




We lovingly dedicate the Proceedings of the 70th annual session of the Grand Chapter of California to

Sister Young was a charter member of Naomi Chapter No. 36, organized in May, 1879, and served as the Worthy Matron in 1881-1882. In October, 1884, she was elected Worthy Grand Matron of the Grand Chapter of California. In May, 1892, her husband, Past Grand Patron John Nelles Young, instituted Carita Chapter No. 115 in Alameda, and in October of the same year Sister and Brother Young affiliated with the Chapter. In 1914 Sister Young became a life member of Carita Chapter.









KATHRYN FARWELL Worthy Grand Matron







MUNICIPAL AUDITORIUM LONG BEACH, CALIFORNIA

October 19-21, 1943

The City of Long Beach was host to the 70th annual session of the Grand Chapter of California, held in the Municipal Auditorium, October 19th to 21st, inclusive, 1943. Owing to the impossibility of securing housing accommodations the customary Divine Services on Sunday evening, and the informal opening on Monday night, were omitted.

As befitted a "wartime" session, the decorations in the auditorium were of a patriotic nature—the balcony was draped in the national colors, and in the west hung the Worthy Grand Matron's motto, "Give Me, O Lord, an Understanding Heart"; except for masses of greens edging the steps to the stage, the only decorations were gold drapes, a basket of white and gold flowers at the pedestal and the National Red Cross emblem as the backdrop—simple, but effective reminders of the grim tragedy of the world at war.

The session was called to order at 10:20 A.M., Tuesday, October 19th, by Senior Past Grand Matron, Sister Mary Josephine Young.

Mary Josephine Young, Past Grand Matron:

"Sisters and Brothers, Members of the Order of the Eastern Star: Through the courtesy of our beloved Grand Matron, I have been privileged to sound the gavel which will call to order this seventieth annual session of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star, and on behalf of the Chapters of this fair city to extend a welcome to all.

It affords especial pleasure to perform this work, as our Grand Matron, chosen by you one year ago to fill the highest office in this great organization, is a member of my own Chapter, Carita 115. With a membership in this State of one hundred thousand members, distributed among five hundred Chapters, any one Chapter stands a chance of but one in five hundred of securing the prize, and this last year Carita 115 drew the lucky number.

We appreciate the hospitality extended to us by this beautiful city by the sea, at a time when housing and transportation are at a premium. The restless sea, whose breakers lap the shore day and night without cessation, is symbolic of the unrest which prevails in this world of ours today. We of this organization, dedicated to Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness, are rightly using our utmost endeavors to overcome the spirit of intolerance, hatred and greed which prevails to so great an extent in this troubled world today.

'Time rolls his ceaseless course' and the year of activity of our patriotic officers is near a close. They are in waiting, and are ready to give us an account of the service they have given in aid of our country against our enemies.

We must continue to hope and pray that right will prevail over might, and that to the world peace will be restored, and made permanent."

Sister Young then invited the Junior Past Grand Matron, Sister Corine Orban Melville, and Junior Past Grand Patron, Brother Walker Peddicord, to enter the Grand Chapter room.

Corine Orban Melville, Past Grand Matron:

"Another year has passed and we again have the privilege of coming together, and indeed we should consider it a great privilege under the capable leadership of our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, who have accomplished great things in the service of humanity and in the name of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Truly it can be said that our Worthy Grand Matron is a living example of her own motto, "The Understanding Heart".

Let us each show our appreciation at this 70th session of Grand Chapter and give our full measure of cooperation and support to our two Grand Leaders."

About five hundred Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons entered from the west and took their places in the north and south. They were followed by sixty-seven Deputy Grand Matrons, gowned alike in gold lace, who occupied the seats reserved for them throughout the session on the north and south; then by the twelve Pages and the Grand Officers.

The National Emblem was carried to the East by Brother Harry Emery and the audience gave the pledge of allegiance.

Tribute to the Flag—Ray W. Brown, Past Patron Long Beach Chapter No. 173:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished East, Sisters and Brothers of this seventieth session of Grand Chapter, State of California:

May I direct your attention to the Flag of our beloved country. It is always displayed in the East of every Grand Chapter, where it is accorded the position of highest honor. It is a constant inspiration to every lover of his country. It demands unswerving loyalty and wholehearted devotion to the principles of which it is the glorious representative. It is the majestic symbol of freedom under constitutional government. Beneath its protecting folds, liberty, equality and fraternity have become the heritage of every citizen, while the oppressed of many nations have found peace and happiness in the land over which it floats. The flags of mighty empires have come and gone, but the Stars and Stripes remain. Alone of all flags it expresses the sovcreignty of the people which endures when all else passes away. Speaking with their voice, it has the sanctity of revelation. He who lives under it and is loyal to it, is loyal to truth and justice everywhere. So long as it flies, government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from this earth."

The constitutional number of Chapter representatives answering "present" to roll call, the session was formally opened by the Grand Officers, Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Kathryn Farwell, presiding.

Invocation-Rev. Charles Swift, Wilmington Chapter No. 459:

"O Thou eternal God, we implore thy blessings upon this convocation of delegates representing this grand Order of the Eastern Star which has definitely committed its faith to the sovereignty of God. We thank Thee for the blessings of the past year under these leaders. In this tragic day of total war when the children of Thy creation are engaged in the inhuman task of destroying one another, let this faith in Thee as the Father of all mankind break through the dense darkness and light the way back to sanity and brotherhood.

O Thou God of Adah, Ruth, Esther, Martha and Electa, whose beauty of character breaks through the gloom of man's perfidy and infidelity, rekindle the fires of faith and loyalty to these spiritual lessons of human relationship so essential in holding together our frail humanity now broken to pieces upon the rocks of hates, prejudices, revenge, intolerance and strife.

While this is a glorious moment for those who will be installed to the highest offices the state can bestow upon them, it is the most challenging moment of their existence, both as officers and as individual members of the Order of the Eastern Star. Like an oasis in the midst of the burning sands, they are indeed an oasis of love and goodwill amid the scorching sands of human hates and prejudices which, like Numidian desert lions, pounce upon and destroy human life. In every community, may the refreshing waters of love and goodwill flowing from their Chapters give promise of renewed life and hope to a dying world.

While all humanity is engaged in the global task of destruction of property and life, grant this Order the deeper conception of being the bulwark of those constructive principles of moral and spiritual behaviour essential in rebuilding this wartorn world. Grant them the insight to know that, more important than the military victory upon the battlefield is the holding the bulwark of their own Chapter—the basic battlements of this global war. If these bulwarks of democracy crumble and fall, if the light of Divine Love and human brotherhood is snuffed out by our indifference, then it matters not who wins on the military front.

Thou God of righteousness, the Father of all mankind by right of creation, inspire these delegates while assembled with a new sense of moral and spiritual responsibility as chosen leaders in this tense struggle with the forces of evil and send them back to their Chapters to be girded anew with a faith and devotion that will not only defend the home front, but will make a lasting contribution to the future in establishing a world order of eternal righteousness, a just and durable peace and a lasting international goodwill. Amen."

ADDRESS OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

To the Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Greetings:

Each day holds for us its duties, each hour brings something new,

But always there's a calling to service, be our duties many or few.

Look well to the task that's before you, ere chance of Life's service is gone.

It's a law of our Worshipped Creator, in Life,— Time Marches On.

Time does march on and another milestone has been reached. Every crisis is a time of opportunity and every difficulty presents us with a privilege. This year has provided me with the opportunity of service, not only to our great Order, but to our Country and our fellowman.

When I assumed the responsibilities of my high office I fully realized that this would be a year in which sacrifices must be made. As our Order stands supreme in its high calling, I had full confidence and faith in the membership of our Order, as I entered upon the task of my plan.

It has been difficult to plan a workable war effort program and establish units, while carrying on my official duties, so may the accomplishments of the year's work overshadow my humble efforts.

At the last session of Grand Chapter it was voted that we, the members of the Order of the Eastern Star, enlarge our Red Cross activities to include "War Service". A program was, therefore, devised, whereby the members could make a contribution of 3 cents a member monthly, to a fund known as "War Effort", to provide for our boys in the armed forces.

In order to place the money, contributed by the members, where it could bring the best results, I contacted Mr. A. L. Shafer, Pacific Coast Area Chairman of the American Red Cross, and was advised that the contents of the utility bags were greatly needed and he asked our assistance (the contents costing \$1.00 per bag). I am extremely happy to report that a check for \$7050 was sent to Mr. Shafer's office for this purpose. Recently another check for \$7000 was sent to his office for the purchase of three ambulances, designated for San Diego, Long Beach and Vallejo. The balance of our funds to be used for the kit bags.

A complete report of the contributions, together with the splendid work done by all the members in our grand jurisdiction, in all phases of war effort will be found in our proceedings. I am sure you will have a great sense of pride when you hear read

this wonderful report by our chairman and be so grateful to have had a part in this patriotic service to our Country and to our boys.

Sister Isabelle Mosher, with the assistance of our efficient Grand Secretary, has kept and compiled all the records (no small task), while Sisters Zella Samson, Willa Jane Hellwig and Mary Warmer, Past Grand Matrons and my area chairmen, gave valuable assistance in this large undertaking.

We have established three Red Cross units, one in Los Angeles, one in San Francisco, and one in Oakland, under the direction of Sisters Bess Pierce, Lilas Scagrave and Willa Jane Hellwig. The members are cordially invited to come and sew, knit and make bandages. A marvelous record has been established by these units.

I am deeply grateful to the members for this generous contribution to the war effort fund, and the wonderful work in all branches of war effort and Red Cross. Your efforts have made it possible for our Order to live up to its principles of Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness. My heart is filled with gratitude to all who served as Area, District and County Chairmen and particularly to my capable and efficient chairman and Grand Secretary for their splendid assistance.

We go this way but once, O Soul of Mine, So why not make the journey well worthwhile? Giving to those who travel with us, A helping hand, a word of cheer, a smile.

I am very happy to welcome you to this, our Seventieth Grand Chapter Session, and trust that you will be kind enough to accept conditions as you find them, and be grateful that we are permitted to assemble here and carry on the necessary business of our Order.

This 1943 proceedings is lovingly dedicated to our beloved Senior Past Grand Matron, Sister Mary Josephine Young, and a Past Matron of my own Carita Chapter, and my inspiration. Her faith in me has helped to guide me through these trying times.

This reception was held in the lovely Scottish Rite Temple and the work of the Marshals outstanding. These beautiful receptions will live long in my memory. For the exquisite flowers I was privileged to carry, my war stamp corsage, and the splendid cooperation of my Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons to make these three events the most outstanding of the year, my most sincere thanks.

NEVADA GRAND CHAPTER

I had the pleasure of attending Nevada Grand Chapter and the dinner honoring the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, at which time I was unanimously made an honorary member of their association. I deem this a high honor and rare privilege and shall always be grateful for such a distinguished honor. The session was a most interesting and inspiring one.

CORRESPONDENCE

My official correspondence has been heavy due to the many problems which have arisen in our large jurisdiction, during these unusual times. CIRCULAR LETTERS

To all Subordinate Chapters, Order of the Eastern Star in California. December 10, 1942.

Timely bulletins will be sent periodically. This is just a preliminary notice. I need your help. Every member of the Order is in duty bound to do some specific thing. This is for our Country. I know that my faith in you is well founded and fully justified.

To the Officers and Members, Eastern Star Chapters, State of California.

My dear Members:

The time to extend our War Effort Activities is at hand, and, as your leader, I am sending forth to you this request for your full support of the program which is set forth herein.

The purpose of this War Effort project is to purchase the materials to be made into such necessary articles as are needed by military hospitals for the relief and comfort of our boys who are ill or wounded.

I would suggest that in addition to all other Red Cross and War Effort Activities now being done by you either in the name of our Order or as individuals, that each Chapter within the State make a monthly minimum contribution from Chapter general funds of three cents per capita. As Worthy Grand Matron, I hereby grant dispensation to all Chapters within this Grand Jurisdiction to so appropriate money from chapter funds, which may be replenished by special fund raising activities.

Each Chapter having a War Effort Chairman should immediately send the name and address of such Chairman to your County Chairman, so that our working organization may be perfected without delay. If your Chapter has no such Chairman, kindly see that one is appointed at once.

All money contributed for this purpose should be forwarded monthly to our Grand Secretary and designated for California Grand Chapter War Activities Fund, to be dispersed only by direction of your Worthy Grand Matron.

I trust that you will cooperate to the fullest in this opportunity to be of service to our Country, our Boys and our Order, remembering that if you give to the world the best you have, the best will come back to you.

To all Chapters, O.E.S. in California.

My dear Sisters and Brothers:

Many questions are being asked regarding our War Activities program, especially as to the use of Chapter funds, so I will endeavor to clarify the situation.

Chapter funds cannot be used for donations to any cause, or for any purpose, except as provided by our constitution and laws, without a special dispensation asked for by the Chapter and granted by the Worthy Grand Matron. Further, a dispensation granted in one year is for use in that Chapter year only, and if similar use of Chapter funds is desired in a subsequent year another dispensation is necessary.

Money raised by any group within the Chapter, in the name of the group, not of the Chapter, may be used to purchase furnishings for sunrooms at the Military hospitals, or for any other purpose. However, if the money is raised in the name of the Chapter the net proceeds would be a part of the general fund of the Chapter and it would be necessary to have a special dispensation to use any part of it for such furnishings, for Red Cross, or other war activity. The special dispensation is without cost and would be granted immediately.

The dispensation granted all Chapters in my letter of February first for use of Chapter funds for the War Activities program does not give Chapters the right to appropriate funds for Red Cross or other activity. The general dispensation is for the specific purpose of permitting the Chapters to make a monthly, or annual, appropriation to the War Activities program. The appropriation should start with February and the check should be sent to the Grand Secretary marked "War Activities program". I hope the contributions will be generous in order to take care of the project for the year.

At the request of the chairman of the Pacific area of the Red Cross, the money will be used to purchase the necessary articles to fill the "kit bags" which are so sorely needed. By securing the articles through the Red Cross, the cost per bag is approximately \$1. The kits are given to the boys when they are sent over seas, and are also given to them in foreign service. The material for making the bags may be secured through your local Red Cross Chapter. A Red Cross label marked O.E.S. will be sewed into every bag we fill, so the boys will know the Order of the Eastern Star sent the bag. Material for filling will be distributed through our centers, and the distribution will be in proportion to the contribution from the districts. All donations will be given proper credit on the books of Grand Chapter and will be published in the proceedings.

All phases of Red Cross work are so important that I do not want the members to curtail any activity in which they are en-

gaged at the present time, but to renew their efforts to do more in the future.

In addition to the necessary sewing, knitting, etc. I should like to call attention to the need for donations to the "blood bank". With casualties mounting, blood plasma is urgently needed. Why not organize groups in your Chapter and make a "party" of going to the "bank" to give a pint of blood each?

I sincerely hope that all of our members will respond to the call for help in all branches of war activity, and that the Chapters will do their part in our program.

The text of the new law in this regard reads: "That the pledge of allegiance to the Flag be rendered by standing with the right hand over the heart. However, civilians will always show full respect to the Flag when the pledge is given by merely standing at attention, men removing the head dress. Persons in uniform shall render the military salute."

I trust that you are enjoying your year and making many new friends in the Chapters under your care.

My dear Worthy Matron:

The contribution from the Chapters to the war effort program is extremely gratifying and I wish to take this opportunity of thanking all of my Matrons for the splendid work that is being done in all phases of "war activities".

It is my plan to have published in the 1943 proceedings of Grand Chapter a complete list of the contributions by the Chapters and a table showing the war work that has been done during the year by the members. This table will indicate the number of hours, number of workers, number of various types of garments made, number of members and hours spent in work on bond drives, observation posts and all the other activities in connection with Red Cross work and the war program.

In order to have the table compiled with as little extra work as possible, I am asking that you have your chairman of Red Cross-War Activities Committee send to the office of the Grand Secretary a record of all work done by your members. This report should not give the names of the members, simply the number who have worked, the hours, number of each type of garment and other activities. The report should be sent in June first for the work done since last Grand Chapter, and on October first for the period from June first. The October report must reach the Grand Secretary not later than October fifth in order to be in the proceedings.

A copy of a form for the report, with explanation, is enclosed herewith.

As you are well aware, the need for all types of work is increasing daily and I should like to have our Chapters make a showing which will indicate to all who are not members, that the Order of the Eastern Star is more than a social organization and that its members are working whole-heartedly in support of our government with the view to end the war as speedily as possible.

Let us pray that a just peace is not far off.

Explanation:

36 workers worked 947 hours and made 49 garments, such as dresses, gowns, shorts, etc.; 16 "knitting" means 16 scarfs, pairs of sox, helmets, sweaters, etc. were knitted; 451 "bandages" are the triangular bandages; 9567 "surgical dressings" are the number of such dressings made; 6 robes "Miscellaneous" are articles which were donated, or the materials donated by the members.

Under the general heading "Miscellaneous" should be listed all other activities, only a few of which are noted above.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. On the whole, peace and harmony prevail in the chapters throughout the State, yet in some chapters the black ball is still a menace. The right of the ballot is a sacred privilege and one that should not be abused. If, as we approach the sacred Altar to cast our vote, we would ask ourselves the question, "Am I voting for the best interest of my chapter or the Order, or am I voting according to my personal wishes," and then follow the dictates of our conscience, I am sure the result of the ballot will be right, regardless of the color.

I RECOMMEND that each chapter designate one meeting night in the year to be called "Obligation Night", and at that meeting all members present arise and orally renew their obligation. The particular night for this ceremony shall be left to the discretion of the Worthy Matron, as also the manner of taking the obligation, that is, whether the members assemble at the Altar or stand by their seats.

- 2. Remission of dues for those in the armed services of our country. In the beginning of the year I was besieged with requests to remit the dues of Brothers in the armed forces of our country. Constitutional inhibitions prevented the chapters from remitting dues for this purpose.
- I RECOMMEND that the Constitution of the Grand Chapter be so amended that chapters desiring so to do, may remit the dues of our members who are in the armed forces of our country and further RECOMMEND that where dues have been remitted, a special card be issued to the members whose dues are remitted containing the following language: "The holder of this card, whose signature appears hereon, is a member in good standing of the Order of the Eastern Star in the armed services of the United States of America. Note. Dues having been remitted, this certificate is issued in lieu of a receipt for dues", or other fitting language. Said cards shall be issued by the Grand Secretary.
- 3. Budget and auditing committees. In order that chapter officers may familiarize themselves with the business of the chapter and also participate in its official discussions, I RECOMMEND that all line officers be invited to sit and meet with budget and auditing committees.

- 4. Grand Chapter sessions. In view of transportation difficulties, housing facilities and other circumstances resulting from the war, I RECOMMEND that this Grand Chapter consider an amendment to the Constitution limiting the attendance and voting delegates of future Grand Chapter sessions during the present world war emergency. (This recommendation was withdrawn by action of the Grand Body.)
- 5. Post-war activity. I RECOMMEND that this Grand Chapter consider the re-establishment of a Student Loan Fund to take care of extraordinary conditions which may occur at the termination of the present war.
- 6. Flags. Many chapters have large and unwieldy flags that are difficult even for a man to carry. I RECOMMEND that chapter flags be of a standard size, both as to the banner and staff.

ADDRESS OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, State of California:

In writing this report, it is pleasant to again relive in memory the many happy fraternal and social incidents and events of my year as your Worthy Grand Patron, having in mind, however, that you have the right to expect from me such recommendations and constructive criticism, based upon observation and experience, as will assist you in shaping the policies of the Order.

The year of 1943 will go down in our country's history as a war year and, yet, one of great material accomplishments and achievements. Faced with bitter, ruthless enemies, both to the East and the West, ours is a struggle for the very existence of that which we have termed the American way of life and, with the assistance of our Allies, a firm belief in right and justice, and with God's help, we will prevail.

In a country at war, there is no place for the drone. If we are to win eventual victory and peace, if we are to preserve our institutions, our culture and our liberties, then upon every man, woman and child in the nation is placed the obligation of sharing willingly in the burdens of war. Certainly this is not a great sacrifice when we ask our fighting men and women to give their lives! By the same token, every organization existing in this country must shoulder its share of the burdens and must continue to do so until final victory has been achieved.

I, therefore, recommend that every emphasis be placed upon all types of war work that we, as an organization, are capable of doing; that our Red Cross units be increased in number and that they receive necessary financial support from this Grand Chapter.

During the past year, I have received many complaints from officers and members in all parts of the State concerning the multitude of worthwhile projects that they are constantly being solicited to support, either by a direct financial contribution, the purchase of tickets, or otherwise, at the same time that they have signified their willingness to support one worthwhile project. This creates an unhealthy condition and promotes dissension among various individuals and groups within the Order while present conditions and circumstances require our united coordinated effort.

I, therefore, recommend that this Grand Chapter approve a war-effort program, and that the Grand Secretary notify each chapter of the action taken; that this Grand Chapter declare it to be unlawful to solicit any chapter, officer or member for

financial support to any project except the one approved by this Grand Chapter, this action not to interfere, however, with any project sponsored by a Present or Past Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, and carried on within the confines of their own organizations or with the activities of any chapter carried on in the chapter itself.

During the past three years, the Order of the Eastern Star in the State of California has made an enviable record in Red Cross work. As in all war activities, we should never be satisfied with our efforts but should constantly strive for even greater results. In order to accomplish the best of which we are capable, it is imperative that our efforts be coordinated and that we take such steps which appear to be necessary to eliminate any interference with this work.

It is of even greater importance that the question of the jurisdiction of this Grand Chapter and our right to govern ourselves by laws, rules and regulations passed by our delegates without interference or encroachment by General Grand Chapter be established. This is a matter of vital importance to ourselves and to our future and should receive our earnest and undivided attention. Prior to the formation of General Grand Chapter, we were the sole rulers of our own destiny. A careful examination of proceedings of our Grand Chapter discloses: (1) That we were willing to participate in the formation of a General Grand Chapter for one purpose only, and that—to induce a uniformity in ritual; (2) Our Grand Chapter was, and has been, careful throughout the years to retain unto ourselves complete autonomy as to government.

In the proceedings of 1877, it is established that General Grand Chapter shall only have such powers as are delegated to it by the various Grand Chapters. In the proceedings of this Grand Chapter for the year 1941, on pages 164 and 165 thereof, this Grand Chapter in solemn session again unanimously reiterated our complete independence and right of self-government.

I, therefore, recommend:

First: That this Grand Chapter not accept a charter from General Grand Chapter which contains provisions that, by its acceptance, subordinates this Grand Jurisdiction and our Constitution rules and regulations to any action which might be taken by General Grand Chapter and which has the effect of delegating to General Grand Chapter our right of self-government;

Second: That a committee be appointed to study the problems involved and to make recommendations as to our future procedure in this matter.

EASTERN STAR HOME

During the past year, it has been a pleasure for me to visit our Eastern Star Home on several occasions, and to participate in the work of the Board. The Home is to me visual and material evidence of one of the most worthwhile attributes of our Order; that is, the extending of the fraternal hand of friendship, aid and support to a member in need. While it is true that viewing the Home in retrospect it is now easy to see many ways in which it might have been made to better serve the purpose for which it was intended; yet, it represents a large capital investment and, of greater importance to us is the obligation that we have to these members who have been admitted to the Home and whose welfare and happiness should be our first concern.

Everyone is familiar with the fact that during the past year there has been a tremendous increase in wages and in living expenses which has had a direct effect upon the management of the Home, and no one is capable of foreseeing what the future holds in store. In my opinion, we have reached the cross-roads and must make a definite decision: (1) Either to abandon the Home or (2) To provide the means of proper financing which will permit its maintenance and operation in the face of changing conditions.

It has been a pleasure to work with the members of the Board, each of whom has given their time and have endeavored conscientiously to manage and operate the Home as economically as possible. They have continuously sought ways and means to better conditions and curb expenses and, in that connection, have sought and obtained the advice of experts. I do not believe it is possible to operate the Home more economically than it is being operated at the present time and, on the other hand, its proper maintenance will require additional expenditures in wages in order to obtain and keep competent help and additional expenditures in order to maintain even the present standard of living.

Each year conditions have required further depletion of the reserve fund, and this year is no exception. This fund should be maintained at its present level in order to meet emergencies and, in particular, building maintenance and repair which will increase as the building ages. An assessment should be levied each year in an amount sufficient to replace withdrawals from the reserve fund and to meet current running expenses. At the present rate, the reserve fund will be gone in approximately five years at which time we will be confronted with the necessity of deciding whether to abandon the Home or provide sufficient financing. It would appear to me that we should anticipate the inevitable and make our decision now.

WORTHY PATRONS' FUND

At the beginning of this year, the 1943 Patrons of California inaugurated a fund to be used for the aid to wounded veterans. To date, the contributions total \$1,738.93 and the expenditures amount to \$215.82. Many of the Patrons have advised me that they have funds on hand to send in, which will be received after

this report is written, so that the total will probably exceed \$2,000 for the year. Although I have been appointed as Trustee of the fund, the Patrons themselves are entitled to all the credit for the idea and for putting it into effect. I commend and compliment them for their zeal as officers and members and Americans!

DISPENSATIONS AND CHARTERS

At the beginning of this year it was impossible to foresee the effect that the impact of total war might have upon our organization. I, therefore, decided not to grant dispensations for the formation of new chapters, feeling that an effort should be made to maintain and, in some cases, to strengthen the chapters already in existence. During the year, there has been very little, if any, decrease in attendance, while the records indicate a large increase in membership.

I have received, and have in my possession, a petition for a dispensation for a new chapter to be known as "Good Hope Chapter", and to be located on West Adams Boulevard in Los Angeles, California. After careful investigation and in the light of our experience this year, I now feel that a dispensation should be granted for the formation of this chapter.

APPRECIATION

I acknowledge with grateful appreciation the privilege and honor accorded me by this Grand Chapter in being selected to serve this past year with our Worthy Grand Matron. Her poise, dignity, charming personality and understanding has been an inspiration to all members of the Order. Her experience and executive ability, coupled with untiring effort, has given the Order a leader of whom we are all proud!

During the year, it has been a pleasure for both Leota and me to attend many installations, receptions and more than two-thirds of the official visits with our Worthy Grand Matron and, on these occasions, to meet personally many of the officers and members of the State. Upon many of our visits, we enjoyed the company of Brother Everett Farwell, the husband of our Worthy Grand Matron, and we are deeply indebted to both of them for their hospitality and the many courtesies extended to us. Their friendship will always remain one of our most cherished possessions. It also gives me pleasure to report that during the year I have visited nine chapters in the State which have never before been visited by a Worthy Grand Patron.

I am deeply indebted to Service Chapter, its officers and members for the receptions given to me the past two years and for the loyalty, support and friendship shown to Leota and me during our entire membership.

Our year has been a happy one and, for that, all credit is due our Grand Officers and our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons. Our association with them has been harmonious and pleasant. Their loyalty, friendship and constant effort to fulfill every duty expected of them has enriched our lives. Mere words of appreciation are wholly inadequate to express the sincere friendship which we feel for them or the appreciation that is in our hearts.

We are also deeply indebted to the chapters throughout the State for the many courtesies and expressions of friendship which we have received this year.

I will forever cherish the memories of this year and, as it draws to a close, I acknowledge with a grateful heart that it was made possible through the sacrifice, understanding, advice, constant love and affection of my wife, Leota. If I have succeeded in obtaining any measure of success in the eyes of my Sisters and Brothers, the credit is hers.

In conclusion, may I commend to you that we

Instruction Books.

New Instruction Books were printed and sent to the Chapters early in the year. Chapters were required to return the old books for exchange. Five Chapters did not return complete sets, nor did they pay the fines for the loss of the old books, consequently these Chapters were not furnished the new issue for the missing books. (Azalia I, Harmony 1, Mission 1, Citrus 1, Jewel 1.) Big Bear Chapter has not returned any of the old issue.

Emergency Benevolent Fund.

Early in the year a loan of \$10 was made to Sister * * *, a Past Grand Matron from another jurisdiction who was stranded in San Francisco. The loan was repaid a few months later, accompanied by a letter of appreciation.

In June an emergency call came to the office from a member from Texas. At my request, Sister Uriel Wood, Secretary of Oak Leaf Chapter, immediately called on the young lady and advanced a sufficient amount to pay her rent until she would receive her first pay check. She was employed by the Government in Oakland and could not draw on her salary. This loan was repaid October 7th.

Other personal calls were made for help, but as the memberships were held in local Chapters the Sisters were told to contact the Matron or Secretary. I might add, that there is considerable lack of knowledge on the part of Matrons as to the proper procedure to secure relief for members.

Funerals.

My grateful thanks to the officers and members of the Chapters who handled funeral services for out of State members—the calls were turned over to the Presidents of the Matrons' Associations so I do not know who conducted the services. In many cases letters of appreciation were received from members of the family of the deceased.

Several times during the year requests have come to the office to find living quarters for the families of service men in San Francisco and in other cities in the State. I regret to say that in almost every case it was impossible to secure anything more than a hotel room, and even that only after making telephone calls to ten or more hotels.

I do not know whether it is because of the war, or because the office tries to be helpful, but we have certainly had some strange calls for help this year: among them calls to purchase baby clothes; to get gifts for men in service; to locate persons who "lived in San Francisco many years ago" and whose surnames only were known; and most unusual of all was the request for the details of a suicide, which strange as it may seem, I was able to furnish as I had known the deceased very well.

Report of the Auditor:

The attached report of the Auditor gives the detailed financial condition of the Grand Chapter. Income for the year was sufficient to pay all expenses of operation, except in the case of the Home where there was a deficit of \$4,042.65. Through an oversight, the bills which were presented at the last session and ordered paid, were omitted from the Budget, but even with this omission of almost \$1300.00 the appropriation for the year was not exceeded.

Unfinished Business.

No report was made by the Finance, Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence Committees last year on the report of the Grand Chapter Activities Committee of 1941.

The Committees on Constitution and Laws and Jurisprudence did not report on the matter of the charter from General Grand Chapter. (p. 122, 1942 Proceedings.)

Recommendation:

Conditions of travel, as well as modes of transportation, have changed so materially in recent years that it is practically impossible to arrive at the true fares paid by delegates. Under the present provisions of our Constitution and Laws a delegate is to be paid "a sum of money equal to the lowest published railroad fare for one person from and to the city or town in which a subordinate Chapter meets". When the convention is held in the central part of the State, practically all delegates can reach the convention city in twelve hours or less by bus or train; however, if the meeting is not at a central point some delegates have a trip of eighteen or more hours and under the law are entitled only to the coach fare, although if the trip is necessarily overnight, the Mileage Committee has allowed the additional expense. This has

caused considerable dissatisfaction among the delegates, due to some collecting considerably more than others from relatively the same distance. In order to make a more equable payment to all, I recommend that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three members who are familiar with transportation problems, to work out a plan, with necessary constitutional amendments, to be submitted to the next session.

Appreciation.

"Thank you" to the editors of the various fraternal magazines received regularly at the office—they have given interesting insights into other jurisdictions. Also my sincere appreciation to Bro. C. C. Hunt, Grand Secretary and Librarian of Iowa Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. for the monthly bulletins, proceedings and beautiful holiday greetings sent to the office, as I have found so much that is worth while in Brother Hunt's writings.

In going through the Proceedings of our early meetings to get some data for the Worthy Grand Patron, I found the following comment, made by the chairman of the committee reporting on the annual address of the Worthy Grand Matron in 1879, and which is quoted for your enjoyment and for my guidance:

"So much pleased, indeed, are your Committee with this admirable address, so free from superfluities or sentimental gush, that we feel warranted in recommending it as a model for all future efforts in this direction."

It is a pleasure each year to get to know the Grand Officers and Deputies and to renew old acquaintances. Our Grand Treasurer's happy smile was a welcome sight whenever and wherever we met—it has been a joy to be associated with you, Kittie.

Worthy Grand Patron, for your courtesies and for the pleasure it has been to meet your charming wife, I thank you.

Our Worthy Grand Matron is a friend of long standing—we served our respective Chapters as Worthy Matrons in 1931 and have enjoyed a warm friendship since that time. Being Worthy Grand Matron has not spoiled you, Kathryn, and I hope that with the close of your strenuous year we will be able to resume our interrupted good fellowship. Your gracious, friendly manner has endeared you to the membership throughout the State. It has been a great pleasure to serve Grand Chapter under your capable leadership and I sincerely trust the future will bring you and Everett every happiness.

During the year I meet at various times with groups of Secretaries in the Bay area and in Los Angeles. At these meetings we discuss the problems that are a part of every Secretary's life, and we benefit mutually from an interchange of opinions and ideas. I wish it were possible to have the same contacts with groups in other parts of the State. To those of you whom I have had the pleasure of meeting personally, and to all of the others whom I have met only through correspondence, goes my heartiest thanks for your loyal cooperation and for your understanding friendship.

For all of the kindnesses received at the hands of the members and for your many little acts of thoughtfulness, I sincerely thank you and humbly hope that I merit your continued faith and esteem.

Closing.

This year, with the entire world embroiled in a struggle, the magnitude of which is almost beyond comprehension, I should like to pass on to you an anonymous "Meditation on the Lord's Prayer" which I found in one of the Eastern Star magazines sent to the office several years ago:

Our Father, Who Art in Heaven,

Help me to believe this day that there is a power to lift me up, which is stronger than all the things that hold me down.

Hallowed Be Thy Name.

Help me to be sensitive to what is beautiful and responsive to what is good, so that day by day I may grow more sure of the holiness of life in which I want to trust.

Help me to be quick to see, and ready to encourage, whatever brings the better meaning of God into that which otherwise might be the common round of the uninspired day.

Thy Will Be Done, on Earth as It Is in Heaven.

Help me to believe that the ideals of the spirit are not a faroff dream, but a power to command my loyalty and direct my life here on our real earth.

Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread,

Open the way for me to earn an honest living without anxiety; but let me never forget the needs of others, and make me want only that benefit for myself which will also be their gain.

And Forgive Us Our Debts, as We Forgive Our Debtors,

Securities-\$231,212.69:

All securities are kept in a safe-deposit box at the Wells Fargo Bank and Union Trust Company and were personally inspected by us. All coupons and interest checks due were received and deposited in the proper banks.

During the year the Homes Fund sold \$5,000.00 U. S. Treasury bonds to the Residents' Properties Fund and \$4,000.00 U. S. Treasury bonds to the Endowment Fund to provide the additional cash necessary for operating expenses.

A 5% liquidating dividend was received from the Mutual Building and Loan Association of Long Beach. The investments in the Pacific States Savings and Loan Association and the Mutual Building and Loan Association, in amount \$18,596.73, are frozen at the present time. The other building and loan investments are paying interest and are subject to withdrawals at any time.

Students' Loans-\$200.00:

A \$25.00 payment was received on one of the notes. There are still two loans outstanding, each for \$100.00.

Eastern Star Homes:

Detailed reports of the Homes operations and of the Residents' Properties Fund are submitted separately.

Endowment Fund:

The Endowment Fund now amounts to \$34,006.48, an increase of \$8,254.63 for the year. This increase came from the following sources:

The interest earned and transferred to the Homes operating fund amounted to \$742.43.

Revenue and Expense:

As shown by our Exhibit B, all funds, except the Homes Fund, shows an excess of revenue over expenses. The expenses of the Homes exceeded the revenue received by \$4,042.65. This loss amounts to 4¢ per member, and when added to the 35¢ assessment paid, shows that an assessment of 39¢ was needed to operate the Home during the year 1942-43.

All dues and assessments payable during the current year, as reported on the 1943 annual returns have been paid in full. The total revenue due, as shown by all annual returns, agrees with the total cash received from the Chapters by the Grand Secretary.

A test check was made of the 1943 returns and those examined were found to have been correctly prepared.

We certify that, in our opinion, subject to the foregoing comments, the attached statements set forth the financial condition of the Grand Chapter and the Homes, as at August 31, 1943, and the result of their operations for the fiscal year 1942-1943.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California, O. E. S.: Greetings:

Your Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California is pleased to submit for your consideration their annual report for the year ending August 31, 1943.

The first meeting for the year was held November at the Home in Los Angeles. The first order of business was the election of officers for the ensuing year, at which time Emma Eugenia Rutherford was again elected President and Mary I. Warmer Vice President. Our ever faithful Grand Secretary, Maud Mc-Williams Smith, filled her accustomed place. We were glad to greet our new member, Past Grand Patron Walker Peddicord.

The following committee chairmen were then appointed, all other trustees serving as members of each committee:

Administration—Mary I. Warmer Admissions—Ralph Boynton Finance—Walker Peddicord Home Policy—Gladys Pierce

Eight regular meetings were held and one special meeting. All were held at the Home except two, which were held in the office of our Grand Secretary. Our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron have attended most of the meetings. We have been pleased to note their interest and participation in the problems of the Home. We have regretted that our Grand Treasurer, Sister Kittie Briggs, has led such a busy life that she has been unable to be with us as often as we desired her presence.

Completing my fifth year as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Home, I have a feeling of helplessness as I look back on those years. I had hoped to aid in decreasing the cost of maintenance of the Home. But, each year there has been an advance in cost of maintenance due to the stress of the times. Your Board of Trustees and the Superintendent have ever had in their minds how best to lower the cost of operation of the Home and yet keep up the appearance of affluence that the architecture and furnishings of the Home indicate—beautiful, to be sure, but expensive to operate. The majority of the guests in the Home come from humble homes and would be as happy in simpler surroundings.

You will observe from the report of the Finance Committee that the income of the Home is far below the cost of operation. This is due largely to the size of the Home and the few that live there in comparison. Then, too, there has been the problem of meeting the salaries of the present day. No home, however

humble, where help is maintained, can compete with the wage scale of this war era.

We desire to acknowledge our appreciation to the Board for their kindness during the illness of my husband this past year.

It was a pleasure to be able to persuade Brother Joseph Argabrite to take time out of his busy life and again assume the task of attorncy for the Board. We have appreciated his wise counsel.

Our Superintendent, Miss Jean Hubble, has completed a hard year of work. So many demands are made by the government on residences of the type of our Home and Miss Hubble has met them all and met them well. We have greatly appreciated her careful, statistical reports at each meeting.

I would like to see regular Eastern Star meetings held in the Home. We sing "Blest be the tie that binds" and to me that tie that binds is the hearing over and over at our meetings the beautiful words of our ritual. They serve as notes of harmony, a renewal of the obligation.

Again we wish to acknowledge our indebtedness to Past Grand Patron D. W. Pierce for his help and advice in the matter of insurance on the Home property. Through him we have been able to effect great savings in premiums.

If you will carefully read the reports of the committee chairmen for the year, you will have a better understanding of the problems met by the Board of Trustees. We hope you will know that each member of the Board has faithfully tried to serve you well.

The Board recommends that for the year 1944 the Home assessment be 40 cents per capita, payable as other Grand Chapter fees and dues, on the membership as of May 31, 1944.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

To the Board of Trustees Eastern Star Home Greetings:

Attached hereto is a detailed report covering the period from September 1, 1942 to September 1, 1943, showing receipts and disbursements for the operation of the Home.

Total net expense for maintenance of the Home was \$40,864.38. Per capita cost was \$623.88.

Medical care, including X-rays, laboratory tests, care of eyes, minor operations and one breast amputation, including hospitalization and a series of twenty post-operative X-ray therapy treatments, amounted to \$1537.56.

Total number of meals served was 75,948 as compared with 77,770 last year.

Articles bought for the Home and work done on the building are as follows:

By order of the Fire Department we had to change two sets of the Garden Court doors to open into the corridor instead of into the room itself. This cost \$165.00 for a first class job. Also chain latches were required on a number of inside and outside doors to replace the bolt catches originally there. The cost of this was negligible as we bought the catches and they were installed by the maintenance man.

Material was bought to recover six spring chairs belonging in the employees' rooms. The material cost \$13.35 and the work was done by Mrs. Smith and Mr. Smithen.

A board walk was placed from the east ramp to the driveway at a cost of \$15.52.

Eight new shades for bedrooms and one blackout shade for the front office were bought at a cost of \$57.30. Old shades were utilized to repair others which needed mending. This work was done by Mrs. Cora Johnson and Mrs. Marion Penfield.

A new linen supply was bought at a cost of \$258.91. Six dozen each of sheets, pillowslips, face towels, bath towels, wash cloths and table napkins. Three dozen new tablecloths were also purchased.

Two more of the bedroom spring chairs, with two of the small straight chairs and two occasional chairs from one of the solariums, were reupholstered at a cost of \$50.72.

The house was dimmed out in January in accordance with General DeWitt's orders. Tarpaper on wood frames was used to cover the skylights in the kitchen and globes were removed from all outside lamps. The front vestibule light was reduced. Cost of this was \$4.82.

The dining room awnings were painted by the maintenance man at a cost of \$4.49. These awnings are quite worn and very brittle.

A cart was built for the gardener's use by the maintenance man at a cost of \$20.25. Bicycle wheels obtained for the cart cost \$17.25.

The front basement room was fixed up for occupancy by a male employee at a cost of \$25.00. A few pieces of used furniture were bought and a window cut and installed in the inside wall by the maintenance man.

The Victory garden project was a failure due to the resignation of the special gardener hired for this purpose and the impossibility of replacing him. A few of the residents and staff members salvaged all they possibly could and set out 210 tomato plants, cared for them and gathered a large crop which supplied the house with all the tomatoes which could be used, as well as making 16 gallons of tomato juice, 8 gallons of chile sauce and 2 gallons of catsup. This latter work was done by Miss Minnie Freeman and Mrs. Gordon, one of our housekeepers. Miss Freeman did most of the work earing for the tomatoes, as well as planting beans, cabbage and squash from which enough was obtained for several meals.

\$19.75 has been spent on caring for the beehives this year. This includes new supers and frames as well as labor. Four hundred and ten pounds of honey was obtained from the nine hives.

The power mower was completely overhauled at a cost of \$6.99, and the Jennings pump to the heating system was overhauled and new parts installed at a cost of \$......

A freezing locker was rented and stocked last December, but, due to the meat shortage, we have not benefited from this as we would in normal times. However, it has been very useful as an emergency storing place.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Homes of California: Greetings:

The report of the Auditor shows the financial transactions of the Home for the fiscal year 1942-43. The deficit this year was \$4,042.65. This deficit was about one-third of that of last year owing to the increase in the assessment voted by Grand Chapter last October from 25 cents to 35 cents per member. The Auditor has called to our attention that had the assessment been set at 40 cents per member instead of 35 cents the operations account of the Home would have shown no deficit at all.

A check of Eastern Star Homes in the United States reveals an average assessment for their support as shown by the last published proceedings of 43 cents per member. This does not give a basis for an exact comparison, of course, because of the variable amount of other income, as from investments, endowment funds or gifts.

The average cost per resident per year is a better basis of financial comparison. This varies from \$400.00 to \$900.00. It is \$400.00 in each of the two largest Eastern Star Homes in the country, each of which has 100 or more residents. The cost is the same amount in one Home in a low wage area in the South. The average cost per resident is from \$800.00 to \$900.00 in the New England States. \$606.00 is an approximate average cost, as shown by the last reports, of yearly support for each resident of an Eastern Star Home throughout the United States. This sum is about the same as the average cost for California, as shown by our last proceedings, of \$608.66. It may be assumed that these costs advanced somewhat this year. Our own costs are among the lowest for Homes situated in metropolitan areas.

Food expense for the Home has increased during the latter months of the fiscal year just closed. It is expected that this increased expense will continue during the ensuing year. Salary expense, including the expense of advertising for help, has also increased during the last few months. It is possible that this expense will increase somewhat during the coming year, in spite of the considerable amount of work now being done by residents of the Home.

The Auditor employed by Grand Chapter for many years has suggested the advisability of stabilizing the assessment for op-

eration of the Home. He stated in this connection that a check of the records of the Home for the last several years shows that 40 cents per member would have enabled it to avoid a deficit in its operations.

It seems to the Finance Committee that it is better for the Home and for Grand Chapter that an attempt be made to eliminate as far as possible uncertainty and debate each year as to the amount of the assessment. In such case, the proper basis for fixing that amount is the cost of operation, and the amount set should enable the Home to break even in its annual account of operation from year to year.

We have audited the accounts and records of the Eastern Star Homes of California for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1943, and submit the following statements:

Exhibit A: Balance Sheet, August 31, 1943.

Exhibit B: Statement of Revenue and Expense for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1943.

The loss from operation of the home amounted to \$4,042.65 for the year. The net operating costs for the year amounted to \$40,864.38 as compared to \$38,954.60 for the year 1941-42, an increase of \$1,909.78. The expenses showing the largest increase are salaries \$1,000.00 and taxes \$2,300.00. Repairs and replacements expense shows a decrease of \$800.00 and provisions decreased \$600.00. The other expenses are about the same as last year. The average yearly residents increased from 64 for 1942 to 65.5 for 1943.

During the year \$5,000.00 United States Treasury Bonds were sold to the Residents' Properties Fund and \$4,000.00 to the Endowment Fund to provide the additional cash necessary for operating expenses.

This report is made as a detailed part of our annual report on Grand Chapter to which reference should be made for further comments.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA

September 1, 1943

To the Members of the Board of Trustees:

The past year has been one of turmoil and almost day by day struggle to keep our standards high, due to wartime restrictions and the acute lack of personnel on our staff. It has been impossible to keep all positions on our staff filled, consequently the residents themselves have had to fill in and actually do the work necessary to our continued routine and well-being. It is fitting that high tribute should be paid to those residents who have worked hard and long hours in the kitchen and dining room, as well as all over the house, keeping our Home clean and in its usual inspiring state to ourselves as well as our visitors.

Tribute should also be paid to our very loyal and interested employees, who have done duties far beyond requirement without complaint, but with eager willingness to aid where needed.

Lack of entertainment and outside interests have been keenly felt, but we realize the impossibility of the normal number of visitors and programs, due to gasoline rationing and the fact that people are working harder and have fewer free hours than ever before.

The one day which stands out in our memories as a most enjoyable day is March 25th, when our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron with members of the Grand Family paid us their annual visit. We enjoyed the hours of visiting after luncheon and especially enjoyed the music so graciously provided by the Grand Organist.

We have done what we could to help the war effort, by opening our doors to our neighbors for classes in First Aid, Home Nursing, Air-Raid Wardens and Firefighters. For over a year our banquet room has almost continually been the scene of such classes. We feel that we have gained friends from our neighbors who formerly knew nothing about our Home, and now, in the event of an air raid, we will be in their thoughts and assistance will come through them.

Several of the residents are knitting for the Red Cross, thus adding their bit to winning the war. Others contributed generously in the Red Cross drive.

Nerves have been tense, tempers short, sharp words spoken hastily and feelings injured, when we forgot, or did not try to remember our Saviour's Golden Rule.

There is a little verse which recently came into my hands which I wish could be burned into the hearts and consciousness of every one of us, and practiced always.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

The following report was read by the Chairman, Hazael Marsh Piper, Past Grand Matron:

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members and Delegates of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, assembled for this Seventieth Annual Session:

Greetings:

Our Worthy Grand Matron offered as her cornerstone of this year's work, "Service with an understanding heart".

Pursuant to her ideas and ideals, the Education Committee has endeavored to furnish many programs of an educational nature for the purpose of raising the standard of our beautiful Order and helping our membership throughout our State to become better fitted for the hazards and responsibilities of living during these war-torn days of anxiety and depression.

The fruit of our Education Committee is not learning but the desire of greater knowledge for a power for good.

There never has been a time when the desire to know more about a changing world was so prevalent and strong. There never has been a time when there were so many intelligent men and women who were not content with surface knowledge. They seek to penetrate into the hidden causes of things.

The impact of the war on our high schools and colleges has been most severe. The trend so far is toward the teaching of tasks and techniques, and this is inevitable. But our Chapters can fulfill a great need toward enlightening the households of our members who are deprived of this "every day" education with our boys and girls who have been called into active service. We can become teachers for a better world and a lasting peace through our educational balance and programs at our Chapter meetings.

The greatest defect of our educational endeavors is that we are in the habit of putting pleasure all on one side, and education on the other, as though all study was weariness. Adequate knowledge and accustomed thought will be one of the greatest factors in the reconstruction of society and home life after this world conflict we are so gravely engaged in at the present time is at an end.

Dr. William Neilson, president emeritus of Smith College, speaking recently, frankly admitted, "that there is some doubt whether the humanities will regain their former place after the war".

Then it should be that our Eastern Star make greater endeavor to promote an educational program that will be recognized throughout our communities as a power for good and right living. Let us make ourselves better citizens to face the dangers of today and the peace of tomorrow by awakening our best efforts toward the cultivation of our finer interests and the strengthening desire to be useful and worthy of good.

Such has been the objective of the Education Committee of this Grand Chapter.

Over seven hundred communications have passed through the hands of this Committee. Most of the requests were for jewel marches, presentations, festivals and ceremonies.

As there is a very small amount of such material at the command of the Committee, it is necessary to refer the writer to some catalogue or else the Committee member must adapt herself to the preparation of such material by purchasing some or writing the script, if she has the time and ability.

During these busy times, when there is so much to be done in Red Cross, surgical dressings, Community Chest, U.S.O., and other activities, individuals do not have time for the preparation of such material. If the Worthy Matron or her associates do not have the time, surely the Committee members can be considered equally as actively engaged.

From the observation of this year's correspondence and requests, together with a survey of previous Educational Committee reports it would appear that Grand Chapter should divide this Committee and establish a Program Service to fulfill the desires and requests of Chapter officers.

Our Worthy Grand Matron has been of constructive benefit to the workings of the Committee and we thank her for her many appeals in behalf of the education and uplifting of our membership.

Sister Louise Mae Elsensohn, Past Grand Matron, has been of invaluable help. Her knowledge and vast experience of former years on this Committee has been greatly appreciated.

Sister Sylvia Garrety has done much to assist the Chapters in the southland.

We never know a greater character until something congenial to it has grown up within ourselves. This is ever so with you, Sister Kathryn Farwell, our beloved Worthy Grand Matron, and we, your Committee, are deeply grateful for this opportunity of service to you and to our beautiful Order, for education alone can conduct us to that enjoyment which is at once best in quality and infinite in quantity.

an inquiry to a very competent authority and learn that he was elected in July, 1942 and therefore has not been in office but a little over a year. My informant goes on to say that 'under his direction the city has perfected its system of Civilian Defense, and it has made provision for the entertainment of service men on leave. The administration has done everything possible to aid the construction of new houses to accommodate the thousands of new workers who have come here to work in our war plants. At the same time the city has maintained the efficient operation of all public services despite the serious encroachments caused by the drain on manpower for the war. Under Mayor Wagner, Long Beach is cooperating 100 per cent with the National Government in pushing war activities'.

I think that is a message that we are glad to receive because it coincides so nearly with the thought and action of the Order of the Eastern Star in that in these days we are war minded and we want our every effort directed along that line.

I was presented with a great many figures about the City of Long Beach, but the only two I shall call to your attention are the United States census of 1940 which was 164,271 and the estimated population today which is 220,000. So you can readily realize the problem the city has in taking care of its guests in the way they used to do, and the way they would like to do. I noticed also they have 1400 hotels in the city, but I do not believe many of you would believe that now because you have tried to get accommodations and perhaps some of you could not, but the reason for that is simple as they are host to a great many people before they are hosts to us.

I am sorry that the Mayor is not able to be with us, but he has a very able Vice-Mayor, and I take a great deal of pleasure in introducing the Honorable Martin Moxley, Vice-Mayor of the City of Long Beach."

Address-Hon. Martin Moxley, Vice-Mayor, Long Beach:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, other Grand Officers, distinguished guests, Officers and Members of the Order of the Eastern Star:

In greeting you in the City of Long Beach this year we find it rather difficult in view of our many handicaps, but I know that you appreciate that. As had been stated, we have had various problems forced upon us, of which the greatest is the housing problem. But you have been taken care of although our hotel accommodations are practically overrun many times.

We have been able to salvage, so to speak, some of the facilities that you have been accustomed to use in the past. The auditorium is one of them. It has been quite a problem to maintain and keep it during these times when it has been desired for many purposes, but I assure you that we will keep it for conventions such as yours.

I could not help noticing on the front cover of your program the admonition 'Let us serve as best we can our God, our Country and our Fellowman'. You have two grand leaders and a fine corps of officers at your helm, and a grand group in the Order of the Eastern Star. Although not a member, I feel very close to your members, being a Master Mason and belonging to both the Scottish and York Rites.

You have accomplished a great deal in the past year toward the war effort. I know the Red Cross is very grateful to you. You have contributed a great deal to the bond drives and to the many other war effort activities all over the State of California, and no doubt members in other States have done the same.

I know that from this session, the 70th of the Order in California, will be mapped a program for the coming year. I know that the members of your subordinate Chapters are behind the Grand Chapter one hundred per cent, as to my mind there is no better group than the members of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Again I want to welcome you to the City of Long Beach. I want to apologize for the curtailed facilities and to assure you that if the war is ended before you return, we will hope to make up at that time for what we lack this year. Thank you."

Response-Willa Jane Hellwig, Past Grand Matron:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California, Sisters and Brothers, Friends, Your Honor Martin Moxley, Vice-Mayor of the City of Long Beach:

It is my pleasure and happy privilege, through the courtesy of our Worthy Grand Matron, to extend to you the appreciation and gratitude of the members of the Grand Chapter of California for your words of welcome. May I assure you we greatly appreciate the welcome you have given, and may I assure you also that we will enjoy this session to its fullest. We have come from all parts of this great State—many are visiting here for the first time, but may I assure you that we are all here with the full realization of the problems that confront you in entertaining a convention of this size and we appreciate your efforts in our behalf.

Those of us who have visited Long Beach in past years, know this city and its people as home-loving and peace abiding. Little did we dream that in a few years conditions would change this city into a roaring, hustle-bustle industrial center.

We are grateful to the City of Long Beach for giving to us one of your successful professional men, a fine gentleman. His integrity, ability and outstanding character has placed him among our most devoted members. We hail with pleasure, Donald A. Boone, Worthy Grand Patron, in this his own home city.

Your Honor, we wish for you and the city which you so ably represent, success and prosperity, and may the warring of the present day soon cease and our boys return home to us, and may we again enjoy that peace-abiding, home-loving atmosphere we love.

Thank you for your words of welcome."

The Grand Marshal was instructed to escort to the Grand Chapter room Mr. Claude Morrison, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California. Mr. Morrison was escorted to the East by Lloyd Ellis Griffin, Past Grand Patron, welcomed by the Worthy Grand Matron and invited to a seat in the Grand East.

Presentation of Mr. Morrison—Donald A. Boone, Worthy Grand Patron:

"Worthy Grand Matron, distinguished and honored East, Sisters and Brothers:

It is indeed an honor to have been accorded the privilege by our Worthy Grand Matron to present to you this evening an honored guest and the most distinguished member of the great Masonic Fraternity in the State of California.

We of the Order of the Eastern Star recognize that we are no part of that great and honorable fraternity; however, there are bonds, ties that exist between our two organizations that are greater than those which exist between any other two organizations, greater even than the ties of friendship, greater even than the fraternal ties, and I refer to those ties which find their conception, and their inspiration, in the sacred confines of the home, those bonds which exist between husband and wife, mother and daughter, father and daughter, brother and sister. So, it is with great honor and pride that I present to you Brother Claude Morrison, who is the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in the State of California."

Address Mr. Claude Morrison, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star of California:

I am very sorry that I am not up to date on statistics of my home town of San Diego. We heard a lot here about Long Beach, and how big it is. Hark back to the years when I used to follow the San Diego High School Football team up here to see them always get licked. I am not up to date on what they have been doing in San Diego,—I have been away about ten days. We had about 400,000 people down there when I left. I don't know what I will find when I get back. I hope to find a bed to sleep in.

The very flattering introduction which was given me made me feel very happy. It is true that the Grand Lodge of California does not officially recognize any other organization the prerequisite of which is membership in a Masonic Lodge or an allied affiliation. Unofficially, however, we are so closely tied to the Eastern Star, and to the women of Masonry, that it amounts almost to official recognition. We are so dependent upon our wives, our daughters, and our mothers and sisters for help and consolation and guidance that any member of the Masonic Lodge, any Mason, must needs be a good son, a good husband, a good father, a good brother. And I believe that that is one of the first things for which we should work in Masonry.

We have high ideals but those ideals are worthless if they are not carried out in our practical every-day living. And certainly our first responsibility is to our homes. I feel that that is one of the things which we as individuals, not necessarily as organizations, should feel very keenly. There is a sense of uncertainty for the future. There is an aura of confusion around us. It is not caused entirely by the war, the step-up, the increased tempo of industrial production, the taking of millions of men out of civil life is not entirely responsible for our sense of confusion.

We do not know just what the future holds for us. We do not know just what kind of a world our children will have to live in. Our political leaders tell us it is going to be a different world, that we are going to have to depend more and more upon what Government can do for us, and less and less upon our own personal endeavors.

Whether that is true or not probably depends to a great extent upon what kind of thinking is done by groups such as this, not as an organization but as individual thinkers. What are Masonic families thinking about today? How much confusion exists in their minds? Are we hopeful of the future, or are we just a little skeptical as to what is about to happen?

In thinking this problem over, and in thinking about how I should address the Masons of California as I see them from time to time I have thought out two ways of thinking and endeavoring, two ways by which we can attune ourselves to the tempo of the times, and yet face the future.

One of them is by work. The old-fashioned idea of work, I think, is very much the style, although many would have us think work is not so important after all. Government relief, Government planning, has sometimes taken incentive out of real work, and sometimes we feel that our youth have not the objective, have not the incentive to work for a career, to build themselves up in business, or to build themselves in some kind of business affiliated relationship.

But, my friends, if we are to work ourselves out of this confusion we must work. We must work constructively. We must work in our jobs. But the most important thing, as I see it, is

not our daily tasks, by which we earn our living, but the thing to which we Masons are dedicated, in which we are supposed to divide our time,—a part to our usual vocations, and a part to our fellowmen and to our God. And I believe that that is a matter which should very seriously concern us, because while we practice the tenets of work in our Lodges, too many times we do not carry them into effect in our contacts with the outside world and there is going to be more need for that type of work as we come into the post-war period.

Many of the problems will be solved by Government aid, but we are still going to have with us the needy, the dependent youth, the underprivileged,—all of that great class of people to whom society has not been good, who have felt the evils of misfortune.

Organized charity will not solve the problem. All of the groups need a sympathetic understanding such as is taught in our two great orders.

When I find that a man is not attending a Masonic Lodge, but is spending his time with a Boy Scout Group, as Counselor for the DeMolay, who is working nights with the Red Cross, with the U.S.O., with the Community Chest, or the many varied activities which are in such need of help now, I do not criticize that man for not coming to Lodge. I feel that he is doing his duty as a Mason by his constructive community work. And more of us should be engaged in that type of work, both men and women.

How many broken homes are there caused by the war? How many cases of juvenile delinquency are there? I had a few minutes' talk with the Foreman of our Grand Jury in San Diego the other day, and he told me of conditions which are appalling, caused by broken homes. All of these problems need the constructive effort of every one of us.

And then, the next avenue of thought is a restoration of our faith. There have been many things that have happened in the past few years to break down our faith. We have lost hope in a great many phases of our economic, our political and our social life, but there have been many things which have happened since December 7, 1941, which have caused us to restore our faith, to have a new faith, for faith bogs down in times of prosperity and it becomes stronger in times of adversity.

Faith has many phases, and the first phase is probably faith in oneself. It is by faith in oneself that the primitive man, the pioneer man, made a place for himself, and secured sustenance and shelter. Faith in ourselves can only be accomplished by faith in others, and it is by faith in others that men have been able to build villages, cities, states and nations; to found great universities and great industries. Faith in others causes us to rely upon the implied word, the spoken promise.

And then, with faith in ourselves and in others, comes faith in God,—not a blind faith in dogma or creed, but the everlasting faith in a Supreme Being to whom our lives are dedicated.

And then we have with that, faith stepped up by the faith we have heard from the front. Our men have shown us new faith in courage, in ingenuity, in manhood. Many of them are not coming back. (Pause for order.)

I am serious, friends. I am wondering whether we are really dedicated to what we stand for.

Have you seen a military parade lately? I saw one just a few weeks ago, a parade of Marines. It was not the old-fashioned military pageant. They had a band, a magnificent band, but when the band had passed, all the pageantry was gone, and we had before us the grim reality of war,—marching marines, men and officers, all equipped and dressed alike, guns ready for service, paratroopers with their chutes, men ready to go to every corner of the world, to justify our faith in them.

Every day when I go to my work I pass by one of the largest naval hospitals in the world. It is filled with men who have sacrificed to justify our faith in them. And the bigness of it all, the greatness of the thing in which we are engaged is so far beyond and above us that it makes us very humble.

May we have renewed faith in ourselves, and our ability to work. May we have renewed faith in each other. May we have a renewed faith in our Country and the ability of its citizens and its leaders to work out the problems that are before us, and may we have a new faith in God that he will give us the leadership, the counsel and the guidance without which we cannot do anything.

Rudyard Kipling, a great Mason, and a great poet, said, better than any of us can say it in words, in his great poem 'The Recessional':

> 'The tumult and the shouting dies, The captains and the kings depart, Still stands Thine ancient sacrifices, An humble and a contrite heart. Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet Lest we forget, Lest we forget.'''

Response-Francis J. Herz, Associate Grand Patron:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Morrison, Sisters and Brothers:

Historians have traced Masonry to the remotest time. Masons in adages have been men of character and integrity. Most of the men who wrote the Constitution were Masons and they incorporated into the fabric of that remarkable document Masonic

principles, thereby guaranteeing to the people of the new Republic more liberties than had been enjoyed by any previous nation.

Today this nation is engaged in a terrible war. Masons are doing their part on the war front, as well as at home, to defend those hard won and precious liberties. In the Grand Lodge of California at its convocation last week, the Committee on War Activities presented a most wonderful report.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Claude Morrison, the Officers and members of this Grand Chapter have the profoundest regard for the Order you represent. Your presence here this evening, to have the opportunity of greeting you as the titular head of Masonry in the State of California, and your inspiring message has given us much food for thought.

Please extend to your Officers the good wishes and fraternal greetings of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star."

We sincerely regret that for some reason unknown to us, he is unable to be with us this evening."

REPORT OF THE HOUSING COMMITTEE

The following report was read by the Chairman, Muriel Eaton, Past Matron:

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California, O.E.S.:

As Chairman of the Housing Committee, I wish to submit the following report: The Committee was probably confronted with a more difficult problem than at any previous time, due to the situation which has arisen because of the war and the fact that Long Beach has become a port of embarkation for the armed forces as well as an industrial city. On account of this the facilities of all the hotels have been taxed to the utmost. It was impossible to secure accommodations for the delegates at any of the large hotels except the Hilton. Because of this we were unable to place a large majority of them as they requested. Also, it was difficult to obtain rooms in the homes of members of the Order because so many defense workers are being housed in the city. The Committee had to deny the requests of many delegates for reservations.

After having returned many of the deposits, a large dormitory was secured which has greatly helped in solving our most difficult problem. It will accommodate two hundred persons and, if necessary, has one hundred army cots which are at our disposal. Mr. Gray, the owner, is making every effort to make the delegates, who are housed there, as comfortable as possible and we hope they are all good sports and will make the best of the situation. At least they got to Grand Chapter, which might not have been possible without it.

The Committee wishes to express gratitude to Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Stuart of the Hilton Hotel, Mrs. Benedict of the Seaside Hotel and Mr. Gray for their splendid cooperation. Mr. David Olmsted, the Convention Manager, has been of great assistance to the Committee, as well as Sister Ruth Leaming, Worthy Matron of Bettina Chapter, my Worthy Matron.

The Committee is happy to have been of service to our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron in their strenuous year of service in our beloved Order.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

The following report was read by the Chairman, Sister Virgia Ann Hensley (summaries of the proceedings of other jurisdictions will be found in the appendix):

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand East, Grand Officers, Delegates and Visitors to the Grand Chapter of California."

PREFACE

We all understand in terms of points, so we will use as few points as possible and hope this report will be pointed and not pointless.

Paper and pencil nor "voice to speak" are rationed, hence I will try to give a short comprehensive outline of the marvelous progress and stupendous work this beautiful Order is doing in this sad world.

One morning, our Worthy Grand Matron, my sister Matron of 1931, called me on the 'phone.

She asked "if I would take the chairmanship of Fraternal Correspondence".

Having my hat on ready to go out—I know she must have been ready to go too—and not knowing just what the Fraternal Correspondent's responsibility earried, I said, "Yes".

Her next remark was, "Have you seen a late proceeding?" I said, "No, not since '31."

She then said she would have the Grand Secretary send me some copies, which she did.

I went to our Chapter meeting, our Sister Emma Blanchard Graves, fully realizing more than I, the honor, and the ressponsibility of this chairmanship, arose and told the Chapter how much this would mean to me and of all the numerous travels I would make to the countries wherever our Chapters are to be found.

After the meeting, a rather new member, not knowing Sister Emma meant I would travel by way of the rocking chair, came up and congratulated me and said, "And did I hear Sister Emma say you would go to Canada, too!"

Then I began to count our word reports and found it meant consolidating the happenings of the Eastern Star World into a group of from 82 to 150 pages of finely printed matter.

I am not going to read that many pages. It will be found printed in the proceedings.

I feel as though I had taken a combined course in English composition and of history, past and "In the Making".

I am convinced that with privileges come responsibilities, but we will reverse and say with responsibility come privileges of travel through all our "History Making" events.

The word of admonition I have heard most is "make it short". From other jurisdictions the admonitions are to save time, and particularly space, due to expense of publication.

My firm convictions now are—that the chairmanship of Fraternal Correspondence is a committee head that should be termed a Grand Office with official escort and a Chapter reception.

And now that my theme is written and I am ready to read my report, I feel as the participant feels who comes up before the august body ready to tell what he knows and tries to get his "Doctor's Degree".

So, in the words of Rudyard Kipling, we submit this report:

"It ain't the individual

Nor the Army as a whole

But the ever-lasting team-work

Of every blooming soul."

Point I-Past History:

For the benefit of those who are attending Grand Chapter for the first time, and begging the indulgence of those who have attended many sessions, I shall hi-lite the History of our Order, or the Star Facts we should know.

The first era of our order was from 1850 to 1866, during which period the founder, Dr. Morris, was brought to light, beautified the Ritual, named the organization "the Eastern Star", decided upon the number of points, which were five, to correspond with the emblems of the Master's Carpet.

After patient labor, Dr. Morris and his wife communicated the degrees to a Masonic friend and his wife.

The first publication he designed and it was issued in 1855.

The second era extended from 1866 to 1876, when Michigan lodges united to form the first Grand Chapter. Two Grand Jurisdictions, the Independent Grand Chapter of New York and Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey, use a Ritual of their own and are not alike. All other jurisdictions, except Scotland, use the General Grand Chapter Ritual.

The third era is from 1876 to present day. The Order of the Eastern Star is comprised of four sovereign bodies, which are:

The General Grand Chapter,

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland,

Independent Grand Chapter of New York,

Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey.

The General Grand Chapter meets triennially and was organized in Indianapolis in 1876. It has jurisdiction over 55 Grand Chapters, 47 of which are in United States, 7 in Canada, one in Puerto Rico. In addition, it has supervision over subordinate Chapters—12 in Alaska, one in Cuba, 4 in Canal Zone, 8 in Hawaii, 14 in Nova Scotia, one in Philippine Islands, two in Prince Edward Island, three in China, one in Yukon Territory and three in Old Mexico.

Over 200 members of Chapters in China and Philippines are prisoners of the Japs besides our soldiers on Corregidor and Bataan.

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland meets semi-annually. Its supervision is over 8 Grand Chapters, 7 in Scotland and one in Australia, and subordinate Chapters in England, Ireland, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

Changes have been made, but the cabalistic word and motto always remain the same due to the fact that the Ritual is copyrighted. A strict adherence to the Ritual is and has to be observed.

Our Ritual is printed in English, Spanish (in China the English Ritual is used due to English-speaking Chinese and cosmopolitan membership), and German; but in 1919 all Rituals in Germany were destroyed and there are no Chapters there now.

Point II-Our Growth:

We have grown from two to about 2,000,000, from one Chapter to over 12,000.

Our Benevolences have grown from nothing to an expenditure of over \$5,000,000.00. Our predominant funds are Endowment, Education Loan, China Relief, International Temple and Home Funds.

The Eastern Star sponsors over 50,000 girls in organizations such as Rainbow, Job's Daughters, Beatitudes and Daughters of Eastern Star.

While many jurisdictions in our foreign lands are forced to curtail for the duration and our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Patron are kept in our Home land, it is interesting to note that as history repeats herself, Masonic bodies and Eastern Star are on the alert and making grand strides. Loss of membership is noted, particularly on the Atlantic seaboard, due mostly to gas limitation for transportation.

Scotland, with her closeness to the war theatre, where Chapters were forced to recess for the duration, due to lack of transport, restrictions on petrol consumption and blackouts. Many Chapters have gone back to their original meeting places and the number of initiates greatly increased, showing a record-breaking gain this year of 4,371 members.

"Let's take heart."

Homes, Hospitals, Sanitariums, Tubercular camps and Orphanages are maintained throughout the length and breadth of our land. There are at least 17 Eastern Star Homes, 15 Hospitals and about 50 Masonic and Eastern Star Homes.

Ontario has only Eastern Star Home outside United States, called the "Florence Nightingale Home for Boys and Girls".

Printing plants are maintained in Masonic Homes in Georgia, Florida, Texas and Oklahoma. These plants print the Proceedings of these states.

Point III-Themes and Mottos:

(a) One central theme has characterized all Grand Sessions—that of PATRIOTISM, though it may be coupled with other selected themes, as many almost as Worthy Grand Matrons in number.

In the Garden Group, we find Friendship, Fraternal, Maytime, Open Garden and two Azalea Sessions.

- (b) Then there is Golden Rule and Golden Anniversary, Roll of Honor, Black Diamond, Queen Mary, Empire; and from Chapel we gather Light, Love, Service, Friendship, Rainbow, Constancy and Faith, Faithful Service, Faith, Harmony, Purity and Forward March.
- (c) In honor of the Points, we find an Esther, two Adah Sessions, an Electa-Ruth, Electa-Birthday, and a Ruth.
- (d) Predominating, we find 6 Patriotic, 3 Victory, a Defense, 3 Red Cross and an All American Session.
- (e) Finally, "Courage" Sessions. The dare of all Eastern Star to forge ahead.

Point IV-Time, Places and Guests:

We learn our Grand Sessions meet almost every month of the year, with October and June vying for first place. The sessions vary from one day in Scotland and Rhode Island to four in Pennsylvania.

The Grand Sessions are held in a variety of Masonic Temples, halls, churches, schools, ballrooms, theatres, and civic auditoriums. Decorations range from simplicity to profusion, with emphasis this year on streamline and simplicity.

Many times divine services precede. Openings are formal and informal.

Much fine pageantry is in evidence and at almost every Grand Session the "V" for Victory has been evidenced in floor work at one time or another.

The Holy Bible is always presented in a most reverent manner. Memorial services are held in all Grand Chapters.

Our own Flag is always our most welcome guest. It is presented, accompanied by flags of all the Allied Nations, by the Christian, State and Eastern Star Banners.

"Old Glory" has never flown more proudly, nor had more glorious tributes paid by keener minds and thinkers, than have been paid to her this year. Governors, First Ladies, Mayors, Ministers, Grand Masters of Masonic Lodges and our own Sister Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Chas. E. Townsend, Most Worthy Grand Patron. Other General Grand Officers and General Grand Committeemen have graced and lent much inspiration to the several Grand Sessions.

Sister Easton almost always goes to the Grand East to the strains of "California, Here I Come", and may I add, I can't

find any two addresses that she gave that are alike, though she always inspired work, more work for Red Cross, China Relief and relief of the stricken world. Her theme seems to run like these lines:

> "Do your bit! How cheap and trite Seems that phrase in such a fight! Do your bit! That cry recall, Change it now to, 'Do your all'; Do your all, and then do more; Do what you're best fitted for; Do your utmost, do and give, You have but one life to live."

Sister Easton, we're proud of your "write-ups" in all the Proceedings of the General Grand Jurisdiction.

Point V-War Work-Red Cross:

"War Work and Red Cross" takes the word "STUPENDOUS" to convey what the Order everywhere is doing.

When the figures of General Grand Chapter are compiled and released, they will be astounding. Our own state stands at the top of the list.

The work this year alone is an outstanding memorial to Clara Barton, founder of "Red Cross", who received the degrees of our Order in her parlor, from Robert Morris.

Sisters and Brothers have served as chairmen or members of the various Red Cross and Defense Committees; on sugar, draft and rationing boards, food production campaigns, U.S.O., A.W.V.S., aluminum, book, fur, metal, fat and tin-can drives; assisted in tracing lost persons, volunteer service activities, auxiliary firemen and police, air raid wardens, block captains, defense councils, radio and ambulance work, peeled tomatoes, baked thousands of cookies, made candy, donated to cancer drives, blood donor campaigns, donated use of Masonic Temples and Homes, purchased bonds and stamps and conducted drives for same, made and filled kits, assisted in "share your car" campaigns, made victory gardens, knitted and crocheted articles, entertained service men, loaned sewing machines and furnishings, opened homes to defense workers, gave lectures, conducted publicity, provided messenger services, secured permits for additional gasoline to carry on work, conducted day nurseries and much more could be enumerated.

Four states, Ohio, Missouri, Pennsylvania and California, whose membership has totaled more than 1,000,000 hours of Red Cross work each.

One member in Washington State, 89 years of age, has given 856 hours to knitting.

One Past Matron in South Carolina has six sons in the service.

A Past Patron of Kansas made 150 cribbage boards for men in service.

The District of Columbia gave three ambulances, the first one going to Red Cross at Vallejo, California.

Illinois has given three ambulances and one station wagon.

Ohio, one ambulance and two mobile disaster units.

Quebec, one ambulance.

New Jersey has \$7,818.00 in ambulance fund with one ambulance being presented at this Grand Session.

Indiana presented and dedicated three ambulances. Nebraska, five clubmobile ambulances, purchased in England, and put into overseas service in North Africa, are used for canteen and libraries and may be converted quickly into ambulances.

In war-torn Scotland Eastern Star has given and dedicated this year a mobile van. It was presented by Lanarkshire District Grand Chapter. The van was immediately sent to Blantyre, birthplace of the great missionary pioneer, David Livingstone.

New South Wales presented one ambulance and now a third is ready to be presented.

Up to May 5, 1943, Scotland has presented 12 ambulances, 2 mobile kitchens and 5 motor supply vans.

And as we finish this report, we read in the Oakland Tribune, that our own Worthy Grand Matron presented the Red Cross with a check to cover the purchase price of 3 more ambulances for the Pacific Coast.

'Tis a glorious assembling for relief when Eastern Star can total the presentation of 28 ambulances in one short year.

Point VI-Unusual Interesting Facts:

(a) Illinois is the largest jurisdiction. It has 806 Chapters. Utah is smallest jurisdiction in United States.

Puerto Rico is the smallest Grand Chapter, having 12 Chapters, with only one speaking English.

New Brunswick is the youngest Grand Jurisdiction.

Michigan organized the first Grand Chapter in America. It is seventy-six years old and the oldest Grand Jurisdiction in the world.

All Grand Chapters do not open in same form, yet no Grand Chapter opens without the presence of the Holy Bible.

Scotland's Supreme Grand Chapter meets semi-annually. This year they voted to allow the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron to be permitted, as a war-time measure, to travel first class.

The Grand Officers, and officers of subordinate Chapters, are called Office-hearers

The word "Immediate" is prefixed to any Junior Past Grand Officer-bearer as, "Immediate Past Grand Matron".

The membership list of committees or office-bearers is referred to a "Sederunt" (roll for sitting in session) as per attendance sheets.

Apologies for absence are "intimates" and a "vote of thanks" is always awarded the Most Worthy Grand Matron for presiding on any occasion.

(b) In New York the "O.E.S. Service Fund" gives each boy in service a \$3.00 check, whose name was presented by one of the Chapters. \$44,000.00 was used in the fund.

Missouri has 2 Chapters composed entirely of Red Cross members.

Beulah Chapter in Kansas is still the largest Chapter, having 1,527 members. Forty-six fifty-year pins were presented in Grand Session, one to the Ex-Governor, Past Grand Master of Masonic Lodges, and past Grand Patron Ben Paulen, and to his sister, Mrs. Minnie Burke, Past Grand Matron. I am proud of these people, they are from my own home town.

Tennessee has a "Sleeper's Club" in Chapters, the proceeds in fines go into the Red Cross "kitty". A check for \$675.00 was sent direct to China for relief through General Grand Chapter.

South Dakota has a movie film of the Home available to Chapters.

Montana maintains a library of Chapter programs.

Since Pearl Harbor, the field of work is cut down pretty small. We have Alaska, Hawaii, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Mexico and Canada. The Most Worthy Grand Patron says it is impossible to do any work in these places now except Nova Scotia, where three Chapters have been organized.

(c) Oklahoma furnished the Grand Matron a car. Made and sent 386 afghans to hospitals in United States. Some were sent to San Diego, California.

A dime on the Grand Secretary's desk started the Home Fund in Nevada.

In Ohio, money given the Grand Matron instead of flowers, started a swimming pool—\$3,891.00 was received.

Two O.E.S. Homes are maintained in Pennsylvania. A call, at session, came for recreational place at soldiers' camp out of Philadelphia—\$1,500.00 was raised in the session and the walls built.

Colorado has a Patron who has served for fourteen consecutive years.

International Chapter No. 1, Peking, is the only Chapter sending dues to International Fund now, on account of the war condition in China.

Delaware has reached the 100 per cent contribution to International Fund and received from General Grand Chapter the Chinese Bible and an engraved certificate signed by Madame Chiang Kai-Shek. Sister Easton explained the meaning of the White Bible.

Black Diamond Session in West Virginia was so named for the chief industry of state.

New Jersey collected 24,053 pounds of tinfoil which netted \$1,112.00.

Conclusion:

In concluding our efforts as your committee, we have determined:

First: That Masonry and Eastern Star are stronger today than ever before.

Second: That the challenge was never greater nor more heroic than now.

Third: That this organization is a bulwark for democracy.

Fourth: That we know the pattern of the tapestry, and that the Eastern Star has woven a "big bit" into the picture for 1943.

Up, face the task and work, Fling ease and self away, This is no time for sleep, Up—watch, work and pray.

Let us say thanks to the Grand Secretary for her promptness in delivery of proceedings and her advice. Thanks to the Fraternal Correspondents of all the other Grand Jurisdictions.

Thanks to you, Worthy Grand Matron, for this rare privilege.

"Real Happiness lies in Service,

San Francisco Convention & Tourist Bureau October 14, 1943

To the Members of the Order of Eastern Star, California Grand Chapter, In Convention Assembled, Long Beach, California.

Greeting:

San Francisco invites the Order of Eastern Star, California Grand Chapter to be held in the City by the Golden Gate in 1944. All the facilities of our City are at your disposal and you have the assurance that the business men of San Francisco and the City Government, as represented by this Bureau, will supplement the hospitality of your own members.

I do not have to tell you that San Francisco is the port of embarkation for seventy per cent of the men and materials that go to the Pacific Theater of the war which is entering a larger phase. Our hotel rooms which are second in number in the Nation are now of course pre-empted for Army and Navy occupants but we know you are willing to adjust yourselves to the heroic conditions of the war and will forgive us for facilities that are far below normal.

You will find, I hope, our spirit of hospitality, however, unimpaired, clear, bright, cool, cloudless skies as kindly as ever and our people one with you in a patriotic desire to win the war, to punish those who destroyed the peace, and to begin again to promote the principles of brotherly love and kindness toward all men and all races as a God-fearing Nation.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

The following report read by the Chairman, Willa Jane Hellwig, Past Grand Matron:

To the Grand Chapter of California, O.E.S.:

With reference to the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Patron relative to a war-effort program, your Committee reports as follows:

This matter involves strictly a policy of our Grand Chapter, and the question immediately arises as to whether or not this Grand Chapter should go on record as singling out any war-time activity and putting our concentrated effort upon it. Much may be said in support of our Worthy Grand Patron's recommendation that it would be well to have a single program and strive for unified effort, but the difficulty lies in the determination of which activity is best suited to accomplish the result sought. Many Chapters have whole-heartedly cooperated in Red Cross work during the past year, while others, we understand, have, with equal enthusiasm, exerted their efforts in other fields of war-time activities.

Our Worthy Grand Patron is to be commended for this recommendation and if time would permit a survey to be made into

the merits of various war-time activities, it might be possible to select one and concentrate our united effort upon it. For various reasons this is not possible to do and valuable time would be lost. California is a large State and war-time activities are varied in different localities.

As the question involved is one of "policy" your Committee makes no recommendation of approval or disapproval of this recommendation and refers it back to this Grand Body for its approval or rejection.

To the Grand Chapter of California, O.E.S.:

Your Committee, to whom was referred the matter of the approval of amendments to By-Laws of subordinate Chapters, beg leave to report as follows:

With the exception of the approval of the amendments to the by-laws of Miriam Chapter No. 302 and Estrellita Chapter No. 541, we recommend that the amendments to the by-laws of all Chapters approved by the Worthy Grand Matron receive the approval of this Grand Body.

In reference to the by-laws of Miriam Chapter attempting to amend Article V, section 2 thereof, as well as the proposed amendment to the by-laws of Estrellita Chapter (Article IV, Section 2) we feel that both were inadvertently approved by our Worthy Grand Matron and that the matter of amendment to these by-laws should be referred back to the two subordinate Chapters for further action in compliance with Grand Chapter law.

The by-laws of Miriam Chapter would automatically provide for remission of dues of a member on reaching the age of 70 years instead of placing "remission" on the basis of financial inability to pay dues. (See Section 536 of the Grand Chapter Constitution and Laws.)

The amendment to Estrellita's by-laws does not comply with basic constitutional qualifications for membership in the Order. Membership in the Order cannot be restricted to women under 35 years of age, or men under 40,—neither could a man join our Order at the age of 18 years, because he could not be a Mason until 21.

JOINT REPORT OF COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS AND FINANCE.

The following report read by Delos A. Mace, Past Grand Patron, member Committee on Constitution and By-Laws:

To the Grand Chapter of California, O.E.S.:

The undersigned committees, to whom were referred recommendation No. 2 of the Worthy Grand Matron's report, unanimously agree that the same be approved and adopted by this Grand Chapter.

Accordingly we propose that the first sentence of Section 536 of the Grand Chapter Constitution and Laws now reading as follows:

"Sec. 536. Remissions. A Chapter may remit, in whole or in part, dues owing it by any member on account of financial inability to pay them or as compensation for services rendered." be amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 536. Remissions. A Chapter may remit, in whole or in part, dues owing it by any member on account of financial inability to pay them or on account of having been inducted into and serving in the military, air or naval forces or auxiliaries of the United States in time of war, provided, however, the right to remission on ground of active service in the armed forces shall terminate at the end of the Chapter year in which armed hostilities cease. A Chapter may also remit the dues of a member, in whole or part, as compensation for services rendered the Chapter." (Balance of section unchanged.)

By way of clarification as to procedure it should be pointed out that Secretaries should issue to the members whose dues are remitted the ordinary receipt for dues without any notation thereon that the holder's dues have been remitted for any reason whatever.

The list of the Past Grands who entered the Eternal Grand Chapter during the past year was read by the Grand Secretary. The Altar was draped by the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress, and the Grand Chaplain lead in Prayer.

Prayer:

"There is no death! The stars go down To rise upon some fairer shore, And bright in heaven's jeweled crown They shine forevermore.

There is no death! The dust we tread Shall change beneath the summer showers To golden grain or mallow fruit Or rainbow tinted flowers.

Escort of Flag:

"Old Glory" was escorted to the East by three United States Marines, and allegiance pledged.

The Worthy Grand Matron then presented Sister Hazael Marsh Piper, Past Grand Matron, who gave a tribute to the Flag.

Tribute to the Flag-Hazael Marsh Piper, Past Grand Matron:

"" 'When freedom from her mountain heights unfurled her standard to the air She tore the azure robe of night and set the stars of glory there."

Your Flag and my Flag, the Flag of the land of the free and the home of the brave. This land of our United States is a visible symbol of the ideals of the American people. It is the one focus in which we all unite with reverential devotion. We may differ as to religion, politics and home environment, yet under the folds of this Flag the combined intelligence of the nation rises superior to any of its parts and thereby should perpetuate this American Republic as the 'land of the free and the home of the brave'.

Never before has this Flag spoken to us so pleadingly as it speaks today. It says to us, 'O, my American people, safeguard me well. If I am nullified, destroyed or impaired, you and your children shall become slaves to despots and dictators. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. O, spare me, my American people, that I may forever wave over a land of free men, where justice and equality is measured out to all.'

'Here's to the Red of it; There's not a thread of it, No, not a shred of it, In all the spread of it, But heroes bled for it, Faced steel and lead for it, Precious blood shed for it, Bathing it Red. Here's to the White of it; Thrilled by the sight of it, Who knows the right of it But feels the might of it, Through day and night, Womanhood's care of it Made manhood's dare for it; Purity's prayer for it Keeps it so White.

Here's to the Blue of it; Heavenly view of it, Star-spangled hue of it, Honesty's due of it, Constant and true. Here's to the whole of it, Stars, stripes and pole of it, Here's to the soul of it, RED, WHITE AND BLUE.'

Your Flag and my Flag, the Flag of the land of the free and the home of the brave."

The Worthy Grand Matron presented Commander Truman Riddle, Navy Chaplain.

Patriotic Address-Commander Truman P. Riddle:

"I am thrilled as I look over this vast audience. I realize what you mean, not only to this State but to the whole country. As a retired Chaplain of the U. S. Navy, my thoughts and my heart are constantly with the work of our country and the Kingdom of God.

I realize that this organization has done much for our country, and also for the Kingdom of God. But as I stand here tonight, it makes me feel jealous. It makes me feel jealous for the times that I have been in church and seen such a small audience. Then I come here and see such a great congregation and it makes me think of one time when I was in Washington on duty at the Bureau of Navigation, and Admiral Hugh Rodmans, who was on the flagship of the Pacific Fleet in 1919, was being retired. They were giving him a great banquet. Capt. Frazier, Chaplain, was speaker. He said to the Admiral, 'We shall miss you a great deal. We shall miss you from your office; I shall miss you from the golf links, and personally, I shall miss you in church, where I have missed you for the last thirty years'.

You don't wonder that I feel jealous when I see this good-looking audience tonight. But I am extremely honored by being asked to speak to you, and I feel particularly grateful because

of what the Masonic Order has meant to me as I have established the work of the Navy Family Chapel in Long Beach. You have been excessively kind in contributing every month to my work and in helping me as much as you could. But, as I understand it, I must deliver to you tonight a patriotic address. I am not an eloquent speaker, but I have been trained in the Navy simply to tell what is in my heart, and these are a few thoughts that come to me now.

We have had four great wars—the Revolutionary War, where we fought for the independence of the Colonies against the rest of the world; the Civil War, when we fought for the independence of the individual citizen, no matter how humble, how poor or how ignorant; and then I think of our first World War, when we were striving to keep our freedom against the domination of Germany, when we lost 116,000 men, 234,000 wounded, total casualties of 350,000 men. And now we are faced with this great war—in Guadalcanal, in the Midway, in the Coral Sea, in Alaska, in Africa, in Sicily, and in Italy—where our men are giving that same undivided spirit, that same undivided service for their country that they have always given.

But it strikes me that it might be of interest to you tonight to go into the causes of this war. There are many economic causes that I know nothing of, but being a clergyman, it is my interest to try to find out what the moral causes are for this great war. As I analyze that I go back to a German philosopher by the name of Hegel, who lived in Germany some one hundred years ago. He had the theory that one nation and only one nation should rule the world; second, he promulgated the doctrine that that nation was above the moral law; and third, he asserted that war was not a necessary evil, but a positive spiritual good.

Now, Germany was willing to accept that theory. I know how thoroughly they took up Hegel's doctrine, because as a boy I was in Germany one year with my father who was an invalid and was taking cures at the various baths. I was sent to a gymnasium, a German school where the master stood with a whip behind his back, ready to lash any of the boys if they did not obey him. I remember that those German boys were taught at that time, 'Deutschland, Deutschland Uber Alles'. It wasn't Germany above the Austrians, or the Bavarians, or the Scandinavians, or Germany over the Greeks, it was Germany above the rest of the world. She was the one nation that was fit to rule and she must conquer the world. As I say, not Austria, Bavaria and Scandinavia, but France, England and finally America!

The second thing that came true was that she did believe she was above the moral law. You who are old enough to remember the first World War will remember the sinking of the Luisitania,

when we lost hundreds of American women and children on an undefended ship. Why? Because Germany considered it her right; she was above the moral law. She could do whatever she wanted to do. We remember the treaties that were torn up; the cities that were fortified which she swore would not be fortified; we remember how she built up her armies, her navy, in spite of all the promises she made to the United Nations. Why? Because she was above the moral law.

Then we see her going a step farther. We see her taking away from her own people—not people of other nations, but her own people—their rights. They had no more free speech, no more free press, no more free radio, and the greatest tragedy, no more free thought. Then we see the masses of the people degraded until they are nonentities. One man was raised up above them, their fuehrer, their leader, the only one capable of governing not only Germany, but also the rest of the world. He takes the place of the Supreme Court; he takes the place of the Congress; he takes the place of the President himself, and he finally takes the place of God.

Rev. Perry Austin, in one of his sermons in St. Luke's Church, gave a very apt illustration in that connection. He said he was looking through a friend's stamp album. The friend called attention to a certain stamp issued, say in 1916, under which was the caption: 'One people, one Nation, one God'. Now, he said, 'Look at the difference between that and the stamp that was issued last year. Instead of 'Ein Volk, Ein Reich, Ein Got', there is 'Ein Volk, Ein Reich, Ein Fuehrer' '—'Ein Fuehrer' in the place of God Almighty.

The old German salutation was 'Praise God', the new salutation is 'Heil Hitler'—again, Hitler is placed in the place of God.

Perhaps you have noticed that from time to time I am using the past tense instead of the present, that is because even with the present German people, Hitler is no longer God. He has already degenerated!

Now, in contrast to that system of thought, are our thoughts. In contrast to this thought of the Germans which held that they were the only nation fit to rule, that they were above the moral law, that the masses had no right to govern and that only the fuehrer could govern, stands the American system. What is that in essence? In the first place, every one of our 130,000,000 people takes a part in the government itself. No man is considered wise enough, nor good enough to legislate or to speak for the American people, be he Washington, be he Lincoln, or be he Roosevelt. They are simply the mouthpieces of the masses of our hundred and thirty million people.

The Germans have taken away from their people the right of free press, the right of the radio, the right of free thought, and we steadfastly maintain it for our people.

The Germans have said that they were above the moral law, and we have scrupulously tried to carry out each moral obligation. We have attempted to defend the nations that are poor and weak. China is our brother, and so are the other nations that need our help. So we have come to a higher level than that of any other nation in God's world.

What is this vast difference between Germany and America? The German system is based on the corrupt, the neurotic teachings of one philosopher, and our thought is based on the philosophy of two masterminds that lived from two thousand to four thousand years ago—Moses and Jesus Christ.

Moses, in his Ten Commandments, gave us the sanctity of the family, 'Honor thy father and thy mother that thy days may be long in the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee'. Moses gave us the dignity for the working man, 'Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work'—defending the laboring man. He gave us the civil and criminal law upon which our present law is based. And beyond that, he gave us a definite code of what was right and what was wrong. He said there was a moral code and we must live up to it,—if we didn't 'our sins would be visited upon the third and the fourth generations'. And Moses' teachings have been found good for four thousand years.

Then came Christ's teachings. How simple they were in comparison to those of Moses. Just a simple man of the people, the carpenter, the working man who loved the whole world, but who burned into the souls and the spirits of mankind this doctrine: 'God is your father and we are all brothers'. What a wonderful doctrine for democracy that has been. We are all brothers! Through the position that man has reached, through that high dignity, man has developed so that he is able to govern himself.

From the humble people came our great leaders. We recall Coolidge sweeping out a law office and Hoover crossing the campus of Leland Stanford University with a dirty linen sack on his back. We remember all those common men who have governed in high places of the United States. Why? Because they were the children of America. Through developing their brains they have given to this country things that no other country in the whole world has had. America has given us higher education. She has given to her people better medicine; she has given better care of the women and children; she has given a higher type of social service than any nation has ever known. Why? Because through the doctrine of Jesus Christ, our Lord, we are all brothers and the sons of God.

So you see, our men are not fighting against Hitler, or against Hirohito, or against Japan or against Germany, they are fighting against a horrible system of thought that takes liberty away from men; that makes them cowards and slaves. We are fighting to defend our people as the Sons of God. But, as Lincoln said in his Gettysburg address, we cannot leave this to our fighting men alone. Our men have fought, and are fighting still, and will fight until the very last, to defend these ideals of America. They have fought in Guadalcanal, on the Coral Sea, in Midway, in Sicily, in Africa, to defend these ideals.

You and I, and particularly you women, must carry on. When the war is over you must see that true brotherhood supplants our craving for luxury and material things. You must see that the class distinctions are broken down and that all men are truly equal in the eyes, not only of God but in the eyes of the world. You must see—and I speak to you women particularly—that the homes of America are kept safe and pure; that mothers remain with their children, regarding them as the greatest heritage of the world, because they are future America. You mothers must realize that no one except yourselves can take care of your children as a mother does; no one can give them the love, the sympathy, the intense understanding that a mother can. And so we must bring our American homes to a higher standard than they have ever been before.

Next Sunday I shall again preach to my people at the Navy Family Chapel. Before my Altar I shall pray for the men that have been lost, for the prisoners of war and for those who are missing, because the wives of those men are in my congregation. But I shall think of you also. You are going to carry on the work that these men have started. They made America safe for democracy, but you are going to carry on something that they cannot do. You are going to carry on a more intimate understanding of the love of your fellowman, the dignity of labor, and the sanctity of our American home."

"It seems almost sacrilegious to speak after this marvelous address, but I would feel remiss if I did not express the gratitude of this Grand Chapter to you, Commander Riddle, for your most inspiring talk. Will you please accept a seat in the Grand East?"

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RED CROSS PRODUCTION AND WAR ACTIVITIES WORK IN SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS

The following report was read by the Chairman, Isabelle Mosher, Past Matron, who presented members of the Committee:

Early in the year our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Kathryn Farwell, outlined as her project, Red Cross production and War effort work. In order to promote the furtherance of this additional work to be done, our Worthy Grand Matron requested that each subordinate Chapter voluntarily contribute three cents a member per month for a period of nine months to a war fund. The organization chart of the committee was changed to include, in addition to the staff chairman and nine district chairmen who had functioned in previous years, three war area chairmen and thirty-one county chairmen. In its entirety, this committee was composed of the following:

General chairman—Sister Kathryn Farwell, Worthy Grand Matron; War Area chairmen—Sisters Zella Samson, Willa Jane Hellwig and Mary Isabelle Warmer, all Past Grand Matrons; Staff chairman, Isabelle Mosher, and nine District chairmen and thirty-one County chairmen. It will be my privilege to present these District and County chairmen when naming the District in which each has worked, during the past year.

This committee considered it vitally necessary, not only to stress the sewing, knitting and bandages, on which we had made such a fine record, but to bend every effort to promote the project dear to the heart of our Worthy Grand Matron. Members will be pleased and proud to learn that the total amount of this fund as of September 1 is \$15,050.00. From this fund the American Red Cross has received as direct gifts, 3 ambulances, \$7,000.00; fillings for kit bags, \$8,050.00. I feel sure that each member of our great fraternal Order will take a just pride in the manner in which they have supported our Worthy Grand Matron and the project that has been so close to her heart throughout the year.

It is with satisfaction and pride that I will give the details of the 1943 war activities, which include sewing, knitting, bandages, first aid, canteen, motor corps, home nursing, nurses' aid, nutrition, aircraft warning observation, American Women's Volunteer Service, bond drive, civilian defense, rationing, U.S.O. and hospitality.

Allies of our Star Spangled Banner, we pay with you the awful price of war. We hope to pay with you a more welcome price of peace. Out of our kindred past, out of our present bonds of alliance, may God give us an understanding heart, each for the other, when that day comes.

May we always remember with fraternal regard the struggles for liberty from which your beautiful Flags were born, the high ideals and the noble hopes of the men and women of our Allies which your proud banners symbolize even as our own. May you long continue to inspire and lead your peoples in honor and glory."

THURSDAY EVENING

The session was called to order and resumed labor at 8:45 P.M.

Presentation—Worthy Grand Matron, Kathryn Farwell:

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

The lights in the auditorium were lowered, and as the curtain on the stage parted, a scene depicting the Rising Star of the Light of the World was revealed—the little town of Bethlehem on the hillside and the Three Wise Men on camels gazing upward at the Star. Tropical plants and palms flanked both sides of the stage.

Address-Hazel Thorn Lane, Worthy Grand Matron:

"Junior Past Grand Matron, Junior Past Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers:

I could not approach the duties of this coming year, relying upon my own resources. These are days of unprecedented opportunities and sacred responsibilities in service. I know of only one way to meet them, that is to seek the guidance and presence of the One whose Star in the East we follow. In Revelations 3:20 is the answer to the problems of all time. Especially is this truth needed now: 'Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear my voice and open the door I will come in to him and will sup with him and he with me.' What a portrayal of friendly fellowship!

Holman Hunt, the English artist, was inspired to use this verse of scripture as the theme for his beautiful painting, 'The Light of the World'. An army Captain of the first world war stated in a recent discourse that the truth exemplified in this picture holds the only cure for the darkness of today's world.

A group of art critics gathered to see the unveiling of this masterpiece. As the curtain was drawn aside, one of them approached Mr. Hunt and said, 'Why, you haven't finished your work'. 'It is finished', the artist replied. 'But', the critic pointed out, 'there is no handle on the door'. 'That', returned the artist, 'is the door of the human heart, and it can be opened only from the inside'.

The artist pictures Christ in a garden, holding a lighted lantern in his left hand, and with his right hand knocking on a heavily paneled door. The door has long been closed, as indicated by the tall growth of weeds directly in front of it.

On the face of the Christ, as depicted by Mr. Hunt, there is the utmost tenderness, patience and hope—hope that in spite of discouraging appearances the occupant will open the door. It is obvious that there will be no attempt to force an entrance—that the only motive for seeking admission is to bring His Light into the darkened dwelling.

When one studies the painting, one imagines that the animation in the eyes indicates that there has been some movement heard within, perhaps a footstep, perhaps the door is about to open. One can not but wish that Holman Hunt had painted a companion picture in which the door was opened wide. But the artist has left the completion of his story on canvas as a legacy to the world. He must have had faith that the theme of his masterpiece would find fulfillment in you and me.

It is our privilege to light our lamp from the flame of this sacred lantern and carry it constantly. We have inestimable power within our Order; we should know no limitations. We can wield an influence which may be a large factor—perhaps a gov-

erning factor, in the solution of the world's problems. Never has there been so great a need; never have we been so aroused, so determined to find our places in the fulfillment of human destiny.

Let us cherish our lowliest opportunities. The humblest effort may become the most exalted endeavor. What a wealth of light could be made visible if each of us could have as an objective the illumination of some dark corner each day that we live.

We pledge ourselves to carry through the coming year

The Light which God gives us;

The Light of Truth wherever it may lead;

The Light of Freedom, revealing new opportunities for individual development and social service;

The Light of Faith, opening new visions of the better world to be;

The Light of Love, daily binding brother to brother and man to God in ever closer bonds of friendship and affection. Guided by this Light,

We shall go forward to the work of another year with steadfastness and with confidence."

Two Chapters sent a gift of \$3.00 to each relative in active service.

Money collected for ambulance fund and all sorts of regular war work, entertainment and duties, have been performed by Arizona War Committee. 75 per cent of the Arizona members are engaged in some type of war work outside of the Home. Production program shows 147,821 hours of work for various garments and surgical dressings.

An active Library Committee is busy collecting material for a History of Arizona O.E.S.

The Estelle Robinson Club has adopted a soldier outright in England and four other soldiers in Canada, all for the duration.

The Order of the Eastern Star Auxiliary makes available to all members of the Order free of charge: 1 hospital bed, 1 mattress and cover, 5 pair sheets, 5 pair pillow slips, 2 chenille spreads and 2 wheel chairs.

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron were retired under an arch of flowers made by retiring Grand Officers, the flowers being presented to retiring Worthy Grand Matron.

The incoming Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron were installed with the Worthy Grand Matron summing up her ambitions in the following lines:

A recommendation by the Worthy Grand Patron was made and approved that the ceremony of honoring and presenting a fifty-year membership certificate to the members of the Order who have held continuous membership for fifty years be made a permanent part of the procedure, on occasion of the official visit of the Worthy Grand Matron.

Dues of those members serving in the Armed Forces are remitted by the Chapter of which they were a member, and the Grand Chapter would in turn remit the Grand Chapter dues on such members.

A recommendation of the Educational Loan Committee is that, "As a token of appreciation for young men in the Armed Service, that interest on their accounts be suspended for the duration".

The program Wednesday evening, April 28, 1943, was perhaps most outstanding session of Indiana Grand Chapter. The program opened with a piano and organ concert followed by a stirring patriotic monologue by Corp. Hodges saying, "Yes, we stand, the sons of many men who lie in Flanders Field and no, we have not forgotten".

A processional followed of Service Units, Army, Navy, Marines, Air Corps, WAACS and WAVES. Then came call to colors, the Pledge of Allegiance and Star Spangled Banner. The unveiling and dedication of the Service Flag by Clarence Martin, Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Indiana F. & A. M., and member of the Eastern Star.

The Worthy Grand Matron then presented and dedicated the three ambulances to Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness, then asking the Grand Chaplain to ask our Savior for His Blessing.

In the name of the National Red Cross, Mrs. Bertha Hicks, a member of Eastern Star and Indiana State Red Cross Liaison Officer, accepted the gifts saying they were being placed at Indianapolis, South Bend and New Albany Chapters of the American Red Cross, and in closing left the thought, "I commend the Grand Chapter, Order of Eastern Star of Indiana, for your humanitarian efforts".

The Worthy Grand Patron gave the main address, closing with a rededication of our lives to the Stars and Stripes, followed by the assembly singing "Onward Christian Soldiers".

The setting was in keeping with the name, "Harmony Session", chosen by the Worthy Grand Matron, Mrs. Marjoric Schwartz of Salina. The color motif was rose, gold and white, accenting gleaming white satin chair slip-covers and draped white satin altar cover. At the back of each Point's station was a golden lyre. The top of pedestals were mirrored, reflecting the emblems

resting upon them. The scene was altogether harmonious and beautiful in its simplicity.

Mrs. Olga Philip, Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress of the General Grand Chapter, presided in the Grand East calling the assembly to order.

The theme of the Grand Chapter comes from Harmony Chapter No. 2, who put on a solemn and beautiful presentation of the Bible and emblems.

Appropriate welcomes and responses were made by Governor Schoeppel and his wife, who was presented, Major Frank Warren of Topeka and distinguished guests, Mrs. Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and Mr. Chas. H. Townsend, Most Worthy Grand Patron; after which "Star of Love", a song written by John Lewis McDonald, Worthy Grand Organist and dedicated to the Most Worthy Grand Matron, was sung by Mrs. Adelaide Shepard, Past Grand Matron.

Forty-six 50-year pins were presented by the Worthy Grand Patron to various members, two of which were to Ex-Governor Ben S. Paulen, Past Grand Patron and Past Grand Master of F. & A. M., and his sister, Mrs. Minnie Burke, Past Grand Matron.

A Loving Cup was presented to the oldest member in point of service, Mrs. Katherine Davis, Beulah Chapter No. 34, Topeka.

The Masonic Home at Wichita is one of Kansas' main projects receiving \$110,424.10 from O.E.S. sources, such as per capita, endowment, Christmas, fruit and music funds.

A most stirring address was given by Sister Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, saying that Madame Chiang Kai-shek told how a gift of seventy-five cents to China Relief was many times that amount since it bought one meal for 100 Chinese children and there were three dollars in Chinese money left. That one dollar in American currency means twenty dollars in Chinese currency.

The Most Worthy Grand Patron, Mr. Chas. Townsend, told in his address that since Pearl Harbor our O.E.S. field is cut down pretty small and that it is impossible to do any work in Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Mexico and Canada, except Nova Scotia, where three Chapters have been organized. Also a Chapter organized in Honolulu just two weeks before Pearl Harbor.

A scholarship board and student loan come in for much interest in young people.

Kansas maintains an "Eastern Star Unit of the American Red Cross for Volunteer Work" showing 608,592 hours of work with 5,881 members engaged in the work; cash donations, \$758.55 to Grand Secretary for General Grand and \$1,445 to local Red Cross; 162 blood donors and 90 Chapters observing Red Cross nights. One Past Patron made and distributed 150 cribbage boards to service men.

After farewell addresses by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, the installing Grand Officers presented for installation

Preceding the opening of the Fortieth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star of Kentucky, a delightful banquet, honoring Mrs. Dewey Lee Tyler, Worthy Grand Matron, and Mr. E. B. Beatty, Worthy Grand Patron, was held in the Gold Room of the LaFayette Hotel. This was the largest Grand Chapter banquet ever held in Lexington, and possibly the largest ever held in the state.

Toastmaster for the occasion was Mr. Eldon S. Dummit, Past Grand Patron.

The invocation was given by Rev. Hayes Farrish, Pastor of the Christian Church and of the church to which the Grand Matron belongs.

The Governor of Kentucky was escorted to the speakers' table while the audience sang "My Old Kentucky Home".

The Woodland Auditorium, in which this patriotic session was held, was transformed into the deck of a huge ship. The "ship" motif, originating from the fact that the Worthy Grand Matron's name is Dewey, was featured throughout the year and thus became the inspiration for the setting of the Grand Session. In the foreground were three sail ships, representing the three watch words of the Worthy Grand Matron—Friendship, Worship, Fellowship.

Mrs. Alice Cook, Grand Chaplain, assisted by Mrs. Ruby Maher and Misses Jean Dewey and Joan Ruie Jarrett, nine year old nieces of the Worthy Grand Matron, presented the Holy Bible in a very impressive ceremony. The Bible used was one that had belonged to the great-grandmother of the Worthy Grand Matron.

The Electa Session of the Grand Chapter was lovingly dedicated to the memory of Sister Margaret A. Woods, the mother of the Worthy Grand Matron, who served as Electa in Bright Star Chapter No. 16, of Louisville, Kentucky. The predominating colors used in the decorations were red and white—red symbolizing the ray of Electa. This being the Seventy-fifth Birthday Session of the Grand Chapter of Michigan, 1867-1942, special tribute was paid to the pioneers. The Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons were especially honored, and many features which pertained to the building of the Order in Michigan were given special places on the program.

The sessions of the Grand Chapter were held in the Civic Auditorium where the labyrinth was set off by white arches and pedestals which were connected with red and white streamers. Red cups decorated the pedestals of the Star Points. Hanging from the center of the stage was a heautiful emblem of the Star, the Cup, and the figure "75", to designate the anniversary.

The outstanding tribute to the anniversary was the exemplification of Michigan's first ritual by the Past Matrons and Past Patrons of Coldwater Chapter No. 1, under the direction of Sister Nellie Loose. The labyrinth was converted into a replica of one of the early "lodge rooms", beautiful old time costumes were worn by the sisters, and old hymns and music were played on an old-fashioned organ.

An impressive memorial service, "The Hour of Remembrance", directed by the Chairman of Obituaries, Sister Margaret Burgess, was a part of the Wednesday evening program.

A special war bulletin, distributed among the delegates, set forth outstanding and almost unbelievable accomplishments of the subordinate Chapters of Michigan during the past year. Over \$62,000 worth of war bonds had been purchased by the subordinate Chapters; more than 50,000 kits had been distributed to soldiers in the Fort Custer area; over \$1,500, besides thousands of articles and loads of magazines, had been contributed by the Chapters of Michigan through the Battle Creek Chapters; and under the sponsorship of the Red Cross, over 300,000 hours

had been given by the Chapters of Michigan, thousands of garments, over \$3,000 in eash, donations of blood, and active leadership rendered in all of its departments of service.

The report of the Committee on Courtesies mentioned that Coldwater Chapter No. 1 is known as "The Oldest Chapter in the World" and that the Grand Chapter was instituted as the Grand Lodge of Adoptive Masonry in 1867 and was reorganized as the Order of the Eastern Star in 1879.

A beautiful installation service, featuring red roses, closed the Seventy-fifth Birthday Session of this, the oldest Grand Chapter in the world.

A patriotic note was added by grouping of the Flags of the Allied Nations. Red Cross and special defense work as well as motto of the Worthy Grand Matron were evidenced.

Preceding the formal opening, a religious service and welcome was held at First Baptist Church.

Following the public opening, the "Hour of Remembrance" was held in the Shrine Mosque. After the presentation of the Flag of United States with a stirring tribute, many distinguished guests were escorted and introduced.

In cooperation with the watchword "Others" and the objective "Red Cross and Civilian Defense", the report shows

100,727 hours of work spent in making garments and other forms of Red Cross work. Civilian defense included first aid, hours working in victory gardens, hours in canning from victory gardens, hours spent in collecting scrap, and hours in selling bonds and stamps. \$148,266.80 was sum realized from bonds and stamp selling. \$3,500 was invested by the Grand Chapter Special Bond Committee in war savings bonds.

Twenty-two Certificates of Proficiency on the Ritual, Secret and Jurisprudence of the Order, were awarded at the Grand Chapter Session.

The Grand Historian told in words of the "Givers", "Why" such individual gifts as the Grand Matron's Jewel, a Bible, State Flag, a gavel, and a Grand Patron Jewel, were given to the Grand Chapter.

A Masonic Home for Boys and a Masonic Home for Girls are maintained.

At the election of Grand Officers, by vote of Grand Chapter, Mrs. Lillian Helms, wife of Brother Helms, east one vote for all—for her husband, Brother George Helms, for Worthy Grand Patron.

The Sixty-eighth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter convened in the spacious auditorium of the Scottish Rite Cathedral. The insignia of the Red Cross hung in bold relief against a snowy-white backdrop across the stage.

The Flag of the United States was placed in an honor position with the Flags of the Allied Nations disposed about it.

Much pageantry in the national colors was performed. Elaborate presentations of the labyrinth furniture, gifts to Scholarship Fund and the presentation of the Bible after the salutation made by the presiding officer.

At the direction of the Worthy Grand Matron, the Grand Officers entered the Grand Chapter room, all vouched for by Grand Sentinel.

The Flag of the United States was escorted to place of honor and a fine tribute paid.

Many distinguished guests were received and introduced, including Sister Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and several members of General Grand Committees, Grand Matrons and Grand Patrons, present and past, of several neighboring states. Special pageantry was performed for Sister Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Fully realizing the seriousness of the hour, the Grand Matron wished to have a short devotional before each session.

Many 100 per cent Chapter contributors to the International Temple Fund, a large sale of O.E.S. seals (a project of 1941). Fifty-year pins and donations to Masonic Home Advisory Board are all projects enthusiastically supported.

An invitation was extended to O.E.S. to sell bonds at Klines, Inc., St. Louis, on June 30, 1942, where \$25,250.00 bonds were sold that one day.

Red Cross was the major activity of the year, having a state chairman and Chapter chairman to coordinate the Red Cross work done by members. Activities beyond the Red Cross work rooms and blood banks called for assistance so two chairmen were appointed to help in recreational work and U.S.O. activities other than St. Louis, Kansas City and St. Joseph.

Much interest is taken in Board of Relief, the Masonic Home and International Temple Fund.

A concert by the United States Marine Band, known as "The President's Own", which must have special permission by our Chief Executive to leave Washington, D. C., gave a concert in St. Louis, under auspices of Masonie and kindred organizations. A check received for O.E.S. share was turned over to Masonie Home Advisory Board.

Much fine activity is shown in the Masonic Home and the Scholarship Educational Fund, and the Welfare Committee.

Splendid reports by state chairmen besides some history of Red Cross were given Sister Northup, Past Matron and member of Speaker's Bureau of American Red Cross. She stated that the Red Cross in St. Louis is today at the peak of its organization.

The report shows 1,271,201 hours in activities; 77,489 articles; 1,702 blood donors; 13,667 Eastern Star members participating cash donations \$129,851.32 (does not include Red Cross Roll Call). It is interesting to note two O.E.S. Chapters in Missouri are composed entirely of Red Cross members. A sale of war bonds and stamps up to this time of \$37,650.00.

Sister Effie Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, addressed the Grand Chapter and spoke of what the Red Cross work by Chapters and members in Missouri had accomplished and continued to undertake. Nothing less than "stupendous" would describe the accomplishment, she asserted.

The Fifty-ninth District, in costumes representing Red Cross Nurses and WACS entered and the leader read a "summons" commanding Sister Reppert to her home district immediately. To their surprise, her handbag was packed and she was ready to start. She retired temporarily.

Upon Sister Reppert's return, she directed the Grand Marshal to escort the Installing Grand Officers into the Grand Chapter room. Sister Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, was invited to assist in the installation amid the replica of an old Southern mansion. The members of Golden Gate Chapter stood in groups on the lawn and a floral service was held.

Temple in Washington, D. C., its establishment and furnishings and saying, "This building should remain one of the precious jewels and prized possession of the great Order".

Committee on Chinese Relief suggested that in the month of November, each subordinate Chapter take an offering for Chinese Relief, setting five cents per member as a minimum goal, or the regular "Penny March Contribution" be turned over to Montana Grand Chapter, which in turn be sent to General Grand Chapter.

Montana has an active Librarian of Chapter programs. This library is set up in true library fashion and sent out to Chapters.

Activity in Red Cross is self evident, having a total of 22,212 garments made during the year, a total of 15,342 hours of work and blood plasma donations.

These decorations will be made into afghans, immediately following Grand Chapter, and will be sent to a government hospital to be used as coverings for service men. A huge star made in star point colors of afghans was in evidence. The two daughters of the Worthy Grand Matron entered and lighted the tapers for the prologue of four scenes to follow.

Scene I was a group of sailors and soldiers in uniform being conducted in service by the chaplain. The background had two hundred and fifty persons representing the 100 per cent Chapters of the "children's" endowment fund, formed a human American Flag.

Scene II, a human afghan was formed by 216 women, also showing many knitting afghans.

Scene III, was "Angels of Mercy" administering to wounded soldiers.

Scene IV, a Rare Organization and a Rare Flower, the formation of a human orchid.

The Grand Officers entered carrying white Bibles and realistic markers of the orchid scene.

The various flags were presented with tributes.

The Most Worthy Grand Matron of California and the Most Worthy Grand Patron of Wyoming were presented at the Altar with the Grand Representatives carrying flags of their respective states, and circled the labyrinth, symbolic of General Grand Chapter.

As the Most Worthy Grand Matron approached the East, the Temple Choir sang, "California, Here I Come".

On Tuesday, April 13th, in the evening, "Palms of Victory Easter Cantata" was presented by Masonic Home children and a pageant, "Faith Rewarded", by the 100 per cent Chapters of the Endowment Fund. The Grand Officers and distinguished

guests retired to the massive dining room where a receiving line was formed, extending greetings to over one thousand members and friends. Guthrie Chapter No. 12 served refreshments.

A splendid detailed Red Cross report shows 204 afghans made, production room 15,432, knitting and sewing 149,944½ hours, besides figures on surgical dressings, first aid, nursing, nutrition, home service and Junior Red Cross, canteen and disaster, motor corps and roll call and with a total of 1,614 members doing this splendid Red Cross work.

The Worthy Grand Matron's motto for the year, "Sacrifice for Service", was in her mind in acts of deeds and kindness and lovingly dedicated this "Service Session" to her mother and father who instilled the principles of the Order into her mind as a little child.

The objective for the year was to carry out the wishes of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, that of a Red Cross and defense program. In addition, each member of the Order is urged to aid in an objective of creating an endowment fund for the future welfare and education of the children in the Masonic Home so that when they have graduated and leave the protection of the Home there will be a small savings in store to meet at least the bare necessities of life.

The model request being that each week when buying a defense stamp or bond, place one cent (1ϕ) in a box for home objective which will amount to fifty-two cents (52ϕ) a year.

The Worthy Grand Matron made one other interesting suggestion, that August 31st being the birthday of Robert Morris, that Chapters plan Robert Morris Festal Day celebrations in form of picnics, social evenings or some appropriate entertainment of honor, the one who formulated an organization for wives, daughters, mothers, widows and sisters of Master Masons.

At the end of the year, report shows 386 afghans were delivered to U. S. Navy Hospital, San Diego, California; Borden General Hospital, Chickasha, Oklahoma; U. S. Naval Hospital, Norman, Oklahoma; Will Rogers Hospital, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and to U. S. Naval Hospital, Bremerton, Washington, where, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt visited the hospital, one of the afghans was placed over the lap of a boy wounded in action when he was brought before the President for words of praise and sympathy.

\$11,822.18 revenue for endowment fund from the one cent a week plan with 118 Chapters registering 100 per cent and \$15,-224.00 from sale of bonds and stamps.

Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, M. Alice Miller, was given a burst of applause for she has not missed a Grand Chapter session in forty-eight years.

Excellent addresses were given by Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Easton, and Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Townsend. A Grand Historian serves to keep alive the history of Eastern Star in Oklahoma since long before when the state was two territories.

The Past Grand Officers' Jewels were carried to the East, concealed in orchids by girls from the Masonic Home.

At a public installation, Sister Effic Easton, Most Worthy Grand Matron, installed

The informal opening took place Monday evening in the ball-room of the Broadwood Hotel. Behind a garden wall of yellow flowers, amid a background of greens, carrying out the color scheme of the Worthy Grand Matron. Her motto, "Faith and Courage", an electrically lighted cross against a dark green

drop completed the theme of Sister McCarter's year. Patriotic address, Flag Drill, Grand Choir, and a Bible ceremony completed the informal opening.

The formal opening took place on Monday evening with Sister Florence A. Plummer, Past Grand Matron, giving the opening welcome. At the conclusion of her talk she instructed the Grand Marshal to invite the Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Patron to enter the Grand Chapter room, and when these two officers had assumed their stations, the remaining Grand Officers marched in and formed a cross.

A fine tribute was paid to our Flag by Past Matron, Sister Minnie Pierce.

Eleven of the thirteen nurses who served at various times throughout the session were presented this opening night.

The primary purpose for this session was to enact such legislation as will serve the best interests of our Order. A second purpose is to renew old friendships and to make new ones. This session was dedicated to the mother of the Worthy Grand Matron

There are two Homes maintained—one, the Western Pennsylvania Home at Pittsburgh, and the Eastern Pennsylvania Home at Philadelphia.

At the time of the floods in the northwestern part of the state, financial aid was sent from Welfare Fund to assist many members who lost heavily. The sisters displayed great courage in going miles out of their way to hold their Chapter meetings.

Fire destroyed buildings in which three or more different Chapters met. Again "Courage and Faith" was displayed and help went to these Chapters.

Several loans were made from Educational Loan Fund this year.

Three ambulances were purchased last year and it was the desire to purchase another ambulance this year but the Worthy Grand Matron, after numerous efforts, found they were not to be had. Afghans were made by members for use in the ambulances.

Chapters have bought bonds amounting to \$244,804.00; Chapter members have bought bonds amounting to \$4,096,178.55; pints of blood donated, 2,695; Red Cross hours, 1,228,742; welfare of Chapter members, \$5,926.58; Salvation Army, 3,738 hours; Salvation Army, 458 dozen cookies donated.

Hostesses in all the S. A. Canteens in Allegheny County on Tuesdays and Wednesdays were O.E.S. members.

There are 95 sisters enlisted in the service of our country.

The Worthy Grand Matron travelled about 21,000 miles by auto and train on official business.

Educational Loan, General Home, Welfare, Ambulance, International Temple and China Relief are all active funds doing fine work. \$500.00 was sent to Right Worthy Grand Secretary for China Relief and since then much more has come in to be sent.

The Most Worthy Grand Matron gave a fine address stressing the effects of Eastern Star, but ever pressing home the strict adherence to the Ritual—the one thing that binds us all together.

A room is furnished and maintained in the Masonic Home in Philadelphia.

Word was brought before the Grand Session that a recreation room was almost imperative at Fairmont Park where about 500 soldiers were stationed without any recreational facilities. The sum of \$5,000.00 was needed, which would have to be turned over to the military jurisdiction. The sum was almost fully pledged and donated at once.

An act was started to raise \$250.00 for cigarettes for men in service, but when the final count was made \$422.95 was the sum donated for this cause. The name of the donor "Grand Chapter of Pennsylvania, O.E.S." will appear on the cigarettes so boys will know from whence they come.

The Past Grand Matron and Patron's jewels were presented, and Pennsylvania goes forth to another banner year with

SCOTLAND

The Supreme Half-Yearly Meeting, Glasgow October 10, 1942

The half-yearly meeting of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland was held in Woodside Hall, Glasgow, on Saturday, 10th of October, 1942.

Brother Alexander Duncan, Most Worthy Grand Patron, welcomed the Most Worthy Grand Matron and the Grand Office-Bearers and spoke of how good it seems to meet here in peace and tranquillity when there were such dark clouds passing over the rest of Europe. He then presented the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Jeanie Thompson, with the gavel, to preside over the meeting.

The Supreme Grand Chapter was then opened in regular manner and with prayer, and the Most Worthy Grand Matron saluted with Grand Honours. She greeted the Grand Office-Bearers and other members of the Supreme Grand Chapter, as per attendance sheets.

At the request of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, those present were upstanding and observed two minutes' silence, and thereafter sang one verse of "Forever With the Lord".

The Most Worthy Grand Patron assumed the gavel and presided over several motions, after the return of the gavel to the Most Worthy Grand Matron. It was agreed by motion that the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron be permitted, as a war-time measure, to travel first class, as they deem desirable. The Most Worthy Grand Matron attended the dedication of a Motor Supply Van presented by members of Fife and Kinross District Grand Chapter.

The collection for the Supreme Grand Chapter Benevolent Fund was taken and amounted to £6 4s. 6d.

In the Grand Jurisdiction the Grand Officers are called Grand Office-Bearers, with the five Star Points being the only appointive officers, all others being elected for two-year terms.

The Grand Chapters are called District Grand Chapters and are presided over by District Grand Matrons, assisted by District Grand Secretary and District Deputy Grand Matron. They are divided into eight districts.

At the meetings of all the various individual committees at different times, mention is often made by Most Worthy Grand Matron of receiving of parcels of clothing from Canada and various other places. The membership list of committees or office-bearers is referred to as Sederunt (roll for sitting in session) and other members of the Supreme Grand Chapter, as

per attendance sheets. Apologies for absence are intimated and a vote of thanks was always awarded the Most Worthy Grand Matron for presiding.

Annual Meeting Central Hall, Tollcross, Edinburgh March 13, 1943

The Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland was held, with Mrs. Jeanie Thompson, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and Alexander Duncan, Most Worthy Grand Patron, who said in part to the Most Worthy Grand Matron he hoped she would be able "to look back on her two years in office with the happiest memorics".

In accordance with the decision of the Supreme Grand Chapter, a Union Jack Flag was displayed for the first time at our meetings. The dedication ceremony opened with the Senior Grand Chaplain offering up prayer, after which the Most Worthy Grand Matron gave a fine tribute saying that "in this world war, in so much strife and turmoil, we, loyal members of O.E.S. are striving with courage and sacrifice to keep our flag flying in our Empire".

Collections were taken for the Supreme Grand Chapter Benevolent Fund and Red Cross Society.

Sister Jeanie Thompson, Most Worthy Grand Matron, installed in their respective offices the Office-Bearers of which Sister Catherine Black is the new Most Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Thomas Murray the Most Worthy Grand Patron.

The Junior Past Officers are referred to as I.P.G.M., Immediate Past Grand Matron and Immediate Past Grand Patron. The word "immediate" is prefixed to any Junior Past Grand Office-Bearer.

The Most Worthy Grand Patron in his report tells that even though "black out" conditions impede progress, many Chapters have been able to go back to their original meeting places and the number of initiates greatly increases and records broken. Tells us the mobile service van dedicated was presented by Lanarkshire District Grand Chapter to the County Council of Lanarkshire, for service in that county. The van was immediately put into service at Blantyre, the birthplace of that great missionary pioneer in Africa, David Livingstone.

The Worthy District Grand Matrons of the Districts all make mention of difficult traveling conditions, good work, increase in membership, gifts, fruit and flowers and hospitality. One Chapter finding a celebration impossible owing to war, marked the event by giving a gift of five guineas to each of the Cot and Annuity Funds.

Each District has Worthy District Grand Patrons also. One Worthy District Grand Patron reports carrying on voluntary canteen at Central Railway Station at which they serve as many as 412 meals in 2½ hours to boys in uniform.

Two Chapters were forced to recess for the duration due to lack of transport, restrictions upon petrol consumption, and prevailing war conditions.

Through members of Order in New South Wales and subordinate Chapters, an ambulance was donated to the military authorities at a presentation dance held in the Sydney Town Hall; with a third ambulance to be presented in near future, the purchase money being held in hand.

Worthy Grand Secretary reports no fewer than 4,371 new members, this 1942 being the most successful year in O.E.S. history. To May 5, 1943, 12 ambulances, 2 mobile canteens, 5 motor supply vans, and have also contributed £1,166 11s. 6d. to Red Cross Funds.

Besides the \$1,000.00 raised for Masonic Service Centers, much knitting, sewing, a wide variety of donations of all sorts for various projects, and every possible phase of defense work running up to many hours is listed. One member has an average of 300 hours which includes ambulance driving, packing parachutes, pistol practice, first aid, etc. Defense bonds and stamps, entertainment of all sorts (as varied as donations) and finally a listing of miscellaneous, all come in for their share in the large patriotic program.

On Thursday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock P. M. the newly elected Grand Officers were installed for 1943 and 1944.

The Worthy Grand Matron noted in her address the number of candidates she had witnessed and also the number of Past Matrons and Past Patrons present at her official visits. This totaled to 1,208, causing her to say, "Such a fine group of Past Matrons and Past Patrons lends courage and strength to our Order".

For this pleasant relaxation, a small donation was in order, hence the

donation reported \$4.82. Dr. Davies said, "Should this idea spread over the state, let's not be light sleepers".

The \$100.00 was paid to China Relief through General Grand Chapter and the certificate signed by Madame Chiang Kai-Shek hangs in the Grand Secretary's office and the Grand Secretary wears the pin to which the Grand Chapter is entitled, when this contribution is made. Besides this, the General Red Cross Committee of Grand Chapter recommended and adopted at the General Session, that \$675.00 also be given to China Relief, the check to be forwarded to Right Worthy Grand Secretary Sister Minnie Keyes, General Grand Chapter, Washington, D. C.; and to be forwarded by her to Sister Geraldine Fitch, Past Grand Matron of Shanghai, China, to be used by the United China Relief in their noble work.

A complete and detailed report by Chapters of Red Cross work in all its phases is given showing every activity has had a bountiful share of support. Totaling in hours in any capacity of work, 241,180 hours and money donations of \$1,763.46.

An active interest is shown in the Masonic Home with many O.E.S. members sending subscriptions for magazines for the Homes.

Committees on International O.E.S. Temple, Eastern Star Home and Benevolence Funds are all actively engaged.

First honor award certificates were given by Worthy Grand Matron to all Chapters that made monetary contributions to Eastern Star Unit of the American Red Cross, and second honors to Chapters making monetary contribution to local Red Cross.

While the Grand Choir sang "Apple Blossoms", the Director, in behalf of choir presented the Grand Matron with a miniature choir book filled with defense stamps.

Thus closing a fine session, the gavel was passed to Worthy Grand Matron, Lois J. Jacobs. Worthy Grand Patron, Raymond Rogers.

The Grand Master gave a fine resumé of the workings of the Masonic and Eastern Star Home and said in part, "the running of that Home is just a magnified difficulty that is found in individual homes". Having the "point and help situation", the ladies in the Home help solve the problems where as before there were 14 maids in one wing of the Home, now there are none. The food problem is the greatest worry—the magnitude of the problem shows that last year 25,000 pounds of meat were bought for the institution, this year the same amount with all other foods in proportionate amounts are needed. A plea for donations of canned goods particularly was made.

On Friday morning, the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron opened the Grand Session by a "Cheery Good Morning".

The Grand Secretary notes that eleven members during the year received fifty-year pins, making total number of thirty-nine in the state. The Grand Matron was privileged to present to Sister Emma Chadwick, the Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, her fifty-year certificate and pin upon her official visit in Olympia.

A life membership was presented the Worthy Grand Matron by her Esther, who is now the Worthy Matron of John Rex Thompson No. 220, home Chapter of the Worthy Grand Matron.

Much Red Cross work of all forms was done and a plea for army and navy relief to the Army-Navy Relief Fund, which the Worthy Grand Matron and Patron are sponsoring for the year. Each Chapter was requested to donate at least 10 cents per member. This fund increased to \$2,700.00 and was divided equally between army and navy relief.

A most interesting review of O.E.S. work in the state was held over the radio by the State Federated News Radio Chairman, Mrs. A. V. Overman.

The Rose Fund helps the youth with a scholarship fund of one hundred dollars to outstanding boy or girl to some accredited school.

The Masonic Home Fund for Home at Zenith for Masons and Eastern Stars,

In the address of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Effic Easton, outlined her program as she wished it to be carried out when she took the honored chair:

- No. 1. "Protection of the Ritual", telling the session that the name of the Order of the Eastern Star and the Signet and Star are all copyrighted, thus pointing out why it is hard to change some things.
- No. 2. "Leadership" is second point of her program, and the last.
 - No. 3. "This Wonderful Opportunity of Welfare Work."

The Red Cross report shows a grand total of 444,382 hours being spent in activity.

Several sisters are in the armed forces, particularly the WACS. One of the Officers of Analia Chapter is a WAC. One Chapter member, 89 years of age, member of Mansfield No. 162, has 856 hours of knitting to her credit.

A guest, Brother Alfred Wagner, Past Grand Patron of Alberta, gave a unique and splendid address and spoke on his thrill at seeing the Union Jack displayed alongside that of ours. He told of the American Flag flying on many of Alberta's public buildings and to see the convoys of trucks leaving for the North at Edmonton is a great sight.

There was a recessional and processional of Grand Officers and the presentation of the Past Grand Matron's and Patron's jewels. The installation of the new Grand Officers places the work of the Order in the care of

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

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
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
