





In view of the fact that it was impossible to hold a session of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star, for the year 1945 in the City of Long Beach, the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lillian W. Podesta, on October first, 1945, instructed the Grand Secretary to have printed the reports of the Grand Officers and of such Standing Committees as functioned during the year, for distribution to the Chapters and others, as authorized by Rule 16, Section 300 of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.

By virtue of the authority vested in her as Worthy Grand Matron by the provisions of the war emergency legislation enacted at the 1942 session of the Grand Chapter of California held in the City of Oakland, Sister Lillian W. Podesta filed in the office of the Grand Secretary dispensations (1) cancelling the 1945 session of the Grand Chapter; (2) providing for nominations of Officers; (3) providing for nominations for Trustee of the Eastern Star Home; (4) providing for the election of Officers and Trustee; (5) providing for the installation of the Officers for 1946. (Copies of the dispensations will be found in the report of the Worthy Grand Matron.)

REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

To the Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Greetings:

As I send my greetings to my beloved members throughout our glorious State of California, it is with a heart full of love and deep gratitude that "I part the curtain of Time", and recall to mind the treasured memory of standing in the center of the beautiful Golden Poppy at the Sacred Altar humbly accepting the great responsibility of being Worthy Grand Matron saying a little prayer just as I promised I would do at the beginning of each new day, "That God may be my Hope, my Stay, my Guide, and a lantern to my feet" as I presided this year of 1945.

Between that yesterday and today, how short has been the journey.

"Gone are the precious yesterdays,
I count them each one apart,

We are grateful to our Heavenly Father indeed, as we come to the close of this year that the Golden Chain of Grand Officers has not been severed.

Sincere sympathy is extended to our Past Grand Matron, Sister Bertie Y. Todd, in the loss of her husband, Brother Lafe Todd.

To those members in subordinate Chapters whose hearts have been saddened by the loss of dear ones in this tragic war or otherwise, we extend our sympathy.

"No one hears the door that opens
When they pass beyond our call,
Soft as loosened leaves of roses
One by one our loved ones fall."

The sympathy of this Grand Jurisdiction is extended to all Sister Grand Jurisdictions in the broken links in their Golden Chain of members.

SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION

The San Francisco Degree Team, under the direction of Dr. Maude Noble Haven, Past Grand Matron, exemplified all phases of the ritualistic work for the Deputy Grand Matrons of the Northern districts in Richmond Masonic Hall, San Francisco, on October 20th to 24th.

The Southern California Degree Team under the direction of Sister Corine Orban Melville, Past Grand Matron, exemplified all phases of the ritualistic work for the Deputy Grand Matrons of the Southern Districts in the Masonic Hall at Pico and Figuero Streets, Los Angeles, on October 30th to November 2nd.

Highest words of praise go to these two splendid leaders and their corps of officers for their efficiency in the ritualistic work. It was indeed a joy to work with these two Degree Teams and to know these fine and loyal women is to love them.

INSTALLATIONS

One of the first distinguished honors to come to me after being installed as Worthy Grand Matron was the very kind invitation to act as Installing Officer at the Joint Installation of the Chapters in the City of Sacramento on November 27, 1944, and then the Joint Installation of the Chapters in the City of Long Beach on December 3, 1944.

I shall always be grateful for this courtesy. It was my happy privilege and a joy indeed to have Brother Logan R. Cotton, Worthy Grand Patron, assist in these beautiful Installations.

Another happy privilege was mine and one which I shall always cherish was that of being Installing Officer at the Installation on November 21, 1944 in my own beloved Roosevelt Chapter No. 470 in San Francisco.

OFFICIAL ACTS

My first official acts were the naming of the Appointive Grand Officers and Grand Chapter Committee members. The greatest desire to distribute these honors throughout the State made this a most pleasant task but a difficult one because of the great number of worthy members.

Also, it was my duty to sign warrants and dispensations for use in the Grand Secretary's office, and approve the bonds of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer.

The Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star, was not unmindful of its patriotic duty to have a part in the war bond drives, so early in my term of office I appointed Sister Hazel Thorn Lane, Junior Past Grand Matron, as General Chairman.

In the sixth war loan drive, Sister Elva Dawson, Past Matron of Los Angeles and Sister Grace Lavonne, Past Matron of Oakland, assisted Mrs. Lane. Over six million dollars was sold by the Order of the Eastern Star. Five million went to buy a Mercy Hospital Ship, which carries an appropriate plaque crediting the Order of the Eastern Star.

In the seventh war loan drive Sister Kathryn Farwell, Past Grand Matron of Alameda, assisted Mrs. Lane by taking charge of the northern Districts of the State and Sister Elva Dawson, Past Matron of Los Angeles the southern Districts. Over eight million dollars were the results of this drive. We were able to buy twelve C-54 Skymaster evacuation planes and four hospital planes. These planes all carry an Eastern Star plaque.

My deep appreciation to you, Sister Hazel, and your splendid committee.

Appointed Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Matron of Amity Chapter of San Francisco, as Chairman of Hospitality House in this city and appointed Sister Frances Olson, Past Matron of Plymouth Chapter of Oakland, Chairman of Hospitality House of Oakland. I wish to express my appreciation for the splendid work you fine women have accomplished.

Appointed Sister Zelda Postel, Past Matron of San Francisco Chapter, to represent the Order of the Eastern Star on the Camp and Hospitals Council. This request came to me from Mrs. Helen Reynolds of the American Red Cross.

NEW CHAPTERS

I am happy to report that this Grand Jurisdiction has gained three new Chapters under dispensation this year and it was indeed a happy privilege to have a part in the installation of their corps of officers. I wish for each one of these new Chapters success and happiness always.



To the Officers and Members of all California Chapters, O.E.S.

My dear Sisters and Brothers:

An urgent appeal has been received from the Red Cross for afghans for the thousands of patients who are being received in the hospitals in this area. The Army and Navy hospitals are calling on the Red Cross for these handmade afghans for use on beds and wheelchairs of wounded servicemen—25,000 are needed as soon as possible. The Army and Navy do not issue this type of coverlet, so the Red Cross is asking our help.

The finished afghan should be 4 x 6 feet and may be made of knit or crocheted "squares" which should be no larger than 6 x 6 inches. Scraps of yarn in any color, except the pastels, may be used. The squares may be in any pattern and any size knitting needle or crochet hook may be used. If your members cannot assemble the afghan have the squares turned in to the production chairman of your local Red Cross Chapter for completion. This is an important phase of Red Cross work and your assistance will be greatly appreciated. If you cannot knit or crochet, you may be able to contribute some yarn for the work.

Contributions for the Arts and Skills project have not been as generous as anticipated. May I again ask your help in this great work? For the information of the members, arrangements have been made to build and equip an Arts and Skills building at the Marine Hospital in San Francisco and one in Southern California. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$12,000 each, which will be paid from the contributions you made last year. Substantial contributions have also been made to other hospitals throughout the State for this work. Every penny that is contributed will be used exclusively for the service men and women who have given so much in our behalf; surely it is not asking too much of our members to ask each one to forego some little pleasure and to contribute to this worthwhile project. The government does not finance anything of this kind, but expects this type of work to be done by the Red Cross. The government maintains the hospitals, but the occupational therapy project has to be financed by organizations.

"The session of Grand Chapter, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, for the year 1945 having been cancelled by virtue of dispensation dated April 16, 1945, and the nomination of officers having been provided for in dispensations dated May 31, 1945 and July 25, 1945, now, therefore, for the purpose of providing for the election of Grand Chapter Officers and of a Trustee for the Eastern Star Home for a five year term, and by virtue of the powers vested in me by provisions of Sections 156-A and 156-B of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, and with the written approval of the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and the Chairman of the Committee on Jurisprudence, I, Lillian W. Podesta, as Worthy Grand Matron, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, do hereby order as follows:

"Six ballots shall be sent to the Secretary of every Chapter by the Grand Secretary, one each for the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, for the Past Matrons collectively and for the Past Patrons collectively. In addition a ballot shall be included for a Grand Officer, Deputy Grand Matron, or Past Elective Grand Officer who may be a member of the Chapter.

"These members who compose the Grand Chapter shall be notified in writing, not later than five days prior to the date set (such date to be designated by the Worthy Matron, who will

direct the Secretary to send the notices) that the ballots will be delivered for the purpose of voting, at the stated meeting of the Chapter, held on (giving date), said meeting to be not later than the last stated meeting in September.

"At the stated meeting named, and after such special notice, the Secretary shall deliver to each member entitled to same, the envelope containing the ballot. The ballot will be marked by the person entitled to vote, be replaced in the envelope, which will then be scaled and turned over to the Secretary of the Chapter. Sealed ballots will be placed in an envelope bearing the certification of the Secretary that such ballots were cast by the members entitled to vote, and will be immediately mailed to the Chairman of the Election Board, Brother Guy Brundage. All ballots must be postmarked not later than midnight, September 29, 1945, in order to be valid.

"Ballots will be opened by the Election Board and counted by the Board under the personal supervision of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron, at the office of the Grand Chapter, Room 633, Phelan Building, San Francisco, on Monday, October 8, 1945.

"Voting rights are as follows (Section 45 of the Constitution):

(1) Each Grand Officer shall have one vote.

(2) Each Past Elective Grand Officer of this Grand Chapter shall have one vote as such, and shall in no event have more than one such vote.

(3) Each Deputy Grand Matron shall have one vote as such.

(4) The Past Matrons of each subordinate Chapter, as stated in Section 14, shall have one collective vote, cast as a majority of their number, present and voting, shall determine, by one of them, selected likewise by majority. In case of a tie, the vote is lost. No Past Matron, having an individual vote shall participate in such collective vote, unless she is the only Past Matron present.

(5) The Past Patrons of each subordinate Chapter, as stated in Section 14, shall have one collective vote, similar in all re-

spects to that of the Past Matrons.

(6) Each Worthy Matron, Associate Matron, Worthy Patron and Associate Patron of each subordinate Chapter, as stated in Section 14, shall have one vote as such. If one or more of such officers be not present, the senior in rank of such officers present, in the order named, shall be entitled to cast such vote or votes in addition to his or her individual vote.

"If the Chapter has no elected officer as mentioned in Section

(6) above, that vote is lost.

"Section 45 further provides that no one shall be instructed how to vote.

"In order to vote, the members of Grand Chapter as enumerated in the foregoing, MUST be present at the stated meeting of the Chapter designated in the notice,

"Any member of Grand Chapter in good standing may be elected to any office, whether nominated therefor or not."

This letter shall be read in open Chapter at the first stated meeting following its receipt.

To the Worthy Matrons of all Chapters in California.

My dear Sisters:

It has come to my attention that many Chapters have not a complete set of books as furnished by Grand Chapter for the use of the Officers. Every Chapter should have the following for the Officers named:

Six Rituals and Six Instruction Books—one each for the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Conductress and Associate Conductress.

One Instruction Book for the Marshal.

Two Syllabuses—one each for the Worthy Patron and Associate Patron.

Two Diagrams of the Labyrinth—one each for the Worthy Patron and the Conductress.

Seven Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter—one each for the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Conductress, Associate Conductress and Secretary.

Section 570 of the Constitution provides that fines are imposed on Chapters for the loss of any of the foregoing, as follows: Ritual \$10; Instruction Book \$5; Syllabus \$5; Diagram of the Labyrinth \$1.

Please check and if any of the books mentioned above are missing send the fine to the Grand Secretary so the book may be replaced. This is IMPORTANT.

If Rituals are badly worn you may secure new books on payment of \$1.25 each and return of the worn books to the Grand Secretary.

Podesta, as Worthy Grand Matron, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, do hereby order as follows:


We honor these pioneer sisters who have followed His Star these fifty years, and wish for them that they continue to be an inspiration and help to those about them by their splendid example of courage, faith and devotion to this beautiful Order.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Political Solicitations. In 1925 a resolution was adopted by the Grand Chapter forbidding the use of official stationary

of either the Grand Chapter or subordinate Chapters for political purposes or for advocating the election of any candidate or candidates for Grand Chapter offices. On several occasions since the adoption of this resolution the mandate of the Grand Chapter has been disregarded, sometimes by individuals and sometimes by subordinate Chapters. This practice is not only a defiance to Grand Chapter, but also unfair to those candidates who observe the law.

In order to clarify this situation and in the interests of dignity, I now RECOMMEND that this Grand Chapter forbid the solicitation of votes for any person for any elective Grand Chapter office through the medium of any publication or circular letter or letters addressed either to Chapters, delegates, or other members of Grand Chapter, either on Eastern Star stationary or otherwise.

- 2. Committee on Education. For many past years the Committee on Education has been called upon for marches, speeches, entertainment, drills and similar features, but in practically no instances have Chapters called upon them for anything of an educational nature. The Committee has simply become a medium through which Chapters secure entertainment for their members. As the Grand Chapter is not interested in furnishing entertainment to subordinate Chapters, and as the features ordinarily requested can be secured from other sources, without cost or at a nominal fee, and as the Committee has never functioned as originally contemplated, I RECOMMEND that the Committee on Education be abolished and that that portion of Sections 168 and 227 as pertain to this Committee and Section 190, of the Constitution be repealed.
- Instruction Books. Whenever a new Instruction Book is printed an exchange is made without charge for the old Instruction Books which are the property of the subordinate Chapters for the offices of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Conductress and Associate Conductress. This is authorized by law. In addition, in 1940, each Chapter was furnished a book for the use of the Marshal. Since 1922 the Instruction Book has been reprinted six times and on each occasion there has been a surplus of several hundred copies. These naturally had to be destroyed. In order to avoid unwarranted expense, I RECOMMEND that there be no reprint of the Instruction Book more often than every ten years, and that in the event that there be any change, changes, or corrections authorized by Grand Chapter in the period between reprints, the changes or corrections be inserted in existing Instruction Books in the same manner as are the changes and amendments to the Constitution and Laws, namely, by inserting printed slips.
- 4. Sale of Instruction Books. The method of disposing of Instruction Books in vogue for some time has caused considerable trouble in various Chapters. Instruction Books should be sold

only to Chapters and solely for the use of Chapter officers, and I therefore RECOMMEND that Instruction Books be sold ONLY to subordinate Chapters, and then only for the use of officers of the respective Chapters, each book to be marked property of the Chapter for the use of the particular office, or station, in which it is to be used and to be passed on to the officer succeeding to the office, or station, from year to year. Further, that no Chapter shall be permitted to purchase more than four such books. The fine for the loss of a book purchased shall be the same as that provided for the loss of other Instruction Books belonging to the Chapter, namely, Five Dollars (\$5). If, and when, Instruction Books are reprinted, the purchased books shall have the same exchange value as other Instruction Books which are the property of the Chapter.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

In the beginning of my term of office many complaints came to me of innovations being brought into the life of our Eastern Star Chapters. Marches and processions by large groups of hostesses, Bible Bearers with escorts preceding our ritualistic entrance. I asked their discontinuance, feeling that if this sort of thing was permitted we would soon lose our identity as an Eastern Star Chapter.

Many of these innovations I have been told came from former members of other Grand Jurisdictions and other fraternal Orders.

From observation at my Official Visits to our various districts and to the individual Chapters that I met with, I found the condition of the Chapters exceptionally good. Although there has been some use of the black cube which has been disturbing, to say the least, but this offense is not in any large degree. My thought toward this offense is: if, as we travel the highway of life, we could remember that we are dedicated to the high principles of "Charity, Truth, and Loving Kindness", and think sincerely of that obligation that we assumed at the Sacred Altar, much of this shameful work could be eliminated.

The attendance at the official visits in every section of the State was far above my fondest hopes. Membership in practically every Chapter in the State has increased and in turn the financial condition has improved.

It gives me pleasure to report with but few exceptions the meetings were started on the appointed hour of the evenings of my official visits.

WAR ACTIVITIES

Much thought and deep consideration was given to this program. After visiting Mr. Verne Simmons, Pacific Coast Area Chairman of the American Red Cross and his staff on many occasions finally selected Arts and Skills and Recreational Supplies as the project for the members of the Order of the Eastern Star for the year of 1945.

I fully believed that our members would enjoy contributing to this most wonderful work, and I do know now at the end of my year that it was the very finest program that I could have selected.

Arts and Skills gave us the great opportunity by our voluntary contribution to serve our fellowman.

"Service is love; in this do we glimpse the higher vision and learn to count no blessing truly ours, until it has, through us, blessed someone else."

Many are the blessings coming to our members for their unselfish devotion to the project of Arts and Skills and Recreational Supplies.

This Order was founded upon the principles of Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness towards others. We have indeed strived this year by our united efforts to uphold the high ideals for which our Order stands and to fulfill our obligation; to aid, comfort and protect each other, yes, aid, comfort and protect our boys too, your boy and my boy.

The voluntary contribution that I asked for, in many Chapters and Associations, exceeded my fondest dream. The good that this War Activity Program is doing could never be measured in words. Let us continue to stand by our boys until they are ready to face the world strong in body and mind. Let us renew our faith in God and put our trust in a wisdom greater than our own is my fervent prayer.

Now my grateful thanks and deep appreciation to my members of the Eastern Star throughout the State of California for answering the call to service.

A complete report of all contributions and expenditures will be found in this proceeding.

American Red Cross U. S. Naval Hospital Mare Island, California

June 20, 1945

Mrs. Lillian Podesta Grand Matron Order of Eastern Star 760 Market Street San Francisco, Calif.

Dear Mrs. Podesta:

We have delayed acknowledging your gift of \$400 which was to be used for the construction of two remedial gymnasia until we were able to let you know that the gymnasia were actually under construction. Now that all of the arrangements have been made, wood secured, metal parts obtained, et cetera, we feel that your gift will actually be used for the purpose for which it was intended. There was so much difficulty in securing the materials necessary for the construction of this equipment for a while we felt we might have to return the gift to the Eastern Star.

We would like all of the members of the Eastern Star to know how much these remedial gymnasia mean to the patients at this hospital. It is really the first step on the road to recovery. We have so many patients here who have been handicapped for life and this effects their whole outlook despite the fact that they have been told by the doctors that their handicap is something which can be overcome. They do not believe it. The hospital does everything it can to help these men and many people who have similar handicaps come to the hospital and demonstrate to the boys that the loss of an arm or a leg or the loss of the function of any part of the body does not necessarily mean that the person will become a useless member of society. However, many of our patients have that attitude and it takes a long time for them to make the adjustment and to accept the fact that they really can do something to help themselves.

The gymnasia for which you provided the money are one of the biggest helps because the patients through their use are able to demonstrate to themselves that with a little effort on their part they can learn to walk, use their arms and make use of their artificial appliances. They begin to use the gymnasia long before they are able to be out of the ward and the number of persons who have taken hope and look corrageously toward the future because they have been able to prove to themselves that they can get around is countless. Although the gymnasia by themselves could not accomplish this miracle, they help and anything that helps these wounded men overcome their handicaps and take courage to face the future is worthwhile.

The gymnasia were an experiment and because they were we could not get people interested in seeing they were provided. We wish to thank you not only for making this experiment possible but for being generous enough to risk your money on something which might have proved a failure. It was a chance which you took and for which we are most grateful to you and since it has proved to be successful I know that you will be delighted that you had the courage to invest some money in the hope that a few of our veterans might be benefited by its use. Thank you on behalf of the men you have helped and also on behalf of the Physical Rehabilitation Office at this hospital who pioneered this project.

Dear Mrs. Podesta:

We received a letter from the Secretary of Camp and Hospital Council, Mr. Louis Hendricks, that the Order of the Eastern Star having just contributed \$400 for our gymnasia has now contributed \$1000 for our musical instruments. We hardly know how to thank you for this. Both the Recreation Department of the Navy and ourselves and practically everyone around the hospital has been trying to secure musical instruments for some time so that we could have a patient-corpsmen orchestra. For a station as hig as this hospital and the Navy Yard, we suffer from a lack of bands and orchestras to play for our parties and entertainments. Nearly every time we have a dance we must either use phonograph records or try to get one band which is overworked now to come and play for our patients.

On the other hand, amongst the Waves, the corpsmen and the patients in this hospital, we have some very fine musicians and they would be glad to form an orchestra to play for their fellow patients and workers, but we have not been able to secure any musical instruments except a few string instruments. With your gift we can certainly go to town on brasses and wind instruments. I suppose it will take about two months before the orchestra will be able to make its first public appearance, but you can rest assured that in the two months that the orchestra is practicing it will have fun and we wish to thank you and all the members of the Eastern Star for their most generous gift to this hospital.

Ours is an attack transport. Our job is to earry the troops and all their equipment to the landing beaches. Just now we are engaged in taking occupation forces to Japan. Although we do not anticipate opposition, we are armed and prepared for any emergency. The element of strain has lessened greatly since peace came. But there is still great need for entertainment to keep up the morale of all hands, and especially the troops. Now that the spice of danger and the glamour and glory of battle are over, they are a pretty unhappy group of men. Their prospect is one of months, and perhaps years of separation from their loved ones. Therefore the contribution you are making to their good spirits is very valuable.

I wish you could hear the groups that gather on deck in the evening to sing and listen to that accordion. I just now came from a rehearsal for a Variety Show which is to be given for

all hands tomorrow evening. The accordian has an important spot in that. All in all, it is a wonderful and much appreciated gift, and I speak for us all when I give you our hearty thanks.

Please convey to all the members of your Eastern Star Chapter the gratitude of the officers and men of the U.S.S. Buckingham (APA-141). And accept my personal thanks, whose name, by some strange coincidence, is the same as that of my ship.

the public and certainly the Eastern Star organizations who so kindly donated these funds should know more about it.

We are hoping to publish an article soon in the San Diego paper telling the public of the gift. Our publicity Chairman has instructed me to ask you for your photograph which we would like to run with the story.

Mrs. Ivan Finn showed me your letter in reference to leather for the patients in hed. Our corps is accordingly going to attempt to spend the \$4800 most wisely, buying the leather in large quantities at cheaper prices and then placing the leather in the shop for convalescent patients and delivering the leather to the Red Cross recreation departments on both main side and park side for the bed patients, at U.S.N. My dear Mrs. Podesta:

I regret exceedingly that a variety of circumstances beyond my control has prevented my writing to you before this. On August third, last, Mrs. Antoiette Sharp of the Bay Area Camp and Hospital Council wrote me the list of names of donors of craft and other recreational material for the patients aboard our ship and this letter did not reach me until we were one day out from San Francisco this last time, about October 29th, and where in the world the letter could have gone, we've no idea. Your name and organization headed the list of donors and I wanted so badly to write to thank you for the wonderful leather—but could not since I hadn't then your address.

So now, at this time, I have the privilege of thanking you for the two separate lots of leather and craft materials you and your wonderful organization gave us—for the lot about August third and for this last tremendous lot October twenty-sixth.

You can never know, from the inadequacy of my mere words, what it has meant to the patients returning from the Pacific to have the leather and other craft materials available for their recreational therapy. I am going to try to get pictures of the men at work around the craft table so that you might have some visual idea of what it means to them. The pictures will probably not accompany this particular letter but I shall send them as soon as they are developed.

Your generosity has permitted us to present an unusually full and complete craft program for the men that we might not otherwise have been able to do. Leather work has been by far the most popular and has perhaps served the most men. But then who am I to say this when I watch and listen to the other patients enjoying themselves and entertaining other patients with the music they make on the accordion and the guitars?

During both these last trips in from Saipan and Guam, Miss Julie Sutton, the recreation worker has been able to present crafts to the patients from the day they came aboard. We have two huge tables set up in the only available space on the ship, the forward lobby on the main deck, and from morning until night the men are busy cutting, tooling and lacing their wallets, belts, picture frames and knife handles.

We are extremely fortunate in having in Miss Sutton an extremely skilled craft worker who can use materials most ad-

vantageously. She spends long hours after work hours carefully cutting the skins so that nothing is wasted, and her care and appreciation of fine tools would delight the hearts of the ladies who have given so generously to make her work possible.

Some beautiful work has also been done in Plexiglas and you can rest assured that the men who are at long last coming home do not go home empty handed—but they take "something they have made" to their families. Few of them have any other souvenirs of their months overseas.

Will you convey to the ladies of the Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star our most sincere thanks for these materials and extend an invitation for them to visit the ship if they would care to do so. We shall be in port for a few days around the period of November 28th to December 4th. We do not know where we will be berthed but the Port Director should be able to direct anyone who is interested. Miss Sutton or I will be delighted to show them our beautiful hospital ship and be glad of the chance to thank them in person for their wonderful contribution to our work.

Dear Mrs. Podesta:

On behalf of the patients at the U. S. Naval Hospital, Shoemaker, we wish to thank you for the two pianos and three portable phonographs donated by your organization.

Heretofore we have been greatly limited in the number of parties we could give in one evening because we had only two pianos, one of which was in very poor condition; as you know, music always provides a more friendly relaxed atmosphere for any gathering. With the addition of these fine pianos we will be able to expand our recreation program, as well as to meet the requests from patients who want to play the piano for a few hours. We have known instances where a mentally ill patient was aided in his recovery through music. An account of one such instance follows:

"While making plans for a party on one of the wards, the recreation worker went there to see if any patient could play the piano. None could, so arrangements were made to have a patient from another ward come in to play. The piano was taken on the ward a half hour before the worker and pianist arrived. As the worker walked on the ward, she sensed the excitement in the air—the patients, nurse, and corpsman were all gathered around the piano. 'Big John' was playing the piano! Why was this so startling? Because 'Big John' had completely withdrawn from society; shunning association with anyone, and this was the first response he had shown since being admitted to the hospital three months before. The patients were interested in hearing 'Big John' play, so the rest of the evening was spent in making records with the patients singing and 'Big John' playing the piano.

The doctor and nurse were so enthusiastic about 'Big John's' response that they requested the piano be left on the ward, so he could play whenever he desired. This request was made possible by 'storing' the piano there and taking it out only for parties in that section of the hospital."

At present we have a system of lending phonographs to ambulatory patients who have been able to keep them only one day because of the great demand. Your gift will enable us to serve more patients.

The members of your organization can be justly proud of their record of service to hospitals in this area, and we are grateful for the generous assistance you have given us.





Appeal

On May 2, 1945, the following Appeal was received: "April 28, 1945

To Grand Chapter, State of California Lillian W. Podesta—Worthy Grand Matron Logan R. Cotton—Worthy Grand Patron Maud McWilliams Smith—Grand Secretary

You and each of you will please take notice that the undersigned, a member in good standing of Service Chapter, Number 414, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star does hereby appeal from that certain order of Lillian W. Podesta, Worthy Grand Matron and Logan R. Cotton, Worthy Grand Patron, dated April 16, 1945 and approved in writing by the Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and Chairman of the Committee on Jurisprudence under and by virtue of which all provisions of the Constitution and Laws, including its By-Laws and Special Rules of Grand Chapter pertaining to the holding of the said annual session of Grand Chapter for the year 1945 are suspended.

This appeal is taken in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Grand Chapter, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star providing for an appeal from any order of its Worthy Grand Matron suspending the provisions of the Constitution and Laws, including the By-Laws and Special Rules of Grand Chapter made in accordance with Sections 156-A and 156-B of said Constitution and Laws.

Fraternally, (Signed) D. A. Boone."

In accordance with the provisions of Section 156-B of the Constitution and Laws of Grand Chapter, copy of this Appeal was immediately sent to the Associate Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Patron, with the following letter, dated May 2, 1945:

"Enclosed you will find an exact copy of an appeal from the decision of the Worthy Grand Matron regarding the holding of the 1945 session of the Grand Chapter, signed by D. A. Boone, as a member in good standing of Service Chapter No. 414.

This appeal was received in this office about 10 A.M. today, May 2, 1945 and must, in accordance with section 156-B of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter, be decided within thirty days, that is, on or before the first day of June, 1945, or be considered denied.

You three are the special Board of Appeal authorized in section 156-B, and should meet as a group to hear the case. The meeting should be held in San Francisco, in this office, as this is the headquarters of the Grand Chapter.

A notice should be sent to the Worthy Grand Matron and to Brother Boone of the exact time and place of the meeting so they may appear to testify. Both sides are entitled to present their case at the session of the Judges.

Copy of the Grand Matron's dispensation is also enclosed."

No action was taken on this Appeal, so in accordance with Section 156-B of the Constitution and Laws, it is considered as denied.

Meeting re Housing.

By authority of the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Willa Jane Hellwig, Past Grand Matron, Brother Logan R. Cotton, Worthy Grand Patron, and I met with Mr. David Olmstead, Manager of the Long Beach Auditorium and Convention Department of the City of Long Beach, to ascertain the possibility of securing enough rooms to house all of the delegates if government regulations regarding the holding of conventions were modified. Mr. Olmstead's report, which was confirmed by the Hotel Managers, was that it was impossible to secure accommodations for more than three hundred persons in, and around, Long Beach and Los Angeles.

Finance Committee.

On September 24th I met with the Finance Committee in Sacramento. All members of the Committee were present, Sisters Gertrude Conant, Maude Ethel Fluetsch and Brother Charles Johnson. The following Budget was approved for the year 1945-1946:

The Committee, with the consent of the Worthy Grand Matron, authorized the payment of amounts specified in the Constitution and Laws to the members of such Standing Committees as functioned during the year.

Owing to the fact that there would be no 1945 session of the Grand Chapter, and the fact that Chapters had paid a per capita tax for the Representative Fund in 1945, the Committee made no provision for a per capita tax for this fund for the coming year. As can be seen from the Auditor's report, there is sufficient money in the fund to pay the mileage for the next annual session, wherever and whenever it may be held.

The Finance Committee authorized the purchase of \$25,000.00 U. S. Bonds for the General Fund.

Election of Grand Officers.

In line with the dispensation issued by the Worthy Grand Matron under date of July 31, 1945, ballots and voting instructions were sent to all Chapters.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Greetings:

The Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California is pleased to submit for your consideration its annual

report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1945.

The first meeting for the fiscal year was held November 28, 1944, at which time the following Officers were elected: President, Gladys Fitch-Pierce, Vice-President, Ralph Boynton. The President then named the following Committee Chairmen for the year, all other Trustees to serve as members of each Committee: Administration, Ralph Boynton; Finance, Kathryn Farwell; Home Policy, Hazel Thorn Lane; Admissions, Walker Peddicord.

All meetings of the Board were held at the Home on the following dates: November 28, 1944, December 19, 1944, January 31, 1945, February 20, 1945, March 20, 1945, April 27, 1945, May 15, 1945, June 14, 1945 and September 18, 1945.

In Memoriam.

Miss Annie Wible, member of San Jose Chapter No. 31, San Jose. Born, December 7, 1852. Entered the Home May 10, 1934, entered into Rest April 21, 1945.

Sister Wible was the senior member of the Home family, a truly sweet, lovable, kindly character. These few words were found near her and are very true to her nature:

"He who helps to make the world more beautiful Helps God to make it good.

I will keep my mind annointed with the magic balm of youth;

I will keep my footsteps pointed toward the shining hills of truth.

Old Age—though weak and bent and gray And years have o'er us rolled, While our hearts are young and gay We should not be counted old.''

Mrs. Augusta Craig, member of Hollywood Chapter No. 209, Hollywood. Born November 30, 1863. Entered the Home January 6, 1934, entered into Rest September 27, 1945.

Sister Craig, "Cricket" as she was affectionately known within the household, had this tribute paid her: "If only more people would emulate Cricket's disposition and philosophy, how much better the world would be."

These lines, which bespeak her strong, sincere philosophy, were found among her effects: "This is the simplest definition for average humanity being couched in the language of mysticism, thus linking the Truth as found in all religions. The Soul can be spoken of as the Son of the Father and of coming into incarnation in order to reveal the quality of the nature of God which is essential Love. This Life taking form, nurtures the quality of Love within all forms and ultimately reveals the Purpose of all Creation."

Members entering the Home during the year were:

Mrs. Florence Pipe, Plymouth Chapter No. 423, Oakland;

Mrs. Wilhelmina Davis, South Gate Chapter No. 133, Los Angeles;

Mrs. Lillian Page, La Posa Chapter No. 292, King City.

Mrs. Rosa Moller of Amity Chapter No. 262, entered the Home in August, 1944, and after taking a trip to San Francisco in November, decided to remain there. Her request to leave the Home permanently was granted.

Mrs. Agnes Claus, Superintendent of the Home since November 1, 1943, notified the Board in September, 1944, that owing to her approaching marriage, she would have to resign October 1st. It was impossible to find a successor to Mrs. Claus in October, so she graciously consented to remain, but gave notice that she would not be able to stay after the 15th of November. We were still unable to find a successor to Mrs. Claus when she left, so by the unanimous vote of the members of the Board of Trustees, as President of the Board I assumed the duties of the Superintendent until a permanent adjustment could be made. It took vision, courage and confidence on my part to assume this responsibility, and I hope my efforts have been satisfactory.

Representatives of the State Social Welfare Department visited the home and recommended that more clearcut administrative lines be established, and an analysis made of work assignments. In line with the recommendation, and at their suggestion, Miss Lola Yerkes was engaged to make the survey and an inventory of the Home furnishings, etc. Miss Yerkes made a comprehensive report and her suggestions have been followed. It was found necessary to revamp the Rules and Regulations governing the Home as several were outmoded.

The food situation was one of our greatest worries this year. According to statistics of the Department of Labor, food costs have risen tremendously during the past year. In order to keep costs down as much as possible, we have shopped around and have bought as we could, WHERE we could, WHEN we could and WHAT we could. The gardener planted a "Victory" garden and it was a great help in providing vegetables in season. We also have an apiary which yielded 575 pounds of superior quality honey for the table.

The garden has been given careful attention and the flowers are a daily source of pleasure.

It has been the desire of the Board of Trustees, as administrator of the Home, to study and discuss the health problems, and to secure employees who are sincerely interested in the welfare of the aged. It has at times been difficult to scure competent help, but the staff has cooperated and is to be congratulated. During the past year there has been considerable illness in the household, which is to be expected when the average age is eighty years. An infirmary wing is urgently needed.

A bequest of \$50 was left to the Home by Sister Maybelle Prince of Josephine Chapter No. 104 of Chico. The Harry C. Sproule Association of Southern California (Associate Patrons) sent \$50 to the Endowment Fund of the Home. Many memorials were placed in the Endowment Fund by various members of the Order. For these, and other gifts, the Board of Trustees and the Home family are grateful.

Many of the members of the Home family assist in various ways, adding to the happiness of others within the Home. Mrs. Evelyn Hobbs, Home Librarian, compiled a historical scrapbook covering all of the important events at the Home since its inception. Each month we have a "birthdays of the month" celebration and the kindly women who give of their time, talent and assistance to make these occasions a success deserve the gratitude of all

"A good deed is never lost. He who sows courtesy, reaps friendship, and he who plants kindness, gathers love." Many happy hours were spent in anticipation of, and preparation for, the most eventful day of the year—the visit of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Officers and trailers—and culminated in the annual luncheon and reception. Residents of the Home entertained the Grand Officers with a clever original skit by one of their number which was entertainingly presented in the Garden Court room. This was the first time that members of the Home family had themselves entertained the Grand Family, and the afternoon was voted a grand success.

The Degree Team of Southern California, under the leadership of Past Grand Matron Corine Orban Melville, served the luncheon as they have for many years, and in their colorful caps and aprons added to the beauty of the day. The beautiful floral decorations, from the garden of Hazel and Billy Lane, were enjoyed long after the day was a happy memory. Thanks comes from the heart of everyone who had the privilege of enjoying this outstanding day.

"The world is full of beauty when the heart is full of love" is particularly true at the holiday season, when we enjoy a program of home talent and gather around the fireplace in the Garden Court room. At Christmas Santa distributed gifts to all of the guests and we enjoyed the carols sung by Job's Daughters and the Girl Scouts of Santa Monica.

The Auditor's report, attached, gives a clear picture of the financial status of the Home. The Board of Trustees was par-

ticularly pleased that this year the revenue exceeded the expenses.

This last year of my stewardship on the Board of Trustees has been a very pleasant one, and it is an honor to work with members of our Grand Chapter who are giving to the Order time, energy, thought, understanding and part of their world of experience in trying to do everything possible for the betterment of this wonderful institution, the principal charitable project of the Order. And as a last year of service on the Board draws to an end, Peace has been declared all over the world. Pray, keep on praying, that peace, harmony, happiness and quietude may be the atmosphere amid these beautiful walls, and may God in His infinite wisdom bless everyone.

"O, God of Love, O, King of Peace Make wars through all the world to cease. The wrath of sinful men restrain, Give Peace, O, God, give Peace again That evermore shall rise to Thee Glad hymns of praise from land and sea."

After many discussions with our Superintendent, and close observation of conditions at the Home, I am presenting to the Board of Trustees for their approval, a few changes to be made in Home Policy.

I am profoundly grateful for the many opportunities of fellowship with these beloved senior members, whose presence has made of the Home a haven of inspiration and uplift.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home. Greetings:

The question of the successful financing of the Eastern Star Home is one that has caused considerable debate each year at our annual sessions. At our last Grand Chapter session the delegates voted fifty cents per member to be paid yearly by each Chapter for every non-exempt member on the Chapters' membership roll. This was an increase of 15¢ over the assessment per member for the previous year. The amount collected for this per capita tax this year amounted to \$54,454,00. Additional revenue for the Home's Operation Fund amounted to \$4,151.63, being \$996.05 back Home assessments on reinstated members; \$3,-035.98 interest; \$40.90 donations and \$78.70 sundry revenue. The net operating expenses for the year amounted to \$48.640.73, which left an excess of revenue over expenses of \$9,964.90. Under our present working plan, \$8,569.45 must be set aside for depreciation, so that the net excess of revenue over all expenses is \$1,395.45—the first time in many years that we have not had a deficit.

Every precaution has been taken to live within our budget and yet maintain a high standard so that our members may be proud of the monument they are building for our Order.

In the early part of this year, upon recommendation of the State Welfare Chairman, a Mrs. Yerkes was employed as a Home analyst to make a complete survey of our Home, so that we may run the Home in the most economical and efficient manner. After a very careful survey, she found that we were understaffed and our salaries low. She advised we secure additional help and not depend on the residents who were willing to assist, but because of their years, were not so dependable.

I would like to bring to the attention of the membership the opportunity of contributing to the Endowment Fund, by bequeathing sums of money by will, or by making contributions to the fund in memory of a departed relative or friend instead of a floral tribute to the funeral services. Many of our present and past Grand Officers are making these memorial gifts. By building up the Endowment Fund, the earnings will eventually substantially aid in supporting the Home, obviating the necessity of taxing the subordinate Chapters annually for such support.

For a more detailed report of our financial standing, I refer you to the Auditor's report.

We have audited the accounts and records of the Eastern Star Homes of California for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1945 and submit the following statements:

COMMENTS

CASH:

All per capita dues, as shown by the 1945 returns from the various Chapters, were received and deposited in the banks. All interest due from the Homes investments and from the Endowment Fund was received. Disbursements were made by checks and supported by properly approved vouchers. All bank balances were verified by correspondence with the depositaries.

SECURITIES:

The securities were inspected by us at the Wells Fargo Bank & Union Trust Company where they are kept in a safe-deposit box.

The final liquidating dividend of \$557.55 was received from the Mutual Building and Loan Association of Long Beach. The remaining balance, \$1,394.98, was written off as a loss. Liquidating dividends amounting to \$3,511.17 were received from the Pacific States Savings and Loan Association.

OPERATING COSTS:

For the first time, the revenue of the Homes exceeds the expenses. The excess revenue over operating expenses before depreciation amounted to \$9,964.90; and after deducting the depreciation charge of \$8,569.45, there remains an excess revenue of \$1,395.45. The net operating cost for the year, excluding depreciation was \$48,640.73, as compared to \$46,368.66 for last year, an increase of \$2,272.07. Salaries increased \$2,696.67 over last year; extraordinary legal expenses incurred last year, in amount \$593.45, did not occur this year; the other costs remained about the same.

The cash balance as at August 31, 1945 was \$44,854.60. This balance together with the interest that will be received during the coming year, should provide ample funds to operate the Home during the year 1945-46.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

To the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star.

Greetings:

Because of my friendship and admiration for our beloved Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lillian Podesta, it is with combined pride and pleasure that I submit the following report: proud of the confidence bestowed on me and pleased to be of service during this past year. Am also grateful for having been privileged to work with the fine committee appointed to serve with me, our Associate Grand Conductress, Sister Thelma Bailey and Sister Electa Gay, both have cooperated and assisted in every way possible to complete our year's work.

Robert Morris, founder of our Order, once said, "If the Eastern Star satisfies the demands of the ages and is worthy of its existence, it will live". The fact that it is the largest fraternal organization for women and men in the world, with 12,226 Chapters and nearly two million members, proves that it has met the test.

During the past year most of the sessions and other Grand Chapters were dedicated to Patriotism, with Victory, Courage and Faith as their motto. These sessions vary in length from one day to five days. Many hold religious services previous to the sessions. Meeting places were Masonic temples, civic auditoriums, ballrooms of hotels, school or church auditoriums, or other fraternal halls, all beautifully decorated with pageants, drills, processions and music appropriate to each individual session. At all sessions the Flag of our Country is given a prominent place in the Grand East with inspiring tributes. Christian, State and O.E.S. Flags were given special honor and in all states bordering Canada, Old Glory and the Union Jack were jointly honored. All states have the Pledge of Allegiance.

Every Grand Chapter pauses with a deep spirit of reverance for an impressive memorial service for departed members. Many sessions were honored by the presence of our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mamie Lander, and our Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Harold T. Landeryou, and other General Grand Chapter Officers, who gave inspiring and beautiful messages.

A substantial increase of membership in most of the Grand Jurisdictions, the best record in many years, is an indication of the individual need of wholesome relaxation in an atmosphere of fraternalism and friendliness. A strong fraternal bond existing between the Masonic Order and the Order of the Eastern Star is evidenced by the many joint Masonic and Eastern Star Homes in various states. The Florence Nightingale Home for Children in Ontario, Canada, is the only Eastern Star Home out of the United States. It now admits refugee children.

The Grand Chapter of Louisiana was the first to promote the Educational Student and Loan Fund, now active in practically

all jurisdictions. This assists worthy young people to avail themselves of higher education. Many jurisdictions sponsor either the Order of Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, Beatitudes or Daughters of Eastern Star. These girls are encouraged to create higher ideals and interest in the better things of life which will lead them to the finest in the Order of the Eastern Star of tomorrow.

There is a growing tendency to perfect the ritualistic work. Schools of instruction are growing in number and these are held by the Worthy Grand Matron, her Deputies or Instructors or the Grand Lecturers. Proficiency certificates are given in some jurisdictions, and no one may hold office who has not first passed a proficiency test.

We found funds were secured for four major objectives, Relief of the Sick and Distressed; Education of our Youth; Maintenance of the International Temple, and Cooperation in the War Effort.

War work and Red Cross work is outstanding this year, a memorial to Clara Barton, founder and organizer of the American Red Cross, who was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, receiving the work from Robert Morris in 1860.

All jurisdictions have made splendid showings in every branch of war work. Many hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of bonds have been purchased, Red Cross work accomplished without thought of strength or time. Ambulances, station wagons, clubmobiles and a large amount of money has been contributed to Masonic Service Centers by subordinate Chapters and Grand Chapters. We feel that our members should be highly commended for their most creditable efforts during these past years of war. We have proved to the world that by our united efforts, we have accomplished much for suffering humanity. Limited space does not permit a review of each jurisdiction and as one of the main objectives for the year is Red Cross work, we have tried to give you an idea of the hours spent and contributions made to this project in the individual reports.

We wish to express appreciation to the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jurisdictions for the splendid reports of our proceedings, and we extend to each our Fraternal Greetings.

This report would not be complete without acknowledging our gratitude to our Grand Secretary, Sister Maud McWilliams Smith, for fine cooperation, and kindness, in forwarding the proceedings so very promptly to each member of this Committee.

We wish to thank our Worthy Grand Matron for this appointment, for the privilege that has been ours in serving on the Committee. It has been most pleasant and profitable to us and we hope that we have been able to pass on to you a bit of the inspiration and a portion of the information that we have gained and enjoyed reviewing the proceedings of other Grand Juris-

dictions and the opportunity that you have made possible for us to know our Order better.

The theme of the retirement of the 1945 Grand Officers was "Lanterns of Love"; the ceremony was arranged by, and under the direction of, Sister Rita May Cooper, Past Grand Matron.

The Deputy Grand Matrons retired as the lights were lowered, and re-entered carrying lighted lanterns. Separating into eight groups, they eircled the Grand Officers as Brother Jos. E. Joseph, Past Patron Roseland Chapter No. 465, sang solos dedicated to Sister Podesta. The Deputies then formed a double line from the East to the West, Sister Podesta and Brother Cotton were each presented with a large lighted lantern, and with the Grand Officers, were escorted from the Chapter room, followed by the Deputies.

Brother John L. McDonald, Past Grand Patron, acted as Grand Organist for the ceremony.

Installation of Officers:

The Installation ceremonies opened with the informal entrance of Installing Grand Marshal, Sister Corine Orban Melville, Past Grand Matron, Honorary Grand Marshal, Sister Grace Richardson Butterfield, Past Grand Matron, Grand Chaplain, Sister Maude Ethel Fluetsch, Past Grand Matron, Grand Organist, Brother John Lewis McDonald, Past Grand Patron. The Installing Marshals then escorted the installing Officers to the East, Sisters Lillian W. Podesta, Worthy Grand Matron, Willa Jane Hellwig, Past Grand Matron, Brothers Logan R. Cotton, Worthy Grand Patron, and Lloyd Ellis Griffin, Past Grand Patron.

Sixty of the 1946 Deputy Grand Matrons, gowned in white, entered in a double line and were seated on the side lines.

The following Officers-elect were escorted to the Grand Chapter room and seated in a semi-circle in the West:

The theme for the Installation was Peace. A pageant, The Garden of Peace, was a prelude to the installation of the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Isabella Harrison Hildich. Lights were lowered in the auditorium and Brother Howard Hawley, Past Patron of Rose Croix Chapter No. 317, gave the following dramatic reading:

"The lights grew dim in doubt and fear, Unrest was felt both far and near; The World in suspense, the future unknown Hatred and greed, were triumphantly shown. Blackness descended, whole cities were dark, The FLAME OF HOPE lost even its spark. There were wars, and rumors of wars The MARCHING OF MEN throughout the world! Signs of disaster, a feeling of doom, The whole world plunged into untold gloom. Men were transported they knew not where, DEATH AND DESTRUCTION reigned from the air. Ships of iron and men of steel Both were seen to buckle and reel. Tank battalions by the score Air Armada five thousand, and more. FLAMES OF FIRE, devouring the earth, Men regretted the day of their birth. The ATOMIC BOMB, its untold disaster to cause, On the brink of destruction the world seemed to pause. The DREAM OF WORLD CONQUEST, by men filled with greed Foretold their undoing, let others take heed! GOOD MEN fought for RIGHT, for the freedom of all, Ideals of enslavement remain certain to fall. Men displayed greatness as never before, They'll FIGHT for their freedom, forever, and more. A convention for PEACE, all nations attending, To bring to world conflict a definite ending. LIFE and LIBERTY, the pursuit of HAPPINESS, FREEDOM from FEAR and FREEDOM of the PRESS, FREEDOM to WORSHIP, man's highest ideal, For THIS have men died to make it quite real! 'DO UNTO OTHERS AS YOU'D HAVE THEM DO' Down through the ages, remains TRIED and TRUE. Throughout those dread days, OUR FLAG waved free, Our EMBLEM of HOPE and SECURITY. Symbol of Mercy and JUSTICE for ALL, God in His WISDOM let it not fall! Prayers for PEACE, were wrung from each soul, God, in His MERCY granted this goal. The DAWN OF A NEW DAY came over the earth! May we NEVER FORGET the cost, it was worth. A GARDEN OF PEACE, our thanks steady arose, As pure and as true as the heart of a rose. AS PURE, AND AS TRUE as the HEART OF A ROSE."

In the darkness the Associate Matrons formed a large V in the Grand Chapter room, and as the lighting increased, it shone on the silver brims of their blue hats. The curtains on the stage parted and revealed a "Garden of Peace", with white doves over

the garden gate, and a huge red rose in the center of the garden. As the reading came to a close the rose opened and Sister Isabella Harrison Hilditch, Worthy Grand Matron-elect, stepped down to be escorted to the Altar for induction into office. The Associate Matrons held their V formation until after the Worthy Grand Matron was escorted to the East, when they took their seats on the north and south sides of the room.

Brother Lloyd Ellis Griffin, Past Grand Patron, installed the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Willa Jane Hellwig, Past Grand Matron, installed the Worthy Grand Patron and Sister Lillian W. Podesta, Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Logan R. Cotton, Worthy Grand Patron, installed the other Officers.

Address-Isabella Harrison Hilditch, Worthy Grand Matron:

"Worthy Grand Patron, Junior Past Grand Matron, Junior Past Grand Patron, Sister Anna Smalley, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Present and Past Grand Officers, Sisters, Brothers and Guests:

There are occasions in the life of every person that are imprinted indelibly in the memory. Tonight will be one of those occasions in my life. By a strange coincidence, the soloist of the evening chose for his first number a song which recalled to my memory another important occasion—that of a high school graduation night in a small New England town when the graduating class of which I was a member sang, 'The Lost Chord'!

To those who planned and carried out the details of this beautiful installation, I am grateful. My thanks to: Past Grand Matron Corine Orban Melville who acted as General Chairman; to her assistants, Anie Sivel of San Diego and Jane Perry Foster of Long Beach; to the Southern California and San Diego Associations who under Gladys Hawley, Chairman and Ruby Robertson, Co-Chairman worked together to make this evening a success; to Fred Hancock, Chairman of Grand Chapter Week Activities for his untiring and wholehearted cooperation; to Blanche Hunter who acted as Publicity Chairman, and to my Associate Matrons who came from all parts of the State to be with me tonight. I shall remember the beautiful 'V' for Victory which you formed for me, using our colors and flower.

Sister Lillian Podesta, Junior Past Grand Matron, I thank you for the privilege of choosing the installing officers. Each was chosen for a special reason.

Past Grand Patron Lloyd Ellis Griffin, thank you for installing me. Not only does Brother Lloyd come from my home distriet but he was a Worthy Patron in 1930 when I served as Worthy Matron and was Worthy Grand Patron in 1933 when I served as Deputy Grand Matron.

Sister Corine Orban Melville, Grand Marshal of the evening was our lady of the understanding heart in 1942 when I served as Grand Marshal. Sister Grace Richardson Butterfield, Honorary Marshal tonight, was Worthy Grand Matron in 1933. From her I received my first appointment in Grand Chapter, that of Deputy Grand Matron. Sister Maude Ethel Fluetsch, Installing Grand Chaplain was Worthy Grand Matron in 1939 when I served as Grand Chaplain. I thank each of you.

To you, Brother John Lewis McDonald, I want to give a special thank you for the effort which you made to be here tonight. You and I belong to the same profession, one of the greatest. Your music is always inspiring and has brought enjoyment to all of us tonight.

Will the members of South West Chapter please rise. Thank you for coming to share this evening with me. I am proud of my membership in our very fine Chapter. It was twenty-five years ago that mother and I joined South West Chapter so this is the silver anniversary of my membership! Will the members of the other San Diego County Chapters please rise. I am happy that you are here and trust that you will be as proud of me a year from tonight as you are now.

I would like to introduce the members of my family: my brother Eldon who is my official trailer, his wife May, their daughter Arleen and her husband, Harold Stowell, who has just returned from three and a half years' service in the Navy, their daughters-in-law Donna Jean Hilditch and Gladys Hilditch, whose husband is in the South Pacific.

When I was elected Associate Grand Conductress, I chose as my motto, 'Service Not Self'. In Matthew Chapter 20 and verse 27 we read these words: 'Whosoever will be chief among you let him be they servant'. Tonight Brother Harry and I, together with our corps of officers have become your servants. We will try to serve you well. I realize that this first year of Peace will bring many difficulties but with our Worthy Grand Patron's help and your cooperation we shall be able to meet whatever problems must be met. I have never known you, members of our Order, to fail to meet whatever challenge was presented you. It will be necessary for us in our Chapters to continue to help the American Red Cross, to carry on as long as it is needed the U.S.O., and above all we must not fail those boys in our hospitals and convalescent homes who will need our help. For them the fight is not over. Sister Lillian, your little sisters from all parts of the State, are vitally interested in your project of this year, Arts and Skills and Recreation-a project which has helped and will continue to help these boys win their way back to a normal life. On behalf of myself and the Associate Matrons of 1945, please accept this check,

Harry C. Sproule, Worthy Grand Patron:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Junior Past Grand Matron, Junior Past Grand Patron, our distinguished and honored East, Sisters, Brothers, and Friends:

Allow me to thank you for this grand honor you have bestowed on me this evening. This past year has been one of pleasure and surprises and tonight is no exception. To have Past Grand Matron Willa Jane Hellwig install me, Past Grand Matrons Corine Orbin Melville, Grace Richardson Butterfield, Maude Ethel Fluetsch, and Past Grand Patron John McDonald assisting and my own Associate Patrons forming the square and compasses adds to another evening of happy memories for the years ahead.

I anticipate a year of pleasure in being the escort of such a grand and efficient lady as our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Isabella Harrison Hilditch.

Twenty-seven years ago I was initiated in Silver Star Chapter No. 3 in the City of Vallejo. I have the pleasure this evening of introducing some of the members of my Chapter. Will the members of Silver Star Chapter please rise? I, also, have the pleasure of introducing my lovely wife, Sister Charlotte and our darling daughter, Nancy.

Grand Matron Sister Isabella, allow me to present to you a gavel, the emblem of your authority. It may interest the sisters and brothers to know that the gavel and base were made from the plastic tube used in the radar on the U.S.S. Hazelwood that fought and was severely damaged by a Jap suicide plane during the battle on Okinawa."

Response-Isabella Harrison Hilditch, Worthy Grand Matron:

"Brother Harry, I thank you for this gavel. Its historical background gives it a special significance. It is not merely the emblem of my office but a symbol of the sacrifice and heroism which has brought an end to the war in which we have been engaged for the past four years. Sister Lillian: Having followed your years of achievement to their crowning climax tonight, brings to mind a story:

Our scene takes place in the front yard of a wise old neighbor of yours. The usual green lawn was carpeted and paved with gold—the gold of fallen leaves. A beautiful and thought-provoking scene—but rather untidy at best, thought our wise old neighbor. He wished that the leaves were raked into a neat pile. With this wish in mind, he went to his tool shed for a rake. A few minutes later, Johnny, the paper boy came along on his 'bike'. Seeing the old neighbor, he slammed on the brakes and stopped for a visit. 'My, what a lot of leaves! Dont'cha wish

they were all raked?' The old man respondend, 'Yes, I wish they were', and went quietly on raking the leaves.
