The "Let There Be Light" Session of the Grand Chapter of California was preceded by presentation of a Necrology Service under the direction of Anneta Ricketts (28), and Divine Service under the direction of Marilyn Hoobler (627), on Sunday Morning at 10:30 a.m. Religious music was presented by Marylee Dozier, Harpist, and Barbara Campbell (295), Organist, the Theme—"The Light of the World".

Fifty Year Pins:

1,167 Fifty year pins have been presented this year and I was proud and privileged on behalf of their chapter and our Grand

Chapter of California, to be given the honor of making some of these presentations. I was especially honored to present a pin to Sister Della Cotton, wife of our Past Grand Patron, Brother Logan Cotton; to one of the Sisters of our own Eastern Star Home; and to two of my own Worthy Matrons. Present at our official visits were approximately 715 fifty year members counted by our Grand Marshal as they were introduced.

Honorary Memberships:

What a nicer way to be received in a district than to be given an honorary membership from various chapters. Many were received by Brother Gene and myself and were accepted with our fraternal love and gratitude. Our hope for the future is that we may return to each chapter, who has extended us this honor. I was honored to receive honorary memberships from each Grand Jurisdiction where I attended.

Courtesy Visits:

From the very beginning of our 1974-1975 year, our Grand Officers started to visit our subordinate chapters. Each one made many installations in their area and made visits to other chapters besides the very large attendance at our Official Visits. Many visits were made to our youth groups. I have been thanked many times personally by the members and have received many letters of thank you for the generosity of our Grand Officers for giving of their time in doing this and told of the happiness that they have brought our members.

I attended meetings on December 20th at Radiant Daylight Chapter; on February 24th Sun City Club; on March 25th at Pageant of the Dawn at Fraternity Chapter; on May 15th Fiftieth Anniversary at Whittier Chapter; and June 27th at Eastern Star Home, Triangle Chapter exemplified the work.

Five times this year I felt it necessary to call meetings under my powers of summons to help chapters in trouble, mainly lack of officers, attendance, illegal use of the black cube, or the impossibility of officers and members to settle their differences. This was done in various parts of the state and I am only sorry that time did not permit me to do more, for I truly feel that the Worthy Grand Matron can help in chapters by her personal appearance.

Irregularities:

As the year progressed some irregularities were noted, but most of them because of the lack of knowledge and showed a willingness to correct. The most common were the starting of ante-room meetings before the time stated in their Chapter By-Laws, the lack of the use of the ballot box when required by the constitution

for the issuance of special dispensations and the use of the black cube, especially when used against our Masonic brothers.

Correspondence:

Each Worthy Grand Matron is overwhelmed by letters during her year. With the help of the Grand Secretary, Constitution and By-Laws Committee, and the Jurisprudence Committee much consideration was given to those who were asking for assistance or answers to questions. We do hope that all correspondence was received and vice versa, due to the fact that mail is sometimes lost during postal delivery.

My sincere and loving thanks to the many member chapters and associations for the cards of love and prayer for my recovery, during my serious surgery. I know they did help toward my rapid recovery. My very sincere thanks to the Grand Secretary and her office staff for their very able assistance.

Official Communications:

October 15, 1974

To all Chapters in California Dear Sisters and Brothers:

It has come to the attention of your Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron that a few of our Eastern Star Chapters are engaging in fund-raising activities which clearly violate Masonic law pertaining to concordant Masonic organizations in California, including Order of the Eastern Star.

It has been reported that some Chapters are conducting raffles to raise money for their Chapter; we sincerely trust that this is not true, since raffles, in any form, or under any guise, are not only in violation of Masonic law, but also are illegal under the Penal Code of the State of California. Any such practice in any Chapter must immediately cease.

We are, therefore, enclosing herewith a copy of the rules of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in California pertaining to concordant bodies. You will note that the Order of the Eastern Star is listed as one such body subject to the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge. These regulations should be filed in your Chapter files and referred to at any time a fund-raising project by your Chapter is contemplated. You will note that in these regulations it is set forth that in case you are in doubt as to whether an activity is illegal under Grand Lodge Rules, you are directed to consult with the Masonic Inspector of the district in which your Chapter is located for his approval or disapproval of the contemplated activity.

All Chapters are charged to comply with these regulations, since it is the opinion of your Worthy Grand Matron and your Worthy Grand Patron that all of these regulations are designed ultimately for our own protection and well being. The public image of our Eastern Star Chapters must not be tarnished by illegal acts.

Reccommendations:

- 1. I recommend that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a Committee to prepare the proper Legislation to be presented at the 1976 Grand Chapter Session to change the 1979 California Grand Chapter Session from October 14th through October 18th to November 4th through November 8th; to make it possible for Sister Thelma Bailey to return to the California Grand Chapter Session as the Most Worthy Grand Matron.
- 2. I recommend that Section 773, Constitution and Laws, Life Sponsor Membership, Eastern Star Home, be studied by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for clarification. If it was the desire of the membership that individuals would collect from the membership of subordinate Chapters, and then by choice of the Worthy Matron or a committee, present such membership to an individual, or if this was to be on an individual basis only.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee to present their findings at the 1976 Grand Chapter Session legislation to clarify this section.

- 3. I recommend that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons to study the feasibility of having the four Grand Line Officers rotating each year in making the Official Visits, so that by the end of their Worthy Grand Matron year they would have been in every District of the State. This is done in other states and works well. With the rising cost of gasoline, motels, food, etc., and the impossibility of increasing allowances because of our decreasing membership, I feel this should be put under consideration and a report brought to the 1976 Grand Chapter Session.
- 4. I recommend that the Constitution and By-Laws Committee present Legislation at the 1976 Grand Chapter Session to re-write Section No. 468, of the Constitution and Laws, so that Plural Membership is not permitted within a District.

Too many of the problems, especially the use of the Black Cube, in our Chapters have been caused because of the Legislation as it stands now.

Our Golden Chain was broken in our Grand Family by the loss of Brother Edward Brown, husband of our Grand Marshal and Brother Roy Robbins, husband of our Grand Electa. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored members, Sisters and Brothers.

Once again another year of service to this Grand Chapter comes to a close and it is my pleasure to present to you my fourth Annual Report.

The activities of the Grand Chapter Office are many and cannot really be defined as routine. With the loyal assistance of those employed in the Office of the Grand Secretary we strive to keep current all correspondence with the subordinate Chapters and other Grand Jurisdictions. All Grand Chapter bills, Eastern Star Home Bills and bills pertaining to our projects are paid promptly. Orders for supplies and payment for requisitions are recorded and merchandise forwarded to Chapter Secretaries.

It was enjoyable to attend the School of Instruction for our Deputy Grand Matrons following our 1974 Grand Chapter Session and both Brush-up Schools and to work with the Grand Officers of 1975 in preparing to exemplify the Ritualistic work for many joint Official Visits. Attending these special meetings afforded the opportunity to meet with the Secretaries in the areas. Fourteen area meetings were held with over 250 Secretaries in attendance.

Immediately following Grand Chapter the amendments to the Constitution adopted at our 1974 Grand Chapter Session were printed and distributed as prescribed in the Constitution. The newly printed amplified Instruction Book was also distributed to all Chapters upon return of Instruction Books previously allotted to Chapters. At this time all Chapters are using a current Instruction Book. All Deputy Grand Matrons received a copy of this new issue of the Instruction Book and also for transmittal a copy of the Syllabus now made available for the use of the Conductress of each Chapter.

The itinerary of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Roster of Grand Officers, Committee Members and Chapters were prepared for printing and distribution. The proceedings of the Session were compiled and three copies sent to each Chapter to be distributed according to the Constitution to the Worthy Matron, Associate Matron and a copy to the Secretary for the use of the Chapter; as well as to all Grand Officers and other Grand Jurisdictions.

This year was no exception in showing an increase in issuance of fifty year pins. Letters of congratulation and 50 year pins were

forwarded to 1,167 of our members with 50 Golden Years in our Order. Many Chapters vote a Life Membership for their fifty year members and as a result we are now allowing the dues of 7,172 members. This number would also include those for whom we allow dues for reasons noted in the Constitution.

We look forward each year to receiving the Annual Reports from our Subordinate Chapters, showing the status of our 535 Chapters. To check the reports is quite a task but with the cooperation of our Secretaries the returns were completed in record time this year, although there were some corrections to be made and letters were written regarding questionable information in the reports. Most reports are now typewritten and this is a great help to those checking the Annuals in the Grand Chapter Office.

Our Chapter Secretaries are to be commended for the overall fine manner of presenting information to this Office. Without the special effort of this fine group of members the Grand Chapter records would not be complete. We sincerely appreciate the dedication shown by our Secretaries. We have held another Workshop Meeting preceding this Grand Chapter with an attendance of over two hundred, we do help one another.

We are sorry to report a loss in membership this year of 1,783.

Consolidations—The complete report of the Consolidation Committee will show in detail the consolidation of six Chapters to become three Chapters. The Charters of the Consolidated Chapters were properly endorsed in the Grand Chapter Office and all charters returned to the Chapters.

Courtesies—Correspondence was received from many Grand Jurisdictions asking that we assist in courtesy initiations and investigations, and visitation of so-journers in distress. The requests were promptly allotted to our Chapters in the areas involved and courtesies were cheerfully extended for our Sister Jurisdictions. Many thanks to our California Chapters for this kindness.

Special Dispensations—At the request of our Worthy Grand Matron 270 Special Dispensations were prepared for her signature and forwarded to Chapters. The report of the Worthy Grand Matron will show the reasons for requests.

Grand Representatives—All recipients of a Commission are very pleased to be so honored and respond expressing thanks and appreciation for this consideration. Fighteen Commissions requested by Grand Jurisdictions were granted and forwarded with letter and badge of California. Twenty eight Commissions received from other Jurisdictions for Grand Representatives in California were sent to those appointed by our Worthy Grand Matron. Subordinate Chapters were pleased to hear of their honored members and have accorded all honors to the Grand Representatives.

Eastern Star Home—As Secretary of the Board of Trustees I have attended all monthly and special meetings of the Board. As noted in the report of our Auditor our investments have been made to fine advantage for our Home, through the advice of our Investment Counsellor and procedure of the Finance Committee.

Institution—It is a most rewarding experience to have a part in the Institution of a Chapter, and through the efforts of our Worthy Grand Patron another Chapter was added in California. Lakeside Chapter, U.D. includes a most enthusiastic group of 72 new members and 63 affiliated members. They are closely related to a Masonic Lodge, show true fraternalism and fine financial background—we wish them well and do hope to prepare a Charter for them to be presented at our next Annual Session.

Committees—The meetings of the Finance Committee are very enlightening to our Grand Chapter Office for through this Committee's constant review of our assets our financial status is very sound in all Fund Accounts. Past Grand Patron Logan Cotton, Chairman, arranged during the year for meetings with our Investment Counsellor, Insurance Carrier, Eastern Star Home and many of the Committee Chairmen.

Through the approval of this Committee and also the Chairman of the Fund we have paid through this office more than 1,000 checks for the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund and 460 checks to cover Scholarship Awards. These are the largest accounts payable. Our Auditor's report will show in complete detail the amount of money processed through this office for various funds. Many thanks to all committees for their cooperation.

Appreciation—It was my pleasure to travel with our Worthy Grand Matron to assist Chapters. One such occasion was a visit to Tulelake Chapter No. 539. This Chapter has presented me with an Honorary Membership and I thank them for this honor, my first such honor, which shall always be very special to me.

A special thanks to our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Officers of 1975 for your many courtesies extended to Brother Jack and to me. We do appreciate your friendship. We have said "Let There Be Light" and there was Light because of our Association with you.

The Assistants in the Grand Chapter Office are truly what the word implies—Persons who serve. Their service to our Order is devoted and faithful. My Grand Page, our Assistant Grand Secretary—the friend who walks beside me, thank you, Sister Diane, for always knowing what I am thinking!

REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates of this Grand Chapter Session, Sisters and Brothers. Greetings from your Scholarship Committee:

On behalf of the Scholarship Committee I have the pleasure of submitting the following report:

All activities relating to the Scholarship Committee were organized in compliance with the Constitution of the Grand Chapter.

Award selections were based upon the following eligibility list:

- 1. Graduating High School Students.
- 2. Members of the Order who wish to continue their education and need financial assistance.
- 3. Students who have completed a portion of their higher education and need aid to continue.
- 4. College students seeking theological training. (ESTARL).
- 5. Grants and Re-Grants for continued college graduate work.

Standard procedures were followed as the year progressed. A needed form for application for Scholarship was sent to anyone who requested it. The completed applications were sent to the Chairman of the Committee by the Grand Secretary. When all parts of the application were received by the Chairman the Completed Applications were grouped in sets of fifteen or more and then sent to each committee member for evaluation. This Careful Evaluation continued from February through most of June. During this period

of time committee members evaluated Three Hundred twenty-five (325) applications.

All five members of the Committee met June 26th and 27th in San Francisco for final decisions. These decisions are very difficult because of the many outstanding and deserving young people who apply for assistance. After long and arduous deliberations we prepared the letters of acceptances and rejections. It is so hard to write letters of rejections, but we will always have those that do not meet the "need", even though, they are affiliated or good achievers.

John L. Wixon, Active Member and Executive Officer in Northern California Jurisdiction, Order of DeMolay:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Members, Sisters, Brothers and Friends:

The Order of DeMolay deeply appreciates the invitation to participate in this program this evening. We are very acutely aware of the fact that without the active support of the Grand Lodge of California of Free and Accepted Masons and other Masonic affiliated groups, the Order of DeMolay would not continue for long as a strong and viable group.

We also appreciate the invitation for another reason: It gives us an opportunity to fraternalize with our kindred organizations, Job's Daughters and Rainbow for Girls.

We in the Order of DeMolay stand ready to cooperate and to assist these two organizations at any time, as we know that cooperative we will be stronger.

About five years ago the Order of DeMolay in Northern California started having a Public Speaking Contest to determine a speaker at the Grand Lodge Session or at the Grand Chapter Session.

This year we have selected Rick Olson, a Past Master Counselor of Washington Township Chapter. He is currently serving as Treasurer of Washington Township.

Rick is a biology major, studying at the University of California in Berkeley. He plans to become a physician.

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present to you Rick Olson.

Rick Olson, Past Master Counselor, Order of DeMolay, Washington Township Chapter:

And God looked upon the face of the earth, and, behold, it was corrupt; for all flesh had corrupted his way upon the earth.

And God said unto Noah: The end of all flesh is come before Me; for the earth is filled with violence through them; and, behold, I will destroy them with the earth. Make thee an ark of gopher

wood; rooms shalt thou make in the ark, and shalt pitch it within and without with pitch—and thus saved mankind from other destruction—and in March, 1919, a man was again called upon to build an ark. This was Frank S. Land. He was the founder of the Order of DeMolay. He was to lead us into the light of truth.

Sisters and Brothers of Masonic Affiliation, Ladies and Gentlemen: I bring to you fraternal greetings of the Order of DeMolay of Northern California. The Order of DeMolay teaches its membership many beautiful lessons in reverence and patriotism—the unchanging truths. But these lessons would fall on unhearing ears if it were not for dedicated, consecrated adult leaders willing to give more than their time but their very life and spirit to guide us and serve as examples of the right living to which we have dedicated ourselves.

Fremont, my hometown, recently honored Daddy Bills, as he was affectionately called by all the Rainbows and DeMolays in Fremont. He was more than dedicated, this man was a rock, exemplifying every Mason, he set a matchless example of universal brotherhood.

He was one of the founders of our DeMolay Chapter over twenty years ago, and since then has worked long, arduous hours in Fremont with the Rainbow, Job's Daughters, and DeMolay.

The love this man displayed, the virtues of reverence and patriotism as no other man I ever met. Daddy Bills' pastor describes the man when he tells a story of the first time they met. Daddy Bills asked why there was no American Flag in the sanctuary of his church. The pastor patiently tried to explain that the sanctuary is a place of prayer, the flag does not belong there. Daddy went to the next church council meeting, and he stood up and convinced the pastor and the congregation why the flag belonged in the council chamber.

Daddy Bills will never be forgotten, but neither will other DeMolay leaders who teach us by their lives that our teachings are not empty shells.

These men demonstrate the concern for the future of their country by their concern for the youth of their country, and not just these men but every one of us is responsible for carrying the torch to life and eternal freedom. For our country's heritage has not been one of unbroken freedoms, as demonstrated by the McCarthy era, the Bay of Pigs—all these spell out the need for eternal vigilance.

As our country approaches the Bicentennial, however, your thought cannot but reflect the high spots of history—Commander Armstrong walking on the moon; Abraham Lincoln taking an even greater step for mankind, the abolition of slavery, and our great men fighting to serve us and so serve God.

We sometimes lose track of the principles upon which our country was founded—Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Paine, Benjamin Franklin and other colonial visionaries wrote of personal freedom, not patriotism to a country but about patriotism to a country's personal freedom. Personal freedoms are most important in America, and we as believers in a country like ours must remember this.

The Order of DeMolay has carried its men to the Honorary Thirty-Third Degree of Masonry, the senatorship, and even to the presidency.

The success in DeMolay in creating leaders is witnessed by the success of senior DeMolays all over the world.

The DeMolays of America display the true meaning of patriotism by assuming roles of leadership in their community, state, and nation. But to assume leadership is to try to direct others, to walk together down a common path. Our human eyes, alas, cannot see the correct path to take. The virtue of reverence therefore teaches us to take refuge in God's all knowing freely given life. For I am convinced that nothing can separate us from His love, death can't, and life can't; the angels won't and all the powers of hell itself cannot separate us from the love of God demonstrated by our Lord Jesus Christ when He died for us, and if He loved us enough to die for us, won't He help us meet His children?

All we have to do is to realize what He wants with us is a personal relationship, not the head trip that most of us are at but a heart-to-heart trip.

When we begin to know Christ as a human, as a friend, He loses the legalism He had. We don't have to be strong already to ask His help. We ask Him in our lives and He helps us by giving us His power.

Our God has been called the Great Architect of the Universe. Well, if we try to be good leaders on our own, we are doomed to failure, for a leader can lead no higher than the level to which he is tied. So if we feel the need for building blocks of our character, all we need do is throw our whole blueprint at His feet, let that Architect build our characters, and He will build.

By the way, you all have noticed that when the Great Architect of the Universe was on earth, He was a carpenter.

Anyway, a person-to-person relationship with God through Christ is the answer, the key to God's power in our lives.

But we must not be like a battery-operated trolley car, and when that battery runs out, so does the power. We must be on the overhead system, constantly plugged in to God's limitless power for us.

So reverence is the key to leadership, not only a real line upon God's perfection instead of our own frailties but we then love ourselves, too, as He wants us to, as He did, whose ark has over three million young men to kneel at DeMolay altars all over the world

Thus the Ark of DeMolay, through the lessons it teaches, the lesson of patriotism, makes the role of the leader humbly acknowl-

edging the power of God. And the framework of this Ark is molded by the leaders of DeMolay, and if I read these men correctly, I can find no better way to repay it than to dedicate my adult life to that same cause which they have found most important, young men and women, heirs apparent of our country's heritage. I will be then as I am now proud to say "I am a DeMolay." Thank you.

I have the pleasure of presenting Elise Blair, Past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 75, Chatsworth, who wishes to present a 5 + 1 program on Multiple Sclerosis. Elsie was diagnosed with this dread disease two years ago. Her Mother is a Past Matron of Glassell Park Chapter in Los Angeles.

Elise Blair:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Honored Delegates of this Grand Chapter.

I'm a graduate of the University of Southern California in Music Education, specializing in violin.

For nine years I had been an instrumental music teacher, and conductor of orchestras and bands in the City of Los Angeles for eight years.

Two years ago I was diagnosed as Multiple Sclerosis. Multiple Sclerosis is known as a crippler of young adults, because it strikes us in our prime, just when we are ready to spread our wings to live.

In January of this year I began to slip, and my active teaching career came to a sudden halt.

The + 1—a bit of cooking or a personal touch in any direction that is needed.

5 + 1 is a program of people helping people. My appeal to you is, can you give one hour a month or more to help 5 + 1?

Will you spread this to your chapters, to your chapter members.

5 + 1 needs your name, telephone number, full address and Zip Code, what you believe you can do, and the time of your availability. I have forms with me. If you ask, you will certainly be receiving.

This researcher has discovered that not all mentally retarded children are alike. There are some 15 to 25 percent of these children that are capable of being reeducated under some new research discovery that has just been made.

Now this means the children who are otherwise doomed to a life where they're out of it completely, these children in light of this research now have the opportunity of leading a normal and useful life, and instead of talking about the original three to five percent that was believed were originally in this group of mentally retarded children, Dr. Wilford now believes that it is in the neighborhood of 15 to 25 percent.

So we are talking about something that can really do a world of good, and if we pay any attention to our Masonic obligations, that of relieving the distressed, I don't see how we can ever find a more distressed group of children than these.

This program has been sponsored now and is being underwritten by the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, and I hope I may have aroused enough interest or enthusiasm in some of you brothers and sisters that you will ask your Royal Arch Mason friends, and they hopefully will have something to tell you, and we can get this program off the ground.

The Worthy Grand Matron shall also, upon request of the Worthy Grand Patron, appoint a Deputy Grand Matron to give proper instructions to officers of a Chapter to be instituted or under dispensation, provided, however, that if such request is not made prior to the institution, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a Deputy Grand Matron for such Chapter.

Sec. 194. SCHOLARSHIP FUND.

Scholarship awards, except those for religious training, shall be made to:

- 1. Graduating high school students for their first year in college or university.
- 2. Members of the Order who wish to continue their education in institutions of higher learning.
- 3. Needy students who had been unable to go directly into college from high school.
- 4. Students who have completed a portion of their higher education but who find themselves in need of aid to continue.

The awards shall be made on the basis of scholastic record, the purpose and need for higher education, the character of the applicant, and his need for financial assistance. The choice of college or university indicated by the applicant must be approved by the Committee.

Awards for religious training shall be made to college students or college graduates desiring to enter a Theological College or Seminary, or to pursue studies in a Theological College or Seminary.

Regrants for continued college or university work, or new grants for graduate work, may be made in the discretion of the Committee.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE INSTRUCTION BOOK ANTEROOM MEETING

Anteroom meetings, as well as stated meetings, cannot be opened before the time specified in the by-laws for stated meetings.

To hold a meeting in any room other than the regular meeting place, a vote of the Chapter taken at a previous meeting is necessary. Members must be notified of the change. A quorum must be present. The Charter, or a photostat copy thereof, as provided in Section 386 of the Constitution and Laws must be present.

The Bible must be opened by the Conductress and the prayer given by the Chaplain. Business must be transacted in accordance with the constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter and the meeting must be closed in Ritualistic form.

Note: Page 96 of the Ritual provides that an antercom meeting prior to Installation must be closed.

Note: An anteroom meeting before an Installation is "the last stated meeting prior to Installation". Chapter books are closed and audited between this meeting, and the first stated meeting AFTER Installation. The Committees report at the first stated meeting AFTER Installation.

INSTRUCTION ON ELECTION

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session:

Each of you, I know, is vitally interested in your privilege as a voting delegate representing your Chapter at this Grand Chapter session.

The following instructions are to assist you in our voting procedure.

Our Constitution and Laws provide that every Chapter in California are equal in voting rights. Voting rights is Section 45, 1 through 11 and Section 46 of our Constitution.

Each Chapter is entitled to one vote for each of its top four officers, if regularly installed, and one collective vote for Past Matrons and Past Patrons in each subordinate Chapter.

When filling in your official ballot you will not vote for any candidate who has already been elected by unanimous ballot, but only for those offices for which there is more than one candidate.

It is important that the name of the candidate you wish to vote for is written in the space following the name of the office to which they aspire.

For example, if the name of the candidate for Grand Treasurer is placed in a space other than that opposite the Grand Treasurer, it

cannot be considered, and the same applies to the candidates for the Eastern Star Home Board.

If you are entitled to cast more than one Ballot (as outlined in Section 45 of the Constitution), mark each of the Ballots correctly.

Remain in your seat as regular business of Grand Chapter will continue while ballots are being collected.

Please note: Separate your ballot and retain the left hand side in case of balloting on proposed amendments. We will now proceed with the election.

Gordon Gilbert, Past Grand Matron, Sister Ellen Walters, Past Grand Patron and Vice President, Brother Robert Lutz, Sisters Viola Crew, Gladys Pendleton, and Brothers Elias Mansfield and Richard Cronon.

We, the members of the Board of Trustees, are pleased to submit for your consideration, the Annual Report for the fiscal year July 1, 1974 to June 30, 1975, as required by the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter. At the close of the 1974 Grand Chapter Session in Anaheim, the Board met for the purpose of electing the 1975 officers. Elected were: Frank Zanier, President, Robert Lutz, Vice President. Two very dedicated members of your Board of Trustees are ending their service with this Session: Viola Crew and Elias Mansfield. Thank you, Sister Viola for your six years of faithful and unselfish service to our Home, especially during your year as President, and in particular for your many hours of hard work this past year. Brother Al Mansfield, you have completed fifteen years of extraordinary service on this Board. Sisters and Brothers, Brother Al is an Attorney and a Certified Public Accountant. His presence on the Board has been invaluable as he has taken care of all legal matters in connection with wills and bequests as well as all other items of a legal nature. Not once did he submit a bill for his legal services. He has saved us many thousands of dollars. To Sister Viola and Brother Al, we will indeed miss you. Again many thanks to you both.

The Eastern Star Home of California is a non-profit corporation. It is the responsibility of the elected Board of Trustees to manage the operation of the Home. The Board is composed of nine mem-

bers, the Worthy Grand Matron, and the Worthy Grand Patron, by virtue of their offices, and seven elected members. At the Grand Chapter Session here in 1973, legislation was adopted that an elected Trustee shall be limited to two consecutive three-year terms.

All accounts of the Home have been transferred to the Grand Chapter Office in San Francisco. All checks are written there and no financial transactions take place at the Home. For all services rendered by the Grand Chapter Office, the Home pays an annual fee of \$8,000.00. Our Grand Secretary, Sister Gladys Johnson, her Assistant, Sister Diane Dixon, and the able Staff, are to be commended for their valuable assistance to the Board of Trustees. We thank them most sincerely. We thank the General Chairman, Sister Verna Mae Yingling and her Endowment Fund Committee Members for their time and effort in behalf of the Home this past year. The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron have attended nearly all of our meetings and the Grand Line Officers have attended whenever it was at all possible for them to do so. We appreciate their interest and attendance.

We wish to call attention to the existence of a booklet which outlines the rules and procedure to be followed in applying for residence in the Home. The Grand Chapter Office will make these available on request. The Board members will at all times be happy to visit Chapters to speak about your Eastern Star Home.

During the past fiscal year, eighteen new residents entered the Home and eighteen were called to their Eternal Home. Their names will appear in the proceedings. There are at present 109 residents at the Home. The average age being 86.09 years. We have ten members over 95 years of age. One resident, our beloved Sister Alice Minnick, will be 106 years old on December 22nd.

Official Visit:

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron made their Official Visit to the Home on May 16, 1975. The Grand Officers and many Deputy Grand Matrons were in attendance. There also were many Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons as well as Past Grand Treasurers present. The Worthy Matrons of the Southern California Association decorated the dining room and provided the corsages and boutonnieres for our honored guests. The Worthy Matrons also served the delicious salad luncheon. Our sincere and grateful thanks to those Worthy Matrons who helped make it a beautiful event. After the luncheon, all adjourned to the Garden Court where a lovely blind girl entertained with excellent piano music and then played the organ with equal dexterity. After this, the residents presented their amusing version of the latest fashions.

Fiesta:

The Fiesta was held on Saturday and Sunday, June 7th and 8th. A happy throng attended both days. The Worthy Matrons and

Worthy Patrons served Sunday dinner to over 1,100 members and visitors. The proceeds amounting to \$14,785.00 were, by order of our Worthy Grand Matron, deposited in the Operating Fund of the Home. A very fine gesture for which we thank you most sincerely, Sister Eleanor. We extend our gratitude to all who worked so diligently to make the Fiesta a success. We also wish to thank the Chapters, the Associations and individual members for the gifts, courtesies, entertainment and all they have done to make life for our residents more enjoyable.

Administration:

Sisters and Brothers, our Eastern Star Home is the number one charity of our beloved Order. Economic conditions in our Country and the continuing inflationary spiral have created great financial problems in the operation of the Home. The cold hard facts are that as the dollar declines in value, we are, because of the decline in membership, receiving a much smaller number of dollars.

Statistics show that in the fifteen years since 1960, our membership has dropped from over 160,000 to 130,000. This means that our \$1.00 assessment which goes into the Home Fund is reduced by \$30,000.00 each year, and our \$1.00 special assessment which goes into our Operating Fund is also reduced by \$30,000.00 per year. Our income has not kept pace with our necessary expenditures. The average age of our residents has risen to 80.09 years. We have a greater number of our sisters in the Infirmary where around the clock care is required. Also, more rigid requirements by the State and Federal Governments for the operation and maintenance of Homes such as ours and higher license fees are also problems with which we are faced. For example, for the fiscal year 1974-1975 our license for the Infirmary was \$104.50. For 1975-1976, the same license will be \$1,180.00. An increase of \$1,075.50. Also, two additional Licensed Vocational Nurses must be employed according to new State regulations. Food, and of course, increased wages are also problems to be solved. One solution, my Sisters and Brothers would be more generous voluntary contributions by each of us. Voluntary contributions by our members have averaged less than twenty-eight cents per member. If we could receive an average voluntary contribution of \$2.00 per member, our Operating Fund would then be sufficient and the surplus could at the end of each year be deposited to the Endowment Fund. Our ultimate goal is to build the Endowment Fund to a level where the income will be adequate to operate our Home.

My Sisters and Brothers, each member of our Order is a part owner of our Home. It is our personal responsibility and obligation to support it. Our outstanding Home, of which we can be justifiably proud, is a haven for our elderly and lonely members who most often are lacking in financial security. Here they can find security and fraternal friendships in their waning years. Our interest in and support of this Home, truly exemplifies the lesson of Electa, That we love one another.

It has been a distinct pleasure to serve as President of the Board this past year. It has been a rewarding experience to work with such a dedicated group of Board Members. For your many hours of unselfish work and untiring devotion to the operation of our Home, your President is deeply grateful to each of you.

I would like to present those who served on this committee with me and to whom much credit is due for this successful year.

Your committee for the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund is pleased to report the following:

We met on two occasions. At our January 25 meeting at the Eastern Star Home we formulated our plans for the year and discussed the best ways to promote the Fund in the individual chapters. We were honored to have our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Eleanor Marsh, and our Worthy Grand Patron, Brother W. Gordon Gilbert join us for part of the meeting which concluded with an informal meeting with Brother John Brost and the Board of Trustees of our Eastern Star Home. Our second meeting was in the Bay Area on April 12, where we discussed our speaking in the Chapters of our Area on the Fund and the distribution of our leaflet which we hope will reach our entire membership by being sent with chapter bulletins or dues notices. Our thanks to my sister, Lanore Cady, who did the lettering on the Honor Roll Certificates and on our leaflet.

Much appreciation goes to the chapter secretaries for forwarding information to me. Much was accomplished through the efforts of the chapter chairmen appointed by the Worthy Matrons throughout the state.

We are grateful to all of the Grand Officers for their loyal support, interest and enthusiasm for this Fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Approximately 100 chapters have submitted amendments to their by-laws during the year. Almost half of the changes have been for increases in dues and/or initiation and affiliation fees. Changes in meeting dates and places accounted for the second highest number.

Many proposed amendments had to be returned to the chapters, some more than one time, because the changes were not submitted in accordance with Section 338 of our Constitution. A minimum percentage of the by-law amendments submitted could not be approved, mainly because of their conflict with one or more sections of our Constitution.

The Chairman acknowledges with appreciation the assistance rendered by the Jurisprudence Committee when called upon throughout the year for their interpretation of our Constitution and Laws.

The Committee would admonish all chapters considering by-law amendments to particularly review the laws pertaining to Sub-ordinate Chapters in our Constitution before amendments are presented to your membership for adoption.

In addition to the proposed amendments to by-laws submitted to the Chairman for approval, each of the members of the Committee has answered numerous telephone and letter inquiries regarding interpretation of certain sections of our Constitution.

In accordance with Section 300 a ballot vote has been requested. You are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 45 as printed. A ballot vote has been duly requested as provided by the Constitution. Is there any discussion?

James H. Hoole, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, as proponent of this Amendment, I know the time is getting short and I will explain this briefly as quickly as I can. I would like to read a portion of Section 10 of our Constitution.

"The membership of the Grand Chapter shall consist of its Grand Officers and Deputy Grand Matrons then in office, all past elective Grand Officers, all Past Matrons and Past Patrons of subordinate chapters of this Jurisdiction who have served as presiding officer of their chapter"—the point is, I feel that because of the fact that the Past Matrons and Past Patrons have served their chapters well, they come to these sessions and pay the \$5.00 fee, the same as anybody else, and still when it comes to Section 45, they are taken out of the group who is entitled to a single vote, their own vote. Talk about discrimination. I think this is one of the rankest instances of discrimination.

I have taken it upon myself to write to 16 other Grand Jurisdictions. Of the 16, 13 of them have an individual vote for the Past Patrons and Past Matrons, and I would like to read you the list. It takes a moment: New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Florida, South Dakota, Colorado, North Carolina, Iowa, Illinois, Maryland, Montana, Nebraska and Texas. Louisiana and Michigan replied that they did not have it, and I got no reply from Wisconsin. So this is a cross section of the country, and I feel if it works in other Grand Jurisdictions, why can't it work here?

So I hope that you will see that this is something that should be done. You Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons presently in office, as of your next installation next month, you will be Past Matrons and Past Patrons and you will not have your own vote like you do today. So think about it.

You Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons, who will be going into the office as Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons in November will have your own vote until the following November, in case this does not go, and after your installation you will be Past Matrons and Past Patrons and lose your vote. So I would think that you would think about this seriously before you cast your ballot. I am urging a "yes" vote.

After Further Discussion - Motion:

Previous question was called to close the debate.

You make sure you put in Ballot No. 1 for each of your vote, other numbered ballots will not count. This is very important to the delegates.

All those opposed will cast their "no" Ballot No. 1 in the same Ballot Box. The votes will be tallied as we proceed with the business of Grand Chapter and the Chairman of the Election Board will report back when the counting is complete. You will now cast your ballots.

Sisters and Brothers, we will continue with the business of Grand Chapter and I would ask while we have people speaking that no one walk in front of the Associate Grand Matron, please wait until we have finished. Thank you.

The members of the combined Committee unanimously recommend a no vote on Proposed Amendment No. 10. The committees feel that this is unnecessary and would be costly to Grand Chapter as new receipts would have to be issued for several thousand of our members.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers:

I desire to express my appreciation for having served as Chairman of the Finance Committee for the past year. All members of the Committee, the Grand Officers and members of other committees were very cooperative and helpful, and I assure you, it was a pleasure to work with them.

I would like at this time to present the Committee Members for 1975: Past Grand Matron, Florence Dunn; Past Grand Patron,

Richard Brassell; Past Grand Patron, James Craven and Past Grand Matron, Elsie Mitchell.

Your Finance Committee has a responsibility of supervising the investments, finances, budget records and audits of Grand Chapter, the Eastern Star Homes and various committees for the proper and effective conduct of its financial affairs. Therefore, the Committee had six meetings during the year namely: October 11, 1974; January 13, 1975; March 8, 1975; May 16, 1975; August 13, 1975 and October 20, 1975. In the interest of time, your Committee will present this brief summary of our report with a detailed report to be published in the proceedings.

At the first meeting of the year we reviewed the various finance activities of the previous year. This gave us a comparison and a guideline for the ensuing year.

We reviewed the result of the sale of the 100 Yearbook, and a number of books that were in inventory at the end of the year. As of January 13, 1975 there were 5,497 books sold out of an order of 7,500 leaving a balance of unsold books at 2,003. The sale of the books amounted to a profit of \$6,167.01.

We likewise met with Mr. Joe Uttz who was the General Chairman of the previous Grand Chapter held in Anaheim in 1974. He was asked to meet with us for the purpose of giving suggestions and recommendations that would improve the operation of future Grand Chapter sessions.

We renewed the agreement with the financial consultants; namely, the Alliance Capital Management Corporation for which they will be paid for their services a fee of \$10,000. At various times during the year they submitted to your Committee a detailed analysis of all investments in every fund of Grand Chapter including the Eastern Star Homes.

At the first of the year, we met with Brother Jack Holloway, the Chairman of this Grand Chapter session. He submitted a preliminary budget which was reviewed very carefully by your Committee and after comparing it with previous Grand Chapter sessions held in Sacramento, their budget of \$20,545 was approved by the Finance Committee.

One of the most important meetings during the year was held at the Eastern Star Homes with the Home Board, and I am pleased to state that all members of the Finance Committee, the entire Home Board and all the Grand Line Officers were in attendance. We reviewed their operating budget and their suggested requirements and improvements for the remaining months of the year.

Each month the Committee received from the Grand Secretary a financial statement of finance transactions of each fund. The statement set forth the income and expenditures, and a comparison with the previous year's accounts. These statements also set forth the amount that was budgeted for each account. These statements were reviewed with the Grand Secretary at each meeting.

During the year, we were asked to consider the renewing of the lease of our present Grand Chapter office. After considering our present location and amount of rent we would be paying at other locations, it was the opinion of the entire Committee that we were very fortunate in securing the lease for the following figures; namely, \$692.50 per month for two years and \$725.00 per month for the following two years. Therefore, the lease was renewed for a period of four years.

During the year, the Eastern Star Homes Board requested an increase in their budget. After reviewing their financial report which reflected an increase in expenditures, the Committee authorized the increase in their budget in the amount of \$26,450.

Several times during the year, we were requested by various Chapters to contribute to Masonic Temple projects. Each Chapter making this request submitted to us their financial condition. After reviewing the financial statements of said Chapter and if they met the qualifications, their request was approved.

In conformity with the practices of other organizations similar to ours, a cost of living increase of 5 percent was given to our employees.

During the year we held conferences with Mr. Tormanen of the accounting firm of Davis & Ehrman regarding the accounting procedures in the Grand Chapter office and the Eastern Star Homes. We requested their firm to analyze the internal control of our Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Homes. They submitted their report with various recommendations that we feel will be beneficial to both Grand Chapter offices and Eastern Star Homes.

The Committee met with Mr. George Frank who is a representative of Thompkins & Company, our insurance carrier. Insurance fees like other expenditures are increasing each year. It was our desire to determine the reason for the increase. He gave us the following report:

For the years 1972, 1973 and 1974, there were fifty-eight cases of liability in the amount of \$28,603 which was paid to various members in the liability classification. For the same three years in the paraphernalia classification, there were twenty-six cases reported and a payment of \$5,318.00 was paid in insurance claims. The representative stated that in his opinion, the Chapters should give more attention to the safety areas of the Chapter, and also caution the Chapters to have adequate inventories.

At our meeting held in August, Mr. Flynn representing the Alliance Capital Management Corporation, submitted their report for the year ending June 30, 1975. The report sets forth the annual income from investments of \$391,815.00 or an average rate of 8.43%. He informed us that the investment policy that they pursue is very conservative under the "prudent man" rule. The entire Committee

was of the opinion that the rate on the investments was exceptionally good considering the condition of the times.

We reviewed the cash balance in the General Grand Chapter Convention Fund which was established by our Grand Chapter in 1970 to defray the expenses of the General Grand Chapter Tri-Annual assembly which will be held in California in 1982. It is the opinion of the Committee that additional funds will be necessary to cover the anticipated cost of the 1982 session; therefore, we recommend an additional five cent assessment be levied for the years 1975 to and including 1980.

A proposed Grand Chapter budget for the year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976 in the amount of \$94,635.00, was approved by the Committee and will be submitted for your adoption at this Grand Chapter.

The proposed Eastern Star Homes budget for the year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976, in the amount of \$611,400.00 was submitted by the Trustees for the approval by the Finance Committee. The Committee withheld approval of the budget which will be submitted later at this session of Grand Chapter for adoption. I am sure that each one of us realize that it is very difficult to accurately prepare a budget for the operation of the Eastern Star Homes when each month sees an increase in nearly all items in all areas of operation. Therefore, it may be necessary to amend the budget from time to time during the year. Your Finance Committee is concerned with the increased cost of operating the Eastern Star Homes with a limited amount of income that it now has. It is our opinion that in the very near future, it will be necessary to increase the income by means of voluntary contributions or additional assessments if the Home is to be operated on a sound financial basis.

During our meetings throughout the year, various items were discussed and acted upon which we feel were important to the financial operation of Grand Chapter; however, not significantly important enough to be included in this report.

We sincerely thank the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and the Grand Line Officers for their attendance at most of our meetings, and I want to express appreciation for their assistance and encouragement in all our deliberations. I am sure I speak for each member of the Committee when I say it was a pleasure to serve on the Finance Committee with our most efficient Grand Secretary, Sister Gladys Johnson. We thank her for her wonderful help and cooperation.

REPORT OF CALIFORNIA EASTERN STAR PUBLICATION

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Eleanor Marsh; Worthy Grand Patron, Brother W. Gordon Gilbert; Sisters and Brothers:

On behalf of Brother Robert Armbrust, Past Grand Patron, who with Sister Melvina is at this time in Germany attending the wedding of their son, I am pleased to give the final report on the California Eastern Star Publication.

The California Eastern Star Publication has been an active and most beneficial communication tool for the members of this state commencing with the first issue of Spring, 1970 through the final issue of Fall, 1974.

The Publication Board operated under a resolution granted by the delegates of this Grand Chapter for the years 1970, 1971, 1972, 1973, and 1974. A small group of dedicated members gladly donated their time and talent throughout this five-year period so that all interested members could receive some form of statewide news of their beloved Order.

During our last year of operation, the Board was honored and pleased to find that for the first time Past Grand Matron Zoe Harris had included this committee in her itinerary book.

Legislation was proposed to the delegates of the 1974 Sunshine of Showers Session that Grand Chapter officially recognize the Publication, and include it within the confines and under the juris-

diction of Grand Chapter. To our dismay, the delegates did not adopt this legislation and therefore, the Publication ceased to exist. All advance subscriptions were refunded to our subscribers during the months of February and March, 1975. Recently all equipment owned by the Publication was donated and transferred by the Board to the Grand Chapter office in San Francisco.

It was also the decision of the Board that all monetary funds remaining in our banking account after meeting all obligations and expenses, be given to various benevolent funds of Grand Chapter. On behalf of the Publication Board, then, it is now my great pleasure to present a check in the amount of \$112.50 to each of the following Grand Chapter Committees:

Scholarship Committee
Endowment Committee

Lastly, it is with regret that this Committee finds it necessary to conclude this effort, and we deeply appreciate this final opportunity to express our heartfelt thanks to each member who in any way contributed to, or supported this project. Your kindness to each of us will long be remembered.

SUMMARY OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR PUBLICATION BOARD ACTIVITIES FOR 1975

Legislation was proposed at the 1974 Sunshine of Showers Session for the continuance of the "quarterly pamphlet" of the Order of the Eastern Star Publication, and that it be placed under the jurisdiction and control of Grand Chapter. This legislation was rejected by the delegates in attendance, and the Publication was thereupon terminated. Associate Grand Matron Eleanor Marsh requested that the Publication be continued under the present arrangement, remaining under the direction of Past Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust, for another year. This request was subsequently restated in a letter dated November 1, 1974 from Sister Eleanor to Brother

Bob. Past Grand Patron Bob Armbrust responded by saying that he would present this request to the Publication Board and Publishing Staff, and advise Sister Eleanor of their decision.

The Board met on October 19, 1974, taking the matter under advisement. Under date of November 1, 1974, the Board notified Sister Eleanor that after due consideration, the members and publishing staff had voted to discontinue publishing. Three factors played an important part in this decision:

- The Publication Board felt that the need for this type of communication had been demonstrated by the members for many years, and fulfilled by the Publication for the past five years.
- 2) The Publication Board felt it imperative that this project receive the wholehearted support of all Grand Line Officers in order that it achieve its full potential.
- 3) It was the firm belief of the Publication Board that the Publication could not possibly be offered to the membership at some later date at a more nominal cost than that presented to the delegates of the 1974 Showers of Sunshine Session.

This letter concluded by stating that should the Worthy Grand Matron desire to appoint other members to this undertaking, that the Board members and staff would be happy to offer their assistance and advice in getting the project underway.

On December 18, 1974, Past Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust wrote a letter to Worthy Grand Matron Eleanor Marsh, reporting that Brother Robert and Sister June Richards were desirous of continuing the Publication under their direction.

Under date of December 23, 1974, and carrying the signature of Gladys Johnson, Grand Secretary, a letter was received stating that Worthy Grand Matron Eleanor Marsh was instructing Past Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust, to take no action whatsoever on this matter until further notice from the Worthy Grand Matron.

Notice was received from the Grand Secretary on January 16, 1975, scheduling a meeting with the Worthy Grand Matron, Finance Committee and Jurisprudence on the question of continuing the Publication under the direction of Bob and June Richards. That meeting was held in San Pedro, California, on January 21, 1975, and was attended by representatives of the two committees listed above, and Past Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust, representing the Publication, with the Worthy Grand Matron presiding. Following a lengthy discussion, it was decided to continue the Publication, and to transfer the accumulating of material, printing and mailing of the pamphlet to the Richards. Before the implementation of this decision, however, a telephone call was received on February 10, 1975, from Worthy Grand Matron, Eleanor Marsh, to Past Grand Patron, Robert Armbrust, instructing him to disregard the affirmative action reached in San Pedro since after further consideration it had been decided to cease the Publication.

Whereupon, all prepaid subscriptions were refunded by the Publication Board during the months of February and March, 1975.

At a special meeting of the Publication Board on August 27, 1975, the following decisions were made:

- To donate all equipment and supplies belonging to the Publication to Grand Chapter. Subsequently, on September 21, 1975, this decision was carried out, and all equipment and supplies were delivered to the Grand Secretary's office.
- 2) That all monetary funds remaining in the Publication banking account after all obligations had been met, were to be donated to various benevolent funds of the Order; and that such donations were to be made to Grand Chapter at the October, 1975 session to be held in Sacramento, California.

Following this action, the Publication and its Board are no longer in existence and we hereby submit this summary as an integral part of our final report to Grand Chapter.

It is a special pleasure for me, of course, to welcome Brother Everett Newman and his lovely wife Ella Mae and we hope, Brother Everett, that you can stay for some little time this time—he always runs out quickly.

Sisters and Brothers, it is a very happy pleasure for me to be serving with Brother Logan Cotton as our Host this evening. Brother Logan and I have been friends for many, many years. Their lives have blessed not only me but many, many of our mem-

bers, and thank you so much for your many kindnesses and your friendship for me during these many, many years, Brother Logan.

Sister Eleanor and Brother Gordon, your "Let There Be Light" Session has been very beautiful and I was impressed last night by one line in the speech by one of the Rainbow Girls, when she said "A candle is just a bit of string until it is dipped in wax," and I thought it had to be dipped in wax many, many times, and then in loving service it will go forth very strong and give a beautiful light.

And so it has been with each of you, Sister Eleanor and Brother Gordon. You have brought light into our lives. It has permeated our lives and added much to the happiness, the success, and the progress of our wonderful Grand Chapter.

It is always a joy, Sisters and Brothers, for me to speak to my beloved members of California, and tonight I especially want to express my deepest gratitude to each of you for your many cards, thoughts of love and kindness which you have sent my way during this past month. They have given me courage and strength and I am indeed grateful to you.

Most Worthy Grand Matron, we are indeed proud of your appointments to our Grand Chapter, Brother William Wilson and Brother Logan Cotton. These fine gentlemen have served our Grand Chapter for many, many years. They have the highest respect of every member in this Grand Chapter and they have not only been involved with the business of our Grand Chapter in their communities, they have given, I would imagine, half a lifetime, and we're grateful to you.

Sisters and Brothers, it is said that service is one of the most beautiful words in our lives, and this lovely lady, our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Marguerite Kennerdell, has given perhaps far more in service than many of us are privileged to give.

Marguerite Kennerdell, Most Worthy Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, Sister Thelma Bailey and Brother Logan Cotton, Hostess and Host for the evening, my co-workers in General Grand Chapter, my favorite Worthy Grand Patron of Ohio, Brother Ray Belfrage and his wife, Sister Donna Lee. It is a rare privilege for me to find them so far away from home, and all Honored and Distinguished Members, which would include everyone:

What a joy it is to come so far away from Ohio and find the same kind of loving people here that I have at home.

And what a wonderful joy it is to be in the home Grand Chapter of our Right Worthy Grand Conductress. Sister Thelma and I have enjoyed a very close association in the General Grand Chapter. Occasionally we differ in our ideas but we have always been able to work them out and that is a healthy situation.

I am more than pleased to hear from the members here in California that you are delighted with the appointments here. I have been thanked for giving appointments to Brother Logan Cotton and Brother William Wilson, but I, in turn, would like to thank the members of California for giving to the General Grand Chapter two such fine gentlemen. Both of these gentlemen add a great deal to the General Grand Chapter. They are assets in every way, and I know the work that Brother Wilson is already doing here in your State for the International Eastern Star Temple, and I know how capably Brother Logan will function when our Assembly gathers next year in Cleveland.

I thank both of these gentlemen for accepting these responsible positions and I do thank the Grand Chapter of California for giving such fine gentlemen to the General Grand Chapter.

I am at a loss for words. I don't ever prepare speeches. I am not able to, as a rule, but very often I am present long enough at a session to have gathered some of the ideas of what has been going

on. But I just arrived late this afternoon and I know little of what your reports have been like.

I do read your proceedings when they come to me and I am grateful to your Grand Secretary for sending them to me. I thoroughly enjoy reading them and knowing of the wonderful, fine things you are doing here in California for your own projects as well as for those of the General Grand Chapter.

I know that you are heartily interested in ESTARL, ESTARL as we have known it since it was instituted in 1952, Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership, and these are awards that are given to young people who are graduating from seminary or college.

I know, too, that you are giving generously to Cancer Research, and I hope that you will continue to dig just a little bit deeper, because you must know as well as I do that this disease is not under control by any means, it is growing worse all the time.

It seems as though every time I return home after being away a week or two or three or four that there are other friends of mine who are down with it as terminal cases or hopefully recovering from surgery of one kind or another, and so I hope you will continue your interest in Cancer Research.

I congratulate you upon being 100 percent Grand Chapter in your contributions to the International Eastern Star Temple. If you have not visited the Temple recently within the last year, I do hope you could find it possible to go and see how our beautiful Temple has been updated. It is perfectly beautiful and you, who have given your dollar to this once in a lifetime cause would be so pleased to know that you had a part in making this beautiful Temple possible.

To me it is a Temple of Faith. It represents the faith of all of our members who have contributed to it, faith in the future of the Order of the Eastern Star.

The night before last Dr. Dandridge, the President of Athens College in Alabama, spoke to us after dinner, and he gave us an inspiring message. But of all the words he said, those that have remained with me most, that I thought of time and time again were his belief, always his belief in God.

And I have that same belief. You probably know that the motto of Ohio is "Through God All Things Are Possible," and that motto has carried me through all of my years in the General Grand Chapter, in my own Grand Chapter, and in my home Chapter. It has carried me all around the world.

There were times when I wished I could be home, almost wished I never heard of the Order of the Eastern Star when I was so far away and so far from my loved ones, mostly during the night. But then morning would come and there would be a knock on the

door, ready for breakfast and luncheon and meetings, and then one would forget that one was so far from home, because there would always be friends waiting for me.

Some of my folks at home have been concerned because I travel a great deal by myself, and I keep assuring them that I am never alone, never for a moment. When my plane arrives or the boat arrives or whatever I'm traveling on arrives, there are always Eastern Stars there waiting to meet me and to make me feel at home.

Then Dr. Dandridge said he had a great belief in his country. He feels that we are all concerned, things are not just going right the way we would want them to, but he has great faith that the better things will come if we will just give them time, if we will just not be impatient. If instead of talking about what is wrong with the world we will just talk about what is right with it.

And surely when you start to think about it, everything is right with the world. Actually it is only the people in it that are causing the difficulties.

I have always liked the words of Anne Getty, and they were written inside the program at our last Assembly, "Let each one sweep the front of his own door and then the world will be clean." And isn't that true?

There are more than three million members of the Order of the Eastern Star and if we could rise in the morning, repeat that, repeat it through the day, what a beautiful world this would be.

Now I went one step farther than Dr. Dandridge. I have great faith in the Order of the Eastern Star. Many people are complaining and worrying because our attendance is down, because our membership is not growing. They find fault with the things that are happening in the chapters, but they don't do anything about it.

I don't think there is anything wrong with the Order of the Eastern Star. I don't understand why everyone wants to open the gate and let everyone come in. I became a member of the Eastern Star through my husband's affiliation, but long before we were married I could have been an Eastern Star through my father's affiliation or my brother's affiliation, and I am proud of that fact. I am proud that I am an Eastern Star through the proper Masonic affiliation, as Robert Morris intended it to be. He thought we should have an organization for the wives, daughters, mothers, widows and sisters of Master Masons and for Master Masons.

And then we let the barriers down for other relatives with Masonic affiliation, but next year is the ninth year and the time for changes in our Ritual, and you would be amazed, in fact I think you would be heartsick—as I often am—when you read the resolutions that are coming in, opening the gates to almost anyone. It does not matter about Masonic affiliation, just let anyone come in.

And then when we do that, what happens to our Masonic heritage? What happens to the Order that our Robert Morris wanted for us? If you have the answer, I would like to hear it.

I see no reason why we need to be worried about our Order of the Eastern Star. I think our meetings are not attended as well as they should be, mostly because many of us are afraid to be on the street. That is not the fault of the Order of the Eastern Star, it is the fault of conditions.

I think many of the people are afraid of being out alone. Many of our members are becoming older. Many of the younger ones forget to call the older members and ask if they can't pick them up and take them to Chapter.

I think we should do something about the members we have, not worry about bringing in others without the proper Masonic affiliation but instead each one of you, every one of you, if you would go to someone in your Chapter who has not come to Chapter recently and persuade him or her to come to Chapter, make them feel needed, make them feel wanted, give them something to do, make it possible to come.

During the war we had car pools. What is wrong with having them again, just to bring our members out? Many of them need the Masonic and the Eastern Star associations that we're giving them, and they do not come because we forget them.

I have not heard—and I have talked with many of our Masonic leaders—and I have not found one of them who has said anything about letting down the bars in Masonry. So why are we thinking about letting down the bars in the Order of the Eastern Star?

Our Ritual was written more than 150 years ago and yet there are innumerable people writing in, wanting to make changes, making changes in the wording, in the phraseology, making it as we possibly would write it today, and yet any 21 of us, if we would rewrite it, would write it differently.

And so why not leave it alone? Why not leave it as we wanted it to be? Think about it, won't you please?

I would like to mention one more thing: Your Grand Chapter has been very, very generous in giving to the projects of the General Grand Chapter. I know you're going to continue to be, because you always have been. But I would like to tell you about another project which is merely an extension of ESTARL. I don't think you have heard too much about it, because according to my records there are only 305 in California, and 305 have not been paid for. I am speaking about the Extension of ESTARL, ESTARL Phase II. This was an idea of mine, not mine alone, it was induced by Judge Daniel Jennings, who was a member of our Continuing Committee on ESTARL in Ohio. And when he finished his five-year term in 1972, he said, "Marguerite, we are not going far enough. We are helping these young people through college and seminary

but many of them are well enough educated, they have the requirements to take them further, and yet we're not giving them any help whatsoever."

And he and I talked with three theologians, prominent theologians in Ohio, and found that those schools, too, were thinking of the same thing. Through their former students and alumni they were hoping to raise the money to give awards for postgraduate study.

And so rather than take any little thing from our ESTARL as we know it, I proposed that we sell this little Chapel Charm. I wear mine around my neck on a chain. I have one on a charm bracelet and one on my watch. I propose that we sell, and I hope we would sell 50,000 of them, and if we did, that we would be able to give a thousand dollar award in each one of our 56 Grand Chapters and in each country anywhere in the world where they co-sponsor a postgraduate student.

I would like to tell you with all the pride in the world that when I left home, our Mail Order Chairman was mailing out the 46 thousandth charm. Forty-six thousand charms have been mailed out all over the world.

Many of our Grand Chapters have sold up to 6,000—I think Pennsylvania holds the record so far with around 6,000, Ohio is following closely behind with almost 6,000. Michigan is not far behind. Many of our Grand Chapters have sold a thousand, 2,000, many, many of them have sold 500. Well, 46,000 of these tiny little charms have been mailed.

Our Grand Chapter of Ohio advanced \$18,000 so we could buy our first 10,000 to take to Denver, and we came back without any of them. We ordered more immediately, and since then have repaid our Grand Chapter for the amount they advanced and now in our fund we have \$63,000 plus, which means that we're going to be able to give a thousand dollar award in each one of our 56 Grand Jurisdictions, a thousand dollar award in each country that supports graduate students, and in some instances where there are especially fine students, who need extra help, we are going to be doing more.

Now as I said, there are 46,000 in circulation—305 in California. I don't know who has them but they have not been sold.

I talked with a young lady tonight who said she had taken 24 in Denver and is planning to send the check to my home.

I hope that sometime through this coming year, we have less than a year before our Assembly, that you think a little bit about selling some of our charms. Your ESTARL Committee will have the opportunity, the same as any Grand Chapter that has sold five or six thousand of them to present up to five applicants, and we will hear from the ESTARL Committee and the applicants that they send to us.

In May of next spring our ESTARL Committee of the General Grand Chapter will meet to go over these applications, and then we will present the awards in the spring. Any of the charms that are sold after that time will be given in awards up to the time of our Assembly. This is a three-year project, it will end with the next Assembly.

Thank you so much for listening. Aren't you glad I did not write a speech?

You see, when I'm talking with Eastern Stars about the things Eastern Stars are interested in, I sort of get carried away.

I know how very beloved our Sister Thelma is here in California. Brother Ray Belfrage and Dottie and I could tell you some of the things that are in store for you. REPORT OF THE FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE COMMITTEE

They are the General Grand Chapter, organized in November, 1876; the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, in 1904; The Grand Chapter of New York is the oldest organized in 1869, and The Grand Chapter of New Jersey. The General Grand Chapter meets every three years, and we in California are looking forward to being host at the 1982 Triennial when our own Thelma Bailey will be the Most Worthy Grand Matron.

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland has jurisdiction over 647 subordinate Chapters. It meets twice a year for a one-day session with the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron being elected for a two-year term on alternate years. The Queen Mother is a member of a subordinate Chapter of Scotland.

New York is the only Grand Chapter to have the white point of the Star up. Each Jurisdiction supports many worthwhile projects, ESTARL, Cancer, Eastern Star and Masonic Homes, Youth Groups and many others. A New York State Health Association stated Fraternal Organizations, in caring for their own Sisters and Brothers, saved the taxpayers a considerable amount of tax dollars. A conservative figure of 125,000 to 150,000 persons each year are taken care of better and at a cost less than that of government organizations.

We beheld many interesting and humorous happenings—some of which we will share with you.

The late President Truman, affectionately known as "Give em Hell Harry," was a Past Patron of Grandview Chapter in Missouri and the first member of our Order to be elected President of the United States.

The late President was and Mrs. Eisenhower is an Honorary Member of a Tokyo Chapter in Japan.

In New Jersey the Associate Grand Matron pins a rose on a Brother at a District Meeting to show her preference for Worthy Grand Patron, New Jersey does not have an Associate Grand Patron. Only in New Jersey, Great granddaughters have been added to membership eligibility.

In Bermuda, it is not unusual to see Sisters riding bieycles to Chapter meetings in their formals.

Ohio has the most members, 169,774. They presented 1,398 50 year pins. Six chapters have memberships over 1,000.

Quebec, Canada, has the fewest members—2,742.

Delaware has only 3,581 members that raised \$12,833.01 from a summer benefit. Monies donated to charities helped mostly children.

Pennsylvania collected 3,286,767 stamps, which were sold for \$10,162.34, this being sent to Washington State Council of Churches for famine relief.

Montana's Grand Sentinel is a Sister and succeeds to Associate Grand Conductress.

In Maine the husband of the Worthy Grand Matron was Worthy Grand Patron four years before.

Nebraska's project is a Masonic-Eastern Star Home for Children. Highlight of the Session was entertainment by these children with dances, songs, and a play.

Georgia had a gain in membership for the fifth consecutive year. There are 36 Districts, each with a Sister and Brother appointed to serve together as District Grand Deputies.

In most jurisdictions it was sad to note the loss of membership. 43 jurisdictions noted a loss of 33,724. There were 10 jurisdictions that had a gain of 1,475 members. Eastern Star lost 6,000 more members this year than last. Many are striving in various ways to see what can be done to change this and to see that members become more interested in their Chapters. Robert Morris once stated, "It matters not what men say, if the Order of the Eastern Star satisfies the demands of the ages, and is worthy of existence, it will live and take its place among the institutions of the land." Therefore, let us strive to practice our beliefs in our every day life and make this an institution people will desire to become members of and be active in.

Worthy Grand Matron, it has been an interesting experience. We thank you for the opportunity of serving on this most rewarding committee.

Helen Bratschie, Chairman, J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund:

Sisters and Brothers, before I present my report, I have three acknowledgements to make that are really outstanding. There were many groups that worked for the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund this year, and I know that they put their heart and soul and everything they had into it.

San Gabriel Valley Matrons & Patrons Association had a Breakfast, and they turned into the Fund \$4,810.

Bell Chapter, of which our Grand Ruth is a member, had very many projects this year, and as a single Chapter turned in \$5,890.30.

My own East Bay Area had a Breakfast, and they turned in well over a thousand dollars—and there were many groups that turned in very sizable amounts, and I can't mention all of them, but I do have one more to mention: South Pasadena Chapter No. 272 had a member who prior to being a member was the Honored Queen of Bethel No. 101, and while she was Honored Queen she had as her project the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund, which was outstanding inasmuch as it had nothing to do with Eastern Star. She was the daughter of a Past Matron and Past Patron of South Pasadena Chapter. Unfortunately she became ill, she died of cancer

at the age of 19, and South Pasadena Chapter in her memory contributed over \$900 to the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund.

REPORT OF J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

We, the members of the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund committee are grateful for the privilege that has been ours in serving our Sisters and Brothers who have sought aid in their time of need. This is a working committee and is always available to assist when called upon.

It is my pleasure to present your committee to you, some were unable to attend this session, but those who are present will step forward as I introduce them. Sisters Kathryn Carter, Alice Connor, Georgia Brignall, Zelma Bray, Ione Meyer, Pauline Roberts, Jean Albrecht, and Brothers Felix Carter, Elmer Downey, Ralph Kaufman, Harry Davis, Roy Bowman, John Chase, Don Parton, and Leroy Covey. They have made the lessons of our Order a reality to many Sisters and Brothers and they have the everlasting thanks of those whom they have assisted and my grateful thanks for the many hours, worked, and the many miles traveled to provide the necessary information to make this work possible.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have served Grand Chapter on this committee and I thank you, Worthy Grand Matron Sister Eleanor Marsh and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Gordon Gilbert for this privilege.

No bills would have been paid without the efficiency of our Grand Secretary, Sister Gladys Johnson and her staff, and I thank them, and my special thanks to Sister Diane Dixon for all her valuable assistance, and who would have less interruptions with her work if I lived at the other end of our State.

I should like to pay special tribute for the efforts and years of service of Brother Roy Bowman of Star of the West Chapter No. 468 who served as Worthy Patron in 1953 when Brother J. Clifford Lee was Worthy Grand Patron. Brother Roy has served on this committee for eighteen of the twenty-two years of its existence and during that time has been General Chairman eight years. He has been appointed Chairman of the Credentials Committee for 1976 and although our committee will miss his valuable assistance and vast store of knowledge, we know that he will continue to work with the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Association to further our cause.

This is the twenty-second year of existence of this fund and the aid to our members. From its humble beginnings in 1954 when the amount of aid given was \$3,987.00 with assistance to twenty-one members, we have progressed to this year of 1975 when the aid given was \$171,706.00 assisting 159 members. The total amount of

aid for all years is now \$1,378,843.00 and we have assisted approximately 1,872 members. I might add, that since the close of our Grand Chapter year on June 30th, 1975, we have received an additional forty applications, and the bills have totaled almost \$50,000.00.

Cancer does not respect age. We have applications from members in their twenties up to the age of ninety-four, and we are receiving many more applications from members in their forties and fifties. We had an application from a member who was found to have cancer when she gave birth to a baby daughter. As a precautionary measure, in the event it was needed, an application for a dependent member is in the file for that baby, filed when she was only one week old.

When you registered you were given copies of the proposed Budgets and the Auditors reports of the various funds. Do not be misled by the balance in the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund. There would have been a decrease in the balance, had it not been for a bequest of \$80,000.00 from an estate. We cannot hope for such a windfall every year, and the amount paid out in 1975 exceeded any previous year by \$64,000.00. Had all the 159 members that we assisted this year required even \$4,000.00 aid each, the fund would have been completely depleted, and some would have not received any aid at all. We must continue our efforts to keep our fund "healthy" to meet the ever growing calls for help.

In our file at the present time are 140 applications. To date, we have paid \$500.00 or less on 41; approximately \$1,000.00 on 29; \$2,000.00 on 25; \$3,000.00 on 8; \$4,000.00 on 11; \$5,000.00 on 2, and the absolute maximum of \$6,000.00 on 1. We have 19 applications that at this time have not had any bills submitted for payment.

My Sisters and Brothers, none of this would be possible if it were not for each of you. The contributions from individuals, Associations and groups who work year after year with Breakfasts, Teas, and other projects, the proceeds of all, being given to this fund, assure us that we can continue to serve. It is all of you who make our work possible, and I speak for all of those whom you have helped when I say—Thank you. In relieving the financial burden of those who are stricken with cancer, we give them peace of mind and hope for the future.

To quote one applicant whom we assisted, and I could quote from many letters I have received, "God bless the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and all my Sisters and Brothers in the Eastern Star for all the help they have given me", to which I add "So may it ever be."

To those Grand Floor Officers who chose our Project for their special efforts this year, we thank you sincerely. You have increased our funds considerably.

It is impossible to name all who have sponsored fund raising affairs. We deeply appreciate all their efforts and sincerely thank them.

Woods, Past Grand Patron, Chairman of this Committee were unable to attend because of illness in their families.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

We are sorry to report that this committee was called upon to investigate problems in eleven Chapters this year. There have been more complaints received this year than in the past several years. Most of these complaints had developed into serious problems by the time they were called to our attention.

We feel that many of these problems could have been solved within the Chapters by the members themselves if they had talked the problems over when the troubles first occurred. In a majority of the cases the Elective Officers were involved. Disregard for our Eastern Star Obligation entered into every case. In many cases the Past Matrons and Past Patrons interfered with the authority of the Worthy Matron and did not extend the same courtesy to her that they had received when they were in office. In other cases the Worthy Matrons acted in a dictatorial manner, exceeding their authority.

The improper use of the black cube also entered into many of these Grievances especially when the petitioners were girls or advisors from our youth groups.

Until we can learn to respect the rights of others to have different opinions than ours, we will continue to have these problems.

In a separate report we are giving our incoming Worthy Grand Matron the list of those Chapters where problems still exist, so that she will have a guide in her future actions.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

I am most grateful to Jay Miller, Past Grand Patron, and his fine Committee, for their service to our Chapters this past year, answering many requests for information and talks to Chapters.

Our Chapters during their many years of existence have passed through periods of prosperity, depression and distress. Many of our Chapters have become discouraged because of the lack of officers, and this fine Committee has strived to assist them with their problems.

We are running quite a bit ahead of schedule and perhaps we could have a little community singing.

(Community singing).

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Sisters and Brothers, we are going to have our Most Worthy Grand Matron speak to us at this time.

Marguerite L. Kennerdell, Most Worthy Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, all my Colleagues of General Grand Chapter and important Honored Guests and our most important Members:

I talked at length last night and I should think that would have been enough. I am sure that any guest speaking once should be enough, but Sister Thelma seems to think and the Worthy Grand Matron seems to think you would like to know where I have been and what I have been doing, and I would like to tell you, if you want to listen for a few minutes.

I was installed or we were installed in Denver in 1973. My first official visitation was to the Grand Chapter of Arkansas in December of that year. You may not know that the responsibilities of the Most Worthy Grand Matron are that she attend at least once each of the 56 Grand Jurisdictions of General Grand Chapter and each of the subordinate Chapters under the direct supervision of the General Grand Chapter.

We have 86 Chapters that are under the direct supervision of the General Grand Chapter—those in Alaska, those in Hawaii, in the Philippines, Guam, Taiwan, Okinawa, Japan, Germany, Italy, Canal Zone, Panama, and many, many others.

In setting up an agenda the summer before one is installed, it is quite a proposition, because naturally our Grand Chapters set up their Assemblies or Sessions to suit their own convenience rather than that of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, and as a result, 17 Grand Chapters meet in the month of October, and I believe 12 to 14 in the month of May, and a great many in June. So it is a difficult matter to try to arrange them chronologically and geographically.

My reason for being here for part of your Session rather than all of it, as I would have liked, is because I share the week with the Grand Chapter of Alabama. Two weeks ago in nine days I visited five Grand Jurisdictions and was able to spend only a few days with each one.

Up to this present time I have visited, I think, all but about 14 of our Grand Jurisdictions. This is the last one for this year.

My visiting will start again next March, when I visit the Grand Chapter of Louisiana, the home Grand Chapter of Brother Everett Newman, and I'm looking forward to that visit with great feeling and anticipation. I started out a year ago last February for the Philippines and visited each one of our Chapters there. There are 12, and not so many of our Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons have visited the individual Chapters as I did. I think in only one case we had a combined meeting, and that was in the City of Manila, where we have five Chapters and where it is almost impossible for our Chapters to have individual nights or separate nights, when they could have had separate meetings.

I was in the Philippines three weeks, I thoroughly enjoyed our people there. I wish sometime you might have an opportunity to visit them. They are all English speaking, even though most of them are Nationals, because they're educated in the English language from the third grade on, so they speak very good English.

They have a number of provinces and in each province they speak a different kind of the Philippine language, and so very often in order to communicate with each other, they have to speak English, because they can't speak the Philippine language that is spoken in the other province. I found that to be quite interesting, and it came to light one time when I was standing at the desk of a hotel and one man was trying to say something to another one, and finally the clerk said, "If you speak in English, you will be able to understand and you will each be able to understand the other." So it is very nice to know that our English language has spread that far.

I went from there to Guam and spent five very fine days with a very, very dedicated Chapter there. Their membership is 300 some, but they have a difficult time getting enough members together for a Corps of Officers, because they are military, mostly, and their members are rotated, and as a result are living in all parts of the world. But they do pay their dues to Verona Chapter on Guam.

I had the unfortunate experience of waking one morning with phlebitis and called the Worthy Matron immediately, because they were having a farewell luncheon for me at noon, and asked her if she could find a doctor for me, and she said, "We will be there in an hour," and she was. She came in with a lady who looked like she was 17 or 18 years old, wearing a flowery, very pretty kind of pinafore dress, long black curly hair down to her shoulders, and introduced her as Dr. Cruz. She was a Guamanian, had been educated in the hospital in Philadelphia, and she was an excellent doctor.

Within an hour I was in the hospital and within another hour I had x-rays, blood taken from every part of my body and ended up with my leg wrapped up on pillows and a bottle up over my

head, and everything just happened so quickly that it was just impossible to really be sure that that is where I was.

When I was ready to go to sleep that night the thought occurred to me that I was on this tiny little island way out in the great big ocean, and not any of my family—I do not have a large family, but not even my little Dachshund was there with me. They wanted very much to let my people at home know about it, and I said "There is no need to, I hope I'm not going to be here that long," and there was not anything anyone could do for me that the members of Verona Chapter had not already done for me or were doing for me.

But on the fifth day, much against the doctor's wishes, I was allowed to come home on one of the 747's and she arranged passage for me and I had red carpet treatment all the way, wheelchair through Honolulu, wheelchair through San Francisco, wheelchair waiting for me in Cleveland, and I arrived at six o'clock in the morning about three weeks before anyone expected me.

By the time the taxicab drove into our driveway, my next door neighbor was over instantly and said, "What in the world are you doing home?" I said, "I was going home and wanted to surprise everybody to be sure everything was going to be what it would be."

When I took the chart that Dr. Cruz had given me to the hospital to my doctor, as she had told me I should do, he looked at it, and whistled, and said, "You know, this fellow certainly knew what he was doing." And I said, "This fellow was a little Guamanian doctor who weighed, I'm sure, not more than a hundred pounds soaking wet."

She was delightful and I will never think of it as a sad or tragic experience but rather as a very wonderful one, because I came to know the members there. They were so delightful, so sweet, so careful and good to me that I have a very, very great, deep love for each one of them, and that is the way you find our members everywhere you go.

I came back home and rested for a week, and that just about brought me up to the time of my visit to the 100-Year Chapters in Indiana and Connecticut, and then I was down in Tennessee and Florida, and then took off for Germany and Italy.

The experiences in Germany were extraordinary. I have a very fine Deputy Grand Matron there who is bilingual, and her husband was in line in the Grand Lodge, and they drove me everywhere, as we had agreed, and I would pay her expenses if she would do the driving and make it a little easier for me.

Our Chapters there, unfortunately, are not on too solid a foundation, because they do rotate. The Military seems to toss things into a hat and throw it up into the air, and away go the boys, and what it does to our Chapters is very unfortunate. Of course, I'm sure it must be necessary but some of our officers in the Chapters in Germany never serve more than a year, or very rarely do, but they do have the experience, they initiate them and hopefully send them back.

They have proficiency tests and they are very careful, in most cases give a Ritual to their new members rather than a Bible, as we do in many of our Chapters here in the United States, and it is not unusual to sit in a meeting of the Chapters and see the Bible on the sidelines, the members holding the Ritual and reading every word that the officers are saying, which must be helpful.

I wonder sometimes when I hear about the proficiency tests and see these folks in Hawaii, they do the same thing, these are all English-speaking Chapters, they instituted one German Chapter, all German-speaking Chapter while I was there last May, and they have the German Ritual.

But in so many cases where these people are looking at the Ritual as people are talking, they are memorizing it, and you would be amazed to sit and listen to a class in proficiency and hear how quickly they absorb everything that is in the Ritual. I wonder sometimes how many of our members could even recite the landmarks of our Order.

I don't know whether or not you have proficiency tests here or cards of any kind. Many of the Grand Chapters do not. Many others do, and I am very much in favor of them, because only in that way do you make an effort to learn the work and to know what the Ritual is all about.

I came back from Italy, you possibly may have heard that Strawberry is my emblem. I started out in 1962, my hair had been up to that time and up to later years a very fiery red, not a pretty red but a carroty red, and after you have gone through your younger years, perhaps up through high school with red hair, and the name Marguerite, you have not lived. Because most of the time the boys would say, "Redhead, redhead fire in the woodshed. Marguerite go wash your feet the board of health is across the street."

I think many times that those years prepared me for all of the criticism that I receive sometimes. It just rolls off my shoulders just as those experiences did.

My mother used to console me with the fact that Marguerite is a sun daisy, and I often wished they called me Daisy instead of Marguerite.

However, after my visits in Germany and in Italy, while I was there I ate strawberries, which have become my sort of emblem because of my red hair in 1962, our Worthy Grand Matron started calling me the Strawberry Blonde and referred to me as the berries, and that is the second nicest compliment I ever received. The first one was when someone said I was a good egg.

Since then the strawberries at all of our parties and our General Grand Chapter receptions, have been very much in evidence, and if you walk into my home, you would know they are a great part of my life, because there are strawberries from the time you enter my home until you leave it by any door.

So we have had a lot of fun with the strawberries. But in Germany they were receiving them, they were shipped in, beautiful strawberries from Italy, and so we were having breakfast, lunch and dinner, and sometimes before I went to bed at night we were having strawberries.

Then I went to Italy, and they were at their peak then, and I really ate strawberries. I had them again in every shape and form. So by the time I left in April on a 747 for Kennedy Airport, I found myself scratching a little bit here and scratching a little bit there, and suddenly realized that I had a strawberry rash. That is the only time I have ever had it, and I have eaten many, many many strawberries and thoroughly enjoyed them.

I believe I have, as I said, visited all but about 14 of our Grand Chapters. I have visited all of your subordinate Chapters under the General Grand Chapter, and Alaska, which was a very wonderful experience, and then the Canal Zone, a very, very wonderful experience there.

There is a very sad feeling prevailing there, because Mr. Kissinger, as you know, has offered to give the Canal Zone back to Panama, and our people there are very worried about this. In fact, the Panama Canal Company is very worried about it, because they are mostly Americans. They are fourth and fifth generation of Americans living in the Canal Zone, because when the Canal was built back in 1903, when it was completed, many of our men remained there, raised their families there, their sons and daughters have come back here to school and gone back there to work. And it is a very, very fine group of people there, and particularly our Masonic brothers and Eastern Star.

I think they have one of the most beautiful Scottish Rite Temples I have even seen in Balboa. The Masons are very strong, probably because there are not as many other things to think about, other places to go, and so they are very active.

We have four beautiful Chapters there composed of dedicated Eastern Stars, and I came home with a very sad feeling about them, because they are concerned about the Canal Zone being turned over to the Panamanians, because they know it is the Communists in Panama who are doing the heckling and wanting to make the change. And they are concerned that we are going to be foolish enough to give it back.

I hope this is not going to be true. I hope you will all take time, no matter how busy you are, to send a card to Mr. Kissinger, President Ford, to your Senators, to your Representatives, and tell

them that you would like to see for the United States to maintain sovereignty over the Canal Zone and the Panama Canal.

I fully understand that the Canal will be obsolete probably by the end of the century, and they tell me that on the books and on the boards there are drawings showng a new way of going through the passage, but until it is built we should certainly support the Canal and the people in the Panama Canal Zone.

I was told that probably 60 percent of the employees of the Panama Canal are Panamanians, and they are living in holy terror of the Canal Zone being given over to Panama, because they realize only too well that it will become communistic when it is given back.

So you can help a little bit if you send your opinion to those who are concerned. Senator Taft from Ohio told me there seems to be not too much danger but, of course, there is always the chance that the vote can be swung the wrong way, and so when you think about the Canal Zone, think about our members there who are dedicated, and who would be asked to leave probably or made so uncomfortable that they would have to leave and come back to a country that they hardly know, because they have lived in the Canal Zone all their lives, even though they are Americans.

I think of all the places I have been, I liked and admired the people in the Canal Zone, because they are so dedicated. Our people in the Chapters in Bermuda are equally so. Everywhere I have gone I have found people just like you, just as dedicated and happy about your Order of the Eastern Star, and as I said last night, I hope that you begin to think about doing more for your Chapters, doing more in your Chapters, because we don't need to open our Chapters to further memberships.

There is nothing wrong with the Order as it is today, even though our membership is going down.

In your Fraternal Correspondence report read yesterday, it mentioned that Ohio is the largest Grand Chapter in the world, and we are very proud of that, but you very rarely hear about this, and this is one of the few times that I have ever mentioned it, because we like to think of the quality of our membership rather than the number.

I think if you will start to think of the quality in your Chapter, whether it be large or small, and then bring back the members who are not attending your Chapter, make it important enough for them to come back, make them feel that they are needed and that you need them, and make it possible for them to come to Chapter, because each one of us is afraid at night to be out alone, and that is a sad situation which neither you nor I can correct. But let's hope that it will be corrected in the not too distant future.

My personal greetings to your members in your Chapters. I hope you take my greetings to each one of them. I wish there were the opportunity to shake hands with each one of you before I leave

on Friday and before you start for your homes, but it certainly has been a joy to meet you here in this building, in the hotel, the different parties and so on. It is a joy to shake your hand and to know that you want to shake mine.

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Isn't she delightful?

Marguerite L. Kennerdell, Most Worthy Grand Matron:

I don't want to discourage Sister Thelma and Brother Everett, but that is just an idea of what is in store for you.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

From the way Brother Everett is traveling around, I think I understand why Sister Thelma chose him. He is probably planning one of those plane trips and using the tickets he has got stored up.

Sister Lilas Haug, Chairman of the Special Committee on Conventions, may we have your report?

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates of this Grand Chapter Session, Sisters and Brothers:

Before proceeding with the report of the Special Convention Committee, I would like to introduce the other two members of this committee, Sister Lois Blodgett Tamba, Past Grand Matron and Sister Grace Hoffman, Past Grand Matron.

To you two fine Past Grand Matrons my loving and appreciative thanks for the consideration and kindness shown me while working together this past year.

Our purpose, to find an adequate convention site to hold our Grand Chapter Session in 1985 in the northern part of our state.

Five cities in the north were contacted. Sites for four cities were investigated to determine if the facilities were adequate to host our session. However, written bids were received from only three, namely the cities of Fresno, Sacramento and San Jose. These bids have been presented with a financial summary of the information to the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Brother Logan Cotton, prior to the opening of this Grand Chapter Session. They in turn will be presented to you following the acceptance of this report.

All cities with the exception of the City of Oakland responded most graciously. All with the exception of Oakland seemed eager and anxious to host our Convention, however, San Francisco did not send in a written bid because their auditorium would not be available for 1985 but would like the opportunity and consideration of bidding on future Grand Chapter Sessions especially in 1987. By that time they hope their new Convention Center will be completed.

In lieu of this, we felt rather than make any definite recommendations ourselves, we would receive their bids, bring them to the Finance Committee for their perusal and recommendation and then to you the delegates for your consideration and final determination.

All of the Convention Bureaus making bids received us graciously and our meeting with each most interesting and pleasurable. To these representatives our sincere thanks.

We would like to call your attention to the fact that the cities that have built new Convention Centers and those in the planning stages are constructing their new buildings on one level with theatre seating only and seating for approximately 4500.

Lois Blodgett Tamba, Past Grand Matron Grace Hoffman, Past Grand Matron Lilas E. Haug, Past Grand Matron, Chairman

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Sister Lilas, would you please present those who wish to extend invitations for future sessions.

Lilas Haug, Past Grand Matron, Chairman of Special Committee on Conventions:

Thank you. Worthy Grand Matron, now it is my pleasure to present the representatives of these three cities who are here this morning to present their bids, after which they will meet with the Finance Committee, who will review their bids and make recommendations to us.

These representatives, according to the cities alphabetically will present their invitations.

First we will hear from Mr. Lloyd Kennedy, Jr., of the Fresno Convention Bureau.

Mr. Lloyd Kennedy, Jr.:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Honored Members:

I first of all want to thank you for giving me this opportunity to attend your meeting this morning. I very much appreciate the opportunity to be here.

On behalf of the City and County of Fresno, I extend our sincere invitation to the Order of the Eastern Star to have your 1985 Convention in Fresno, California.

There are many reasons why we feel that your convention convening in our City would be most successful, and I want to mention very briefly some of those reasons:

As many of you realize, the City of Fresno is located right in the center of California. Because of this it is very convenient for a State convention to meet in Fresno, because you have to compromise for the delegates North and South. It is easy to drive to Fresno, Interstate No. 5 and Highway 99, and we have excellent air service, United, PSA, and Air West.

Aside from the location, we think your convention will be most successful in the City of Fresno because of our convention center facilities. We have a very large Convention Center in Fresno. It occupies four city blocks. It consists of a theater that seats 2,359 people, has a beautiful lobby. We have a large exhibit hall, 32,000 square feet. It will accommodate 3,500 people for a meeting. We have 13 meeting rooms. The largest will seat 400, and most important, we have a large arena. The arena, I believe, will be ideal for your meeting as you have here in Sacramento.

The arena seats 7,500 people with elevated seating. We also have 27,000 square feet on the arena floor, so you have more than sufficient room in the arena to conduct your sessions.

In addition to our complex, we have a large lobby around the arena, so that people don't have to be exposed to the elements. The arena lobby would make an ideal area for your registration needs.

One of the delightful aspects of the Convention Center is that the City of Fresno says "We will waive rent, not charge you any rental charge to use the Convention Center Complex," and that usually rents for \$3,500 a day, so that is a pretty substantial savings.

Also the City of Fresno does not charge you for microphones, does not charge you for cleanups, setups, for chairs, for tables, a substantial savings again.

There is lots of parking at the Convention Center. I think that is really important. We have parking for 880 automobiles right at the Center, and you pay a dollar to park there. You pay one time, and you get to go in and out for the entire time of the convention for just one dollar.

Another reason why the convention in Fresno would be most successful, in addition to the excellent facilities, is because of the hotel situation in Fresno. One block from the Convention Center we have the 22-story Rodeway Hotel; two and a half blocks away we have a Hilton Hotel. We can reserve over 2400 guest rooms in Fresno for you. Of that total approximately 600 are within walking distance of the Convention Center Complex.

The hotels, too, incidentally, have lots of meeting space. Very briefly, the Rodeway can seat a thousand, the Hilton 900 for a banquet. The Sheraton will accommodate 1,800 for a banquet, and if

need be our Convention Center can accommodate 2,600 for a meal function.

Another reason we think your convention would be most successful in Fresno is because there are so many tourist attractions and sites of interest. We have the world famous Fresno Mall, a park-like setting in downtown Fresno, where we have done away with Main Street. It consists of outdoor parks, restaurants, the first mall in the United States, and we think it is a delightful environment.

We are close to National Parks, Yosemite, Sequoia, and Mineral King. If you have time there is scenery for enjoyment.

We have many, many tours of the wineries, which are kind of my favorite in the area.

Last but not least I want to mention the services that the Fresno Convention Bureau will extend to your convention if you come to Fresno, and I will tell you this candidly: We are willing to make available more services to your group—I have been representing Fresno for six years—we will provide your convention, if it comes to Fresno, with promotional fliers and materials in advance of your convention.

We will house your delegates, we will process all hotel reservations, we will print and provide meal tickets for your various luncheons, we will provide program covers as you have now, and provide up to \$500.00 for program printing.

We will see that you get good coverage by the media in our community also.

In summary, when you think of our invitation, remember our City is in the center of California. It is a geographical compromise, and I think it is very convenient for all of you to come to Fresno.

We have a truly magnificent Convention Center, as a matter of fact, Fresno has the largest Convention Complex in California. We have lots of hotel rooms. We will extend you many free services, but most important, I want you to think about this, I believe your organization has been in existence for over a hundred years in California—you have not had a convention, not one time, in Central California, and I think your members from the Fresno area, Bakersfield area, Modesto area, would welcome the opportunity to extend their hospitality to you to have you come to their part of the State.

Thank you for your consideration. It is most appreciated by the City of Fresno.

Lilas Haug, Past Grand Matron:

Now we will hear from John Burns of the Sacramento Convention Bureau, Mr. Burns.

Mr. John Burns:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the 102nd Annual Session of Grand Chapter:

I have here in front of me a two-page speech telling you about Sacramento. It really puts me in an embarrassing situation, because I think most of you know more about Sacramento than I do—you have been here many times.

I think I will just tell you what we're doing most recently. Before you were here two years ago, you are now sitting on new chairs down on the floor, which I hope are a welcome relief, and those of you on the top there, two years from now you will be sitting on the same kind of chairs, so you can applaud that.

Two years from now there will be a new parking garage one block down the road here, and we will have a hundred spots in that for you.

I think that for me to go on talking more and more about Sacramento would be using up my time foolishly.

This is the only time I get to welcome you to Sacramento. But more important, it is the only time that I have to ask you to do me a favor. There are four people that for the last two years we worked very closely with as a Bureau. They are nice people. They work with a group of other people that are very nice people, but four of them we have become very close to, actually there are five. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Holloway, who really carried the ball for Sacramento people and for the Convention Bureau.

Mr. and Mrs. Rob Lawson, you have been very nice to us here in Sacramento and I wish to applaud them for it.

Then a person who took on a job that has never been done here in Sacramento with the downstairs and the basement, Lee Conover, who took over the job that had never been done in Sacramento before and did a beautiful job with it, and it is a lot of hard work.

Thank you very much, I hope we see you in 1985.

Lilas Haug, Past Grand Matron:

Last we will hear from Mrs. Marie Foulks of the San Jose Convention Bureau.

Marie Foulks:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates and Members of the Grand Chapter Session, good morning:

It is my pleasure to be invited here today and on behalf of the San Jose Convention Bureau I would like to extend a most sincere invitation to the members of the Eastern Star to hold their 1985 Annual Convention in our warm and friendly City of San Jose.

At this time I would briefly like to share with you some of San Jose's more salient features:

San Jose is centrally located and easily accessible either by automobile or airplane into our modern uncongested San Jose Airport, presently serviced by 13 major carriers.

An added plus is the close proximity to several first-class convention hotels, which provide complimentary shuttle service that will ease the wear and tear on your delegates as well as on their pocketbooks.

For those interested in pre-or-post-convention trips, our location could not be better. We are within one hour's drive of San Francisco, Monterey, and Santa Cruz.

Presently San Jose has three major convention hotels, the garden setting of the Hyatt House, which offers 500 guest rooms, four complimentary suites, banquet facilities to accommodate 800 in their convention center or 1,100 for a general meeting, with additional meeting space and banquet rooms throughout the hotel for your special functions, plus ample free parking.

Perhaps some of your delegates have already tasted the LeBaron's fine hospitality in San Diego. Their San Jose property is lovely with 300 guest rooms, two complimentary suites, and equipped to handle approximately 200 people plus free parking.

The new Holiday Convention Center offers 150 guest rooms, banquet seating for 600, and comfortable meeting space for 800, along with two complimentary suites.

They are in the process of building a four-story parking plaza to adequately accommodate all guest parking.

There are over 3,000 guest rooms available within the City, and prices to please all pocketbooks.

Within the next few years our neighboring City of Santa Clara will have a new 300-room Mariott Hotel as well as a 400-room Hilton Inn.

San Jose is very committed about our new Convention Center, which will be completed in early 1977, offering 50,000 square feet of both meeting and exhibit space. We will be able to handle theater-style 4,500 for general assembly. We will have portable risers.

In general, the overall picture will be a large floor with the portable risers such as what you have here today.

We can handle banquet sitting for over 2,000 with a full kitchen to efficiently provide excellent service.

Exhibit space can accommodate from 50 to 150 exhibits, and additional rooms which would be utilized for hospitality, Red Cross, lost and found and special board meetings.

Directly across the open-air plaza is the Civic Auditorium, which would nicely accommodate your Grand Ball.

An added plus is our new theater for the Performing Arts for your Sunday church service.

Plans are presently on the drawing board for a large downtown parking plaza and will be completed well in advance of your 1985 Convention.

Our fine City offers the convention near a wide variety of dining and cuisine, ranging from Continental dining to the ever popular McDonald hamburger, something for everyone and for every pocket-book.

Santa Clara County offers a wide range of culture and history, entertainment and recreational facilities, beauty in strolling through the Japanese Friendship Gardens or the Rose Gardens, enchantment in the scenic tours to our famous wine country, where wine tours are conducted by such popular wineries as Paul Masson, Almaden, and Marissou.

Culture can be found while touring the Rosicrucian Museum, which blends mystery, beauty and a visit to old Egypt, or a visit to the Art Gallery.

A guided tour of the world famous Winchester Mystery House, Mission Santa Clara, and many other historical sites.

In addition, Santa Clara is very proud to announce their great American Theme Park, which will be opening in March of 1976. It will be the Disneyland of Northern California. This 65-acre park will focus on historic America with such attractions and homes as Hometown Squires, Yukon Territory, Yankee Harbor, New Orleans, etc., featuring many fine restaurants and boutiques, and a special semi-private evening for the Eastern Star Convention to enjoy the great America would be a definite must.

As your busy schedule permits, San Jose offers shopping and dining at the Pruneyard or the quaint setting of Old Town, and please do not overlook our warm weather and blue skies, which create the perfect atmosphere for golf, swimming, and tennis.

Our Convention Bureau provides outstanding services and all complimentary. They would include registration, signs and badges, typists, printing of your programs and mailing, scenic tours, city housing arrangements, program covers, all the personal assistance needed to ensure a total and successful convention from start to finish.

In conclusion, I appreciate your time to acquaint you with San Jose, along with our Mayor, Janet Gray Hayes, we sincerely look forward to your favorable decision and know you will be pleased with our San Jose hospitality. Thank you.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you for extending the fine invitations to the delegates.

The invitations will be studied by the Finance Committee and will be considered at our Afternoon Session.

We are most grateful to Sister Lilas Haug, Chairman and her Committee, for their work for our future Grand Chapter site for 1985.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, we would like at this time to consider Proposed Amendment No. 14, and before making the report of the Committee, the Board of Trustees would like to present information to the delegates.

May I present Viola Crew of the Board of Trustees of our Eastern Star Home.

Viola Crew, Member of Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star

At the present time the Board of Trustees is very restricted and inhibited by this present legislation in the hiring of an Administrator for our Home, in that he or she must be a member of our Order, while all other employees need not be.

As the delegates know, it was essential that we made an administrative change during the past year, and finding a qualified replacement was most difficult. Requests for applications and interview for Assistant and full Administrators were sent to all Chapters of which we received only four replies. Two of these did not meet State of California Administrative Code requirements and the third was hired on a 90-day probationary period, the end of which time employment was terminated as the responsibilities of the position were too great. The fourth is now in our employ as Acting Administrator.

The position of Executive Administrator is a highly skilled profession and to even qualify for this position within the control of this State a degree in administrative procedure is mandatory, they must be licensed by the State of California, whose rules and regulations regarding the operation of nursing and retirement homes has been increased most rigidly during the past few years. (Many of such homes have been closed for lack of such leadership, as all of you are aware, I'm certain.)

A 60-hour annual education program is required to keep their license current. Also, a knowledge of genetics and geriatrics is absolutely necessary—our ladies' welfare naturally being our prime responsibility. Further, it is essential to have worked a minimum of two years as Assistant Administrator under a qualified Administrator before even being permitted to take the State Board Examination for a Licensed California Administrator.

Needless to say, in view of all this, an efficient qualified Administrator is in demand and finding one to meet all requirements necessary is most difficult. Our Master Masons here today can

certainly understand this problem, as their Home at Union City was without an Administrator for over one year for these reasons, and just recently they were fortunate in obtaining a very fine gentleman for this position.

In hiring an Administrator for our Eastern Star Home, the Board of Trustees would certainly give number one precedent to a member of the Eastern Star or Masonic Order if qualified in meeting all the strict requirements. However, as the response to our original requests for applicants was so nominal, we feel the scope of available persons eligible to hire must be broadened with no discrimination, giving the Board the privilege when necessary (in the event it need be) to hire those qualified to assume the important responsibility of administering our Eastern Star Home.

Worthy Grand Matron, the Board of Trustees wishes the privilege of hiring an Administrator, when needed, on their capabilities and the proper California State qualifications, regardless of fraternal ties, and recommends a "yes" vote on Proposed Amendment No. 14.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, your Joint Committee on Constitution and By-Laws and Finance, to which Committees the Proposed Amendment No. 14 was referred, would recommend a substitute amendment to read: "If possible, the Superintendent and/or Administrator of the Home shall be an affiliated member of the Order of the Eastern Star or a Master Mason in good standing."

We feel, as I mentioned, this has the concurrence of the Board of Trustees, that with this wording in our Constitution they will give every consideration they can to a member of the Order of the Eastern Star or a Master Mason before they will go outside.

Adopted.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron. This concludes the legislation presented for this Session. We will have some action on the recommendation on the reports at a later time.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Florence Dunn, Past Grand Matron, Member of Finance Committee:

The recommendation of the Finance Committee, as read by the Chairman yesterday, was referred to the Finance Committee.

I, therefore present the following resolution:

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

"THAT, instead of a per capita tax of five (\$.05) cents per member, the tax be increased to ten (\$.10) cents per member per annum, beginning January 1, 1976, and continuing for the balance of the term of five (5) years through December 31, 1980, and

"THAT, per capita tax funds heretofore, or hereafter, thus raised, be used by Grand Chapter for the expenses of the California Triennial General Grand Chapter Assembly, or other necessary and proper expenses arising as a result of the Grand Chapter of California sponsoring a California Past Grand Matron as Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter."

The Committee on Finance moves for the adoption of this resolu-

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers.

I would like to point out to the delegates, Worthy Grand Matron, that we in California have already assumed this obligation by a resolution we adopted in 1970. At that time it was the thinking of those who presented that resolution that possibly five cents per member would be adequate.

But my Sisters and Brothers, as each and every one of you know, the rate of inflation has been so terrific these last few years that it is evident to us at this time that the original proposed per capita of five cents will not be adequate to meet California Grand Chapter responsibilities.

We therefore urge a "yes" vote, so that we might be in a position to take care of a commitment already made. Thank you.

Everina Rheingans Past Grand Matron, Member of Constitution and ByLaws Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron:

Your Committee on Jurisprudence and Constitution and By-Laws, to whom was referred the proposed resolution by Brother James Hoole, Past Grand Patron, indicating that the Ritual should be changed where the Worthy Matron asks the Associate Conductress, "Have all voted who are entitled to do so?" and the Associate Conductress answers, "Worthy Matron, all have voted", to indicate that the answer is often untruthful, since many of the members have not moved out of their seats. It is suggested that this Grand Jurisdiction go on record at this Grand Chapter Session to petition General Grand Chapter at its next meeting to change it to read: "Have all voted who wish (or desire) to do so?" and the Associate Conductress may answer, "Worthy Matron, all have voted"; she will then be truthful.

Your Committee on Jurisprudence finds, from a legal standpoint, that this resolution is untimely.

The combined Committees on Jurisprudence and Constitution and By-Laws make no recommendation.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

We are about to vote on the resolution as just read. I do not have a copy before me. Sister Grand Secretary, would you like to read it.

Gladys M. Johnson, Grand Secretary:

"WHEREAS, during election in our subordinate Chapters the Worthy Matron asks the Associate Conductress, 'Sister Associate Conductress, have all voted who are entitled to do so?' and the Associate Conductress answers, 'Worthy Matron, all have voted,' and

"WHEREAS, the answer given by the Associate Conductress is not only ambiguous but also untruthful, since many of the members have not moved out of their seats, and

"WHEREAS, it is believed this wording in the Ritual should be changed,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Grand Jurisdiction go on record at this Grand Chapter Session to petition General Grand Chapter at their next Triennium, beginning on September 26, 1976 in Cleveland, Ohio, to change the wording in the Ritual on Page 14 to read as follows: 'Worthy Matron: "Sister Associate Conductress, have all voted who wish or desire to do?" Then, when the Associate Conductress answers, "Worthy Matron, all have voted," she will be truthful.'"

James H. Hoole, Past Grand Patron:

Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters, Brothers and Delegates: I only want to say that I have discussed this with our levely and gracious Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Marguerite Kennerdell, and she has given me her wholehearted support for this resolution.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Is there any further discussion?

Lloyd Ellis Griffin, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I think the law is involved here, a question of law and a question of time and I made quite a study of this and I have to be at variance by not supporting it, because of the law, and I might say that I have had trouble one time, President Eisenhower was invited to San Diego to make a talk to 350 people. I was seated at the head table and listened. Halfway through his talk the Senator says, "I want you to respond to the President's talk." I said, "Oh no." Well, I said, "Mr. President, I don't know whether a Judge can offer the President of the United States anything, but I will offer you immunity while in the community."

The law on the subject matter to me is very plain in that you cannot propose a resolution by the Grand Chapter of California to General Grand Chapter, you can't propose a law. It takes someone who is a member of the General Grand Chapter, and it has not been proposed yet, and I don't know who is going to propose it. If he did it, I would be for it, but it is a question of timeliness and I don't think it can be proposed at the next session of General Grand Chapter.

I think the Most Worthy Grand Matron agrees with me there was a law passed when I was on the Jurisprudence Committee that there be no changes in the By-Laws for nine years, and that was passed, and did not become effective until the end of that session, that law, and according to my way of thinking of the law, therefore it would hold through this next session that you cannot present an amendment to the By-Laws at that General Grand Chapter Session, and there has been none presented, and as I read the law, Page 15, Article XV, "All amendments or additions to this Constitution shall be submitted in writing to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary not less than one year before the General Assembly."

That is the Constitution, now I will read what it says about the Ritual from the Constitution.

"The Constitution governs the Ritual."

The Constitution governs the Ritual. When they change the Ritual it is by constitutional amendment.

It is going to be four years before this is presented, this change. I think it is a little early to be recommending its passage now, because there is nothing before General Grand Chapter at all on the matter.

It is going to be three or four years before it can be done, according to the way I read the book.

I was on the Jurisprudence Committee for three years with the Most Worthy Grand Matron and I had a little problem there when we were going to institute the first Eastern Star Chapter in France.

I don't think it is timely to move on this thing at the present time because there is no law pending before General Grand Chapter to change it.

I am for the change, but I don't think it is timely. I recommend a "no" vote.

Thomas W. Thurman, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Jurisprudence Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron: As the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, may I say most kindly that the Honorable Judge Griffin has issued a minority report of the Jurisprudence Committee. In conference this morning we were told by the Most Worthy Grand Matron that you can present changes to the Ritual within not less than six months ahead of the Triennium, and she is the supreme authority of General Grand Chapter during the recess of the Assembly, therefore the Jurisprudence Committee must accept her decision until the Triennium. Have I made myself clear?

MEMBERS: Yes.

Adopted.

Thomas W. Thurman, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Jurisprudence Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, our most Distinguished Guest, Distinguished Members, Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers and Friends:

Now I must as a preface to this report recall to your memory that last year there was a proposition placed before this Grand Body to admitting members of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls who have no Masonic affiliation. It was passed without being referred to committees, and later in the session, at the behest of the Jurisprudence Committee, it was reseinded, and carried over to this year with the promise from the Jurisprudence Committee that clear and concise legislation would be placed before you, so that you know what you are voting on.

If you see Page 237 of the 1974 Proceedings, this is the report of the Jurisprudence Committee on Unfinished Business.

Your Committee on Jurisprudence reports on unfinished business as follows:

WHEREAS, recommendatory action was taken by this Grand Chapter in 1974 to qualify members of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls for membership in this Order without Masonic relationship; and,

WHEREAS, this action was rescinded by this Grand Chapter in 1974 in order that clear and precise legislation could be framed for approval by the delegates of this Grand Chapter for subsequent presentation to our General Grand Chapter;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Grand Chapter, State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, approves the presentation of the following legislation, if offered, to the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, at its Thirty-Fifth Triennial Assembly in 1976:

"That Article VI, Section 2 of the By-Laws of General Grand Chapter be amended to read as follows: (Qualifications for Degrees): Affiliated Master Masons in good standing, the wives, daughters, legally adopted daughters, mothers, widows, sisters, half-sisters, grand-daughters, step-mothers, step-daughters and step-sisters of affiliated Master Masons in good standing, or if deceased were in good standing at the time of their death; each of whom shall have attained to at least the age of eighteen (18) years are eligible to membership in the Order of the Eastern Star; provided further, that when five (5) unrelated members of the Order of the Eastern Star recommend for membership a past worthy member of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, who is not otherwise qualified for membership under any of the above enumerated relationships to Master Masons, then such person if over the age of 18 years of age recommended shall also be eligible for membership in the Order of the Eastern Star."

That it what we would be doing in presenting to General Grand Chapter. We are only approving the presentation of this to it.

Your Committee on Jurisprudence conferred with the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Marguerite L. Kennerdell, of General Grand Chapter, and your Committee is authorized to state to this Grand Chapter that our Most Worthy Grand Matron is opposed to any further broadening of the base from which our membership is obtained; in other words, she is opposed to any further extension of persons eligible for membership in this Order and, it is her opinion, that perhaps we have gone too far in this extension already.

Your Jurisprudence Committee completely and unequivocally concurs with the opinion hereinabove expressed by our Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Therefore, your Jurisprudence Committee merely places this resolution before this Session, as promised in last year's proceedings,

but, in view of the above-stated opinion of the Most Worthy Grand Matron and for Masonic reasons, your Committee on Jurisprudence refuses to move for the adoption of this resolution.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I just had a discussion with the Chairman of our Jurisprudence Committee and I could not concur with his thinking, and the opinion of the Most Worthy Grand Matron more fully, because I am definitely against this item, extension of our membership. However, I feel that any delegates in presenting anything for consideration have the right to have it brought to the floor to be settled by the delegates. Therefore I move this be brought before our delegates for consideration and certainly recommend a "no" vote.

Thomas W. Thurman, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Jurisprudence Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, we now have the original proponent of this in attendance and he is ready to speak to this point.

Edwin F. Collins, Past Grand Patron;

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, I proposed this legislation last year and after further consideration and with regard to the rules and regulations by General Grand Chapter and our Grand Chapter, I move that this motion not be adopted.

Not Adopted.



Everina Rheingans, Past Grand Matron:

This is on the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron:

The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, to whom was referred the recommendations of the Worthy Grand Matron that legislation be presented at the 1976 Session of Grand Chapter to rewrite Section No. 468 so that plural membership is not permitted within a district and also to change the date of the 1979 Session of California Grand Chapter, feels that since every member has the privilege of presenting constitution amendments, that anyone desiring such changes should present the legislation at the next session.

Therefore, no action is needed, nor can be taken, on these recommendations at this time because of the 70-day limitation as provided in Section 320 of the Constitution.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you, Sister Everina. Sister Lura Rae Dales.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

Worthy Grand Matron, report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee. This report concerns the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron which was referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, concerning Section 377 of the Constitution and By-Laws, which pertains to life sponsored membership.

The recommendation will be referred to the new Constitution and By-Laws Committee and will be studied for clarification.

I would like to state in concluding this report that the proponent of this legislation, which was enacted at the 1967 Session, has been contacted and he states that it was his intent that a life sponsored membership of our Eastern Star Home be an individual action.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, there is another continuing per capita of Grand Chapter which should be brought up, 30 cents for the Continuing Insurance Fund. **Motion:** I move that the amount of 30 cents for the Insurance Fund be continued.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

We do appreciate having the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron of 1973 open this Wednesday Afternoon Session. Sister Lilas and Brother Jens, my Grand Conductress year, serving under your fine leadership gave me the spiritual guidance that strengthened me for the future years. Each time I attended at the Altar, I did feel the special light shining on me from above.

A Grand Conductress year is a special year. Part of the duties are to attend at the Altar and reverently handle our Holy Bible. My loving thanks to both of you, for your most gracious welcome this afternoon, and may I always live your watchwords, "Let Us By Love Serve One Another."

W. Gordon Gilbert, Worthy Grand Patron:

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for allowing me to respond to our Past Grand Matron.

My Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lilas Haug, and my Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Jens A. Morley, of 1973. I spent one of the finest years of my Masonic life serving as their Grand Chaplain in 1973.

I wish to thank you, Sister Lilas, for your kind and gracious manner that you always have shown to me and to everyone else in our Grand Chapter, and to your fine husband, Brother Charlie. I certainly look forward to being able to attend, if not all at least some of the 1973 functions hereafter.

To you, Brother Jens, I know that you are a true and dedicated Mason. Everything that you do you do in consideration of whether it is right for Masonry or good for Masonry and if you do that for Masonry, you also do it for Eastern Star.

It has been a wonderful pleasure to me having served as your Grand Chaplain in 1973.

I thank you so much for acting as our Hostess and Host this afternoon on our Wednesday Afternoon Session of our Grand Chapter.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Under the order of business this afternoon we must give consideration to the \$2.00 Home Assessment for the coming year.

Frank Zanier, President, Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees:

Worthy Grand Matron, representing the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California, I move that a \$2.00 Assessment be imposed for the operation and maintenance of the Home for the ensuing year.

Discussion:

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

This amounts to doubling the assessment that we have at the present time, and I would like to go over a few figures that I thought that were given to me at this Session.

We have 129,000 members, and if you double the assessment and make it \$2.00, it would increase it by \$129,000, and for the figures that were presented on the budget for 1974, they run \$128,575, and for the 1975 budget, that is for their expenses, they ran in the hole \$41,000.

Now we're talking about an increase of not \$41,000 but an increase of \$129,000.

Taking our figures of what per capita tax or assessment the whole package of that would be for every member, every brother and sister in the Eastern Star pays into Grand Chapter, and last year the total was \$2.78. Out of that \$1.00 went to the Home, and you want to increase it another dollar, which I feel is excessive.

I understand that costs are going up and expenses are going up, but you have to consider that all of us are on budgets, too, and a lot of our members are on fixed incomes, and we have to raise the dues for every member in Grand Chapter, that means eventually you will have to pass it on to the member to raise the dues to every member, and when you do that you raise the dues, and you're going to lose a lot of members.

In our Chapter—and probably a lot of other Chapters—you have a lot of members who are paying dues who never come to hardly any meetings or no meetings. Anytime that you increase your dues tremendously you're going to have a lot of lost members.

Now you have approximately 109 members, as I understand, in the Home, and if you take the budget for last year and the total budget was \$612,354, total expense, you divide that by 109, you get approximately \$5,615 for each person in the Home, or \$486 a month for each member in the Home.

I understand it is a service to these people and these people need care, and we are committed to giving them that care. However, I feel also that we have to think of our own members in each Chapter, and each Chapter if you increase the dues to them, you're going to be losing a lot of them, so you really have not gained a lot, if you lose a lot of members.

So I would like to amend this motion to 30 cents increase instead of one dollar.

Frank Zanier, President, Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees:

May I answer the brother.

Have you the revised budget, the short sheet, or are you looking at the longer one, the white sheet, which was given you when you registered?

If you're using the revised budget, you will find that our deficit during the coming year, which does not begin until July 1st of 1975, you will note that from the budget we will already be in the red over \$81,000, and if things continue the way they are, and there is no assurance that they won't, we may well be over \$100,000 in deficit during the next fiscal year.

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

I appreciate that fact also, however, as I understand it, there is over \$4 million in the Endowment Fund and there should be some increase either in earnings from that or wherever that deficit money comes from someplace, and this is your budget as I understand it, and nothing is firm, whereas the one on the white sheet is actually your funds from June 30, 1974 to June 30, 1975.

Frank Zanier, President, Eastern Star Home Board:

We would have been more in the red had it not been for the generosity of our Worthy Grand Matron and our Junior Past Grand Matron, who contributed their funds from the Fiesta to our operating fund. We can't count on that kind of income.

Eleanor M. Marsh. Worthy Grand Matron:

My Brother, your amendment was not clear to the motion as you stated it. Will you please restate it?

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

I propose that we amend the motion for an increase of 30 cents instead of one dollar.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

We're not asking for an increase, we're asking for a \$2.00 assessment.

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

It says one dollar-

W. Gordon Gilbert, Worthy Grand Patron:

Brother Cliff, would you allow the speaker here to clarify it for you and then we will come back to you. We're not trying to slough you off. He will clarify it for you.

Richard W. Cronon, Eastern Star Home Trustee:

I will try to explain it to you in as simple a way as I can:

On our sheet this last year it showed a \$41,000 deficit, and that is because Sister Eleanor M. Marsh gave to the operating fund \$14,785 from the Fiesta, and Sister Zoe Harris gave us \$11,850, which we utilized. This does not show as a deficit, so that was income that was extra, and had we not had those funds, our deficit would have been \$67,665 for this past year.

Our budget for the coming year is estimated to be an \$81,000 deficit, even if we pass this motion today, it will not affect that \$81,000 deficit, because that won't come in until the first of July next year.

Now recognizing that, you have to also recognize that we have many unknown factors that occur. For example, and I mentioned this to a few people, on July 15, which was 15 days after we started this fiscal year, our hospital license, which was \$104 and some change last year, was \$1,180 this year, just to have a license.

We must also by law now have a registered nurse and an LVN on duty awake and on the floor 24 hours a day.

Our residents at the Home are attaining a larger majority of years, we have more sickness, we have not asked Grand Chapter for any additional funds since 1957. I don't think any of you are living today at the same cost you were living at in 1957.

The question is brought up about the Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund cannot by two factors, being one the Constitution and the other because our Home is now under the control of the Attorney General, all nursing homes are, and the Endowment Fund is capital funds, it cannot be used for operating funds.

But even if it were possible, the size of that Endowment Fund would not last us five years, because at what it is costing us to operate that Home we would go through that and every time we used some of those funds, we decrease our income even more for the next year, and that becomes an impossible situation, it just can't be done.

This is a very difficult problem and I think you have to understand that the operating funds are one thing, the Endowment Fund is something else, and we use only the income from the Endowment Fund, we cannot use the principal.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

We do not now have an assessment set for the ensuing year, therefore the motion before you is to oppose the \$2.00 assessment. I believe what you intend to suggest is that this motion be amended to impose a \$1.30 assessment, but you have not so stated your motion to amend the motion.

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

I will so state it to make it \$1.30 assessment for the Eastern Star Home.

I might add if you increase this \$1.00, what you're asking for, that is a 27.8 percent increase in the per capita tax for every member of the Eastern Star of the State of California.

Richard W. Cronon, Eastern Star Home Trustee:

That is nothing compared to the last 15 years, 30 cents will not meet our budget. There is no way it can, and you tell me, if you will, where we are going to get the money to operate this Home?

Now may I mention one thing, remember these are our sisters, and when this Home was started, we took it upon ourselves to take their total care, and I mean total care, into our hands.

Now, if you were to try to put one of these ladies into a nursing home or convalescent home, the probable minimum would run \$650 a month, and that excludes their hospitalization, that excludes their clothing, that excludes their hairdressing, their foot care, their eyeglasses, their hearing aids, their spending money, the dental work which we provide for the residents of our Home.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Brother Wiehe, is your motion to strike out the \$2.00 assessment and insert \$1.30?

Clifford Wiehe, Jr. (Worthy Patron, Riverside Chapter No. 622):

That is correct.

Margaret Garner (Past Matron No. 133):

This dollar assessment or two dollar assessment is very little to us here financially, but when we go back home again I can tell you that I rather dread going home and informing our members,

at least a third of whom are on fixed incomes, that their assessment has gone up 100 percent over last year.

As the Secretary last year it was difficult enough to get in all the dues. I think I will resign, think of resigning my office, because we are all well aware with the inflation and our members are all aware of the inflation, every day at the marketplace—I think they're going to take a dim view, some of them, not all of them, but our senior citizens, a dollar is pretty rough, and I can't see where we couldn't come up with some other means of raising the Home Endowment Fund donation.

A dollar to older people is a lot of money.

W. Gordon Gilbert, Worthy Grand Patron:

My Sisters and Brothers, I can't conceive or believe that anyone in our audience here today or anyone in our Masonic Order anyplace in this great State of California would turn their back on these residents of our Eastern Star Home for the price of one dollar a year.

I don't think one of our people would give up their membership or your brothers and sisters at home in our Order for one dollar. If you would, my Sisters and Brothers, you don't think very much of our Order.

Metta Smith (Past Matron, No. 389):

I am a Past Matron of Santa Ana Chapter and a Deputy Grand Matron of the 66th District.

If these people who are trying to talk against this two dollar assessment have ever gone to the Eastern Star Home—they have probably never gone to the Eastern Star Home to see what it looks like, what a beautiful place it is, and if it ever comes to that, that would be the place that I would like to go.

I do believe that anyone in this audience who votes this two dollar assessment down—I am with the Worthy Grand Patron, that they don't care about the Eastern Star.

After further discussion—Kay Hart, Associate Matron, No. 108:

Motion: for the previous question on all pending questions. Carried.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Debate is stopped. It has been moved and seconded that a two dollar assessment be imposed for the maintenance of the Home, which be amended by striking the sum of two dollars and inserting the sum of \$1.30. Do you understand? You are voting on the amendment. You are now voting to lower it from \$2.00 to \$1.30.

Lost.

The motion to amend is lost.

You are now about to vote on the original motion to impose a two-dollar assessment for the operation of the Home for the ensuing year.

Carried.

Frank Zanier, President, Eastern Star Home Board:

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and in particular on behalf of the residents of the Eastern Star Home, we thank you most sincerely.

Robert Lutz. Past Grand Patron:

I would like to add just one word to this which has passed.

For your information—and this is to the delegates—I have just been elected President of the Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees for the ensuing year, and I want to assure you that each member of the Board is serving and has served without compensation, and in many cases at some cost to ourselves, and when we come before you with any measure related to the Home, that we have given it our careful consideration, and we feel that there is no alternative, particularly when money is involved.

As our Past President, Brother Frank, said, we appreciate very much your confidence in this Board and hope that you will continue to extend it to us.

Any member, I might add, who disagrees with our policies is entitled at any time to run for election to the Board and by so doing, if he can be elected by the membership, is at liberty to change any of our policies.

We trust that we will be able to continue to serve you with complete satisfaction.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

I can assure the members that this has been a hardworking Board, both the Worthy Grand Patron and myself have attended these meetings with these dedicated members, and many special meetings have been called, and all have been present.

Minutes:

The Minutes of the Wednesday morning Session were approved.

Bills:

Properly audited bills were read and approved for payment.

Brother Logan Cotton, would you like to report at this time?

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Sisters and Brothers. This is in connection with the 1985 Grand Chapter Session. If you would like to look ten years ahead and see where we will all be. Where is it?

The report of the Special Convention Committee was referred to the Finance Committee for a recommendation for the 1985 Grand Chapter Session. The Finance Committee interviewed three representatives from three different cities, namely, the City of Fresno, the City of San Jose and the City of Sacramento.

After giving due consideration to the proposals, as submitted by the three representatives, we recommend that the proposal submitted by the City of Sacramento be accepted for the 1985 Grand Chapter Session and I so move.

MEMBERS: No.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

We interviewed them very thoroughly, and everything considered it is just really not practical from the standpoint of the financial considerations that we had to give to this, Sacramento will give us much, much more.

The facilities in Fresno are not near as good from the standpoint of a fraternal floor that we must have.

Likewise, with the City of San Jose.

We have gone into everything very thoroughly, we studied this one to another, and consider what we have that is unusual. We are different than most conventions and most conferences, Sisters and Brothers, because of our floor structure. Some of these places do not have a balcony such as ours. They have a theater and they would have risers going up along the side, artificial risers, and there are many things that we had to consider in this, and there is just no other way to do it and do it economically as we're doing it, and we have to look at that from the standpoint of expense, from the standpoint of the budget.

Furthermore, the City of Sacramento guarantees us for the year of 1985 no change in the figures that they have submitted to us, and the others did not.

It is just one of those things, you look to the Good of the Order and there is just one thing to do, and that is to recommend what we recommended.

If there is anyone in the audience who would like to meet with us in the morning, we will explain the various factors and I have them. There is no other conclusion that we could come to.

I may say this offhand, that we have brought up several things to the Committee on Sacramento, various areas of this convention that were not too tolerable, so they have appropriated about a million dollars to refurbish this and to change many things that need to be changed, many years before 1985, though I don't think too many of us have to worry about that particular year.

However, we do like to think they will give us good accommodations, and they have promised to do that.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

It has been recommended and moved that we accept the report of the invitation to Sacramento for the convention of 1985. Is there any discussion?

Motion:

Robert Atkinson, Past Grand Patron:

I would like to strike out Sacramento and insert San Jose. I so move, to strike out Sacramento and insert San Jose.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Is there a second to the motion?

The motion lost for lack of a second.

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

I am sure Brother Bob is sincere in making this amendment to the proposal that Brother Logan submitted, but Sisters and Brothers, we reviewed San Jose very carefully. San Jose is making many improvements and additions to their City, but they're not adequate for our convention at this time, and we sincerely went into this thoroughly.

Their facility is not adequate for what we need. They do not have a floor where you can have floor work and proper seating. They can only accommodate 3,000 people, leaving enough room for our floor work, and that is not adequate.

Sisters and Brothers, maybe later they will be able to accommodate us but not now. I understand the amendment was lost due to the lack of a second.

Grace Slaughter (Past Matron, San Diego Chapter):

I would like to ask one question of the gentleman that proposed that we couldn't afford to go to Fresno. I understand the gentleman to say that we had free rent, that they would give us all of the extra facilities that we needed free, that they would furnish all of our necessary printing pages or anything else that we use, and our advertising.

I did not hear Sacramento make any such thing in their proposal to us, therefore I'm asking where we are getting more from Sacramento than we are from Fresno?

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

We have a very itemized amount as to what they will give us, and if you want to listen to them, I have them in my briefcase. We have a very detailed amount as to what they're going to give us, item by item, for that particular convention in 1985, and a guaranteed figure for it.

So we asked them, the other two did not in writing submit to us an itemized list of what they were going to give us, nor did they promise that they would.

Sacramento gave us this guarantee under the signature of the Convention Bureau.

Kenneth Cook (Associate Patron, Silver Spray Chapter No. 59):

I would like to ask one question concerning the Fresno proposition: If it is stated that the floor space would not be suitable to setting up our Chapter, and I have been informed that the Rainbow have held their convention there, and they need at least as much space as we do, and if it was adequate for them, where is the lack for our use, then?

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

Brother, we went into that very thoroughly. One of the members of our Finance Committee attended the Rainbow, and we went into it very thoroughly with the gentleman from Fresno with regard to the difference of the two Chapter meetings, and the hotels are farther away.

MEMBERS: No.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron:

I mean that. They gave us a mileage on it, so we have the facts and figures on that.

I have been there for a couple of conventions under the new complex, too, but it is much different, and this is our recommendation based on our findings and our analysis of the three places.

Sisters and Brothers, it does not make any difference to me, but in our opinion this is what we should do.

Jens A. Morley, Past Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, I am a Past Patron of San Bernardino and Past Grand Patron, and also a Past, if you will, Chairman of the Convention Bureau.

I spent a lot of time looking over many of the facilities offered to the Eastern Star and believe me, Sisters and Brothers, there are many, many cities within our State that would like to have the Order of the Eastern Star as guests in their city, and we're proud of this because, of course, we are a very well-behaved Fraternal Order.

Now we have a committee, a Finance Committee that has been appointed to handle the finances of this Grand Chapter. I would take their word, having looked over all questions, listened to the various opinions of the various cities, I would take their opinion at this time as to which city would be the best.

But it is my hope, Sisters and Brothers, that we would change in the future, because I have found, if you will recall some of us that are old enough to remember having gone to Long Beach, that Long Beach began to take us for granted. There were many things that were wrong with Long Beach, Sisters and Brothers, we were very fortunate many years to have a brother on the Convention Bureau of Sacramento, and we had very fine treatment here in Sacramento.

Now recently this City itself is beginning to take us for granted, and it is a shame, because the facilities are very fine here and they could be better.

So I would hope that we would consider—I found Fresno, Sisters and Brothers, to be very adequate—we went into Fresno and they showed us where their new motels and hotels are, take a look when you are in Fresno, and in the future time we would hope we will go there. Maybe it will shake Sacramento up a bit and maybe we will get some improvement in Sacramento in the facilities.

The food has been great, we have had a fine week, I go along with what the Finance Committee has had to say.

W. Gordon Gilbert, Worthy Grand Patron:

Worthy Grand Matron, Sisters and Brothers, Delegates: I know, I have been making announcements here about cars parked in the wrong place, the parking is quite a ways from the auditorium, this type of thing.

I don't believe that we can go any place in our great State where everything would be perfect.

But there are many in this audience that have attended Rainbow Assembly or Job's in Fresno before. I have been there and attended.

I would have to concur with Sister Elsie K. Mitchell that the floor arrangement is not exactly what we would like, but better yet, I would like to call your attention to how many cars do you think that the Rainbow Girls take to a Grand Assembly and then how many do you bring?

Also, the hotels are really much farther away in many instances. You would be all over that City of Fresno, I mean all over.

I really believe like Brother Jens that in the future it will probably be rectified there, but presently I think we better stick with Sacramento, and Sacramento has tried through the years to give us the very best.

James B. Craven, Past Grand Patron:

I am Past Patron of Foothill Chapter and also a Past Grand Patron, I am an accountant, that is my business, and so is Logan, and we took into consideration a lot of things to compare.

Number one, Sacramento will print 5,000 programs or give \$3,500 to the printing of our program.

Fresno will print the cover, not to exceed \$500, for our program. Do you realize what that program costs that you have in your pocket? Right around \$4,000 for the program.

Fresno will give us \$500; Sacramento, \$3,500.

On the housing, you know your application for your housing, Sacramento will give us \$6,000; Fresno nothing, and the same thing holds true for San Jose.

Your badges, 5,000 badges, to the tune of about \$225. Sacramento gave that to us; Fresno no; San Jose no.

Then there are other items that add up to \$7,700 for this convention that we're talking about, and Sacramento is guaranteeing that for the year of 1985, and taking into consideration the inflationary part.

San Jose and Fresno will give us nothing in writing on what they will give us in the way of these items.

In no way, my Sisters and Brothers, do we put on a convention for a \$5.00 fee. We would have to raise that to \$10.00 to make up for our loss for what Sacramento gives us.

Bob Hastings (Past Patron, Elizabeth B. Wheeler Chapter No. 540):

My wife is to be installed tomorrow as a Deputy Grand Matron. I am sitting back in this section at this time. My good friend, Past Grand Patron Dick Brassell, said it failed for a second. At least we have a voice in the back of the room, but not necessarily on the stage. I want to put in the form of a motion regardless of the picayunish dollars that we may spend ten years from now, I will move that we hold our Grand Chapter in Fresno, California.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

I am sorry, my Brother, we have a motion on the floor.

Bob Hastings (Past Patron, Elizabeth B. Wheeler Chapter No. 540):

I will amend the motion and strike "Sacramento" and substitute "Fresno, California."

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

It has been moved and seconded that we amend the motion to hold the Grand Chapter Session in 1985 by striking the word "Sacramento" and inserting the word "Fresno."

Are you ready for the question on the amendment? All those in favor—may we have discussion.

Wilbur Roberts (Worthy Patron, Crystal Springs Chapter No. 583):

When we had our Rainbow Convention in Fresno, we were transported by bus between our motels and the Convention Center. That answers the question of your parking at the hotels near the Convention Center.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Is there any further discussion on the amendment?

Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Past Grand Patron:

I wanted to point out one thing to the delegates: This recommendation from the Finance Committee is based on what we look at as far as finances are concerned, my Sisters and Brothers, as well as the facilities involved.

Now you are the ones that vote where you want to go. We make the recommendation, we don't settle the issues.

But one thing I would like to point out to the delegates, as far as Fresno is concerned: The main floor of that auditorium is below ground level. There are steps going down. Now this, in our opinion, could pose some problems to some of our elderly members with long dresses.

This is a fact, and we took this into consideration, too. But the main reason for Sacramento, recommending Sacramento, my Sisters and Brothers, was because Sacramento gives Grand Chapter more than any other city in the State.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Is there any further discussion or are you ready to vote on the amendment to the motion, striking the word "Sacramento" and inserting the word "Fresno"?

Lost.

You will now be voting on the motion which is to accept the invitation from Sacramento for the Grand Chapter Session in 1985. Carried.

(Members dissatisfied with the ruling.)

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

My Sisters and Brothers, there was no doubt from the East here. Perhaps from where you were sitting, but I could see all over the auditorium and it was not even close.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron:

We have one item of business that has remained with the Constitution and By-Laws Committee. It is a recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron. The recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron concerning a committee to be appointed to study the manner of making official visits. This recommendation has been studied by the Committee and it is referred to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you, Sister Lura Rae.

REPORT OF HOUSING COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

My year as Housing Chairman began one week after the close of Grand Chapter 1974, as reservations, by mail as well as many phone calls were received. As all committeents from the motels did not become final until the first part of January, these early requests had to be held. My sincere appreciation to Mrs. Beverly Greeson of the Sacramento Convention Bureau for her cooperation and assistance in securing these commitments.

All members and Chapters were notified by our Grand Secretary the first part of February with reservation forms and brochures being sent, then the work really began. Many letters and phone calls were received at home and many phone calls received at my office. I also had the pleasant experience of meeting many of our members personally as they came to my home to make their reservations. When a request for reservation was given for a specific motel and the request could not be filled, a letter of explanation was sent with the confirmed reservation, hoping the member would understand the situation.

There was no attempt to keep statistics of the many phone calls, letters written or personal calls made to both members and motels, as well as the many meetings attended, but each day of the week was a very busy one. We had approximately 1,847 rooms committed and of these, about 538 rooms were released back to the motels ten days prior to Grand Chapter, and a total of 2,677 members were housed in 1,309 rooms. Room deposits totaling \$29,098.00 were received and deposited with the motels. We have no idea how many rooms were available at motels not committed. There are, unfortunately a great many of our members who do not use the Housing Committee to secure their reservations. We hope that an emergency does not arise, where we would be unable to assist. How much easier it would be, if members, who do make their own reservations, would notify the Housing Committee where they have reservations, for we have had many requests this week for members whose whereabouts at Grand Chapter are unknown.

I would be remiss if I did not extend a few personal acknowledgments. A very special thank you to our Past Grand Matron Sister Ellen Walters. To know you is to love you and to work with you an

honor and pleasure. You have been a real guiding light. To Sister Marion Tarbell, Housing Chairman for many years, my deep gratitude for your assistance at the very start.

To the many wonderful Sisters and Brothers whose words of encouragement and expression of appreciation for assuming this responsibility, and the members who so thoughtfully enclosed self-addressed stamped envelopes, a word of thanks seems so little, but so greatly appreciated.

To try and please all of our members, is an impossible task, but if a majority of them have been satisfied, this is all that can be asked. I do thank you for your patience and understanding.

Worthy Grand Matron, it has been a joy and inspiration to work with you during the year, and your motto "Let There Be Light" has shone through in all of our members that I worked with. It has been a year of demanding work, but nevertheless I have found it to be a most pleasant and rewarding responsibility.

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron for giving me this opportunity to serve our beautiful Order. I submit this report with the hope that all efforts have pleased you and our members.

At this time, I would like to present one of my two assistants, Leah Schmidt, Past Matron of Rainbow Chapter No. 385. My other assistant, Willma Perkins, Past Matron of Rainbow Chapter No. 385 is unable to be with us this morning. I thank both of these wonderful friends for their assistance when needed.

This is, I believe, a first that a Grand Master has attended all of our sessions, and if you can go back to your Chapters and tell them we had that very same cooperation and inspiration of our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Burton Myers, Junior Past Grand Master of Masons in California and Hawaii last year, who was not a member of our Order but who, I believe, is very soon going to petition. He was so very impressed by our meeting last year.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

The hour of ten having arrived, Brother Logan Cotton, we will consider the 1975-76 Grand Chapter Budget.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished Members and Delegates. The time has come when we have to move on the Budget of the Grand Chapter as well as the Eastern Star Home.

As I said, I believe you got this proposed Budget when you registered, and probably you have it with you, but after a few days I'm not sure.

It was itemized very carefully as far the Grand Chapter Budget was concerned, the total budget, anticipated income \$94,850, and \$94,635 in anticipated expenditures.

The total income exceeds the expenditures, as far as the anticipated budget is concerned.

Therefore, I move, Worthy Grand Matron, that the proposed Budget of Grand Chapter be accepted.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

It has been moved and seconded that the Grand Chapter Budget be accepted. Is there any discussion?

All in favor signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter. All opposed by the same sign. I'm sorry, Microphone No. 6.

William Nelson (Worthy Patron, No. 255):

We can't compare them exactly, because the itemization does not correspond, but I noticed that the Finance Committee has \$68,000 as possible income for 1976, and I'm wondering if this could be

high, because if you will notice in both '73 and '74 it has been dropping, as our membership has dropped, and I am a little concerned having a high income and we won't realize it.

There might be an explanation as to what the Finance Committee had in mind.

Also, in Eastern Star Home Services—This has been materially increased, the interest income has been increased, and in previous years it was tending to go down, and these are items I would like to have explained, if the good brother could do it for me.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

Thank you. As we deliberated on the income on the dues and fees, we anticipated this would be the proper amount that would come in in the year 1975-76 compared to last year and the year before.

It was increased slightly but we're going to hope to have it come in. If it drops, it will just have to drop, but we are over the budget, so it does not make too much material difference.

We have stayed within the Grand Chapter Budget for the last several years and we will do it this year. If the income does not come in, we will cut some expenses someplace.

I will discuss the Home when we get to the budget, sir.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Is there any further discussion? We have to act on the budget separately.

I now declare the proposed Budget of Grand Chapter accepted.

My personal thanks to Brother Logan and this fine Committee for the many hours of service that they give to Grand Chapter. Theirs is not an easy task for they do have many responsibilities, carefully handling our business.

Brother Logan, would you please present the The Eastern Star Home Budget at this time?

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

In my report delivered on Tuesday, normally the Home Budget on this little sheet, which you got when you registered, but as I said at that time, this was incorrect because of many things that came up subsequent to the meeting in May, when we adopted this one.

So the Finance Committee and the Home Board deliberated many hours on the new proposed Budget, and I'm sure most of

you have this little slip that was handed out at the door, or most of you should have had it by this time, and you looked it over.

Based on that Budget, as you will notice, there is an \$81,000 deficit. You voted yesterday for the one dollar additional assessment, which will not come in until the last of 1976. So in order to cover what you're going to have to do, I'm going to make the motion this way.

I likewise move that the proposed Budget of the Eastern Star Home be accepted and that sufficient funds be allowed, if needed, to meet the necessary expenses as itemized in the proposed Budget.

In other words, if we need additional funds to cover the budget by May or in April, we can then either sell the securities to cover the deficit or transfer from one fund, or borrow from one fund to save the interest on our investments, and we will then have it balanced, but as of this moment we have not balanced the budget, except by a promise that we will balance it when the need arises.

I move that this Budget be adopted with this qualification.

Carried.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

Now, the gentleman had a question he would like to have answered. Will you state that question again, sir?

William Nelson (Worthy Patron, No. 255):

Worthy Grand Matron, the question at this point is superfluous. The question was asked as a point of information prior to the balloting. It appeared the decision was made that the budget had already been approved, so what we're talking about is something that has already been done.

What I was concerned about was the high income the budget indicated, the budget for 1974 and 1975 the income for this Order was materially lessened from '74 to '75, it dropped from 130,000 to 91,000, yet the Finance Committee expects that our income will go up to 94,000 this coming year, and I was wondering how they expect to do that, unless they can reverse the membership trend, and where they're getting the extra money. This did not add up to me.

Logan R. Cotton, Past Grand Patron, Chairman, Finance Committee:

An explanation came about because of the increased rate of the dividends and income on the bonds and securities we have.

During the last several months we have had a decrease on interest rates on good, sound securities, and the increased rate is up. Mr. Flynn, who represents Capital Alliance Management Corporation, to whom we pay a fee for advising us, gave us the figures he thought we would receive, and according to financial magazines dividends are increasing substantially in most corporations, and that will increase the income for the Endowment Fund.

Eleanor M. Marsh, Worthy Grand Matron:

Thank you, Brother Logan, for presenting the Eastern Star Home Board Budget. The Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home have worked closely this past year; because of the inflationary rise in prices the members of the Home Board requested that you present the Eastern Star Home Board Budget after you presented the Grand Chapter Budget. Thank you on behalf of this Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF GENERAL CHAIRMAN GRAND CHAPTER WEEK

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Thank you, Sister Eleanor for asking me to serve as General Chairman of this Session and for appointing all those who have served with me.

There can be only one general chairman, but his job is simplified when all the committees consist of and are headed by capable, pleasant, willing, hardworking Sisters and Brothers. Along with all the devoted service they have given, we've had a lot of fun and we still are!

This goes double and triple for the Activities Committee, each one a very special person. Rob Lawson and his wonderful wife, Lynn, deserve medals for the countless extra duties they have undertaken. The friendship we now share, is to Joyce and me, one of the delightful benefits of having served in this position.

Lee Conover, also on this committee accepted the responsibility of handling a Concessions and Vendors Committee, a first in Sacramento, for until now the Convention Bureau took charge.

Ed Mills, the third member of the Activities Committee, and a member of my own Rising Star Chapter, served as Treasurer. He had a busy year for he also had to find time to chauffeur his wife Barbara around the state, as she performed her duties as Deputy Grand Matron. His accurate records and his tight grip on the purse strings is assurance to me that this Grand Chapter Week is being

conducted within our budget. Speaking of budgets, Thanks to the Finance Committee for accepting the one we presented to them in January, on our first try!

At the time this report is being completed, these facts about Grand Chapter financing are evident. The gross income for Grand Chapter Week was \$26,908.90, which included \$3,618.90 received from vendors. This income is the first of such income received by Grand Chapter in the North and was made possible by a recent revision in the City of Sacramento Ordinance. This gross figure does not include \$277.44 received from the operation on a Cancer Dressing Display and Gift Wrapping Booth, as this sum goes directly into a special fund and is not used as Grand Chapter income or for Grand Chapter expenses.

All of the Grand Chapter Week Committees stayed well within their budget, and the present sum of expenses which have been submitted for the approval of the Grand Chapter Week General Chairman is \$12,764.82.

Each and every committee performed to perfection as far as I am concerned, but there are a few, which by the very nature of their work are more trying and I feel they deserve special commendation: Denzyle Custer, who arranged and scheduled almost all your breakfasts, lunches, teas and dinners—she did almost everything but the cooking!

Courtesies to Dignitaries, headed by Ferne Hammond. These members have worked all year long so all dignitaries would have flowers to wear and room courtesies to enjoy.

The beautiful decorations you are enjoying are the result of the work of Toni and Jerry Stauber. Each month as we neared our committee meeting room, my Joyce would say to me, "Now remember, Jack—Toni is the girl!"

Divine Services were planned by Marilyn Hoobler, who traveled the length of the state to be sure and find a minister to properly inspire us.

You know red-heads are my weakness and Betty Stone has endeared herself to me, and should have to you, too. Her handling of housing has been superb. You know as late as yesterday, she was still finding housing for our members.

Reta Morrison served as my committee secretary all year: Her faithful minutes have recorded for all to see, our committees' good deeds.

Transportation was handled by Charles Badgley, who did a beautiful job. His "Award Winning Drivers" met air line schedules, Grand Chapter schedules, to and from the auditorium, and to the various motels and hotels.

This whole thing is tied together by two wonderful people, the only experienced ones on our entire committee, Bud and Louise Radebaugh who, like master conductors, took all the sounds, lights and individual musicians, transforming them into the symphony of organization which you have enjoyed this week.

Our Grand Secretary and her Assistant, Diane, have been wonderful, cooperative, quick to solve any problems I have presented to them, and have seen that I received every bit of information I desired, and for this I heartly thank them!
