

The Fraternal Correspondence Committee for this year is gathering some exciting information about other Jurisdictions.


We will be reporting information about charities, dress codes and Senior Living Communities.

NOTES FROM YOUR CAL STAR NEWS EDITORIAL CONSULTANT - CHERRI WHITELEY

Soggy Greetings—

It seems that is the appropriate way to begin this message. I don't think anyone in the state has been spared from more than normal rain and even unusual snow. We can't even seem to meet anyone without weather becoming the topic. I hope this finds you safe and warm.



This edition features the autobiographies from the Escorts of this year's Grand Officers and more of the articles from our Deputy Grand Matrons. Of special interest is the article from a Grand Representative about her travels—something we sincerely hope will inspire and encourage other Grand Representatives to submit about their travels or communications. Our next edition will actually feature some history of the position of Grand Representative so it would be great to have articles to go with that sharing.

In our last edition, I covered the development of the position of Deputy Grand Matron. This time I'd like to briefly cover some details of the very beginning of the Grand Chapter of California.

On April 7, 1873, seven Chapters and 18 persons attended a meeting in San Francisco to discuss establishing a Grand Chapter. The persons involved were Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, and Associate Matrons, as the office of Associate Patron was not provided in the Ritual that was current at that time. The seven Chapters included: Golden Gate #1 in San Francisco, Suisun #2 in Suisun, Silver Star #3 in Vallejo, California #4 in San Francisco, Alameda #7 in Alameda, Oakleaf #8 in Oakland, and Evangeline #9 in Nevada City. Chapters #4 and #7 no longer exist and Chapters #2, #3, and #8 still exist but have different names and/or locations due to consolidation. Only Chapters #1 and #9 still bear the same name in the same location.


That meeting in April produced a draft of a constitution which was adopted on May 8, 1873. The first "Annual Communication" was held from October 15-17 of that year. I find it interesting that October was the ongoing tradition of Grand Chapter sessions, as for the first 98 years, it was held in October. In 1972, the 99th session was held at the end of September, but as we all know, we have experienced sessions in October for many years.

Much of the original Constitution is still a part of the document by which we serve today. However, there was not an Instruction Book at that time. Some of what is now in our Instruction Book was actually a part of the Constitution.


We've come a long way since our founding—if my math proves correct, it has been 150 years. Much has changed and continues to change in some ways, but our lessons and values are still the same as when that Grand Chapter was founded.

As always, I look forward to seeing you in my travels and especially look forward to hearing from more Chapters with articles to share about the wonderful things that are happening throughout California Eastern Star.

Hello Sisters and Brothers,

I hope everyone had a wonderful Holiday season and your new year is going well. I hope every member is tracking their Travel, Service and Chapter points for the 2023 Travel Service Program, Hand and Hand Together We Can! The pins are beautiful, and I'd love to see our members wearing them proudly.

The point sheet is available on the OESCal website and you can track your points on the Point sheet or a piece of paper or in an excel spreadsheet. Include Date completed, Type of Travel or Service or Chapter, the explanation and the points earned. Please include your name, title, Chapter name and number, and your phone number. Sign your name on the last page along with the date you submit it to a Grand Representative. The Grand Representative will forward it to the Northern or Southern Grand Representative Association President who will review the point sheet, date it was received, and the day they sent the Travel Pin to the Grand Representative that submitted your form. That Grand Representative will present the Travel Pin at a local Chapter meeting.

December is a time of giving and I'm sure many of our members gave to local service programs and sent cards to other members. In January, did you attend a Masonic Lodge Installation, go on the DeMolay Advisory Council or Job's Daughters or Rainbow Girl Advisory Boards? Did you attend your local AMI or attend an OV of our WGM and WGP? You earn points for all those items along with attending a Masonic Youth or Lodge fundraiser. Are you an elected officer of your Chapter? Have you signed a petition for the Degrees, assisted in your Chapter's fundraiser, or participated in your Chapter's Service Project? Have you substituted for an officer at another Chapter or visited another Chapter? You earned points.

The points are easy to earn and I'm sure that many of you might have already earned your Travel Pin, you just may not know it. Count your points, and turn them in. Our WGM Kimberlie wants to know the totals of the Service, Travel or Chapter activities our members have given at the end of this year. So, I hope you will turn your points in once you have reached the 223 total. I know some members who may not want the pin, but I would love to encourage you to turn in your points to either a Grand Representative, a President of the Northern or Southern Grand Representative Association, or myself. I know many of you give to our community, attend meetings, support our Masonic Youth and Lodges, and send cards to members. Our WGM, Kimberlie, wants to know the totals of all your Travel, Service, or Chapter support. If you do not want the pin, just write "No Pin Please" on your tracking sheet and no pin will be presented to you. Thank you for turning in your points.



If you see us in our travels, please come and say "hi", I promise although I can be quiet at first...it doesn't last long!




2023 Deputy Grand Matrons


But I still have time for my favorite things: cooking, a walk on the beach, swimming, and treasure hunting.

Like my grandfather who was named after his father, I'm named after my mother. Two Nancys in the same household can be confusing.


I have a daughter who, forgive me, I think is amazing.





In 1958, Rowena was the wife of H. Harris Donaldson, Jr., when he was Worshipful Master of Foothill Lodge #564, Free and Accepted Masons in Oakland, California. Later, she was active in her daughters' Job's Daughters Bethel #169 in Los Altos, holding Board positions and being Bethel Guardian in 1965 when both daughters were Honored Queens. (An interesting piece of OES history: Walt Hammond was Associate Bethel Guardian that year, too. He and his wife, Ferne Hammond, were active in California Grand Chapter for decades.)

A little bit about Rowena: Born in Chilliwack, British Columbia, she moved to Southern California as a toddler. She attended schools in a few beach towns, graduating from Venice High School in 1940. In 1945, she married Harris and moved to Oakland. They had two daughters. The family vacationed at the family cabin in Felton until Harris finished building their first ski boat. The Donaldson Family participated in The Golden Gate Water Ski Club Shows and Competitions.

They built their home on the San Joaquin River Delta themselves after demolishing a few buildings to reuse and reclaim building materials. Rowena even drew up the blueprints that were submitted to Alameda County for their building permits.
