

On Sunday morning delegates and their friends were guests at the eleven o'clock service at Grace Cathedral.

At each corner of the central floor Star was a white picket fence with a conch shell filled with pink carnations.

Promptly at 7:30 P.M. the Honorary Grand Marshals, Past Grand Matrons Sisters Mary Balden and Ellen Walters, escorted to the Grand East the General Chairman of the Week, Brother Edwin Bode, and his wife, Sister Ethel Bode.

Then, with two rings of the bell, the car is off, up Powell Street, then climbs the hill to California Street, the top of Nob Hill, with the Top of the Mark and the famous Fairmont Hotel.

The cable car runs through our famous Chinatown. It then turns around near Fisherman's Wharf. The sights and sounds here are another of the many worlds of San Francisco. The fishing fleet, the great seafood restaurants, the Wax Museum, Ripley's Believe It Or Not, and excursions on the San Francisco Bay on the Red and White Fleet which originate here.

There is an old sailing clipper and piers where ships load and unload for the Seven Seas.

Visit the old Cannery on Ghirardelli Square. On your return trip it takes you over the steepest grade and through some quaint and beautiful areas of Russian Hill. Look back, see the Golden Gate Bridge, the fog, Alcatraz Island, the fishing boats, steamers, and Coit Tower on Telegraph Hill.

You want a ride—yes—what a view and only for 15 cents. Horsecars and trolleys and street cars and buses and rapid transit subways may come and go, but it is safe to bet in a betting city that the cable cars will be here for your grandchildren and their grandchildren, too. San Francisco loves you and we're happy to have you here. Have fun and enpoy your Grand Chapter Session.







Prior to the appointment of Deputy Grand Matrons, the entire state was studied with the result that some changes in districts were made. A few of these were the result of requests from members of the particular districts involved. The majority of changes were made in the metropolitan area of Los Angeles. 

School of Instruction:

To all Chapters of California, Order of the Eastern Star Dear Sisters and Brothers:

There are several things I would like to call to the attention of our membership, and a general letter seemed the best way of accomplishing this.

First, it has come to my attention that in many Chapters wording has been copied from the Ritual, and is being used as a "crutch", shall we say, by some of the officers. I wish to call to your attention that this is a direct violation of the Ritual, which is issued to us by General Grand Chapter. There is to be only one Ritual open during a Chapter meeting, as well, and this is to be in the hands of a member appointed as Prompter.

I am charging the Worthy Matron of each Chapter with the responsibility to see that none of the officers use anything that has been copied from the Ritual, including any outlines or books which may be passed along in the Chapter to the presiding officer. The Deputy Grand Matrons will be happy to assist the Worthy

Patrons in seeing that the officers are proficient in their ritualistic work, but all of our ceremonial work, as outlined in the Ritual, is to be given from memory.

Next, I would like to call to your attention that at our last session of Grand Chapter there was a motion adopted that the report of the committee on Appeals and Grievance, be read in each Chapter after receipt of the Grand Chapter proceedings. If this report has not already been read, please see that it is read at your next meeting. The report of the committee begins on Page 166.

In this same connection, reports have reached me that we continue to have what I choose to call "spite" balloting. This is the rejection of a petitioner not for any moral cause concerning the petitioner. but, rather, for some other reason entirely. I would like to quote a portion of an article that appeared in the California Freemason some time ago, entitled The Black Ball. Quote: The "black ball" is not a dagger for a coward's use with which to even up an old score, It is not a brush with which to be mirch the character of one who may hold different views from you. A black ball is a fraternity shield to protect not individuals but the fraternity from those who would injure it. It should never be cast with a prejudiced mind or a selfish thought. Remember, it is a serious thing to constitute one's self as jury and executioner in one single act. . . . Unquote. Look well to your ballots, my sisters and brothers, for the continuance of such "spite" balloting and threats of blackballing could lead to the discontinuance of your Chapter.

I realize this is happening in a small percentage of our Chapters; however, we hear of more Chapters each year experiencing this problem. We cannot build our Order when a few members insist on ignoring their obligation and tearing down that for which we stand. I repeat, look well to your ballots.

To Secretary: This letter is NOT to be read in Chapter, but given to the Worthy Matron at your earliest opportunity.

Dear Worthy Matron:

There have been innumerable questions directed to me concerning elections which will be held in your Chapter next month. In view of this, I felt it best to send some instructions to each Worthy Matron concerning this procedure.

First, prior to the meeting, please study Pages 80, 81 and 82 in your Instruction Book, and the references thereon to sections in the Constitution.

The elective offices are filled in the following manner: Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Secretary, Treasurer, Conductress and Associate Conductress. Before starting the election, which would be the first order under "New Business", it is well to ask if all nominations have been placed on the pedestal. If there is no nomination slip for a particular office, you will declare that office vacant and proceed to the next one in order. It is the responsibility of the Worthy Matron to see that all nominations are properly presented, as described in the Instruction Book.

After appointing the tellers, the Worthy Matron states: "I find on the pedestal the name of for the office of Worthy

In the absence of either of the above motions, the members would proceed to vote by secret ballot. The tellers would count the ballots as they are deposited, and the Instruction Book makes this procedure quite clear. This being an order of business of the Chapter, it is permissible for the members to cross between the Altar and the East from South to North, as indicated.

I hope this information will assist you in conducting your Chapter elections in an efficient manner.





I am eagerly looking forward to our 1968 "Bridge to Happiness" session of Grand Chapter to be held in San Francisco next month, and hope to see many of you there to enjoy it also.

There were many times the desire to reply to little notes received from our members was stimulated, but the time to do so was not found. Such thoughtful messages will remain as part of my treasures of this year, and the memory of the abundance of good wishes that came my way at the time of illness could never be forgotten.

Eastern Star Home:

We have a group of devoted members who serve this Grand Chapter as Trustees of our Eastern Star Home. Their interest is in doing the best possible job in representing each of you, and seeing that our Home is administered in a manner that provides a home-like atmosphere for our residents. It was my desire to plan my itinerary in such a manner that I would not miss any meetings of the Board of Trustees. This was not only because of my profound interest in our Home, but because of being a member of that Board by virtue of the office held this year. It was not completely possible to do this, but I was in attendance as much as possible throughout the year.

It was my pleasure to visit our Eastern Star Home unofficially several times throughout the year. At the holiday time it was

especially pleasing to attend the "tree trimming party" which had been planned for the enjoyment of the residents. Also in attendance that evening was our Sister Thelma Bailey, and all Southern members of the Board of Trustees. A few days later, the Worthy Matrons of Southern California had their annual party at the Home and it was again my privilege to attend and greet our residents.

Having been so closely associated with our Home for a number of years as a member of the Board of Trustees, it was with much anticipation I made my Official Visit there. Prior to the afternoon visit held in the Garden Court room, the Grand Officers, Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, and members of the Board of Trustees enjoyed a delicious luncheon which was served by the Worthy Matrons of Southern California. They had also provided the decorations and pin-ons for the event, and the pin-ons for the residents contained a small monetary gift. Following the remarks of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, a group of the residents put on a skit to entertain us. Dressed in the manner of "flower children" these dear ladies sang and danced to the modernistic recording of "I Love You". Sister Addie Attebury, 87 years young, also participated in the program by giving a recitation and playing the harmonica. It was a delightful afternoon with these wonderful members of our Order.

August Festival

This year the annual fund-raising event at the Eastern Star Home was held the first weekend in August, with a circus theme. It was a veritable three-ring circus as activity was being carried out in all possible locations on the grounds. Through the efforts of the Grand Officers, statewide participation was secured either through the donation of articles for the various booths, or monetary contributions. Many dedicated members spent much time and effort to assure a successful event. Success is sometimes achieved in ways other than financial, and each year many of our members come to the home at this particular time who have never seen the facility previously. In my opinion, this is one of the best public relations events we could have, and our members can give testimony to the fact that we are able in this manner to "aid, comfort and protect each other in our journey through the labyrinth of human life."

The gross amount received was just over \$9,000.00, from which it was necessary to pay breakfast, dinner and miscellaneous expenses. Additional contributions are still being sent to the Finance Chairman for the Festival. From the net amount, \$1,305.36 was sent to the Grand Chapter office to reimburse the Home Funds for office furniture purchased the early part of the year. Two hundred new folding chairs and twenty folding banquet tables have been ordered for the downstairs recreation room. The chairs (100 in number) placed in the Garden Court as part of the 1952 project are being

reupholstered, as time and usage has had its effect upon the original covering. A portable, public address system for use in the dining room and Garden Court room has been ordered. These improvements will cost approximately \$5,263.00, and it is hoped some other needed and useful items can be obtained with the balance. Appreciation is expressed to all who helped in any way to make this possible by your support of the August Festival.

Masonic Home:

A visitation to the Masonic Home at Union City was planned to coincide with the annual "Jam and Jelly" day, sponsored by the Past Matrons Association of the East Bay. Illness prevented my attending this event, but I have been informed that the chapters of the East Bay responded in their usual generous manner in providing jams, jellies, canned goods and monetary contributions.

Youth Organizations and Fraternal Visitations:

The Grand Guardian Council of California, Order of Job's Daughters, held its annual session in Sacramento during the time of our General Grand Chapter Session. As our Associate Grand Patron, Brother Richard Brassell, expected to be in attendance, I asked that he represent me on this occasion and extend best wishes and the offer of cooperation from our Order.

The latter part of November, Brother Milton and I spent an enjoyable evening in attendance at the Installation Banquet of the Northern California Council, International Order of DeMolay for Boys, held in Santa Rosa. There we could view a much different picture of our leaders of tomorrow than our television and newspaper coverage gives us.

Further inspiration was received on the distaff side by attending the Grand Assembly of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls in Long Beach. It was truly a joy to see their Grand Worthy Advisor, Kendra Kassel, preside in her very gracious and poised manner.

This same inspiration was experienced when Kallie Stratos, Grand Bethel Honored Queen welcomed your Worthy Grand Matron to the Grand Bethel Session, International Order of Job's Daughters, held in Oakland last June. To see our many members in attendance at these functions makes one realize that our interest in our youth today, and working with them in these organizations, can mean much to all of us tomorrow, not only in our Order, but in our communities.

It was a privilege and pleasure to accept the invitation of Allan S. Mason, Rt. Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of California, to attend a dinner during their annual sessions held in Annaheim. His wife, Celia, is serving as Worthy Matron of Raisina Chapter in Fresno this year, and it

was an added joy to greet other Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons and members of our Order in attendance.

Institution:

Less than two weeks ago, your Worthy Grand Matron, and the Grand Officers were privileged to participate in the Institution of Sierra Vista Chapter, U.D., located at Oakhurst. We appreciate the invitation extended by the Worthy Grand Patron to have a part in this event, and shall not soon forget the warmth of friendship and good will exhibited by our members who filled the Masonic Temple to overflowing as they came to extend fraternal friendship and encouragement to our newest Chapter. The Worthy Grand Matron was very pleased with the manner in which our Grand Officers performed their duties. We again extend our good wishes to Sierra Vista Chapter and the hope that the enthusiasm you know now will not diminish, but contribute to successful years ahead for your membership.

Visits to Other Jurisdictions:

As our itinerary carried us up the coast of California, many of the Grand Officers were enticed to enjoy the scenic beauty of Oregon and to travel to Portland to attend a portion of their Grand Chapter Session. The Worthy Grand Patron and I were proud to have accompanying us our Grand Treasurer, Grand Conductress, Grand Marshal, our five Grand Star Points and the Grand Sentinel. Sisters Alice Lutz, Wanda Morley and Brothers Jack Blum and Earl Robinson also attended as did a large number of Grand Representatives from our state. We were pleased to also find in attendance our Right Worthy Grand Trustee, Thelma Bailey, her husband, George, and our General Grand Chapter Committee Member, Lois Tamba. It was a distinct honor and pleasure to respond to the Welcome to Distinguished Guests and extend greetings from our jurisdiction.

Another visit outside our Jurisdiction was especially interesting — that to Areme Chapter in Tijuana, Baja California. The members had planned well for our coming and received us with much cordiality and friendship. Almost all of our Grand Officers were present, as well as many of the members from San Diego and other parts of our state. It was a day not soon to be forgotten by any of us.

While the Nevada Grand Chapter Session had been included in the itinerary, it was with regret that I concluded it would be unwise, following my illness, to make the long trip to Winnemucea, the site for their session.

Consolidations:

Through the efforts of the three members of this Committee, three consolidations were effected during the year. Nonparell No. 496 consolidated with Harmony No. 124; Buena Vista No. 364

consolidated with Tatt No. 337; and Yerba Buena No. 228 with California No. 183.

The members of the committee have been very diligent in attempting to visit any chapter who has requested information concerning consolidation. This Worthy Grand Matron urges those chapters who are fighting for existence to consider asking the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to request a member of this committee to come to their chapter and give them correct information concerning the consolidation of chapters. One proposed consolidation in a metropolitan area of our state recently failed, and it is felt this was largely due to the amount of misinformation which had been given members, prior to a committee member attending a meeting to answer their questions and give them facts.

We cannot properly conduct our ritualistic work when a Chapter does not have a full corp of officers. Nor does the absence of members on the sidelines provide any incentive for officers to put forth their best efforts. This situation exists in many of our chapters, yet the members seem reluctant to consider consolidation. This action must come from the chapter itself, and is not something Grand Chapter steps in and urges or forces you to do. Therefore I urge that the delegates to this Grand Chapter who are facing such circumstances in their respective chapters take the initiative and resolve to at least try to do something about it. Consolidation does not represent the end of your chapter, but could mean the beginning of increased interest, participation and enthusiasm for your members.

Receptions:

Three events were planned by the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons which were very special, and for many years has been the tradition of these several areas. On April 21, the San Francisco Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons honored the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and all Grand Officers at a tea, held in the Fern Mart Court. The Worthy Matrons, gowned in attractive pink formals, served as Hostesses, and the Worthy Patrons as Hosts, greeting the many members of the area and from distant points. The room had been beautifully decorated in an Oriental motif, and as the guests circled the room they had the opportunity to visit with all of the Grand Officers who were at individual tables throughout the room. Delicious refreshments were served from buffet tables, and everyone attending seemed to enjoy a beautiful afternoon. Much praise is due the General Chairman for the event, Sister Gladvs DeKay of California Chapter, and to the many committees from the two associations headed by Sisters Earla Knight, Richmond Chapter, and Brother Al Gray, George Washington Chapter.

May 18 was another "never-to-be-forgotten" day, for it was on this date the Chapters of Southern California united to present their "Treasures of Love" reception in the Santa Monica Auditorium. The change of location this year from that used for so long in the past, required several changes in format. These were all skillfully executed by those responsible for the planning. As the narration began, the stage curtain revealed the decoration in the East, with a small island having been created in front of the podium - sand, waves, driftwood and palm trees, as well as two treasure chests which held the gifts presented to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron later in the evening. The next parting of the curtains revealed the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons-25 in all—who had honored us with their presence. The final curtain parted revealing the Grand Officers and Deputy Grand Matrons of 1968. It was thrilling and breathtaking to see them all seated together in this manner. The Worthy Matrons had selected blue brocade gowns for this occasion and truly were a "sea of blue" as they filled the front sections of the auditorium, together with their Worthy Patrons. Those Worthy Matrons participating as Marshals, the Marching Jewels and Singing Jewels of 1968 were formal length white gloves and rhinestone tiaras, as did the presidents of the seven Southern California associations, adding a touch of elegance to the evening. Despite the lack of adequate floor space, the Marching Jewels formed several designs on the stage—a heart, an anchor, and a cross—as the Singing Jewels presented selections appropriate to each one. This was indeed a beautiful evening from the time our boat, the Lura Bos brought us into the auditorium, until it was again time to board for our departure. Sister Doris Tracy, Palisades Chapter, served as General Chairman for the reception, and Presidents Maxine Vernol, Van Nuys, and Garrold Hall, Glendale, deserve much credit, as do all the presidents of the Southern California Associations, their members and the trailers who all worked together to make this such an outstanding evening.

The East Bay Reception is traditionally held in August, and this year the date selected was August 24. Their theme, "Stars of the Summer Night." Here again, circumstances seemed to indicate a change from the Oakland Civic Auditorium might be desirable from several standpoints, and these Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of the East Bay had the courage to make that change, even though it meant a complete change of format for the reception from that of past years. They selected the Scottish Rite Temple. The gowns chosen by these Worthy Matrons were white and silver lace over blue taffeta and, having seen many of them together since that date, know it must have been an impressive sight the night of the reception. Doctors' orders prevented my attendance at this very special evening which honored the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and all Grand Officers. Milton left that morning to fly to Oakland to represent us and in his pocket was a taped message to all present. What we did not realize was that through the foresight and consideration of these fine leaders of the East Bay, it would be possible for me to attend the East Bay reception. This I did the following evening, as Milton returned with a complete set of tapes of the entire evening. To Juanita Jerome, Elmhurst Chapter, General Chairman; Paul Hile, Lake Merritt Chapter, Co-Chairman, and the two very fine leaders of the East Bay Associations, Mae Snow, Caliz de Oro Chapter; and Lowell Abbott, Hayward Chapter, and to all of your committees go our heartfelt thanks for your planning to present another fine East Bay reception for all to enjoy.

Other receptions throughout the year were held for the Grand Officers, and it was a joy to be present on most of these occasions. It was, of course, a bitter disappointment to have four of these receptions take place during the two weeks I was hospitalized. However, Milton did represent us at each of these events, and I know from his and other reports that they matched the other receptions in every way.

Much preparation and planning went into these receptions, and I know it was with love in their hearts that the members of these various chapters worked on these receptions for their honored member.

In attending the reception for the Presidents of the Northern Grand Officers and Southern Grand Officers, it was my hope that each of our Deputy Grand Matrons would consider that in so doing, I was honoring each of them as well.

Irregularities:

It was brought to my attention very early in the year that a Worthy Patron had a paper with the Secret Work entirely written out. I wrote the Worthy Patron asking that if this was true he send me the copy that I might personally know it had been destroyed. The Worthy Patron was most cooperative, which I appreciated. However, the information he sent me had been passed along to him, and, from the worn creases in the paper, could have easily been passed along in that Chapter for several years. It contained not only the Secret Work, but the entire Worthy Patron's part for Initiation. What concerned me further was that this was not just a type copy, but a mimeographed one, and I am still wondering how many more copies are in the possession of other Worthy Patrons or Past Patrons of that area.

I urge our Brothers that if something of this kind comes into your possession that you personally see that it is destroyed. Our future Deputy Grand Matrons should be alert to this situation, as well.

It was most distressing this year to receive reports from the Deputy Grand Matrons to the effect that many of our Worthy Patrons and Associate Patrons could not give their initiatory work, and that on these evenings, their stations would be filled by a Past Patron. Contributing to this condition are some of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons of our Chapters who urge someone to accept the office telling them they do not have to learn the work.

We are told during our initiation ceremony that with privileges come responsibilities. In my opinion, it is a privilege to be elected to serve our Chapters and each person who accepts this privilege, and the honor that accompanies it, should be willing to accept the responsibility of the office. My personal opinion is that no Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron should accept the privileges and title of Past Matron or Past Patron if they have not fulfilled the duties of the position.

It is most difficult to encourage other officers of the Chapter to learn their work and be able to give it in a creditable manner when the Worthy Patron—the person responsible for seeing that the officers are proficient in their work—cannot perform his duties. Some of the Associate Patrons who are refusing to learn their initiatory lecture are going to be our Worthy Patrons next year and, for the betterment of our Order, I sincerely hope those who have been reported to me have a change of attitude. Let us each take pride in our work and encourage others to do so.

Another violation commonly occurring is the copying of the printed work in our Ritual. Reports were such the early part of the year concerning this that a letter was written to all chapters, and the Worthy Matrons charged with the responsibility of seeing that this did not happen in their chapters. I would refer you to Page 165 of our Ritual for the seriousness of this offense.

Reports have come in that some of our Brothers are being accepted into Chapter, and even holding office, who have not received their proficiency from their respective Lodges. I would urge all of our Brothers who serve on investigating committees to ascertain if the proficiency has been received before the petition is brought to ballot. If this situation is known to exist in your chapter, may I suggest that some of the Brothers assist the member in securing his proficiency, in order to meet this requirement.

Indications are that some chapters have adopted a 7:00 o'clock or a 7:30 o'clock starting time on the basis they can start anytime after that, but not before, thus clearing the way for ante-room meetings prior to Installation, etc., to begin at the time specified in the By-Laws, Meetings are supposed to be held at the time specified in the By-Laws, and if it has become the custom of the chapter to begin at 8:00 p.m., the By-Laws should be changed to conform to this precedent. A provision can be included that an ante-room meeting prior to the annual installation of officers may begin at 7:30 p.m.

Legislation:

As the west coast convention facilities become more and more attractive to large conventions, it becomes apparent that if we are going to be able to secure the accommodations we desire, we must have some flexibility in our meeting time. For this reason, your Worthy Grand Matron and Associate Grand Matron have sub-

mitted the amendment to Sec. 36. After further study and consideration, it would be my recommendation that we consider amending this to include the last week of September, as well as the provision that we not hold our session at a time which will conflict with the assembly of the General Grand Chapter.

It is my earnest feeling that our Deputy Grand Matrons are entitled to mileage when requested by the Worthy Grand Matron to attend a brush-up school of instruction, and our Associate Grand Matron has joined with me in signing this proposed amendment to Sec. 166.

Good of the Order:

The majority of our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons have really worked toward giving their chapters and members a fine year. Many have planned very special evenings in an effort to attract members to their sidelines and, I might add, away from their television screens.

Some of the reasons our members are staying away from chapters may not be known, but some of my mail this year would indicate that internal problems in the chapter do not provide an inducive atmosphere for members to come and enjoy our fraternalism. We hear and read much today, as well as in recent years, regarding the infiltration that is taking place in our country. I cannot help but wonder if this infiltration has penetrated our Order of the Eastern Star, and if this could account for the problems that are occurring:

Problems caused by personality clashes, jealousies, and minor hurts that should be forgotten and are compounded by telephone discussions and the buildup of resentment.

Problems caused by the rejection of petitions for membership; these rejections against our Master Masons, and many times against our Job's Daughters and Rainbow girls. This is difficult to understand, for certainly few of our chapters have enough men, and all chapters need younger members in order to perpetuate themselves. It is almost unbelievable that our members who have served as Guardians or Mother Advisors will blackball and threaten to blackball these younger members because of some minor disagreement in the youth organization. My sisters and brothers, we must be bigger than that. We cannot hurt an innocent person because of our petty grievance toward the person who signed their petition, or some other person in the chapter. How often I have heard the statement this year that members hesitate to bring in petitions because they are afraid of the results.

Problems caused by the lack of line officers within our chapters. Many chapters still insist that the ways and means of the chapter be chairmanned by one of the first two line officers. With so many women working today, it is not always possible to take on this much responsibility, and therefore, those who might have good

ability to serve our chapters, refrain from going into the line. How much more important it would be to have good officers in line, and have committees assume the responsibility for the budget. Let us all work together for the good of our chapters and for our Order.

These problems are relatively few, in comparison to our large number of Chapters throughout the state, but only by bringing some of them out into the open, rather than trying to whitewash them, can we hope o eliminate such practices.

It is my feeling that those things which have brought us together, the high principles and ideals of our Order, are much more important than the things which divide us. Let us then dwell on the important things and all work toward making our Chapters, which are our fraternal homes, a place where we all enjoy going, and take pride in inviting those eligible for membership to join with us in our endeavors.

Recommendations:

It is my recommendation that each year, the signature of the Worthy Grand Matron be authorized on the checking accounts of this Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Home, in addition to that of the Grand Secretary, so there will be no delays in the payment of necessary bills in the event of an illness or emergency.

It is recommended that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron carefully investigate several chapters whose problems were brought to my attention a little too late to accomplish the action which seemed warranted. To have suspended the Charters of these chapters so close to Grand Chapter time would give them little time to prepare the necessary arguments to present to this Grand Chapter, and perhaps unfair. A list of these chapters will be available to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for her consideration.

It is recommended that a committee be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to determine if our present Instruction Book should be enlarged and printed in a different manner, such as loose leaf or spiral binding. Each year, the Associate Grand Matron spends considerable time, effort and money to produce a book of special instructions, which supplement our Instruction Book, for use by her Deputy Grand Matrons and the Worthy Matrons of her year. If our Instruction Book were printed in more detail and in a manner where just a few pages could be replaced, if necessary, it would seem that a savings could be effected for our Grand Chapter, over a period of time. This would also be a considerable saving for our Grand Officers during a year which is an especially busy one.

It is recommended that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron be authorized to appoint a special committee to be known as the Convention Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee to investigate sites for our forthcoming sessions to determine that the facilities, including meeting places, housing, banquet facilities and all other needs of our group can be met, and to secure in writing the guarantees made by said cities or convention bureaus. The makeup of said committee should be such that there would be at least one member continuing each year.

This committee would work initially with the General Chairman appointed for the particular year to see that all details previously agreed to are adhered to.

Appreciation:

No words of appreciation could begin without first expressing to my own Seaside Chapter my gratitude for their loyal support through these four years. They have been interested in my travels, plans, and ever ready to assist in any way possible. Many of these dear members have been good friends of mine ever since we became members of this chapter. I say "we", for at one time both my parents, an older sister and myself were all attending chapter together. Milton joined soon after we were married, and together we have enjoyed our chapter activities. The beautiful receptions given in my honor were greatly appreciated, and will remain as outstanding events in my memory. To have my sister, Carol Ellis, serve as Worthy Matron of our chapter this year has had very special meaning for both of us.

In selecting a gentleman to serve this Grand Chapter as the Associate Grand Patron, and subsequently the Worthy Grand Patron, one always hopes they have made the right choice. Brother Robert M. Lutz has been so very well accepted by the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of our state, and his friendly manner has added much to our meetings. Though a busy person, he has travelled extensively this year to attend as many Official Visits as possible—about 75% of them, in fact—all 75th Anniversaries and receptions, as well as the three youth organizations. My sincere hope is that this year has given to you and your Alice some pleasure and happiness that might not otherwise have been possible, and that many new friendships have been added which will have lasting value.

Our Sister Thelma Bailey has been present at so very many of the Official Visits this year. I have truly appreciated her support in this manner, and her willingness to give me her advice and counsel when it was sought. I wish for you much happiness in the years ahead as you continue serving our Order in the General Grand Chapter.

It has been a pleasure to have Sisters Lois Tamba and Grace Hoffman serving as Committee members of General Grand Chapter this year, and a pleasure to join in urging support for the projects they are working toward. May you each make great strides in your respective committee assignments, and meet with much cooperation from our members.

Just a few days ago, our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Sayda Pettersen, wrote me a letter again regretting her inability to attend our "Bridge to Happiness" Session. It was a pleasure to have some time with our Most Worthy Grand Matron and her husband, Leon, on August 5th, as they spent a few days in Los Angeles following the completion of her Official Visits to the chapters in Hawaii.

Our Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons are a very loyal group, and the support they have exhibited in attending so many of my Official Visits is indeed appreciated. Also, for the service many of them have rendered our Grand Chapter in serving on our important committees, I express my gratitude.

To our Associate Grand Matron and Associate Grand Patron, Sister Florence Dunn and Brother Richard Brassell, just a few days remain until you will be the leaders of this Grand Chapter, and the responsibilities of the office will be yours. Sister Florence, I will always be grateful to you for the gracious and sincere mauner in which you accepted the responsibility of making six of the scheduled Official Visits, and representing me and delivering my remarks at four of the Grand Officers' receptions at the time of my illness. This came at a time when you, too, were very busy with preparations for your own year, and I know it meant laying aside some of the things you had planned for those evenings. Thank you sincerely.

To our Sister Maud McWilliams Smith, Grand Secretary, the Ritual states that yours is an onerous and very responsible charge, and that few are competent to perform it in the thorough manner it demands. To all of this, I would agree, and would go further to say how many would continue to perform those duties so cheerfully vear after year, as you do. My years of service on the Board of Trustees gave me the opportunity to know you quite well and perhaps because I, too, have worked so many years as a secretary, made me feel that we had something more in common than just our membership in this wonderful Order, and our great interest therein. While we will both admit we do not agree on every point, I do feel you and I know how to disagree agreeably, and I wish we could teach this to more of our members. It has been a pleasure to work with you this year, and to be able to call on you for information and advice. I will miss our notes and talks and those earlymorning Special Delivery letters. Thank you for your help, assistance and encouragement.

To Sister Vera Blum, Grand Treasurer, I am sure few Worthy Grand Matrons could have had a more loyal officer in their Grand Family than you have been this year. You have travelled extensively, missing so very few of the Official Visits, and always willing to be of assistance in any possible way. We have been proud to have you a part of our 1968 Grand Family.

To the Grand Conductresses, Sisters Bessie Robinson and Elsie Mitchell, you have been a very wonderful part of our "family" this year. Your Worthy Grand Matron has appreciated the effort each of you has made in your attendance at the Official Visits and our official functions. May you, and your Grand Trailers, travel this star-studded pathway in happiness and good health.

To the Appointive Grand Officers, there is so little I can say to you, and yet my heart is so full of love and appreciation for each one. You have meant more to me this year than a few printed words on a page can tell you, and I would ask that each of you look into my heart for the words that are there especially for you. You have been loyal; you have exhibited that friendliness to our members that has set the tone for all our Official Visits; you have travelled extensively so we have always had a large number of Grand Officers at each meeting, our fewest being five and that on just one occasion. Wherever I have travelled this year, I have experienced your friendship. "Friendship is everywhere—it's in the touch of a hand, the warmth of a smile—that little word "hello". Friendship is in glad times and bad times—in quiet hours together and telephone calls and unexpected notes. Friendship is in remembrance and thoughtfulness—and in the hearts of very special people—like you, my Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, for instance!

To all others, our Past Grand Treasurers, Grand Representatives, Committee Members, the members of the special committees who have worked toward this Grand Chapter Week, I extend my sincere appreciation and gratitude for your support and efforts during this year. A very special thank you to Brother Robert Atkinson, who, following my hospitalization, acted as Convention Coordinator, and to Brother Edwin Bode, General Chairman. Many decisions have been theirs to make in finalizing arrangements for this Session, as it was not possible for me to come north to meet with them. Knowing this was in such capable hands was a tremendous relief.

To our Grand Pages, Star Raes and Grand Guards and Ushers who will be working with us throughout this week, a special thank you for your devotion to our Order that prompted your acceptance of this service to your Worthy Grand Matron and our Grand Chapter.

In all humility, this report is submitted as the accomplishments of this year—we cannot go back, the record thus stands.

ANNUAL ADDRESS OF WORTHY GRAND PATRON

Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates to this 95th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

As we open this Ninety-fifth Session of our Grand Chapter of California Order of the Eastern Star in this unique and cosmopolitan city of San Francisco-The City by the Golden Gate-I should like to first thank our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lura Rae Dales, for having nominated me two years ago to serve this Grand Chapter as your Associate Grand Patron, and the delegates for having confirmed this nomination by electing me to that office and subsequently Worthy Grand Patron. These past two years have been most rewarding, not only by the service I have been able to render our order, but by the many friends that Sister Alice and I have made as we have travelled the length and breadth of our great state. Early in November it was my pleasure to attend as a delegate the 32nd Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter in Washington, D.C. Together with our Worthy Grand Matron and a number of our Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. A further honor had been given me by having been appointed a Grand Guard. I have been presented with Honorary Memberships in 69 of our chapters and Sister Alice, too, has received several. I consider this one of the highest honors within the gift of the members and concrete evidence of the fraternal friendship and regard that exists between us.

75th Anniversaries

I was able to attend all of the 75th Anniversaries falling within this year. Amapola Chapter No. 119, Harmony Chapter No. 124,

Tuolumne Chapter No. 123 and Bakersfield Chapter No. 125 all had such celebrations. A great deal of time and effort had gone into these functions and all presented very interesting histories of their chapters. I salute each of these chapters for their successful past and am sure that their future will be just as bright.

Receptions

The Southern California Reception, the East Bay Reception, and the San Francisco Tea were all outstanding and a pleasure to attend. Southern California "Treasures of Love" theme was elaborated into a colorful and delightful pageant; the theme "Stars of a Summer Night" was portrayed by Eastbay as a veritable galaxie of stars. Much time, energy and effort was expended to accomplish the necessary planning. All the associations in these groups participated. We will never forget them. It was also my pleasure to attend all of the receptions for our Grand Officers and observe the high regard their chapter members have for our Grand Officers.

Star Clubs, Chapters U.D., and Chapter Institutions

Early in February I was contacted by a group in Oakhurst seeking permission to form a Star Club. After due investigation respecting facilities, probable members and interest, I issued formal permission on March 7, 1968 to this group to form a Star Club. Interest and enthusiasm were high and members were secured rapidly. This group has had full support from the Oakhurst Masonic Lodge, a fact which I consider prominent in their success. Sister Edna Hurst was elected president of the club and with her experience as a Past Matron and a Past Matron who had served as Deputy Grand Matron, carefully and competently guided the affairs of the club. As Oakhurst is some distance from my home I appointed Brother Charles Levy, Past Patron of Mercedes Chapter, as my personal representative to the club. Enough cannot be said of the manner in which Brother Charles assisted me and worked with this group. He is truly a dedicated member of our Order. In September this club advised me that they had reached the goals that I had required of them and had selected with my approval the name "Sierra Vista". I accordingly requested our Worthy Grand Matron to appoint a deputy for Sierra Vista Star Club. Our Worthy Grand Matron appointed Sister Evelyn Fiske, Deputy Grand Matron of the 46th District, to serve this club. She immediately started to work with them. The Worthy Grand Matron and I were highly pleased that all of the Grand Officers were present and participated with distinction in this Institution except our Grand Electa, Sister Harriette Connell, who unfortunately was in the hospital. Her station was very capably filled by Sister Viola Vreeland, Deputy Grand Matron of the 47th District and President of the Northern Grand Officers Association.

In September of 1967 our then Worthy Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust, gave permission to a group in Newhall to form a Star Club. They organized, with Brother Douglas Fortine elected president of the Club, and selected the name "Old West Star Club". I immediately started working with them and met with them on several occasions. I appointed Sister Grace Marquardt, Deputy Grand Matron of the 66th District, to act as my personal representative to the club. Sister Grace has worked untiringly and efficiently and has been of untold assistance to the end that Old West Star Club may be instituted as a Chapter UD. I extend my sincere thanks to Sister Grace for the fine work she has done and the cooperation offered me. In September of 1968 I was joyfully informed by the club that they had reached the goals required by me for institution. Therefore, a Petition for Dispensation, signed by the required number, was directed to me and is currently being acted upon. I feel that Old West Star Club will be a fine, outstanding chapter as both interest and enthusiasm are high among their 91 members.

This past year we have had two Chapters U.D., i.e., Delta Star Chapter U.D. and Desert Hot Springs Chapter U.D. I have been in close contact with these chapters, either in person or by mail and telephone. Both are exhibiting their adherence to the principles of

our Order and I feel that they will add strong links to our fraternal chain. It was my pleasure to attend the Birthday Night of both chapters. These celebrations added much to our enjoyment of the year.

In June I received a letter from Dee L. Chemnitzer requesting information concerning the formation of a Star Club in Kernville. I responded with the requested information and made one trip to inspect the area. Grand Treasurer:

Sister Vera Blum, my thanks to you for the support you have given us this year. You have traveled extensively and I am sure have made many friends. It has been a pleasure to have you in our Grand Family of 1968.

Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress:

The minutes of the Informal Opening Monday evening, and of the Tuesday morning session were approved as read.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

To the Members of the Grand Chapter of the State of California: "This is a day the Lord hath made, let us rejoice and be glad. Live today the best that you can, as though it is all you had. Life is made up of many todays, and each one lived at its best Makes this day a better day, and somehow takes care of all the rest."

At the session of the Grand Chapter in Coronado in 1935 my first report was made to this Grand Body as your "Acting Grand Secretary." It does not seem possible that so many years have passed, for you have made it such a pleasant experience—you have shown me innumerable courtesies and been such staunch friends and bulwarks on which to lean in times of sorrow, there is simply nothing I can say which would in any way properly express my deep sense of appreciation. To be a member of this great Organization is indeed a privilege, and to have been your Grand Secretary is also an honor which I hope has been deserved and has met with your approval.

At the close of the last session all of the routine business incident to the opening of a new regime was given attention. The Proceedings were off the press and in the mail before the 15th of December.

Because a case of complete exhaustion put your Grand Secretary in the hospital for about six weeks, two meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Home were missed. These meetings were attended by my assistant, Sister Gladys Johnson. Her service to the Board was most satisfactory and she was accorded every courtesy—in fact, I think the members hoped that she would come again.

At the close of our fiscal year in 1967 we had 153,823 members. This year we have a gross total of 147,888 and a "paying" membership of 143,536, a loss of 5,935. The figures for this year are not accurate, as there are still 35 annual reports which are out for adjustment of one kind or another. Being naturally of an optimistic turn of mind, I expected the reports this year to be without flaw as the lists of members sent in at the close of the 1967 fiscal year were corrected to that date, but alas, my optimism was misplaced as there were over 100 reports which had to be adjusted. A member of the office staff said that the Secretaries who sent in reports which had to be corrected were S.Ss, but we finally decided the presiding Officers who certified to the correctness of the reports were V.S. Worthy Matrons and V.S. Worthy Patrons, otherwise they would not have signed their names to the financial statements without first checking the figures.

During the year there have been several consolidations of Chapters, but the report of the Consolidation Committee will list the Chapters so it is not necessary to include them here. The charters of the Chapters were properly endorsed and returned to the consolidated chapters.

Contributions to our various charitable funds by the members— Scholarship, J. C. Lee Cancer Fund, Cancer Dressings and the Endowment Fund of our Home-were so numerous that it was becoming increasingly impossible to send acknowledgments to the donors, and to the families when the contributions were memorials. We therefore asked the Secretaries of the Chapters to send the acknowledgments and to send the money, with list of contributors, to the office once a month. I am happy to say that many of the Secretaries complied with our request, but many still continue to send the money to the office and ask us to acknowledge. I am sure that no Secretary would fail to carry out our suggestion if he realized how much time it takes to send the acknowledgements from the office as we sometimes receive as many as 75 a day, whereas he would not have that many in an entire year. If we can secure permission from our Finance Committee we will have cards printed, to be furnished the Chapters, relieving the Secretary from writing a note and saving the employment of a part time clerk.

In the printed list of proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws you will note several that affect the change in the date of the fiscal year from August 1st to June 30th. The reason for the change is that there is not enough time under the present closing for the auditors to complete their work in time for the annual session. In fact, unless we have the report of the Auditor at least ten days prior to the opening of the Grand Chapter, we cannot get it printed and ready for distribution to the delegates. The report was not completed this year in time for the printer, in fact we only received a preliminary copy this morning. If we can get additional copies they will be on the desk for any member who is interested to secure a copy. The business of the Grand Chapter and of the Eastern Star Home has grown so much, and we have so many more accounts than formerly, that the books cannot be closed and ready for audit until about the fifth or sixth of September, giving the auditors only about six weeks to complete the audit. Closing two months earlier will make it possible to have the report in time so the delegates may know, with accuracy, the condition of our finances at the session, instead of having to wait until the proceedings are off the press and distributed.

As you all know there were a few changes made in the ritual at the assembly of General Grand Chapter in 1967. We had to purchase the little four page list of changes from General Grand Chapter, and six copies were sent to each Chapter for the books which had been furnished them according to section 570. A new edition of the ritual has now been printed, and my problem is this: Should Grand Chapter exchange the six rituals we have furnished the Chapters, which would cost us in the neighborhood of \$8,000., or should we merely permit the Chapters to use the old edition with the inserts. There are not more than six changes in the spoken wording of the lectures and the balance of the changes are merely in the fine print and these changes are incorporated in our book

of instructions. Many of the Chapters are sending in worn copies of the rituals belonging to the officers for exchange, which means that some of the officers will have new rituals while others will be using the old edition with the paste-ins. When worn rituals are sent to the office there is a charge of \$3, for replacement—this applying only to the books furnished originally by Grand Chapter. The question: should we spend \$8,000, and exchange the six books? It is your money we are spending, but this member would like to know how you feel about it.

As always, it has been a pleasure to work with the Grand Family and I appreciate all of the invitations I received to attend your receptions and parties—but as has been said before, a working woman cannot do all of the social gracious things that you are able to do.

Worthy Grand Matron you have been most considerate—my only complaint is that you should have taken better care of your-self so you would not have had all of us worrying and praying for your speedy recovery. All of our members join me in saying a prayer of thankfulness for the good care our Lord took of you. Please take care of yourself in the coming days and years so that we will be able to continue to enjoy the friendship of you and your good husband, Milton.

Brother Worthy Grand Patron, I have known you and your good wife for many years as she was one of my children while the Secretary of your Chapter. Thank you both for the consideration shown me, and we hope the feeling of friendship between us will continue in the days to come.

My special thanks to the office staff, and particularly to my able assistant, Sister Gladys Johnson, for keeping the office running smoothly during the time I spent in the hospital. Thank all of you for your help and for your loyalty. (Just in passing, the Worthy Grand Matron and I would not have been hospitalized if we had not been too eager to get things done and then trying to do too many things ourselves— we each told the other that she should not work so hard, but it was like the old story of the pot calling the kettle black. Have we learned our lesson? I think so, as when a Worthy Matron asked me Sunday if she could have a report of the Session Friday night, I told her she would be lucky if she received it within a week from that date as I was not staying up practically all night Saturday and all day Sunday in order to get them out, and then having to spend a few weeks in a hospital trying to get "rested".)

This year we have been asked by other Grand Jurisdictions to investigate members who wish to be reinstated, presumably as they wish to affiliate with a Chapter in California. All of the requests were referred to the Worthy Matron of the nearest Chapter and in every case were given prompt attention.

Just a personal note:

One of the greatest thrills in my Eastern Star career was on April 17th when the Worthy Matron of my Chapter, California No. 183, permitted me the privilege and the honor of conferring the degrees of the Order on my granddaughter—the fourth generation of my family to become a member of the Order in California Chapter, as my Mother and Father were charter members, my husband and I were members, our daughter a member and now our granddaughter. Unless you have had the same privilege, you cannot know how proud I felt.

We were particularly honored to have with us that evening our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Right Worthy Grand Trustee, as well as ten Past Grand Matrons, four Past Grand Patrons, several of our Grand Officers and Deputy Grand Matrons—it truly seemed to be a V.I.P. evening and I am still trying to recover from my surprise.

Wishing you all God's richest blessing, I should like to close with these few lines which so aptly express my feelings:

"Before we met and you became my friends
Age was thought to be a terrible abyss
In which all hope, all loveliness, all bliss
Were lost forever. Nothing could defend
The old from this grim fate. Now, knowing you,
Age wears for me a glory and a light;
It is a silvered pinnacle, whose height,
Courageously attained, presents a view
Which youth, nor middle-age has looked upon.
You have no words to tell me what you see,
But what you are is proof enough for me
That sunset may be lovelier than dawn,
Since I met you, age is a promised land
Where hope and faith and joy walk hand in hand."

The amount to be set aside should be equivalent to the funds needed to care for the residents which will not be provided by future per capita tax from members of the chapters or by contributions from the residents.

Because of the materiality of amounts for depreciation and reserves for life care, we are of the opinion that the accompanying financial statements do not present fairly the

financial position of Eastern Star Homes of California at August 31, 1968, or the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances at August 31, 1968, and the related statements of changes in fund balances for the year then ended present fairly the information set forth therein. The statements have been prepared on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, except for the change, in which we concur, referred to in Note 2.

Note 1. Basis of Accounting:

The financial statements are stated on a modified cash basis of accounting. Transactions generally are recorded at the time of the receipt or payment of cash.

Note 2. Worthy Grand Matrons Projects Fund:

The Worthy Grand Matrons Projects Fund, as shown in Exhibit A, was established during the current year. In prior years, this activity was reported as revenue and expenses of the Operating Fund, Exhibit B. Activity for the current year is as follows:

Note 3. Property:

The land on which the Home of Eastern Star Homes of California is located was received as a gift, subject to an agreement whereby Eastern Star Homes of California agreed that it would operate and maintain a Home on the property or within a radius therefrom of 50 miles. The agreement also provides that should this property be sold the proceeds are to be expended for land and buildings for an Eastern Star Home.

The appraised value for the land of \$153,536 was adopted by the Trustees of Eastern Star Homes of California in 1957. Home buildings, furniture, and fixtures owned prior to September 1, 1955 are stated at the value assigned at that date. Additions subsequent to that date are stated at cost. In accordance with the direction of the Trustees in 1957, no depreciation has been taken since August 31, 1956.

Note 4. Notes Receivable (Endowment Fund):

Notes receivable with deeds of trust as collateral consist of notes acquired directly from residents or by sales of properties acquired from residents.

We have at present 106 sisters in the Home, whose average age is 83.7 years. The oldest sister is 99 years old and very active; the youngest is 71 years old. Fifteen sisters are over 90 years of age. There is no waiting list for admittance at the present time.

Official Visit:

The Board of Trustees was pleased to welcome the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and the Grand Officers on the occasion of their Official Visit to the Home on May 17, 1968. We were also honored to have Sister Thelma Bailey, Right Worthy Grand Trustee, and other Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons present. Luncheon was prepared by the staff of the Home and served by the 1968 Worthy Matrons Association of Southern California. Our sincere thanks to the Worthy Matrons and to everyone who had a part in the preparation for the Official Visit. A very entertaining program was presented by the residents. It is amazing what talents our ladies have, and how much they enjoyed performing for the Grand Officers and others present. It was really the highlight of the year for them. Our Worthy Grand Matron, who had previously served on the Board of Trustees was no stranger to the residents, and she and the Worthy Grand Patron extended beautiful and inspirational messages to our sisters.

Fiesta:

The Fiesta was held on Saturday and Sunday, August 3rd and 4th, and was very successful. A special "Thank You" to our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, all the Grand Officers and their associations for their effort in behalf of the Home. Our sincere apprecation to the members and friends of the Order for their cooperation in making this event such a success. Our residents look forward to this activity, to the excitement and the many visitors it attracts to the Home.

Administration:

The employment of Irvin Huffman as administrator was terminated on December 13, 1967. Brother John Brost, a member of the Board of Trustees for eleven years was employed as Administrator on March 1, 1968. In the interim, Elias Mansfield, as chairman of the Administration Committee spent three days a week at the Home,

and the President of the Board spent time at the Home on numerous occasions. Other members of the Board also lent helping hands so that the business of the Home continued uninterrupted. We would be remiss if we did not report that without the faithfulness and dedication of three employees, namely, Kelly Boclair in the office, Mildred Brenneman caring for the personal needs of the residents, and Earl Boclair in charge of the kitchen, things would not have "gone so good." To all who helped out during this time, we extend our Thanks for efforts far beyond the call of duty.

The Board feels very fortunate that we now have Brother John Brost as our Administrator. From the years he spent as a Trustee, he knows the Home buildings from top to bottom, inside and out. He knows the residents and has a "special way" with them, and he knows the Board members and will cooperate to the fullest in carrying out their wishes. Our Thanks to John for smoothing out the work of the Board since he has been Administrator.

The fire doors which were required by the Los Angeles City Fire Department have been installed at a cost less than the estimate and less than the amount approved at last Grand Chapter.

The Board employed a nutritionist on a temporary basis to prepare a file of menus and recipes, and for recommendations for work schedules for the kitchen employees and we are very pleased with the results.

We are now receiving Medicare benefits under Schedules A and B for the residents who require "outside" doctors and hospitalization, thereby reducing the cost of this expense. We have also been filing Death Benefit claims through Social Security for reimbursement of such funeral costs as are provided by law.

Budget:

During the past year, the cost of operation of the Home has averaged \$291.00 per month per resident. This includes all costs of food, services to the residents, the infirmary, general and administration expenses, maintenance and repairs and cost of the fire doors. We are constantly trying to effect economies in the operation of the Home and will continue to do so. However, the "cost of living" spiral continues. In the preparation of the Budget for the coming year, we have tried to take into consideration a reasonable estimate of the increase in costs, which includes the Home's share of the cost of the Blue Cross medical and hospitalization plan which we recently approved as a fringe benefit for our employees. Our proposed 1968-1969 Budget for the Eastern Star Home is \$385,000.00, which is \$3,600.00 less than the printed proposed Budget you each have.

General Remarks:

The Home has been the recipient this year of several memorials and substantial gifts from Associations and others. Also, many Associations and groups have brought entertainment to the Home for the pleasure of our residents.

Three Memorial windows have been installed, in memory of the following:

Margaret Hughes Lauritzen, W.G.M. in 1950, Maud Dezell Bradley, W.G.M. in 1922, Mary Isabel Warmer, W.G.M. in 1938, and who was for several years the Superintendent of the O.E.S. Home.

Other substantial gifts have included draperies in the dining room by the 1963's; a riding type garden tractor and a new dress for each resident by the 1967's; new chairs and tables in the basement recreation room, recovering of the chairs in the Garden Court room, and new office furniture by the 1968's.

The Board wishes to express our grateful appreciation to all who had any part in bringing joy and happiness to our residents. We also wish to thank the members of the Endowment Fund Committee for the time and effort they have spent in behalf of the Home.

Recommendations:

That the delegates of this Grand Chapter Session consider the continuation of the \$1.00 assessment, to be payable through the Chapters, to assist in the cost of operating the Home.

A house is built of logs and stone of tiles and posts and piers, But a Home is built of loving deeds that stand a thousand years.

My Sisters and Brothers, the Eastern Star Home is the "Home" of our residents, your fraternal sisters. It is built of steel and masonry, true; but even more of "loving deeds," your loving deeds and the loving deeds of those members who have gone before us, giving unselfishly of their time, effort, talents and generosity that the twilight years of our members less fortunate than we are may be spent in happiness instead of despair; comfort instead of misery, and in an atmosphere of fraternal love instead of loneliness. May the Eastern Star Home stand a "thousand years" as a testimony to your Loving Deeds.

Last night Brother John was in the balcony and he was not on the platform at the time the introduction was made and I would like to present Brother John Brost, the Administrator of our Eastern Star Home.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

(Presented by Herbert C. Duenckel, Chairman)

(Before reading the report Brother Duenckel presented the members of the Committee.)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers:

It might be well at the start of this report to list the prospective duties and responsibilities of the Finance Committee. They are set forth in Section 180 of the Constitution and Laws of Grand Chapter and in general cover the following activities:

The Finance Committee is to exercise full authority and control over all financial matters of Grand Chapter. To this extent it must review and approve any contracts or other obligations of Grand Chapter or any officer or committee of Grand Chapter unless otherwise provided for and authorized by other provisions of the Constitution. It is responsible for the examination of all books and records of the Grand Secretary, the Grand Treasurer, the Trustees of the Eastern Star Home and any other allied organization. It shall, in the performance of its duties, meet with the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home each year, cause an audit to be made by a Certified Public Accountant of the books and accounts of Grand Chapter, The Eastern Star Home, and all other allied organizations and to determine and direct, together with the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, all investments and reinvestments of all funds of Grand Chapter. Under this latter responsibility we are to

be guided by the general provisions of the "Prudent Man Rule" permitted by the State of California for investments but limited generally to forty percent in fixed securities of designated classifications, and sixty percent in equities. All such investments are to be made under the supervision of a professional Investment Advisor. Further, the Finance Committee is responsible for the annual budget of Grand Chapter and for reviewing and approving its budget, together with the budget for the Eastern Star Homes each year. And we are to make available and provide through reliable insurance companies various bond and insurance coverages provided for by the Constitution.

In carrying out these duties and responsibilities, the members of the Finance Committee are in almost constant touch with each other. In addition to specific meetings with the Grand Officers at both San Francisco and in Los Angeles, at each of these specific meetings, the Chairman of the various committees requiring budget approval are invited to attend and their budgets are reviewed in detail for approval. Reports are also presented to us by our insurance carriers and by our investment counsel, with a representative of Moody's Investors Service, Inc., being present at each such meeting to review current recommendations and to explain their underlying investment philosophy based upon economic conditions at the time and as forecast for the future based upon economic projections. These meetings started with our general planning during November 1967 for the activities of the year, with a meeting at San Francisco Grand Chapter Headquarters on January 13, 1968, in Los Angeles at the Eastern Star Home on May 18, 1968, and in San Francisco at Grand Chapter Headquarters again on August 24, 1968. At each of these meetings a full resume of the activities of Grand Chapter and of the various committees of Grand Chapter were reviewed. The problems and budgets of Grand Chapter week activities were reviewed and studied, insurance reports, budgets and investment problems were considered and acted upon.

In review of the various matters considered and the recommendations made by the Finance Committee during this past year, we report the following:

Auditing of the Accounts of Grand Chapter—For the past several years we have been concerned with the increased volume of detail and work required by our auditors which has caused increasing expense and increasing delays in the completion of the work and the presentation to us of audit reports. It was determined that it would be of great assistance to the auditors and in the preparation and presentation to us of reports if the fiscal period of Grand Chapter could be moved back from August 31st to June 30th of each year. This has been proposed to Grand Chapter by an amendment to Section 232 of the Constitution and to the necessary amendments to the various other provisions in the Constitution affected by a change in the fiscal year of Grand Chapter. It is not contemplated that this

change in the fiscal year of Grand Chapter will materially affect the problems of the subordinate Chapters while it will permit a greater control of the expense of the audit of the affairs of Grand Chapter and permit earlier reports to be presented to us. In addition to this we have reviewed with the auditors and approved the following:

- 1. That the General Ledger of all funds of the Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Home should be posted regularly and promptly after the close of each month.
- 2. That the detail of the income and expenses as posted to the "Due Accounts" in a general ledger should not only be posted there but also to the account to which it relates so that the Due Account in the contra fund should agree each month with any difference investigated and adjusted promptly.
- 3. Consideration to be given to the use of collateral payroll forms which would save elerical time. With these forms three documents could be presented with one writing; payroll information, payroll journals, and individual compensation records. Further study of the auditor's recommendation that complete payroll records should be maintained in San Francisco for Grand Chapter employees. This would include personnel forms for the employment, termination, changes of classification of salaries, and so forth.
- 4. Approval of the recommendation that all dividend checks and other checks in connection with bequests to Grand Chapter or the Eastern Star Home be directed to the Grand Chapter offices as soon as possible.
- 5. Approval of the recommendation that any fund or special bank account held by the Eastern Star Home or any other subsidiary of Grand Chapter be reflected on the records of the Eastern Star Home or of Grand Chapter and that all such accounts be distributed and disbursed to Grand Chapter monthly when the purpose for which such account is carried has terminated, such as upon the expiration of a resident of the Home.
- 6. Approval of the recommendation that pre-numbered, numerical control be maintained over all checks written by Grand Chapter. This might include maintaining a separate list of pre-numbered checks for such detailed expenses as represented in mileage accounts and so forth, which would be delayed in presentation and clearance and eliminate a problem of reconciliation on the monthly statements.
- 7. In general, disapproval was given to the recommendation of the auditors that the several accounts of Grand Chapter should be combined into the general fund with only separate income and expense classifications maintained for such accounts. It was felt that a more comprehensive record could be presented to Grand Chapter by a maintenance of these various Funds in their present positions.

Insurance—A review of the several insurance liabilities required to be covered under the Constitution, together with a review of the policies carried on behalf of Grand Chapter was made and it was

determined that adequate insurance is carried in the various categories. In answer to questions presented to our Committee as to major medical payment coverage, included in the policy provided for Grand Chapter and of the adjustment of the cost of our insurance when affected by other coverage, such as the Medicare program, it should be pointed out that the medical coverage under our policy relates only to actual reasonable expenses incurred by persons who sustain bodily injuries, sickness or disease, including death, resulting from accidents. Health coverage is an entirely different subject and Grand Chapter could under no circumstances absorb the cost for health insurance for its members unless it went into a totally different program, which was strongly recommended against. In order to keep the insurance premiums as low as possible, it should be applicable as "excess over other valid and collectable insurance." This feature has several advantages in that it will fill in and pay deductibles where other insurances contain deductible amounts and will also pay as excess over other limits frequently found in other types of policies. For example, where hospital benefits put a ceiling of \$20 to \$25 per day on hospital rooms, most people today find room costs going far above that figure. The Eastern Star coverage will fill in and pay the additional cost up to the actual bills incurred. Further, the premiums of the insurance furnished the Eastern Star is on an "experience rated program." This means that when the loss experienced is affected by any condition, including the application of the Medicare program, the rates under our Grand Chapter program will be reduced as rapidly as the effects are apparent.

Budgets—A substantial part of our Committee's work has to do with the examination of budgets of those other committees requiring budget expenditures as a part of their work. We meet with the Eastern Star Homes Board of Trustees and review their budget with them in detail. We also meet with the Endowment Committee in the review of its budget. We also hold several meetings with the Chairman of the Grand Chapter Week for the review of his budget and prepare and review the Grand Chapter budget itself, for presentation at the Grand Chapter Session each year. In each instance, each item in the budget is carefully reviewed, questioned, and approved or other recommendations made for final approval of each item in the budget. In addition to these budgets, these committees and other committees of Grand Chapter present financial problems, expenditures, or questions relating to our Committee to us for review and report during the year.

Investments and Reinvestments—The handling of the investments and reinvestments of the assets of various Funds of Grand Chapter has become one of the major activities of the Finance Committee. It should be born in mind that our present investment program was inaugurated only five years ago with the "Prudent Man Rule" as the basis for diversified investments of assets in our Funds. Throughout this period we have retained and depended upon the recommenda-

tions of Moody's Investors Service, an independent investing counselor servicing company who maintain no brokerage offices. All securities are further safeguarded by being held in a custodian account with the Crocker-Citizens National Bank in San Francisco who maintain a separate record of the securities in each Fund to follow the receipts of all dividends and interest paid on bonds with periodic reports to the Finance Committee.

In each of our Finance Committee meetings, both in Los Angeles and in San Francisco, a representative of Moody's Investors Service has been present to explain to our Committee the basis for its current recommendations and its investment philosophies for the year ahead. In its report to our Committee in our meeting in January 1968, it reported that the outlook for the economy in 1968 appeared to be generally encouraging, although the ultimate outcome would probably be influenced by the type, extent, and timing of economic policies such as higher income taxes, inflationary tempo, tight monetary controls, major economic instability and serious damage to the international monetary system. In the light of this, it recommended that the long-term stock investor could well afford to retain a reasonable reserve position in order to step in and acquire depressed issues in periods of weakness or add to existing holdings on a dollar cost average basis. It stated that stock selection itself should continue to be based primarily on prospects for earnings, growth and justifiable prices. It stressed, however, that it would be inclined to mark time for the present, hoping to use present reserves for better future buying opportunities and as one vehicle it proposed to continue to recommend the acquisition of convertibles, either preferred or bonds, which offer the institutional fund an opportunity to participate in growth situations at a reasonable yield.

Included below is an investment summary presented by Moody's Investors Service of all Funds in which investments in stocks and bonds are held.

Endowment Fund—It is noted that the common stock position shows a total unrealized gain of around \$130,000 or roughly twenty percent of the original cost. This does not include the realized gains that had been taken from time to time and which should be added to the total unrealized gain figure in order to get a really true picture. Should the depreciation shown by the convertible bonds and preferreds be added to the other realized gains for the common stocks, the total unrealized gains would be around \$144,000. During this past year, Moody's Investors Service recommended the sale of several smaller holdings of limited attraction of this Fund, as well as the sale of recently acquired mutual fund shares. In its opinion, the Fund was large enough to achieve adequate diversification within

itself rather than paying the added charge required for such diversification in an outside mutual fund.

Benevolent Fund—It is felt that the position of this Fund has been improved with several sales made during the past year for reinvestment along with cash funds on hand in other securities to produce a better yield in the growth potential of the Fund.

General Fund and Representative Fund—Few changes were made in these Funds other than to take care of administrative requirements.

J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund—This Fund still shows the effect of higher interest rates which depleted the value of bonds. However, the Fund has improved its position considerably of late and should continue to move forward with the others.

As for the distribution of the various funds, all of them are below the sixty percent level as regard to common stocks, this leaves us further latitude for adding to equities from time to time. It has been the policy of Moody's Investors Service, with which we are in accord, to gradually increase equity positions of the Funds that can invest rather fully in equities such as the Endowment Fund in particular, during times of market weaknesses. Not only have we been adding to the overall investment position of the Endowment Fund during periods of general market weakness, but we have been taking profit from time to time in fully valued issues for reinvestment in other issues with more attractive potentials in conformance with the selective character of the market in general. Moody's Investors Service has continued to recommend, and is following at present, a middle of the road approach under which they have made increased use of convertible securities in order to achieve a good current return along with market appreciation.

A comment should be made here for the guidance of the subordinate chapters for investments in their program. Section 455 of the Constitution and Laws of Grand Chapter provides "a chapter may invest its funds only in securities prescribed as legal for savings banks by the laws of California and in certificates of savings and loan associations for the amount not to exceed the limit guaranteed by the United States Government; except that it may invest funds in "Temple" or "Hall" projects or investments in accordance with the rules laid down by Section 456 of this Constitution." Investments in savings banks in California are restricted to government obligations and other investments, savings accounts, and savings and loan association accounts insured by instrumentalities of the United States Government. It is our opinion, and concurred in by the Committee on Constitution and Laws, that this provision distinguishes the investments for subordinate chapters from investments under the Prudent Man Rule permitted to the Grand Chapter under Section 180. It would therefore seem to follow that any other investment held by a subordinate chapter, such as stock which may have been received by a bequest, should be liquidated and the proceeds held by

the subordinate chapter under the provisions of Section 455 as an asset of such chapter. There are several good reasons for this, among which is that the normal investment portfolio of a chapter does not permit diversification of investment, an absence of adequate professional investment advice and the basic use of funds held by subordinate chapters for charitable purposes. If these investment limitations create any material problems to a particular chapter, we invite your requests for consultation.

Each of us on the Finance Committee wish to express our appreciation to our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, who are, of course, members of the Finance Committee, in connection with any investment activity, and with the other Grand Officers who attended our several meetings and joined in the discussion of the problems presented to us. This affords us all a greater understanding and participation in the role we are privileged to undertake in the affairs of Grand Chapter. We also wish to express our appreciation to the members of the other committees of Grand Chapter with whom we met and were associated with this past year. Each of us on the Committee sincerely appreciate the privilege of serving on the Finance Committee.

- (g) Insurance Fund. For a special fund to be known as the Insurance Fund for payment of the Insurance provided for in Section 180(8) and for the costs of handling said fund in the office of the Grand Secretary, such a premium amount as shall be established each year, for every member in good standing, by the Committee on Finance, acting with the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron.

Savings accounts in and investment certificates issued by a building and Ioan association or a savings and Ioan association or ganized and existing under the laws of the State of California, which is an insured institution as defined by Title IV of the National Housing Act, and shares issued by any such association which issues no investment certificates and which is an insured institution as defined by said Title IV, and savings accounts in and shares issued by any federal savings and Ioan association; but in the case of each association only to the extent that such accounts, investment certificates or shares are insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.
- If, because of limitation of deposits or for any other purpose, then deposit of such money, to the maximum of fifteen thousand dollars, may also be made in any bank which is a member of the Federal Reserve System or whose deposits are insured under the provisions of the Federal Reserve System, and which in either case is approved as such depository by the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron and a majority of the Finance Committee. The foregoing limitation of amount of deposit does not apply to the

General Fund or the Eastern Star Home Building Fund.

Deposit of both general and special fund money and receipts may be made indiscriminately in such accounts or in special fund accounts, as may be convenient, separate accounts of the same being kept on the books of the Grand Chapter; provided, however, that such money may be withdrawn only to replenish revolving funds, for special fund purposes, or for authorized investment, and shall be withdrawn only on warrants signed jointly by the Grand Secretary and either the Worthy Grand Matron or the Grand Treasurer. Eastern Star Home funds shall also be deposited in a special fund account in such bank or banks.

No Chapter shall hereafter invest any of its funds in any manner or obligate itself in any way for the purpose of acquiring or erecting any Eastern Star Temple, hall or other structure for the occupancy, in whole or in part, of a Chapter, or otherwise, until the plan of financing such building, and the plans and specifications of such structure, together with the estimates of costs, shall have been submitted to and approved in writing by a majority of a special committee, consisting of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and the members of the Finance Committee of Grand Chapter, or invest any of its funds in the obligations or securities, or otherwise participate in the financing of any temple or hall corporation or association whatsoever without the approval of such committee.

Sec. 463. MASONIC AFFILIATION OR RELA-TIONSHIP. To be eligibile to membership in the Order in this jurisdiction, one must be either an affiliated Master Mason in good standing in a regular Masonic Lodge recognized as such by the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of California; or the wife, widow by reason of death, daughter, legally adopted daughter, mother, sister or half-eister, granddaughter, stepmother or stepsister, of such Master Mason, or who was such at the time of the death of such Master Mason.

Evidence of Masonic affiliation, or relationship: 491.

Sec. 476, delete portion adopted 1967 and substitute: Sec. 472A. TWENTY-FIVE YEAR CERTIFICATE AND/OR PIN:

On favorable vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting, a Chapter may provide for the presentation of a silver 25 year pin and/or certificate, the design for which has been approved by this Grand Chapter, to those of its members as hereinafter provided, as a token of their devotion to the Order, when a record of 25 years membership, in good standing, is established by such member who is, and has been continuously, for at least 5 years next prior thereto, a member in good standing of the Chapter awarding the pin. The expense of such pins to be the responsibility of the Chapter awarding the pin.

Sec. 479. AMOUNT TO ACCOMPANY PETITION FOR INTERNATIONAL TEMPLE MAINTENANCE FUND. Each petitioner for membership, and each applicant for affiliation whose demit or certificate of good standing is from a Chapter in a jurisdiction within the State of California or a Chapter in a jurisdiction other than California who has not contributed to the International Temple Maintenance Fund, shall accompany the petition or application with a contribution of one dollar for the use and benefit of the International Temple Maintenance Fund. The contribution shall accompany the application or else such application shall not be received.

Such contributions shall be remitted by each Chapter to the Grand Chapter with the annual reports.

Such contributions shall be formally transmitted to General Grand Chapter at the discretion of Grand Chapter.

Sec. 565. ANNUAL REPORTS TO THE GRAND CHAPTER. Within thirty days after the 30th day of June of each year every chartered Chapter shall transmit to the Grand Secretary, on a form provided by

her, a full and correct report of its transactions for the twelve month period next preceding that date.

The report shall include:

- The names in full of its Officers;
- (2) Names of living Past Matrons and Past Patrons who are still members of the Chapter;
- (3) The number and names, in full, of members initiated, affiliated, reinstated, restored, demitted, suspended, expelled, resigned, or deceased during the year ending June 30th;
- (4) The names of members whose dues were remitted for financial inability to pay the same;
- (5) The names of members exempt from the payment of dues;
 - (6) The number of life members:
- (7) The amount of the life membership fund and the manner in which invested;
- (8) The names of members who are "Life Sponsors of the Home Endowment Fund" as provided in Section 773;
- (9) The amount due the Grand Chapter, including back assessments paid by members on reinstatement;
- (10) The amount due the Grand Chapter for the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund paid by initiates and/or affiliates;
- (11) Any additional information and data as the Grand Chapter may from time to time require;
- (12) Each Chapter Under Dispensation, instituted prior to June 1st of the calendar year, shall transmit a similar report from the date of its institution to June 30th, or for any period prior to such date for which it has not theretofore reported to the Grand Chapter.

In all cases the amount due shall accompany the report.

Any Chapter failing to deliver its report to the office of the Grand Secretary, on or prior to the first day of August, shall be delinquent and subject to fine and discipline otherwise, as provided in Section 204.

Sec. 602. PETITION FOR DISPENSATION. Such petition shall be signed by at least one hundred persons. In a city or town where another Chapter is located, at least ten of such petitioners shall be members of the Order at the time of petition, and not more than ten per cent (10%) of such petitioners may affiliate by demits or letters of good standing from any one established Chapter in California until the Charter shall have been issued to the petitioners. The petitioner whose appointment is requested as Worthy Ma-

tron of the proposed Chapter shall be a member of the Order at the time of petition.

(Balance of section unchanged.)

Sec. 609. NOTICE TO NEAREST CHAPTERS. Within ten days after receipt of a petition for dispensation, the Worthy Grand Patron shall give written notice of the same to all Chapters within a twenty-five mile radius of the place in which such Chapter is proposed to be located. He may also give notice to other Chapters in his discretion, and shall in all cases file with the Grand Secretary a list of the Chapters notified. The notice shall give the names of all petitioners, the present or last affiliation of petitioners who are members of the Order, the proposed name, and city or town of location for such proposed Chapter, the names of those proposed for its first four officers and such other information, if any, as the Worthy Grand Patron may deem advisable. No further notice of the petition need be given, whether additional petitioners are added later or otherwise.

Sec. 615. ACTION ON PETITION; EFFECT ON STANDING; RETURN OF FEES, ETC. The Worthy Grand Patron may grant the petition for degrees at sight as to such petitioners who are not members of the Order, if any, and as he may deem worthy and, after such degrees at sight are conferred, he may grant such dispensation to them and to such others of the petitioners, not less than one hundred in total number, as he may deem proper, whose names shall be set forth in such dispensation.

CONSOLIDATION OF CHAPTERS

Sec. 660. POWER AND PROPOSAL. Two or more Chapters having concurrent or adjacent jurisdiction may consolidate and form one Chapter. A proposal therefor may be made in either of the Chapters by motion or resolution. It shall be in writing and shall state the Chapters which it is proposed to consolidate and the city or town proposed as the location of the Chapters when consolidated, which shall be within the

jurisdiction of one or more of such Chapters. It shall be presented and read at a stated meeting and shall lie over, without debate, for consideration, on special notice as provided in Section 385 at the next stated meeting. By majority vote, its consideration may be postponed to a subsequent stated meeting without further notice, but it may not be laid on the table or indefinitely postponed. The vote upon the proposal shall be by written ballot and the vote required to carry it shall be two-thirds of those present and voting. If the proposal is carried, the Secretary shall thereupon send a certified copy thereof to each Chapter referred to in the proposal and to the Grand Secretary, with a statement of the action taken, of the meeting at which it was done, and of the notice given of the meeting. Any Chapter proposing to consolidate with any other Chapter must give to such other Chapter a full statement of its financial condition.

Sec. 661. CONSOLIDATION MEETING. When all such Chapters proposed to be consolidated have passed similar proposals therefor after notice as provided in Section 385, as shown by notice thereof received by the Grand Secretary, as aforesaid, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a member of the Consolidation Committee to preside at a consolidation meeting of the members of the consolidating Chapters.

In the event no member of the Committee is available, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a Past Grand Matron or Past Grand Patron to act as a pro tempore member of the Consolidation Committee to preside at such a consolidation meeting. Such appointee shall designate the time and place thereof and give notice of the same to the Secretaries of such Chapters, who shall give notice to the membership in the manner provided in Section 385. Such appointee shall also preside at such meeting and notify the Worthy Grand Matron of the action taken thereat. At such meeting a name shall be selected, which shall be subject to the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron, the number of one of the consolidating Chapters shall be chosen, all elective Officers shall be elected, and a time fixed when stated meetings may be held. By-Laws may be adopted at such meeting, or as soon thereafter as convenient, and submitted for approval in accordance with Section 336, et seq. Details respecting arrangements for installation may also be decided or authorized.

Sec. 662. ISSUANCE OF CHARTER. On receipt of the required notice from the officer presiding at the consolidation meeting, the Worthy Grand Matron shall direct the Grand Secretary to endorse the charter of the Chapter whose number is adopted, to show the name, number and location of the consolidated Chapter and the names of its first four Officers. The endorsement shall be signed, sealed and attested and shall be present at the installation and be delivered by the Installing Officer to the Worthy Matron as part of the ceremony.

On request of the consolidated Chapter the charter, or charters, of the participating Chapter, or Chapters, may also be endorsed and kept as a memento by the consolidated Chapter.

This year our Grand Chapter has been honored to have two of our Past Grand Matrons appointed to Standing Committees of our General Grand Chapter. They have traveled throughout the State encouraging the support of their particular chairmanship, and your Worthy Grand Matron has been pleased to call the attention of the members to these projects at many of the official visits this year as well.

In addition to these two Committee Members, our Sister Helen Isberg has been recognized for her service and appointed as Choir Director for the forthcoming Triennial Session to be held in 1970. This is a very time consuming and important post for her. We appreciate the recognition of our members and we are very proud that we have been shown this courtesy by our Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Sister Lois Tamba, member of E.S.T.A.R.L. Committee, I have a presentation to make to you at this time. On behalf of the 1968 Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, I am pleased to present \$500.00 to you for the E.S.T.A.R.L. program of the General Grand Chapter, and at this time we would like to hear from you on the E.S.T.A.R.L. Committee.

Response:

Lois Tamba, Member E.S.T.A.R.L. Committee of General Grand Chapter:

Thank you very much.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, our Right Worthy Grand Trustee, Sister Thelma Bailey, our General Grand Chapter Committee Members, Distinguished East, Sisters and Brothers:

Sister Lura Rae, thank you so much for this presentation and I thank all who have worked to make it so successful.

I want to tell you how much I have enjoyed your official visits this year and how much I missed those sparkling bright eyes when you were gone. I enjoy to see you preside at this Session, and I want to tell you how much I appreciate your mentioning E.S.T.A.R.L.

Brother Robert, I am exceedingly happy to be a neighbor of yours and I would like to express to our membership present, the remark I made at your reception—I felt that your Chapter has been so very cooperative and I thank you for that.

My Sisters and Brothers, at the Triennial Session of General Grand Chapter in 1952 E.S.T.A.R.L. was created. It is spelled E-S-T-A-R-L and means Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leaders.

In 15 years—7,000 awards have been granted to young men and women who are preparing for some form of religious work. Contributions to E.S.T.A.R.L. have been voluntary on the part of the members of the Order.

In September, 1967 two TV programs called attention to their work with young people. The MC on the Miss America Program announced that in 25 years they had granted \$700,000 in scholarships while on the local level the pageants had distributed \$5,000,000 more. The College Bowl in 12 years as a National Program said that its sponsor had distributed \$1,000,000 in 12 years as a national program. These are significant accomplishments.

E.S.T.A.R.L. however, in 15 years has received gifts over \$3,700,000 without fanfare, TV coverage or National sponsorship. Isn't this an excellent record?

At the last Triennial Session Sister Sayda Petterson, our Most Worthy Grand Matron, appointed Brother Carroll Hill, Past Grand Patron of Wisconsin and a Minister, chairman of this committee. There are nine committeemen representing different parts of the world. As your representative on the committee I also represent Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Hawaii, Alaska, and British Columbia.

It was my pleasure to attend the Grand Chapters of Oregon, Washington, and Montana this year.

What can you do personally to help? You have been helping with your Scholarship fund but it has not been reported to General Grand Chapter. In the Proceedings of General Grand Chapter for 1964 California was \$450. Yet in our Proceedings of 1962, '63, and '64, \$7,950 was distributed to religious scholarships. The scholarships were not sent to General Grand Chapter. In the years 1965, '66, '67, the amount of \$6,150 was the amount distributed for religious training. So you have been contributing to this ideal. Now we would like to see that the amount given to applicants for religious training be sent to Washington so that California will get credit for help in this field. At the Triennial Session in 1967 I presented contributions from the associations of Ellen Walters, Helen Isberg and my own 51 associations an amount of approximately \$1,650. My grateful thanks to these fine associations.

In our world today with violence, drugs, and sensationalism running wild each of us feels helpless and we wonder what we can do. We feel we must work more diligently for peace and harmony. But how?

Most of you are aware that I am a teacher. I cannot teach any part of the Bible in our public schools except as literature. Most teachers shy away from even mentioning or reading any religious subject which appears in our text books.

Who, I ask you is to teach our children the Christian way of life. We can outlaw guns and narcotics but we can not outlaw ideas. Unless we spread the word of Christ and His teachings to our youth we will lose them. By helping the religious leaders in their training we can do our part to help our country and the world towards peace on earth. This is what you can do personally to help the world from our chaos! Send your donations or memorials to our Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Mamie Lander, International Eastern Star Temple, 1618 New Hampshire Ave., N.W. Washington, D.C., or to me with the request that the amount be distributed in the State of California, or you may send them to me. Your Secretary should have the addresses.

The amount is immediately returned after the check is issued to our State of California, every bit of it.

Remember by doing this you are helping promote the principles of the Prince of Peace in this troubled world.

Lura Rae Dales, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you, Sister Lois.

During the time I am making the next introduction I would like the Worthy Matrons of the Chapters who expect to receive 100% Honor Certificates for contributions to the International Temple Fund, to assemble on my right in alphabetical order by Chapters. If you will do this quietly, please, and be ready so that there will be no delay in the presentation of the awards.

Last November, while in Washington, D.C., one of our Past Grand Matrons and I went to the International Eastern Star Temple and toured that building. Some of the items we saw there were far more impressive than some we had seen on our tour of the White House, but the one thing which startled us was the number of Chapters of our Jurisdiction listed on the Honor Roll as being 100% contributors to the International Temple. There were only six of our Chapters listed. Sister Grace and I know you have been working diligently to improve this record and we would at this time be pleased to hear from you, Sister Grace.

Remarks:

Grace M. Hoffman, Member of the International Temple Committee of General Grand Chapter:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of our Order, Sisters and Brothers:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for giving me the opportunity to tell these Sisters and Brothers assembled here a little about our International Eastern Star Temple which is located in Washington, D. C.

In 1937 General Grand Chapter voted to build or buy permanent headquarters. The most beautiful and elegant show place called, "The Belmont Mansion," was purchased for \$100,000.00, which when it was built cost over one and a half million dollars. With very few changes it was converted into a beautiful Eastern Star Temple. Through the years many priceless objects of art and lovely furnishings have been given to our Temple which is open to all visitors every day in the week except Sundays and holidays from 9 until 4. You will always find a qualified guide who is proud to show visitors, for this is a most beautiful place. However, this is more than a beautiful building, it is the headquarters of General Grand Chapter and one floor is used as an office. From this office all business belonging to the Eastern Star is handled. Here too, precious documents are carefully stored.

Did you know that California is a charter member of General Grand Chapter and helped found it? Did you know we pay no dues and no assessments to General Grand Chapter?

It is the hope and the desire of General Grand Chapter that each one of us will give \$1.00 once in a life time to our International Temple Fund. This money is placed in an endowment fund which will maintain the Temple. Since we belong and are part of General Grand Chapter we should be willing to support it.

When I accepted this appointment at Washington, D.C. last November I must confess that I was quite apprehensive about the results that could be achieved. California was at the bottom of the list of other Grand Jurisdictions for having 100% certificates to the fifty-eight chapters who have achieved this envied goal. In each case the goal was reached because of enthusiastic leaders and the all too often the unsung heroines, the chairman of the project, who worked hard to achieve the goal.

Since it is more convenient for me, I'll present the certificates in alphabetical order.

(Certificates were then presented to the Representatives of the following Chapters: America No. 408, Angels No. 134, Arbuckle No. 368, Artesia No. 253, Beverly Hills No. 404, Carmel No. 481, Eagle Rock No. 313, Garvanza No. 266, Glassell Park No. 486, Hacienda No. 614, Highland Park No. 263, Imperial Crown No. 311, Larchmont No. 463, Majestie No. 480, Melita No. 467, Crocker No. 382, Monrovia No. 227, Montebello No. 335, Morningside No. 601, Mountain View No. 552, Nimshi No. 424, Oakdale No. 226, Ocean Spray No. 68, Radiant No. 421, Riverside No. 622, Rose Croix No. 317, Sanger No. 482, Seal Beach No. 542, Simi Valley No. 637, Stella No. 39, The Gardens No. 464, Torrance No. 380, Westchester No. 569, Westminster No. 625, Whittier No. 444, Windsor No. 543, Wilmington No. 459, Fort Millerton No. 557, White Pine No. 487.

I have a little surprise for you. I had the pleasure of being invited to District 87 where I had talked to three different Chapters

there about this program. Almost within a couple of months two of their Chapters had reached 100%. The first of August I was invited to come to Temple City Chapter to make their second meeting in September. I had a hunch that Temple City Chapter was going to be 100%. This is our Helen Isberg's Chapter, and when I went there I had a wonderful surprise. Do you know that every Chapter in that District is 100%? This not only showed pride in their membership, but pride in the area. They are part of the San Gabriel Valley, and behind this effort I know are two fine people that spark-plugged this, in addition to the Chairman. They are Helen Isberg and Bill Willson who served as Grand Sentiinel a few years ago.

Sister Helen Isberg, since it is your District that went 100% I would like to have you have the pleasure of presenting these certificates.

Helen Isberg, Past Grand Matron:

I am just real thrilled and honored. Thank you, Sister Grace, this is so nice of you. (She then presented the certificates to Representatives of Alhambra No. 193, Granada No. 442, Ramona Star No. 367, Rosemead No. 567, San Gabriel No. 407, San Marino No. 554 and Temple City No. 448.)

Grace Hoffman, Past Grand Matron:

I know that perhaps some people have thought that I have bragged about my Long Beach Chapter but I have always felt that in our own area we have the finest members of our Order, and our town is the best. Now I have the living proof that Long Beach is the best, because I want you to know that both Districts in my home town, all 12 Chapters, have reached the goal of 100%. It is with much pride that I present the Certificates to them. (Certificates were then presented to Long Beach No. 173, Palos Verdes No. 310, Bettina No. 399, Service No. 314, Searchlight No. 435, All States No. 502, Mar Vista No. 511, Emera No. 561, Catalina Island No. 570, Belmont Shore No. 589 and Star of Lakewood No. 617.)

Worthy Grand Matron it has been a joy to me to work with these Chapters and I am certain you are as surprised as I was to achieve these results.

Lura Rae Dales, Worthy Grand Matron:

Yes, I'm surprised, Sister Grace. I thought you had done well, but if our tally is correct, the figures are somewhat different—we now have 58 Chapters 100% and that is pretty terrific for one year's work.

I should like to emphasize my remarks that you remember to support our Grand Chapter and General Grand Chapter, and perhaps we can increase this total next year.

We are very pleased to have with us at this Session Sister Laura E. Chernasek, Chairman of the Peace Garden Committee of General Grand Chapter, the special project of the Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Sister Laura, I am pleased to make a presentation to you also and to invite you to speak at this time. The Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of 1968 are pleased to make a contribution to you for the Peace Garden project, and this afternoon at our luncheon with the Grand Representatives I was presented a sum of money to be given to a project. Inasmuch as the Grand Representatives represent other Jurisdictions in this State, I felt that a General Grand Chapter project might be the place for their contribution to go, so it has been added to this and I would like to present to you the amount of \$228. for the Peace Garden Project.

Remarks:

Laura E. Chernasek, Chairman Peace Garden Committee of General Grand Chapter:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Right Worthy Grand Trustee, General Grand Chapter Committee Members, other Distinguished Guests, Sisters and Brothers:

I cannot say how thrilled I am over this gift and I accept it for our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sayda Petterson. I know how thrilled she is going to be over this very generous gift you have presented today.

I thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for the privilege of speaking on the Peace Garden project. I am sorry our Most Worthy Grand Matron would not be here as she is a delightful person and a Dynamic speaker. However because California is one of the six States for which I am responsible, I came to this Session—my first visit which I am enjoying thoroughly.

I would like to tell you a little about the Peace Garden. Irene Ramsey, a member of this Committee has agreed to send out letters with a description of the Chapel Sister Petterson wishes to dedicate during her term of office.

Our Most Worthy Grand Matron has only four projects—two of these are covered in our laws, the International Temple Fund and E.S.T.A.R.L. I want to congratulate Sister Grace Hoffman on the remarkable job she has done in having so many 100% Chapters for the Temple Fund and I also know that you have had remarkable success in your work with E.S.T.A.R.L. Sister Petterson's third project is Cancer Research and her main project, to complete the necessary fund raising for the Chapel in the Peace Garden.

The Peace Garden was voted in 1952, the same year E.S.T.A.R.L. was, but it has not been publicized by some of our Most Worthy Grand Matrons, therefore, little is known about it.

The Garden comprises 2,300 acres and was started by the Gardeners Associations in the State of New York. It is on the border between Manitoba and North Dakota and in it is a plaque, "To God In His Glory, We Two Nations dedicate this Garden and pledge our souls we will never take up arms against one another as long as men shall live." The boundary between Canada and the United States is the longest unfortified boundary in the world.

The business of the Garden was placed into the hands of the International Peace Garden Association. Many organizations have sponsored various projects in the Garden: Manitoba built a Pavilion on the shores of Lake Stormy for handling large gatherings; the Odd Fellows and the Rebekahs built an Entrance Gate; the Knights of Columbus a Band Shell and several picnic areas have been equipped and sponsored by Chapters and the Grand Chapters of Dakota, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

The Chapel which the Most Worthy Grand Matron wishes to dedicate was to cost \$75,000, and there is still approximately \$25,000 to be raised. The building should start next summer so it will be ready in the summer of 1970. Last Spring Sister Sayda visited the Chapters in Germany and was presented with a check for One Thousand Dollars for the Peace Garden. On behalf of our Most Worthy Grand Matron, I am asking the cooperation of all of the subordinate Chapters in California for this project. I know that you have your Home and other beneficent projects, but if each Chapter in the world contributes a little, we will have enough by next Spring so that Sister Sayda may realize her dream. She hopes to have a ground-breaking ceremony at the Garden following the 75th Session of the Grand Chapter of North Dakota next June.

The number of Chapters asking for Consolidation is heart breaking. However Eastern Star is not alone in this misfortune.

Both of our great Rites are frantically trying to close the doors on recession.

I am sure our Most Worshipful Grand Master is having a few anxious moments, trying to solve similar problems in our blue Lodges over the State of California.

We can turn the tide.

A few weeks ago, I attended a meeting of one of our Rites on a National level. Many of the speakers sounded a tone of despair.

But, when our Speaker representing California was called on, he told the delegates of the "forward steps" we of California are taking to strengthen our bond between the Grand Bodies and the Subordinate Bodies, of the program we were promoting to strengthen our Order, of the goals we have set to increase our Membership.

When he concluded his report on our activities, one Brother got up and made light of our activities. He couldn't see why we were encouraged when California was not keeping pace in Membership, with the explosion of population.

I told him we were positive thinkers. We would turn the tide. Our program would succeed.

My Sisters and Brothers, let us all return to our respective Chapters, inspired with a new dedication, a determination for accomplishment.

May we symbolically, weild the sword of victory. That our Masonic Family will remain the greatest Fraternal Order in the land.

Sister Esther, it has been a real pleasure to have you share this afternoon. You and I share an intense interest in our Order and as both of us come from Orange County I know our paths will cross often in the years ahead. May it always be with the same pleasantness it has been in the past.

Brother William, we are blessed to have you with us this Session and appreciate very much your serving as our Host this afternoon, especially when we welcome such a distinguished guest, for you too are advancing to a high position in the Masonic Order in this State.

I would be pleased to have you present our distinguished guest at this time, Worthy Grand Patron.

Robert M. Lutz. Worthy Grand Patron:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Worthy Grand Matron, our Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, my Sisters and Brothers:

It is always a pleasure for me to be able to introduce a Brother Master Mason, but in this instance I am singularly honored by introducing to you the Most Illustrious of all Masons in California, our Most Worshipful Grand Master, Robert A. Crigler.

Our illustrious Brother was born in Denver, Colorado; attended Huntington Park High School, Los Angeles City College, U.C.L.A., Los Angeles Stock Exchange Institute. From 1938 to 1941 he was a stock and bond trader in the Los Angeles Stock Exchange. In 1942 and 1943 he was Technical Representative, U.S. Air Force, Africa. 1944 to 1946 he was General Manager, Hydraulic Engineering Co., manufacturing valves, and 1946 to date he is President of Robert A. Crigler Company, Insurance Brokers and Industrial Land Developers.

He and his lovely wife, Dena, have a son, Robert A. Crigler, Jr., and a daughter, Karen Christine Crigler. He is a member of the Plymouth Congregational Church and was Chairman of the

Board of Trustees in 1958 and 1959, and was lay leader and Moderator in 1960 and 1961.

He is Chairman of the Beverly Hills Draft Board; is a member of the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce and has been an Officer and Director, receiving the Gold Salute Award.

He has had an outstanding Masonic life, having been raised in John Marshall Lodge No. 636, Beverly Hills, in 1945. He was Master in 1953 and Officers' Coach in 1954. He was a member of Grand Lodge Columbia Temple Committee in 1960. He was appointed Inspector in 1961 and Assistant Grand Lecturer in 1963. He is a member of Signet Chapter No. 57, Royal Arch Masons, and a member of Commandery No. 9 Knights Templar. He has received the DeMolay Legion of Honor Award and has been official representative of the Grand Lodge of India.

He is a Past Wise Master, Los Angeles Scottish Rite Bodies and has been decorated Knight Commander Court of Honor. He has been a member of several Grand Lodge committees, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Masonie Homes of California, a member of the Board of Trustees California Masonic Memorial Temple, and a member of St. Gabriel Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine.

He was elected Junior Grand Warder in 1966 and Deputy Grand Master in 1967 of the Grand Lodge of California and in this year of 1968 has been elected Worshipful Grand Master.

Illustrious Sir, I invite you to address our delegates and members.

Remarks:

Robert A. Crigler, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California:

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, other Distinguished Guests and all of you beautiful ladies and my Brethren:

Let me tell you how delighted I am to be here today. I appreciate your invitation to share with you in this afternoon's program because, you see, this is my first experience in appearing before you, and especially so since just last Friday I was installed as Grand Master of Masons in California and Hawaii, so you see this is a fairly new job for me.

I must tell you that although I have only been in office four and a half days, this is the seventh event that I have attended so far. You know, being Grand Master of Masons of California and Hawaii is a very busy job. They warned me about it but I did not pay too much attention evidently. I looked at my calendar this morning and I found out that every weekend is now booked through next August and there are only two left in September—so my dear is practically over.

I am delighted to be here today with you and to let you know how much the Masons in California appreciate the wonderful help and support that you ladies of the Eastern Star have given to us. As a matter of fact, about a year ago the Inspectors of the Fifth Division, which encompasses the area around greater Los Angeles, came to me and said, "What do you think of having a reception for the Grand Master in the Sports Arena in Los Angeles?" And I said, "It is too large, isn't it? That seats 16,000, you're going to have about 15,700 seats empty," and they said, "No, we would like to make this an all Masonic Family Reception for the Grand Master, with your approval." I said, "I certainly do approve, as a matter of fact, you tell me what you need and I will see that you get it."

So they proceeded to talk to the Manager of the Sports Arena in Los Angeles—this was a year and three months ago—and they booked Sunday afternoon of November 17 for a reception for the Grand Master, and they had to put a deposit up to secure the Sports Arena, which they did, and I told them again, "You realize what you're getting into, there are 16,000 seats and you will never fill them."

To make a long story short, the event is less than one month away now and I am told there will not be an empty seat in the Sports Arena. The sad part of it is that I have also been informed there are over 1,000 of Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls and DeMolay boys who will not be able to have seats because of the shortage of tickets, and this makes me feel a little bit sad because I, for one, firmly believe that our Masonic Family is a Masonic Family, and each of us, no matter what affiliated body we may be a member of, are all working together for the same goal, the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God, and I can't speak too strongly on this point.

Each of us has found a niche in our fraternity in which to serve, and I am very grateful for the tremendous support of our Job's Daughters and our Rainbow Girls and our DeMolay Boys, and you ladies in the Eastern Star and the Amaranth and all the other bodies, the Shrine and the Scottish Rite. The Shrine, as you know, has 19 hospitals for crippled children throughout the United States, and now they have embarked on a new program, Burns Hospitals. They have two in existence right now and they're going to dedicate another one in Boston next week—that will be three hospitals for the treatment of burns. Of course, I am sure all of you are familiar with the York Rite Bodies and their great programs, and the Scottish Rite and their programs.

Just last week at Grand Lodge I was sitting there, listening to the reports of all of our committees and I could not help but be impressed that Masonry in California is on the move. We are busier today than we have ever been. There are more activities in Masonry in California than we have ever had.

Our Public Schools Week Programs are expanding tremendously. We have more participation by members of the fraternity and by members of the Teachers' associations, and similarly our program for the observance of our Constitution in September.

For example, we have just this past September embarked on a new program. The Chairman of our Constitution Observance Committee wrote letters to all of the presidents of all of our state colleges, asking them to have a program of some kind during the week of September 17, preferably during the halves of a football game, spotlighting and calling attention to our Constitution. I am happy to say that a great many of the presidents of our colleges did put into effect this program and so we did have this kind of participation by our state colleges, and we went one step further: For the first time it was instituted here in San Francisco, when a professional football team, the San Francisco 49ers, called attention to it during the half time of their game.

So you see, we are having expanding programs of Masonry. Your Grand Lodge Officers are conducting three times more cornerstone ceremonies now than we were ten years ago and today we have more members in DeMolay than we ever had before. All of our activities are expanding.

While it is true that this past year we had 2,000 less members in our fraternity—that is, Masonry—than we did the year before, still this is to be expected. This is because after the last war. World War II, we had a tremendous increase in the Masonic fraternity in California, a tremendous surge in membership. Most of the men coming into the fraternity during that time were in the age bracket of 45 to 55 years. These were men whose families had grown up. They had come back from the service and gotten married and they found time to join our fraternity and be of service to their fellowmen. These men are now 65, 70 and 75 years of age, so it is only natural that we're going to lose some of these men and we expect this trend to continue perhaps for another four to five years, but that does not say that our fraternity is on the wane. On the contrary, our fraternity is stronger today than it ever has been before. We're doing more, and here again, I think you ladies are a great part of this, because without your aid and support we men would not have much to contribute.

It is your aid and your assistance and your contributions, your kind words of assistance and encouragement which gives us the will and the strength to carry on.

May I say just one thing more: We in California are having a tremendous revival of the ecumenical spirit. During our session of Grand Lodge, which conclued this last week, we had the privilege and pleasure of hearing from a Roman Catholic Bishop, Bishop Harry Clinch, who is the Bishop of the Diocese of Monterey.

Our Grand Master, Dr. Eugene S. Hopp, asked the Bishop to address the members of Grand Lodge at a Seminar on Tuesday evening. He asked this good, kind brother to address us because we shared the program with him when we laid the cornerstone of the new King City High School at King City, and Bishop Clinch, when he got up to speak, praised the Masonic Fraternity so greatly

that I asked him what was the reason for his kind words. He said to us that when he was a young priest and trying to establish a boys' camp up in the Sierras, he could get no help from anyone except two men who were instrumental in helping him to establish this camp. These two men were Masons, and from that day on he has been singing the praises of Masonry—so you never know when you drop a pebble in the pond how far the ripples may spread.

In the audience we had six or seven Sisters, and he said, "Now that you Masons are beginning to take in the Catholics, it is going to serve you right," and then he said, "Sister Evangeline, in answer to your question, no, you can't join the Eastern Star yet."

His warmth and friendliness proves that we are all indeed brothers and sisters, and we were very grateful for his very kind remarks.

I can just say to you in closing that almost 2,000 years ago the greatest of all teachers said, "This Commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another."

My Sisters and my Brothers, in that short phrase we have the perfect definition of our fraternity and of all its concordant and subordinate bodies. I pray that our Heavenly Father will give us many more years of fellowship and service together in the cause of our fraternity.

Thank you very much for your very kind attention and I appreciate being here with you.

Lura Rae Dales, Worthy Grand Matron:

Brother Crigler, Most Worshipful Grand Master, again we appreciate the effort you made to be with us today. It was a slight disappointment not to be able to welcome you at the Informal Opening Monday evening, but I appreciate the fact that you have preferred to come yourself at another time, rather than have one of your Grand Lodge Officers represent you on that evening.

We extend to you our congratulations and wish for you a most successful and highly rewarding year as Grand Master.

We understand the busy schedule of the Grand Master and, while we are pleased to have him remain, he has indicated that he might have to go to his office up on the hill and do a little work. Whenever you must leave, we would excuse you.

Report of Election Board:

Brother George Bailey reported Sister Helen Bell DeBeers and Brother Bert Dobbs received the largest number of votes and Brother Hugh Rutt the lowest number for Trustees of the Eastern Star Home.

The Worthy Grand Matron declared them elected.

Lura Rae Dales, Worthy Grand Matron:

At this time, Brother George, I wish to express my appreciation to you and to all of those who assisted on the Election Board. We are grateful for your service year after year in this capacity and the exacting manner in which our election is conducted.

Now that the election is finalized, my congratulations and best wishes are extended to each of these officers of our Grand Chapter and to the members of the Board of Trustees. There is much joy ahead for you as you serve our Order and I wish you much happiness.

There have been questions about the Bible having been left open during our voting, and I think for those who might be new at our session this year, an explanation will be in order. Our election is an order of business in our Grand Chapter and therefore we do not close our Bible when we ballot, and there is no breakdown of our rules or our love for our Order when we cross from one side of the room to the other to ballot.

The Bible is open to remind us all of our obligation and the love that we have for one another, or should have, and that is why our Session is not closed in the morning while our balloting takes place.

There have been questions asked about the admission for the Grand Ball this evening. Members of the Order of the Eastern Star and members of the Masonic Fraternity will be admitted. Non-members of the Order who may be husbands or escorts of a credentialed member will also be admitted. Those participating in the Grand March are specified in the program.

Are there any other questions about this? There are questions being asked about admission for the Installation on Friday evening, and I can call on our Associate Grand Matron or I can give the answer we agreed on. We feel that Informal Opening and Installation are very lovely nights to come and see, but we feel the business of our Grand Chapter is very important also and that it would be unfair to all of you who paid a \$5 registration fee to admit members of the Order on Friday night to witness the Installation Ceremony without having paid this \$5 registration.

Sister Florence, do you care to add anything to this?

Florence Dunn, Associate Grand Matron:

We will follow the same procedure that we followed in the past. Tickets will be given to members of the families of the incoming Grand Floor Officers and a section will be reserved for the members of the incoming Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron's members. This has been followed in the past.

Sister Florence has the responsibility with whomever she wishes to share it of ticketing the balcony area for Friday night, as I had for Monday night, and these tickets will be distributed in the best manner possible to our Grand Chapter Committees who have worked all week and our regular Standing Committees of Grand Chapter, to our Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, but there are hundreds of seats in the balcony area for the members of the Order to enjoy this very beautiful evening.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to you the members of this Committee, Sisters Gladys Pendleton and Eleanor Miller. My heartfelt thanks to each of you for all of the help you have been to me this year, and to you, Worthy Grand Matron for appointing us.

REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE COMMITTEE (Presented by Donna Smith, Chairman.)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to each of you, the members of this committee, Sisters Gladys Pendleton and Eleanor Miller. My heartfelt thanks to each of them for all of the help they have been this year and, to you Worthy Grand Matron for appointing them. Sister Gladys is an old friend and Sister Eleanor a new one, but both now share a very special place in my heart.

Sister Maud, our Grand Secretary, may we thank you and your staff for the help that you have been. We thought of you all through the year as the proceedings arrived.

It had been the hope of this committee to have our Grand Representatives participate in this report. Despite several months of letter writing and telephone calls, our efforts failed. It is my wish, however, to thank Sister Lillian Lehman, President of the Southern Grand Representatives and, Sister Madeline Anet, President of the Northern Grand Representatives for their wonderful cooperation. Also, all of those whose commissions have expired but who graciously answered my letter requesting their help.

We were a privileged three this year. We were privileged to journey north and south, east and west, throughout our own United States, into Canada and even to Scotland to learn more about our

Eastern Star World and, we felt so welcome at each Grand Session we attended. We realized that our Eastern Star shines on each member of each Grand Jurisdiction, that the Holy Bible is always present on each Holy Altar and that the same obligation binds us together as one family.

From the abundance of interesting material, our greatest task was to choose those points of most interest to you.

The Order of the Eastern Star is International. It is divided into four sovereign bodies governing some 14,000 subordinate chapters with an approximate membership of 3 million. The four sovereign bodies are: General Grand Chapter, Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, Independent Grand Chapter of New York and Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey.

Our Order is the largest fraternal organization in the world with membership open to both women and men. It was learned from the proceedings that 40% of the members of our "Eastern Star World" are men.

Most all groups have some kind of Divine service prior to informal opening. All Grand Chapters had tributes to the flags—American, Eastern Star and State, some a neighboring state. It was with pride that we read of the honor accorded our country's flag at each Grand Chapter Session in Canada. Nearly all groups had drills and pageants and some even had floor drills relating to annual reports. Many are very elaborate. Many Grand Chapters have a regular Grand Chapter choir, Most, but not all, have a memorial service.

The extent of the work done by our Order is limitless. The care of our own, recognition and education of the youth of our land, our benevolent work, these are the primary aims of all chapters in all Grand Jurisdictions. In fifty Jurisdictions, Educational Loan Funds assist boys and girls in completing their education. ESTARL, which awards scholarships to many fine people to further their religious training is most well known. In all Grand Jurisdictions it was well recognized that in the hands of our youth rests the future of your land and mine.

Standing close to the top of the list of projects in all Jurisdictions were our Eastern Star Homes. Both the homes for our members in their "Golden Years" and the Children's homes.

In almost all of the proceedings it was noted that loss of membership and lack of interest are serious problems in our order and yet, we find in one chapter a sixty-four year member who very ably filled the station of Martha. In another chapter a sister, although blind, filled the station of Electa. In one Grand Jurisdiction 240 50-year pins were awarded, in another 300 and, in yet another 319. An organization that can hold—and interest—large numbers for half a century certainly offers great opportunity and the highest of ideals for all members. We must accept the challenge we face, attend meetings, show love and friendship and help when needed.

I would like to quote these words from Brother I. J. Dixon, Jr., Worthy Grand Patron, State of New Mexico, 1966-67, for I thought them most appropriate in regard to this problem:

"I pray that Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness will continue to shine forth as the three great virtues of our order, for therein lie the very foundation stones of our beautiful Order of the Eastern Star. Our lives lived in the spirit of friendly concern for others, are part of the guarantee that our order will grow and bless the multitudes who are yet to come within its portals."

Perhaps our Grand Representatives have the greatest of all opportunity to build. As they promote good will, friendship and understanding between states, provinces and nations, they build our "Bridge of Friendship" throughout our order. Although theirs is a serious commission, as they meet and greet their sister Grand Representatives from other Jurisdictions, they share moments that are also light hearted. Sister Dorothea Amrhein, Grand Representative to Mississippi in California, has prepared a musical parody on this for us.

Williams. I am truly grateful for the splendid cooperation given me by this Committee in behalf of our unfortunate members. We wish to thank all those who assisted these Committee members in making investigations, where it was not possible for the Committee member to contact the person applying for aid. Once again we extend our heartfelt thanks to all who have contributed to this memorial fund, and many thanks to the different Chapters and Associations that held fund raising events for this fund.

More and more the members and friends of the Order are sending contributions to this fund in lieu of flowers at funerals.

We thank our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and all the Grand floor officers for their support this year. To the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons sincere thanks for all your help.

While we are in the thank you's, we must give a great big thanks to Sister Maud and her wonderful staff.

To our 1953 and 1954 Past Matrons, Past Patrons and Trailers for keeping the project in front of your respective Chapters.

Several chapters and associations invited me and other members of this Committee to their meetings to talk on this project so

that the members would understand more of the workings of this project. I received a letter from Sister Maxine Vernol, President of the Lura Rae Dales L. A. Association, and this was a part of her letter "We had the pleasure of having Manila Richardson speak in connection with the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund Project, at our meeting last Saturday and she was most informative. I hope in the future more Associations are able to have speakers in their Associate Matrons year, who are prepared to cope with problems as they arise." Thanks, Sister Maxine. Committee members of all the different projects of Grand Chapter are always ready and willing to go to any meeting and tell of the project they represent and it will definitely help all members and specifically those in line.

I would at this time like to present an ex-officio member of this Committee, my lovely wife Ruth, who answers the phone at home, while I am at work and talks to those seeking information about the fund. Thanks, Ruth, for this help, and as we celebrated our 40th wedding anniversay Monday the 21st, I want to say, I love you, and thanks for being such a wonderful wife.

Since this fund was started in 1954, we have helped 1,054 members or some of their immediate families, and have spent for their aid, \$735,343.48. I have four cases being investigated at the writing of this report. Since Grand Chapter last year we have OK'd 42 new cases, from the Chapters West Covina, Lyra, El Rio, Elysian, Casimir, Moneta (2), Yerba Buena, Wheatland, Temple, Manchester, Alameda, Star of Palmdale, St. Helena, San Antonio, Concordia, Beacon, Mizpah, La Puente, Heber, Vista Cerrito, Palm Leaf, La Mesa, Milton, Alamo, Hawthorne, Pasadena, Lomita (2), Angeles Vista, Athens, Mar Vista, Raisina, Elsinore, Ramona Star, Presidio, Searchlight, Crescent, Smyrna, Bellflower, So. Pasadena, Gate City, and Santa Barbara.

Botanists say that trees need the powerful March winds to flex their trunks and main branches, so that the sap is drawn up to nourish the budding leaves. Perhaps we need the gales of life in the same way, though we dislike enduring them. A blustery period in our fortunes is often the prelude to a new spring of life, health, success and happiness, when we keep steadfast in faith and look to the good in spite of appearances and remember unfortunate sisters and brothers in their time of need. It is from funds derived from our Annual Breakfast sponsored by the 32 Chapters composing the five Districts in the Valley, the 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th and the 88th. At this time, with your kind permission, I would like to make this presentation on behalf of the Robert M. Lutz Association of the San Gabriel Valley and the Richard Brassell Association of the San Gabriel Valley. We have Officers and members throughout the State and this is the first year that we have been 100% State-wide and asked assistance from all of our Chapters. I would like our members to know we had one Chapter in the northern part of the State sent us \$1.33 from their coin march, and I want to tell you Sisters and Brothers, that Chapter could not afford to send \$1.33 as well as my own Chapter could afford \$50.

We are most grateful for the assistance that we have received throughout the State and we hope this program will expand in the coming years, and that in the near future our Association can present five, six, seven, eight, nine and ten thousand dollar checks with the help of all our Associations throughout the State.

Lura Rae Dales, Worthy Grand Matron:

The Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons and all the Officers of the San Gabriel Valley Association, your effort is deeply appreciated for the fine contribution you have made to swell this Fund which helps many of our own members and their families.

We will have the report of the Endowment Fund Committee, Brother Edwin R. Brooks, Chairman, who will present his Committee and the report.

Before doing so, the Worthy Matrons of the Lura Rae Dales Association of California present \$1,500.00 to the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund from the sale of the "California Kitchens" cookbook as of September 30, 1968. It is my pleasure to make this presentation.

REPORT OF ENDOWMENT FUND COMMITTEE

(Presented by the Chairman, Edwin R. Brooks)

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you and the Worthy Matrons of 1968 for this very generous contribution to the Endowment Fund.

Worthy Grand Matron, before beginning our report, I would like to ask the Worthy Matrons or Representatives of the following Chapters to assemble in the northeast corner, and as the Chapter name is called, if they will step up to the stage and receive the Honor Certificates from the Area Chairmen.

I am pleased to present to you the Area Chairmen of the Endowment Fund Committee who are with us today: Hazel Hansen, Grace Gould, Lois Corcoran, William Furber, Robert Doan, Erwin Stockebrand and James Craven.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Your committee on the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund reports to you as follows:

We met on three occasions this year to devise ways and means of promoting the Endowment Fund in order to provide additional income for the operation of our Eastern Star Home in Los Angeles. We have now completed a small folder entitled "Why an Endowment Fund?" and it is now ready for distribution to the general membership. Your Chapter Secretary may obtain these by contacting the Grand Chapter Committeeman from your area. Our efforts we believe have been successful. This year there has been better than a 25% increase in the awarding of Honor Certificates, dedicated Chapters who contribute at least \$1.00 per member to the Endowment Fund. We feel that our Success has been due in a great measure to our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lura Rae, who chose the Endowment Fund as one of her projects.

We would be dereliet in our duty if special recognition was not paid to La Posa Chapter No. 282 and Manchester Chapter No. 449. Endowment Fund Certificates have been given for seven years, including this one, obviously a 100% record. There are thirteen other

Chapters receiving certificates this year who have been on the Honor Roll in previous years also. We are pleased to announce that because of your efforts the Endowment Fund has grown this year by \$336,429, and that the total amount in the Fund now is \$1,759,497. It is a recommendation of your committee that each Worthy Matron appoint someone in her Chapter to serve as chairman of the Endowment Fund in order to promote the Fund on a continuing basis and that the chairmen familiarize themselves with the Home and the purpose of the Endowment Fund.

The budget for 1968-69 has been given to the Finance Committee under separate cover, and we should be hearing from them a little later with regard to our requests for next year's operation.

REPORT OF CHARTERS AND DISPENSATIONS COMMITTEE

First I would like to present the members of my Committee, Sisters Vivian Kilgore and Mary Harpold. These two have done all the work of the Committee really, and I'm very happy that they served on the Committee.

To the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star:

The books and records of both Desert Hot Springs Chapter, U.D., and Delta Star Chapter, U.D., have been carefully examined by your committee, and have been found to be in satisfactory condition. With the exception of a few discrepancies which have been corrected through the help and cooperation of the Worthy Matron,

Worthy Patron and Secretary of both of these chapters they have been found to be acceptable. Through lack of knowledge and counseling, the books were not kept in the manner required by our Grand Chapter; however, we feel that with a little help the books will be kept in the proper manner in the future. We found it necessary to have each chapter furnish additional information in order that a thorough examination could be made, and because of the time required for these chapters to get this information to us—by air mail and personal delivery—this report has been difficult to complete in order to make this report at the proper time.

The chapters are in good condition, both financially and in membership, and the committee congratulates them on the fine progress they have made.

The committee would like to again recommend, as this same recommendation was made in 1965, that a qualified member of the Order be appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron, at the time of institution, to advise and to guide a new Chapter. This recommendation is being made principally for the benefit of the new secretary so that guidance can be given in setting up and keeping a set of books as required by our Grand Chapter.

This is no reflection on these two new chapters as any new chapter needs this guidance and help from the time of institution in order to meet the requirements of our Grand Chapter.

I, therefore, would heartily recommend that both these U.D. chapters receive their charters at this Grand Chapter session.

REPORT OF BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE

(Presented by the General Chairman, Kathryn Farwell, Past Grand Matron)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Members in the East, Sisters and Brothers:

This is the report of the Benevolent Fund Committee for the year just ending.

"We go this way but once, O Heart of mine, So, why not make the journey well worthwhile, Giving to those who travel on with us A helping hand, a word of cheer, a smile."

Our Benevolent Fund is the helping hand that brings a word of cheer, a smile to those of our aging members who are desperately in need.

Although Medicare and Welfare have done much to alleviate some of the difficulties, still there are many services which they do not cover.

Our J. Clifford Lee fund has been a great blessing to many members who have been terminal cases. The Benevolent Fund provides for another small allotment for those who have had the maximum of assistance from the cancer fund.

Year after year, we appeal to the Worthy Matrons to have a project night and call on our chairmen to visit their chapters and inform them in regard to applying for help and to answer questions. Only a few ever respond, thus resulting in confusion when they are not prepared to handle a case when it is presented.

There is an important proviso in our rules which require a member to be in a chapter five years before obtaining assistance. This is to discourage those who join Orders such as ours just for the assistance they may obtain. Of course, in an emergency, the general chairman may obtain permission from our Worthy Grand Matron and the chairman of Finance committee. No worthy appeals properly presented have been rejected. This great humanitarian service gives special consideration to each applicant.

Among the many cases presented this year, the eldest member was 92 years and the youngest 47 years—with a membership from 8 years to 41 years. A widow with three teen-age boys, two of which have been very ill and hospitalized on several occasions has caused the mother to be in a very highly nervous condition.

A member 89 years old, mentally ill was placed in a rest home.

A member 83 years old was supplied a wheel chair with a leg rest to support her broken leg. At the same time, her daughter was in the hospital with a broken hip.

A sister who has no family only a sister in the East, had surgery on her ears. In order to supplement her funds, she does sewing and ironing. A sister had an eye removed and most unfortunately has glaucoma in the other eye. An elderly sister with no relatives and no funds was advised by the chairman to seek admittance to our Eastern Star Home. A widow who was supplied glasses and is a diabetic, broke her arm. When she overcame her difficulty, she secured part time work which necessitated her to walk 15 blocks to her work.

A brother with cancer on his face and side of his head had received the maximum amount of help from the J. Clifford Lee fund and needed our help.

We also assisted five members with blood replacements. Although we did not have the blood, we paid the hospital charges.

We also helped the families of three members with funeral expenses.

Attached hereto is a report in detail of the aid extended in the several areas. The year just ended \$7,830.15 has been allocated for relief from the Benevolent Fund.

It is recommended that the usual 10¢ per capita be allowed and the budgeted amount of \$20,000.00 be allowed for relief and \$200.00 for expenses.

Some of our chairmen have been generous and did not present an expense account because they feel it is a privilege to be of service.

Just another reminder to our Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons that they are the Relief Committee of their Chapters and should keep in close contact with their members so that no person who is in need is over-looked. "For it is only through service to others, giving of our truest and best, that our Star in its glorified splendor can lead to a Haven of rest."

The Committee is indebted to our Grand Secretary, sister Maud, for all her assistance and the cooperation of her fine office assistants, sisters Gladys and Thekla, who help us to be prompt in complying with our requests.

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lura Rae, we trust that your session will be very constructive and a happy one, also, that it will not be too strenuous for you.

Jesus had fed the multitudes from only a few loaves of bread, he had made the blind to see, the lame to walk and healed the sick by only the touch of His hand. But now it was time for the most wonderful miracle of all—the revelation of His Father's promise of life after death—the promise of Immortality.

Many of our members, this past year, have walked in faith through the doorway of Immortality—their names have been entered in the golden book by the angels in Heaven. One day in the valley beyond, we shall see them again. Let us remember, as we hear these words spoken in eulogy that it is His star in the East that we follow—it is His promise of Immortality in which we have Faith and Hope—and in which We Believe.

Where there is Faith, there is Love, Where there is Love, there is Peace; Where there is Peace, there is God And where there is God, there is no need. Her accomplishments were many. Above all she was at all times kind, gentle and courteous, these characteristics endeared her to her many co-workers as well as family and friends. Her name, her faith, her love shall live on memory's tablet bright and clear.

She was attending Friendship Night at Ocean Spray Chapter in Pacific Grove where she met with an accident which resulted in her death April 2, 1968.

Her record of service to the Order is an outstanding one. Just as the "Angelus" calls the toiler from his work and earthly pursuits to the contemplation of the spiritual, so too, does the custom of the Order of the Eastern Star at this appointed hour each year, pay tribute to their departed members.

Grace Stewart King, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star 1939-1940. Entered into rest March 28, 1968.

Sister Grace King was initiated in Santa Paula Chapter #185 on June 5, 1905 and served as the Worthy Matron in 1913. In 1928 she was appointed Deputy Grand Matron and her work in Grand Chapter led to her election in 1939 as Grand Treasurer.

Owing to illness, Sister Grace King was not active in her Chapter or in Grand Chapter for the past few years but always maintained her interest in the affairs of her Chapter and of the Order. She is especially missed by the members of her own Chapter and her entire home District.

Her soft sweet voice and genteel manner exemplified her beautiful way of life.

REPORT OF THE CANCER DRESSING COMMITTEE (Presented by Marguerite Forkey, Chairman Cancer Dressing Committee):

Sister Forkey explained that because of illness the other members of the Committee, Sisters Dorothy Graham of Santa Cruz Chapter and Georgia Coates of Electa Chapter, were unable to be present.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of our Order, Sisters and Brothers:

This year, Worthy Grand Matron, you have given me the opportunity to work with thousands of our members on this most worthwhile project which is so very close to many of us. We hope you are pleased with the accomplishment of 1967-1968.

My sincere thanks to Sister Marguerite Weisheimer for her wise counseling. She was always so willing to help in any way. No task was too great. Thank you, my dear.

During this year we have tried to visit as many of our Stations as possible. In some instances we inspected the work of fifteen Stations in one day by having a joint meeting. In this way we could get to know the Co-Workers and the quality of the work being done.

In visiting the Eastern Star Home and the Masonic Home in Union City, after talking with the Supervisor of Nurses, we found a need there for dressings. A special effort was made to supply the Homes with the needed dressings. These figures are reflected in our report. We have tried in every way to take care of our members and our Masonic families and we are pleased to give the surplus to the American Cancer Society for distribution to patients, free of charge.

As in all other areas, there has been an increase in the cost of materials this year which, in turn, cost us more to operate than in the previous year. There has been a decrease in Stations due to lack of patients in some areas. We have opened four Stations this year where the need existed. They are: (1) Night Station in Covina, (2) Gate City Station in San Bernardino, (3) Amador Valley Station in Livermore, and (4) Simi Valley Station in Simi. We now have a total of 118 Stations as of September 1, 1968.

To each Past Chairman who has assisted me this year as Area Chairman, my grateful thanks. You have made this year much easier for me and it has been a joy to work with you. To each Station Chairman and our devoted Co-Workers, you have been most anxious to assist and I appreciate your efforts to see that the dressings conform to our Manual.

My thanks to Sisters Blanche McKinley and Lillian Lehman for the Instruction Books which they prepared and to Sister Diane Dixon for the O.E.S. rubber stamps which we use on our packaged dressings.

The Fund raising events undertaken by the various groups have indeed helped the Fund. It is by your voluntary contributions that this Fund is maintained. We have tried to attend as many of your projects as possible. The Annual Tea given at the home of Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, was most successful. To each of you who have in any way contributed toward this most worthwhile endeavor, my sincere thanks.

We are now considering the proposed amendment to Section 463, "Masonic Affiliation or Relationship":

This is the section that was considered in a way last Grand Session, and in view of the fact that this is placed before you to comply with regulations of the General Grand Chapter, to which regulations we are bound, the Committee directs attention to the meaning and use of the word "affiliated" in the second line in your printed sheet, with what this word meant in relation to Master Masons.

Master Masons here should be extremely interested in the Committee's interpretation. The word "affiliated" to most Masons is surplusage because every Master Mason is bound by California Masonic law to belong to some Lodge. But, Brothers, let me point this out to you very carefully, under 434 of the Masonic Code, there is such a fellow in Masonry as a non-affiliate Mason who can take, and one year have a letter of good standing, and if he doesn't join a Lodge within that period, he loses his membership and good standing. Therefore, I think that the intent and meaning of this word "affiliated" as proposed to you here, was used to preclude a non-affiliated Mason from joining our Order. I want the record to clearly show that based on this interpretation, your Committee on Constitution and By-Laws recommends a Yes vote.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION

(Presented by Robert E. Armbrust, Jr., Chairman.)

The Publication Committee will make their report as brief and complete as possible.

As you recall, I was the proponent of the recommendation at last Grand Chapter Session, that we have an Official O.E.S. Publication in California. Our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lura Rae Dales on April 24, 1968, wrote to me asking that I act as Chairman of this special committee to investigate and report at the 1968 Session. She appointed Brother Edwin Collins, P.G.P., and Sara Lee Newman, P.M. of Composite Chapter to work with me. (Introduces committee.)

In compiling this report, assistance was solicited from qualified members. The Committee now gratefully acknowledges their help. As members our primary interest is that in the years to come Eastern Star members will have an active part; not a single member can evade his or her responsibility to the present; no Eastern Star can treat lightly his or her obligation to help build and maintain the rich heritage upon which our Order was founded.

It is there for all Eastern Star members to partake of, a way of life, an opportunity. But, before receiving, there is the necessity for having the desire to learn and the willingness to work for that which is of inestimable value. We of this committee feel that in having this way of life, there is a spirit of gratitude for the opportunity to learn and to be of service to others.

This committee agreed, with approval of the Worthy Grand Matron, that a "sample" type publication be submitted at Grand Chapter. I informed Sister Lure Rae of the proposed plan, and she endorsed the recommendation of distributing the sample copies at Grand Chapter.

Letters were sent to Grand Officers and Committee Members asking for information to make possible the Commemorative Issue; we thank them sincerely for their support and cooperation. All articles submitted could not be used due to lack of space, but we hope to use them in the future.

The intent of this Publication is to provide direct communication about the activities of the Order within our State and that our members may become better informed of the various facets of the O.E.S. such as: The O.E.S. Your support will be required in two ways. First, subscriptions; second, articles of interest to be sent to the Publication Board. To those of you who have secured Commemorative copies, you will find on the back page subscription forms. Should this Publication meet with the approval of this Grand Body, a minimum of 2,000 subscriptions will be required to start this Publication.

The Committee desires to publish four copies per year at a total cost of one dollar. We hope to publish the first issue in January. It is our hope in the years to come, it can be made available to all members in California.

The committee recommends:

- The Publication be non-profit, self supporting and controlled with no expense involved to Grand Chapter.
- The incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint one member to act as liaison between Grand Chapter and the Publication Board.
- A yearly report be submitted to Grand Chapter by the appointed member concerning pertinent data with respect to subscriptions, expenses, etc.

We earnestly solicit your support and acceptance.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE FOR RAINBOW BOARDS

The following is a report of the Special Committee appointed by our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lura Rae Dales, concerning selection of Advisory Boards as concerns the youth organizations which our chapters may sponsor.

Before giving the report I would like to present committee members Patricia McCubbin, Past Matron of Richmond Chapter, San Francisco, and Barbara Campbell, Past Matron of Fresno Chapter, now Supreme Deputy of Rainbow in California. Sister Barbara has been appointed to succeed Sister Flo McDonald who continues in the Supreme Office of Rainbow.

A meeting was held with Sister Eileen Dewhurst, Past Matron of Willow Glen Chapter who proposed the addition to Section 450

of the Constitution at our last Grand Session. This section sets forth the regulations that Youth Organizations may be sponsored by our chapters. Her proposal was submitted with the hope that it might assist Worthy Matrons who were confronted with problems concerning Advisory Boards.

Each of this special committee is familiar with youth groups and has studied this proposal. We are of the opinion that when a chapter accepts the responsibility of sponsorship of a youth group, they also accept the regulations which govern that organization.

It has been noted that few problems have arisen where action by this Grand Chapter would be in order, and therefore recommend that no action on the proposed amendment be taken by this Grand Chapter.

The committee suggests that the Grand Line Officers give to their respective subordinate officers that information which would enable them to perform the respective chapters' responsibilities when called upon. This committee would be most happy to assist them on this subject.

REPORT OF APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES COMMITTEE

(Presented by Marian Schwach, Chairman)

To the Grand Chapter of California:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron. Before giving our report, may I have the pleasure of presenting the very fine Committee that you appointed, and without which I could not have covered this vast State. We regret that Sister Annie Picknell Mills is not on the platform this afternoon, but her dear Husband has that old bug or you know she would be here. We do have our Past Grand Patron, Brother James Hoole, and may I at this time, Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for appointing this fine Brother on the Committee with me, for without his counsel and advice, I know many of our problems could not have been solved.

We, your Committee on Appeals and Grievances had hoped to bring you a report showing that harmony prevailed in all the Chapters of this Grand Jurisdiction. But, alas, several problems have been called to our attention which we feel you, the delegates, should be informed of. It seems to this committee that many of the problems which arise in Chapters are the result of a clash of personalities and a complete lack of understanding or recognition of the fact that everyone has a right to their own opinion. Too many times members try to force their own viewpoint or decision upon the other members. Consequently problems come up and the result is that this committee is called in. We found many cases where a decision was requested, and where in our opinion, only the members of the Chapter could solve the problem.

We have discovered that most of the discord in the Chapters arises from the misuse of the Black Cube.

The matter of the "black cube being cast", particularly in the case of Masons, many times against Masons who are Officers in the Line of their Lodge, is cause for great concern to this committee. If such a trend were to continue it could in the not-too-distant future cause the Grand Master of Masons in California to issue an edict forbidding Lodge Officers to become members of the Order of the Eastern Star.

We cannot stress too strongly the fact that the Black Cube is for our protection and should never be used in a personal or spiteful way, nor for a dishonorable motive.

Also, divulging how one balloted, attempting to seek out the member who cast the black ball. Also continued discussion regarding the result of a ballot is a serious problem in many Chapters.

It saddened us to learn that the petition of a Job's Daughter was threatened with the Black Cube. Upon investigation, the only cause given was "She was a spoiled brat".

My Sisters and Brothers, the Order of the Eastern Star needs the youth of our Masonic families and we urge that all our members give this matter very serious consideration.

Loyalty to the Order should be practiced at all times. We find people who are not members of the Order too well informed on the activities of our Chapters. Remember we must maintain a discreet silence at all times concerning the business of our Chapters.

We rejoice in the knowledge that those Chapters which appealed for assistance have successfully and harmoniously solved their difficulties. Several that have not, have been referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for further investigation.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for the privilege of serving you and our Grand Chapter. We have endeavored to give advice and encouragement bearing in mind that only "Love Can Make Us Kind".

REPORT OF THE CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE

(Presented by Ellen Walters, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session, Sisters and Brothers:

Worthy Grand Matron, may I present the other two members of the Consolidation Committee before making the report. I have the honor of presenting Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, who has served on this Committee with a dedicated purpose and a firm belief in the need for consolidation and its benefits to our Order in the State of California. Sister Esther Sandman served with us, but we understand she has been called from the Chapter room and we are sorry that she is not with us at present.

We, the members of the Consolidation Committee, feel that we have been honored and given a great privilege by serving on this newly formed Committee. It has been most interesting, most enlightening and we have found the members to be grateful for all information and assistance given to them.

Each Chapter that has been visited has kept their problems hidden as if in shame but the problem is the same throughout the State—"Unable to obtain a full corps of Officers." We have found that there are several reasons for the above stated problem.

- 1. Geographical location.
- 2. Lack of interest by younger members.
- The same Past Matrons and Past Patrons have carried their Chapter until they are tired.
- 4. Too many demands on the Officers, especially when a Line Officer is required "to balance the Budget."
- Prejudices.
- The wrong information having been given regarding Consolidation.

We do feel that there is a lack of knowledge regarding Consolidation and urge the Chapters to invite a member of the Committee to speak at one of their meetings. Those opposing Consolidation without knowing all of the facts regarding a Chapter's condition, should always consider this factor. If a Chapter is allowed to keep going down because of lack of Officers and interest, they soon are willing to give up from discouragement. Then, if a Chapter gives up its Charter, we lose many members.

Fireside Chapter No. 440 and Harmony Chapter No. 124 were consolidated in November, 1967 by Brother James Millard, P.G.P., before this Committee was active. Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, P.G.M., and Brother James Millard, P.G.P., were the Installing Officers. The Installation made that Consolidation complete.

On February 5th, 1968, a member of the Consolidation Committee met with the Committees appointed by Taft and Buena Vista Chapters. Both Chapters were anxious to complete all details. The Consolidation meeting was held on February 6th, 1968 and their Consolidation was completed by their Installation on February 20th, 1968 of the Officers of Taft Chapter No. 337 by Sister Esther Sandman, P.G.M.

On March 6th, 1968, after the regular stated meeting, the Consolidation meeting was held for the consolidation of California Chapter No. 183 and Yerba Buena Chapter No. 228. On March 20th, 1968, all Officers of California Chapter No. 183 were declared installed, authorized by a special ruling of the Jurisprudence Committee, except the Associate Conductress who was regularly installed. Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, P.G.M., was the Installing Officer and Brother Francis Herz, P.G.P., gave the Obligation. All Officers were re-obligated that night.

On April 10th, 1968, a member of this Committee met with Nimshi Chapter, No. 424, at their request. This Chapter voted to consolidate but this has not been consummated. Further meetings and plans for consolidation are continuing as Nimshi Chapter feels that it must consolidate and the members do not wish to give up their Charter.

The following Chapters were visited at the Chapters request for a member of this Committee to visit said Chapter to discuss their problem and to answer questions.

Chabot Chapter, No. 571—June 12th, 1968

Mary E. Partridge Chapter No. 308-June 14th, 1968

Rosa M. Shattuck Chapter—July 22nd, 1968

Trinity Chapter No. 434—September 3rd, 1968

Encina Chapter—September 13th, 1968

At these meetings and many others not listed, all questions were answered and the procedure for surrendering the Charter or Consolidation was given at the members' request.

On September 13th, a member of the Consolidation Committee met with West Lake Chapter after they had voted to consolidate. South Gate and West Lake Chapters have voted to consolidate. The Installation will be held on November 19th, 1968, making this Consolidation complete as all details are being worked out harmoniously.

A member of this Committee met with Magnolia Chapter No. 73 at the request of the Worthy Matron and the Worthy Grand Matron.

It was a meeting to answer questions at which time, the members realized that all would have to give more support to their Chapter. I am sure that this Chapter will have a full corps of Officers in 1969.

At the request of the Worthy Matron of Kingsburg Chapter and the Worthy Grand Matron, a member of this Committee met with the members of Kingsburg Chapter on September 26th, 1968. Sanger, Selma and Reedley Chapter members had been invited. All asked questions regarding Consolidation and surrendering their Charters. This meeting was most harmonious and it is felt that this area will work out their problems in a fine manner in the near future.

It is recommended by this Committee that the Consolidation Committee serving in 1969 meet with Sister Florence Dunn, the W.G.M., and Sister Maud McWilliams Smith, the Grand Secretary, to work out a definite format to be used in the future. Suggested format is attached.

That information such as on the attached sheet be sent to all Chapters.

That all Chapters be notified that any Chapter interested in Consolidation or wishing information, may vote to request a member of the Consolidation Committee to attend a meeting for this purpose.

Since this report was written, two Chapters in San Francisco have voted to consolidate. Victory Chapter No. 388 and Occidental Chapter No. 280. Further meetings will be held with the Committees in the future.

Further report on Westlake Chapter No. 268 and South Gate Chapter No. 133—The Consolidation meeting was held on October 15th, 1968 and the Installation will be on November 19th, 1968. The name of this new Chapter will be South Gate No. 133.

We, the members of this Consolidation Committee wish to emphasize the fact that our efforts have been to retain our members, increase our membership and the attendance at the meetings and to find the answer to the lack of interest by the members in so many Chapters.

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve you and Grand Chapter on this fine Committee Worthy Grand Matron. We thank you.

I would like to thank our Worthy Grand Matron for the kind consideration given to me to extend the honor to present this fine lady this evening. Sister Lura Rae, your consideration is deeply appreciated.

I am particularly pleased to have the opportunity to present to you the Grand Guardian this evening, because this fine lady was a part of the Grand Family in which I served as Associate Grand Guardian in 1964, and I came to know her very well.

As you know, in our Grand Chapter of California, no one ascends to the high office of Worthy Grand Matron without first having served our Grand Chapter in many ways, and may I assure you, Sisters and Brothers, that the same rule holds true in Job's Daughters.

This fine lady has devoted many years of her life to the service of our youth groups and it gives me a great deal of pleasure to present to you my friend, Sister Lois Barnett, Grand Guardian of the Grand Guardian Council of California, International Order of Job's Daughters.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of Grand Chapter, Order of Eastern Star:

Thank you for allowing me the privilege of coming to your Grand Session with our Grand Bethel Honored Queen. It is indeed an honor for us to be here this evening.

We, who are so fortunate as to be able to work with the young girls of Masonic Heritage, appreciate more now, than at any other time in our years of service, that the influence of our girls can be a deciding factor in the years ahead of us. In Job's Daughters, a girl must have a Masonic relative in order to become a member.

This relative may be a grandfather, an uncle or someone other than her father. We have known many times of fathers who have become interested in Masonry as a result of the friendships they have made with other parents while attending Job's Daughters meetings and other functions.

I ask each one of you to offer your hand in friendship to our young girls. We need to let them know that we have faith in them, that there is a place for them in our adult Order of Eastern Star, and that we are sincerely interested in them and want them to join us. They need to know that we believe in them.

As members of the Order of Eastern Star, each one of us, in our own area of the State, could do much to improve the relationship between the International Order of Job's Daughters and the Order of Eastern Star. You are more than welcome at our meetings. We want you to come and get to know our girls. Many of our girls are eligible to belong to Eastern Star. If they have the opportunity to become acquainted with you and to develop friendships with you, they will want to join the Eastern Star when they reach the proper age. It is important to the International Order of Job's Daughters to have you as their friends and adult workers.

Many of our Bethel Guardian Councils would welcome your offers of help. Every Bethel needs the cooperation of the adult groups which share the same Masonic Temple for meetings. Our young people need the support and approval of adults as they never have before. They need to know that we care about them and their future. To work with these young girls is to love them.

I now have the pleasure of presenting to you Miss Gayle Stiltner, Grand Bethel Honored Queen of the State of California and Past Honored Queen of Bethel 256, Albany.

Gayle Stiltner, Grand Bethel Honored Queen:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star:

Thank you for the honor of representing Job's Daughters at this Session of the Grand Chapter. Mrs. Dales, when you attended the Grand Bethel held in Oakland last June, we learned that you are a majority member of Job's Daughters. To our knowledge, you are the first majority member of our Order to serve as Worthy Grand Matron of the State of California, Order of the Eastern Star. We are proud to present these Grand Bethel records to you and to Mr. Lutz. We appreciate the support that the members of your Order have given to Job's Daughters.

Who is a Job's Daughter? A Job's Daughter is a girl approaching womanhood who has a Masonic Heritage.

Girls are eligible for membership in Job's Daughters at the age of 12 and reach majority membership at age 20 or when married. Each girl must have a relationship to a Master Mason in good standing or who was in good standing at the time of his death.

At 12 years, girls are still developing character. A Job's Daughter is a girl developing the qualities of character that will enhance her life.

The teachings of the International Order of Job's Daughters is based on the Book of Job, found in the Old Testament. The girl learns that faith in God will help overcome any trial that she may face in life. Through her Masonic heritage, a girl is also developing her character. She learns about filial love. Parents are encouraged to attend all activities of Job's Daughters. This brings the girl and her parents closer, enhancing this filial love and promoting friendship between parents and children at a time when the parent-child dependency bond is changing in order that the girl may become an adult.

Part of growing up is developing friendships. Job's Daughters provides the opportunity for girls to develop friendships with others that may last a lifetime. There are many opportunities to make friendships with members of the other Masonic youth organizations.

Any adult with proper Masonic relationship may attend our meetings. This develops friendships between girls and adults and bridges the generation gap so that girls and adults know each other.

Part of character development is learning to help others. Compassion is a womanly virtue. Joh's Daughters are engaged in charitable projects and extend the hand of friendship to those in need of love and friendship.

Job's Daughters is a learning organization. Girls learn to work and to speak with people. A girl is encouraged to increase her knowledge in order to communicate more effectively. Job's Daughters gain poise and beauty of character when they live up to the teachings of the Bethel.

A Job's Daughter is encouraged to be loyal to her country and to take an active interest in the affairs of the nation.

A woman is virtuous. A girl following the teachings emphasized by Job's Daughters will act and think in accordance with virtues emphasized in her religious heritage and in her Masonic background. She will have the character that will make her beautiful from her youth into her old age. She will be a true example of womanhood, worthy of the description of Job's own daughters (Job 42:15) "and in all the land were no women found so fair as the daughters of Job; and their father gave them inheritance among their brethren."

Having been a Charter Member of Bethel No. 120 in Huntington Beach, your organization is very close to my heart. We appreciate the purposes and the accomplishments of your members and wish we had the opportunity to individually express to each member of your Order throughout the State that we are anxious and eager to welcome into our membership all those who possess the proper Masonic affiliation.

I thank you most sincerely for your presentation of these choir recordings and I am sorry it was impossible for me to remain longer with you in Oakland last June. To hear these voices in person—for me music is an important part of our lives, music is love, music is happiness, music is so many things to each of us—and for this Grand Bethel Honored Queen Doll from the Grand Guardian Council of Job's Daughters, I express my sincere appreciation, for it will mean the youth that I remember, that happiness in the Bethel, the training I feel it gave me for my Eastern Star work, the footing it gave me for life, and it will also remind me of my little niece who is joining the same Bethel in Huntington Beach.

It was a very special privilege to attend the Grand Assembly Session in Long Beach last April and to see the enthusiasm exhibited there by the many Rainbow Girls in attendance, and I appreciate the courtesies that were extended to me when I visited.

The announcement of their Grand Officers was a thrilling experience to witness. It was there, I saw Gayle Marsh receive the

news of her appointment as the Grand Worthy Advisor for this year. She was a delightful mixture of smiles and tears, indicating emotions of surprise, excitement and joy that were hers at that moment.

Barbara Campbell, Supreme Deputy, Order of Rainbow for Girls:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star:

Somewhere over the Rainbow is a land of beauty and perfection but, here on earth, we face the strife of daily living and, the never-ending search for our life's purpose. 15,679 girls in California "Look to the Rainbow" for answers. We hope that within the pages of their Rainbow ritual they will find inspiration and knowledge which, when put with that which comes from their Holy Bible, will give them a firm foundation on which to stand. We also trust that their opportunities to serve others will make them better women. This past year, the Grand Worthy Advisor's project earned \$6,400 for the purpose of training another therapist for the Clinic at San Bernardino for Brain-Damaged Children. In addition, the assemblies in their own areas donated 128,121 hours of service and, over \$16,000 for the good of others. The leading assembly in service was San Rafael No. 195. To encourage the Rainbow Girls in our state to further their education, nine scholarships with a total value of \$2,100 were granted by the Grand Assembly. We thank our Worthy Grand Matron for setting aside this time at Grand Chapter that the youth activities might be presented. We are grateful to the Order of the Eastern Star for the 91 women who serve as Grand Deputies in California Rainbow, and, for the 248 ladies who are our Mother Advisors. We are also thankful for the thousands of Master Masons and Eastern Star Members who serve on the local Advisory Boards, and, our state Grand Executive Committee. We hope that the girls' association with these fine people will encourage them to want to continue their fraternal life (if they are eligible) after they reach their Rainbow majority at the age of 20. These girls, the members of Job's Daughters and the boys of DeMolay could be the future of our Eastern Star chapters and, this Grand Chapter. We are proud of the projects of our OrderGeneral Grand, Grand Chapter and, locally—but, I would urge you to remember that these young people are also our project. A few hours spent with them are really a lot more rewarding than equal time spent at the Bridge table or, in front of your television set. Won't you consider saying "yes" this year when someone approaches you to work with one of our Masonic Youth Groups? These are the cream of the crop of American youth—and, they need you!

Gayle Marsh, Grand Worthy Advisor in California, International Order Rainbow for Girls:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, distinguished and honored members, members of the Grand Chapter in California:

It is indeed an honor to speak to you this evening. On behalf of the Grand Assembly in California Order of the Rainbow for Girls, I thank you for allowing me to be here with each of you and I extend to you a most cordial invitation to visit us in our assemblies this coming year.

Try to imagine your life without money, many beautiful clothes, a fine home or a good education. It wouldn't be easy to live like this, would it? All our lives we have been dependent upon these material things to help us to live as we grow and develop into, successful and prosperous adults. But wealth and prosperity do not need to play an all-important role in our lives, and they are not necessarily measures of greatness or success.

Kindness, thoughtfulness, and love play a much more important role in life than money ever could. For, since the very beginning of life, these virtues have been a basic foundation of man. down from the cross and laid in a borrowed grave through the courtesy of a friend. Nineteen wide centuries have come and gone, and today he is the centerpiece of the human race and the leader of all human progress. All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that were ever built, all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has this one solitary personality.

We should all have patience, kindness and love for the common, the poor and the quiet man, for he, too, has his story. REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

(Presented by Francis White, member of Committee.)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates of this Grand Chapter:

It is a happy privilege to submit the following report from the Scholarship Committee:

This year a total of 269 applications were received. Of these, 22 were for religious training including 4 regrants, 15 for general education regrants, and the 232 first-time applications for general education grants. By sending out over 100 postcards, we were able to complete all but seven applications. Most applicants send in all necessary papers, but some students have no way of knowing that school transcripts and recommendation letters have not come in unless we notify them.

The Scholarship Fund totaled \$27,982 this year. We gratefully acknowledge the contributions and memorials which allowed more worthy young people to pursue a higher education.

To comply with the Constitution of the Grand Chapter, a letter was sent in January to each chapter of the Order in California: To the Order of Rainbow for Girls, the Bethels of Job's Daughters, and the Order of DeMolay informing them of the scholarships available to students of fine scholastic records who are in need of financial assistance to further their education. Also, a reminder letter was sent explaining that the members of the Eastern Star who desire to continue their education in institutes of higher learning were also eligible for the awards open to high school seniors entering college, and to college students or graduates desiring to pursue studies in Theological Seminary or College. Recipients of former years are eligible to apply for regrants.

Sister Esther Scott, the chairman for 1967, up-dated and compiled an excellent handbook to be used by future chairmen. A very special thanks to Sister Esther in recognition of her excellent service.

The Chairman's responsibility is to receive and assemble all five parts of the application, and to mail sets of 12 to 15 completed applications to members of the Committee for evaluation. Each application is studied carefully and then each committee member records in writing "Yes", "No" or "Discuss" with any necessary pertinent comment concerning his individual decision. The chairman sorts the applications according to the preliminary evaluations and

groups them into 15 areas, following roughly the boundaries of the benevolent districts. This helps to give an even distribution throughout the state.

Because of the advance work done, we had time to make a careful selection of recipients. Every aspect of each application was considered in order to make the fairest possible selection. We regret that all worthy and needy students could not have been helped.

All five members of the Committee met in the great city of San Francisco on July 11 and 12. This was a happy group—maybe because of the location—, but also because we were to give money away for all of you! A total of 112 awards were made. Of these, 67 were \$300 and 45 were \$150. Four members of the Eastern Star received awards under the new ruling adopted in 1966. The majority of the recipients belong to our youth groups or belong to Masonic families. Certain ethnic groups were recipients of our awards.

Each applicant received a congratulatory letter or one of regret. Sister Maud and her staff sent out checks for the first half of the awards in August. The wonderful letters of appreciation continue to pour in, and each message would assure every member of this Order that the rewards to our society are worthy of our efforts and to realize that our continued financial help is essential.

Sister Maud, our Grand Secretary and always a Grand Friend, along with her competent staff deserves all the accolades that words can express. And a very sincere thanks to each of you.

Each Committee Member appreciates the opportunity of serving Grand Chapter on this most important project. Since this is my fifth and last year I wish to express my thanks and gratitude to my Grand Matron for this appointment and rewarding experience.

As your chairman this year, and a counselor for the largest community college in California, I submit the following recommendations for your consideration:

- 1. Retain the \$150 award for the student attending a community or 2-year college. To date, there are no tuition charges for this public institution.
- Raise the amount from \$150 to \$200 for the student attending a 4-year college or university and who continues living at home.
- Continue with the \$300 for all students attending a 4-year school and living away from home.
- 4. Contribute to the ESTARL Fund so that all may know that the members of the Grand Chapter of California support and commend our Grand Sisters serving the General Grand Chapter.

These are certainly token amounts but most students need only some financial assistance, and a good many need the recognition and encouragement from the members of our Grand Order.

I have been very happy and I appreciate the assignment this morning of giving to you a few words on our last and final morning of this Grand Chapter.

I think all of us since Monday morning have been walking across this bridge that you see right in back of me. Now I suppose tomorrow morning it will be nice to rest and refresh ourselves and lie down and repose, because it has no doubt been a rather strenuous duty to walk across the bridge since Monday, and as we come to the end of this bridge we do look back at our thoughts of tomorrow and to our lifetime.

We will remember what a pleasant job it has been from the time the gavel was first sounded on Monday until this noon. I am certain that you will reflect that it has been one of the most successful, constructive, and efficiently executed sessions which has been full of lots of things that belong to our Order, and we will rejoice in our own minds that we had the privilege of attending this session under the leadership of Sister Lura Rae and Brother Robert.

Also, their dedication and to the Grand Officers who have been so faithful through the year and who tomorrow will retire, they will be glad today that day is over and sad tomorrow that it ended today. I think that is as it should be, Sisters and Brothers, and we come here and emulate the great virtues of our Order. Ninety-five years is a long time in the life of a human being. Very few people reach that age and very few organizations in this State are that old, and yet we are 95 years and I feel the pleasure this morning of in this 95th year having the distinction of walking to the East with a great leader of a few years ago, Sister Helen, who has never ceased to give all she could to the Order since that time. She always does something when you ask her to do it.

I have enjoyed the last few days and I would like to recall to those in the audience and all of us that you realize now as you cross this bridge for the last time that behind the scenes of this great Order there are many hands and many minds at work, yet we recognize it couldn't be an Order without you. We recognize it wouldn't be an Order without your splendid attendance since Monday night. I compliment you on it. You have been here early and you have stayed through the end.

So it is going to be a challenge to you this coming year, for the Officers coming in, and I ask you to meet that challenge, each and every one of you in this building this morning.

A great American said a few years ago, "It is not what America can give to you, it is what you can give to America," and I am going to say it is not what your Chapters can give to you, but what can you give to your Chapters.

You can give more loyalty and more dedication than you probably have.

Sisters and Brothers, we're going to live through a period we have never gone before. It probably is because of our neglect of the youth of the land. Before I came up here I talked to one of the great leaders of the boys' organization of DeMolays, the Master Councilor and his father and a brother belong to the Fraternal Order, and when I asked him why he didn't belong he said, "What does it have to offer?" Imagine that, it is their parents fault to sit down and not making something out of his life. One of the most respected men in the State and he says to me, "What does it have to offer to me? If I thought it offered something I would be glad to join."

We have not put into the hearts and minds of the youth what we should. We have neglected them and I think you and I, it behoves us to give these youngsters all we can. The Masonic Order is doing many things and I have no fear that the fraternal life is fading away, but I must say this, you can make it different, you can make it different as you approach this next year becoming involved, you Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons and Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons. Conductresses, and I challenge you to go home with new rededication, to give back something to your Order it has given to you throughout this glorious week we have had.

Do not go back and sit there and just talk about it, think in your mind, yes, "have I given all I can?"

If you have a problem, find the solution. Sisters and Brothers, you can make the difference. Shall we change this course and reverse the trend in the road we have traveled down, down and down to maybe oblivion as time goes on? Let's turn it around and climb the hill again. Thank you.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON 25-YEAR PINS

(Presented by Florence Dunn, Associate Grand Matron.)

To the Grand Chapter of California:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored East, Sisters and Brothers:

Our Worthy Grand Matron appointed our Grand Conductress, Associate Grand Conductress and myself to serve on a Committee regarding our 25-year pins.

We felt that the selection and the sale of the pins should be handled through the Grand Chapter office, so we asked our Grand Secretary to write to various jewelers and get the prices on the 25-year pins. The decision was that it should be a pin similar to our 50-year pin, a little smaller, and with 25 instead of 50. It should be in silver instead of gold.

We received several prices from jewelers. We were unable to get a sample because the special die would have to be made and we couldn't pay for one pin. The prices that the Grand Chapter would charge for the pins, if our Grand Chapter ordered the pins in lots of 1,000 at a time, would be \$2.70. If we had to order them in lots of 500 instead of 1,000, we would have to charge \$2.90. We feel that the members should be aware of the cost of the pins.

If the Chapter decided to give the pins, the first year it would be quite an item in your budget, but if the pins are to be ordered, I personally feel the Grand Chapter Secretary should have an idea whether she should order 500 or 1,000.

This is the report we have. I am sorry we cannot give you samples, but the charge for the best pin would be a charge of \$2.70 or \$2.90 for each pin. Thank you.

Motion from the Floor, properly seconded, that the report be accepted and that the pins be purchased in lots of 1,000. Discussion followed and an amendment to the motion was made by Betty Nagy, Worthy Matron of Golden West Chapter, properly seconded, to delete all reference to the number of pins to be purchased, so that the motion would simply say that we would accept the report of this Committee. Carried. Vote on original motion as amended, Carried.

REPORT OF THE DIVINE SERVICES COMMITTEE

(Presented by Lillian Pihl, Chairman.)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of our Order, Sisters and Brothers:

As we began planning for Divine Services at this Grand Chapter Session, it was our hope that we might again hold our own service, as has been done in recent years. However, after carefully investigating the costs and other factors involved, it was determined that it would not be feasible to hold a service in this Auditorium. It therefore became necessary to seek a church which would accommodate the several hundred of our members in addition to the regular congregation. We were pleased when we learned that Grace Cathedral, Episcopal, would welcome us to their eleven o'clock service on Sunday, October 20th, as Grace Cathedral is considered one of the most beautiful edifices of its kind on the Pacific Coast, the organ the finest in the area, and the organist-choir director, Richard Purvis,

a renowned contemporary musician and composer. The response in attendance of our members was most gratifying.

A most cordial welcome to the members of the Eastern Star was extended by the Vice-Dean of the Cathedral, Canon David Forbes, who announced that tours of the Cathedral would be conducted for our members following the service.

The sermon was delivered by the Right Reverend Philip B. Parma, Bishop in the Anglican Church in Delhi, India, who was en route to his home from the Lambeth Conference and a tour of eastern and midwestern areas of the Episcopal Church.

We regret that the acoustics in the Cathedral made it impossible for some to hear all parts of the service. We have been told that because of the high vaulted ceilings the reverberation is almost six seconds, which causes distortion of all but low pitched voices. We hope, however, that the beauty of the edifice, the music of the chimes, organ and choir, the Ceremony of the Giving of the Peace, and the dignity of the service brought to each one a measure of personal inspiration.

My sincere appreciation is extended to Brother Arthur Cressey, a member of the Activities Committee, for making the original contacts and assisting in arrangements for the service.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for giving me this opportunity of serving Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

(Presented by Herbert Duenckel, Chairman)

To the Grand Chapter of California:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers:

Regarding the question in the Grand Secretary's report, should the Rituals issued to the subordinate Chapters be exchanged without cost because of changes made by General Grand Chapter:

Considering that each Chapter is issued six Rituals, and that the changes made by General Grand Chapter are minor and not numerous, that paste-in changes have been furnished and are available at a nominal cost, that it is estimated that the cost of new Rituals for all Chapters would approximate \$8,000, and as Chapters in the past have been charged when they have requested an exchange of Rituals, it is recommended by the Finance Committee that new Rituals should not be issued for all Chapters, but only be replaced as ordered by a Chapter with payment of the customary fee for such replacement.

Everina Rheingans Helen Isberg Robert C. Atkinson Herbert Duenckel, Chairman

Recommendation of the Committee Adopted.

Brother Duenckel stated his Committee did not have the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron regarding signing checks. Sister Dales explained that while the Worthy Grand Matron was authorized to sign checks from the Savings Accounts, she was not authorized to sign any checks on the checking accounts and that this could be done by the Finance Committee's action at the beginning of the year unless we want to institute legislation which she did not feel would be wise.

Brother Duenckel asked if this is a matter that must be passed on by the Grand Chapter, or can it be taken care of by the Finance Committee.

The Worthy Grand Matron replied it was taken care of by the Finance Committee last year and in her opinion could be done by their action.

Brother Duenckel:

With that we will take it up with the Finance Committee and take action on it.

Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you. This recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron is being referred to the Finance Committee for consideration at its first meeting.

To the Grand Chapter of California:

We have discussed with the Jurisprudence Committee and the Constitution and By-Laws Committees the matter of the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron regarding the appointing of a special convention committee to look into convention sites, the expense involved and to get proper contracts and see that they are signed.

The joint committees approve this recommendation and suggest such a committee be appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron-elect.

Robert Lutz, Worthy Grand Patron:

The year is drawing to a close and our Grand Chapter is about to install new officers. Such is the nature of our Order, each year we change and we have changing roles. However, in the past two years I have had many varied experiences, all of which have added to my enjoyment of my service to you. Our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons have been an outstanding group of officers this year. I am sure our Worthy Grand Matron is as proud of you as I am. You strictly adhered to the high ideals of our Order. You have exhibited your ability to lead us on the road to our East Way of Life.

I have enjoyed each of the Robert M. Lutz Associations and my friendship with you.

I would urge you as we leave our active service as officers to remember that we, too, owe allegiance and loyalty to those who follow us in the same manner that those who preceded us.

At 1:45 P.M. the Session was called to refreshment until 7:30 P.M.

Recessional:

The Recessional was very simple. The floor was cleared and the Worthy Matrons, carrying parasols, with the Worthy Patrons, in top hats, formed a double line from East to West. The Worthy Grand Matron, with her husband and the Worthy Grand Patron with his wife, left the Grand East through garden gates at the ends of the garden wall at the rear of the stage. The Grand Officers, followed by the 1968 Deputy Grand Matrons left the room through the aisle formed by the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons.

Friday Evening Session

At 7 o'clock the audience was entertained by organ music by Sister Vereien Bourne, Past Matron of Burlingame Chapter No. 275.

The motto for 1969, "Have Faith in Your Heart and Love for One Another", was displayed in the West, the stage was the garden entrance to a Cathedral with a stained-glass window in the background. Around the baleony were displayed yellow roses alternating with the emblem of 1969—a fountain.

A twelve-foot-high fountain stood in the southeast section of the room. The Presidents of the Florence Dunn Associations, wearing yellow caps, were grouped at the foot of the fountain as the Worthy Grand Matron-elect, Sister Florence Dunn, appeared at the foun-

tainhead, and the balance of the Associate Matrons, wearing yellow headpieces, formed a yellow rose at the fountain. The narration was given by Past Patron Robert Gwinn of Celandine Chapter No. 223.

Narration:

Come with us into the Garden of Faith and Prayer. How tranquil it seems to enter the Garden for a moment and to breathe deeply of the fragrance of the flowers and shrubs after the hurly-burly rush of life. We pause perhaps at the fountain to quench our thirst, drinking deeply of the cool, sweet water—and then rush on to be caught up again by the rush of the world—lest we be left behind. But would it be so terrible to be left behind?—At least for a little while? Why not retrace our steps and sit for a time in the Garden—taking time not only to breathe of the refreshing air, but time to look at the beauty of the grass as well as the flowers and shrubs. As we look we become aware of the symmetry of the leaves and flowers. We become aware of the magnificence of the lowly blade of grass and our hearts cry out with the poet "Oh Lord my God-when I in awesome wonder consider all the worlds Thy hands have made—I see the stars—I hear the rolling thunder—Thy power throughout the universe displayed-Then sings my soul-My Saviour God to Thee-How great Thou art, how great Thou art."

Humbled, and no longer anxious to leave, we wander to the fountain again—catching a few glistening drops on our fingers—and we realize again the wisdom and greatness of God in providing drop by drop the water for the fountain and for the needs of the growing things of the Garden.

It must have been with somewhat of this feeling that Sister Florence chose as her emblem The Fountain of Life. It must have been with somewhat of this feeling that she told her Associate Matrons:

"Life is really like a Fountain for in a fountain the water swirls around and then, it rises to a beautiful peak, making a lovely picture. It remains for awhile and then, it falls gracefully into the water, perhaps later to rise again. So it is with Life—we are born and then, because of our Faith and efforts, we rise above the obstacles in our way. Life is not perfect for any of us, at all times. Something happens and we fall but again, we rise as in the fountain, if we only have Faith. Then, comes the time in our life as with the Fountain, that we return to the place from whence we came—content to remain."

Each stream has its beginning and each fountain must have its source, flowing forth from the fountain the water brings sustenance to the growing things that it supplies. The growing things in turn give back into the atmosphere some of this same moisture, which, under the watchful care of God falls to the earth again to re-

plenish the source. And so a never-ending cycle assures water for both the fountain and plant life.

Our Order is somewhat like a fountain, giving and being replenished. We are the drops of water that give of ourselves that the source might be replenished. Into the charge of Sister Florence we have placed the responsibility of channeling to the waters to meet our needs and requirements. Upon us then falls the duty of giving her our utmost support, that the heauty and influence of our Order be not interrupted.

Maybe we are a little surprised at ourselves because, having taken a little time for meditation, we find we cannot leave the Garden just yet. Suddenly we are struck with the realization that if God fashioned the flowers—and He did—if God fashioned each blade of grass—and He did—and if God concerned Himself with the continuous replenishing of the fountain—then He must care about each one of us—and He does.

We realize that from the Garden of Eden, to and through the Garden of Gethsemane, God has been telling us through His Word that He who marks the sparrow's fall is concerned for us and desires fellowship with each one of us. We suddenly see that the Bible, God's Holy Word, is the same—yesterday, today and forever, and His yearning and pleading, His admonitions and instructions do not stop when we close the Bible. God is not at all like the product advertised on TV where replacing the lid on a jar stops the music.

H. R. Palmer knew this when he looked upon a rose, perhaps a yellow rose, and was inspired to write:

"There's a Rose that is blooming for you, friend There's a Rose that is blooming for me Its perfume is pervading the world, friend Its perfume is for you and for me.

Long ago in the valley so far, friend
Far away by the beautiful sea
This pure Rose in its beauty first bloomed, friend
And it blooms still for you and for me.

All in vain did they crush this fair Flow'r, friend All in vain did they shatter the tree, For its roots, deeply bedded, sprang forth, friend And it blooms still for you and for me.

There's a Rose, a lovely Rose

And its beauty all the world shall see;
There's a Rose, a lovely Rose,

Its perfume is for you and for me."

If we would share that fragrance, we must realize that in this Garden is more than we can see. This is the Garden of Prayer. It was Tennyson who wrote:

"More things are wrought by Prayer

Than the world dreams of. Wherefore let thy voice

Rise like a fountain for me night and day.

For what are men better than sheep or goats
That nourish a blind life within the brain
If, knowing God, they lift not hands of Prayer
Both for themselves and those who call them friend
For so the whole round world is every way
Bound by gold chains about the feet of God."

Even as a fountain is useless without water, and God's word is meaningless unless it is absorbed—so life is useless without prayer. As a fountain provides for a Garden's growth, so prayer provides for our spiritual growth. Prayer is not telling God what we are going to do, nor is it telling Him what we want Him to do. It is a two-way communication with us doing most of the listening. John Gilbert wrote:

"Our Faith is quickened by our word of Prayer and I am abundantly prospered
Our Faith is quickened by our word of Prayer and I see the Light
Our Faith is quickened by our word of Prayer and I am healed and restored."

Yes, our Garden is also a Garden of Faith—"and faith is the substance of things hoped for—the evidence of things not seen." And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him.

Have you come to worship Him? He who worships Him, must worship Him in Spirit and in Truth.

This people draweth nigh unto Me with their mouth and honoreth Me with their lips but their hearts is far from Me but in vain do they worship Me.

Solo:

"Oh, the Beautiful Garden of Faith and Prayer." Joseph Uttz, Past Patron of Guardian Chapter No. 439.

Narration:

It isn't the sower that makes the grass grow, The flowers to bloom, and the wheat to bear grain, It is the word of God.

In our Garden of Faith, let your prayers be for understanding of His law and your Garden be full of the beauty of true friendship which you have sown with kindness and service. Strive to supply your faith with virtue, your virtue with knowledge, your knowledge with self-control, your self-control with patience, your patience with piety, your piety with fraternal love, and your fraternal love with charity.

May your leadership as Worthy Grand Patron be fruitful; that you be a door of the Word so that by example all members will remember their Creator and drink from the Fountain of Life.

At the close of the narration Sister Dunn and the Association Matrons left the formation.

The Worthy Grand Patron-elect, Brother Richard Brassell, was escorted to the center of the room where a triangle was formed by white-robed members of Job's Daughters, a tribute to his achievements in the Order of Job's Daughters in California. This formation was held for a few moments as a Job's Daughters hymn was sung, when the girls left the floor. The Associate Patrons entered and formed a "G" centering Brother Brassell, with the traditional Square and Compass encircling the "G".

Yellow rose trees were carried in by the Associate Matrons of the Monterey Bay Association and placed to form an aisle from the Altar to the East. On the stage was the emblem for 1969, the fountain of Life, and the decorations were carried out in the colors of yellow and lavender and the flower, the yellow rose.

Those participating in the Installation were Past Grand Matrons Everina Rheingans and Grace Hoffman, Grand Marshals; Past Grand Matron Thelma Rehnert Warner, Hostess; Past Grand Matrons Marian F. Schwach, Carol Mae Jensen, Vivian Kilgore, Marguerite Weisheimer and Mary Balden, Emblem Bearers; Ellen Walters and Robert Armbrust, Installing Officers; Past Grand Patron Dalora K. Burnham, Flag Bearer; James Hoole, Tribute to Flag; Past Grand Matron Gilma Vick Moyers, Chaplain; Past Grand Matron Lois B. Tamba, Bible Bearer.

The 1969 Deputy Grand Matrons, escorted by the Deputies of 1968 were escorted to their seats in the north and south, and the Grand Representatives were seated in the west.

INSTALLATION

The following Grand Officers were installed, and as each appeared in the entrance to the Cathedral, she or he was joined by her spouse or escort and an introduction given by Brother Gwinn, the escort taking the Grand Officer-to-be to the semicircle in the West, and when all had been seated, leaving the room.

(Worthy Grand Matron-elect, Florence Dunn, escorted by her husband, Chet, Past Patron Reveille Chapter No. 47.)

From Reveille Chapter No. 47 in Salinas, comes our Worthy Grand Matron, lovely, gracious Florence Dunn, escorted by her husband, Chet Dunn, a Past Patron of Reveille Chapter. Serving her Chapter loyally as Esther, Martha, Chaplain and Marshal since her initiation in 1941, she became Worthy Matron of her Chapter in 1948 when our Sister Thelma Bailey was Worthy Grand Matron. Since then she has served on Grand Chapter Committees and has worked on all of the big projects in her Chapter.

Sister Florence and her husband, Chet, had a very active part in the building of the new Masonic Temple in Salinas. She has been busy in community affairs, including serving as President of the Women's Club and the Soroptimist Club. While raising two sons, she served as the President of the DeMolay Mothers' Club. For fifteen years she has worked with the Rainbow for Girls. She has always remained active in her church. Sister Florence was appointed Grand Martha in 1961 by Sister Everina Rheingans, Worthy Grand Matron of that year, and then was a wonderful Grand Marshal in 1965 for Sister Ellen Walters, Past Grand Matron. Truly, she is a faithful Eastern Star member, raised in an Eastern Star family.

(Worthy Grand Patron-elect Richard T. Brassell, escorted by his wife, Mary Lee, Past Matron of Guardian Chapter.)

Guardian Chapter No. 439 gives to Grand Chapter Richard Brassell, Jr., our fine Worthy Grand Patron of 1969. An outstanding member who has served his Chapter and Grand Chapter well, serving as General Chairman of Grand Chapter in 1965, on the Benevolent Committee in 1966, and as Grand Sentinel of the Grand Chapter in 1967. Brother Dick has given many years of service to our youth organizations. He was Chairman of the Advisory Board of Guardian Chapter-Order of the DeMolay, a member of the Rainbow Advisory Board of Guardian Chapter. He was appointed Grand Chaplain in 1951 by Sister Lois Tamba, Past Grand Matron. Brother Henry has served his Blue Lodge and Shrine during these past years and has served on the School Board of San Mateo for eight years.
