Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Greetings and a very special welcome to all who have assembled here for this Informal Opening of our 99th Grand Chapter Session; and now let us set the scene for the arrival of our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Officers for this Crown Jewel Session.

Every member of our Order present in this large arena is, I am sure, proud to be a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. We here in California are very proud of our Eastern Star history, proud to have been one of the jurisdictions which met and formed our General Grand Chapter. Californians are proud to be one of the largest jurisdictions in this fraternal order of almost three million members, and proud that we are but a few months away from the 100th anniversary of the organization of the Grand Chapter of California. Such pride is reflected in the membership of our subordinate chapters, and the willingness of our members to assist our Grand Chapter whenever called upon to do so.

A Grand Chapter Session in this jurisdiction is a tremendous undertaking, and throughout this year many dedicated men and women, under the leadership of our General Chairman, Steve Van De Weghe, have been busy with the myriad of details which accompany this task. In addition, many more members are required to

help throughout the week, to see that our Sessions run smoothly. Such is the task of our Grand Guards, dedicated Past Patrons from many of our Chapters throughout the state, willing to give their time to see that our doors are well guarded. News of the tremendous Crown which would be awaiting the arrival of her Majesty's Ship, the "Queen of My Heart", soon reached the ears of Queen Barbara. Being the kind and gracious person she is, she appointed many dedicated Past Matrons to see to the welfare of those who would be present to greet her. In thinking of the fine members and the service they would render, Queen Barbara said, "they are such dolls, for our Session I'll call them my 'Barbie' dolls."

("Barble" Dolls and Grand Guards enter and form an outline of the State of California. "I Love You California" sung during this entrance, by Pat Swan, Worthy Matron of Alhambra Chapter, and the Southern California Choral Group.)

From a small port near Malibu, called Westwood Hills Chapter, Queen Barbara started on her voyage in the Eastern Star. At that time I am sure neither she, nor the members of her Chapter, realized how far her travels would take her. Yet, her love, devotion and dedication to the Order of the Eastern Star attracted attention, and she was appointed to serve as the Grand Marshal for the year of 1968. That is when it all began. That year saw Sister Barbara performing her duties and absorbing the teachings of those about her. Her love for the work of the Order increased and during the year of 1968, her aspiration to become a leader in this wonderful Fraternal Order was born. As it was prophesied in the Book of Life, our Sister Barbara began her journey to the Grand East the following year. She became associated with wonderful women in our subordinate Chapters throughout California whom she called the "Queens of My Heart."

The time rolled swiftly by and she began to search for a sturdy, reliable First Mate to accompany her on this journey. When she became the Associate Grand Matron, this charming and gallant First Mate joined her, in the person of Brother Jay E. Miller. He was readily accepted by all because of his kind and considerate manner, and was promptly acclaimed their leader by the "Queen's Men" in the subordinate Chapters of our State. Thus began their journey to the Grand East.

Upon being installed as Worthy Grand Matron, Queen Barbara desired a mode of transportation that would carry her to the many ports of call. Being a seafaring lady from Malibu, she chose a ship of love and understanding. Her First Mate, Jay E. Miller, being from Fresno, in the San Joaquin Valley, agreed that a special ship which would travel on rivers, over the mountains, as well as on land would be ideal; so our miracle ship of love and understanding was commissioned, and it was christened, "Queen of My Heart."

(The Pages entered the "State of California" outline, pinpointing the location of Malibu and Fresno, denoting the home towns of our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron.)

During the week of our Grand Chapter Session, another group of Past Matrons perform their duties in an efficient and unobtrusive manner, doing many duties for our distinguished and honored members, and carrying messages throughout the Grand Chapter room. They serve as our Pages, and at the moment they have spotlighted on our map of California, the home area of our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron.

Following embarkation in Sacramento last October, the first sailing aboard the "Queen of My Heart" was more like a "shake-down" cruise, as the various officers and crew members dropped off at their respective home ports to attend to the various duties and responsibilities which would then permit them to travel extensively in the coming months. Our Captain and First Mate had final plans to make in preparation for their journey to the 96 ports of call, and the many additional events scheduled on their itinerary.

Because of her very full itinerary, our Worthy Grand Matron realized that she could not visit as many other Grand Jurisdictions as she would like during her term of office. She wanted to extend fraternal friendship and to maintain good relations with our Sister Jurisdictions, and knew that to do this she must encourage our Grand Representatives to go forth and represent her in as many jurisdictions as possible. She made her recommendations for these appointments with much care, selecting Past Matrons who would be representative of our fine membership. These appointments joined others appointed during the past two years, and together have compiled an impressive list of visitations. Let us see from what areas of our State these Grand Representatives come.

(The Grand Representatives enter the outline of the State of California and stand in the approximate location of their Chapter.)

They have their Grand Representative Associations in each part of the state, and meet regularly to maintain their relations with one another and to exchange information concerning their visits.

Throughout the year they have conducted correspondence with their counterpart in the jurisdiction they represent. Many have made visits to other Grand Jurisdictions, not only the jurisdiction they are representing, but wherever they could to extend fraternal greetings and bring back messages of faith and love to our good Captain. Let us see where these journeyings have taken them.

(The Grand Representatives each leave the outline of the State of California and take a position on the Grand Chapter floor in the approximate place their state or jurisdiction would be in relation to our State. As they leave the border, a guard or "Barbie" Doll holds one end of a pink or blue streamer, creating a colorful pattern on the floor "tying" California to the other Grand Jurisdictions.)

It is through the service of our Grand Representatives that our golden chain of friendship is lengthened, and although these particular commissions may expire, the ties are never severed, only strengthened through the fraternal love extended toward one

another as their journeyings take them to all parts of these United States and beyond its borders, for true friendship knows no boundaries.

(The Grand Representatives, Pages, Grand Guards and "Barbie" Dolls march from the floor.)

Our majestic ship of love and understanding is about to appear on the horizon. Her blue, yellow, white, green and red signal flags ripple in the breeze as the "Queen of My Heart" sails across the placid sea toward the Queen's Port. From there it is but a short distance to the site selected for this 99th Annual meeting of our Grand Chapter—the Crown Jewel Session. After a long and diverse voyage which has resulted in a fruitful year for our Order, we are assembled to greet the Captain of our ship, the First Mate, Officers and crew.

Our officers in the subordinate Chapters have been loyal and true, always serving in a manner which would reflect the watchwords of their leader—Friendship, Faith and Fidelity. Captain Barbara praised them for their loyalty to her and their devotion to the Order of the Eastern Star, and bade them to serve their various Chapters and work with others for the good of our Order. She invited them to be on hand to greet her when she returned from her long journey. Most of them accepted that invitation and are here tonight awaiting her arrival.

(Worthy Matrons, in their Malibu blue capes, with matching material on their heads, entered and formed a large regal crown. Additional Worthy Matrons, with their capes turned to the Mauve pink, and matching material on their heads, formed the bands of adornment through the crown.)

In every port visited by our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron they were greeted and welcomed by those who had been appointed to officially represent our Worthy Grand Matron in their district. These Deputy Grand Matrons served untiringly, working with the officers in each of their Chapters, to see that our ritualistic work was exemplified in the manner desired by our Worthy Grand Matron. She has called them her Golden Crowns, and they now add that golden lustre to our theme formation.

(The Deputy Grand Matrons, in gold dresses, and gold material on their heads, formed the embellishment at the top and the headband of the crown.)

Throughout the year, our Worthy Patrons lend their support to their Worthy Matrons. This strong tie between our Order and our Masonic Brothers adds greatly to the success of our Order of the Eastern Star. They add to our formation this evening, and their presence assures us they will continue their protection of the crown.

(The Worthy Patrons enter and completely frame the crown.)

Surely divine guidance was given our Worthy Grand Matron in the selection of her Grand Officers to serve during this year. Each has given much of themselves in service to our Order, and has travelled extensively on the "Queen of My Heart" throughout the year, to visit the many ports of call and to meet the members of our jurisdiction. The motto of our Worthy Grand Matron, "Let Love Fill Your Heart and Rule Your Life", has been uppermost in their hearts and minds. They have let love fill their hearts—love for our Order, love for their Captain and her First Mate, and love for one another. They have become and will remain, a very close Grand Family, and to our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, they are, indeed, their Crown Jewels.

(The Grand Officers enter and form three jewels at the top of the crown. Metallic cloth in vibrant hues of amethyst and cerise creates the jewelled effect, as the male officers in matching top hats form the center of each "jewel".)

This is the moment for which we have been waiting. All Hail the Queen—Queen Barbara, and our Queen's Man, Jay, as they arrive to complete our formation and take their places at the very top—the brightest jewels in our crown.

(The following words were sung as a duet by Pat Swan and David May to the tune, "On A Clear Day.")

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ACTING GRAND SECRETARY

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patrons, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

A sincere "thank you" to all of you who have been so kind and considerate during this changing year in the Grand Chapter Office, your thoughtfulness made it possible to carry on in the manner we knew you would want the business of the office accomplished.

In 1954 at the invitation of the Grand Secretary, Maud McWilliams Smith, I became an Assistant in the Grand Chapter Office. That assistance was my pleasure in working the past many years

with our Grand Secretary, and because of this close relationship I shall always remember Sister Maud for her willingness to assist our members, and her wonderful sense of humor. Few members have been as active, or given as much of themselves to our Order. And, from her own chosen words—"There is comfort in the thought, that a loving God knows best."

At the close of the last Session the necessary information was compiled for the Itinerary of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Roster of Chapters, and through the assistance of The Bookman Press the booklets were soon available. Also, the proceedings of the Session, with the assistance of Pernau-Walsh Printing Company were available soon after the first of the year, and distributed as directed in the Constitution. The Amendments to the Constitution as adopted at the last Session were also printed and forwarded to the Chapters, according to the Constitution.

This year the Secretaries of the subordinate Chapters were required to forward a list of members as well as the Annual Report to the Grand Chapter Office. Such a list is required every five years. As a result the membership record is not complete at this time, as many adjustments were necessary to reconcile the Chapter and Grand Chapter records. We are sorry to report there was a loss of 2,160 in membership during the past year.

FIFTY-YEAR PINS.—There were 1112 Fifty-year pins awarded in 1972 compared to 1030 during a twelve month period last year. The list of those receiving this special acknowledgement of their membership will be found in the proceedings.

CONSOLIDATIONS—During the year many Consolidations were completed as will be reported by the Consolidation Committee. The Charters of the several Chapters have been properly endorsed in the Grand Chapter Office and returned to the consolidated Chapters. We thank the Committee for their assistance to the Secretary in the completion of the records.

INSTRUCTION BOOKS—A reprint of the Instruction Book as issued in 1966 became necessary this year, in order to have the Chapter officers properly supplied. As noted in the Constitution—Instruction Books are only sold for specified officers.

INSTITUTION—After receiving the Dispensation, accompanied by the necessary fee, and the petition, and in complying with the request of our Worthy Grand Patron, the Seal of Grand Chapter was affixed on the Dispensation of Clayton Valley Chapter, U.D. of Concord. It was an inspiration to have a part in this Institution the members are a most enthusiastic group and should have a very happy and prosperous Chapter. During this period of loss of membership it is very encouraging to have at the present time two Chapters Under Dispensation.

TAXES—Through the assistance of our Auditor, Mr. Stanley Davis, we have forwarded to the Secretaries a summary of employer's tax requirements of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and California Department of Human Resources Development, as well as sales tax regulations. The requirements have been disturbing to many but we are sure they will be most understandable as we progress with the filing. The many questions have been an education for the Grand Chapter Office as well.

COURTESY INITIATIONS—We have been called upon many times during the year to perform courtesy initiations for other Jurisdictions, as well as make investigations on petitions and Home applications. Many thanks to the Secretaries for your prompt attention to the requests of your busy time.

FINANCE COMMITTEE—The necessary meetings have been held in the Grand Chapter office, and the requests of the Committee to complete investment arrangements with Mr. David Flynn of "Alliance Capital Management Corporation" have been promptly transmitted, so there would be no loss in revenue. We have had a close alliance with our Auditor and the completed statements for the Eastern Star Homes and the Grand Chapter will be a part of this report.

EASTERN STAR HOME—As the Grand Secretary is also the Secretary of the Home Board, it was a pleasure to meet monthly

with this fine group, and the Administrator and to take care of the necessary business, including the payment of all bills, the bimonthly payroll and the required tax forms and payments.

OUR GRAND FAMILY—It was very gratifying to be included in the Grand Family the latter part of this year, and the courtesies extended have been truly appreciated. Especially our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, they are truly leaders. Sister Barbara it has been a very happy experience to work with you during your regime as our Queen of Hearts. The Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California wishes to submit the following annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1972, for your consideration, which is required by the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.

The Board of Trustees met, in Sacramento, immediately following the afternoon recessional, 1971 Session, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. Those elected were James E. Mercer, President and Gladys Pendleton, Vice President.

There are two other members of the Board, who I have not, up to this time mentioned. They are Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Barbara E. Poole, and the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Jay E. Miller. It has not always been possible during their busy life for them to attend our meetings, but whenever possible, they are there and are very active in helping plan the operation of the Home.

The Board of Trustees, elected by the Grand Chapter delegates, consists of seven members and the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron. The Board meets the fourth Saturday of every month, except in November and December, when they meet on the third Saturday. The Grand Line Officers attend as many meetings as their busy schedules will permit. The Grand Secretary acts as the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Since our last Grand Chapter Sessions in Sacramento, the Board has received 48 applications. Twelve of these are now in the Home. Sixteen applications were withdrawn before being investigated by the Board, four applications were rejected, and, two have been notified to enter the Home. There are six on the waiting list and seven are being processed. This is the first time we have had a waiting list since 1967.

The roster now shows 116 residents in the Home. This is the largest number that has been in residence at one time in our Home.

The Board of Trustees wishes to call attention to the requirements for entrance into the Eastern Star Home. An applicant must have reached the age of 65 years; a member in California in good standing for ten years, next prior to application, the last five of which in the Chapter of application; to be ambulatory, able to care for themselves in their own room. They must also transfer and assign all assets upon entrance to the Home.

The Grand Officers were in attendance, together with a very good representation of Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. A delicious luncheon prepared by the Home staff, was served by the Worthy Matrons Association of Southern California. The Administrator introduced many of our residents to the Grand Family, the oldest being Alice Minick, 102 years of age. Sister Alice will celebrate her 103rd anniversary on December 22, 1972. After luncheon, all retired to the Garden Court where entertainment was provided by the ladies of the Home. The presentations were very strongly applauded by those in attendance.

Fiesta:

June 3rd and 4th were the days set aside for the Annual Fiesta. It was a very festive occasion and those in attendance had an enjoyable time. Receipts of the two days will be used for the benefit of the Home. At the close of the year, a total of \$10,800.00 had been received.

Administration:

The administration of the Home is vested in the Board of Trustees, who set the policy, and these policies are then carried out by the Administrator. We have a very able administrator in the person of Brother John Brost, and the entire Board would like to extend to Brother John at this time, our sincere thanks for his service. I would like to announce at this time, that Brother John Brost has recently received notice that he has successfully passed his California State Examination and will be licensed to administer in a Home for the Aged.

During the past year, a memorial window was installed in memory of Past Grand Matron, Sister Mable Tellefson and Past Grand Patron Brother Reuben Wright, 1956.

There were many other gifts received by the Home. We would not want to omit anyone by thanking individually, and therefore we thank all for their efforts in making the lives of the ladies a little more pleasant.

All payment of checks for our expenses is made out by the Grand Secretary in the San Francisco offices of Grand Chapter, after approval of the Administrator and the approval of one member of the Finance Committee of the Home Board of Trustees. For the services of Grand Chapter Office, the Home pays \$4,500.00 per year toward the expenses of the Grand Chapter Office.

When our year started, it was only natural that our Sister, Maud McWilliams Smith was in attendance. Her experience and care were greatly appreciated and we received with regret the news of her resignation. Our Worthy Grand Matron appointed Sister Gladys Johnson to fill the vacated office. At this time, we the Board members, wish to extend to our Sister Gladys Johnson and the Staff in the Grand Chapter Office, our very kindest and sincere best wishes and thanks for their assistance.

My work as President of the Board has been made easier by our Administrator, Brother John Brost, and I want to extend to him and his staff the very best wishes and thanks from myself and the Board.

You might be interested in the past history of the Home. We have had 499 residents in our Home since 1933, when it opened. There have been two couples (man and wife) living in the Home. One of these men lived in the Home for eight years. There were twenty-five original residents.

In 1972 the Endowment Fund has approximately \$2,800,000.

In 1971 our cost per resident per month was \$322.00. In 1972 it was reduced to \$318.00 per resident per month.

Due to changes in the administration of State and Federal laws pertaining to Homes of the type which we operate, it is now necessary that a reserve be maintained in our financial structure of approximately one and one-half times our yearly expenditures.

Also under new laws, it has become necessary for us to employ a dietitician, who plans the meals and food.

Recommendation:

It is the recommendation of the Board of Trustees, that the \$1.00 Assessment for the operation of the Home be continued.

Your Finance Committee is charged with the responsibility of supervising the financial transactions, budgets, audits and expenditures of Grand Chapter, the Eastern Star Home and all committees. Five meetings were held during the year to carry out these duties and I wish to express my sincere thanks to the members of the committee for their very loyal support, to the Grand officers for their interest and support and to the acting Grand Secretary, Sister Gladys Johnson, and the office staff who made the work of the committee so much easier.

Insurance:

Our insurance coverage was reviewed with Mr. Robert B. Edwards and found to be satisfactory. Mr. Edwards has agreed to review our insurance coverages at this Session of Grand Chapter which should be very beneficial for all Chapters and members. We are covered for these items:

- 1. Compensation and Public Liability.
- 2. Medical payments.
- 3. Workman's compensation.
- 4. Fidelity Bond—covers each person in a Chapter who handles Chapter money and Chapter money securities against loss from robbery and forgery.
- 5. Paraphernalia.

Budgets:

We are pleased that despite increasing costs, budgets for both Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Home were met. Budgets for the current year will be presented to you later in the Session.

Investments:

Mr. David J. Flynn of the Alliance Capital Management Corporation, our investment councilor, met with the committee to review our investment portfolios. The desire of the Finance Committee is twofold; first to safeguard all funds and second, to secure the highest earnings available. You can be assured that these objectives are being met and your funds are very well supervised.

Eastern Star Home:

Your committee held a meeting with the Eastern Star Home Trustees to discuss and approve their budget. The Trustees and the Administrator of the Home, Brother John Brost, are to be complimented on the very efficient manner in which the Home is operated and within the amounts budgeted.

The Finance Committee received a letter of resignation from the Grand Secretary which was accepted with regret. The operation of the Grand Chapter is a demanding and trying one and our Sister Maud McWilliams Smith's health at that time was such that she could not at the time fulfill those duties. Although the resignation was to be effective July 1, 1972, the Worthy Grand Matron, after consulting the Finance Committee, placed the Grand Secretary on a leave of absence and appointed Sister Gladys Johnson as Acting Grand Secretary.

In recent years both Federal and State Governments have passed legislation requiring the filing of various information returns which all Chapters of the Eastern Star are required to complete. In some cases substantial fines can be levied for failure to comply.

Our Auditor, Mr. Stanley Davis, reviewed these requirements and provided descriptions and details of those returns which are required to be filed. Copies were mailed to all Chapter secretaries with instructions to inform the Grand Secretary's office when the appropriate returns were filed. To date a substantial number of Chapter secretaries have not complied with instructions and we have to assume that proper returns were not filed and that some fines may be levied against these Chapters in the future.

The Finance Committee has received a letter from the Grand Representatives Association of Southern California pointing out that the badge of office of Grand Representatives of California in other States is not one that does justice to our Grand Chapter when compared to similar badges from other States.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS

1972

Proposed Amendment-No. 1:

Sec. 12. ELIGIBILITY TO OFFICE. The Worthy Grand Matron, Associate Grand Matron, Grand Conductress, Associate Grand Conductress and Grand Star Points shall be sisters. The Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Patron shall be brothers. With this restriction, Past Matrons and Past Patrons who are members of this Grand Chapter shall be eligible to any office in Grand Chapter: provided, however, that no person shall hold more than one office in the Grand Chapter at one time; and further provided that the member of Grand Chapter holding the office of Grand Secretary shall not be eligible to be a candidate for that office at the Grand Chapter election of officers following his or her 70th birthday.

Proposed Amendment-No. 2:

Sec. 15. ELECTION PROCEDURE; TELLERS. Before proceeding with the election of Grand Officers, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a Chairman of the Election Board to take charge of the election and see that the ballots are properly deposited and tallied, as may be provided in the special rules of the Grand Chapter. The Chairman shall obtain such assistants as may be required, who shall constitute the Election Board.

This Board will also function in collecting and tallying ballots on amendments, when required.

Sec. 300. Rule 14.

Election to the office of Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, Associate Grand Patron and Grand Conductress may, in each case, be by motion for the election of the member of Grand Chapter holding the office immediately below such office, properly

made, seconded and unanimously carried. Otherwise the election to such office must proceed by written secret ballot.

Sec. 16-fourth paragraph

If there be but one nominee for any office, for which nominations shall be made, such nominee may be elected by motion, properly made and seconded and unanimously carried, otherwise the election to such office must proceed by written, secret ballot.

Adopted as Amended.

Proposed Amendment-No. 4:

Sec. 16. ELECTION PROCEDURE. Nominations shall be made for the offices of Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, Associate Grand Patron, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress. Such nominations shall be written, each on one sheet of paper, and shall consist of the name of the office and of the nominee and the signature of two members of the Grand Chapter making such nomination. All nominations shall be placed on the desk of the Worthy Grand Matron immediately prior to the election, and she shall give an opportunity therefor before proceeding.

The Worthy Grand Matron shall announce each office for which a nomination is made and the name(s) of the nominee(s), allowing each nominee to rise and approach the East as his or her name is called, after which she shall declare the nominations closed. If any nominee is not present in the Grand Chapter room upon such reading of his or her name, such nomination shall be rejected by the Worthy Grand Matron unless it is accompanied by, or there has been filed with the Grand Secretary theretofore, a written statement, signed by the nominee, of inability to be present, in which event the Worthy Grand Matron shall so state.

Details not otherwise provided for shall be within the discretion of the Election Board or of the chairman thereof, as the circumstances may require.

While ballots are being counted the Grand Chapter may proceed with its order of business and may dispose of such business as may be presented.

Thank you Worthy Grand Matron for this opportunity to report briefly on my activity and for the many courtesies extended to me throughout the year as a General Grand Chapter Committee member.

The committee on which I serve as most of you are aware is the Committee on Subordinate Chapters under General Grand Chapter. There are nine members on this committee whose duty is to help provide a closer contact between those Chapters and General Grand Chapter.

There are now 80 Subordinate Chapters throughout the World who are under the jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter. To me was assigned the Chapters of Hawaii. Each of the Chapters assigned to me is an active one, engaged in the very worthy projects of General Grand Chapter.

It has been my privilege to communicate with all of these Chapters assigned to me and they respond nicely and send me their bulletins.

Our Most Worthy Grand Matron advised me that 1972 would perhaps be the best year for me to visit them as she made her visit to them in 1971, thus separating the visitations and making them each special.

I had made plans to visit the Chapters of Hawaii in the Spring of 1972, but on the appointment of a new Deputy Grand Matron, our Sister Thelma Bailey, I learned our visits would be so nearly the same time I changed my plans, hopefully I will be able to meet with them before my appointment ends.

The large Island of Hawaii has countless visitors from the mainland and I am sure many of you have visited a Chapter there.

It is interesting to receive their bulletins and to read of the many visitations to them and of their activities.

I wish Sister Thelma great happiness as their Deputy Grand Matron, working with these Chapters and members.

May our Order continue to grow throughout the World and bring to many in other countries the joy it has brought to all of us in our beautiful Eastern Star World.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you, Sister Mary. I know we have all been wondering just what duties the Committee on Subordinate Chapters of the General Grand Chapter are doing, and so we thank you for this report and I know that you have enlightened us all. Thank you.

During the time that I am making this next introduction, I would like the Worthy Matrons of those Chapters which expect to achieve 100 percent Honor Certificates for the International Temple Fund to assemble on my right in alphabetical order by Chapters. If you will do this quietly, please, and be ready so there will be no delay in the presentation of these awards.

Brother Robert Atkinson, our Past Grand Patron, who is the General Chairman of the International Temple Committee of the General Grand Chapter, may we hear from you at this time.

Response:

Robert C. Atkinson, Past Grand Patron, General Chairman, International Temple Committee:

I feel very honored to have been given the important chairmanship of the International Eastern Star Temple Committee in Washington at the General Grand Chapter, and I look forward to working with our incoming Grand Chapter leaders towards the goals of 100% participation in this project for the International Eastern Star Temple by the time of our next Triennial Assembly in Denver, Colorado, in 1973.

Truly, as Dr. Morris said, "it matters not what men say about the Order of the Eastern Star, satisfy the demand of the age and it will live and take the place among the institutions of the land". His prophecy has come true, for today the Order of the Eastern Star is the largest fraternal organization in the world to which both men and women belong, with almost three million members and 14,184 Chapters. Our Order is now 122 years old. For many years changes have been made in our Ritual, which was first published in 1866, but the Cabalistic Words, the Colors, the Emblems, the Passes and the Signs have remained unchanged from the time Robert Morris conferred the degree of the Eastern Star upon his wife and a few friends in their home in LaGrange, Kentucky, in the year 1850. The Robert Morris Ritual is printed in English and Spanish, and the Obligation is printed in English, Spanish, German and Italian.

The Order of the Eastern Star is world-wide and is made up of four sovereign bodies—the General Grand Chapter with jurisdiction over 46 Grand Chapters in the United States, eight in Canada, and one in Puerto Rico, and the subordinate Chapters in Alaska, Bermuda, Canal Zone, China, Cuba, Germany, Guam, Hawaii, Japan, Mexico, The Netherlands, West Indies, Okinawa, The Philippines and the Yukon, the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland with jurisdiction over Scotland, England, Ireland, Wales, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia; the Independent Grand Chapter of New York; and the Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey. As you know. New York is the oldest of the Grand Chapters and has remained an independent Grand Jurisdiction since it was organized in 1850. It is the only Grand Chapter in the world to display the emblematic star with the white point to the top. This state has 769 Chapters. It uses the McCoy Ritual, and all Master Masons are welcome at the Chapter meetings in New York State. Ohio has the largest jurisdiction in the world with 187,264 members. The Grand Chapter of New Jersey is the second oldest Grand Jurisdiction and was one of the first Grand Chapters which founded our General Grand Chapter in 1879 along with California, Indiana, Missouri, Illinois and Arkansas. Some things are common in all jurisdictions. The first landmark in our Order is the belief in the existence of a Supreme Being. On every altar rests the open Holy Bible. The source of our inspiring lessons is always a reminder of our obligations and our daily need for prayer and guidance. Many have contributed to the worthy causes, such as Cancer Research, Cancer Dressing Stations, Shriners' Hospitals, Veterans Hospitals, Polio, Relief for Overseas Needy, Red Cross and the Children's Charity Hospital at Pusan, Korea. Had it not been for the Masons in Korea this hospital would have had to be closed. It is the only building in Korea to have a Square and Compass on its cornerstone.

At every Grand Chapter Session the flag of our country is the first guest of honor, followed by the state flag, the Christian flag and the Eastern Star flag. In states adjacent to Canada, our own Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack are placed side by side, and beautiful tributes are paid to both. This is a symbol of the peace and harmony which exists between the United States and Canada. The International Eastern Star Temple in Washington, D.C. is one of interest that we are deeply proud of. Being international, it flies no flag, but displays instead an Eastern Star within a Pentagon within a Circle. The Star represents the subordinate Chapters, the Pentagon the Grand Chapters, and the Circle the General Grand Chapter. The Temple is composed of 54 rooms and anyone who visits speaks often of the interior and about the many gifts which have been given from all over the world. It is also the headquarters for our General Grand Chapter and is office and home of the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, and the Most Worthy Grand Matron and the Most Worthy Grand Patron when they are in the City of Washington, D.C. Visiting hours are from 9-4. In perfect French architecture, many have viewed the 25 rooms on display, the priceless furnishings and the Italian marble staircase. The gift of \$1 once in

a lifetime is for the maintenance of the Temple, that is why I hope that each member will send their \$1 once in a lifetime to help keep this beautiful Temple. A resolution providing for the International Eastern Star headquarters was first introduced at the 19th Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter held in Seattle in 1919. Plans to request a contribution of \$1 from each member to finance the project were formulated. Committees were appointed at that time. With the aid of the offices of the General Grand Chapter and interested members, as well as Chapters and Grand Chapters, funds were accumulated until it was decided that sufficient funds were on hand to proceed toward the culmination of our beautiful Temple plans. At the 21st Triennial Assembly held in Tampa in November, 1924, a resolution was adopted which provided for our Temple Committee, headed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, Right Worthy Grand Trustees and other members to be appointed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron. This committee was given power to select a suitable building for the international headquarters, put it in order, furnish it and make it ready for occupancy at a cost not to exceed \$300,000. The purpose of this investment was to prepare an international headquarters in the capital city of the world-Washington, D.C., a Temple befitting the high standards set by our order where records, historical mementos and valuable books may be kept. The Belmont mansion, built in 1909, had been called to the attention of the General Grand Chapter. Steps were taken to contact the owner to secure prices and information. Mr. Belmont, a Master Mason, in the desire of putting the mansion in good hands, felt that our Order would safeguard the building and keep its beauty intact. He did not want this mansion to stand as a monument to the depression. Because of his interest in our plans we were able to secure the title for \$100,000, a site and a building which cost the owner over \$1,500,000. It was almost a gift, for builders today tell us it would cost \$5,000,000 and that we would be unable to secure the fine materials which we have in this particular building. The Belmont mansion was selected by a unanimous vote, the instructions of the General Grand Chapter having been faithfully carried out by the committee on the 24th day of February, 1937, the dedication of the International Eastern Star Temple was held with appropriate ceremonies. International headquarters had been established. The office of the Right Worthy Grand Secretary is housed there and all the supplies of the Eastern Star world go out from this Temple. Statistics are housed here, the history of the Order is in fireproof vaults, sufficient storage is here provided to properly care for reference files which are conveniently arranged. The complete file of proceedings of every Grand Chapter is accessible and every Chapter's records throughout the world is kept in this office for any member seeking data.

In April of this year I spent ten days in our International Eastern Star Temple gaining information on contributions that Califor-

nia has contributed during the years and I obtained a complete record as far back as 1925. I find that Arbuckle Chapter No. 368 paid \$10 and they were the first Chapter on record to contribute. During the year 1925 California members contributed \$448.90. In 1926 they contributed \$96.75; in 1927, \$8.00; in 1928 it was \$10.00; and in 1929 and 1930 it was nothing. Coming to 1931 we find that the California Grand Chapter on November 10th contributed an appropriation of \$5,000 to make a total of \$5,204.20 for the year 1931. Then on November 27, 1939, the California Grand Chapter made another appropriation of \$1,000, making a total of \$6,000 they have contributed. On April 9, 1931, we find that Cambria Pines Chapter No. 525 became the first 100% Chapter. Our Past Grand Matron, Sister Margaret H. Lauritzen, was Chairman of the International Eastern Star Temple Committee and around 1955, during her term of office, we had six 100% Chapters, however, with a total of \$29,598.99 that was collected for the International Eastern Star Temple at the end of her term. Sister Grace Hoffman, our Past Grand Matron, was a member of the International Eastern Star Temple Committee during the years 1968-69-70. She had a very successful term of office, principally from California. At the end of her term she had 222 100% Chapters for a total amount of \$60,346.85, a beautiful and rewarding term.

The amount shown on the records at that time was, as of June 30, 1971, \$87,228.24. Since that date \$16,321.78 has been added to the amount, making a total of \$103,550.02. This amount should make California Grand Chapter near 100% as of my records but is not official until notification from Mamie Lander, Right Worthy Grand Secretary.

When the great German philosopher Goethe was an old man, he put a sign out on his front lawn which read, "I am home. Won't you come in?"

This is what you have done for us, your guests. You are home and we have come in and entered into your hearts. We thank you for every courtesy you have extended to us. Each and every act has been noted and we thank you deeply for your smiles and your warm handelasps and your welcomes.

Many years ago, when I was a child, I heard a very fine Methodist Bishop preach a sermon on a simple little poem. It made a great change in my life, because always after that I judged the things I was doing by this poem. It is my thought that we have ceased teaching our children the joy of accomplishments, which is one of the greatest joys in life, to do a task and to do it well. It does not make any difference what it is.

This little poem said:

"Here is a ditch, dear Lord, I have dug it straight and true; I just wish that you yourself could come down and look it through." So you see, if we teach our children the joy of accomplishment, no matter what it is, if our daughters are baking cakes or our boys are carrying newspapers, whatever it is they do, to do it the best they can, then there won't be any of these shruggings about work, it is a dirty word, and we hear that sometimes.

Then, too, we must work hard to get the communists out of our colleges. I have granddaughters and grandsons in our own State University. They have received bids to sororities and have refused, and it is not the teaching of their home, because their parents were sorority and fraternity members, it is because what they have been taught by their teachers in their colleges and the influence of other children. This is one thing that we must eradicate from the American scene, the fact that we allow people to distort our teachings and change our children into lives that we do not want them to have.

I would like to take you on a short trip with me, one that I completed this spring. On the first day of March Sister Grace Leatherberry, my beautiful Worthy Grand Esther and I landed in Tokyo, Japan. Tokyo has become the largest city in the world. It is a great, bustling, busy city, and as we came into the airport, all we heard was an unfamiliar tongue. This was some of our members in Tokyo, and they quickly whisked us to Kamikura, where we were put up in an old hotel. It happened to be the honeymoon hotel of Tokyo.

Here day after day while we stayed there, young couples came to be married. There always seemed to be a director who looked after them, the little brides were so dainty and pretty in their beautiful kimonos, which you don't see too often anymore in Japan, because the American influence has caused them to dress in American clothes and it is not always too becoming, but the bridegrooms were in long tails with white gloves and their pretty little brides in their colorful kimonos. They looked like butterflys flitting around.

From there we were taken to the various Chapters. Tachikawa we attended a Chapter that met in a beautiful old temple, one that had belonged to the Masons for many years. It had what is known as a collation room, where they served after the meetings. It was once a large Chapter but at that time it had fallen down to about 40 members, but they did their work beautifully, as they had Past Matrons and Past Patrons in the Chapter.

This is not true in Germany, where it is impossible, because of the rotation in the Military, to have a Past Matron or a Past Patron in your Chapter, so if you think sometimes that they are a little too officious in telling you what to do, remember, there are Chapters who would give anything to have a Past Matron or a Past Patron.

From Tachikawa we went to Lasawa, which is near the northern part of Japan, an American Air Base. Here the Colonel and his wife were members of the Chapter. We were placed in the Admiral's quarters, it consisted of a living room and two bedrooms. The one bedroom boasted a modern bed and the other one had a futon, where we had to sleep on the floor. I pulled rank and I got the bed, and Sister Grace slept on the futon. The headboard consisted of two crossed swords, and she said, "If the Admiral comes, I will be able to take care of him."

This was a most interesting Chapter. They had a nice temple which had just been built, off of the base, and we had a beautiful dinner there that evening, marvelous cooks, not only with Japanese foods but their own food. We had a nice meeting, they do their work well.

These girls had not had a visit from a Most Worthy Grand Matron for nine years, and they really gave us the red carpet treatment. In fact, we had an emergency, Sister Grace had just bought a new suitcase and she couldn't get it unlocked, and believe it or not, the Worthy Patron who helped carry our bags into the Admiral's quarters was a locksmith, and he went home and got his tools and unlocked her bag for her, so she was able to get into it

Many times things of this type happened to us, and I thought always that there was a guiding hand that placed the person that we needed in our paths at the time he was needed.

From there we went back to Tokyo, where we had a meeting with Yeddo Chapter in Tokyo. This Chapter was having troubles with the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron who were Jewish and someone had placed in their hands a copy of a booklet written by a Most Worthy Grand Matron many years ago, in which she had stated that we were merely a Christian organization. In this Chapter there were Japanese, there were Moslems, and the Jewish people, and they were ready to throw their Chapter up. We talked with them and I explained to them that the book upon our altar could be any man's Holy Book. It was usually opened at the half-way mark between the Old Testament and the New. That the Jewish people believed the old part of the Bible, while we followed both, and that several of our heroines were Jewish, and before we left they had decided to carry on.

They meet in the old Japanese Officers' Club in Tokyo, a great building that sits back in grounds all of its own, and here many of the Japanese officers committed hara-kiri after the war was over. That seemed to be filled with very sad associations.

We also had a meeting on the air base near Tokyo. That building was used by both the Prince Hall Chapter, a Masonic Lodge, and the American Masonic Lodge. It created difficulties and problems for them, but they worked it out, and were getting along very nicely. It did not seem to matter too much to them.

From Tokyo we left for the airport for Guam. Guam is not a very large island, it only has 30 miles of paved highway, and on this paved highway the cars drive just as fast as they can go, and it has a very high accident rate. It seems when the wheels touch that pavement, the desire to speed is uncontrollable.

They have a beautiful Chapter there. It has been in existence quite a while, and there are many American people who live on Guam permanently, so that they're not faced with the rotation problem.

From Guam we left—first, let me tell you about the Hilton Hotel in Guam. It had just been newly built and the members were quite concerned about our staying there, because they had a Cliff Hotel that was just extra special, but we stayed at the Hilton Hotel, and the first thing that happened when I arrived, they handed me a telegram from home that said that my husband had slipped on ice and broken his leg. And, of course, that was a shock, because he has always been the strong one of the family, and there I was completely around the world and I couldn't do a thing for him.

We went to our room; it was a beautiful room looking out over the ocean. We could see the little Japanese couples, because it was a Honeymoon Island, strolling along the shore hand in hand, but when we went to put our clothing away, the closet doors fell off.

We asked some of the members about it, they said, "That is Guam," that is the expression they use, whatever goes wrong, "It is Guam."

But it was most interesting, a beautiful place, and I was very happy to have been there.

When I got to the airport that morning, Sister Grace had a visa to go to Taiwan, and mine had been issued so recently that the travel agent thought I could pick it up over in the Far East, but unfortunately that was not the case. I couldn't get a visa, so we had to fly all the way to Hong Kong and spend a day there, running about from one embassy to another to get a visa to Taiwan. I had made a trip to Taiwan about ten years before, shortly after Chiang Kai-shek moved in with all of his men and women from the Mainland.

It had changed greatly. You would hardly recognize it from a great, modern American city. The Chapter there consists of many nationalities. It is a beautiful Chapter and they do their work very well and we are proud of them.

We were taken to one Chinese lady's home and served a Chinese tea, which was most interesting. The table was built like a Lazy Susan, with the dishes moving around on the table as you wished them.

From Taiwan we went to Okinawa. Okinawa I visited also about ten years ago, and it has changed greatly. The city of Naha has grown from the airport inland. Here we stayed in a little native hotel, because the Okinawans were rebelling because the Americans were turning the Island over to the Japanese, and they were losing their jobs. They knew they wouldn't have jobs like they had under the Americans. They were standing around on the street corners, a hundred at a time, cooking their little meals on fire on the street corners, and they were just afraid to leave us in the hotel we were booked in in the city. They said that the year before they had rebelled and they had burned 80 American cars on the street. But we got by without any incident whatsoever.

They have a beautiful temple. It is set right down in the heart of Naha. The Masons were farsighted enough that they built this temple years before, and after we left they sold the temple for over a million dollars, and they were going to build a new temple, where the American colony had moved up the coast, and this new temple I was told was going to have two large chapter rooms in it.

In each of these places the Rainbow Girls were flourishing. Some places the Job's Daughters were flourishing, and occasionally you would find a Chapter of DeMolay, where there was a sufficient number of young people to work in these Chapters.

Now all along we had been trying to get a visa to go into Saudi Arabia, but everybody discouraged us. Even in Hong Kong the American Ambassador said, "Why do you want to go to Saudi Arabia?" And we told him we had a Chapter there that had never been visited since it was constituted. He said, "You wouldn't like it, because Saudi Arabia is a country that does not consider women at all. They are as cattle, if you get into any trouble at all, there is no one who will be able to help you." But we persisted and finally a wonderful Masonic brother who was head of a Shrine Club secured a visa for us from the Arabian Ambassador, so that after we left the Philippines we were able to go to Saudi Arabia, and I will tell you about that in just a few minutes.

From Okinawa we went into the Philippines. The first night my deputy there had a delightful reception, and I invited all of the Masters and the leaders of the Eastern Star and their escorts in to meet us in her home. Sister Alice Fellows and her husband Ed are a real fine Masonic brother and sister. They have a retarded daughter, the only child they ever had. She is 23 years old and this couple has given to the Rainbow Girls in the Philippine Islands a great deal of service, giving to others what they cannot give to their daughter.

The child is slightly educable. They're teaching her some things, she is going to a special school, but it is delightful to see how much they love her and how the servants in the household have geared themselves to taking care of her.

During our stay in Manila we had a meeting in the Scottish Rite Temple, where the five Chapters in Manila took part in the meeting. This temple is a beautiful temple, it has an armed guard around it every day. The Lodge room where we met was an outstanding room. We were privileged on Monday and Thursday to see the extinguishing of the lights by the Filipino Masons. Masonry is old in the Philippines. It came in there in the 1500's. You may not know it, but we have a Chapter in the Philippines that is known as the Ten Martyrs of Cafiti Chapter. These were Masons who gave their lives for their beliefs.

We also have outside of Manila an orphanage known as the Children's Gardens and you, the members of the Order of the Eastern Star, hold 1/14th of the Children's Gardens from your donations to the Children's Fund. It was a wonderful sight to go there. We were entertained one entire afternoon by different grades singing to us, and these little children were well cared for and well kept, and I was proud to know that we as members of the Order had had a part in taking them off of the streets of Manila. I have never seen worse poverty than there is in Manila. So many very, very poor, and the area that the very rich live in is guarded with armed guards day and night.

I understand since I came here that President Marcos has had to declare martial law. In one Chapter in the Philippines a young engineer, who was Secretary of the Chapter, stood with tears running down his face when they brought in the American flag in my honor. He said, "I was raised under that Flag and things were so different then. I have told my son to get out of the Philippines, that there is nothing for him here."

Everywhere we went we were treated with the greatest courtesy. We were given the food that they deemed the highest that they had to offer us and the very best.

We were invited into their homes. In Japan the Grand Master of Masons had a dinner for us, inviting all of his Officers and their wives. The Order of the Eastern Star is respected wherever you go.

We visited Cebu in the Philippines, another Chapter that had not been visited for nine years, and they were delighted to have us. One member had just built a new home after the Chinese fashion that had a marble floor in its living room 60 feet long. When the Japanese were digging tunnels they found the marble.

We also flew to Saudi Arabia, and we got in there at three o'clock in the morning. As we started down the steps from the airplane one man said, "What do you want to go there for? You will turn right around and come back."

Of course, we were met by Arabs in their native costume. It was a delight to hear some American voices out the hallway after we got through customs, and here were members of the Chapter waiting for us at that hour of the morning, and they took us to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walters.

Here we found a delightful home. They had lived there many years and collected artifacts and objects of art from all over the Far East.

The Chapter was new; they had a beautiful hall; I have never seen such beautifully gowned women, living so close to Hong Kong and the nimble Chinese fingers that do so much bead work; they had lovely gowns but they did not know anything about the work. They could not purge their Chapter, they had not had any instruction since they had been constituted. So we spent the evening as long as we could keep them there, giving them instruction. However, there was a party planned and the antercoom was just filled with Masons waiting for us to get through to go to the party. So we had to tell them that the next time the Most Worthy Grand Matron came, not to plan a party on that evening, because she could be of greater help to them.

I would like to tell you just a few incidents about Saudi Arabia. As I mentioned before, women have no status there whatsoever. A girl, when she reaches the age of 13 or 14, is a salable commodity to her father, because she brings about a thousand dollars on the marriage market. She is not trained to do anything outside the home. They will not allow her to work anywhere, and the house-boys in the American girls' homes are all men.

This is an oil community, you must understand, set down in the heart of the Arabian Desert. All around the towns are tall wire fences and the American girls are not allowed to drive outside under any circumstances without an Arabian driver, hecause if they do, they are in trouble.

Mr. Walters, with whom we stayed, told us that when he first came there about 15 years before it was not anything to find a pair of severed hands tied to his fence in the morning, that is what they do to thieves in that country.

They also told us that they sometimes whip men with big whips in order to keep them in line. That is what an absolute dictatorship is.

If you could see one of these women in Saudi Arabia come into their Chapter room, you would be horrified. When your husband wants to divorce you, he merely goes in front of the judge and says, "I divorce you" three times, and she is divorced, and unless she has a home, her mother and father still living, she has no place to go, and she does not know how to work or how to do anything, and she has not been trained.

There is a beautiful new hospital there, but they bring all of their nurses from Egypt and India.

There is a beautiful college being built upon the hill, but it is not for women, it is only for men.

We in this country have so many blessings and I realized it more and more when I was in that country and saw the condition of the women there. It is unbelievable in this day and age.

It is a wealthy country, the King of Saudi Arabia has millions and millions of dollars in revenues from the oil that the American companies are bringing up out of the soil.

From this Far Eastern trip we went home into Washington, D.C., and then I went to Florida and started visiting Grand Chapters up the East Coast.

It has been a wonderful experience. A Most Worthy Grand Matron is separated from her home and family, but the other experiences that she encounters are most rewarding.

I would like to tell people overesas and the members in our Chapters about what we're doing over here about our ESTARL program, about the Cancer Projects, about our wonderful Youth Project, and about the Subordinate Chapters under General Grand Chapter's project. This latter Committee I gave them, so if there's anything there that they need that we can help them with, that we would be delighted to do so.

For instance, in Alaska there are only one or two Chapters who had a rug, an Eastern Star rug on their floor. We thought that perhaps if some of you buy a new rug and your old rug is not worn out, you might send it to one of the Chapters in Alaska. They would be delighted to have it.

I want to compliment this Grand Chapter on their support of the Temple Fund. I am very sorry I was not here this afternoon when Brother Atkinson gave his report, but I understand that he has done a beautiful job.

Also, I understand that you have started selling the Candle Pins for the Ella Maude Lander Brady Cancer Research & Education Committee. Now there is a little catch about these pins. Sister Helen Rocquemore, who is present and who is the Chairman of the Project, says that if you don't wear one of these pins when you come to Denver, she is not going to let you into the auditorium, so be sure and get a Candle Pin, you will be glad that you did.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, I have been received so beautifully at this Grand Chapter Session. The introduction last night and that lovely addendum when we were introduced this evening, Brother Robert with me, and the song. "The Beautiful Lady" at noon that was sung to me by your choir. I want to thank you for my quarters at the hotel. For the flowers in my room. For all the gifts. For every courtesy you can possibly mention, and which I have been the recipient of, I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Wherever we went on our trips, no matter whether it was overseas or whether it was in this country, we have found our Masonic Brothers most helpful. In fact, the only time I was ill in the Philippines from drinking some of their water, I had two doctors and two nurses to look after me. I am most grateful to the Masons for their help. Wherever you go, you will find this is true. If you get into trouble, just ask a Mason and he will help you. Thank you very much.

First, may I tell you how very, very happy I am to be in the Grand Chapter of California and view the magnificent work of this splendid Grand Chapter. It is for me a most wonderful privilege to join our Most Worthy Grand Matron in being with you at this Ninety-ninth Session of the Grand Chapter of California, which is a very, very beautiful Crown Jewel Session, which is a culmination of the reign of your Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Barbara Poole, and your Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Jay Miller.

All of your guests have been treated fine and like royalty, and we are indeed grateful.

To enumerate the many wonderful courtesies and kindnesses shown us these few days will take many words and much more time than you would care to listen to me. With a heart full of appreciation may I say thank you, California, not only for these things but for giving to the Eastern Star World our Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress, a beautiful, capable and dedicated lady, and to us in this triennium two very fine and very important Committee Members who are serving during this Foundation of the World Triennium.

My Sisters and Brothers, it has been wonderful to be with you for these few days and to have the privilege of joining you in this Grand Chapter Session, enjoying the beautiful work, the very fine talks we have heard, and tonight this wonderful address by your Most Worthy Grand Matron.

I, too, agree that we live in a turbulent and disturbed world, and many things are happening that seem to be most unfortunate. But my Sisters and Brothers, I am a confirmed optimist, and I know through the determined dedication of the members of the Order of the Eastern Star and this great Masonic Fraternity of ours, we can, in time, bring this world of ours back to normaley, to peace, to happiness.

If I may, I would like to talk to you just for a few minutes this evening on what to me is a very, very exciting experience, and to show to you the yearning and eagerness of other people in the world to share what we have here.

Your Most Worthy Grand Matron has told you, she has traveled to many of the subordinate Chapters. My travels in the last two years have taken me to many Grand Chapters, but it seems to me, more important than that, has been the request and earnest effort that the people of Italy are making to us as an organization, and it has been brought about very largely, I would say, through the dedication and devoted and wonderful efforts of a very strong Masonic Fraternity in the great country of Italy.

My Sisters and Brothers, there are more than 50,000 Masons in Italy. It is a Grand Lodge that has been in existence for over one hundred years. In fact, they celebrated their Centennial Anniversary in 1970, two years ago. Many years ago, prior to the formation of the Grand Lodge of Italy, a great battle was fought in that country, led by three dedicated Founders of the Masonic Fraternity there to separate church and state. Garibaldi, who was one of the greatest Masons of all ages, was the leader, and they established their Grand Lodge in 1870.

It has gone through some very turbulent days, some very frustrating days, and sometimes, of course, they had to go underground. But prior to that time they had a great deal of strength, had amassed a considerable amount of strength, and a magnificent Grand Lodge Building in the city of Rome, which covered more than a block.

During the days of World War II or just prior to that, the days of Mussolini, when he banned everything Masonic in that country,

the Grand Lodge, as the individual Lodges did, had to go underground.

The government took their property. At the end of the war, one of their leaders who led the freedom forces and later served as Prime Minister, General Bianea, in Italy, a very devout Mason, with the efforts of their elected leaders, and the help of the Masons of America, persuaded the government to give them back a part of that property, of the Grand Lodge property. It was returned to them but, of course, they thought everything that they had in the way of records and paraphernalia and mementos, and particularly of Garibaldi had been lost. Surprisingly enough, when they returned to their building and refinished it and refurnished it to again use it as a Grand Lodge Temple, these items that were so dear and precious to them all came back, even to their records. They came back aboveground, no one can say any one Mason had saved them all, but Masons from many Lodges there had concealed some of these things.

They had a magnificent portrait of Garibaldi that was painted by one of the greatest Italian artists and which they thought had been lost. It, too, reappeared, and they now have it hanging on the wall, as they do much of his Masonic paraphernalia.

In 1970, the young man who was then Grand Master of Masons in Italy was in the city of Washington for a meeting of the Grand Masters' Conference, and he asked for an interview with the Most Worthy Grand Matron and the Right Worthy Grand Secretary and me, and we did have the pleasure of seeing him and talking to him, the immediate Past Grand Master of Masons in Italy, and five of his Grand Lodge Officers.

From that conversation we learned of the great desire not only of the Masons but of the women in Italy to learn and know something about the Order of the Eastern Star. Now these Masonic brethren of ours in Italy, knowing that through the years the Italian women had been subjugated under the domination of men completely, thought that it was time that those women should have an equal chance in the world and take their rightful place alongside of their husbands, their sons and their brothers and their boys, and they were intensely interested in the instituting of Chapters in the Order of the Eastern Star in that great country of theirs, to raise not only the level of the women's position but to help the country in many, many ways.

So after a trip that the Most Worthy Grand Matron and I took to Italy last year, we met with some very interested people there, and we have since that time had the great privilege, or I have, of instituting some several Chapters in Italy.

My Sisters and Brothers, I can tell you truly and honestly that we are getting some fine, fine members of the Order of the Eastern Star there. We are getting some fine Masons, and in Italy it is truly a family organization, because the husbands and wives and sisters and brothers are coming in in nearly equal numbers.

Of course, prior to that time we had had two English-speaking Chapters, No. 2 at Pisa, and No. 1, both with Italians and American personnel.

The Chapters that have been instituted there since then, and we have one, Minerva No. 3, which has been constituted in Rome, is an Italian-speaking Chapter, and all the others are Italian-speaking Chapters.

We have five additional Chapters already instituted there. We have two more Chapters to be instituted within the next thirty days, and by the end of next year, I'm sure that we're going to have a Chapter in nearly every section of Italy where there is a good, strong Masonic Lodge.

So my Sisters and Brothers, I am encouraged considerably, more than I can tell you, about what is actually happening in this world of ours. There is an eagerness and craving among the people outside of our country for the rights and privileges of the Order of the Eastern Star, and that in itself is going to make good, fine citizens of them.

One of these days it is going to spread by word of mouth from one person to another until we can live in a world of peace and harmony. That is a little bit of what is happening in my part of the work in the Order of the Eastern Star.

There have been requests from numerous other places that we never had before and, of course, places that we're going to have to look at very carefully to see that it can flourish and grow there and not be subject to torture, as in times past so many of our Orders have been.

But I think we come by that because of the things we have learned of the teaching of our great Fraternal Order and if I may, I would like to leave you with a few of the things that we have learned or should learn.

We learned obedience to the laws of God, Nature and Country.

We learned to become a person of honor and conscience, but above all, we realized that we should be faithful and devoted to family, to the country and to humanity.

Faithful to promises made and those assumed. Kind and indulgent to Sisters and Brothers.

Ready with assistance by every means.

We learned industry and honesty. Discovered how to study, to hear and think much and to say little.

To say we cannot perform what we possess, we have honestly earned and no man is poorer because we are richer. We learned that we should control our tempers and govern our passions that we might aid in keeping peace and harmony among mankind.

That our Order is a great peace society of the world, ever struggling to prevent dissension.

We learned in our search after truth that happiness is not affected by riches or poverty, but is engendered by unselfishness.

We learned that our Order is for love, peace, charity and tolerance, and against ignorance, intolerance, fanaticism, superstition, uncharitableness and error.

We learned an Eastern Star is not a religion but a way of life, a search for truth, a belief in immortality.

We developed a will to live in the sight of God, so that when the hourglass denotes our work on earth is finished, we may be weighed on the scales of God's mercy and conscience and not found wanting.

REPORT OF DISPENSATIONS AND CHARTERS COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, I would like to introduce the two very charming Sisters you assigned to this Committee and who gave of their talents and time to make this a real working committee.

Sister Lois Johnson, Past Matron and Secretary of Mizpah Chapter No. 100, and Sister Hildegard Smith, Past Matron, of Star of Palmdale Chapter No. 619. May we, the committee, thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for giving us the opportunity to serve Grand Chapter.

This past year at the request of the Worthy Grand Patron, each of us had the opportunity to visit and work with Star Clubs. Sister Hildegard with two, Saddleback in Mission Viejo and Silver Trowel in Hollywood.

Our Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Patron will agree, her reports were very complete and to the point. And they kept us all well informed on their progress. Thanks, Sister Hildegard for the time you have spent and for these very complete reports.

Milton I. Dales, Chairman:

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Worthy Grand Matron, it is my pleasure at this Grand Chapter Session to again present the members of this special committee, Brothers Walter Weisheimer and Hyman Geller.

This Special Committee was appointed in accordance with action taken at the 1970 Grand Chapter Session, to study the election procedure of our Grand Chapter, and to determine if a different balloting system for the election, as well as for voting on proposed amendments to our Constitution was feasible. We learned that other members of our fraternal family use a printed ballot system. as well as state and national service organizations. While each of these systems differed slightly from one another, the same basic plan is used—a sectioned ballot is given each voting delegate at the time of registration.

This Committee agreed last year that a printed ballot system is feasible for our Grand Chapter. The details of implementing such a system into our voting procedure was omitted last year, inasmuch as no change could be adopted at our last Session due to the required amendments to our Constitution. The Committees to which our report was referred, in turn referred it back with the request that the proper amendments be presented at this Grand Chapter.

Several of the other larger Jurisdictions were contacted regarding their election procedures. All were most kind in their response, and some sent copies of their Constitution and By-Laws pertaining to the election.

The results of our efforts can be read in the proposed amendments which have been presented for the consideration of our delegate body.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Now that our Election is over, may I offer my congratulations and best wishes to each of these Officers of our Grand Chapter and wish you each much happiness and joy as you serve our beautiful Order.

I am going to dismiss the Election Board. Please remain where you are to avoid confusion, but you are dismissed.

We will now hear from our Insurance Carrier, Mr. Robert B. Edwards, Vice President of Thompkins & Company. Mr. Edwards, would you please come up the ramp.

This is Mr. Robert Edwards, Vice President of Thompkins & Company, who will enlighten you on a few things, I am sure, today.

REPORT

Robert B. Edwards, Vice President, Thompkins & Company:

Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of Grand Chapter, Ladies and Gentlemen:

We were asked to appear before you today, because it has been about six or seven years since this idea was promulgated before to better acquaint you with the insurance program that every Chapter in the State of California has, and apparently it is timely.

It was much to my surprise I was told this morning there was one Chapter who did not know they had any insurance at all. Perhaps there are others. The reasons for taking your time in your very busy schedule is that this is a very important part of your everyday Chapter and Grand Chapter experience, and it is unusual to be in a room like this with so many people, realizing that every one of you has a definite insurable interest in this program. It can touch the lives of every one of you either from the standpoint of liability, the paraphernalia, etc.

We are not talking to strangers, we are talking to a group of people who each one has an individual interest in your Grand Chapter Insurance Program.

I thought it would be well, since it has been so long since we have done this, to quickly recap how this came to be.

About 25 or 30 years ago, Merritt Rowland, who many of you know, and the Grand Secretary of California, Lloyd Wilson, felt that there was a need for a special insurance program for fraternal organizations, something which had never been done before.

The two of them worked on the idea and finally got some basis of what they wanted to do, and in turn Mr. Rowland went to one of the insurance companies and said, "We have a unique group of potential insured, the Masonic Fraternity, the caliber of the people involved, the type of activities they have, etc., should lend themselves to special treatment. The risk should be low, the experience should be good, it should be an attractive type of program from the standpoint of the fraternal organizations." It was felt not only were they inadequately covered in many areas, and sadly to say in lots of insurances not covered at all.

Also, they were paying too much money, there was no control, no consistency, etc., and to make a long story short, a program was finally put together and California became the leading instigator of it, and it was adopted by the Conference of Grand Secretaries in Washington, D.C., a number of years ago as the so-called Official Insurance Program of the Conference of Grand Secretaries.

It was then spread to other fraternal organizations, because the exposures were almost identical. Most of you here are probably either involved in some other fraternal organization through Job's Daughters or Rainbow or Blue Lodge, Shrine, York Rite, DeMolay, etc.

All of these activities are now under this program in California on a blanket basis, the same identical program you have.

It has spread to over 40 other Grand Lodges, and just within the last two months the International Order of Job's Daughters adopted it on a nationwide basis. DeMolay has done the same thing, it is blanketed in in many of the big states and Grand Lodges. The Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite has made it a part of their program, and the Northern Jurisdiction has done the same thing, and it has been adopted to serve the unique and specific programs of Masonry and all of its organizations.

In 1956 it was adopted by the Grand Chapter of California on a partial blanket basis, and then over the years was finally put on a complete blanket basis as it now appears.

The reasoning behind this at the time was a very sound one on the part of your Grand Chapter Officers and, of course, the Grand Chapter meeting in a body, as you're doing today; really far in advance of later court decisions that made this type of thing even more vital. Within the last ten years there have been court decisions holding that the parent organization, whether it be a Grand Chapter, a Grand Lodge or whatever, is indeed responsible for and liable for the acts of all of its subordinate organizations, regardless of whether or not they are aware of those acts. This makes sense from our standpoint here today, because it would be impossible for the Grand Chapter to have any vague notion of everything that is going on in all the Chapter activities throughout the State of California.

Well, what to do about it? You did it a long time ago, you are way ahead of the game, but other fraternal organizations are beginning to see the need of this, to realize that the Grand Lodge, the Grand Chapter, the Grand Guardian Councils, etc., are indeed subject to suit, because of activities of their subordinate bodies.

If there were to be an organization such as yours where there was no control, you had no idea who had what type of coverage or how much, whether there be a suit at the Chapter level and there was no insurance or inadequate insurance, the suit would go right up the line to the Grand Chapter, and the Grand Chapter would be liable.

This can't happen in our program with Grand Chapter, because every Lodge, every Chapter, and the Grand Chapter and all of the operations of Grand Chapter in California have the full one million dollar liability coverage. This is just one phase, but probably the most important one from a legal aspect.

Each Chapter has, and I don't know where, because I don't know how you handle your individual bookkeeping problems, a certificate of insurance, just like this (indicating), which indicates all of the coverages and in layman's language on the next three pages describes those coverages.

This is not the insurance contract. The contract is held in the Grand Chapter Office, but each Chapter has this full explanation of what coverages there are. If you don't have it, and we always find there are some that have misplaced them, and this was sent out as recently as September of 1970, we will supply more to you. I have a few extras today, you can get them from our office, but you should have them, because they give you an indication of what you have, and they also indicate how to handle claims. It has been running very smoothly, that is due to the cooperation of your various Chapter officials and your Grand Secretary's Office.

There have been a number of claims over the years, some serious, some not so serious, some kind of humorous, but we have had lots of them, and we continue to get lots of them through the Fraternal Society.

The loss ratio is a good ratio from the insurance standpoint, therefore the lower rate, and extremely good coverage is available, but still plenty of losses and always the potential for the serious one that got hurt.

The contract is made up in about five parts, the principal one of which is the liability policy, to which I just referred. It was a specially designed policy by Mr. Rowland after years of negotiations with the companies, and finally settling with the Travelers

Insurance Company, whom you know of. They are one of the biggest companies in the United States, there is one in every state and city, and could give us the service we needed and give us the unusual coverage we needed.

Your liability contract is without any question the broadest liability contract you can possibly get. This is not a sales pitch, so to speak, this has been verified by some of the largest insurance programming firms in the United States as being a unique liability policy. If you take a look at your policy, and I am sure some of you have from time to time, particularly you busy men and women, you will find columns and columns of exclusions in your policies. This policy has two exclusions: one is Workmen's Compensation, which must be excluded by law and is handled separately, and the other is owned automobile, and where there are owned automobiles, this can be written into your contract, so you virtually have no exclusions. This means that every activity of Grand Chapter, every activity of every Chapter, is covered regardless of what you're doing, and whatever suit arises, there is protection up to a million dollars.

This is important from the standpoint that we have a very broad definition of insured, which includes not just the Chapters, Grand Chapter and Officers, but every individual, every committee, every partially formed committee on a temporary basis. The meeting here today, everything arising out of the activities of this meeting, everyone coming to and from this meeting involved in any kind of a claim, if Grand Chapter or the individual Chapters are named in a suit, the protection is there.

This is the reason for putting it on a blanket basis, there are no exclusions for what we call care, custody and control, meaning you rent a building, in fact a great majority of the Eastern Star Chapters are renting premises from someone else. If you are responsible for a serious fire or loss to those premises and the fire insurance carrier sues you because of this loss, the policy protects you to the full limit of a million dollars.

Personal injury coverage, meaning injury other than bodily injury, is included in the contract. This may sound rather insignificant but we right now have two claims pending, one with Job's Daughters and one with DeMolay, where someone is being sued for defamation of character. One in the amount of \$15,000, one we don't know yet, and in the Job's Daughters insurance, a girl claimed because she was not suspended but put out of her Bethel that her character had been defamed. Her mother is the one that was really defamed, I think she felt this was a terrible thing for her daughter, so they are suing the Bethel and the Grand Guardian Council for \$15,000. We think the suit is groundless but it is being defended. Should it prove to be actual, there will be a payment under the contract. The normal insurance policy would not carry such a thing.

In your elections, if you were to blackball someone for whatever reason, valid or invalid, and the person feels they were going to join the Eastern Star and they did not and were ashamed and decided to sue somebody, they are covered.

These things sound ridiculous but they are happening every day and we have tried to anticipate what your needs are going to be and keep up with them.

The liability policy, of course, is just what it implies, liability contract where there has been negligence. This is true of any liability policy, your home, your business, your car, there must be negligence. No one is going to come down and pay \$100, unless they can prove it was your fault. Theoretically, there would have to be a court suit. In actuality, most liability suits where the company determines there is liability are settled out of court.

You have had only a couple of those over the years of any size. There was one for \$30,000, other than that they have been fairly small, although we did have a serious one in one of your neighboring states recently, where at a Chapter function in a Masonic Temple tables had been stacked. Someone leaned against the table, the tables collapsed and a person was knocked down and seriously injured, and the suit was involved and paid under the policy.

Someone sat on a chair that was faulty and had a broken hip—again liability, definitely negligence on someone's part. The claim was paid.

The place we get most of the claims is in the next coverage, which is called medical payments. Medical payments is like that which you have in your car and home owner's policy. There need be no liability, there need be no negligence.

We have had any number of these arising out of the Chapter activities over the years. I have a dozen examples of this type of thing. A couple of years ago in Grand Chapter a lady stepping off one of the stairs misjudged and fell and broke her hip. She was covered under medical payments. It was not anybody's fault, nobody's liability, nobody's negligence.

The Grand Chapter did nothing wrong, but there was a thousand dollars in medical payments coverage available.

One thing you should bear in mind, particularly, the secretaries and various other people who are dealing with claims: The medical payments coverage, because it is a very low premium coverage, is excess of other coverage. We mean by this that if you have Kaiser, if you have Blue Cross, if you have major medical, etc., these come in first. All we are trying to say is if you are hurt to the point where you don't have insurance to protect you, this policy is available.

The deductibles that might be involved are covered. If you have a major medical policy with a \$500 deductible, we would pick up the first \$500. If you use all your policy we would pick up an

additional \$500 on top of it. It is up to a thousand dollars of money actually out of their pockets not otherwise provided for. It is medical payments and applies to any place anywhere for any activity by anyone in connection with Chapters, and also includes their guests, anyone who is an invitee to any of your functions is also covered under the medical payments coverage.

The other so-called bodily injury coverage is Workmen's Compensation, primarily to apply to employees, but any employee of any Chapter by statute must be covered by compensation, meaning that if they are hurt in the performance of their duties, they come under the Compensation Act of the State of California, and the payments for time off the job and for injuries and so forth are covered. This is statutory.

The next item of coverage you have is fidelity, which means dishonesty coverage, and we fortunately have been very free of this in Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star.

I am sorry to say we cannot say the same thing for other fraternal organizations. We have had a couple of serious losses in the Grand Lodge of California, very, very serious loss in one of the Grand Lodges of the East, 15 years ago, over \$200,000 in funds misappropriated in one of the Masonic Homes. We carry a blanket policy on all of the Chapters and it includes not just employees as the normal contract does, but any member who would be acting in any capacity where there would be responsibility, monies collected, monies taken home, property, anything that belongs to the Chapter, if it is stolen in any way by a member, it is covered.

This coverage is up to \$5,000 for dishonesty. There is \$1,000 for just loss of monies for any reason, by theft, burglary, by fire, by just plain losing it. I should not tell this story but it is a story on you. About five, six or seven years ago in all the confusion that was going on, and Gladys's desk is real clear right now, but Maud's desk was not at that time, somebody put \$600 in cash in a brown paper bag on Maud's desk. Somewhere in the ensuing hours it was put in the wastebasket and never showed up again. This was covered under the money security portion, because of disappearance, no idea what happened to it, it was gone. It was covered. This is unusual but there have been surprisingly a number of claims under this particular item also.

You also have forgery coverage, which would be theft not only by one of your own people but by someone else getting hold of your checks, signing or forging them. That is \$5,000 coverage.

The next item and the one that causes the most claims and sometimes the most misunderstanding is the paraphernalia. The paraphernalia policy covers what it implies, the part of the Chapters, the Grand Chapter, etc., and we worded it in such a way that we said "Paraphernalia which would ordinarily include property which would be applicable to the ritualistic work of the Chapter," but we realize you have a lot more property than just the ritualistic work, so the contract was put together with a million and a half of total value.

We could be way under, we probably are, you all sent in inventory sheets to us, indicating everything that your Chapter owns. There is no co-insurance, so if you made a mistake there, it would be part of a loss you were going to pay. The policy covers every item of any type of property owned by the Chapter wherever it might be and regardless of what happens to it, with a very few minor exceptions, and those would be fidelity—which is covered elsewhere—wear and tear, depreciation, this kind of thing. But theft, burglary, fire, water damage, earthquake—you name it, it is covered.

The normal type of claim we get is usually burglary or theft. Just within the last couple of months there was a break-in in one of the Chapters and all of their electronic equipment was taken, two or three hundred dollars. No deductible, full coverage, replacement cost.

Replacement cost is an important phrase in this picture, because it means you're going to get new for old. If you lose all of your Chapter's properties tomorrow in a fire or whatever, the contract calls for you going out and buying new ones, regardless of how old they were or how badly worn they were. This is a new for old or replacement cost contract, no depreciation.

There is a \$25 deductible applying to items other than fire, vandalism, burglary, but the deductible is wiped out the minute the claim gets over \$25. If you had a \$26 theft loss there would be full coverage. If you had a \$24 theft loss there would be no coverage. This was done in accordance with your Officers, realizing that there would be lots of petty five and ten dollar claims, put in for mysterious disappearance, carelessness, etc., that we don't want to increase the premium for this type of thing, but if it is a large loss over \$25, they want it all paid, and that is the way it works.

There have been losses of property in transit, losses at a meeting like this. We had one that was very funny, it was not funny at the time, but it struck us humorously at the time: We got a call six months ago from a Chapter here in Southern California, saying that they had lost over \$300 worth of steaks. They had a barbecue the next day and they called up wondering, is such a thing covered? Is this paraphernalia?

This is not exactly ritualistic paraphernalia, and I don't think you want it on a depreciated basis, either, but nevertheless, because of our definition, we are trying to say in effect if it is something you own and you lose it, it is covered. We told the insurance company, "Find out the total value and issue a check." They sent the check to the wrong Chapter and it took about two months to get it straightened out, but it was covered.

We don't want to encourage this type of thing, but if you lose them you are protected. But the paraphernalia policy is unique in this respect, because there is no co-insurance. There is full replacement cost, no depreciation.

An example of what can happen to you, those of you who might have been involved, there was a serious fire in the Palo Alto Temple over a year ago. In fact, it was a total loss, and in that Temple were an Eastern Star Chapter, DeMolay, Job's Daughters, a couple of Blue Lodges, one York Rite Body, and we had all of them covered, because of the blanket policies.

The adjuster went in, asked for inventories, in the case of Job's Daughters there were robes that had been badly stained. He said, "If you can get them cleaned, fine. If not, buy new ones." That is what has happened, all covered, no questions asked, "Just get new ones and send us a bill," and this is the way the thing works.

Now the claims procedures have worked very well. We try to discourage you bothering your very busy Grand Secretary with questions about insurance. She wants to know what is going on, they want to know what claims are coming through, obviously, but the claims procedures is well spelled out on the certificate that you have. If you have any questions, you can call us directly or call Gladys's office, and she will refer you to us.

Also, we insure all of the coverages for the Eastern Star Home and have for a number of years, and through the excellent cooperation of John Brost this has been worked out to the satisfaction of all involved.

We are most grateful to your Grand Secretary's Office and her staff, the fine committee for all of the help they have given us over the years, and it has made our job a lot easier in trying to provide what you need.

Just one further thing, incidentally, I will be here through the noon hour and most of the afternoon if any of you have any individual questions about any of your Chapters. One other thing before I conclude: I want to pay my personal tribute and thanks to Maud Smith, whom I knew personally and for many years, not only for the wonderful help she gave us but for the wonderful friend she was to our office. I personally got to know her real well. In fact, I own a couple of her neckties. I told her I would never wear any of them, she understood. She was a very dear person to us and we will miss her very much.

I do know that our Sister Helen Isberg, who is Chairman of our Benevolent Fund, is ready for her report. Sister Helen, would you like to give it to us at the tme.

REPORT OF THE BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE

(Presented by Helen O. Isberg, Past Grand Matron, General Charman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of our Order, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers:

Another year has come to a close and your Committee on Benevolence appear before you to report on their sincere efforts to relieve our distressed members. Each of the fifteen area Chairmen appointed have given their best to represent our membership in this very important service. There are many avenues in our Eastern Star life to give hope, inspiration and to reduce the great needs of our members, but, we who serve you on this Committee feel in visiting, aiding and assisting those in need is most important.

Our committee members have been willing to visit Chapters and give instruction and help so that their members may receive the greatest amount of information to expedite our service. We feel there is still a great need that the Worthy Matrons be better versed on the procedure of this fine program. We urge all Chapters to call on their Area Chairman for any information they may need. We wish to thank all of the Chapters for their fine assistance in completing the work this year.

Among the many cases presented for our consideration included dire financial need, medical bills, surgery and hospitalization which depleted funds and caused members to mortgage their homes and other possessions. In some cases both members, husband and wife needed assistance in order to again try to get back to a normal life where they again could take care of all their needs.

A new system of recording expenditures was set up and we thank our Sisters Gladys and Diane for their ever ready help.

The attached report gives in detail the assistance given this year to our members in the amount of \$13,509.40. A detailed statement will be made a part of this report in the proceedings.

We recommend that One Cent (.01) per capita and a budgeted amount of \$20,000.00 for relief and \$300.00 for expenses be allowed for the coming year.

Sister Barbara, Worthy Grand Matron, I wish to thank you for the appointment to this Committee and for allowing me to be your General Chairman. We have all been drawn closer to the real purpose of our Order. May those we aided feel we were the friend walking beside them.

With majestic splendor in 1971, a queen began her reign in our very own Grand Chapter. To you Sister Barbara, the queen of our hearts, your Fraternal Correspondence Committee wishes to thank you for the privilege and honor of serving you and our Order in this majestic manner. No flag flies over this building, but each night the rays of the star within the Pentagon, and within a circle, send out its light just as the star of Bethlehem did long ago.

Grand Chapters all over the world are basically the same, because of the ritual, rules and regulations which govern us, yet each has its own individuality. General Grand Chapter has jurisdiction over the ritual which is printed in many languages; English, Italian, Chinese and others. The ritual is our heritage and we shall preserve it. The symbol of the Order is a reminder that many people

of many nations can work hand in hand for the betterment of all mankind. This has also been the goal of our very own Grand Representatives. Grand, they are for each in her own way has strived to promote a closer fellowship and good will between the Grand Jurisdiction that they represent. Thank you, Sister Barbara, for extending to me the honor and pleasure of escorting again Sister Ellen, our Past Grand Matron, and for sharing the East with her and with you and Brother Jay at this afternoon's Session. It is an honor that I shall long remember. Thank you so very much.

I am sure that the delegates to this convention—I keep calling them convention, I should say Annual Session—have enjoyed it up to this time and will continue to enjoy it as you get into the real work of this Ninety-ninth Session.

This is something we all should be proud of and shout it out to all people, that The Order Of The Eastern Star in California takes care of their own, the Sisters and Brothers who have this dreadful disease Cancer, and need help.

But there come times in every General Chairman's term, when a sad thing arises, a member receiving aid, has used all the funds from the total grants of \$2500.00 which we are allowed to give in case of Terminal Cancer, must be told that is all we can allow and they must look elsewhere for further help. Oh, how my heart aches

whenever I have to write such letters. Therefore I have proposed legislation at this Grand Session to raise the amount to \$5000.00, we now have the money and let's help our unfortunate Sisters and Brothers to the fullest.

This is my last year as General Chairman of this Committee but Sister Helen Bratschie of Oakland, who was General Chairman a few years ago is going to take over once more, her address will be in the Itinerary. I will remain on the committee as area chairman of District No. 10.

Our sincere thanks to our sister project, The Cancer Dressing Stations, who have supplied many dressings to our members in our Eastern Star Home and also to the members of the Masonic Home at Decoto.

We receive many letters thanking us, the Chapters and Grand Chapter for the wonderful aid they have received from the fund, here is a typical letter from a member of Penrhyn Chapter: Dear Brother Bowman: I wish to express through you to the Grand Chapter my very deep and sincere appreciation of the financial aid granted in the illness of my late husband. The kindness and thoughtfulness shown me and my family by the members of Penrhyn Chapter helped so much during this difficult and painful period of time. Words are inadequate to express my feelings at this time, so all I can say to you is thank you for your assistance. very sincerely.

Our thanks also go to the 1953 State Patrons, Trailers Association, The San Gabs, Bell Chapter and the many other Chapters and Associations that helped raise money for our project. One member that works every day of the year for this project is our Past Grand Treasurer Sister Hattie Tolle. Thanks Sister Hattie.

Our fund has also grown when members and their friends send donations to the fund in lieu of flowers for funerals.

Once again I will repeat myself, each year I urge the line officers to read and study the constitution and learn of the many fine projects we have in our California jurisdiction. REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Lloyd E. Griffin, Chairman, Past Grand Patron:

We have a partial report of the Jurisprudence Committee. If you have your amendments with you, it would be easier if you have them to follow.

We refer to Proposed Amendment to Section 205, Proposed Amendment No. 10, pertaining to Exemption of Chapters to pay fees, dues and assessments on members.

I might say originally when the Endowment Fund Act was passed, by its terms it exempted the individual from the payment of assessment thereafter on the Home. Now the statue itself raises the assessment on the Chapter, but if the member forgets to pay it and does not pay it, the Chapter does have to pay it, so we want to amend that so that the Chapter is also exempt from the payment of that dollar due.

We have a proposed amendment now to that Section 205, which adds at the bottom a proposed amendment, which says: "who hold life sponsor membership in the Eastern Star Home as provided by Section 773 of this Constitution and Laws," which covers the situation.

But to make it very evident, we want to amend that last sentence here before the words "who hold," and insert the words, by adding before the sentence, "or Eastern Star Home assessments."

It will read now by adding the words "or Eastern Star Home assessments on members who hold life sponsor membership in the Eastern Star Home as provided by Section 773 of this Constitution and Laws."

We have to amend this proposed amendment by motion. This is with the consent of the proposer of that.

I so move.

Adopted.

Motion Carried.

Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

Now, Worthy Grand Matron, it is necessary for me to move the section as amended, and that is the recommendation of all the committees, the Chairman and Members of the By-Laws Committee, the Jurisprudence Committee and the Finance Committee have all approved this. If this is amended it should be adopted as amended. That is the recommendation.

Adopted as Amended.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

The report of your Constitution and By-Laws Committee and your Jurisprudence Committee:

We are going to consider Proposed Amendment No. 2, Section 15, Election Procedure.

Your Joint Committee of Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom was referred Proposed Amendment No. 2, Section 15, report as follows:

After discussion with the Chairman of the Committee proposing this amendment, we recommend that it be amended to delete the entire first paragraph, for the reason that we feel the appointments to the entire Election Board should be left to the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move that Proposed Amendment No. 2, Section 15, be amended by deleting the entire paragraph.

Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, then we would like to propose that the last sentence as printed in your list of amendments be added to Section 15, as we feel this is worthy of adding to our Constitution in view of the fact that there are many changes to our election procedures that will be governed by this concerning ballots, and the manner in which our elections will be handled in the future.

We therefore recommend the adoption of the last sentence in this Proposed Amendment No. 2 of Section 15. It reads: "This Board will also function in collecting and tallying ballots on amendments, when required."

Adopted as amended.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

The next section we would like to consider, Worthy Grand Matron, is Proposed Amendment No. 4 to Section 16.

I would like to point out that we are adding to the second paragraph of Section 16, Election Procedure, as printed immediately above Proposed Amendments No. 3 and 4, the names of the officers of Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Associate Grand Patron—we feel that this is necessary to simplify and make our election procedures consistent with the election procedures for all offices.

Therefore, the Joint Committee, the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, to whom was referred Proposed Amendment No. 4, Section 16, recommends a "yes" vote.

Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I move that consideration of Proposed Amendment No. 4, Election Procedure, have the words "second and third paragraphs" inserted after the words "Election Procedure."

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

It will then read: "Proposed Amendment—No. 4: Section 16. Election Procedure. Second and Third Paragraph."

This is an amendment to clarify questions that have been raised by the delegates.

Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, your Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence would recommend approval, a "yes" vote on the Proposed Amendment No. 4, Section 16, Paragraph 2 and 3 as amended.

Adopted as Amended.

James Millard, Past Grand Patron:

I would like to present at this time Section 300, Special Rules of the Grand Chapter, Proposed Amendment No. 15, which reads as follows: "(i) Ballot Vote Upon Request. A ballot vote may be ordered upon any question, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or at the request of five members; provided such request is made before the result of the vote has been declared by the presiding officer. During any ballot vote and the tallying thereof, the Grand Chapter may proceed with its order of business and the disposition of such business as may be presented."

Our Joint Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence recommends a "yes" vote.

James Millard, Past Grand Patron:

Your Joint Committee on the Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom this Proposed Amendment No. 17, Section 300, Rule 14, was referred, with the agreement of the Chairman of the Committee proposing this legislation recommends this be changed to change the word "appoint" to "assign" in Line 6, Section 300, Rule 14, Details for Conduct of Elections. To read: "The Chairman shall select his assistants and assign twenty counters and twenty tellers to count the ballots."

The reason for this is the same reason as given in the Proposed Amendment No. 2, we feel that the appointment should be left to the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron. She does the appointing and the Chairman does the assigning.

Adopted.

James Millard, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, we recommend a "yes" vote on Amendment No. 17 as amended.

Adopted as amended.

To Live In Hearts We Leave Behind, Is Not To Die-

This could well have been written of our dear departed Sister Helen Bell DeBeers, our Past Grand Matron. We are thinking today of one beloved by us all whom our hearts will always remember.

Sister Helen was initiated in Melita Chapter No. 467 in Pasadena on November 18th 1931 After serving as Marshal, and Esther, she was elected Associate Conductress in 1936, and served her Chapter as Worthy Matron in 1939. In 1944 she was appointed Grand Ruth by Sister Hazel Thorn Lane, and in 1948 Sister Thelma Bailey appointed her Grand Marshal. She was elected Associate Grand Conductress in 1948 and served California as Worthy Grand Matron in 1952.

During her service in Grand Chapter her heart was always with our Sisters in the Eastern Star Home, and the many acts of love and kindness, and the many projects which she supported for the betterment of our Home are too many to enumerate. In 1966 Sister Helen was elected to the Home Board as a Trustee. This service to our members was the greatest service that she felt she gave to our order.

She fought life's arduous fight with stalwart soul Kindly in heart, her life reached out to all; Upright in dealing, she achieved a goal Which many, yet unborn, will oft recall. Filled with knowledge and wisdom of the years, Serene, she moved to life's inevitable end, Leaving a memory too deep for tears, Within the hearts of those who called her "Sister Maud" Sweet be her rest and peaceful her sleep, God's ways are best, she is safe in His keeping Oh blessed sleep, where ills never molest her, Why should we weep since Heaven hath blessed her.

Entered into rest, November 26, 1971. Sister Fisk was initiated in Acacia Chapter No. 21, on September 3, 1910, served as its Worthy Matron 1925. Sister Josephine served on many Committees for Grand Chapter. She was one of the ORIGINAL MEMBERS of the Eastern Star Home Board. She served as Deputy Grand Matron in 1930, and was elected Grand Treasurer 1936.

Sister Josephine was a woman of few words, but spoken wisely, loyal and true to her Friends and Neighbors.

REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

(Presented by LaVerne I. Walker, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Officers and Members of Grand Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

Greetings:

It is a happy privilege to submit the following report of the activities of your 1972 Scholarship Committee:

It is my pleasure to present the only member of the Scholarship Committee that could be present this morning, Sister Francis Trusty.

This committee is observing the 25th anniversary since its inception on a motion by our late Past Grand Matron, Kathryn Farwell in 1947 to provide an Eastern Star Scholarship Fund and a Scholarship Committee. We share her belief in the statement, "this project has given the Order commendation and prestige among the fraternal organizations." I also concur with the words of former Chairman, Past Grand Matron Elvetta Grohl:

"Sharing our good what ever it is Will give to our hearts the deepest joy No greater work can be done in this world Than helping a girl or boy."

To comply with the Constitution of the Grand Chapter, a letter was sent to each Chapter in late November to be read at the December meetings. It was addressed to the members, to the Order of DeMolay, the International Order of Job's Daughters and the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls so that members realize the importance of getting the information regarding our scholarships to our affiliated youth groups. In addition, copies of this letter were mailed to the Executive Officers of the Orders of DeMolay and Job's Daughters and to the Supreme Deputy in California Order of Rainbow for Girls for dissemination. This letter delineated the eligibility for awards, the amounts of the awards, the deadline dates and the established procedures.

It is important for our members to be aware that with the amendment to Section 194 at the last Grand Chapter Session more students are eligible. Now included are (1) graduating high school students, (2) members of the Order who wish to continue their education, (3) needy students who had been unable to go directly into college from high school and (4) students who have completed a portion of their higher education, but who find themselves in need of aid to continue.

Because of this increased eligibility it followed that we would have an increase in the number of applications. The total was 293. Of these only 13 remained incomplete. We also received a total of 36 transcripts or Dean Reports for which no formal application was ever received. Of the 280 applications which were considered,

197 could be given awards. One student had withdrawn. We do gratefully acknowledge the most generous gifts from Sister Clara Belle Hamilton and the individual contributions in gifts and in memorials to the Scholarship Fund which with our 10¢ per member made it possible for this record number of worthy students to receive the awards.

Standard procedures were followed by the Chairman and the Committee. The Chairman assembled all six parts of the application: the application form with a photograph, the personal letter, the copy of the Income Tax declaration, the Health Report, the Dean's recommendation and report, and the letter of acceptance received from the college. As fifteen or so were completed, the Chairman mailed these as sets to members of the Committee for evaluation. Each member can thus make an independent decision. Each member recorded "Yes", "No" or "Discuss" with a pertinent comment concerning his decision. As these were returned, the Chairman set aside those which received three or more negative responses and kept an accurate check on those awarded, the amounts and the area of the State in which the grant was given. (For the purpose of fair distribution, the State is divided into 15 areas, similar to the boundaries of the benevolent districts.) This work continued from late February through most of June.

Despite this advance work completed, when the Committee met in San Francisco June 29 and 30, there were 33 applications which had been held for discussion and nine additional applications on which final decisions had to be made—now keeping in mind the exact amount of money available for the awards. When final decisions were achieved, the Committee then prepared for mailing the letters of acceptance and rejection to the students. It is no easy matter to write a letter of rejection. It seems evident, however, that no matter how much money is available, we will always have more worthy and needy applicants. It should be stressed here that all applicants in addition to being good students and perhaps affiliated must meet the requirement of "need".

As students received their letters of acceptance, notes of thanks and gratitude began to pour in. Lists of colleges with the students attending each was mailed to the Acting Grand Secretary in August. She, in turn, has seen that checks were written for the first half of the award and mailed to the Financial Aid Office of the colleges. Students received their checks at the college office upon enrollment.

Members can take great pride in the achievement of the Scholarship Fund this year. \$39,000 in a total of 169 General Education awards was made; 51 of which were regrants. There were 28 Religious awards in the amount of \$8,400; six of these were regrants. A list of the recipients, their addresses, vocational objectives, colleges they will be attending and the amount of the award is included in this report which will appear in the Proceedings. You will want to know that we had awards go to 92 affiliated members: 18 members of the Order of Eastern Star, eight members of the DeMolay, 23 members of Job's Daughters and 39 members of the Rainbow for Girls. Four of our college students are Masons. It is encouraging to see these young students entering the adult organizations.

As a freshman member on this Committee I enjoyed the wit of our only male member, Brother Frances White, for two years. Then for two years there were only "we girls". Now in my senior year on this Committee we are fortunate to have the sage advice of another male member. This newest member of the Committee provided your Chairman with more than one chuckle with the remarks noted on the applications. However, it was what I call a truly coincident name and address of an applicant, Theresa Dahl, that really seemed quite humorous to me. This Dahl lived on Easy Street in Smartville. Now don't you think she really has it made?

In a more serious manner, I wish to report to you the intense gratitude these recipients express. Here are excerpts from several letters:

from a future nurse . . .

"I will do my best to show all of you who have given me your support that I can succeed. I want all of you to be proud of me. I am very honored to receive this award."

from a young husband of few words . . .

"Thank you so much; your award of \$300 really eases our financial bind. That's all I really have to say, I guess. Thanks again and God Bless You."

from a grateful family . . .

from a member's son . . .

"I would like to extend my appreciation to the members, and thank them for this award. I can assure you the money will be used for what it was intended. Thank you for having the confidence in me; it will not prove to be ill-founded."

from another husband, a student for the ministry . . .

"I want to thank you for this award. My family and I are greatly appreciative of the help this will be for this year. Our load will be a little lighter and our hearts a little fuller because you shared with us. Thank you again."

from a medical student . . .

"As I indicated on my application, my years of formal schooling are far from over. I look forward, though, to the day when I will be able to help others as you are helping me."

One youngster reported she had given up the opportunity to vacation with her family in order to work, saving the money for her first year in college. Just when she was feeling lonely one day on her return home from her job and was indulging in a bit of self pity, she opened her letter announcing the scholarship award. She says she shouted with joy all over that "empty" house. She felt rewarded for staying home.

Another stated that the very day she was laid off of her summer job, she received our letter which helped to brighten the day. She says, "When I go out in the morning looking for work, I put the letter in my purse as a support and a reminder that someone cares for the future of today's young people. I will do my very best in school this fall and will not let the Committee or the Grand Chapter down."

Perhaps these responses will help you to understand why each member of the Scholarship Committee appreciates the opportunity of serving Grand Chapter on this very important and worthy project. As this is my last year, I wish to express my gratitude to Past Grand Matron Lura Rae Dales for my appointment in 1968 and to my own Past Grand Matron for the recommendation.

The work of this Committee can go forward only with the full support of the Grand Secretary and her capable staff. I wish to express deep gratitude for the assistance given by Acting Grand Secretary, Gladys M. Johnson and to Diane Dixon who handles much of the correspondence. The Committee expresses a "thank you" to Sister Marie Williford, a visiting member, who assisted us in preparing the letters for mailing.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron for appointing me as Chairman of the Cancer Dressing Stations. It has given me the opportunity to meet and work with so many members throughout the State dedicated to this most worthwhile project in the Service of helping others. It has been one of the most rewarding experiences in my life. I do hope that you will be pleased with our accomplishments this year.

No one can undertake a project of this magnitude without help and you have given me two capable Co-Chairmen, Betty Allen and Grace Matthews, who have helped so much by visiting several Stations, which I could not do alone. My sincere thanks to each of you and to all Station Chairmen who give so much time in keeping records, sending in reports and taking care of the demand for dressings needed. To all the Faithful workers, thank you all so very much.

My sincere thanks to Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, for her advice and very nice letters and encouragement. A special thanks to Alice Koon, Chairman of 1970 for all your help and advice and for being my traveling companion at times. To Mary Schwilk, 1971 Chairman for your advice and generous hospitality and to all past State Chairmen who sent notes of encouragement, my thanks to all.

Our Grand Electa, Myrtle Dauberg and Grand Warder, La-Vonne Kirschner, chose Cancer Dressing as their projects for this year and have turned in quite a sum of money to help our Fund, thank you both very much.

It has been a pleasure to work with our Grand Secretary, thank you for your assistance and to Diane Dixon who kept me well informed as to our financial status.

We continually strive to remind our Station workers as well as the general membership that while not one penny of the Cancer Fund is ever expended for any purpose than for the Gauze and Cellu-cotton from which most of our dressings are made, the constantly rising cost of living also affects the cost of those materials, and we are resolved that only those dressings which are needed shall be made to avoid stockpiling or storing any dressings more than those required by the constitution to meet the unexpected needs of a member.

All Stations use identical manuals so that our dressings are all uniform. Our aim is to maintain a high standard quality in our dressings and we have stressed quality rather than quantity in every station throughout the State. Our ladies at the Eastern Star Home have helped so much in making 10,250 bed pads to be used at the home. This is great to have these above 80-year young ladies help us like this.

This is the 15th year for the Cancer Dressing program and we have 125 Stations now. One small Station closed this year and two Stations were reactivated. A group of Star members from Kernville went over to work at Ridgecrest Station to learn how to make bedpads. They spent quite a bit of time with them and are now working as a sub-station with Ridgecrest Station; it is working together like this that makes our project so very special.

We have visited many of the Stations this year, covering thousands of miles and we had some combined meetings, which gave us an opportunity to meet and see the work of more Stations.

Throughout the State we have had many Rainbow Girls and Job's Daughters and one DeMolay boy working at our Stations. One group made 250 Hospital gowns for the Masonic Home at Union City. In Rialto, the American Cancer Society presented the Rain-

bow girls with a plaque of recognition for 594 hours of work making gauze bibs used by Cancer patients who have undergone Laryngectomy operations.

The cooperation between our Stations and the American Cancer Society has been most beneficial to both organizations, the American Cancer Society has stated many times how very much we do help, as the money we save them in buying our own materials, releases that much more money for research work for them as they strive to find a cure for cancer.

I have traveled with June Chrysler, coordinator in the Cancer Dressing Program for the American Cancer Society in Sacramento, where the depot for that area is located. She gives much of her time and help to our Stations and works to coordinate the flow of dressings to their places of need. She is indeed a devoted friend to our Eastern Star Cancer Dressing Program.

Our project can only be carried on by voluntary donations and support from the Chapters. This year Memorials have come in very well and acknowledgments are always sent to the bereaved families from the Grand Secretary. Many fund raising events have been undertaken by various groups. This year again the 1957 and 1969 Clubs of East Bay each put on a successful breakfast. In San Diego, under the direction of Lillian Lehman another successful breakfast was held. In San Francisco Marguerite Weisheimer Past Grand Matron of 1957 and Matrons, Florence Dunn Past Grand Matron of 1969 and Matrons combined to hold a Silver Tea with very good results. In Sacramento the 1957 Matrons held a successful tea. The Florence Dunn Associations and Dick Brassell Past Grand Patron of 1969 work continually to support our program. Ruby Ray sends in considerable sums each year from luncheons, which are served at the Station each work day. Maxine Hall 1968 Matron of Temple Chapter, Sacramento has helped our Fund with jewelry she has made and orders have come in from all parts of the State for a total of \$1,100 at the end of June.

Many other luncheons, card parties and breakfasts were put on by the Stations or Chapters. These fund raising events don't just happen, it takes lots of time to plan and much hard work is put into them by many members. We do extend our sincere thanks to all who have helped in any way to make our program possible.

It has been my pleasure to present 5, 10, and 15 year award pins. This is the first time that we were able to award 15 year pins and I was thrilled to be able to do this for the American Cancer Society where they were unable to do it because they were presented in a Chapter meeting.

Most of our stations meet in Masonic Temples and I would like to thank our Masonic Brothers for permitting our stations to work in these rent free facilities. Some stations work in church recreation halls, Community Centers, Red Cross Buildings and in Homes, we do appreciate all these advantages.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, our Distinguished
and Honored Members, Delegates and Members:

We have representatives from the various convention centers this morning who are to present their bids for future sessions. We will introduce them, have them present their bids, then they will meet with the Finance Committee, and following that, if our Worthy Grand Matron can arrange it, we will give the regular report. But I thought we would like to have you hear the bids first, so that the Finance Committee would have ample time to review them and then make recommendations to us.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members and Delegates, the Special Convention Committee appointed this year has contacted various convention bureaus in cities to secure bids for the 1978, 1979, 1980 and 1981 Grand Chapter Sessions.

Prior to giving our report, we will have the representatives of these cities present their bids and invite us to hold our sessions in their city. Then they will meet with the Finance Committee.

We are presenting the representatives alphabetically according to the cities and area.

From the North we have first Mr. Keith Wendell of the Oakland Convention Bureau.

Mr. Keith Wendell:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Delegates. Good morning:

My name is Keith Wendell, I am Assistant Manager of the Oakland Convention and Visitors Bureau. On behalf of the Mayor of the City of Oakland and the Oakland Convention Bureau, we

would like to extend a most cordial invitation to hold your 1979 or 1981 convention in the friendly City of Oakland.

Oakland has many attractions and points of interest to offer our visitors. The new Oakland four square block of Museum, East Bay Regional Parks, our Jack London waterfront restaurants area and, of course, BART, which commenced operations on September 11 of this year.

By 1974 we expect the complete 75-mile system to be open, which will link the cities of downtown San Francisco and Oakland by means of the longest underwater transit tunnel in the world.

This will enable delegates that do want to visit the City in the evening to go over there in minutes.

Our facilities, we feel, are quite adequate to handle this size of convention.

In our airport area we have about 1200 first-class sleeping rooms currently. In the downtown area an additional 750, with more on the way. These include complimentary badges, registration assistance, typists, full covered programs, maps and brochures and other informational material which gives you an idea what there is to do in the area in the evenings, and it points out the points of interest, I should say.

It is a pleasure for us to once again invite you to return to Long Beach. We recall the excellent relationship we once had, and we are hopeful of reestablishing that relationship once again in 1978.

Now I'm not going to stand here and tell you that we have corrected all of our problems. Those problems have probably caused you to leave in 1965, but I am here to tell you that we're doing wonderful things to improve the hotel situation that exists in our City. At the present time, before the year is out, we will have under construction 1,000 new hotel rooms. Of these 1,000 rooms, 400 will be on the Queen Mary and operated by PSA Hotels.

The Queen Mary, as you are aware, at one time took some time to get opened. I'm happy to say now that we have just passed our two millionth visitor aboard the Queen Mary, and we look for many millions more to come in the future.

Thet additional hotel rooms that are going to be constructed are adjacent and in close relationship to the Queen Mary. The contracts have already been signed and approved by the City Council of Long Beach for a new Hilton Inn to be located adjacent to the Queen Mary, and for a new Sheraton Hotel adjacent to the Long Beach Arena.

From the beginning we have placed improvement of the publication at the top of our achievement list. We have constantly looked for quicker and more efficient methods of getting the publication to you; and where financially possible, to implement a more professional approach. With this goal in mind, early in the year we purchased an addressograph machine and an IBM electric typewriter. We hope you have noticed that your issue now carries a clearer address label.

This equipment made possible the use of a Kardex system which produced faster file reference and more efficient processing of our mailings. Just for comparison's sake . . . our first mailing back in 1970 required a staff of 15 to 18 persons to label and bundle approximately 2500 copics. Our recent mailing required 9 workers and in only $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours we had deposited some 6500 copies at the Postal Department. You can be certain that each volunteer on our staff personally appreciates improvements of this type.

We are happy to report that your publication now has a part-time employee on its payroll. Sister Mary Roberts, P.M. of Triangle Chapter No. 456, has assumed the position of our clerical office worker and is doing a credible job.

During the year, I wrote each Worthy Matron in the state to request that a Chairman be appointed in each chapter to procure subscriptions and to accept articles from the members for our publication. My personal thanks to the Worthy Matrons for their cooperation which we feel has greatly contributed to this successful year.

You now have a duplicate copy of your subscription slip as reference should it become necessary for you to contact our office regarding your subscription. NOW is the most opportune moment for me to say that we do hope you have renewed because, of course, our continuance is paramount upon your approval as evidenced by subscriptions. Yes, if you fail to subscribe then we will subside. Although our subscriber list has steadily increased during the three year period, we feel that with the cooperation of the membership our list should double.

It was unfortunate this year that some copies of our first issue went astray due to new and inexperienced personnel within the Postal Department. We have been assured that this occurrence will not be repeated. Those subscribers who notified us they had not received their copy were immediately mailed another copy.

The publication recognizes and appreciates the support and credit given the publication by our Sister Barbara Poole, Worthy Grand Matron; Brother Jay Miller, Worthy Grand Patron; and their Grand Officers. Before proceeding with our report I would like to introduce the other two members of our committee, Sister Vera Blum and Brother Wayne Bode.

The Convention Committee this year proceeded along the same lines as in the past three years. We investigated sites for our sessions to determine that the facilities including our meeting places, housing, banquet facilities and all other needs of our group could be met and to secure in writing the guarantees made by such cities or convention bureaus.

You have heard the result of our investigation presented in bid form by the various cities. In addition to these, several other cities were contacted to see if their facilities would be available and if they would be adequate.

We did not contact the Fresno Convention Bureau as it has been previously determined that their Center is not suitable for our particular type of meeting as there is no provision for an entrance hall or room in the arena.

Upon checking San Diego we found that we would still have to have our Monday and Friday evening sessions in the large arena, thus incurring additional expense and much more work for the Grand Chapter Week Committee.

The Biltmore Hotel in Los Angeles contacted us several times as they were most anxious to host our group. They do have facilities for certain types of our affairs such as receptions and re-unions but they do not have the facilities large enough for our Grand Chapter Session.

The city of San Jose was most anxious to host our group also; however their facilities are not large enough for our group.

The other cities contacted were Anaheim, Long Beach, Oakland, Sacramento and San Francisco.

As noted in the report last year, some of the facilities were not available to us at our regular time. Even though the delegates voted to reserve our dates many years ahead, we find that some areas have reservations as many as fifteen years ahead. The facilities in Southern California are attracting many large conventions and trade shows which convene during the months of September and October, thus making it very difficult for us to have our sessions in the south at our regular time.

REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

(Presented by Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

As I entered upon this platform this morning, somebody said, "Good morning, Judge," and I did not recognize him, and I said, "Have you been before me before?"

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Delegates:

If you have your proceedings before you of the Constitutional Amendments, this is the report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee and Jurisprudence Committee in reference to Section 32, Amendment No. 5, conferring of Emeritus Title on our deceased Grand Secretary, Sister Maud McWilliams Smith.

The report reads as follows: Since this legislation was presented prior to her death, it is thought to be better to amend this section by adding to the words: "The title of Grand Secretary Emeritus is hereby conferred upon our loved and valued sister, Maud Mc-Williams Smith," and after her name to add the word "deceased," and it reads the same as the printed matter. Is that clear to you?

"The title of Grand Secretary Emeritus is hereby conferred upon our loved and valued sister, Maud McWilliams Smith of California Chapter No. 183, in regard for her many years of faithful service as Grand Secretary of this Grand Chapter."

It is proposed to amend that so as to add the words "recognized as having been conferred the title of Grand Secretary Emeritus," "the title of Grand Secretary Emeritus is recognized as having been conferred," and after her name we add the word "deceased," so we know why we are conferring it at this time. Is that clear to you?

Adopted as amended.

Richard Brassell, Chairman Constitution and By-Laws Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Delegates: Continuing with our amendments concerning the proposed changes, proposed amendments concerning the changes in the election procedures, a few of which you considered yesterday, I would like to ask Brother Ed Collins to present the next two for your consideration.

Edwin F. Collins, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers:

Column 1, the next to the last line in Column 1, Section 16, Election Procedure, Proposed Amendment No. 3.

The bottom of Column 1. It now reads: "Election to the office of Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, Associate Grand Patron and Grand Conductress may, in each case," and so forth.

Please strike out the italics Associate Grand Patron, that is a printing error that should not be there.

If there be no objection by striking this out, I move that it be stricken.

Adopted.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

We will take the vote on the Proposed Amendment No. 3 to Section 16 as amended.

Adopted as amended.

Edwin F. Collins, Past Grand Patron:

Column 5, Proposed Amendment No. 16, right in the center, Section 300, Amendment No. 16.

Your Joint Committee of Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom was referred the Proposed Amendment No. 16, Section 300, Rule 14, Special Rules of the Grand Chapter, recommends a "yes" vote.

Now we wish to strike out the complete paragraph which now reads: "In ease of easting ballot by virtue of a motion unanimously carried, as provided in Section 16 of the Constitution, the ballot ordered east by such motion shall be deposited in any convenient voting booth and shall be immediately reported orally by the Board."

The reason for recommending a "yes" vote in easting this out is that you have just passed this other amendment, No. 3, Section 16 on Page 1, in that if only one person is running it will not be necessary to have a ballot cast.

You can have a unanimous ballot, and therefore that has passed, so we recommend that this be stricken. I so move, Worthy Grand Matron.

Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, the next proposed amendment for consideration is No. 22 at the top of Column 7. Brother Jim Millard will present this.

James Millard, Past Grand Patron:

After Column 7 Vacancies in Office, Section 354, they are proposing: "The resignation may be withdrawn in a like manner as it was made, providing that an elected officer may submit only one proposal of resignation during his or her term of office, and providing that an elected line officer may submit only one proposal of resignation during his or her terms of office."

The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence have carefully considered this legislation, and we feel that this is an individual case and should be considered by the Chapter itself.

We certainly are in sympathy with any Chapter that is in need of such legislation as this, but they elect the officers for their Chapter for the year, and if they carefully consider personal and other qualifications of the person for this office, it is only their problem for the year that they serve.

If such a case as this may arise, they can correct on the following year's election, so therefore, the Committees on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence recommend a "no" vote.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

I would like to move, Worthy Grand Matron, that the proposed amendment No. 22 to Section 354 be amended by inserting after the words "The resignation may be withdrawn in a like manner as it was made," at that point insert the words, as they now stand in our Constitution, in the paragraph as printed above, insert the words, "at any time before it is accepted."

Then the wording of the proposed amendment would be as it is printed in the section, providing that an elected officer, etc., as these people would like to have it.

Then, Worthy Grand Matron, we will be legal in considering this proposed amendment in line with the present Constitution.

Adopted.

By Douglas Cairns, Worthy Patron, Chispa Chapter No. 151, to amend the amendment by striking the word "submit" and substituting the word "withdraw" on Line 3 and Line 5 of Section 354.

Adopted.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Sisters and Brothers, you are now about to vote on the adoption of the proposed Amendment No. 22 to Section 354 as amended.

Adopted as amended.

Stanley Love:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, I would refer you, Sisters and Brothers, to the first page, Column 2, the Section is 182:

The Amendment is No. 7, Section 182, under the heading of Endowment Fund.

If you will note carefully, the first under 182 (a), where it uses the words: "The Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter shall act as the Secretary for the Committee." This is eliminated and is replaced in the proposed amendment with the words: "A member of the Committee shall act as the Secretary for the Committee."

Your Constitution and By-Laws Committee and Jurisprudence Committee propose in the interest of simplification and convenience, to adopt this and recommend a "yes" vote.

Adopted.

Motion:

Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, following my report on our lovely Sister Maud, I move that the Secretary send to her close relatives a copy of this section which we read here and adopted by this Grand Chapter.

Carried.

Motion:

Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

I have another motion, this should be addressed to the Worthy Grand Patron, since it involves one of your recommendations. May I address him, Worthy Grand Matron.

There was referred to this Committee on Jurisprudence the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron to the effect that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to present a format at our next Session to further shorten Grand Chapter proceedings. It has been referred to the Jurisprudence Committee, and I recommend that this matter be referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for consideration. I assume that is it.

Jay E. Miller, Worthy Grand Patron:

It is the recommendation that the shortening of Grand Chapter Session be referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron. It has been moved and seconded that this question be referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for her consideration.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Members of Grand Chapter, your Committee on Appeals and Grievances is pleased to report that very few cases, or problems, have been referred to it this year. However, the few troubles that have been brought to our attention had developed into rather serious problems by the time they were presented to us.

We have found that what would normally appear to be small things have grown into big issues with certain members of the Chapter, until everything is blown way out of proportion, and then the Chapter seeks assistance from Grand Chapter through the Appeals and Grievances Committee, expecting one or more of the committee members to come and say a few magic words, or wave a magic wand, and make the problems disappear.

My Sisters and Brothers, problems are caused by people; by their inability to try to get along with each other; by their refusal to live the Obligation each one takes in becoming a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and by their failure to live by the Golden Rule. In the majority of cases the trouble has been among the elective officers. Honors not only bring responsibilities, but tend

to cause jealousy and inflated personal views of oneself as well as an unwillingness to understand those with whom they are working.

If only our line officers, on whom rests the leadership of our Chapters, could realize the truth of the statement that no one has ever risen to the real stature of leadership until he has found that it is finer to serve somebody else than it is to serve himself—that there is nothing noble in being superior to some other person. True worth is in being superior to your former self. Good will can solve every problem, whether it arises in the Chapter or in the nation.

We cannot all think alike and we cannot all act alike, but we can think together and act together, and we can respect the rights of others to differ in their opinion from our own.

It is gratifying to know that these Chapters are now experiencing rejuvenation in both attendance and interest. Several other Chapters are currently considering consolidation but have not finalized plans as of this date.

This committee fully realizes that the decision to consolidate is most important in the life of a Chapter, and offtimes quite painful.

Too often only a few members of the Chapters involved are present at the critical moment of decision. However, no dedicated Eastern Star member can dispute the fact that consolidation is healthy and the only solution for those Chapters struggling for survival.

The following suggestions are offered by this committee to those chapters considering consolidation:

- (1) Invite a member of the Consolidation Committee to meet with you to answer any questions you may have.
- (2) Make the decision to consolidate early in the year since this procedure requires three to four months to complete.
- (3) Do not permit visitations, party nights, or pre-arranged schedules to preempt the matter at hand. Once consolidation has been initiated, all other matters should become secondary.

The recommendation of this committee to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron is that a Special Committee be appointed to investigate those chapters having a history for 3 years of unfilled elective stations 60 days following the annual installation of their corps of officers. Further, that this Special Committee make appropriate report to the Worthy Grand Matron, and that proper action be taken.

REPORT OF CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

Presented by Richard Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

The first amendment in Column 1, Section 12, Eligibility to Office, was referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, and report on that will be made by Brother Ed Collins.

Edwin Collins, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers:

The very first proposition, Eligibility to Office. In adding Section 12, Amendment No. 1, it is identical with the top Eligibility to Office, but the addition is in italics.

You can notice it at the bottom there, and it is signed by the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons Association of California, and it reads: "and further provided that the member of Grand Chapter holding the office of Grand Secretary shall not be eligible to be a candidate for that office at the Grand Chapter election of officers following his or her 70th birthday."

Your Committee on Constitution and By-Laws recommend a "yes" vote. I so move, Worthy Grand Matron.

Otto Zentner, Past Patron No. 136:

Worthy Grand Matron, I am Otto Zentner, Past Patron representing the Past Patrons of Centinela Chapter No. 136. I would like to speak to this amendment.

I thoroughly understand what it was intended to do, but as worded it fails to achieve that purpose.

The amendment, the italics, are listed here, point at one person. The incumbent secretary may not be a candidate, but there is nothing in here that says that anyone else over 70 could not be a candidate, and I think that is not what we want.

As I understand it, we wish a retirement age of 70 at that point. Now I think that we should amend that so it would apply to any person over 70 years old, and I would propose an amendment for discussion, "and further provided that no member having attained his or her 70th birthday shall be eligible to be a candidate for any salaried elective office of the Grand Chapter." I so move.

Now, Sisters and Brothers, the question is on the adoption of the substitute amendment presented in place of No. 1 to Section 12. There is no more discussion. All those in favor of adoption of the substitute amendment will vote by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter. Those opposed the same sign.

Not Adopted.

Robert Lutz, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I should like to propose an amendment to this Eligibility to Office to read: "No Grand Officer may serve for more than 15 years, or in the event the Grand Officer is required to serve under bond, retirement is mandatory upon reaching 70 years of age."

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Now, Sisters and Brothers, the question is on the adoption of the substitute amendment presented in the place of No. 1 to Section 12—"No Grand Officer may serve for more than 15 years or in the event the Grand Officer is required to serve under bond, retirement is mandatory at 70 years of age." Now, Sisters and Brothers, the question is on the adoption of the substitute amendment presented in the place of No. 1 to Section 12.

Not Adopted.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Now we will vote on the proposed Amendment No. 1 to Section 12 as printed.

La Verne Walker, Past Matron, San Dimas Chapter, No. 509:

I believe our delegates are ready to vote on this amendment No. 1, but I do believe we would be wise to substitute the word "seeking" for "holding". This would eliminate any future problems.

Motion:

By Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron that the word "holding" be struck and the word "seeking" be inserted.

Adopted.

Barbara E. Poole. Worthy Grand Matron:

You are now going to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment No. 1, Section 12 as amended.

Adopted as Amended.

DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

Esther Sandman, Past Grand Matron:

I don't think Jurisprudence has enough to do, so we have assigned the recommendation of the Consolidation Chairman, Brother Robert Armbrust and his resolution to Jurisprudence.

Edwin Collins, Past Grand Patron:

Now, Worthy Grand Matron, we have another one for you, Column 2, Sisters and Brothers, Section 169, about two-thirds of the way down, Proposed Amendment No. 6.

The Proposed Amendment, which is No. 6, the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund Committee shall consist of a Chairman and fifteen members.

That is increasing it by one member. In other words, the Chairman will be in an executive position, such as appointing or delegating assignments and will not have to make the assignments herself, as we understand it, there will not be any additional expense to this Grand Chapter, and your Committee on Constitution and By-Laws recommends a "yes" vote. I so move.

Adopted.

Richard Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, your Joint Committees of Constitution and By-Laws and Finance, to which was referred Proposed Amendments No. 9 and 11, your Joint Committees on Constitution and By-Laws, and Jurisprudence and Finance, to which was referred Proposed Amendment No. 27, which will be presented by Brother Bill Cook, Chairman of the Finance Committee.

William J. Cook, Chairman Finance Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron. We're going to talk about Amendment No. 11, which is at the bottom of Column 3 and on the top of Column 4. It concerns mileage. This amendment proposes a sum equal to ten cents per mile for the round trip from the location of the Chapter of each of the following persons, to wit: and those persons remain the same.

This amendment proposes that the five cents per mile be increased to ten cents per mile.

Your Joint Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, Jurisprudence and Finance, to whom this amendment to Section 222 was referred, feels that this legislation should be decided by the Grand Chapter, and therefore make no recommendation.

Yesterday you heard the report of the Mileage Committee who recommended that \$34,662.50 be paid in mileage to this Grand Chapter. The Representative Fund, from which these monies are paid, is \$6,500 in the hole. I am the kind of a guy who rounds figures off, so I will say that is \$7,000 in the hole. We are paying out \$35,000, so we have got to collect \$42,000.

We have 135,000 members that are assessed, and to accomplish that the assessment against the Chapter will have to be 32 cents. That will get the Fund out of the red and takes the brackets off of it and puts \$750 in that Fund.

To increase this mileage allowance to 10 cents a mile, as this amendment proposes, and based on this Session's payments, will require a per capita tax of 52 cents.

Not Adopted.

Logan Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. Section 195, J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund, Proposed Amendment No. 9. You will notice, Sisters and Brothers, I think it is very clear at the present time, the maximum amount of aid to any one case shall be \$2,000, and when an emergency exists the maximum amount may be increased not to exceed an additional \$500.

The proposed amendment is to increase the maximum amount of aid in any case to \$5,000, and if the Committee determines that an emergency exists, the maximum amount may be increased not to exceed an additional \$1,000.

Now, I think before you vote on this, you might just remember that there is considerable money in that Fund and more coming in. We believe that this recommendation by the Committee of Constitution and By-Laws and Finance is good, all the members recommend a "yes" vote on this, but before you vote on it, the fees of a doctor and the fees of the hospitals, various people who are benig treated against this treacherous disease, they mount up to thousands of dollars.

Some people have lost their homes and all of their years of earnings of a lifetime.

So you may say, "Do you have the money?" And I think it should be explained to you very fully. The balance at the end of June 30, 1972 in the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund was \$428,879. Now that is an increase of \$37,900 from last year's balance.

The total income last year on the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund was \$94,000, and the total expense was \$56,000 so we're not de-

pleting the Fund and we do not believe that we will deplete it with this increase.

The 15 members of the Cancer Fund, I understand, make a very thorough investigation on whether or not the people are eligible for this aid, so the Joint Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and Delegates, recommends a vote "yes" on this.

Edward T. Mancuso, Past Grand Patron:

I feel that we have been very fortunate in being able to support our members that have had a cancer problem. I would therefore, Worthy Grand Matron, like to amend this legislation to provide that the \$5,000 be changed to \$2,500, and that the additional \$1,000 remain as recommended. That would be an increase in those cases that are found worthy of demanding additional relief of a thousand dollars of what they are receiving at the present time.

I am moving that the \$5,000 be amended to \$2,500. The question I wanted to bring forth was that we have other provisions for giving assistance to members that have received the maximum amount under the Cancer Fund at the present time. You have the Benevolent Fund that they can give additional help and assistance to the members that have received the maximum. Under the Cancer Dressing Project they can give additional funds for additional help and assistance, if and when needed.

Under the motion I have made, I am increasing the \$2,500 to \$3,500, which is an increase of a thousand dollars, and they can still go to the Benevolent Fund if they need additional money.

Motion:

Dalora Burnham, Past Grand Patron:

I move the previous question.

Carried.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Now, Sisters and Brothers, it has been moved and seconded to strike out the \$5,000 and insert \$2,500, and leave the other thousand dollars.

Lost.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Now we will vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment No. 9 to Section 195 as printed.

Adopted.

Logan Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

If you will turn to Amendment 27, Section 760, it is entitled the Home Site. Turn to your hymnal and we will start.

The Joint Committees on Constitution and By-Laws, Jurisprudence and Finance, to whom was referred the Proposed Amendment No. 27 to Section 760, Home Site, recommend a "no" vote. That is the italies, as you would notice, which is the same as the original except this: "except any unimproved real estate now owned. Unimproved real estate may be sold at the discretion of the Board of Trustees when in their opinion it is in the best interest of the Home and the Order."

It is the belief of the Committees, the combined Committees, that the delegates assembled and the members of Grand Chapter, it will be in their discretion as to whether or not real estate should be sold, as proposed by this amendment. We recommend a "no" vote.

After Discussion.

Motion:

Tom Galvery, Worthy Patron, Baldwin Park Chapter No. 527:

I move the previous question.

Carried.

The Worthy Grand Matron then called for a vote on the adoption of proposed Amendment No. 27 to Section 760 as printed.

Not Adopted.

Motion:

William J. Cook, Chairman Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee recommends the adoption of a 30-cent per capita tax for 1973 for the Insurance Fund. This is the same amount as last year. I move the adoption of the 30-cent per capita tax for the Insurance Fund for 1973.

Carried.

Motion:

William J. Cook, Chairman Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee recommends the adoption of a one cent per capita tax for the 1973 Benevolent Fund. This is the same amount as last year.

Carried.

Motion:

William J. Cook, Chairman Finance Committee:

The Finance Committee recommends the adoption of a 10-cent per capita tax for 1973 for the Scholarship Fund. This is the same amount as last year.

Carried.

Motion:

William J. Cook, Chairman Finance Committee:

One more, as I explained earlier, when we were going over Section 222, this is required, the Finance Committee recommends the adoption of a 32-cent per capita tax for 1973 for the Representative Fund. That is the mileage fund. That is 7 cents more than last year.

Carried.

Lilas E. Hang, Associate Grand Matron:

Will the Deputy Grand Matrons and the Grand Representatives of 1973 meet in the Convention Center right here on stage Friday night, 6:30 p.m., before installation for pictures. Also, there have been many questions pertaining to tickets for the Installation for Friday night.

It is my understanding that any member wishing to attend Installation must have credentials. The only ones admitted without credentials are either the families of the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron-elect or the Chapter members who will be admitted with white tickets and purple ribbons and are going to be seated in special sections. Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

Lura Rae Dales, there are many questions, I know, from the Worthy Matrons and Patrons concerning Recessional.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members and Friends:

I wish first to thank the Worthy Grand Matron for the invitation to be here this evening as your guest, and say a few words to you on behalf of the International Order of Job's Daughters. It is indeed a distinct pleasure and honor.

At our Grand Bethel Session this past June in Oakland, this charming lady, Mrs. Barbara Poole, your Worthy Grand Matron, and this fine gentleman, Mr. Jay Miller, your Worthy Grand Patron, did us the honor of visiting with us, and a great many of the Job's Daughters in California.

During her remarks to our daughters, Mrs. Poole made a comment that has stayed in my thoughts, and when asked to say something to you this evening, her comment has generated the thoughts I would like to leave with you. In effect, she said it would please her very much to see those interested and eligible in becoming members of the Order of the Eastern Star, to do so when they are of age.

We, as leaders and representatives of all the leaders of the Job's Daughters in California would like nothing better than to see this come about. It would have a great impact on the future of our organization as well as the Masonic Fraternity itself. We are in high hopes that this year the downward trend has ended and possibly that it will even be on an upward swing.

The whys are many and varied: To name a few, there is environment, spreading urbanization, changing social ideals, changing moral values, changing ideals, allegiances and obligations.

There are many others and they may be placed in any order that you wish.

The next thing is, what can be done to help change this picture? As probably most of you know, our Bethels are self-supporting and it is not often that they are in serious financial problems, so this cannot be considered a primary problem.

The biggest problem is obtaining adults that are qualified to serve in a Bethel counsel capacity, adults with a genuine interest in helping to perpetuate our Masonic families, and adults with the strength of their convictions and a little fire in their soul that will

not fade and sputter out when they meet the first obstacle.

I can sum it all up with this, very simply, we need all of the assistance we're able to muster up at councils, encouraging membership or just by your very presence at their meetings and by your moral support. They enjoy your presence and will reflect this in their ritual work and their general attitude.

So if you also feel strongly that what I have presented to you warrants fighting for, we will all be able to look forward to a brighter future and keep all of these organizations belonging to our younger generation active and healthy for the benefit of our Nation's future leadership, dignity, peace and harmony.

I might add, enthusiasm when you eat a box lunch with 6,200 Job's Daughters, that is a lot of box lunches, and we did it right on the stage, and the girls were eating all around us, and box lunches were in order, 6,200, that is a lot of them, is it not? So that is how close you can get to a youth group, I would say that is it.

We are so happy that you, in turn, could be with us. This is a great pleasure for us to have you. We can't serve you box lunches.

Tonight how pleased we are that our Sister Flo McDonald, Supreme Worthy Associate Advisor of the Supreme Assembly of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, is with us on this particular night which is set aside for our youth organizations. Sister Flo, would you please rise.

Sisters and Brothers, I wish you could have been with us at the Grand Assembly in Sacramento to witness the love and respect the Rainbow Girls have for our Sister Flo. She is indeed loved and admired by these girls of Rainbow, just as much as we in the Eastern Star love her. Thank you, Sister Florence, for again being present with us this evening.

Being in a position to introduce our next speaker is a very special privilege, for she is no stranger to us. Sister Barbara Campbell is a Past Matron of Fresno Chapter and a very active member in Grand Chapter. We in the Central San Joaquin have long marveled at her activity to take on half a dozen jobs and complete them all with perfection and on time.

Her efficiency is exceeded only by her stamina and her perseverance.

It is now my honor to present Sister Barbara Campbell, Supreme Deputy of Rainbow in California. We would be pleased to hear from you, Sister Barbara, and have you introduce Sister Kathy Jenkins, Grand Worthy Advisor.

Barbara Campbell, Supreme Deputy in California:

Thank you, Brother Jay. I will speak to you about that when you get back to the San Joaquin Valley.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of the Grand Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

This Grand Chapter year has been the year of the Queens and the Queen's Men. We have no titles similar to that in Rainbow but, we do have a phrase which is applicable. It says that "they who give themselves to a life of service are the crowned queens of every assembly" and, so in this golden anniversary year of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls, I speak with pride of the service given to others by these girls. In times of reports which mention billions of dollars and populations of hundred-thousands, our facts may not seem like much but, remember—we're talking about 13,269 girls between the ages of 12 and 20 who belong to our 248 assemblies in California. Girls who may walk with their heads in the clouds sometimes; girls with their teen-age hopes and ambitions; girls who still find time to help someone else.

Our last annual service report presented at Grand Assembly showed a total of \$18,733 and 172,565 hours given through local projects. California Rainbow also was able to award 17 scholar-ships for a total of \$4,600 from its own scholarship fund which is composed of money earned by the girls—augmented by memorial gifts and donations. In addition—in that one year—another \$18,700 was earned by the girls for the service project which their Grand Worthy Advisor had chosen—Guide Dogs for the Blind in San Rafael. Each year our Grand Worthy Advisor has the privilege and responsibility of choosing the statewide project.

Now we are half through another Grand Year. Our Grand Worthy Advisor has chosen another project where the girls' service is muchly needed. The results of her operation, Green Earth, will not be known until Grand Assembly in April, but already some of you have seen the results around your hometowns as the Rainbow Girls

have begun their fight to combat pollution and ugliness. Do you read about the work of our young members? Sometimes. But any Chapter publicity chairman knows the difficulty of getting an article into a local newspaper, especially if that article has good news about nice people. It's discouraging but, do you know what is even more discouraging to some of us? It's finding out that in some of our own Masonic Temples—no one hears about the accomplishments of our Masonic youth. We even meet Eastern Star members who have held a dues card for a year or maybe more before they finally found out that Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters and De-Molay aren't part of Scouting or the 4-H movement. We have some communities where we simply cannot get our own Chapter members to even attend a meeting as a guest—much less be on a Board and give actual help of the month-to-month variety.

Tuesday evening, our Past Grand Patron, Brother Logan Cotton, spoke about the declining interest in the Order and the diminishing members. We heard Mr. Kerr's report, and we must tell you in the last ten years we have shown a decline in membership, just as our Chapter has, but, my Sisters and Brothers, do you suppose that you and I will wake up in time to make use of these thousands of young people we still do have in these three Masonic Youth Groups in California? Young people who are Masonic minded, who are fraternal minded, and who are already receiving fraternal instruction and tradition. Unfortunately, sometimes we cannot even get our members to come to our Chapter meetings, and we often find we cannot get them in some communities to a youth group meeting, even as a guest, much less to be on a Board and give that month-to-month type of help.

Why don't these young people come into our Order? I think one reason is that we have failed to give them an example. They need to know you. The girls need to be able to look at you ladies and say, "Gee, if that lady I admire so much is an Eastern Star, I want to be one, too," and the boys need to look at you gentlemen and say, "If that man whom I respect so much finds time for Masonry, then I'm going to find time for it, too."

We have within our Order many girls who have joined this Grand Chapter. We hope that you are proud of them, because we are.

In July, 111 Californians joined with thousands of other Rainbow Girls, Master Masons and members of our Eastern Star in attending Supreme Assembly in the home State of Rainbow—Oklahoma. We acknowledged 50 years of faith, hope and charity; 50 years of fraternal love and community service; 50 years of support by some of the Masonic adult family; 50 years of history and, with your help and loyalty, there are 50 more years coming. The apple blossoms may turn into lilacs, but we hope you'll still want a Rainbow 'round your shoulders.

It is now with pride and much pleasure that I present to you Miss Kathy Jenkins, a Past Worthy Advisor of San Luis Obispo

Assembly, a member of Corona Chapter, and our Grand Worthy Advisor in California.

Kathy Jenkins, Grand Worthy Advisor:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of the Grand Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

Faith, Hope, and Charity, these three: but the greatest of these is charity. With this powerful statement every Rainbow Girl ends her initiation. She has reached her goal—the pot of gold—to discover its contents, the greatest treasures of our civilization. Guided by faith, and sustained by hope, every Rainbow Girl learns that true charity is to be her goal, her purpose in life.

For fifty years, thousands of teen-age girls have absorbed and loved the teachings of our seven bow stations. In so doing they have learned countless, often intangible things about the Masonic family's way of life.

Rainbow Girls, like all members of the Masonic family, adhere to the belief of the trinity of home, church, and nation. No girl can be accepted into an Assembly if she does not declare a belief in the Supreme Being. She is taught that to be a wife, mother, sister, or daughter is the goal of all womanhood, and she is trained so that whether the future shall have war or peace, it shall have patriotism.

Too often we look at our youth groups as a club for young people for today only, when our attitude should be that of dynamic Orders looking to the future. The Masonic youth groups prepare their members to be leaders in the community. Working together on fun, money-making, and charity projects teaches us to work together, plan ahead, share responsibility, and then pitch in and work hard. This training also prepares us to take an active part in the Masonic way of life.

While it is true that many members of the Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters, and DeMolay joined these organizations because of a Masonic family background, it is also true that many members of the Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, and affiliated bodies joined the adult orders because of our youth groups. I am sure that some of you here joined the ranks of our Masonic Family because you had a daughter or son in Rainbow, Job's Daughters or DeMolay. I am also certain that even more of you here went on to Eastern Star or Masonry after being exposed to fraternal life while a teen-ager.

In this respect the Masonic youth groups are especially vital. The Order of the Rainbow for Girls was created in order to provide fraternal fellowship for the daughters of Master Masons, and their friends. I was able to fully appreciate the extent of the fraternal experience which we youth receive at my initiation into the Order of the Eastern Star a short while ago. After six years of Rainbow meetings and activities, the teachings and ideals of East-

ern Star were familiar friends. I found that I had been trained for fraternal life in the Masonic Family.

Drug use is widespread, morals are changing, and many demonstrators would have us believe that our civilization is on the verge of collapse. There are those who ignore our great Flag, and even worse, those who would bury our Flag.

In the midst of these conflicts the Masonic youth groups stand as a pinnacle of hope, a herald of truth. With your continued support the Masonic Family can continue to grow and be an influence for good in our way of life. We have a heritage to be looked at with pride, and a future of hopeful assurance. And so I can say, "Because I know what the Masonic Family has done for me, and what it can do for my Sisters and Brothers throughout the world. I am proud to be a Rainbow Girl."

Barbara E. Poole, Worthy Grand Matron:

I, too, would like to extend my congratulations to Kern River Valley. It was a personal pleasure to help institute this Chapter last year. The Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron and one of their Officers have been friends of my husband Art and myself for many years. We are very proud of the progress this Chapter has made and it has been a pleasure to have so many of the members present this evening. May you be successful in your endeavors to carry out the fine principles for which our Order was established. Congratulations.

Brother Richard Brassell, do we have some further reports to be given at this time?

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Constitution and By-Laws Committee:

Sisters and Brothers, the Worthy Grand Matron feels that we should endeavor to complete a little more of legislation before closing tonight, so will you please get your copies of the Proposed Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter, and refer to Proposed Amendment No. 19 to Section 320. It is in the middle of Column 6.

The combined Committees of Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom was referred the Proposed Amendment No. 19 to Section 320 recommend a "yes" vote. My Sisters and Brothers, before we go to vote on this, I would like to explain: Section 320 is changed by the adding after "annual session." of the words: "The Distribution Committee then to distribute such proposed amendments to the proper committees five days prior to the opening date of the annual session." That is the last three lines at the bottom of the proposed amendment, which provides for the duties of this Committee to distribute these proposed amendments five days prior to the opening of the Annual Session of Grand Chapter.

Then there are two words in italies, "and Distribution," and this is adding one other committee on the committees that are now provided for by the Constitution that will receive all copies of our proposed amendments to our By-Laws.

Now, my Sisters and Brothers, our reason for recommending a "yes" vote on this is that it will give the committees involved, the Constitution and By-Laws, Jurisprudence, Finance, an opportunity to have these amendments distributed to the proper committee five days prior to the opening of our Session, which will give them additional time for consideration, more opportunity to discuss them freely, so that we might have them brought on the floor of our Grand Chapter sooner during our Session.

Also, that these committees will not have to spend their entire time at the Grand Chapter Session in committee rooms.

We feel this is a good piece of legislation and we recommend its adoption.

Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I would like to refer the delegates to Proposed Amendment No. 21, also in Column 6. This pertains to distribution, to Section 320, and may I explain to you, my Sisters and Brothers, by having adopted the Proposed Amendment No. 19, this proposed amendment is automatic to make the duties consistent with what you have just adopted, and the only change in the proposed amendment is instead of the words "shall, unless," it is proposed to read: "All proposed amendments so filed may be withdrawn by the proponent," and it strikes out the last portion of Section 320 as printed in our Constitution at the present time, which states, "referred to the Committee on Distribution for appropriate action."

We have already provided that these shall be sent to the Distribution Committee and they shall distribute them in the previous legislation.

Worthy Grand Matron, we recommend a "yes" vote. Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I would like to refer the delegates to Proposed Amendment No. 8, Column 3. This proposed amendment was referred to your Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence Committees, and like Proposed Amendment No. 21, it is also a matter of just uniformly setting up the distribution work in accordance with the Proposed Amendment No. 19 that we have previously adopted.

Worthy Grand Matron, we recommend a "yes" vote on this also. Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, in order to be further consistent, I would like to refer the delegates to Column 4, Proposed Amendment No. 12 to Section 300, Special Rules of Grand Chapter, which provides that the reports of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer and the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home and such other addresses as may be desired shall be referred to the Committee on Distribution.

This change we feel is good, because it will allow the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron to present to the Distribution Committee any recommendations in their report five days prior to the time that they might be distributed to the committees that might be affected, five days prior to Grand Chapter, so that these recommendations of our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer might also come up for consideration within the committees involved prior to our Grand Chapter Session to facilitate their work.

The Joint Committees on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom this Proposed Amendment No. 12, Section 300, Rule 6, was submitted, recommend a "ves" vote.

Adopted.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron. There is one other Proposed Amendment No. 13, pertaining to distribution, that will be presented by Brother Jim Millard.

James L. Millard, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, we would like to take up Section 300, Rule 7, on Column 4, Proposed Amendment No. 13. With the approval or consent of the proponent we would like to amend the Amendment No. 13, Section 300, Rule 7 to read: "All proposed amendments to the Constitution or Laws of the Grand Chapter which have been duly filed with the Grand Secretary, shall be deemed submitted," which is instead of the present "presented." That is the word that we changed, "unless withdrawn by the proponent in writing, five days prior to the opening date of the Annual Session.

"The Committee on Distribution shall thereupon receive such proposed amendments and may immediately take appropriate action in referring them to the Grand Chapter Committees concerned."

Adopted.

James L. Millard, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, your Committees on Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence recommend a "yes" vote on Amendment No. 13, Section 300, Rule 7.

Adopted as Amended.

James L. Millard, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, we now consider Proposed Amendment No. 14, Section 300, Rule 7. The proponent of this proposed amendment and the Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence Committees felt the content of this Amendment No. 14 is incorporated in the Proposed Amendment No. 13 that they just accepted, and therefore the Constitution and By-Laws and Jurisprudence Committees recommend a "no" vote on Amendment No. 14.

Not Adopted,

At 10:35 p.m. the Session was closed until Friday morning at nine o'clock.

There have been releases in the Los Angeles Times, Los Angeles Herald Examiner, Fullerton Tribune, Anaheim Bulletin, Santa Ana Register, Long Beach Independent Press Telegram and Orange County Happenings 72, Sept. 15th through 30th, 1972 edition.

A total of thirty-two articles were written regarding Grand Chapter Week and of the Eastern Star activities which would take place this week and many articles on what our wonderful Order does for us and for others. I am sorry to say that the press does not cooperate very well, and many articles which were sent in have never been published.

Our best publicity has been through the radio stations. I wish at this time to thank radio station KFI—Lohman and Barclay program; they started announcing Grand Chapter Week on Wednesday, September 20th and gave us at least 30 minutes per day. On

Saturday, September 23rd they gave us two 20 minute spots and truly followed much of the information which had been sent to them regarding our Order, and our many projects. They highlighted our Youth Groups and were very cooperative. Other radio stations which cooperated with our publicity program were station KWIZ and our local Anaheim station KEZY on their Community Happenings program.

We were able to secure newspaper photographers for some of the functions but not as many as we would have liked to have had.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, as your Publicity Chairman, I have prepared memory books for you on just the Grand Chapter Week activities. These books will not be presented at this time as the newspapers are to have pictures and articles in both today's and tomorrow's Santa Ana Register. You will receive these books just as soon as they are complete.

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for giving me the privilege of serving on this committee for you.

REPORT OF HOUSING COMMITTEE

(Presented by Phyllis Aegerter, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

As Housing Chairman I could tell you that we have processed thousands of pieces of correspondence, and I wouldn't even "Guess-timate" the number of telephone calls. We have placed 1,670 room reservations—a total of 4,249 people. Statistics are soon forgotten, so instead I am going to tell you a little about housing.

Housing is making many trips to Anaheim to check hotels and motels as to distance from the Convention Center, checking for cleanliness and to negotiate room rates. Housing is spending so much time at the Housing Department of the Convention Bureau processing the correspondence and phone calls trying to place you in the hotels and motels of your choice, that most of the employees think that you are on the payroll. Housing is receiving a letter from someone making a reservation and asking you to find them a room-mate, but not stating a choice as to male or female. Housing

is getting checks made out to you for luncheous, dinners and hijinks. Housing is receiving a letter from a Brother making reservations for himself and "parttime wife". I assume he meant his wife would be occupying the room with him part of the time. Housing is trying desperately to get the hotels to send back room confirmations within a reasonable time. Housing is getting letters from out-of-state visitors, telling the Housing Chairman their office and when they should be escorted.

Housing is receiving 19 letters in one day and only two giving the information you need. The other 17 just ask you to make a reservation for them during Grand Chapter. Housing is getting letters from delegates, stating they do not intend to stand in line to pick up tickets for various functions. Housing is receiving a telephone call asking if it is true all Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons get free rooms. I think you can tell by the expression on the faces of the Past Grands that the answer to that is "No"—it is not true, they each pay for their own rooms just like you and I. Housing is doing your best to please everyone and knowing all the time it is impossible.

The task of Housing Chairman would be much easier and the expenses could be cut a great deal if the Sisters and Brothers would get Housing forms from your Chapter Secretary, and fill them out completely.

Why Housing? Housing maintains a complete file on all who have made reservations, so that in case of emergency or need to find a member, we know at which hotel they can be located. Some have the mistaken idea that going through Housing, rooms are most costly, when in fact, most give us a Convention rate. It is very important to use Housing, because if we were to use the Convention Center on a non-convention basis, the rental for the Arena alone would be \$1,250 per day, plus an additional charge for the various meeting rooms of \$50 to \$600 a day per room. For a Convention, the Arena and Meeting Rooms are provided free of charge. The 6% room tax charged by all hotels and motels in the City of Anaheim goes into their General Fund to belp defray the expense and maintenance of the Convention Center.

I would like to give thanks to the Anaheim Convention Bureau for all their personnel, who were most kind and helpful. And, a very special thank you to the gracious Nan Parsons, who helped with any problem I encountered. My sincere appreciation to the Royal Inn for their cooperation and efforts to please, as well as to all of the other hotels and motels.

If any Sister or Brother, who has gone through Housing, has a legitimate complaint concerning a hotel or motel, please put it in writing and either give it to me or send it to me and I will refer it to the Convention Bureau.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for my appointment as Housing Chairman. I'll admit I did take a couple of aspivin, but it will

be an experience I shall never forget, and now that it is over, I can say that I have truly enjoyed it, and it has been my pleasure to "accommodate" you.

Proposed Amendment No. 18 to Section 320—A substitute Amendment was proposed embodying changes suggested by the Constitution and Laws and Jurisprudence Committees. Section 320(1)

(1) Time of Filing; Signed by Proponent; Form. All proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws shall be signed by the proponent and filed in the office of the Grand Secretary in duplicate, not less than seventy days prior to the opening date of the next Annual Session of the Grand Chapter. All proposed amendments shall include those portions of the section prior to and following the amendment necessary to clarify the intent and purpose of the proposed amendment. If the change is primarily that of deletions, additions or the change of a few words, each deletion shall be within a double parentheses and all in capital letters; and each addition or change shall be in capital letters. If the proposed change substantially constitutes a rewriting, then the amendment shall include that portion of the action as it is prior to the proposed amendment, followed, all in capital letters, by that portion of the section as proposed in the amended form.

Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

There was referred to the Jurisprudence Committee the Consolidation Report of 1972, and the last paragraph. I will read the recommendation of this Committee, which is to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron, "That a Special Committee be appointed to investigate those Chapters having a history for three years of unfilled elective stations, sixty days following the annual installation of their corps of officers.

"Further, that this Special Committee make appropriate report to the Worthy Grand Matron and that report and proper action be taken"

Your Committee on Jurisprudence moves that this be referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for consideration.

Lloyd E. Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

Also referred to this Committee is a resolution proposed to the effect that we adopt the rules they have prepared in this Committee for the consolidation of Chapters. They have prepared a set of rules, and they want us to approve the rules, as I assume by the resolution, and here is the resolution, may I read it, as presented.

"That the Committee on Consolidation be able to function efficiently within the confines of our Constitution and the subject matter is not wholly contained in our section of our Constitution, and that all members of the Committee present the subject uniformly, we have hereby

"RESOLVED, that the Booklet used by the members of 1972 be continued to be used, subject to changes as may be deemed worthy."

Now in adopting it, these rules that they have set up, there has been some objection to some of these rules that have been presented to the Committee, and I have talked it over with Brother Armbrust, and he has consented to this amendment to this, so that it will read:

"The Booklet used by the members is to be continued to be used as a guideline by the Committee, subject to changes as may be deemed worthy by the Committee itself."

It is merely a guideline, and it isn't adopted as the rules of Grand Chapter, so it can be changed by the Committee itself, and I agree with this amendment and I move the adoption of the resolution as amended.

In conclusion, my Sisters and Brothers, I would like to repeat something I said to you last October—that we, who are privileged to be members of the Eastern Star should always remember that our Order is based on the belief of the existence of a Supreme Being; that we should ever dedicate ourselves to God, our homes, our churches, our schools, our country and our fellow man; that we should abide by the great principles and ideals of our Order, and, so that our Order might grow and prosper, we should, from day to day, be true to our great teachings, that the Order of the Eastern Star will go on from age to age to elevate and bless all mankind.

As your Worthy Grand Patron of 1972, and First Mate on the "Queen of My Heart", I bid you Farewell, and clear sailing and calm seas to each of you.

At 12:15 p.m. the Session was called from labor to refreshment, to reconvene at 7:30 p.m. for the Installation of Officers.

RECESSIONAL

The Recessional was under the direction of Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron, and Milton I. Dales.

The Barbie Dolls and Grand Guards entered from the West, forming lines along the North and South of the Grand Chapter room. The Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons were the next group to enter taking their places in front of those already assembled. The Grand Representatives entered, followed by the Deputy Grand Matrons and then the Grand Pages.

Down the aisleway came the Grand Officers, each escorted by their husband or wife, or a chosen escort. They ascended the ramps leading onto the stage and formed a semi-circle. The Pages for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron led these two officers down the aisleway and onto the stage, after which the following parration was given:

"All good things must come to an end,

I know this and so do you, my friends.
So it is with this year of '72,

The year of mauve pink and Malibu blue.

Throughout this Session they've served us well

Special music was sung by the Southern California Choral Group, with special words to "Turn Around, Look at Me". As this song was sung, the Grand Officers moved to the sides of the stage, revealing large portraits of Art Poole's Restaurant and Jay Miller's residence. Standing by the picture of Jay's home was his wife, Eleanor, and beside the picture of the restaurant stood Art, with Penny Poole, their lovable German Shepherd. Each of our leaders joined their loved ones, thus ending the recessional of the Crown Jewel Session.

Friday Evening Session

The Stage setting for the Installation of the 1973 Officers carried out the colors and theme of the coming year. The Turquoise blue back drop on the stage included the silver lettered motto—"Let us by Love serve one another." There were two large Lilac Trees on the stage, and many lilac arrangements surrounding the stage, and in the center a large book with a Star.

Each Grand Officer was escorted from the back of the stage through an open book, and touched with a Silver Wand by a "Fairy Godmother."

Promptly at 7:30 the Grand Representatives entered the Grand Chapter Room, followed by the 1972 Deputy Grand Matrons escorting the 1973 Deputy Grand Matrons. The Associate Matrons—the Cinderellas—entered wearing headpieces of various shades of Lavender, forming an Open Book, with a Wand. The Associate Patrons—the Royal Coachmen—formed a frame. As the Narration was given by Henry Woods, Past Grand Patron, Sister Lilas Haug and Brother Jens Morley were brought into the formation in a beautifully decorated Pumpkin Coach.

Narration

"The wand of friendship fills our book with Love," the theme of the evening you see portrayed on the floor by the Associate Matrons. Protecting and framing this book are the Associate Patrons.

Down through the ages, the open book has been a source of wisdom, knowledge and entertainment. From our earliest childhood we remember the words read to us from the Holy Bible and as we grew into adulthood, we turned to those pages again and again for guidance and inspiration. When we were initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star, we found that our Ritual was based upon the teachings of this Holy Book. Reading and listening to the words in our Ritual, we discovered that by loving one another we had come upon a way of life that brought us full happiness.

For a brief moment, let us take ourselves back to those childhood days when we read the fairy tales which are so familiar to all of us. Yes—they were but fairy tales, it is true—but how often we dreamed that someday the fairy godmother would touch us with her magic wand and we would be transferred into a world which had not been possible for us.

Among the most familiar of fairy tales is the story of Cinderella. As her sisters donned their finery and left for the ball, Cinderella

was left at home performing her menial chores, little dreaming of the future in store for her. To her surprise, the fairy godmother appeared and with her magic wand transformed her into a beautiful lady dressed for the ball. As she left her home in her coach, she was admonished that she must return by midnight because at the stroke of twelve she would revert to her former state. But for these few briefs hours she would enjoy a world which she had not heretofore dreamed possible.

Each moment was exciting—and as the hour of midnight approached she realized that her time would soon be ended and that she would return to her daily chores.

Tonight—from the pages of our book, we relive the story of Cinderella. Touched by the magic wand, our Sister Lilas Haug, Worthy Grand Matron-elect, with her trusty coachman, Brother Jens Morley, Worthy Grand Patron-elect, arrive in her coach to live a year she had not dreamed possible.

Our Worthy Grand Matron elect, Sister Lilas Haug, affectionately calls her Associate Matrons her Cinderellas. She has given them the magic wand of friendship and when used in the right way, it can and will bring each one friendships loyal and true. No greater gift can God give man than his friends. Were it not for the true friendships we make day by day our lives would not attain the complete fulfillment for which we hope. The touch of this magic wand will enfold all whom they meet. The Open Book to them represents our Bible, our Ritual or fairy tales. The Open Bible symbolizes the spirit of God in the human heart; —the Ritual, our teachings; —the fairy tales, —to keep us young at heart, and filled with joy and a sense of humor.

Our Worthy Grand Patron-elect, Brother Jens Morley, calls his associate Patrons his Royal Coachmen. The coachmen of the 1700's and 1800's were very attentive gentlemen who were generally looked up to and admired by all whom they served or with whom they came in contact. Men of great trust, they bore themselves proudly, with great dignity, neatness and propriety. Our Associate Patrons will emulate these craftsmen by serving our Order in the same courteous manner.

"Let us by love serve one another" is the motto which our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of 1973 will keep in their hearts.

Throughout the year they will use the colors of lilac, peninsula blue and crystal with a silver accent. Purple, through the ages, has represented royalty. Esther, even though feted and crowned, succeeded in remaining pure, upright and simple. Emulating the attributes of Esther by remaining faithful to our high standards, these Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons will remain above reproach. Blue represents fidelity and is representative of Adah. Their lives will be a shining star as they master this virtue. Finally, let us consider crystal. The combination of the five star point colors is referred to as the mystic colors. A proper blending of the sym-

bolic attributes which these colors represent, create a power which may be used to bless and benefit all humanity. These are the colors in the crystal when held to the light. They represent beauty and joy.

As our Sister Lilas and Brother Jens look at their book to be filled with love, their hope and prayer is that the pages will be filled with the accomplishments of each Chapter. Each member of our Order, by extending love and friendship to one another, will have an important part in this book—the book of 1973—the book representing the 100th year of our California Grand Chapter.

And now our Cinderellas and their Coachmen are ready to begin a year of bringing love to our members. Although they have but one short year before they, too, must return to their former places, the great reward of friends made, self satisfaction of service rendered and happy memories will not fade at midnight but will continue throughout their lives.

Our coach starts on its way and as it travels it will make a brief stop in each of our districts. The magic wand of friendship held in the hand of our Worthy Grand Matron will touch the lives of each member of our Order—and as it touches them they will feel the love she has for them and our Order; thus filling our book of 1973 with love.

Our book slowly opens to begin the story of 1973. It is a book to be filled not only with love but with the accomplishments of the year—a book to see the fulfillment of one hundred years of our Grand Chapter.

Leading our Grand Chapter in this Centennial year will be our Worthy Grand Matron, lovely gracious Sister Lilas Haug of San Carlos Chapter No. 551, the first Worthy Grand Matron to come from the Peninsula area in our state since 1908. Sister Lilas was initiated into Caliz de Oro Chapter No. 457, Oakland in 1949, and served as Adah and Associate Conductress. Moving to San Carlos she affiliated with San Carlos Chapter in 1952. Her genuine interest in our Order continued as she served as Esther, Chaplain, Marshal and Warder. She was elected Associate Conductress in 1957 and served through the Line to become Worthy Matron in 1960. In 1964 she served as Deputy Grand Matron, and was elected President of the Northern Grand Officers. In 1968 she served on the Grand Chapter Housing Committee and the following year was appointed Grand Marshal. In 1970 she was elected Associate Grand Conductress. Sister Lilas is interested in our youth groups, having served on the Rainbow Board and as Guardian Secretary for Job's Daughters.

Sister Lilas is proudly escorted tonight by her husband, Charles Haug, a Past Patron of San Carlos Chapter.

From Foothill Chapter No. 433 in Oakland, comes our Associate Grand Patron, Brother James Craven. Initiated in 1949, he served his Chapter as Worthy Patron in 1954. In that same year he served as the Housing Chairman for our Grand Chapter Week. He was appointed Grand Sentinel in 1962. Sister DeBeers was initiated in Melita Chapter No. 467 of Pasadena, California on November 18, 1931 and served as Worthy Matron in 1939. Before becoming a member of Grand Chapter by her election to the Grand Line, Sister Helen had served Melita Chapter as an appointive officer almost continuously. When her term as Worthy Grand Matron was concluded, Sister DeBeers served on Grand Chapter committees, the most important assignment being to the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund Committee for a term of five years.

In 1966 Sister Helen was elected to the Board of Trustees of our Eastern Star Home. The Home was the most important project of Grand Chapter and the comfort of the residents and the upkeep and beautification of the Home were her great aims. Her cheery smile and greeting will be missed by all the residents and the contribution she raised for the continued beauty of the Home will be lasting memorials to her industry and devotion. Because she felt her health would not permit, she would not consent to seek reelection in 1971. Her place on the Board of Trustees will be most difficult, if not impossible to fill.

Sister DeBeers' worth was recognized by General Grand Chapter by her appointment to the Educational Committee for a three year term—1961-1964.

This little poem, entitled "When I Pass On" by Fleishman, expresses Sister DeBeers' philosophy:

When I pass on, I hope to leave behind Not worldly things for some unworthy hands, But grateful mem'ries in the heart and mind Of fellowmen to whom I have been kind. For life is given us to mold a way Of happiness for others we have known-Unselfishly and true, from day to day, To help them bear their burdens as we may, There is no death for those of us who know That what we do in life lives on and on; We reap, the Good Book says, just as we sow; Let's plant our seeds of love before we go. When I pass on, I want no grief, my dears, No sadness in the hearts of those I've loved: I would but feel that in this world of tears I've helped to dry a few throughout the years!

A truly courageous Sister has left us for a better land. Carrying out her expressed wishes, no formal funeral services were held, but she will live on in the many happy memories and kindly deeds we have as reminders of her stay with us.

Frank David Cruse

Worthy Grand Patron 1936-1937 Entered Into Rest March 5, 1972
