

EULOGY FOR SISTER MARY E. BALDEN, PAST GRAND MATRON, 1960

Our Past Grand Matron, Mary E. Balden, left this earthly life on July 14, 1986 following an extended illness, called by her creator to dwell in His house — her Eternal Home.

Sister Mary, a native Californian, was initiated into Fillmore Chapter No. 361 on May 17, 1928. She served her Chapter in various appointive offices and then in the Line Offices to become Worthy Matron in 1938, and again in 1946 to assist the Chapter. She served our Grand Chapter as a Deputy Grand Matron in 1942, Grand Adah in 1954. and was appointed Grand Marshal in 1956. She won election to the office of Associate Grand Conductress in 1957, and progressed through the Grand Line to become our 87th Worthy Grand Matron, serving for the year 1959-1960. Her service to Grand Chapter did not end with her year in the East as she served on the Committees of Constitution and Bylaws, Jurisprudence, Charters and Dispensations, Distribution. Consolidation and the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund. General Grand Chapter honored our Sister with an appointment to the Committee on Chapters Under the Jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter for the 1971-1973 Triennium. She unselfishly gave of her time to attend meetings of her 1960 Associations, and was extremely loyal in her attendance at the Chapter meetings in her District until her health made this no longer possible. She was a 58-year member of the Order.

Sister Mary Balden was a sincere, dedicated member, who strived to live by our principles of charity, truth and loving kindness. She looked upon those subordinate chapter officers with whom she was serving as lambs the Lord had placed in her care for a brief time, knowing she would tend them well; "their love a thing more precious far than gold, her lambs awhile to love, to guide, to fold."

Her husband, Harold, was devoted to Mary, and encouraged and supported all of her endeavors throughout her service to the chapter and to Grand Chapter. He traveled with her to be of assistance in every way possible, attending each of her l02 Official Visits and all of the official receptions held during her year of 1960. At the time of her passing they had been married for over 62 years. She also had two lovely daughters, both of whom were members of Fillmore Chapter. To Brother Harold and their daughters, Barbara and Patricia, we extend our deepest sympathy in the loss of their loved one and our loved one, too.

Among Sister Mary's talents was the ability to compose meaningful poetry, and she would often use this means of expression to extend her beautiful thoughts to or about someone. With few changes, I quote these lines she penned:

"To you whose work has ceased to be And now have reached the Home you sought— We heed your whisper, soft and sweet, Dear ones I loved — Forget-me-not."

Our Past Grand Patron, Brother Edward Thomas Mancuso, was initiated into Albert Pike Chapter, No. 284, on October 7, 1943 and served as Worthy Patron in 1944

EULOGY FOR BROTHER HERSHEL C. BROWN, PAST GRAND PATRON, 1980

He charted a course of high ideals and love and now sails in calm seas in the heavens above.

On January 23, 1986, our Order suffered the loss of our Past Grand Patron, Brother Hershel Brown. His sincere and dedicated service to the Masonic Order, the Order of the Eastern Star and the International Order of Rainbow for Girls is well known. His happiest moments were realized by the service he gave to these Fraternal Organizations.

Brother Hershel was born on February 10, 1918 in Jenks, Oklahoma. His education included Business College in Nebraska, Engineering Colleges in California and various Navy courses and Army Logistic Management. He was versatile in the fields of work he undertook and proficient in many positions.

Brother Hershel served his country in the Navy and Naval Reserve on Active Duty. He joined the Navy as a Seaman in 1938, saw service in each conflict our country encountered and was placed on the retired list in 1973 with the rank of Commander.

Brother Hershel was a Retired United States Civil Service Officer, having held the position of Marine Facilities Management Officer and Civilian Officer-in-Charge of the Army Marine Facility at Rio Vista, California.

Brother Hershel was very proud of his lovely family. Devoted to his wife, Judy, for thirty nine years, proud of the accomplishments of his lovely daughters, Lucille and Peggy and the joy of his life were his grandchildren, Paul and Janine.

Brother Hershel's fraternal life began when he joined Rio Vista Lodge No. 208, F. & A. M. in June 1960. He served as Worshipful Master in 1965 and 1966 and for a number of years as Inspector of the 220th Masonic District. He joined Rio Vista Chapter No. 222, Order of the Eastern Star, October 16, 1962 and served as their Worthy Patron in 1967, 1974, 1978 and 1984. His service with the International Order of Rainbow for Girls included; several terms as Rainbow Dad, Master of the Grand Cross of Color, General Chairman of the Grand Assembly in 1972 and 1976 and a Member of the Grand Executive Committee. Brother Hershel was elected Worthy Grand Patron for the year of 1980.

He endeared himself to the members of the Order throughout the State as he served with humility and sincerity. It was a privilege to serve with Brother Hershel during 1979 and 1980 for he was a fine leader, a gentleman at all times and held in high esteem by all.

The 1980 Grand Officers, Deputy Grand Matrons, Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, together with their husbands and wives will miss our dear friend greatly. His ways were pleasant and he traveled only paths of peace.

On March 6, 1986 Brother Walker Peddicord, Past Grand Patron, was lovingly released from the labors of this early vale; gently, to a place of rest and refreshment where sadness enters not; softly, to a place of wondrous beauty prepared for him at the foundation of the world; tenderly, to a peaceful, fragrant garden where surely countless family and friends, gone before, have gathered to greet him with everlasting love. He dwells now in the promised care of our eternal Father where heavenly joy abounds and only tears of delight and happiness are shed.

The Golden Chain of our fraternal circle is diminished by the loss of our dear and distinguished brother, yet the memory of his kindly way remains. A chair is unoccupied now in his Chapter room, yet the memory of his unremitting loyalty remains. He is seen no more in our Grand Chapter room, but the memory of a man so seemingly fragile, yet so abundantly possessed of inner strength, remains. His voice is heard no more in this place, yet the memory of his words, never careless of propriety, never thoughtless of others, still remains. No. 409 in 1936 and served that Chapter as Associate Patron in 1938 and Worthy Patron in 1939. The Grand Chapter of California was

pleased to elect him to serve, in 1941, as Associate Grand Patron and as Worthy Grand Patron for 1942.

Over many years, and many terms, often as Chairman, he served our Grand Chapter Committees on Jurisprudence, Constitution and Bylaws, Appeals and Grievances, Grand Chapter Week Activities, Scholarship and Election, and on Special Committees on Insurance, The Eastern Star Temple in Sacramento, and the Revision of Constitution and Laws. His was a tireless and constant dedication to the good of our Order.

Sincere sympathy is extended to a grieving family and to the many members who knew and respected our brother as a paragon, by every test, of manly virtue. Brother Walker, by his peerless example of correct fraternal behavior and unfailing personal decorum, has left a legacy beyond all price. "Study the Constitution" he advised, "and follow it; learn the Ritual and live it." He closed his report to the Grand Chapter, in 1942, with these words: "Let us adhere to our Order firmly and do its work faithfully, do its works gladly and joyfully, with thoughts not of ourselves but of others. Above all, he said, "let us do its work today."

With this sentimental promise, given to us by Sister Corine Orban Melville, his beloved Worthy Grand Matron of 1942, we bid our dear brother a fond and affectionate Farewell.

At the request of our Chairman, Brother George Cronin, May I give you an insight into ESTARL Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership.

However, did you know it had it's beginning in October of 1952? Did you know that it has made for itself a universal name, and has acquired an identity of its own?

The ESTARL program was established for the purpose of assisting young Christian men and women to enter various fields of religious service such as ministers, missionaries, directors of youth leadership, church music and religious education.

Many thousands of young persons studying to become Christian leaders have been helped through ESTARL....and, many of them realize that without ESTARL they might not have had the opportunity of this vital religious training. They all know that ESTARL is associated with an organization known as 'The Order of the Eastern Star'. It was not until our Order reached the three million mark in membership that we adopted a project of our own....one that is now universally identified with the name, "ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR". That project, ESTARL! Would that we could predict, or even imagine the far-reaching effects that the program of ESTARL may have upon the destinies of all nations and the world today.

Summing up the purposes of ESTARL, let us be encouraged in the thought that only 12 faithful disciples were responsible for the spread of the gospel of christianity in our world....and, so it will be with the young men and women in the field of ministry today - many who have been, are - and will be our ESTARL Recipients.

ESTARL donations are sent from our subordinate chapters or from individual donors to our Grand Chapter Office where they are properly recorded. These donations are then forwarded to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary of General Grand Chapter for crediting to our Jurisdiction and then returned again to California to be distributed to our recipients.

In presenting our participant in today's Divine Service, one of the fine recipients of our ESTARL Awards, may I introduce him to you. He is a native of our Golden State of California and resides in San Diego County. He is married and the father of four children. His 'calling' is to the ministry, specifically as a Navy Chaplain. His Navy and military involvement began in June of 1969 and his lifetime goal is to become a Navy Chaplain. His object in his calling is to project the tempering of peace with strength. I'm sure he will not object to our sharing that he is 37 years old and that he has been actively involved with the Navy Reserves as a non-pay Chaplain.

His is a Masonic family....his wife was a member of Job's Daughters until their marriage - and her father is a member of Silver Gate Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons in San Diego.

The recommendations presented on his behalf have strongly illustrated his ability and qualifications for our Award.

He is under the care of the Presbytery of Southern California as a candidate for the ministry.

ADDRESS

(By Jack R. Levitt, Deputy Grand Master)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Guests, Sisters, Brothers, Friends All:

I bring you the warm and sincere fraternal greetings and the best wishes of the Master Masons of California and Hawaii, and also the regrets of our Most Worshipful Grand Master, John W. Driskell who could not be here this evening. Were he to have been here, I know he would have addressed you on the subject of the State of the Fraternity as it exists in California today.

I will not introduce that subject, because I know he will present it in his Grand Master Address in a few short weeks. Instead, I would like to address you on two subjects that extend to the future: Change and Optimism.

I think we can all agree here that change is inevitable. The Grand Lodge of California certainly believes in appropriate change. We have undergone and continue to undergo changes. A few years ago, we had an insert in the newspaper that talked about Masonry, and the concordant and dependent bodies, and our youth bodies, and how they have changed from the past.

This January, during the Rose Parade, you will see a float by the Grand Lodge of California, which will announce to the world our support of good government and the Constitution of this great nation.

Other changes will be forthcoming in the several years ahead. All of these changes are designed to make us more visible in the community and more helpful in the community.

I only mention one note of caution, and that is that whatever changes our organizations make, they must always be with the eye that we do not intrude upon the reputation of our organizations, because Freemasonry and the dependent and concordant bodies do not provide a conversion, but rather we take good people and make them better people, and therefore our reputation is good, and we must maintain that reputation.

I speak of optimism, because, for too long, we have been dwelling on pessimism. Nearly every Masonic publication that you pick up talks about the drop in membership, the dearth of officers, the lack of participation.

I subscribe to the principle that we should deal with solutions, not the problems. We must begin to be optimistic. We are what we can see, and there is such a thing as a self-defeating prophecy. The psychologists tell us that, if you continually tell a child that the child is clumsy or dumb, that child will begin to take on those attributes; and if we continue to talk about the pessimistic side, that will eventually come to fruition.

But the opposite is true, if we have the optimism that I think we are entitled to have, then we will have the enthusiasm to go forward, and we have a great deal to be optimistic about.

Freemasonry gives us something that no order, no other order gives us. Freemasonry gives us self-confidence and self-image. It teaches us that we are indeed free and independent, free to exert our tasks, to speak our thoughts.

It gives us more inner strength, the inner strength of courage, and of faith, and of serenity, and of love. And it allows us to understand that we are good, that we can indeed add and enhance humanity.

But Freemasonry gives us something that is far more important than that. It strengthens our belief that we have in God and of the immortality of the soul. It indeed tells us that the good should overcome the evil, the spiritual the material, the psychic essential that we indeed have a spark of divinity within us, that we are in the image and likeness of God, and therefore we have that strength. And I believe that we should cherish our great Fraternity, and we should thank God

that we have it and that we have that opportunity and that we understand the strength of our Fraternity,

I simply conclude by reminding everyone that there are ways and the way, and the high soul climbs the high way, and the low soul take the cloudy and murky paths between the resting to and fro, but to everyone open at the way, everyone decides where their soul shall go.

I thank God for each of you who has decided to take the high way. Thank you.

Dennis Jordan, Worthy Grand Patron: Thank you for those words of inspiration. Also special calendars listing the Itinerary for 1986 were sold and we realized \$1,090.77 from those sales for the Scholarship Fund. I am grateful to our Worthy Grand Patron who planned our Music Book of the year. They were sold and a profit of \$2,178. was donated to the Scholarship Fund.

GRAND OFFICER INSTRUCTIONALS: In our earlier travels as Grand Officers, Sister Kathy Hill and I noticed that it was easier for the Subordinate Officers to see the work demonstrated instead of verbally trying to explain it in separate sections with individual officers. We felt that if they could see the Grand Officers working as a complete unit, they would see how one officer's work affects another. Sister Kathy and I agreed try this new program for two years. Then we felt future Elective Grand Officers could evaluate it. I felt both years were very successful. They were well attended. Many times there was standing room only. We received many letters of appreciation for the officers. This year the Grand Officers exemplified the work at 18 Instructionals throughout the State. It was a tiring schedule but the benefits were worth the effort.

Special appreciation is extended to Sister Nancy Jordan, wife of our Worthy Grand Patron, for acting as the Presiding Worthy Matron for the Instructionals. She was not only proficient in her work, but added a bit of wit during our long sessions.

DECISIONS: Section 177 of our Constitution and Laws requires that a Chapter maintain control of its funds and property at all times. A special "earmarked" fund, whether it be for memorial donations or otherwise, would be improper under this section of our Constitution and Laws, inasmuch as that would be a restriction on the use of moneys received by the Chapter.

COMMUNICATIONS: During the year the Worthy Grand Matron receives and sends many communications. Many of them are similar in context. One of the most talked about subjects during the latter part of my year was from those who had read the Dear Abbey column concerning non-members wearing an Eastern Star ring. Of course we have no rule, as the Worthy Matron stated, that actually states who can or who cannot wear an Eastern Star ring. Basically, it is out of our control since any person can purchase one. However, I feel that it should be pointed out to anyone asking this question, that it is a form of misrepresentation. Very few people would want to represent themselves as a member of an organization to which they don't belong.

RECOMMENDATIONS: The following recommendations are presented for thought and possible consideration by some of our Grand Chapter Committees. I refer them to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron for possible review by the proper committees.

COMBINING OF FUNDS: In many ways I feel that we are not working together in a concentrated effort to give support to our Grand Chapter funds and to ultimately assist our members when needed. I realize there are those members who have a stronger allegiance to certain projects; therefore, some of our funds increase in size while others receive fewer donations. Also, many times there are greater

monetary demands on some funds than others. If some of these funds were combined into one, we could allocate the money where most needed. I realize under our present structure some of them could not be combined because some are tax deductible while some are not. However, I feel we must look into the future and consider the feasibility of combining our funds and making a more concentrated effort to meet the needs of our members.

THE BALLOT: The concern involving misuse of the ballot box grows more each year. It continues to reappear in the Worthy Grand Matron's report as well as the report of the Appeals and Grievances Committee. In our present system of allowing only one black cube to determine the final result of the ballot, we are allowing one person, with a possible personal grievance, to determine the future growth of our Chapters. For years, we have heard that there is a shortage of men in our Order; yet, we stand by and do nothing while our Masonic Brothers continue to be black-balled in our Chapters. Many are Officers in their respective Lodges. Is it any wonder why there is not closer harmony between the Masonic Fraternity and the Order of the Eastern Star when we stand by and do nothing to correct this situation.

PROBATION OF INDIVIDUAL MEMBER: Last year at Grand Chapter, legislation was passed that would allow the Worthy Grand Matron to place a Chapter on probation prior to using the drastic measure of suspending it's Charter. In observing the Chapters that have either had their Charters suspended or were under consideration. in most cases it was found the misconduct of one or two members created the disharmony in the Chapter. Would it not be more feasible and fair to consider placing that member or members on probation instead of the complete Chapter? I realize the Worthy Grand Matron should not be empowered to make this decision alone. She should act only when in complete agreement will all of the members of the Appeals and Grievances Committee. In many cases this action also would prevent the necessity for a trial by some Chapters. Also, I believe that it is expedite from time to time for each member to read the rules in our Constitution and Bylaws constituting conduct unbecoming a member. Doing so, many would find themselves in jeopardy. Each member must be held accountable for his or her actions if peace and harmony is to prevail in our Chapters.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE: When Sister Hildegard Smith, Chairman of the Scholarship Committee, gives her report later this evening, pay particular attention to the recommendations that she will be making. She is recommending future legislation which she deems necessary for the processing of the many forms that are received by this committee. Their workload is tremendous.

They have my highest regard for the work that they do. I hope that these will be considered by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron.

APPRECIATION: I want to express my gratitude to the members of Normal Heights Chapter No. 478 for the loving support that you have given to me these past five years. You have remained active, supportive members of our Chapter while accepting the added responsibilities that has been yours. I thank you for the Receptions that you have planned for my pleasure. But, most of all, I thank you for being kind and loving people. I have a feeling of pride each time that I am presented as a member of Normal Heights Chapter. I look forward to returning home to you.

PAST MOST WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sister Thelma Bailey, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, continues to be an inspiration to the members in California. She actively supports our many events and always shares with us some of the knowledge that she has gained over the years that she has given service to our Order. Our special thanks to her for the support that she continues to give.

GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER COMMITTEE MEMBERS: California Grand Chapter was pleased to receive three General Grand Chapter appointments. They were Sister Eleanor M. Marsh, Cancer Project Committee, Brother Richard T. Brassell, Jr., Credentials Committee and Sister Zoe Harris, Chairman of the Education Committee. These fine Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patron are deserving of the honor that they received. We have appreciated their attendance this year at our 1986 events.

PAST GRAND MATRONS AND PAST GRAND PATRONS: To the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons who continue to serve our Order, I say a special thank you. You offer your guidance to the members, as well as the Grand Line Officers who are following in your footsteps. In your own way you have left a valuable mark on our Order.

ELECTIVE GRAND OFFICERS: I have appreciated and enjoyed the good communication that exists between the Elective Grand Officers. I think that we all agree we must continue to upgrade our procedures due to the heavy workload. I have enjoyed sharing and exchanging ideas with them. I feel with the continuous of this unity, much progress can be made in our Order in the future.

APPOINTIVE GRAND OFFICERS: Truly I realize how a lady feels when she decides to adopt a child. She sincerely wants that child because she has so much love that she wants to share. When she looks over the available children, it's difficult to chose which one would fit into her family. In looking them over it is not important to her if they have blue eyes or blonde hair. For she is not looking at the outer physical person, but the inner spiritual person. I was more fortunate than most mothers for I got to chose not only one but ten. I have appreciated your kind cooperation, your capable manner, and, more than all else, your good humor. "Laughter" was an important watchword for us, and we did our share of laughing this year. We shared our many concerns for the Order and both agreed that we must not hesitate to speak out on these concerns. OBSERVATIONS: After completing my year of service as Worthy Grand Matron, I find it difficult to put into words my many thoughts and observations concerning our Order.

There is always room for improvement in any organization. I feel we must look for ways to carry out these improvements.

My ideas may differ from yours, but I think we must combine those ideas and set our goals high. We must remember that this is a social and charitable organization. I firmly believe in high ritualistic stan-

Therefore, in delivering my report, I feel it expedient, right, and responsible that I share with those who hold in their hand the very future of this fraternal experience those things that weigh heavily upon my mind and heart.

LOSS OF MEMBERSHIP: Like those who have traversed this path of duty before me, I am distressed by the continuing loss of members by demit and non-payment of dues. A pervading sense of loss and sadness envelops me as I witness the exodus from our chapters of those, who like each of us, once promised at an altar of prayer that they would be faithful. It is glaringly apparent that in some way we are failing to meaningfully bind each member to the family. Somehow we are not making membership in the fraternity so attractive and desirable that life without it is depreciated. Yet, like each one listening to my voice, I have discovered belonging to this great fraternal family to be a viable and uplifting alternative to the life I live in a world clouded and

misdirected by situational ethics, relativistic thinking, and self-centered pursuits. In a very real sense I believe I can become a better example of what is meaningful in life because I journey through its vicissitudes with sisters and brothers whose very words and deeds point the way to the richer life.

Therefore, the hour has come when we must each look within and uncover the secret of our devotion, the catalyst of our commitment, and the reason for our faithfulness to the Order, and then proceed to fashion the most promising avenue of openly sharing it with every member until until our losses abate and our fervency is renewed.

RITUALISTIC WORK: Throughout these two years of working closely with the Master Masons who, for varying reasons, serve their chapters as line officers, like a proud father, I have often been elated when informed of the outstanding efforts some exert for the good of our Order.

Yet, in what appears to be an increasing number, I am extremely dismayed by the blatant, outspoken unwillingness of some to attempt fulfillment of their duties as Associate Patron and Worthy Patron, especially concerning the ritualistic initiatory work. This attitude they extol is unkind, unfair, unmanly, and unMasonic. The call of Masonry and Eastern Star has always been to commit oneself to what is best within. Nowhere in ritual, precept, teaching or tradition can be found such acceptance of laziness and self-centeredness.

Everyone looses when an officer within a chapter holds such an attitude. It poisons the atmosphere and spirit, making a mockery and sham of the entire fraternal way of life. However, when the Master Mason, charged with overseeing the proficiency of others, is unwilling to be as proficient as he possibly can be, he disgraces himself, his office, his chapter, the Order and the Masonic Fraternity.

Somewhere, sometime, as an Order we must address this malignancy eating away at the vitals of our fratemalism. Ultimately, we must decide whether doing one's best is to be held in more esteem than merely occupying one's station.

THE WOMAN'S ORDER IMAGE: Repeatedly I have heard voiced the statement "Eastern Star is a woman's Order". Alas, I have even heard it from those who have served the fraternity in leadership positions.

My first reaction is one of repugnance. My second is disgust that such misguided thinking continues to exist after one hundred and thirty-six years of working together. Yet, it is this attitude and belief that must be dispelled before we can fully experience the uniqueness of being part of the largest fraternal endeavor for women and men this world has

ever seen. Basically, it is our commitment to labor together that makes our witness outside our fraternal walls convincing, strong and capable of influencing others to embrace our philosophy and enter our gates. The very fact Eastern Star's existence is based upon its Masonic inheritance and foundation gives it veracity and meaning. The further we drift from the fraternal bonds between the two great Orders, the weaker we both become. The success of our Eastern Star is women and men working together, accomplishing what neither could have accomplished alone.

So, Sisters and Brothers, speak openly, honestly and convincingly of our Fraternity's greatest uniqueness: though a woman leads the Order, a Master Mason stands by her side!

REPRIMAND OF MEMBERS: Again, this year, our Order's inability to effectively and expeditiously deal with a member whose actions are unworthy of one who follows His Star has allowed situations to mushroom until an entire chapter family suffers for one person's infraction. Our present Constitution is so structured that no action seems legal to be taken until the situation worsens and innocent members suffer. In case after case, a more speedy handling of the guilty member would have kept the flames of unkindness and destruction from igniting a conflagration.

I strongly feel it behooves this body of dedicated members, who alone have the power to establish policies, implement change and pass laws, to intelligently and unemotionally create a constitutional format upon which the leadership, in conjunction with the appropriate committee, can legally implement action that more speedily confronts the guilty and reduces the potential for the innocent to be swept into the maelstrom.

OUTSIDE ATTACKS ON MEMBERS: On more than one occasion this year I have felt the need to speak out against the rising anti-Masonic tide permeating the minds of some within our society. Often devoted members of the Order have shared, with a heavy heart and a troubled spirit, how they were personally challenged, maligned, questioned, and accused by some within religious leadership. In every case brought to my attention the implication was the same: to belong to the Order of the Eastern Star is to be a supporter of and a participant in the forces of evil. Each time our Order's veracity, integrity and motives were held suspect.

The fact the murky, sick, spiritually-corrupt world of evil has perverted and profaned the five-pointed star, the Pentalpha, one of the earliest and most poignant symbols of God, into a sign of those who worship Satan and perform acts of debauchery and depravity has not helped our image. The minds of the ignorant and the uninformed have condemned us. Therefore, we dare not remain silent any longer in the presence of

being classified as partners in diabolical depravity.

Sisters and Brothers, we need to individually and collectively speak out in love and strong conviction to anyone concerning our beliefs, regardless whether he be priest, rabbi, minister or layman. There is nothing to be gained and much to be lost by further retreat and silence. We know who we are; we know what we do; we know what we believe; and, we know where we are headed. Therefore, let us tell the world!

EASTERN STAR HOME: One of the most dedicated, hard-working group of members in our Order is the Board of Trustees we have elected to oversee our Eastern Star Home. For two years I have been privileged to witness their devotion, concern, understanding and compassion as they grapple with the increasingly difficult task of keeping this most costly of our charities moving forward. To say that I have been impressed by their steadfastness to the task is an understatement. I feel they have served the Order with distinction.

Yet, in spite of the faithful service of these members, due to a complexity of circumstances beyond anyone's ability to foresee or control, the purpose of the Home's founding is no longer being fully met. We are entering a period in our fraternity when we must not merely wrestle with some hard-to-make decisions, but we must make them. The time left for us to determine what course we shall follow concerning the Home is running out.

Therefore, I implore the delegates to listen with utmost care as those who have a better focus on what is happening in this charitable effort share their thoughts, feelings and findings. This Grand body will be asked to accept a deficit budget for this fiscal year. Although this in itself is disturbing, the prospect of it being the first of many is frightening.

The time has come for us to discuss openly and factually what we are facing. We should be weighing such questions as: should we relocate the Home, creating a modern facility that could better serve a wider range of members' needs? Given the extensive involvement and intrusion of government in the lives of the elderly is such a charitable effort needed? Can we justify the expenditure of two million dollars per year on ninety members when there are other needy areas among our members to be addressed? Can we, given the continuing decrease and the diminishing returns of interest on our investments really afford such an institution any longer? Should we declare a moratorium on further admissions to the Home until such time as we have determined its future?

I raise these questions, not to suggest that any one of them is indicative of the direction we should go, but to create an atmosphere of thinking, sifting, weighing, and discussing an issue that can no longer be dismissed or placed on hold.

Yes, we are faced with what some would quickly label as problems. Yet, I do not consider them as such. For:

knowing that we are the children of God;

knowing that He has and will continue to give wisdom and guidance to all who ask;

knowing that our Sisters and Brothers who traversed this path before us brought this great Fraternal witness through many times of trouble:

knowing that God being for us diminishes the final impact of any who rail against us;

and, knowing that we each dare to face life with a commitment to love one another -

this knowledge changes all problems into challenges.

We are faced with challenges; however, I believe we are capable and ready to embrace them straight on. We will not hedge; we will not abdicate our responsibilities; we will not retreat from the conflict; we will not prove unworthy of the sacrifices made on our behalf by those whose names and deeds fill the pages of our fraternal history. For my precious sisters and brothers, we are more than mere members of a super club, we are the SISTERS AND BROTHERS OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR, different from those without our walls, for we have seen His Star and our lives are forever different. We are now and for eternity - "ONE IN THE BOND OF LOVE".

I lifted a cut crystal prism and the light from our Holy Bible shown thru it and presented a rainbow like band of colors, called a spectrum. These colors are representative of the rays of our Star, each has a special meaning in our lives.

A spectrum has three primary colors which are, red, blue and yellow. Nothing can be mixed to make these colors, and to us in the Order of the Eastern Star, they represent love, fidelity and constancy. To me, our Worthy Grand Matron Jerry, and her Dorsey, our Worthy Grand Patron Dennis and his Nancy, the Grand Officers and their Trailers, and the Deputy Grand Matrons of 1986 reflect the love of our Order. Their service to the economics of the Grand Chapter and the responsibility to our ladies of the Eastern Star Home are the utmost in fidelity and it has been a pleasure to be of service to each of these bodies, as they perform their duties.

The last of the three primary colors is yellow, which represents constancy. To the staff in the "722 Club" who are ever constant in their love and loyalty to our Order. You know, you spend more time with the people you work with than you do with your family. To our Grand Treasurer, Viola Perry, my assistant, Helen Kirkpatrick, our book-keeper, Flora Silvey, our assistant, Ruth Huelse, the Requisitions Manager, Lorraine Bode and our Computer Wizz, Sheri Weisser, the employees of the Grand Chapter office, I cannot give enough praise. They are constant to their love of the Order, their devotion to duty and their love for me. They make me look good, and for that I am ever grateful. No one can do this job alone and it is the people behind the scene, that get the work done, and they should be receiving all the compliments I receive for a job well done. Thank you loyal and true friends.

The Office of the Grand Secretary is not a nine to four job. I feel that I am there to be of service to our members and I am afraid that our members need service twenty-four hours a day. No one has been more constant in his love for me and his understanding of our Order than my Husband, Albert. He is the joy of my life and I thank him for his understanding and his constant appreciation of my duties. His love is the song that lights up my life.

Within the Spectrum, there are complimentary colors, which are green, purple and orange. These colors are obtained by combining two of the primary colors in equal amounts.

Purple certainly represents the loyalty of all the members who serve on our Grand Chapter Committees and it has been a joy to work with each Chairman and the members of their committees as they serve the Grand Chapter of California and its members. Each Committee of the Grand Chapter works through the Grand Chapter Office, and it has been a pleasure to be of service to the Credential Committee, sending out all the credentials and working with them this week; the Constitution and Bylaws Committee and processing 108 Chapter amendments to chapter bylaws; the Jurisprudence Committee and presenting their 87 opinions to the Worthy Grand Matron; working with the Appeals and Grievances Committee as they tried to be of assistance to many of our Chapters. Sending the proceedings of the Grand Chapters of all the other jurisdictions to the Fraternal Correspondence Committee. Sending the 35 Proposed Amendments and the Revision of Section 73 to the Distribution Committee as well as the Committee on Jurisprudence, Constitution and Bylaws, Finance and the Grand Line Officers. Preparing over 1200 Mileage checks and 150 Compensation checks. The payment of all the Benevolent Account, all the Scholarship checks which totaled 78 recipients and \$41,000.00. The bills for the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund which totaled \$166,534, the bills for supplies for the Memorial Cancer Dressing Fund which totaled \$61,881. the Insurance bills that totaled \$81,216, all the bills of the last convention and all the bills to maintain our Eastern Star Home, besides maintaining control of all the investments of the Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Home, paying the bills that are created with the maintenance of an office in San Francisco.

Green represents faith and I hope the Secretaries of California have faith in their Chapters and faith in their service to our Order. They are called upon to perform services for the good of their Chapters. Each year an annual report is requested to be sent by each Chapter. With Grand Chapter Session coming a month earlier, this task was made very difficult. Our Constitution and Laws requires that the Annual Report and its check must be in the hands of the Grand Secretary no later than August 1st. As of that date, we had not seen the Annual Reports of 75 Chapters. Certainly in the next few deliveries of mail, most of these Chapters had at least sent in the Annual Report for the

first time. It was not until August 25th, that we received the reports of Radiant Daylight Chapter No. 265 and South Park Chapter No. 443 and finally on August 27th, we received the Annual Report of Point Arena Chapter No. 291, which finally completed the task of receiving every Annual Report It is not fair to the Chapter Secretary that do their job as requested to allow the same Chapters to always be delinquent in whatever request is made. There are still 22 Annual Reports that the financial portion is not correct, but after much prodding I am able to give you the membership figures as of June 30, 1986 on 460 Chapters in the State of California:

This is a loss of membership for the fiscal year of 3, 497 Memberships.

Once we get all the membership on the computer we will be shocked to find out just how many actual members we have in the Order in California. My figures reflect the plural membership which joins our Order twice and in turn leaves our Order twice.

We presented 580 - 50 year pins and three - 75 year guards to our members. One Hundred Ninety Chapters saw fit to present Rob Morris Awards to their members.

To look to the future and progress of the Order in California, this year, the delegates will find evidence of the use of the computer in the Grand Chapter Office. We now have over 10,000 members on the computer and hope to have the total members on by the end of the fiscal year. This will make the Secretaries of California happy as they no longer have to do the Annual Report in its present form. We will send a list of each Chapter's members to the Secretary. He or she will edit it with the

addition of the initiates, affiliates and reinstatements with the names and the dates, and the deletions of the demits, suspensions, resignations and deaths of its members.

The corrections on the list will be entered into the computer and the computer will create a statement of the dues and fees which will be sent to each Chapter with a corrected list of their members and the Chapters will issue a check for the Annual Report. This year the delegates will receive their mileage and compensation checks printed by the computer. The Secretaries receive mail with labels created by the computer. The 1986 edition of the Grand Chapter Proceedings will be printed on the word processor of the computer and converted to the correct type for our printer to print the proceedings. In time the complete bookkeeping system of the Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Homes of California will be on the computer and all checks issued will be done on the computer. We are to the age of the Bits, Bytes and Buzzwords of the computer and we can hardly wait until you ask for some information and our reply will be, sorry the computer is down and we are unable to give you that information. If our Order is to grow, we must meet the market place of the business industry and each day we work with our new computer we find methods that save us time, that are more accurate and that will be of more service to our members the Chapters and the Grand Officers. It will take time to get the system working to the maximum performance, but when it is, we will wonder how we ever go along without it. None of us really like a drastic change, and for us in the Grand Chapter Office, the computer is a drastic change. We should look to it as a change and accept the responsibility that, in time, will make our job more easy.

The change does not stop with the computer in the Grand Chapter Office. Each of you, as members of our beautiful Order must stop and look at our Order. We are not advancing, so we must do something to change it. The time is now. It is too late to stop and talk about it. We must encourage people to join our Order and when they do we must encourage them to take an active part. We must support the line officers and assist them in the performance of their duties. When they ask for assistance, be there. Do not say NO. Praise them instead of complaining abut them. Make their budgets easier to make. There are very few Chapters that have a financial problem. The problem is that we do not have line officers or members willing to assume these stations. Why put such a financial burden upon those members who are willing to serve our Chapters. I have made this statement before. Sisters and Brothers, for the good of our Order, we all worked very hard to give our Chapters the financial stability for those rainy days. Take a look at our Order, as it is raining cats and dogs, and those rainy days are here. Let us support our Line Officers, as they try to perform their duties to the best of their ability. Without them, we will not have an Order to be proud of, or an Order to belong to.

Lift up that prism, and look into it, and see the need for Sincerity, Tolerance and Happiness, the Watchwords of 1986, but accept the responsibility of your membership and be an active and contributing member of your Chapter so that when the snowflakes fall on your Chapter you will have the warmth and love to dissolve those snowflakes and make your Chapter a place of responsibility, caring for your members, and a growth in our Order.

EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 1986

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

- a) Method of accounting. The accounts are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting.
- b) <u>Investment valuation</u>. Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the overthe-counter market are valued at the bid price. See Note 2.
- c) Purchases and sales of securities. Purchases and sales of securities are reflected on a trade date basis. Realized gains and losses on sales of securities are based on the first-in, first-out method. See Note 2.
- d) Dividend income. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.
- e) Interest income. Interest income is recorded as earned on an accrual basis.
- f) Inventory of provisions and medical supplies. The inventory is stated at cost (first-in, first-out method).
- g) <u>Property</u>. The land on which the buildings of the Eastern Star Home are located was received as a gift. The book value of the land was established by the Board of Trustees of the Home in 1957. The buildings and other property recorded on the books prior to July 1, 1977 are stated at values determined by the Board of Trustees of the Home. All additions of property acquired after June 30, 1977 have been recorded at cost and transferred from the Operating Fund to the Property Fund. The property is being depreciated on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Land improvements 10 years
Building improvements 5 and 10 years
Furniture, fixtures
and equipment 5 and 10 years
Automobiles 5 years

When property is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is recognized in income and any cash transferred to the Operating Fund.

- h) <u>Services</u>. Services donated by a large number of people are important to the <u>activities</u> of the <u>Eastern Star Homes</u> of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.
- i) <u>Income taxes</u>. There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income as the Eastern Star Homes of California is an exempt nonprofit corporation and has no unrelated taxable business income.

NOTE 2. INVESTMENTS: Fund records include a Market Valuation Account. The balance in this valuation account represents the difference between the original carrying basis of the securities and their respective market values. The changes in the valuation balance is effected by dispositions of securities as well as the differences between carrying basis and market values. Gains and losses on securities sold during the year are computed from the carrying value basis.

When the story of the past year is written in the great Book of Time, if it includes a record of organization life; I am certain that our Order of

the Eastern Star will be very high in the list of those which have listened to the call of distress and have answered - "We are ready to relieve!"

One dear Sister, nearing her "90th" birthday, has expressed the appreciation which so many feel, in a letter which begins - "God Bless You All."

Many perplexing cases have confronted your committee this year. Applications have been received from Sisters and Brothers temporarily without income yet possessed of property in many cases heavily mortgaged. In some of these cases it has been necessary to give temporary aid in order to save their homes.

Many times we find lack of family support, lack of information of where to go for assistance.

At the beginning of the year letters were sent to the Worthy Matrons suggesting that the Area Chairmen of the Benevolent Fund Committee be invited to speak and explain the purpose of the Fund and the procedure of obtaining assistance. I regret, there were very few responses. We find most members have no knowledge of the Fund, but are grateful that the Fund exists.

We find that many times the first four officers do not realize they are the Relief Committee of their Chapter and it is their responsibility to assist in the investigation of the applicants.

Also, that this Fund is in order to assist chapters in matters of relief. It is the chapter's duty to investigate, to give necessary emergency aid and then appeal to the Benevolent Fund.

It is apparent there is a lack of communication between officers and members.

The Benevolent Fund Committee Members are continually widening their efforts to meet the requests of our needy members in these difficult times brought on by inflation and unemployment.

I wish that it were possible for each member of the Order to take a pilgrimage with me to some of the homes which are so cheerless today, many of them homes of members who have in the past, served as officers in their Chapters and presented a picture of comfort and security, which is now gone.

Could you do so, I am sure you would feel with your committee, that we have a very grave responsibility.

We recommend a budget of \$25,000 and \$300.00 for expenses, also the continuance of one (1) cent per capita. A full and detailed report is in the proceedings.

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jerry, Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Dennis, we your committee are most grateful to you for the opportunity to serve on this most needed committee. May your leadership guide you through a productive and harmonious session.

I cannot close my report without saying that I am especially indebted to Sister Diane Silva, our Grand Secretary for her kind services so willingly and cheerfully rendered, always with sympathy and understanding.

My Sisters and Brothers, we grow tall only when we are thoughtful. We live only when we serve. We are compensated in a permanent way only when we do something worthwhile for somebody else. Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Doris Hayden I want to thank you for your musical prelude prior to opening. I have had the pleasure of listening to your beautiful music on many occasions and each time has been more enjoyable.

Opening: The Worthy Grand Matron declared this Tuesday Afternoon Session of the Grand Chapter of California called from refreshment to labor and the Grand Marshal made the proper proclamation.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Atour 1984 and 1985 Grand Chapter Sessions we voted to vary the method of voting as provided in our Constitution and Laws so that instead of raising the hand to vote by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter, each voting delegate was given a colored card for each vote to which he or she was entitled and, when called upon to vote, the card or cards were raised. This has been a successful method of insuring that multiple votes could more effectively be cast. Once again this year the Credential Committee has been instructed to give a card for each vote to which a delegate is entitled so that the card or cards could be raised when the vote is called. In order to provide for the use of these cards for multiple votes, within the rules of our Grand Chapter, we must vote to suspend Section Ill, Rule 13, which relates to the voting sign of this Grand Chapter. I will, therefore, entertain a motion so to suspend Section III, Rule 13 and to provide that the usual voting sign of this Grand Chapter Session will be by the raising of the cards distributed by the Credentials Committee.

To suspend Section 111, Rule 13, and to provide that the usual voting sign of this Grand Chapter Session will be by the raising of the cards distributed by the Credentials Committee. (The motion was seconded.) Carried:

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Sisters and Brothers, we are about to take up the business of Grand Chapter, and I remind you that we are governed by the rules set forth in our Constitution and Bylaws; or if our Constitution is silent on a procedural matter, by Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised, Rule 13 requires that every member addressing the Grand Chapter shall announce his or her name and the name, number and location of the Chapter to which he or she belongs. In speaking on a question that is properly on the floor, the speaker shall state whether he or she is for or against the question. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject, except members of the committees in relation to their reports, without permission from the presiding officer, or of Grand Chapter. No one may speak longer than three minutes at a time.

Unless a ballot vote has been called, the vote shall be taken by the special voting sign of the Grand Chapter, which is the raising of the right hand with the green cards given out at the time of registration.

A ballot vote may be ordered upon any question at the discretion of the presiding officer or at the request of five members, provided such request is made by such five members at the time the question is under discussion and before the result of the vote has been declared by the presiding officer.

When you need additional information on a subject, you may "Rise to a point of information". If you are unsure regarding the proper parliamentary procedure to use, you may "Rise to a parliamentary inquiry". If you feel there has been a rule violation, you may "Rise to a point of order". If you do not agree with the chair's ruling on a point of order, you may "Appeal the decision of the chair". If you wish to stop debate, you should move "The previous question". A motion for the previous question (to stop debate and call for a vote) shall not be in order until at least three members have been heard on each side of the question, if they desire to be heard.

You are asked not to clap, speak out, or otherwise display your feelings as a result of discussion on any matter.

As presiding officer, my intent is to the fair and impartial. With the assistance of our Parliamentarian, Sister Lila Hummel, I will do my best to see that each part of legislation is clarified, if need be, and that all of our members who wish to speak will have an opportunity to be heard.

I am reminded many times of a statement made by our Past Grand Matron, Sister Marguerite Weisheimer; "We can disagree without being disagreeable".

Therefore, I ask you for your courtesy and indulgence as we proceed.

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

It is with much pride and gratitude that I present to you Brother Thomas Sagar, my colleague on this Committee. It would be impossible for me, in the length of time allotted for this report, to express adequately my appreciation to Brother Tom for his insight and thoughtful assistance in all of the work of your Committee on Jurisprudence.

It is with equal sadness that we do not have the privilege and honor this year of personally presenting to you Brother Thomas W. Thurman, Past Grand Patron, who is our other colleague. His serious illness this fall has confined him to his home and for the first time in many years he is not able to attend Grand Chapter. Both of us who are here miss him and we know that you, as the delegates of Grand Chapter will miss him. He has never failed to give 100% of himself in the service of our Order. His vast knowledge of fraternal law and usage and his willingness to share it has been an inspiration to us all. We all pray for his recovery and return to the field of service.

Many of you are not fully aware of the time commitment of this Committee. You see us only at the Grand Chapter session when we report to you on questions of fraternal law or usage as to proposed legislation. This is only the tip of the iceberg of the functions and duties of this Committee.

We are a year-round working committee charged with the duty of advising the Worthy Grand Matron as to legal questions, of advising Grand Chapter Committees with respect to fraternal law and usage when requested, of providing opinions to any member of Grand Chapter who requests such, of working with the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws in "housekeeping" items in our Constitution and Laws, and of working with the Committee on Finance to review certain contracts. Because of the important consequences of each of these duties, it has become the custom of this Committee only to act as a unit and only upon

written request; no one of us alone will respond in an official capacity, nor will an oral question be answered officially. Sometimes this may cause delays in our answers; however, it is our belief that the delay is more justifiable than an incorrect or incomplete response.

We will not detail all that we have done during this year in the performance of our duties; but we would like you to know that, in addition to our other activities, we have researched the laws and written thirty-seven opinions. That is approximately three each month since our last Grand Chapter session. Probably no less than one hour is spent by each one of us on every opinion and sometimes many hours of research are required before we can even start to write the opinion.

We find that certain questions are repeatedly asked by different members and we believe that under proper circumstances the publication of a decision by the Worthy Grand Matron in conformity with our opinions would be extremely beneficial. It would, perhaps, reduce some of the workload of this Committee; but, more important, it would enable the members to have before them the interpretations which have already been made, prior to their finding themselves in a position from which it may be difficult to extricate themselves. We recognize that sometimes our opinions when adopted as a decision by the Worthy Grand Matron have resulted in the need to "undo" somethings. This can sometimes be difficult so we are interested in having those decisions readily available to our members in order to help avoid some of these painful experiences. As you are aware legislation has been submitted in this regard.

We enjoy serving on this Committee and we appreciate the many expressions of gratitude we have received for our service. We thank our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jerry Southward, for her appointment of each of us and we thank you, the members of Grand Chapter, for the fine reception you always give us.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

(By Milton Dales, P.P. (259), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers:

Before proceeding with the report, it is my pleasure to present the members of the Finance Committee: Sister Betty Stubblefield, Past Grand Matron, Brothers James B. Craven, Past Grand Patron, Phillip Brooks, Worthy Patron and Past Patron, Orinda Chapter (635), and Glenn Martin, Past Patron, Yorba Linda Chapter (347).

Our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva, serves as Secretary to the Committee, and we express appreciation to her and to our Grand Treasurer, Sister Viola Perry, and the entire office staff for the friendly cooperation and assistance they have given me and the members of the Committee this year.

MEETINGS: Seven committee meetings were held during the year, beginning in November 1985, and in January, March, May, July, August and September 1986. Our May l6th meeting was preceded by

a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home, at which the Grand Line Officers were present.

The members of our Committee also attended two joint committee meetings with members of the Constitution and Bylaws and Jurisprudence Committees, at which our Grand Line Officers were also present. The first of these, held on February 5, 1986, was to discuss the tax status of the Endowment Fund and other Grand Chapter funds, and the second, held on June 26th, to review the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws.

Three special meetings were held with the Board of Trustees to discuss the fiscal-year budget for the Eastern Star Home.

In January 1986, Brother Bert Alexander, General Chairman of the 1985 Grand Chapter Session in Sacramento, presented his final report. Brother Joe Morris, General Chairman, for the 1986 Grand Chapter Session in Anaheim, presented a proposed budget which was approved.

Our Associate Grand Matron presented prices for Temple rental and motel room rates for the School of Instruction which follows our Grand Chapter Session. The Committee approved her selecting the most convenient location available, giving consideration to overall cost.

Mr. R. Stephen Doan, of Adams, Duque and Hazeltine, the Attorney for the Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star Home, attended our February joint committee meeting. The decision was made to file application for tax-exempt status for the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund. This approval has now been received from the State of California, but as yet, not from the Internal Revenue Service.

Mr. Jay Newman, of Thompkins & Company, joined our January meeting to review the insurance coverage on the Grand Chapter and all constituent chapters charged thereby. The decision was made to add to the name of the insured, "and all allied organizations".

We regret that liability costs, together with continually rising medical costs, have caused an increase in the insurance premium, resulting in an increased per capita tax for this coverage to \$1.20 per member for this year.

INVESTMENTS: Mr. Wesley Petit, and members of his staff, of Crocker Bank's Private Capital Investment Division, (now Wells Fargo Bank), were in attendance at three meetings during the year. All funds have shown good growth performance throughout the year. Mr. Petit has assured us there will be no management changes in the Investment Division by Wells Fargo Bank.

OFFICE EQUIPMENT: The computers have been installed in the Grand Chapter office and the Eastern Star Home. While there have been some problems with software, good progress is being made in utilizing this equipment to its fullest extent.

TRAVEL PROGRAM: A travel program for 1986-87 was presented our Committee by Trans National Company. As this has been a good source of income in the past, the Finance Committee recommends the continuance of the program, with any monies received from this source being credited to the Convention and Mileage Fund.

At the beginning of this fiscal year, each member of the Finance Committee was given an assignment pertaining to a particular phase of our responsibilities. Each has performed their duties in this respect, and I, personally, thank them for a job well done.

We express our appreciation to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for the cooperation they have given throughout the year to our Committee, for certainly it take team work and dedication to make a success of any program, and to retain sound policies.

Brother Earl Marshall, President of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home, may we have your report at this time and introduction of the other members of the Board?

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA

(By Earl Marshall, P.P. (609), President, Board of Trustees)

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Delegates to the 1986 Grand Session of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star:

This Report, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1986, is presented for your consideration in regard to the property of the Home, its condition and the operation of this important charity, as required by our laws and Constitution.

In the life of our Home, as in the lives of our members, more than half a century has seen profound changes in a society committed to charity and service. Dedicated during the Great Depression to provide comprehensive residential service to our members, over 65, who need and desire charitable care, our Home has met the test of time and has met every challenge in achieving its original purpose: "to own and manage a Home for the care and support of aged, indigent or infirm members of the Order", Once a member decides to live in our Home, we, the members, have a contractual commitment to provide total care for the remainder of their life. It is a noteworthy commitment that has gained us the respect and admiration of members and non-members, alike. We are justifiably proud of more than half a century of service. But, be aware of continuing, "profound changes".

As we came out of the Great Depression, manufacturing wages rose to 63 cents an hour by 1939. Lawyers earned \$4800 a year; doctors \$5100. For 5 cents, a streetcar would deliver you to a downtown Italian restaurant for an enjoyable 5-course 75-cent dinner. By 1941, theater prices rose to 25 cents, to see Ronald Reagan star in "International Squadron", a most important role in a young career. Sister Gertrude Conant Matson was our Worthy Grand Matron and the Home continued to serve our members during a devastating World War II. Costs rose dramatically, as America adjusted to a post-war economy that saw prices, wages and taxes escalate as never before.

In a period of tremendous social, cultural, economic and scientific changes, our Order continued to serve and provided the energy, leadership and finances to enlarge the Home. That energy, work and dedication provided the splendid legacy which is now in our care and, today, we have a facility of 103 residential beds and 38 nursing care beds for our needy members. How well are <u>WE</u> doing?

Six years ago, the Board of Trustees was authorized to take a close look at the role and responsibilities of the Home and its future. Under

contract with Urban and Rural Systems Associates (URSA) of San Francisco, a comprehensive study was conducted and the results presented to the 1981 Grand Chapter Session that told us some important things about us that warrant review, among them, these:

"The Home is, from a financial standpoint, the largest activity and a major "business" of the Order; however, from the standpoint of involvement, and interest, it is a comparatively much smaller activity of the Order."

"There are questions and concerns about the ability to continue to operate the Home in the future in a manner comparable to current operations, including: a) the Homes ability to serve special needs of residents, particularly nursing care needs; b) the continuing trend of increased operating costs; and c) the adequacy of income sources to meet operating costs."

These conclusions are equally valid today and underlie the very spirit of this report in some regards, but, generally speaking, our Home is alive and well.

The Eastern Star Home is owned and operated by this Grand Chapter as a non-profit, California corporation, licensed by the State Department of Social Welfare and the State Department of Public Health and operated under Federal Registry Title 22, and appropriate State and local regulations. Corporate powers are vested in a nine-member Board of Trustees of whom seven are elected to 3-year terms and the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron are voting members of the Board; by virtue of their office. Terms of office are staggered to enable continuity and experience on the Board, but circumstances this year require that you elect four members at this Grand Chapter.

Admission to the Home is open to any properly tenured member of the Order who is not less than 65 years of age, in good standing and is in distress, seeking relief. The general requirements for admission are detailed in our Constitution and Laws and in the policies adopted by the Board of Trustees. Once admitted to the Home, and having completed the statutory 90-day probationary period, the resident is assured of total care for the remainder of her/his lifetime. During the prior year of this report, our resident population has ranged from 98 to 94 ladies and of these, the Skilled Nursing Unit has accommodated 34 to 38 persons which is too close to the licensed capacity for administrative comfort.

To better understand this issue, keep in mind that the Home is licensed for 38 patients in the Skilled Nursing Unit. This licensed capacity cannot be exceeded, which means that any additional patient must be placed elsewhere, outside of the Home and at greater expense. The

situation is vivid evidence that our aging members are waiting too long to apply for residence in the Home and that the trend in our available care is less residential and more toward a hospital-type of charity, due to the normal aging processes of our applicants.

To relieve this pressure, a Personal Care treatment has been instituted as an intermediate step between the residential care and the skilled nursing facility and, while the organization is working well, it symbolizes an ongoing problem that is costly and will require close attention by future Trustees and the Home management. The immediate effect is the need for additional staff and some rearrangement of facilities plus the increased supervision to insure proper performance and care.

In matters related to residential care, there is considerable legislative pressure on this industry. Added rules, regulations and certification requirements tend to increase competition among a limited work force making it difficult to quickly meet staffing requirements. The Home is not a participant in the State "increment" program that makes dollar grants directly to certain facilities to supplement wage scales, thereby reducing our wage-competitiveness and staffing ability. There is some evidence that our staff is among the lowest paid at any of the Masonic-related homes in North America and it is an uncomfortable position reflected in the wage increases proposed in our budget for the consideration of this Grand Chapter.

The Board of Trustees has been extremely conscious of their stewardship in the preparation of the budget you will be asked to approve. It is a deficit budget which has been reviewed with the Grand Chapter Finance Committee on several occasions and using the projections of the financial consultant whom the Finance Committee employs, we are asking approval to directly transfer the operating surplus of 1985-86 to the new budget, plus the transfer of funds from the Homes Operating Fund, in order to balance. These actions become necessary due to extreme reductions in the estimated income to be earned from our investments, based upon the data furnished by the investment counselor who served the Finance Committee of Grand Chapter and is in charge of the Home investments. There are sufficient funds to support these suggestions, but obviously it is not a trend that we can allow to continue. There is a natural concern over the division of authority that exists between the Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees over fiscal matters related to the Home. Representatives of both groups have met and discussed the matter which hopefully can be resolved for the benefit of all of our members. Undoubtedly there will be future legislative changes for consideration at later Grand Chapter Sessions.

One further note regarding the need to balance the proposed budget is the elimination of all capital improvements. This became necessary, but will not impair the operation of the Home since these improvements can be accomplished on an extra-budgetary basis with the consent of the Grand Chapter Finance Committee. They cannot be done without this approval, except on an emergency basis wherein the Board of Trustees has the authority and the obligation to proceed independently.

Because our building is more than 50 years old, there is no question that capital improvements are an important issue and will continue to be a major expense. Repairs are not always predictable, but many are foreseen and the decision to defer such projects is difficult, knowing that they border upon being a necessary expense rather than an enhancement of the Home property. We have no centralized authority and responsibility to proceed on these issues, consequently there is a need to review the decision-making processes presently written into the laws and regulations of the Order in California. Our information indicates that most jurisdictions place the authority and responsibility solely in the Board of Trustees who are accountable directly to the sponsoring body. There is considerable merit in this process, but to implement such procedures will require extensive review and changes in the laws and regulations of our jurisdiction.

On the brighter side, there have been many happy, Home-related experiences in the past year. Some are not so visible to the casual visitor, such as a new kitchen stove, air-conditioning units, new floor in the Skilled Nursing Unit, new carts, added electrical service, elevator renewal and plumbing corrections. New furniture improved the appearance and comfort of the dining room and our new Wang computer has been installed in the Administrative Offices.

More visible, and of greater delight to the ladies of the Home, were the traditional visits by the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Officers and guests at the annual Christmas Party, the Official Visit to the Home on May 16th and the "Winter Carnival" Fiesta on June 7th and 8th. For the Christmas Party, the generous gifts made possible by donations from the Chapter members were distributed by Santa Claus and his helpers, making each lady feel "special" at that happy season and, on their behalf, we thank the membership for their kindness and thoughtfulness in remembering our ladies.

The Official Visit sparkled as the residents listened to inspiring comments from our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and heard a special message from our Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Thelma Bailey, plus an entertaining musical interlude by our Worthy Grand Patron and his family that was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. The afternoon ended with a beautiful buffet prepared by the Home staff, beautifully served.

The "Winter Carnival" Fiesta was a well-managed success and those who set it up and carried out the details for this two-day event are to be complemented on a job "well done". A final financial report has not

yet been delivered but it appears that the Home will again benefit from the magnificent effort of the participants in this annual affair.

During the year, the Board of Trustees has held a number of "work sessions", designed to produce an operating manual for the guidance of Trustees in a uniform manner relating to residents, the administration and employees, the infirmary, Grand Chapter and the Board, itself. It is recognized that the manual is a necessary supplement to the many references already controlling the operation of the Home and, as such, will provide a uniformity in policy matters and Board decisions that require a greater continuity than has been available heretofore. During these "work sessions", the information booklet, that many of you have referred to as the "brown book", was reviewed in great detail and in view of the extensive errors discovered, based on today's operating data, it was decided that all copies shall be destroyed and a new version provided for the membership at an early date.

It was also determined during these sessions to provide this written report on the Home to be distributed to the delegates at Grand Chapter, primarily for two reasons - to provide a permanent report that can be taken home with you and made available to interested members of your Chapters and to eliminate the usual verbal report to the delegates in favor of more profitably using your time with other presentations. Included with this report is a review of pertinent cost data that we hope will be useful and informative to you and your Chapter members. We would appreciate your response to this type of reporting, and whether or not it should be continued.

Our Home is now an active participant in the Masonic Homes Executive Association of North America and has taken part in the annual seminars and information published by the association. Some of the comments in this report are based upon data made available by the organization and our support of the organization is proving to be of benefit to our Home administration and to the Board. Much useful data are made available to us that might otherwise pass unnoticed.

The Board deeply regrets that Trustee Eleanor Marsh, Past Grand Matron, was led to tender her resignation from the Board for personal reasons, effective April 1st, and welcomed Warren Wildman, Past Grand Patron, who was appointed to take Eleanor's position on the Board, for the remainder of the year.

Two matters of general interest to those of you who are delegates, and to your Chapter members in particular, require your continued attention. First, you are urged to make greater use of the members of the Home Endowment Committee in your meetings, allowing them to bring their message to the membership and to encourage increased participation and interest in Home matters. Secondly, should you become involved in an application for admission to the Home by one

of your members, treat the application and the investigation with a thoroughness and completeness that are essential to expediting the review process, remembering that the Trustees, and the Grand Secretary, are readily available to assist you in work that you must perform to move the request to the Board of Trustees for final consideration.

It is a pleasure to offer this report to you, fully recognizing the dedication and devotion of so many people who have made the operation of our Eastern Star Home a proud benefit for our needy members. Our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jeraldine Southward and our Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Dennis Jordan have been most helpful in their participation in all phases of the activity. The Grand Chapter Office makes a major contribution to our services performed for applicants and the residents, alike. The professional staff and employees at the Home have done an exemplary job, making the Home a showplace among other similar residential facilities. The residents, through a program of volunteers, are most helpful by greeting new residents, welcoming visitors and by conducting tours of our facility to lend an air of fraternalism at its best. To the Board of Trustees, the ability to disagree while seeking agreement on difficult issues has indicated a fraternal strength that is essential to the success of the important charity that we represent.

Finally, we thank the members in California for their continued support and for their generous contributions that make it all possible. They have never failed to support the Home, and we again will seek the continued \$2.00 assessment during the Grand Chapter Session in order to properly fund this important charity that represents each of our Members in the eyes of a curious world that often wonders what we do.

Earl Marshall, P.P. (609), President, Board of Trustees: We thank you for that. Working on the Board of Trustees is one of the most satisfying and gratifying jobs that a member can have. You get awfully

close to immediate problems, and you have the benefit of seeing either the result or sometimes, as the case may be, the problem, in which case you take the challenge and find an answer. It is a pleasure that so few of you ever enjoy. It gets a little hair-raising at times; but, nonetheless, everybody that I know who has ever served in this position has gone away from it with a feeling of satisfaction that so few members of the Order ever have the right to enjoy.

In that regard, as you have read our report, we had a number of work sessions this past year, and the Trustees wrestled with a number of problems, many of which are outlined in the report. But in wrestling with those problems, we realized that many of them don't have an instant answer. It is going to take time; it is going to take money; it is going to take energy to resolve some of the things the Home is facing.

About three months ago at our meeting following a work session, we met the following Saturday, as the Board meets on the third Saturday of each month, and we had a little bit of time to make use of and, in an attempt to make use of that time constructively, we had the Administrator present at our meetings, both as a resource person and also as a communications effort.

I have known Mary Lou for so many years, I guess I was on the Board when we hired her. I looked at Mary Lou, and I told her "Mary Lou, as a professional as well as a member of the Order, what do you see of this Home charity five years, perhaps, down the road in this place" and the lady gave us a half-hour dissertation that reminded me of Lincoln's Gettysburg address.

The circumstances, of course, were different; but there was not a murmur among the Board of Trustees or the guests who were present at that time, they were so intent on listening to what she said in response to that question. And, afterwards, I though about it, and I asked Mary Lou, I said, "It is nice that you would give us the benefit of your impressions at a Board meeting with seven elected Trustees and the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron, but how wonderful it would be if you would give that same news to the delegates at Grand Chapter. Would you be willing to do it?" And she thought about it for quite a while, I didn't get an immediate answer, I don't believe, pressing the point, she did agree that she would come and talk to you and give you her response to that rather simple question, I thought, which gave us very illuminating answers.

So with your indulgence, I would again like to ask Mary Lou that, as a professional, "What do you see of this Home charity in this place five years or more down the road?" Mary Lou, we would be very happy to hear your answer.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME

(Mary Lou McElroy, (505), Administrator, Eastern Star Home)

Thank you, Brother Earl. Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Guests, Brothers and Sisters.

I have been asked to address this body concerning the current status of the home, but before I can do that I'd like to explore the past for a bit. Back in the late 20's the Order decided to establish a home for the aged and/or needy members on the almost 7 acres acquired of a former avocado nursery. After a great deal of work the Home was opened in March of 1933. At that time there were 8 residents and a staff of 6. The Home continued to grow with more and more residents being admitted during the next 20 years or so. In the mid 50's, it became evident that there was a need to provide nursing care for those residents who were ill or disabled. In the Spring of 1958, our infirmary was opened allowing the home to provide this care. Through the years the infirmary averaged about 12 residents per month at the skilled level.

During the World War II years, staffing became a real problem so many of the residents filled in and helped out with housekeeping, cleaning and cooking tasks. Meals were served family style with dishes and platters being passed to one another and each lady bringing her dishes to the kitchen for washing up. Each lady also assisted in cleaning her room and helping to tidy up the common usage areas of the Home. These practices continued for many years and fulfilled all the necessary criteria established by State Agencies.

In 1966 the Medicare Era began and brought with it major changes in the health care deliver system along with the attendant bureaucracy and red tape. Initially everyone received 100 days of nursing home care. After a 3 day hospital stay. I remember quite distinctly a patient who had a fractured hand and did indeed stay for the 100 days. At that time co-insurance days for nursing homes, which are the 21st through the 100th day, were charged to the patient at \$5.00 per day. All other nursing home costs were paid by Medicare. Physicians meanwhile argued and fought and predicted dire happenings if their patients tried to use Medicare Benefits, but gradually they too accepted the program. The cost factor was still being contained in the late 60's as represented by a typical hospital stay for a fractured hip-\$1,820.00 This represented the services of an orthopedic surgeon, an assistant surgeon, an anesthesiologist, ambulance transportation to the hospital and approximately 5 days stay. Today that figure is just about two-thirds of the amount charged by the orthopedic surgeon with all the other costs having increased to about \$6,800.00

In the 70s sweeping changes occurred in Medicare regulations, along with Federal and State requirements, nursing homes, homes for the

aged, and so-called locked facilities seemed to spring upon every corner. Care was being offered in many varieties, some very good and some really dreadful. The Medi-Cal program went into full swing providing many resources for the older Californian. Some of which allowed them to remain independent for longer periods of time. Medicine, itself made great strides in prolonging life and allowing the individual to look forward to a better and more productive "Golden" age. This, in turn, promoted application for admission to the Home at an older age than had previously been experienced.

All of these changes and advancements have a direct bearing on our Home. Almost 10 years ago when I took the position of Administrator of the Eastern Star Home, one of my regular functions was going into the dining room to give prayer and seeing all the table pretty well filled. Approximately 70 ladies were using the dining room at that time. On the first floor east side the destination "east corridor" was used to indicate that portion of the home where the ladies resided who needed some additional help and assistance to meet the needs of daily living. There were plenty of empty rooms in that area and also in our infirmary where staffing was carried out mainly on the 1st floor. Our census has varied over the years with some years seeing a larger influx of residents and in other years our admissions have not been as plentiful.

Now, however, there are enormous changes in our operation. As of today 35 ladies eat in our dining room. I have had to develop a program to accommodate the special needs of those residents who require a more intense level of care than that which is being offered in our residency. The entire east side of the building, both 1st and 2nds floors have been made into our PC unit-meaning personal care unit, with 2 small dining rooms on each floor to accommodate the special needs of those residents. The infirmary has no vacant beds although both floors are now staffed. We are forced to send our patients to other convalescent homes to receive care. I have spent many agonizing moments worrying over who will become so ill as to be transferred out of the Home.

One of my greatest pleasures has been taking the ladies on different outings throughout the years and I remember well at the outset of these programs we'd fill the bus and on one occasion I had to get 2 buses because so many had wanted to go. Now, I feel really thrilled if 20 sign up for an outing.

You might well ask—WHAT'S HAPPENING? The answer is very simple. The United States has one of the highest standards of living in the world today. Because of this—better nutrition, better housing, preventative medicine and direct intervention in crisis situation, we have the ability to expect and attain great longevity. THIS is what has happened in our Home.

However, if this enormous problem is looked at as an unlimited opportunity not only can we apply our past knowledge but we can utilize our many resources to develop a contemporary environment for the betterment and benefit of all our members. We can expand our services to provide an encompassing health care delivery system such as day care programs, outreach programs, meals-on-wheels programs, and perhaps even direct convalescent home care. With the love and generosity that each and everyone of you have given over the years, not only can we accomplish our goals but we can perhaps rekindle the spirit of fraternalism throughout the state. Thank you.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Mary Lou McElroy, our Eastern Star Home Administrator, we are pleased that you have taken your time this afternoon and shared some of your observations and concerns for our Eastern Star Home.

Sister Mary Lou, from the first day that we met, I felt how fortunate we are to have you as our Administrator. Your knowledge has to be varied for the many demands that are brought to you. I have the highest respect for you as an Administrator, but most of all, as a person. Thank you for taking the time to be here and sharing your thoughts with us

At this time we would like to hear from Nola Bragulla, Vice President, Board of Trustees?

I appointed Brother Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, as Chairman. Brother Del, may we have your report at this time and introduction of the other Committee Members?

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE FUTURE OF OUR HOME

(By Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers: It is with pleasure that I introduce the very capable and hard working members of this Committee, Sister Nola Bragulla and Brother Lloyd Budwig.

This committee is a continuation of the committee formed in 1981, after the findings of the Urban and Rural Systems, Associates or known as URSA Report - we the members of Grand Chapter had the foresight in 1981 to realize that our Eastern Star Home would not or could not be able to handle the changing needs of our members. We are nearing that time and we the members of this committee feel that positive steps must be taken now.

As you already know, from the Report of the Board of Trustees, we are for the year 1986-1987 coming very close to the prediction by URSA for the year 1985, we have had one year extra to work with. The costs and the average age of our residents and their inherent problems are increasing every day. The infirmary is filled to capacity and two of the residents are being taken care of in another facility, which adds additional costs. Medicare takes care of the first 60 days expenses such as room and board after the 60 days the rate is \$70.00 a day, which runs approximately \$2100 dollars a month, in comparison to the costs of total care at the Eastern Star Home of approximately \$1700 a month. We cannot reduce the quality of care our members are now receiving, the only answer is additional income to meet the ever increasing costs.

Our first recommendation is that the Per Capita tax be raised to a realistic figure of \$5.00 per member, and eliminate the Home Assessment. Further, we suggest that the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron stress the needs of the Home at the Official Visits and, also, talk on Wills and Bequests. Grand Lodge has been very successful along these lines, raising \$11,000.000 dollars from one bequest alone. We would like to recommend that a committee be formed, such as the Grand Lodge Committee, on Wills and Bequests.

The needs of our members have exceeded the care capabilities of our Home, we are unable to offer housing to men and to couples at our present location. In addition, we recommend that existing residency requirements be modified to allow some members of the Order to reside in the Home without fully joining the Life Care Program and without being required to turn over all of their assets to the Home. It is suggested that such persons be required to pay an initial entrance fee and to pay a monthly fee at least equal to the full cost of their residency. The Office of Life Care Contracts of the State of California indicated that such an arrangement would be acceptable to them. At this time we

have 15 empty rooms in the West wing and a portion of these could be utilized for this purpose - also, the fee paying resident would not receive any preferential treatment, they would take their meals in the same dining room and participate in the usual activities of the Home the same as the other residents.

Our Home is run most efficiently, thanks to our Administrator, Mrs. McElroy, when you consider that the building is 54 years old and in constant need of repair and maintenance and also, with the realization that it is very difficult to get and keep good employees in view of the fact that our present community location does not yield the type of employees that are necessary for the proper care of the residents and that the transportation system, for the employees use, does not suit our needs.

We encourage the members to make their feelings known regarding the future of the Home in its present location, or perhaps locating elsewhere and how they feel about the type of care now offered, or the type of care we would like to offer.

At this time I would like to present Sister Hildegard Smith, Past Grand Matron and Chairman of the Scholarship Committee who will give her report, present her Committee Members, and present some of the recipients of our Scholarship Awards.

REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

(By Hildegard Smith, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters, Brothers, the Members of our Youth Orders, Scholarship Recipients and Guests.

I am proud to present the members of the 1986 Scholarship Committee: Sisters Katherine B. Hill, Past Grand Matron and Kathleen MacDonald, (195) Past Matron, and Brothers Richard Holsinger (33) and Jay Way, (106) Past Patrons.

The work of this dedicated committee can never be equaled. Without a doubt they have labored more in the many hours of evaluating scholarship applications than any previous committee and I thank them for their unfailing assistance this year.

May I also thank Sisters Diane Silva, Grand Secretary, and Viola Perry, Grand Treasurer, and the Staff of the Grand Chapter Office for the assistance they gave whenever requested.

Have you ever been in a position to feel the reward of a privilege that has been granted to you - that of fulfilling the ambitions and dreams of a deserving few? Well, that is just how we, the members of the Scholarship Committee have felt in our years of service since our appointment. For my own appointment, I sincerely thank Past Grand Matron, Sister Betty Stubblefield. It truly has been a 'learning experience'.

The dreams and ambitions of our applicants...the letters outlining their goals...their eligibility...their needs! All revealing a glimpse into an 'inner self'...some were idealistic, but so many were very realistic.

Every application revealed the financial costs that have so outrageously accelerated in recent years for education. Where, not too many years ago, we could roughly estimate a fine degree being attained for about \$10,000 - today the cost of many of the least expensive colleges is that amount per year. Some colleges and universities have the staggering yearly fees of \$20,000. It is, to put it gently, 'mind-boggling'.

We found that many of our applicants came from single parent homes where one income had to suffice for an entire family.

We found that medical costs in families were draining all their sources of income.

We found the excitement of the highest grade point averages in my service of five years on this committee. Many were more than a 4.0 grade point average which indicate the 100% score. Evaluations were difficult. Priorities, as outlined on applications were carefully and closely followed. It was gratifying to receive an application from a senior citizen of 73 years young...and even more rewarding to re-grant an award to our youngest applicant, who now at the age of 18 is a senior at Harvard University.

How can one, in a few words, describe the elation and excitement of our Committee while reviewing applications such as this?

However, there is a note of distress and concern for the many who applied to us for educational assistance and had to be rejected.

This year, the committee processed more applications than at any time in the recent 5 years. A total of 508 applications were received, 39 were incomplete, 469 were processed by the Committee, 82 received awards, but 426 applications were rejected.

Out of these total we were proud to grant:

41 Awards to our Fraternal Family representing:

15 Job's Daughters

9 Rainbow Girls

4 DeMolay

8 to Eastern Star

5 to ESTARL Applicants

Those of our Fraternal Family who applied represented:

18 Eastern Star

41 Job's Daughters

27 Rainbow Girls

8 DeMolay

26 ESTARL Applicants

We had no applications this year from members of the Masonic Lodges.

It was rewarding to note that we granted one-third of our awards to members of our own Masonic Family.

Although our instruction sheet clearly states that an incomplete application will not be considered and that they would receive no notification, I could not be at ease with my conscience knowing a small postcard might help, so, I did send reminders to almost all on the incomplete list. Many were very appreciative and did respond, however, many did not. We, on the Committee, were appalled at the number of previous recipients who never did exhibit the common courtesy of a 'Thank You' upon being granted an award in 1985 as well as in this year of 1986...and, sad, too, to be aware that many are members of our fraternal families.

It is truly heartbreaking to send over 400 letters of regret to applicants, many with grade point averages of 4.0, simply because we did not have sufficient funds to make these awards.

In reviewing the proceedings of many previous years, we have found that our awards for religious and educational scholarships were originally less than the \$500 we now grant. We also discovered that, at one time, all applications were sent to the Grand Secretary's office for assembly. When all sections had been completed they were mailed to the Chairman for distribution and evaluation by the Committee. Today

the Chairman receives hundreds of envelopes and packets containing the various portions of applications, and holds them for completion and further mailing.

Our Scholarship Committee has complied with all requirements of notification to Job's Daughters Bethels; Rainbow Girls Assemblies; Chapters of DeMolay, and to our own Eastern Star Chapters, informing them of the Scholarships available and including proper instruction with basic requirements.

It is estimated that each Committee Member spends 20 minutes processing the application, and the Chairman totals at least one hour per application.

The Annual Meeting for 1986 was held at the home of the Chairman in San Clemente during the last week of June. An estimated 17 hours was spent in reviewing the applications prior to making the awards.

With only \$41,500 to grant, including \$2,500 for ESTARL - and 469 eligible applicants, one can easily recognize the dilemma and concern of the Committee. It doesn't require a computer to know that there would be very few awards granted by the ratio of available funds to recipients.

We processed every application with great regard. We noted that onefifth of our applications were from other ethnic origins and we granted awards to many in this classification.

Ultimately, we need more funds! We need to meet the challenge offered to us by the increased number of applications from almost every state in our country, and even beyond our United States' limits.

How can this ideological conclusion be achieved? Is it by limiting our applications to ONLY California residents?

Is it by limiting our awards to schools ONLY in California?

Is it by discontinuing awards to graduate students or

Is it by encouraging and accepting financial grants from benefactors who would appreciate public donor recognition?

It really seems senseless to permit our Eastern Star California Scholarship Awards to be made available to applicants from the entire nation when our lack of funds would prohibit the granting of these awards.

The Committee works eagerly to promote the welfare of our recipients but, in all fairness to them and to those whose applications are denied, the time and expense spent is wasted and useless.

I, therefore, suggest that the Worthy Grand Matron of 1987 invite a continuance of study into the scholarship program by the Committees on Finance, Jurisprudence and Constitution and Laws as has been started in this year of 1986 at the request of the Scholarship Committee Chairman, into the feasibility of a tax exempt status through the Internal Revenue Service and the California Franchise Tax Board. This suggestion being made at the recommendation of our Order's Tax Consultant, Brother Steve Doan, as well as our Chairman on Finance, Brother Milton Dales.

I also suggest that the Worthy Grand Matron of 1987 consider that our Scholarship Committee approve only the awards being granted to recipients who are California residents.

It has come to our attention that a publication is readily available throughout the nation that lists the California Eastern Star Scholarship Awards and its requirements.

We in California Eastern Star work diligently to support and give financial aid for our Scholarship awards. It is the opinion of our Committee that we should..."Take care of our own California applicants first."

These, my Sisters and Brothers, are our thoughts and they are YOUR challenges as well as mine...to accelerate our efforts to promote education in our state, our nation, and in the world. We, the members of the Scholarship Committee of 1986 ask for your increased support in 1987 and beyond. We urge that you give generously.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: With your permission may we ask for the acceptance of your report after our Session has been officially opened?

Hildegard Smith, Past Grand Matron, Chairman, Scholarship Committee: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters, Brothers, the members of our Youth Orders, recipients of our Scholarship Awards, and Guests.

I have the privilege of presenting to you an outstanding young lady. One who has addressed us at another time. One who has achieved much in the years since she served as Grand Worthy Advisor in California, Order of Rainbow for Girls in 1977-1978. In that year she was our speaker at our Grand Chapter Session on Youth Night and held us spellbound by her articulate delivery. Today she is a student at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena while pursuing a Master of Divinty Degree. Upon graduation in 1988 she will be ordained as a Presbyterian Pastor.

To help attain her goal she has worked one to two jobs at a time, averaging as many as 30 to 40 hours per week. Then, upon the urging of a member of San Carlos Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, she applied for an Estarl Scholarship Award. From her membership in Rainbow she discovered Eastern Star and became a member of our Order in San Carlos. Her speaking ability has afforded her the opportunity to address many groups at Youth Church Conference and at retreats. The recommendations presented on her behalf assure us that she is highly qualified to be awarded an Estarl Scholarship Grant.

Her Dean states: "She has a deep and open religious commitment with contagious faith. She is spirited and gifted and the investment we will make in her will pay great dividends in the future". What more can we ask?

ADDRESS OF SCHOLARSHIP AWARD RECIPIENT

(Andrea Akers-Messinger, Scholarship Award Recipient)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and many Honored Guests in the East, and my many Eastern Star Sisters, Brothers, and Friends.

It is an honor to be with you this evening. I first came in contact with the Eastern Star as a very gawky, awkward, skinny twelve-year old, as I became an initiate in the Order of Rainbow for Girls. And for the first time, I felt the love, the support, and the warmth of the Order of the Eastern Star, and it was love and support that led me to join your Order very proudly in 1978. I do not know if I can share with you the appreciation for your very generous scholarship award, knowing that these two words come from my heart.

It was my second year in college that I committed my life, my career to serving the Lord Jesus Christ in full-time ministry, which led me to travel overseas widely and to work with different mission agencies. This eventually led me to Fuller Theological Seminary, which is the largest non-denominational seminary in the world, and it trains young men and women in the Bible and theologically to go out and be church leaders in every corner of the world. It is an exciting place to be, and I am very thankful for the studies that I have there. Upon graduation, my husband, who is a Fuller Theological graduate and who is a Presbyterian Pastor, and myself hope to travel overseas as missionaries. We do not know exactly where. We put that in God's hands. But we look forward excitedly to where He leads us.

Presently, my husband and I are working at Silver Lake Presbyterian Church, which is an inner city Presbyterian church in Los Angeles. We see all types of people come through the door from all walks of life, every age, and the one thing most of them have in common is hopelessness, nothing to believe in, a life that has hit them over the head time and time again.

We come in contact with those that come from broken homes; we come in contact with men and women who have been abused emotionally and physically; we see youth who are fighting peer pressure, alcohol, drugs, sex; and the tragedy is that this is not uncommon. It is not the exception, but rather the norm. But, the beauty of the Gospel is that they come in hopelessness, but they meet the Lord Jesus Christ in Scripture, and they go away believing with new hope, a new vitality, a new purpose.

That is why I attend Fuller Theological Seminary, not merely for a degree, not merely for a career, not merely to hang a plaque on the wall that says I have a Master Degree, but because I feel called by the Lord Jesus Christ to serve Him, to be an agent to bring hope to a world that has lost it, to bring the one eternal hope, the message of the Lord Jesus Christ.

I thank you Brothers and Sisters, for sharing that vision, for encouraging me through the years, for having profound impact on my life.

I would like to close by reading to you from the Book of Roman, Chapter 5, 1 and 2. These are the words of Paul, the Apostle Paul: "Therefore, as we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through Our Lord, Jesus Christ: By Whom also we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand."

Hildegard Smith, Past Grand Matron, Chairman, Scholarship Committee: The next recipient of our Scholarship Award is also a native of our Golden State of California and he was born in Anaheim just 19 years ago. He is now attending California State University in Fullerton and his courses include computer programming and electronics. ADDRESS

How sweet it is, my Sisters and Brothers, to be in the great Grand Jurisdiction of California, the land of the most beautiful Eastern Stars in the world; the land that is number one in membership in the Rainbow Girls, and this is something that I was not aware of; and the land of the most beautiful women in the world. My father was a politician; he told me that would always earn applause.

Worthy Grand Matron, Jeraldine and Worthy Grand Patron, Dennis, there is no doubt your year has been a great success, from the many reports we have heard. It is so nice to be here for your "Winter Wonderland" Session and to know that today is the first day of Autumn. Is there anyone here that can tell me how long it is until Christmas?

It has been a pleasure to listen to your members in praise of youth and the Order of the Eastern Star in California. We in General Grand Chapter know this must be due in a great part to your leadership and love for the Order.

We know that your year is coming to an end, but we also know that you will serve for many years to come this beautiful Order of ours, the

Order of the Eastern Star; not only in California but throughout the world will you be known.

It is always an extreme pleasure, my Sisters and Brothers, to share our love and friendship with your lovely lady, Thelma Bailey, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. I must tell you my Sisters and Brothers, that our romance goes back many years. In fact, over twenty years.

It was indeed an honor and a pleasure to escort this lovely lady that, as our Worthy Grand Patron has said, has dedicated her life to the Order of the Eastern Star. I want you to know, Sisters and Brothers, General Grand Chapter is very proud of this lady, and she is known throughout the Eastern Star World as being one of the gems.

Sister Thelma, my love, we do salute you for all the things that you have done, and we cherish your friendship, Sister Lois and I, more than you will ever know. God bless you, lovely lady, for what you are.

Californians have served General Grand Chapter in many ways, and they continue to serve today. Sister Eleanor Marsh, Sister Zoe Harris, and Brother Richard Brassell, Jr., serving as members of the General Grand Chapter Committees, we thank you for this. We also thank you for what you have done and what you will do.

To our General Grand Chapter Officers, it is always so nice to be with each of you; and I am sure the members of California appreciate you for being here. You know, my Sisters and Brothers, when you start up this line, you really dedicate your life to the Order of the Eastern Star, and it is deeply appreciative for these General Grand Chapter Officers for Sister Helen and I, I should say, we're deeply appreciative for each of these members as they travel throughout the Eastern Star World and try to be with us and to visit with you, the great members of the Order of the Eastern Star. You know, my Sisters and Brothers, in Heaven there is Paradise; and on earth, there is California.

Let me ask you this: If you had to select one state to represent this great nation of ours, what state would it be? Of course, it would be California, with your beautiful coastline and beaches, the beautiful snow-capped mountains, redwood forests and deserts, beautiful cities, great industries, and great educational institutions, oil, cattle, agriculture, and then, above all, beautiful people. California, we salute you.

My Sisters and Brothers, about three years ago, Sister Lois, and our two daughters went to Paris, to visit her brother, who works for an oil company there. They went over to visit and, on her first day, I thought I would give her a call and wish her a Happy Birthday, and as you know, our time is quite a bit different between here and England, so I called and got my brother-in-law in England, and he said, "Sorry, they are not

here; they are in Paris, France." He said, "They have gone over there to visit", his wife had gone with them, and he said, "I know what hotel they are staying in, and I have the phone number, and it is so and so." I said, "Give me that, and I will call them."

I called and got the switchboard and, not being able to speak French and the switchboard operator not being able to speak English, we were not getting along too well, but I finally convinced her that I wished to speak to Lois McRoberts. So she rang the room, my wife answered the phone very sleepily, and said "Hello." I said, "Good morning, Mademoiselle, this is your wake-up call." She said, "Thank you", and hung up. So you see, sometimes there is a surprise coming back the other way.

Two years ago, Sister Lois and I were in Georgia. We stopped in Atlanta, and Sister Helen met us there, and we were going on down to Macon. It was raining quite heavily; it was about six o'clock in the evening, and dark. As we were going down the highway, we passed an automobile, and there was a lady out trying to change a tire. I said, "Helen, turn around, go back; let me help that lady." She said "It's raining; you will get your suit wet." I said, "That's all right." It took me about a mile to convince her to turn around and go back. We turned around, and I said to the lady, "let me help you here, and I will get that done." It took about ten minutes, and I was soaked to the bone, and just as I was starting to let the jack down, she tapped me on the shoulder and said, "Sir, would you let the jack down very gently. My husband is in the back seat asleep."

Most of the stories I tell you are true, my Sisters and Brothers.

We have heard from many dignitaries. We have heard from your Grand Chapter Officers about the loss of membership in the Order of the Eastern Star. You know what it is in your own Grand Jurisdiction, but let me tell you, my Sisters and Brothers, let me give you some figures that are inclusive of all the Eastern Star World.

In our last Triennial Session, we lost 133,000 members throughout the Eastern Star World. This averages out 122 members per day, and that is a terrible loss.

I was just in the Grand Jurisdiction of Colorado; they were celebrating their 94th year; and I just sat there and calculated, by the time that they would celebrate their hundredth year, if our losses continued as they are, we would lose another 266,000 members.

Let us pause, if you will, for 15 seconds. (pause for 15 seconds)

Now, let me say this, my Sisters and Brothers. You have never been this way before, the last 15 seconds is gone. It is history and you will never pass that way again.

So let us talk about the future and what we can do to possibly stop this loss of membership that we have in this beautiful Order.

Number one, as our Worthy Grand Patron said today, let us work with the Masons, and let us never forget that we would not exist if it were not for the Masons. Let us go to them and ask them if we can help, not tell them what we will or what we won't do. Let's always ask.

In fact, I want to say this, my Sisters and Brothers, and I usually do not comment too much, but I would like to say that our Worthy Grand Patron today in his report told it like it is.

Now, what else can we do? In most Grand Jurisdictions, I go into the Masonic membership, and sometimes it is almost double that of the Eastern Star, and I understand there are about 176,000 Masons in this Grand Jurisdiction, and I believe your membership is 98,000, or something in that neighborhood.

Let me say this to you, my Sisters and Brothers, let us go to these Masons, their wives, their daughters, and all those that are eligible to be members of the Eastern Star and ask them to be members. There is nothing in the world wrong with this, because they are already eligible for membership in the Order of the Eastern Star. Will this work? I can tell you from experience that it will.

Our Junior Past Worthy Matron, in little Tombstone, Arizona, population of about 900 to 1,000 people set her goals to get 10 new members in her year, and she not only got 10, she got 12. Where did she get them? She got them right out of the Blue Lodge. She went and talked to them, she asked them to become members, and we do have 12 new members, thanks to this lovely lady for the work that she did. If we took the total registration here and each of you got two new members next year, just think what we would have just in this Jurisdiction.

I made the same remark in Minnesota, and our Sister Pat Rasmusson here will verify what I'm going to tell you. I spoke in the morning, the Grand Master spoke that afternoon. As he was leaving the East, the Worthy Grand Matron told him, she said, "Just a moment, the Most Worthy Grand Patron said it was all right for us to ask someone to become members of the Order of the Eastern Star, and I happen to know that you are not a member, and I am asking you to become a member. He said, "There is only one thing wrong," and she said, "What is that?" and he said, "I don't have a petition," and she said, "Here it is."

I want to tell you this, Sisters and Brothers, there is hope, because I see this as I travel throughout the different Grand Jurisdictions, this makes the eighth Grand Master that is a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and I want to tell you, we didn't used to see that. In fact, in Colorado, the present Worthy Grand Patron just installed is a Past

Grand Master of Colorado, and I'm seeing more and more of this, and I want to say to you that I believe, this is my sincere belief as I travel about, that the Masons have finally realized what the Eastern Star can and will do for them. I want to ask you, my Sisters and Brothers, to go to them, but always ask, don't tell what you want to do.

Then, too, we must work with the Youth Groups, and I was amazed to see the numbers of members that stood here this evening. I want to tell you, the youth of today is a message which we will send the future, of which the majority of us will never see. The youth of today, my Sisters and Brothers, they ask of us to set them an example, to work with them. In fact, they beg us to do this. We must work with them.

I tell you, at this time, I want to interject something here, and I don't usually do this: There is a Worthy Patron, here, by the name of Don Farris; and a Worthy Matron, by the name of Jeanie Farris; I do not know the Chapter. He is 29 years old, I don't know how old his sister is, his Worthy Matron, but he told me here this evening that his average age on the floor is 23, and I want to tell you, Don and Jean, I have given my card to the Worthy Grand Patron, and he will give that to you, and I want you to invite me to your Chapter before you go out of office, and if it is in any way possible, I will be there to visit you.

My Sisters and Brothers, we need young people, and we need them very, very much.

Publicity; Publicity is one of the greatest things in the world that we can use to let the world know what we are, and what we stand for, and what we do. I want to tell you, if you ever have the opportunity to hear the Past Grand Master of Ohio, Jerry Rasin, please do; go out of your way to hear this man.

I would like to see a bumper sticker that would read thus: "I am proud to be an American. I am proud to be a Christian. And I am proud to be a Mason or an Eastern Star," whatever the case might be.

In Ohio, let me tell you what the Masons are doing there: They are going on radio, they are going on TV, and they're going into the newspapers, and they are telling the world what the Masonic Order stands for. They not only are doing this, they are opening their Lodge one day out of the year, and they are inviting the public to come and see what they are and what they stand for.

In addition to this, they are going to sponsor the Special Olympics for the whole State of Ohio this next year. In addition to this, they are wearing a badge, and I'm speaking of the Masons, and it reads thus: "YWMAGM." When everyone inquires as to what this is, it says, "You would make a good Mason." As all good Masons know, we cannot ask someone to become a member of a Masonic Lodge, but you know what? This isn't asking; this is telling.

We have got to change, Sisters and Brothers. We have got to change, not a whole lot, but we do have to change some things that we do.

In Minnesota, the Grand Master there, he went to the Governor and asked the Governor to declare a Masonic Day. In addition to this, they are following suit as to what Ohio had done, they are opening their Lodges and inviting the public to come down one day out of the year.

I'll tell you another thing that they do in Minnesota that I think is wonderful, each Chapter has a project in their city or in their town, wherever they're located. It might be for the schools, Salvation Army, for the sick, or whatever. And when I heard the Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge say last night that the Masons of California are going to have a float in the Rose Parade.

We need to let the world know what we are and what we stand for and what we do, the greatest group of people in the world.

I also have a message for you to take back to your minister in your own church: I want you to go back to your churches, and I want you to go to your minister, and I want you to tell him that you are a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and that you are proud of it, and that we support ESTARL, and nine times out of ten, he is going to ask you what the ESTARL is, and you tell him what it is, and then, my Sisters and Brothers, you tell him we, the members of the Order of the Eastern Star, have contributed thirteen and a half million dollars to ESTARL.

Then there is a couple of other things that I would like to say, and I would like to hear us stop saying. We have never done it that way before." So what? Let's try something new and try and see if that does not work.

Then you hear, "Well, we can't do that," or "It is impossible." I want to tell you, my Sisters and Brothers, there is nothing that is impossible. Do you know that the Wright Brothers would have never gotten off the ground if they would have had the computer in their day, because the computer says that that plane would not fly! That is true.

How many of you believe that a blind person could beat Jack Nicklaus in a game of golf? As you know, Jack Nicklaus won the Masters in the Grand Jurisdiction in Georgia, and when he returned back to Ohio, he supports a blind institution there, and there was a young man, 16 years old, that had been taking golf lessons, a blind person, and he challenged Jack Nicklaus to a game of golf. And Jack said, "Young Man, you don't know what you're talking about. I am the greatest golfer in the world. I just won the Masters. I've won all kinds of tournaments. You just don't know what you're speaking of."

The young man said, "Please, I beg you, play me a game of golf." He said, "In addition to that, Jack, I want to bet you \$5.00 a hole." And Jack said, "Wait, you did not hear what I said. I just won the Masters. I'm one of the greatest golfers of all time." The young man pleaded with him, and finally Jack said, "Well, okay, what time will we tee off?" And the young man said, "midnight tonight."

So you see, things are not impossible. All we have to do, my Sisters and Brothers, is to go out of our way and work a little bit, and we will stop this loss. I am confident of that.

Associate Grand Matron and Associate Grand Patron, I am sorry that I will not be here for your installation. We wish the best for you, and we know that you will carry the flag high for the Order of the Eastern Star in California. God bless each of you for carrying on this great work.

Then, you know, my Sisters and Brothers, we want all of you to come to Georgia in '88 and I am sure that the news that was announced here today that all of you will be there. Sister Helen, our Most Worthy Grand Matron, has done wonders. The Grand Jurisdiction of Georgia is really going out of its way to make sure that you will have a wonderful time in Georgia. I extend her greetings to you.

I believe she will visit you next year, and I wish to leave you, my Sisters and Brothers, with this thought of how much I have enjoyed being here, getting to know each of you just a little bit better.

God bless you for what you are, for what you have been, and for what you will be, great members of the Order of the Eastern Star. Thank you.

REPORT ON CANCER PROJECT OF GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER

Sister Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron, Brother Dennis Jordan, Worthy Grand Patron, General Grand Chapter Committee Members, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers.

The Cancer Project Committee of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star appointed for the 1986-1987-1988 Triennium by Sister Helen Roquemore Cox is composed of twelve members, ten from the United States and two from Canada. It was my privilege to be selected to assist the Grand Chapter of California, Nevada, Oregon, Idaho and Arizona. Our purpose is to promote the awareness of the needs and help for cancer patients, be it individual monetary aid, contributions towards cancer research, or the making and distribution of cancer dressings.

Throughout the ages and most of our lives the age old question still remain; "Why? What? When?" Cancer is a word that brings instant fear. In the past the word meant "Incurable" with little or no hope at all. Today the situation has taken a turnabout. Our individual attitudes and approaches have taken new hope and encouragement. Science and medicine have given us this hope. More and more people are joining together from all over the world in the fight against cancer.

We in California, Order of the Eastern Star are helping in our support with the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Project and the Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations. To aid in raising funds for the various projects the General Grand Chapter Project Committee Members are urging the sale of very attractive cancer pins (a horseshoe with a four leaf clover "For the Cure of Cancer:). These pins are on sale at this 1986 Session of Grand Chapter in the lobby by some of the 1975 Past Matrons and Past Patrons for the sum of \$3.00 each. All proceeds after expenses will be sent by Sister Diane Silva, Grand Secretary, who forward them to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary in Washington, D.C. Here they are recorded for the Triennium record and then the funds are immediately returned to California for our own J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations projects. They will also be sold in 1986-1987 Grand Chapter years by the members of these committees in the chapters throughout the state.

I wish to thank Sister Alice Wilburn, Past Matron, who has acted as my Secretary in the correspondence and the handling of the funds received. Also, my sincere and loving thanks to the 1975 and 1980 Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons and others who assisted with the selling of the pins in California. I am happy to report that we have forwarded

to the Grand Secretary the amount of \$2,000 which has been divided evenly between our J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and the Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations Fund.

Sisters and Brothers, this is what Eastern Star is all about. This is people helping people, our own Sisters and Brothers. Won't you help with your donations, big or small? Every bit helps.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you for sharing some information with us on your important committee. Cancer continues to touch the lives of many of our members, whose burdens are lightened by the work you are doing.

REPORT OF HEART RESEARCH FUND COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, General Grand Chapter Officers, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers.

About one year ago at a meeting with Sister Jerry a plan was formulated to raise the awareness of the chapters in California to the Heart Research Project. At that time I requested the assistance of the Deputy Grand Matrons. With Sister Jerry's help the theme of "Be a California Heart Throb" was adopted. In January, at the brush up schools, I was given the opportunity to speak to the Deputies on this most important project and distributed somewhere around 5,000 Heart shaped key rings for them to sell in their districts. I also request that when they speak to the members of our Eastern Star they talk about our California Fund for Heart Research. One goal was to sell our key rings, but a further and almost more important goal was to remind our members that it is only through their donations that the medical community can continue on the long road toward reducing the threat of heart disease that hangs over so many.

And so we began. February was declared Heart Research month. By March we were well on our way and each month the donations have continued as members have remembered this fund with memorials for our loved ones who have gone ahead of us.

Sister Jerry, my thanks to you for your support this year. When I asked the Deputies to help, many responded far above my expectations. I have enjoyed my correspondence with these ladies. One particularly sticks in my mind as her last letter reported that her infant grandson was recovering nicely from open heart surgery that had saved his life - real proof that heart research does make a difference.

A project like this takes many people to make it a success. The Deputies I have already mentioned. Sister Diane Silva and her super staff, particularly Sister Flora Silvey, who not only sold key rings, as a Deputy Grand Matron, but kept our records. I would also like this Grand Chapter to know of the support given this project by the Peninsula "Happy Crew of '82." At a dinner sponsored by this group, over \$500 was raised for heart research and medically related projects. My thanks to them and everyone who helped.

Now for the commercial. If you can't answer the following question with a "yes," visit our table in the main lobby. The question is, "Are you a California Heart Throb?" If not, why not?

It is my pleasure to report to this Grand Chapter that \$31,100 is now available for distribution to a Heart Research Project to be selected by our Worthy Grand Matron at the close of this Grand Chapter year.

Again, Sister Jerry, my thanks for your support and the opportunity to serve this year.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Fran Groat, I want to thank you and I will be pleased to receive this report this evening, and we will process it in the morning. I want to tell you how much I appreciated you accepting this Chairmanship, because you truly have put your heart in it. You have such enthusiasm and a bubbling personality. I just can't believe that every person in this Grand Chapter Room would not want to be a California Heart Throb after meeting you.

I want to thank the Deputy Grand Matrons and the 1982 Associations throughout the state who have had special projects to assist you. We thank you for your efforts for this most deserving project.

These Sisters and Brothers have spent many hours calling on our members who have sought our aid, they have traveled many miles and have worked hard for our cause. My sincere thanks to each of these fine members for all their time so willingly given.

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Dennis Jordan it has been an honor to have served with you this year and we thank you both for all you have done to benefit this fund.

Many thanks to our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva and her staff for all their cheerful help.

During the Grand Chapter year July 1, 1985 through June 30, 1986 bills have been paid for 99 applicants totaling \$150,743. Of this \$63,570 was for hospital care, \$61,699 for doctors and nurses and \$25,504 for medicine, drugs and services. There were 55 new applicants of which 3 were non-members during this time.

The contributions for this period were \$137,956. Among the contributions were \$44,808.56 from the estate of Sister Violet Brooks, \$2,000 from the estate of Brother Leon Miller, \$4,643.66 from Bell Chapter, which includes \$2,100 from Brother James Kelso on his nut sale, \$2,000 from the Starlighters Association in memory of Sister Mary Balden, Past Grand Matron. There were many more contributions

from projects and memorials that went direct to the Grand Chapter office and for these contributions a heartfelt thanks.

Since July 1, 1986 to September 15, 1986 bills have been paid in the amount of \$45,137.93 and contributions were \$26,587.16 and there were 14 new applications of which one was a non-member.

To be eligible for aid you must be a member in good standing of a California Chapter for at least two years. If you or a member of your immediate family is ill with cancer, and the cost of care is beyond your means, contact the Worthy Matron of your Chapter. Almost as important as paying the bills incurred is the peace of mind and relief that the approval of an application gives to an ill Sister or Brother, knowing that help is available and that we care.

This is not a Charity. It is made possible by the fraternal love of our members through their voluntary contributions and the many projects they work on.

We must remember this fund was started to help those that have insufficient funds to cope with the ever increasing costs of medical care.

I am grateful for this rewarding opportunity to serve our members through this fund and with these loyal committee members.

With the precept of our great Order, we will always stand ready to assist our Sisters and Brothers who seek aid through the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and we thank you, the members of California for making it possible.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL CANCER DRESSING STATIONS COMMITTEE

(By Winona McNitt, P.M. (264), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

I have the pleasure of presenting the two Co-Chairmen of the Memorial Cancer Dressing Station Fund: Sisters Doris Letts, El Petrol-Service Chapter No. 414, Long Beach and Catherine Scott, El Camino Chapter No. 428, Sacramento. Thank you for giving us the opportunity to serve you this year.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, it is a pleasure to present you with these Awards on behalf of the American Cancer Society. They wish to express their appreciation for the many hours of work given by the members of the Order of the Eastern Star toward the relief of Cancer patients.

In May of 1985, all the Cancer Dressing Stations in the state were closed for lack of funds. Many, many members, Chapters and Associations gave very generously to the Fund and most of the Stations reopened in September. This crisis caused us to seriously examine the workings of this committee.

Although the Committee is mandated by our Constitution to provide dressings for CANCER PATIENTS ONLY... we found that over the years this practice had gradually eroded.

For many years the Eastern Star and Masonic Homes received items made in Cancer Dressing Stations and paid for by our Fund. The Dressing Station at the Eastern Star Home made bed pads that were used only at the Home, and many more were sent in from other Stations.

IN 1984-1985 there were 53,000 bed pads made in ALL THE STATIONS IN CALIFORNIA, 38,000 ALMOST THREE-FOURTHS OF THE BED PADS WENT TO THE EASTERN STAR HOME. The cost of the cellu-cotton in the bed pads alone was \$33,000!! In addition 22,000 dressings were sent to the Home at a minimum cost of an additional \$4,400. Thirty-eight percent of our Fund was used for the Home which DOES NOT HAVE ONE CANCER PATIENT IN RESIDENCE.

After conferring with our Worthy Grand Matron, the Stations were notified, in December that the Fund no longer pay for dressings supplied to the Masonic and Eastern Star Homes. They had already received 4300 bed pads and more than 12,000 dressings. We continue to supply the Home with terry bibs, hospital gowns, lap robes, and washable bed pads at no cost to the Fund.

To help save more money, only the cheaper grade of gauze, which costs \$43.70 per roll, was used for all dressings at a saving of \$8.05 per roll. With the cooperation of the Station Chairmen we were able to cut the cost of materials used to \$56,043 WHICH IS MORE THAT \$37,000 LESS THAN LAST YEAR!!! Your generous donations totaled \$111,454 which gave us a balance at the END OF THIS YEAR OF \$73.957.

We wish to thank the many members and groups throughout the state who work each year to help our Fund. The San Diego and East Bay Breakfasts and the San Francisco Silver Tea at Sister Jane Donovan's home are the largest sources of money. We appreciate the continuing support of Past Grand Matrons Marguerite Weisheimer, Florence Dunn, Lilas Haug, Patricia Quibell, Fern Hammond and their Associations.

Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron introduced the Cancer Dressing Stations to the Order of the Eastern Star in California thirty years ago. California is the only state where the American Cancer Society provides free dressings statewide to cancer patients. All dressings are made in Eastern Star Cancer Dressing Stations. Your donations of both money and time made it possible for the Cancer Dressing Stations to provide 349,323 dressings (bed pads, prothesis, etc.) to 11,747 cancer patients this year! Only 195 patients had any Eastern Star or Masonic relation.

The attendance in our 96 Dressing Stations averaged 1,761 workers who gave a total of 67,182 volunteer hours. My thanks and congratulations to each one who helped to write this outstanding record of service.

Sisters and Brothers, one person in every three of you will develop cancer during your lifetime. This year there will be 92,000 new cases of cancer in California. Each one of us has lost someone we love to this dread disease which not only shortens life, but causes additional suffering because of the devastating cost of treatment.

Have you any idea how expensive it is to buy dressings? A San Diego patient was paying \$45 per week for the many types of dressings and bed pads that she needed. When an elderly widow, on Social Security, received her dressings she told how grateful she was that she would no longer have to choose between the dressings she needed and FOOD. One patient received 4,400 free dressings this year, another 2,350.

Medicare did not help. A letter from a daughter nursing her mother told of her frustration with all the hands that reached out to take the money they had. She said that the only hands who reached out to give were the members of the Order of the Eastern Star with their free dressings.

How can you help? Sisters and Brothers we need your help.

- Please continue to support the Cancer Dressing Stations with your gifts of both money and time.
- 2. It is possible that you know someone who needs dressings. Tell them to call your Worthy Matron, or the American Cancer Society about free dressings from the Order of the Eastern Star.
- 3. You do not have to be destitute to receive dressings. These dressings are not "charity". This is our way of showing the world that the Order of the Eastern Star "cares". Thousands of people first learned of our Order when they received a package of dressings marked by our "STAR".
- Include information about the free Order of the Eastern Star dressings in your Chapter and Blue Lodge bulletins. Many of our older members do not attend meetings but could use this information.
- 5. Contact the Hospice group in your community and make them aware of this program.

Four Stations closed this year, Napa, The Eastern Star Home, Southern Star, and Past Matrons of South West Chapter. Five stations have sent no reports for two years and are assumed to be closed: Mt. INSTRUCTIONS TO THE VOTING DELEGATES

(By Walter Hammond, P.P. (636), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members and Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session.

The following instructions will assist you in our voting procedure. Our Constitution and Laws provide that every Chapter in California is equal in voting power to every other Chapter. Each Chapter is entitled to one vote for each of its top four officers - if it has such officers duly installed. Each Chapter also has one collective vote for Past Matrons and one collective vote for Past Patrons. If a Past Matron, entitled to a full vote as a line officer, Deputy Grand Matron, Grand Officer or Past Grand Officer., is the only Past Matron of the Chapter attending, she is also entitled to the Past Matron's vote. The same is true of the Past Patron's vote. (With the exception of the Deputy Grand Matron Part). Every delegate must be seated in the properly marked sections to vote. It is especially important for the voting Past Matrons and the Voting Past Patrons and others to be in their proper sections so their ballots can be collected. If there are voting Past Matrons among the Grand Representatives, they can cast their ballots with the Deputy Grand Matrons. If there are voting Past Matrons or Past Patrons among the Inner or Outer Guards who are on duty their ballots will be collected by Election Board Members when returning to the Board Room providing they will cast their ballot in the arena.

You are not to leave your seat to vote, the ballot containers will be passed to you. As the ballot container is passed, you will deposit your ballot or ballots in it. When writing your ballot, you will not vote for any candidate who has already been elected by unanimous ballot, but only for those offices for which there is more than one candidate. Make sure that you write the name of the candidate you desire to vote for in the proper space and section of the ballot. Mark your ballot properly to make sure it will be counted. If you are entitled to cast more than one ballot, mark each of the ballots correctly. Please remain in your seats as the business of Grand Chapter will continue while the ballots are being collected and counted. Be sure to separate the ballot so that you have the proper numbered ballot section.

On a ballot vote to amend any legislation the Constitution requires a two-thirds majority to pass.

There will be two members to be elected as a Trustee to the Eastern Star Home Board for the North

There will be two member(s) to be elected as a Trustee to the Eastern Star Home Board from the South.

Because of an unexpired term of a Trustee in the North the following conditions will prevail.

The candidate receiving the largest number of votes will be elected to the longest term and the candidate with the next largest number of votes will complete the unexpired term.

The Election Board will now retire to pick up the ballot containers and report to their stations.

Jeraldine Southward, Worthy Grand Matron: Prior to declaring the ballot open, it has come back to me that many of our delegates are not sure which person is which. I hate to bother those candidates again, but I think we should bring to the attention of everyone, who each one is. So if they would come forward once again.

As I call your name, I would like for you to step forward. I believe we should have seven: Charles Bridges, who is presently serving on the Board of Trustees; Lila Hummel; Milton Dales; Edna Ree, Warren Wildman P.G.P.; Connie Harrington; and Dee Larry West. The ones on your right are from the North and the ones on your left are from the South. There will be two from the North and two from the South elected.

I now declare the ballot open, and you will now remember that you are voting on two from the South and two from the North.

REPORT OF THE CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE

The members of the Consolidation Committee probably have one of the most rewarding duties of any of the Grand Chapter committees. This has been a busy year for our committee. Two meeting were held early in the year, one in the North and one in the South. We were pleased to have our Worthy Grand Matron and our Worthy Grand Patron attend the Southern meeting. These discussion meetings helped greatly to make us all aware of just how much misunderstanding and misinformation there has been over the State regarding our Consolidation procedure. Knowing that it is difficult to accept what you do not understand this committees' first concern this year has been to thoroughly explain the process of consolidation to every Chapter requesting information. In all Chapters we visited we found a few determined members who, year after year, hold offices and work hard to keep the Chapter together. These Chapters find themselves left behind as changing times and the fast pace of todays lifestyle rushes by. In most cases by the time this committee is contacted for information and assistance the Chapter has long since exhausted all other means of survival. In these Chapters, we have not only made sure that the process of consolidation is thoroughly understood, we have also acknowledged the courage and strength the members have found in their decision to take this difficult step. We want these Chapters to feel comfortable with their decision and to be reassured that consolidation is not the end of a Chapter, but rather it can be a new beginning.

We have also been asked for assistance from Chapters who have received a proposal from a struggling Chapter requesting to be considered for consolidation. These stronger Chapters are generally doing well and have never thought about consolidating. Here too we have supplied information, answered questions and explained the consolidation procedure so that knowledgeable consideration could be given to the proposal.

In February it was my privilege, together with Past Grand Matron, Sister Ferne Hammond, to speak on the subject of consolidation to the Chapters in the San Francisco area. We were grateful for the large representation from all the Chapters and much of the evening was devoted to questions and answers. We believe that everyone gained a clearer understanding and a better attitude about consolidation and feel that this type of discussion evening would be beneficial in other parts of the State.

My sincere appreciation to our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva and her efficient staff for all of their assistance and prompt answers to my many questions. May I also extend a special thank you to Sister June Lucretia Barnum, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee. Her insight and comprehension of our Laws and her willingness to share this knowledge has been an invaluable help to me this year.

Worthy Grand Matron, I may blow my allotted three minutes with this last minute addition to this report, but I must express this committees' appreciation to our Sister Thelma Bailey for her remarks last night on the need for Consolidations and her reference to the song "We Belong Together".

Remember Sisters and Brothers this Grand Chapter has a very dedicated Consolidation Committee and we are here to help you join together in an unified effort to strengthen our Eastern Star in California.

Since our last Grand Chapter Session we have completed six consolidations with three more scheduled for completion in November. There are presently three consolidations pending.

This Committee is proud of each Chapter that has found the strength to Consolidate this year and I wish I could take the time to name and introduce them all.

A complete list has been included with this report. Each member of this committee is working on, or has completed, at least one consolidation this year. I thank them all for their dedicated service to our Chapters and for their kindnesses to me, as their Chairman.

Thank you Worthy Grand Matron for your support of our committee. It has been our pride and pleasure to serve you and our Grand Chapter this year. We hope that our accomplishments have been to your satisfaction.

PROPOSED REVISION OF SECTION 73 OF THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS:

SEC. 73. FINANCE. TO THE END THAT THE FINANCIAL AFFAIRS OF GRAND CHAPTER SHALL BE EFFICIENTLY, PRUDENTLY, UNIFORMLY, AND EXPEDITIOUSLY ADMINISTERED, IT IT HEREBY DECLARED TO BE THE POLICY OF

GRAND CHAPTER THAT THIS COMMITTEE SHALL HAVE AND EXERCISE FULL AUTHORITY AND CONTROL OVER ALL FINANCIAL MATTERS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER, INCLUDING THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA (EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED IN THIS CONSTITUTION AND LAWS), IT SHALL BE THE DUTY OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE:

(1) TO PREPARE THE ANNUAL GRAND CHAPTER BUDGET AND FORWARD IT TO THE GRAND SECRETARY AT LEAST NINETY (90) DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL SESSION OF THE GRAND CHAPTER. SHE SHALL THEN DISTRIBUTE IT IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 113 OF THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS. ALL BUDGETS SHALL BE IN ITEMIZED FORM AND SHALL INCLUDE A BUDGET FOR THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA PREPARED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION 73, THE WORDS "SUB-SIDIARY ORGANIZATIONS" SHALL MEAN ANY MEMBER OR MEMBERS OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR WHO, AS A GROUP, CONSORTIUM, ALLIANCE, OR OTHERWISE, UNDERTAKE TO SPONSOR, PROMOTE, OR PARTICIPATE IN ANY PROJECT OR UNDERTAKING IN THE NAME OF, OR FOR THE BENEFIT OF, THE GRAND CHAPTER OF CALIFORNIA, OR ANY OF ITS CHARITABLE OR BENEFICENT PROJECTS, OR IN THE NAME OF OR FOR THE BENEFIT OF ANY GROUP, CONSORTIUM OR ALLIANCE OF SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS OR ANY CHARITABLE OR BENEFICENT PROJECT IN WHICH THE GROUP, CONSORTIUM, OR ALLIANCE IS ENGAGED.

- (2) TO PRESENT THE PROPOSED BUDGETS TO THE GRAND CHAPTER AT THE FOLLOWING SESSION OF THE GRAND CHAPTER, NOT LATER THAN 11:00 O'CLOCK A.M. ON THE LAST DAY OF THE SESSION: AND TO PRESENT A SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET TO COVER THE ITEMS THAT MAY BE APPROPRIATED DURING THE SESSION.
- (3) TO APPROVE ALL EXPENDITURES OF MONEYS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER: AND, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE, TO APPROVE ALL CONTRACTS ENTERED INTO AND TO APPROVE ANY FINANCIAL OBLIGATION INCURRED BY OR ON BEHALF OF GRAND CHAPTER: PROVIDED SUCH APPROVAL SHALL NOT BE REQUIRED IN THE EVENT THE GRAND CHAPTER HAS BY RESOLUTION, SPECIFICALLY AUTHORIZED AND APPROVED SUCH EXPENDITURES OR SUCH EXPENDITURES HAVE BEEN SPECIFICALLY PROVIDED FOR IN THE BUDGET ADOPTED BY GRAND CHAPTER.

- (4) IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE COMMITTEE ON JURIS-PRUDENCE, TO APPROVE THE CONTRACT NEGOTIATED BY THE ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE FOR THE NEXT ENSUING GRAND CHAPTER SESSION. (SEC. 78) (SEC. 86(b)). THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE SHALL APPROVE ANY PROPOSED CONTRACTS REGARDING SERVICES OR FUNCTIONS PERTAINING TO GRAND CHAPTER ACTIVITIES PRIOR TO ANY COMMITMENT BY THE GENERAL CHAIRMAN OF GRAND CHAPTER WEEK OR ANY OTHER MEMBER OF ANY GRAND CHAPTER WEEK COMMITTEE.
- (5) TO FUNCTION DURING THE ENTIRE YEAR AND HOLD BI-MONTHLY MEETINGS DURING THE YEAR AT SUCH PLACES AS THE CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE OR A MAJORITY OF SAID COMMITTEE MAY DEEM ADEQUATE AND PROPER IN THE BEST INTERESTS TO CONDUCT THE AFFAIRS OF GRAND CHAPTER, EXCEPT THAT THE SAID COMMITTEE SHALL HOLD ONE SUCH MEETING WITH THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA AT LOS ANGELES, AND ONE SUCH MEETING WITH THE FOLLOWING GRAND OFFICERS IN ATTENDANCE: WORTHY GRAND MATRON, WORTHY GRAND PATRON, ASSOCIATE GRAND MATRON, ASSOCIATE GRAND PATRON, GRAND CONDUCTRESS, ASSOCIATE GRAND CONDUC-TRESS, AND NECESSARY MEETINGS DURING THE SESSION OF GRAND CHAPTER. ALL DECISIONS AND ACTIONS BY THE COMMITTEE SHALL BE BY THE CONSENT AND AP-PROVAL OF A MAJORITY OF ALL MEMBERS PRESENT AND VOTING, UNLESS OTHERWISE PROVIDED.
- (6) TO SELECT AND RETAIN A PROFESSIONAL INVEST-MENT COUNSELOR(S) WHOSE DUTY IT WILL BE TO SUPER-VISE ALL INVESTMENTS MADE AND HELD BY THE GRAND CHAPTER. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COUNSELOR(S) ON INVESTMENTS, REINVESTMENTS, PURCHASES, SALES AND EXCHANGES SHALL BE MADE TO THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE WHO SHALL TAKE ACTION BY MAJORITY VOTE OF ALL VOTING MEMBERS PRESENT. ALL SUCH ACTION SHALL BE TAKEN ONLY UPON THE APPROVAL AND DIREC-TION OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE, EXCEPT THAT IN THE EVENT AN EMERGENT RECOMMENDATION OF SUCH COUNSELOR(S) REQUIRES ACTION BEFORE THE NEXT SCHEDULED MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE. ACTION MAY BE TAKEN WITH THE CONCURRENCE OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE, THE GRAND TREASURER AND TWO OTHER MEMBERS OF THE COMMIT-TEE ON FINANCE.

(7) TO DETERMINE AND DIRECT, BETWEEN THE SES-SIONS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER ALL MATTERS OF THE INVESTMENT AND REINVESTMENT OF ALL FUNDS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER AND EASTERN STAR HOMES, BOTH GENERAL AND SPECIAL, INCLUDING THE LIQUIDATION OF ANY ASSETS THEREOF DEEMED ADVISABLE, TO RECEIVE ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY FOR THE EASTERN STAR ENDOWMENT FUND FROM MEMBERS UPON ENTER-ING THE HOME AS RESIDENTS, AND TO ADMINISTER ALL MATTERS RELATING THERETO, IT IS HEREBY DECLARED TO BE THE POLICY OF THE GRAND CHAPTER TO INVEST AND REINVEST ITS SURPLUS FUNDS TOGETHER WITH THE PROCEEDS OF ANY SALES, LIQUIDATION OR MATURITIES OF ANY ASSETS OR OTHER PROCEEDS AVAILABLE FOR INVESTMENT UNDER THE GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE "PRUDENT MANRULE" PERMITTED IN THE STATE OF CALI-FORNIA FOR INVESTMENTS BUT LIMITED GENERALLY TO THE FOLLOWING:

INVESTMENT OF FUNDS: THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE OF SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS SHALL INVEST THEIR FUNDS, EXCLUSIVE OF TEMPLE PROPERTY OR TEMPLE SECURITIES AS FOLLOWS:

- A. AT LEAST TWENTY PERCENT (20%) OF THE FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR INVESTMENT MUST BE IN:
 - a. CASH AND/OR BANK ACCOUNTS.
 - b. OBLIGATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES OR THOSE FOR THE PAYMENT OF WHICH THE FAITH OF THE UNITED STATES IS PLEDGED.
 - c. OBLIGATIONS OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA AND ITS POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS, PROVIDED THEY WERE ISSUED PURSUANT TO LAW AND THAT THE FAITH AND CREDIT OF SUCH MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OR DISTRICT IS PLEDGED FOR THEIR PAYMENT.
 - d. SUCH EVIDENCE OF CORPORATE INDEBTEDNESS AS IS RATED "A" OR BETTER BY STANDARD AND POORS CORPORATION OR MOODY'S INVESTORS SERVICE, AND SHARES OF QUALIFIED INVESTMENT FUNDS WHOSE INVESTMENTS ARE LIMITED TO SHORT TERM UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT SECURITIES, BANK CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT, BANKERS' ACCEPTANCES COMMERCIAL PAPER, REPURCHASE AGREEMENTS, AND COMPA-

RABLE SECURITIES. EXCEPT WITH RESPECT TO UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT SECURITIES, A QUALIFIED INVESTMENT FUND SHALL HAVE NO SECURITY INVESTMENT WHICH SHALL HAVE A MATURITY DATE EXCEEDING ONE YEAR.

e. SAVINGS ACCOUNTS IN AND INVESTMENT CER-TIFICATES ISSUED BY FEDERAL CHARTERED BANKS INSURED BY THE FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSUR-ANCE CORPORATION, (FDIC) AND FEDERAL CHAR-TERED SAVINGS AND LOAN ASSOCIATIONS IN-SURED BY THE FEDERAL SAVINGS AND LOAN IN-SUR ANCE CORPORATION. (FSLIC) ORGANIZED AND EXISTING UNDER THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA WHICH IS AN INSURED INSTITUTION AS DEFINED BY TITLE IV OF THE NATIONAL HOUS-ING ACT, AND SHARES ISSUED BY ANY FINANCIAL INSTITUTION WHICH ISSUES NO INVESTMENT CER-TIFICATES AND WHICH IS A FEDERAL INSURED IN-STITUTION AS DEFINED BY SAID TITLE IV. BUT IN THE CASE OF EACH INSTITUTION ONLY TO THE EXTENT THAT SUCH ACCOUNTS, INVESTMENT CER-TIFICATES OR SHARES ARE INSURED BY THE FED-ERAL INSURANCE CORPORATIONS, FDIC OR FSLIC.

B. UP TO TWENTY PERCENT (20%) MAY BE INVESTED IN:

a. OTHER EVIDENCES OF INDEBTEDNESS, WHICH ARE OR WILL BE FULLY LISTED AND REGISTERED ON AN EXCHANGE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION AS A NATIONAL SECURITIES EXCHANGE, EXCEPT THAT THIS LISTING REQUIREMENT SHALL NOT APPLY TO EVIDENCES OF INDEBTEDNESS OF CORPORATIONS WHOSE COMMON STOCK IS ELIGIBLE FOR INVESTMENT UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION C (a) HEREOF.

b. PREFERRED STOCKS, WHICH ARE OR WILL BE FULLY LISTED AND REGISTERED ON AN EXCHANGE OR REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION AS A NATIONAL SECURITIES EXCHANGE, EXCEPT THAT THIS LISTING REQUIREMENT SHALL NOT APPLY TO PREFERRED STOCKS OF CORPORATIONS WHOSE COMMON STOCK IS ELIGIBLE FOR INVESTMENT UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION C (a) HEREOF.

NO SUCH INVESTMENTS, HOWEVER, SHALL BE MADE WHICH AT THE TIME OF PURCHASE WILL RESULT IN THE TOTAL MARKET VALUE OF THE SECURITIESREFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION EXCEEDING TWENTY PERCENT (20%) OF THE TOTAL MARKET VALUE OF ALL THE CASH, BANK ACCOUNTS AND SECURITIES HELD.

C. UP TO SIXTY PERCENT (60%) MAY BE INVESTED IN:

a. COMMON STOCKS, WHICH MUST BE FULLY LISTED AND REGISTERED ON AN EXCHANGE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION AS A NATIONAL SECURITIES EXCHANGE, EXCEPT THAT THIS LISTING REQUIREMENT SHALL NOT APPLY TO BANK AND INSURANCE COMPANY STOCKS.

b. SHARES OF INVESTMENT TRUSTS.

NO SUCH INVESTMENTS, HOWEVER, SHALL BE MADE WHICH AT THE TIME OF PURCHASE WILL RESULT IN THE TOTAL MARKET VALUE OF THE SECURITIES REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION EXCEEDING SIXTY PERCENT (60%) OF THE TOTAL; MARKET VALUE OF ALL CASH, BANK ACCOUNTS AND SECURITIES HELD.

IF A CHAPTER OR TEMPLE ASSOCIATION ELECTS TO INVEST IN FUNDS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTIONS B, OR C (a), OR C (b) HEREOF, IT SHALL CONFER AND COUNSEL AS TO ANY SUCH PROPOSED OR CONTEMPLATED INVESTMENTS WITH A PROFESSIONAL INVESTMENT ADVISOR OF ITS CHOICE, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT IT IS NOT MANDATORY THAT THE CHAPTER EXECUTE THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INVESTMENT ADVISOR, SUCH RECOMMENDATIONS BEING ADVISORY ONLY. THE USE OF PROFESSIONAL INVESTMENT ADVICE DOES NOT RELIEVE CHAPTER TRUSTEES OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES, AND SAIDTRUSTEES MUST EXERCISE THE JUDGMENT AND CARE WHICH MEN OF PRUDENCE, DISCRETION AND INTELLIGENCE EXERCISE IN THE MANAGEMENT OF THEIR OWN AFFAIRS.

IF THE CHAPTER SHALL SO DETERMINE, THE CHAPTER MAY INCREASE THE PERMITTED PERCENTAGE OF SECURITIES SPECIFIED IN SUBDIVISION B OR IN SUBDIVISION C ABOVE, PROVIDED THE TOTAL MARKET VALUE OF THE SECURITIES SPECIFIED IN SUBDIVISIONS B AND C COM-

BINED SHALL NOT EXCEED EIGHTY PERCENT (80%) OF THE TOTAL MARKET VALUE OF ALL CASH, BANK ACCOUNTS AND SECURITIES HELD.

(8) TO PROVIDE THROUGH A REPUTABLE INSURANCE COMPANY OR COMPANIES. A MASTER FIDELITY BOND (INCLUDING BROAD FORM MONEY AND SECURITIES IN-SIDE AND OUTSIDE COVERAGE AND DEPOSITOR'S FOR-GERY COVERAGE), A MASTER WORKERS' COMPENSATION POLICY, A MASTER COMPREHENSIVE PUBLIC LIABILITY POLICY (INCLUDING MEDICAL PAYMENTS COVERAGE) AND A MULTIPLE PERILS POLICY OF INSURANCE (OR SUCH OTHER COMPARABLE POLICY OR POLICIES OF INSURANCE) PROVIDING COVERAGE FOR PHYSICAL LOSS OR DAMAGE FROM EXTERNAL CAUSES TO THE PROPERTY OF, OR IN CARE, CUSTODY AND CONTROL OF, THE GRAND CHAPTER, ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR, AND OF ITS SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS. THESE COVERAGES SHALL AFFORD PROTEC-TION TO THE GRAND CHAPTER, THE OFFICERS, MEMBERS, COMMITTEES OF ASSOCIATIONS WITHIN ALL THE ORGANI-ZATIONS MENTIONED, INSOFAR AS ANY LIABILITY EXISTS ON THEIR PARTS BY REASON OF THEIR ACTIVITIES AS A PART OF SAID ORGANIZATION.

THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE SHALL ESTABLISH THE PREMIUM AMOUNT(S) FOR SUCH INSURANCE WHICH SHALL BE ASSESSED AGAINST EVERY MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING SUBJECT TO PER CAPITA ASSESSMENT, WHICH TOTAL AMOUNT SHALL BECOME THE INSURANCE FUND AS DESIGNATED IN SECTION 96(g).

- (9) TO CAUSE AN AUDIT TO BE MADE AT THE CLOSE OF EACH FISCAL YEAR BY ONE OR MORE CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS OF ALL THE BOOKS OF ACCOUNT AND FINANCIAL RECORDS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER, THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA AND AT THE DISCRETION OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE, ANY SUBSIDIARY ORGANIZATIONS. TO KEEP THE AUDITORS APPRISED OF ALL DECISIONS, LAWS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS APPERTAINING TO THE FINANCIAL AFFAIRS OF THIS GRAND JURISDICTION. THE REPORT OF THE AUDIT SHALL BE INCORPORATED IN, AND MADE A PART OF, THE GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT AT THE ANNUAL SESSION.
- (10) TO PROVIDE GRAND CHAPTER WITH OFFICE SPACE IN CONFORMITY WITH SECTION 59(11) THROUGH PURCHASE, TRUST, LEASE OR RENTAL.

- (11) WITH THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE GRAND SECRETARY, TO SET THE SALARIES, FRINGE BENEFITS AND WORKING HOURS OF ALL EMPLOYEES IN THE GRAND CHAPTER OFFICE AND TO PROVIDE NECESSARY FUNDS FOR THE SAME IN THE BUDGET WHICH THEY PRESENT TO THE GRAND CHAPTER.

Financial arrangements are comparable to Anaheim and Sacramento.

We've been contacted by several communities who have expressed an interest in our 1991 and 1992 Sessions. Ventura will be building a new Convention Arena at their County Fairgrounds located on beach front property, but construction cannot begin until they obtain permission from the Coastal Commission and the completion will possibly be in 1991.

The Los Angeles Convention Bureau tried to find a facility for us that would meet our needs since we cannot afford their rental fees, but none were available.

San Diego may be a possibility for a future site, as something may be worked out at their facilities to accommodate us.

In the north, we visited Santa Clara's beautiful new Convention Center and found it was constructed mainly for trade shows with a flat floor and doesn't have any risers, however the \$4000 per day rental fee makes it too expensive, the same as San Francisco and Long Beach.

Sacramento has a temporary Arena that ARCO is using for their professional Basketball Team, which is located seven miles north of Sacramento towards the Airport. This facility rents for \$2500 per day, but doesn't have any meeting rooms or display areas for concessionaires. ARCO is building a new Convention Complex including hotels that could be contacted in the future.

We have representatives here today from Bakersfield and Palm Springs Convention Bureaus, who will make their own Presentation Bids to host our Annual Sessions in 1991 and 1992.

We have something for everyone every day, and if it is shopping you like, my wife wanted me to be sure to mention that we are doubling the size of the current shopping center, so I think that is pretty important.

Bakersfield is rapidly becoming a city of the futures, and we hope your view will be in the future, too.

Our Central California location means just that. We are convenient to the majority of the members of the Order of the Eastern Star. We can be reached by road, rail, air, and if you are adventurous, even tootling down the Kern River.

I want to thank you for allowing me to bring this invitation before you today for 1991 or 1992. You will find October is a beautiful time of the year, and we hope you will bring this session to Bakersfield, help us make our October even prettier.

We offer meeting facilities, restaurants, things to see, and all at reasonable prices. Put this together with our unique hospitality and location, and you have got a winner. Thank you very much.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Distinguished Guests. I am Jennie Agee, for the Convention Bureau of Palm Springs, and I am here to extend a sunny welcome to Palm Springs.

When I left there, it was just beautiful, and I wish you were all there with me, living there right now. It is just wonderful.

Now it is my pleasure to extend a cordial invitation to the Order of the Eastern Star, Grand Chapter of California, to consider Palm Springs as the site for the 1991 and 1992 meetings. We have a new Convention Center opening the end of 1987. We hope to have that completed in the fall of '87. It will have 100,000 square feet. We have 50,000 square feet of space available, and it will accommodate 6,000 easily in an arenatype setting.

The Convention Center is located just three blocks from the heart of Palm Springs, and it is only two miles from the airport. If some of you have not been in Palm Springs, I want you to know it is only fifteen minutes from one end of town to the other, so you do not have very far to go.

We now have ten major hotels in the area, two are brand new and two others are in the process of elaborate renovation. We have within walking distance of the Convention Center five hotels; another hotel is adjacent to the Center, with 410 rooms; and we have, right across the street, two other hotels, and then two others about three short blocks away, so you can park your car, leave it, and you have 1160 rooms right there at the Convention Center. My favorite thing is to sit in an inner tube and float around in it. We have 25 acres at this wonderful waterland.

The Home Endowment Fund Committee is given the responsibility by the Worthy Grand Matron of informing and acquainting our members of the need to continue to build our fund. This committee has once again traveled many thousands of miles in their 26 designated areas of the state to encourage our members to contribute to the fund in one, more, or several ways.

Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-Six was another good year for the Home Endowment Fund; however, there have been years when more money was contributed and more Life Sponsorships were sold. Thirty-One Chapters will be receiving Silver Stars which designates they have contributed \$2.00 or more per dues paying member. A total of 1,542 Life Sponsorships were sold this past year, and total contributions from our members of \$90.366.

We deeply appreciate the donations made to this fund whether large or small. It is not an easy task asking members to contribute monies year after year, but we all must realize the necessity of constantly building this fund and thus increase the interest derived. As our economic structure changes, so does the expense of running the Eastern Star Home.

Again this year many Chapters failed to reach 100% Honor Roll status by very small amounts; in fact one Chapter lacked just 45 cents. To all Associate Matrons here today, this could have been avoided if you would check with your Secretary in April or May to see how you stand. All contributions must be in the Grand Chapter office by June 30, and this year many checks were sent directly to me in July and August which could not be counted for 1986. Please follow thru on this and be sure your Secretary is sending in the money and her report by the designated dates. Over twenty Chapter Secretaries still have not returned their Annual Report to me for this past year.

There are a few Chapters I wish to single out for special recognition. This year the largest amount was given by Area 23 which covers Gardena, Bellflower, Torrance and the Long Beach areas. The second largest contribution was made by Area 21 which includes Burbank, San Fernando Valley, Ventura and Santa Barbara.

Six Chapters have achieved Honor Roll status for 20 or more consecutive years. Fifteen other Chapters have reached 15 or more consecutive years. Pasadena-Melita No. 108 had the highest percent participation of 900% with Bakersfield No. 125 having 500% and West Gate No. 290 and Wild Rose No. 326

Top honors go to La Posa No. 282 and Manchester No. 449 for 25 consecutive years of 100% participation in the Home Endowment Fund.

The Chapters having achieved honor roll status by contributing \$1.00 or more per member this year, as has been reported to me and thus receiving their gold or silver star, will be included with this report and listed in the proceedings of this Grand Chapter Session. These stars and/or certificates will be personally delivered to each Chapter by the Area Chairmen.

In closing, I wish to thank the members of my committee for their devotion and dedication on behalf of the Home Endowment Fund, for without their help these results could not have been accomplished. The accomplishment of each Chapter this year for our Home Endowment Fund portrays the true meaning of fraternal love. Helping others surely will be your reward!

We thank you Worthy Grand Matron for appointing us to your Fraternal Correspondence Committee for the "Winter Wonderland" Session. A little over a year ago when our letters arrived asking us to fill this appointment we hurried to open them holding our breath,

Wanting to help, but scared to death.

To chair a Committee, read a book,
Write many reports and forget how to cook.

Now the year is over and our chores are done,
We hope the recaps have not forgotten anyone.
We've had fun, laughed and smiled,
You can't imagine all the books we filed.

Friendships are formed to last a lifetime through
This has happened with us and you.

It has been a wonderful armchair trip, an opportunity to visit other Grand Jurisdictions and to serve our Grand Chapter in this way. It is my pleasure to present the Committee at this time. Sister Maebell Shipley, Ami Tai Chapter No. 405. The other Committee Member, Adell Saab, Lafayette Chapter No. 571, is unable to attend Grand Chapter this year. My grateful thanks to both of you for a service well given to Grand Chapter, and the help you have been to me.

I would also like to thank those Grand Representatives who sent recaps of their Grand Jurisdiction to insert where we did not receive correspondence from those Jurisdictions. Thank you Ladies and Gentlemen for being such a resource.

For the benefit of our new members or those attending Grand Chapter for the first time, certain bits of information and history need repeating. The idea of a Fraternal Correspondent was started in 1876 by a Worthy Grand Matron of Connecticut who thought it would be helpful to exchange ideas between the eight Grand Chapters existing at that time; now there are five sovereign bodies. The oldest is the independent Grand Chapter of New York organized in 1869. Then the independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey in 1870; third is our own General Grand Chapter in 1876; fourth is the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland in 1904, and the youngest is the United Grand Chapter of Australia instituted in June 1985 and they have jurisdiction over Australia, New Zealand, and New South Wales.

As we opened each Grand Chapter proceedings it was like seeing another snowflake. Each Grand Chapter session portrayed the teachings of our Order in its own individual and unique manner just like a snowflake. The settings were beautiful and their programs were inspiring and representative of the people and section of the country in which they were located. We find that the Ritual is printed in six languages. The only Grand Jurisdiction that displays the Star with the white point up is the Grand Jurisdiction of New York. We read where every jurisdiction gives fantastic help to the aged through their Homes. The ESTARL, Cancer, Heart and Arthritis Funds and many other charities too numerous to mention are listed as yearly projects. Many jurisdictions give special emphasis on working with our Youth Organizations.

All jurisdictions share the common problem of declining membership and no one seems to have any magic formula for increasing the membership. Many jurisdictions focused on initiating the young people as soon as the girls reached 18 and the young men as soon as the Masonic Lodge would allow them to become members of Eastern Star. Many jurisdictions had special committees at the Grand Subordinate level to see why members were not attending their Chapters and encourage them to be active again. Minnesota has a 5 star program to encourage membership participation. A ribbon for each star point color

represented something accomplished like; blue for signing a petition for initiation or affiliation; or yellow for traveling. When the members came to the Grand Session each wore their ribbons and were recognized for their contributions during the year to help the Order grow.

We read in numerous proceedings where our California Grand Representatives were introduced at their respective Grand Sessions. It is nice to know we were so well represented throughout the land.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Iowa collected over 10,000 stuffed animals from all over the state. The animals were used to decorate the Grand Chapter Room and then donated to hospitals, for the childrens' wards, after the Grand Chapter Session.

The Fraternal Correspondent of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland is an appointive Grand Office-Bearer. We thought this to be very interesting and different.

The Grand Chapter of Minnesota has a traveling Worthy Matron Gavel which the Worthy Grand Matron presents when she visits the first Chapter and then the Worthy Matrons must travel to pass it on. It sounded like fun.

The Grand Jurisdiction of Delaware just voted in 1985 that the Worthy Grand Patron could have a copy of the secret work and diagram of the labyrinth. Aren't you glad you are a Californian Brother Dennis?

In Massachusetts the Deputy Grand Matron selects a Deputy Grand Marshal to assist her. I bet some of our Deputies wished they had an assistant this year.

The Grand Jurisdiction of Montana had 49 men aspire to the Office of Associate Grand Patron and there were 48 candidates for Associate Grand Conductress. The miraculous thing was it only required two ballots to decide who would serve in each office.

We found that in Rhode Island in half of the Chapters the Secretary is a Past Grand Matron.

In Texas when the subordinate Chapters are opened the square and compasses are placed on the open Bible during the Opening Ceremonies.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO RE-WRITE SECTION 73

(By Warren Wildman, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Sisters and Brothers: My name is Warren W. Wildman, Past Patron of Elmhurst Chapter No. 455, San Leandro. Thank you Worthy Grand Matron for the opportunity of continuing my serving on this special committee.

I would like to introduce the other two members who have shared this committee work with me, Sister Everina Rheingans, Past Grand Matron and Brother Gilman Knutson, Past Patron of Palm Springs Chapter No. 576. These fine people are former members of the Finance Committee and their former experience has been very valuable in our work. My thanks to each of them for their service.

During 1984 while I was serving as Worthy Grand Patron questions arose regarding the position of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron with respect to financial matters. It became apparent ambiguities in Section 73 existed. The requested opinions from the Jurisprudence Committee confirmed that inconsistencies do exist and prevent the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron from performing the assigned duties. Rather than let the matter slide by, I did, in my Annual Report to this Grand Chapter make a recommendation, which by your vote was adopted. The action called for the then incoming Worthy Grand Matron to appoint a Special Committee to review Section 73 and present a proposed revision and/or an amendment for consideration at the 1985 Grand Chapter Session.

At the 1985 Session of this Grand Chapter the proposed legislation was carried forward to this session due to last moment proposed amendments and the fact that many legislation booklets had pages missing which was due to a printers' error. We are now at that carried forward point in time to consider the proposal.

You will find on page 33 the proposed revision. It has a format listing the duties numerically. The proposal pulls all the listed duties found in 29 different sections of the Constitution and Laws, together into one section. Unless one reads all the Constitution and Laws word by word many of the listed duties go unnoticed.

The Committee has solicited input in this rewriting from both the members of the Finance Committee and Home Board Trustees, as well as the Past Grand Matrons and Patrons and individual members. Much input was received, considered, some incorporated, but above all, appreciated.

The proposal as presented is more definitive in spelling out required duties of the Finance Committee and should enhance their efforts in performing assigned duties for the betterment of all financial matters. One example that comes to mind is the closing in 1985 of our Cancer Dressing Stations Project due to over-spending of available funds. Stronger fiscal control is desirous and needed if we are to stay financially sound in all of our funds.

We have also proposed the adoption of a new set of rules for the investment and reinvestment of Grand Chapter Funds as well as permitting our individual Chapter to also invest in this wider range of investments. You will find them the same as permitted for Grand Lodge and all of the Blue Lodges. Permission was granted for us to copy them from the California Masonic Code. They will provide a security against investments that are not properly protected or insured. Instances have also been noted in the past where moneys have been placed in uninsured money market accounts.

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron are made voting members of this Committee when they are present at a meeting.

There are also several companion resolutions which will need your action if you adopt this proposal and we do recommend your YES vote on this very important matter.

Upon returning home from our 1985 Grand Chapter Session in Sacramento much to my surprise I had numerous phone calls with regards to our 1986 Grand Chapter Housing. Fortunately for me, I had installed a message recorder on my phone and with this handy device I have been able to receive and record over 300 phone calls, thus enabling me to get back to our membership and answer their many questions. To those members who did not leave their area code along with their phone number, I do apologize for not returning your calls, but it was impossible to guess what area code you were in. I feel confident to report that to my knowledge each and every phone call and piece of correspondence I received was properly taken care of and I sincerely hope that each request and need has been filled to your satisfaction.

Many months ago, our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jeraldine Southward, Brother Joseph Morris, General Chairman and myself spent many hours inspecting the various properties in and around the Anaheim Convention Center. We were interested in price, location, cleanliness, comfort plus the attitude of those in charge of these facilities. After much discussion and deliberation, blocks of rooms were secured at 14 hotels and motels.

The main purpose for going through your Housing Chairman and the Anaheim Housing Bureau is to aid and assist our members in obtaining the housing of their choice.

Five thousand Housing Registration Forms were printed, listing the price and location of each hotel/motel we were using. In addition to the Housing Forms mailed by our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva to each individual Chapter Secretary your Housing Chairman mailed out an additional 250 forms to members who either wanted more forms, had lost or misplaced the original form or indicated they had never received the form in the first place.

Housing for a convention such as ours does generate a lot of interest. To those of you who made your reservations through the proper channels, I thank you for following directions as you are the members who allow us to use the Convention Center Arena and Meeting Rooms along with other services. The eight percent Bed Tax paid to the various

hotels and motels is where the Anaheim Convention Bureau derives its income thus enabling us to use this facility at no cost.

A total of 2,108 rooms were used by the members attending this Grand Chapter Session, however, 1184 reservations were made individually (not through the Housing Chairman). While 942 rooms were secured directly through the Housing Chairman, thus making a difference of 260 rooms which indicates that our membership continues to resist acquiring their rooms through the proper channels set up by the Housing Committee.

Inasmuch as we will be holding our Conventions in Fresno for the next four years, I would recommend to our Associate Grand Matron, Sister Barbara Cambpell that a Housing Chairman, plus a Co-chairman be appointed and in this way the Co-chairman would have the knowledge and experience to assume the responsibilities of Chairman the following year.

My job was made much easier by the capable knowledge and expertise of Nan Parsons and her staff at the Anaheim Convention Housing Bureau. My special thanks and gratitude to each of these fine ladies. This arduous task given me this past year has truly been a challenge, but a challenge that I have thoroughly enjoyed because it afforded me personal contact with my Sisters and Brothers. My only wish is that I will at sometime be able to put faces with the many voices I have talked with over the phone.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for placing your confidence in me and allowing me the privilege to serve you, our Grand Chapter and the members of this beautiful Order.

Substitute Resolution:

WHEREAS: The average age of members applying for residency in the Eastern Star Home at present is approaching 88 years of age and the physical and mental condition of those applying and of the present residents require more Skilled Nursing care; and

WHEREAS the present Skilled Nursing Unit cannot accommodate more than thirty-eight (38) and this being fact, we cannot meet the needs of the present residents and/or those of the future, due to the age and location of the Eastern Star Home; so

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Grand Chapter authorize the formation of the "Future Home Site and Emergency Capital Expenditure Fund", the start of which shall be the sum of \$250,000. from the Operating Fund of the Eastern Star Home, and shall be further expanded by donations. These monies will be under the direction of the Finance Committee, and no disbursement will be made therefrom without the prior approval by Grand Chapter; and in the

event that these monies are not expended within 10 years, all monies including all accumulations, will revert back to the Operating Fund.

The Finance Committee, to whom this Resolution and Substitute Resolution was presented, recommend a "yes" vote.

REPORT OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE

(By Frank Young, P.P. (19), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers.

On behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, I would like to thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for appointing Sister Lura Rae Dales, P.G.M. and Brother Gerald P. Cashion, P.G.P. to serve with me on this Committee. It has been a privilege for me to work with these very capable members and for our Committee to serve Grand Chapter in this capacity during the year.

This year approximately 80 sets of Bylaws were submitted for approval of proposed amendments. Many of these Bylaws were returned for further consideration. In most cases the required corrections consisted of changes to the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter that had not properly been incorporated into the current Chapter Bylaws.

The Committee recommends that the Secretaries and Committees of the subordinate Chapters be certain that all copies of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter be kept current including copies of the Uniform Code of Bylaws. If these documents are kept current and if the Chapter Committees study the appropriate sections of the Constitution and Laws pertaining to that which they are amending in their bylaws, fewer requests for approval would have to be returned for further consideration.

This past year the Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Jurisprudence reviewed errors in the grammar, spelling, punctuation and reference numbers found in the Constitution and Laws and the Uniform Code of Bylaws. When the Committees were in unanimous agreement as to the need for correction, the corrections were noted and will be made in the appropriate places at the next required printing. These approved changes will be found in detail following our report in the annual proceedings.

This Committee acknowledges with appreciation the assistance of the Jurisprudence Committee throughout the year. We would also like to thank our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva, and her staff for the help which they have extended to us.

Certainly, if I had my choice, I would thank each committee member personally, but, due to limited time, it must be as a group. Sisters and Brothers, I would be remiss if I did not speak for a moment on our Housing. Again, as in past years, many of our members did not go through Housing or notify our Housing Chairman where they would be staying. We urgently need your support in this direction. If you do not go through Housing, our Order does not receive credit for the bed tax. This bed tax is used to offset the expenses of this Arena and the twenty-five Committee Rooms. The normal rental of the Arena is five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) per day. The Committee Rooms are charged for by the square foot. These charges are waived by the city of Anaheim, the cost being taken from the bed tax. When the Convention Center does not receive credit for members staying in motels not registered with Housing, the city does not receive enough money to cover costs. Every hotel/motel charges the same bed tax whether you go through Housing or not and each tenant must pay this bed tax and will be charged bed tax by the hotels/motels whether they do or do not go through Housing. So please, my Sisters and Brothers make your reservations through Housing.

This year we attempted to improve the handling and issuing of tickets. We printed only sections, no seat numbers on tickets. When you registered your ticket permitted you to be seated with anyone you wanted in that section, even if they registered at a different time. We felt this was an improvement but know that it is almost impossible to

have fool-proof system with tickets. However, we will continue to strive for perfection.

I feel fortunate to have had Sister Billie Jean Feldman as my Activities Chairman for she is an organized and efficient lady, always aware of the many details requiring attention. She has been of much assistance to our Committees and we have all enjoyed her quick wit. Sister Billie and I have been capably assisted by our three fine Group Chairmen and their wives, Sister Millie Bormann and her husband Jack, Brothers Marvin Holmberg and his wife Bobby, and Tom Day and his wife Ethel. Thank you for the many meetings you held with your committees where plans were made to assure the success of the week. You can now see the fruits of your labor.
