

FORMAL OPENING OF GRAND CHAPTER

The 114th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star was held in the Selland Arena of the Fresno Community and Convention Center. The stage was decorated with a black back drop with the sun slowly setting. Across the back drop in large gold letters were the words "Song of the Sunset". On either side were the emblems of our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron.

Our Worthy Grand Matron's emblem is "The song of the sunset within a heart." The SUNSET – A sunset composed of the colors of a melted rainbow: another of God's wonders. The HEART – Her Chapter being in the heart of our state. The SONG – Her interest in music which gave her the first active place in the Fraternal world and has always been a part of her life. The song in the heart is the first phrase of "Star of Love", a composition of the late Past Grand Patron, John L. McDonald.

Our Worthy Grand Patron's emblem is "The Badge of Gold", which is a badge of Peace, Harmony and Pride. PEACE of mind, HARMONY with others and PRIDE of belonging. Each point is equal and connected by a hexagon of gold indicating that we are equal and united in our goals. The musical note within the badge demonstrates that harmony will abound when there is peace within. The red background represents the red carnation that brings joy and happiness within. The Eastern Star is our way of life. The sun and sunrays indicate God's power is abounding and endless.

The ramps to the stage were like the keyboard of a piano. All around the Grand Chapter room and at each Grand Officer's station were some of the stuffed animals our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron had been given in lieu of a carrying piece at her Official Visits throughout the year. The edge of the stage and the area between the ramps were decorated with ferns and red carnations.

At 1:30 p.m. we enjoyed a "Sing-a-Long" with Eleanor Bignami, P.M. (590) as Organist and Anne Harris, D.G.M. (100) as Song Leader.

Clinton Dillon, Worthy Grand Patron: The Flag symbolizes our aspirations and achievements as Americans; our struggles and sacrifices; our devotion to the ideals expressed by our founding fathers. My Sisters, you who are the five jewels in our Golden Chain, have you a tribute to our Flag?

At our last three Grand Chapter Sessions, we have voted to vary the method of voting as provided in our Constitution and Laws so that instead of raising the hand to vote by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter, each voting delegate was given a colored card for each vote to which he or she was entitled and, when called upon to vote, the card, or cards, were raised. This has been a successful method of insuring that multiple votes could more effectively be cast.

This year the Credentials Committee has again been instructed to provide the cards. In order to provide for the use of these cards, within the rules of our Grand Chapter, we must vote to suspend Section III, Rule 13, which relates to the voting sign of Grand Chapter.

Motion: To suspend Section III, Rule 13, and to provide that the usual voting sign of this Grand Chapter Session will be by the raising of the cards distributed by the Credential Committee. (Motion seconded.)

Clinton Dillon, Worthy Grand Patron: One of the highlights each year for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron is to be able to present to you, the delegates of this Grand Session, the Annual Report of the activities that we have accomplished this year.

It is now my honor and privilege to call on our Worthy Grand Matron at this time for her Annual Report.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON (By Barbara Campbell)

Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates to this 114th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of California, Sisters and Brothers;

Once upon a time a Committee on Relevance was appointed to look into our Order as seen through the eyes of our members. Over sixty items were listed as concerns of the members and/or reasons why our Chapters did not enjoy the popularity that they had known in years past. Since that report, Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons have continued the quest for answers to our problems and this year has been no exception. The Constitution states that I am to present a written report to you reviewing the work of the term, setting forth the general condition of the Order in our jurisdiction and recommending such legislation as I may deem necessary.

Therefore – the written proceedings for this session will include all the traditional report of the itinerary, dispensations, appointments, correspondence and thank yous.

Each of our innovations this year were based upon the Relevance Committee's report and, I would enumerate some of them at this time so that you may consider whether or not you feel they are worthwhile. We would all agree that there is no need in re-inventing the wheel – or, that we don't use valuable time to fix something that isn't broken – so, if our "fixing" isn't what you want – then, it is worthless and our future leaders would like to know your opinion.

The Worthy Grand Patron and I have stressed the importance and desirability of learning the Ritual. That is the foundation of our Order however, I must admit we did not succeed in all Chapters. If someone can tell us how to foster pride within each of our members – you could do us a great favor.

We urged interesting and well organized meetings and have been pleased with the reports we've received of exciting and informative nights at Star.

At the Official Visits it was made known that money did not have to be expended for corsages and, in lieu of the traditional carry-in - stuffed animals would be enjoyed and, then taken to local hospitals and/or convalescent homes. Your response to these two suggestions was gratifying and, I'm happy to tell you that we have delivered 1,580 toys to 72 institutions including our own Home and, you see we have almost 100 here as decorations which will go next week.

There were no blocks of seats reserved at Official Visits and, the Grand Family sat about the room – each with her/his subordinate officers. In the dining room, when at all possible, the Grand Officers enjoyed your company rather than being set apart at one table.

Because I find the words "Sickness and Distress" bring to mind unhappy images, the officers were requested to name this portion of our meeting our "Circle of Concern".

In tribute to those whom we honor in our Memorial Service, the Worthy Matrons were asked to put this ceremony just before Closing – rather than to insert it before bills and receipts.

Grand Officers have long been criticized for telling you too much at one time – so the Worthy Grand Patron and I agreed we would make our messages a bit shorter and, cut out numerous words of appreciation. We want you to know that this in no way indicates that we did not enjoy being together nor, did we not appreciate the attendance of all Distinguished and Honored Members and the work of all members who put together those Official Visits. Hopefully the volume of mail which left the hands of the Grand Officers will reinforce these words, and you'll know that we do acknowledge and appreciate your many kindnesses to us and, your devotion to this Order.

We encouraged the presiding officers to look into new ideas for Official Visits and, the result was an outdoor meeting in an almond grove in Brentwood.

Annual social events were considered with some new ideas tried. I firmly believe that these events should be made self-supporting for two reasons. No. 1 - our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons should be giving the majority of their effort to their Chapters - not to association business or events. No. 2 - some associations are considerably smaller than they used to be and the strain of putting on an event free to the attending members is too much to ask of them, in my opinion. The results of this theory were a luncheon in San Francisco in lieu of the San Francisco Tea, a dinner show in Fresno in lieu of the Central San Joaquin Banquet, a first-time event in Siskiyou Association - outdoor Bar-B-Que, a family picnic in Sacramento with the Superior Association, another family picnic with square dancing in the Sierras with the Northern San Joaquin Association, a picnic with the Hi-Sierra Association, a family day at the Calamigos Ranch at Malibu in lieu of the Southern California Reception, a Bar-B-Que with the Central Coast Association, dinner with Kern County, lunch with Orange Belt. dinner with San Diego County, and lunch with the Peninsula Association were all continuations of traditional events.

Our friendships with our first "Hands Across the Border" Official Visit shared with Nevada – we went to them in Reno and they came to us in Elk Grove.

I am proposing no legislation this year; however, I do have some suggestions which I throw out for your thoughts and in hope that on an individual basis within each Chapter – perhaps you may take your own action.

During your Chapter meetings – why do you escort Past Matrons and Past Patrons every meeting? Have you ever noticed that sometimes there are only a couple of people left on the sidelines and the rest of you are escorting each other? Who is left to applaud?

At Receptions – why do some of you go for escort over and over again? Perhaps you noticed this year – our Grand Officers simply stood at their chair when a group to which they belong was presented.

Why do you get on the telephone between meetings and stir up trouble? If we could rip out all the phones, we could eliminate 90% of our grievances.

In the business of your meetings – I would urge you to look at the tradition of giving life memberships to our fifty year members. Some Chapters automatically give the life membership and, others have never started it. The point to consider is – not that we do not honor these people who have supported our Chapters for all these many years – but often you are giving a life membership to a member, who has not been in Chapter for years. Yet, you automatically vote. Financially, this could be crippling to a Chapter with many, many such life members and also to Grand Chapter.

Many Chapters have a Relocation Committee wherein you keep track of your members who leave your community and, contact the new Chapter for them. I would urge our Grand Line Officers to start such a committee on the state level to work with those of some of our sister jurisdictions who inherit many of our Californians.

The use of the black cube continues to bring heartache. I have no answer. At this Grand Session we have also tried to abide by your wishes to streamline and eliminate unnecessary expenses. You know that we are using Sunday afternoon for a session rather than for free time. You will also note that there are no reports listed from the Grand Chapter Week Committees – all will be printed in the proceedings and, all will be passed on to the 1988 Committee Chairmen within the month. Our Singing Stars are not listed as often on the program – not that we don't love their music.

It is our hope that the sessions will be interesting, productive and yet relaxed enough so that we can all go to the social events in between sessions and have time to enjoy them as

well. And, that you will not be leaving the session early and returning late because your lunch or dinner came first.

Mometarily – we have made some cuts. You will notice that the Grand Officers are not wearing the traditional artificial corsages. The Courtesies Chairman was concerned that you wouldn't know that she knew better – so I promised that I would make a public announcement that it was my decision.

We have cut back on gifts made by the Courtesy Committee to be given to our own people. I would urge still further cuts in this area.

There is no place in our Order for mediocrity. People in the business world know that if you give the customer something of value and, something they want – they'll pay you for it. I firmly believe that if you give our members something of value and, programs of interest – they'll be active members of our Chapters.

You who are our line officers – listen to what's being said. Search for the interests of your members and, don't be afraid to try what may seem like a far-out idea. Do you realize that one of the biggest new businesses is a chain of wine bars in coin laundries? Coin laundries – usually thought of as a kind-of scruffy little building with some washing machines and maybe some old magazines lying around – now, the place to go to meet people and enjoy a few moments of relaxation while you wait for your laundry – and, making some enterprising people a fortune.

You may need to be just naive enough to not know that something can't be done. Don't just wait for the right moment – get on with it. A few years ago our Grand Secretary told us that the money we were saving for the rainy day should be used – for the rain is pouring down upon us. She's right. Some of your Chapters have accounts in the six figures. What do you intend to do with all that money? And, when are you going to do it?

Constant innovation is the basis of success – coupled with a maybe slightly wacky, persistent champion of the "cause". I'm probably more than slightly wacky – but, I'm still hopeful that if you have pride in your organization, work in harmony and show fidelity to each other – you can get people to do most anything.

Remember - one vote in 1640 caused Charles I of England to be executed.

- one vote in 1845 brought Texas into the Union,
- one vote in 1923 gave Hitler leadership in the Nazi party.

Your vote is important this week – use yours well and, may each of you officers and members alike, go home from this convention with a SONG IN YOUR HEART.

Grand Officers: Every Worthy Matron looks forward to the choosing of her appointive officers and, a Worthy Grand Matron is no different. To select but ten people from the large California membership is a difficult yet most exciting task. My never—ending gratitude to those who became what was known as "The Red Wave" of California.

Meetings and functions of our two Chapters when possible: Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge; Installation of Crescenta Valley Lodge, Jim Stubblefield, Worshipful Master; Installation of El Rancho Lodge, Don Hodson, Worshipful Master and Worthy Patron; East-West Shrine Football Game; Bell Chapter Hobo Dinner; Central Coastal Bar-B-Que; Northern San Joaquin Brunch; Orange Belt Spring Luncheon; Kern County Dinner; Central San Joaquin Dinner; San Francisco Event; Peninsula Event; Siskiyou Event; Superior Event; Northern San Joaquin Event; East Bay Event; Cancer Dressing Stations Breakfast; two J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund Breakfasts; Teas Honoring Eleanor Marsh P.G.M. and Richard T. Brassell, Jr. P.G.P., General Grand Chapter Committee Members. I also had the honor of attending the Initiation of Brother Leo Mark, Deputy Grand Master and his wife Laura, into Campbell Chapter. Brother Leo is now our Grand Master of Masons in California and Hawaii.

California Masonic Code: In December 1986, I received correspondence from the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California, that I would be held responsible for violations of the California Masonic Code by members of our Order. He was particularly concerned about fund-raising by games of chance, lotteries, bingo, etc.

At the Instructionals I encouraged the Worthy Patrons to be aware of what the Ways and Means Committee of their Chapter was doing to raise money for the Chapter. I also stressed that I did not want an individual Chapter or the Grand Chapter to be a major topic of discussion at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge for violations of the C.M.C.

In September, I received a call from a Worthy Patron and a letter from the Grand Master indicating a group from a Chapter had gone to a Bingo Parlor as a means of raising funds for their Chapter.

I appointed a committee consisting of one Past Grand Matron and two Past Grand Patrons to investigate these charges. I commend the committee members for their quick response and excellent report.

It was reported to me that a group from a Chapter did attend the Bingo Parlor and \$500 was paid to an individual in the Chapter. However, the original check issued by the Bingo Parlor was never cashed and, in fact, was returned to the Bingo Parlor.

In this instance, our Constitution and Laws were not violated; however, the California Masonic Code was. I urged each Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron to be ever mindful of what their Ways and Means Committee is doing to raise funds for the Chapter and to make sure there is no violation of the C.M.C.

Recommendations: At our 1985 Grand Chapter Session, the members approved the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Patron, Delroy Aldershof, to establish an Eastern Star Home, Homesite Committee. This committee was to consider the feasibility of buying acreage for the construction of a new, modern and up-to-date Home that would meet the needs and better serve our Sisters and Brothers. At our 1986 Grand Chapter Session the Committee gave a report of their progress and has continued to do their work well. In keeping with their progress and what I feel is in the best interest of the Home and the members of our Order, I hereby make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Homesite Committee be reappointed for the Grand Chapter Year of 1987–88.
- 2. The Homesite Committee be given the power to negotiate for the purchase of property to relocate the Eastern Star Home and to sell the existing Eastern Star Home, both, with the approval of the Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees and the Grand Chapter Finance Committee.
- 3. The necessary expenses of the Homesite Committee be paid from the interest on the \$250,000 fund set aside for the new home site, as approved by the Finance Committee.
- 4. The Wills and Bequest Committee be continued and expanded to five (5) members to allow for better access to committee members throughout the state.

Appreciation: I thank God who watched over and protected the Grand Family in our travels, for His many blessings we enjoy as members of this beautiful Order and for His continued presence and guiding hand in our loss of Brother Homer Klarnet, the husband of our Grand Chaplain.

Sister Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: Your leadership has brought about a joyous and successful year. It has been an honor serving our Grand Chapter with you. Your ideas such as the stuffed animals in lieu of a carrying piece has been a highlight of what can be done to carry our Eastern Star to those who may never have heard about our Order. The Hands Across the Border has widened our circle of friendships and our lives have been touched in a favorable way.

Gloria and I thank you for the honor of serving our Grand Chapter for the past two years. It is our prayer that God will continue to bring His many blessings your way all the days of your life.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY (By Diane Silva)

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

The sun is slowly rising in the East and it is a beginning of a new day, a new year of 1987 in the Grand Chapter of California. It has been a year of new innovations and changes. To our Worthy Grand Matron, Barbara, our Worthy Grand Patron, Clint and his Gloria, and this 1987 corps of Grand Officers, it has been great to be a part of the "Red Wave" and to make new friendships. This year is the first time we are holding Grand Chapter in the city of Fresno, the first time the Worthy Grand Matron received stuffed animals as carrying pieces and then turned them over to Children's Hospitals and Convalescent Hospitals, the first year that the Grand Officers sat with their officers, in colored formals at the Official Visits. These are all steps in the right direction to increase enthusiasm within our Chapters. It was even the first time I owned a red formal.

I look forward to the beautiful world of Jean Powers and Bernard Seamans and wish them and their Grand Officers well as they assume the duties of our Order.

We started the year by compiling the Roster and began work on the 1986 Proceedings and the loading of the membership into the computer. With the help of the "Saturday Crew", Zita Allensby (177), Mary Kay Bowser (577), Karen Brooks (635), Lillie Mae Marsh (331), Marcia McBrayer (103), Kim Ribeira (577), Gerry Terry (384), Barbara Wildman (115), Sheri Weisser (577) and my husband Albert, the task was completed and over 115,000 members names and their membership records were in our computer. They received no compensation for the hours of work, but have the grateful appreciation of this Grand Secretary and the Finance Committee.

Then came the task of sending a list of these members to each Secretary asking them to edit the list and bring it up to the membership as of June 30, 1986, which was the latest figure we had in the Grand Chapter office. We asked the Secretaries to tell us when and how the members left their Chapters or if a name was not on the list, to add it giving the date and how they joined each Chapter. Some did just as instructed, but most did not complete our request or thought it necessary to add what transpired since June 30, 1986. If the Secretaries failed to give us the correct information, it was necessary for someone to research the information, so that the records would be complete and correct in the computer.

Next we sent out a corrected list showing the Chapter's membership as of June 30, 1986 and the Annual Report. We asked the Secretaries to note on the list the information contained in the Annual Report. When returned, this information was fed into the computer and a corrected list of members as of June 30, 1987, and a bill was generated by the computer and sent to each Secretary. This took much more time than was expected and this is the reason the printing of the 1986 Proceedings has not been completed. It will be the first order of business when we return to San Francisco. To those Secretaries who followed the instructions, we thank you. To the others, we ask that next time you read the instructions, for we are trying to make the Secretaries' job easier.

As Grand Secretary I work with the Finance Committee and congratulate James Craven, Past Grand Patron, on the fine job he did as Chairman and to Earl Heverly, as President of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California, for his devotion to our Home. It has been a pleasure to work with these dedicated members who serve on this Committee and Board of Trustees, as well as all the Committees of this Grand Chapter.

The Scholarship Committee awarded \$71,000.00 in scholarships to 147 recipients. 282 Chapters participated by making requests for 726 fifty-year pins and 5 seventy-five year guards. 215 Chapters honored one of their members with the Rob Morris Award for outstanding service by a member who is not a Past Matron or a Past Patron.

This year our Grand Treasurer Viola Perry cannot submit her name as a candidate for that office, because of a requirement in our Constitution and Laws. Sister Viola, I have enjoyed working with you these fifteen years and I cherish your's and Milton's friendships. I wish for you much happiness in your retirement and may your health continue to gain strength in the days to come. To the candidate for Grand Treasurer, Sister Sheri, I shall look forward to working with you as you assume your important duties.

Another first for this year was that the Secretaries and Treasurers had a booth at the Fiesta and our Worthy Grand Matron assigned us the task of selling Jams, Jellies and Nuts. The theme of the Fiesta was "Horray for Hollywood" and each Grand Officer chose a movie for the theme of their booth. As Viola and I are both native San Franciscans, we chose the old Jeannette McDonald movie "San Francisco". To the chairman of the booth, Susan Premo, Secretary of Conejo Valley Chapter, and her committee, I sincerely thank you and to the Secretaries of California, I thank you for your participation. We compiled a Cook Book of recipes of jams, jellies and nuts and even received a recipe from our Worthy Grand Matron.

It is now the time to report to you, the delegates of this Grand Chapter, the information contained in the June 30, 1987 Annual Reports from the 449 Chapters in our state.

The Internal Revenue Service has determined that the Endowment Fund is exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

In my opinion, the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities, and fund balances and changes in fund balances and the statement of the 1986 annual reports present fairly the financial position of the various funds of the Grand Chapter of the State of California of the Order of the Eastern Star as of June 30, 1987 and 1986 and the changes in fund balances for the years then ended, as prepared on a modified cash basis (see Note 1) consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

- a) Method of accounting. The accounts are maintained on the modified cash basis under which basis revenue is generally taken into account when received and expenses generally when paid. The results are not materially different from the accrual method of accounting. The Endowment Fund statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.
- b) Investment valuation. Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the overthe-counter market are valued at the bid price. See Note 2.
- c) <u>Inventory of supplies</u>. The inventory is stated at cost (first-in, first-out method).
- d) Furniture and equipment. Furniture and equipment are stated at cost and are being depreciated on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture 10 years Equipment 5 years

When furniture or equipment is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is recognized in income.

- e) <u>Services</u>. Services donated by a large number of people are important to the activities of the Grand Chapter of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.
- f) Income taxes. There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income as the Grand Chapter of California is an exempt nonprofit, unincorporated association and has no unrelated taxable business income.
- NOTE 2. INVESTMENTS: Fund records include a Market Valuation Account. The balance in this valuation account represents the difference between the original carrying basis of the securities and their respective market values. The changes in the valuation balance is effected by dispositions of securities as well as the differences between carrying basis and market values. Gains and losses on securities sold during the year are computed from the carrying value basis.

NOTE 6. FUTURE HOME SITE FUND: As the Skilled Nursing Unit of the Eastern Star Home cannot accommodate more then thirty-eight residents, it cannot meet the needs of the present and future residents. Due to the age and location of the Eastern Star Home, the Skilled Nursing Unit cannot be enlarged. Therefore, the Grand Chapter of the State of California, Order of the Eastern Star, authorized the formation of the Future Home Site Fund, the start of which was the transfer of \$250,000 from the Operating Fund. The Fund shall be further expanded by donations. These monies will be under the direction of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes and if the monies are not expended within ten years, they shall revert back to the Operating Fund.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA (By Earl Heverly, Past Patron (444), President)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers;

In presenting our Annual Report on the Eastern Star Home, may I begin by introducing to you the capable and dedicated members now serving on the Board of Trustees:

Sisters Barbara Campbell, W.G.M., Brothers Clint Dillon, W.G.P., Nola Bragulla, Connie Harrington, Lila Hummell, Kathryn Carmignani, Warren Wildman, P.G.P., Vice President, Milton Dales and myself, Earl Heverly, Board President. Sisters Diane Silva and Viola Perry of the Grand Chapter Office serve as Secretary and Treasurer. We want to thank both of them for their un-tiring help in conducting the business of the Home.

I would be remiss if I did not give special recognition to two of our members. Nola Bragulla completes her second three-year term as a member of this Board and pursuant to the Constitution and Laws is not eligible for re-election. Nola has served with distinction over the past six years, spending many, many hours taking care of the myriad duties that are involved in being a member of the Board of Trustees. As the senior member of our Board, she has given invaluable counsel to me and because of her vast experience with the working of the Home, to the Board. Thank you, Sister Nola, for your un-tiring efforts. We will miss you.

Another Board Member, Chet Mell, was also in his final year of his six years as a member of the Board when he was forced to resign because of health reasons. Chet has willingly given many hours of his time doing everything necessary to provide a home-like atmosphere for the ladies in our Home. We have missed Chet's advise and counsel. Thank you, Chet, for your service to our Home and to our Order.

We welcome Sister Kay Carmignani as our newest member of the Board. She was appointed by Sister Barbara Campbell, W.G.M., to fill out the un-expired term of Brother Chet.

This report, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987, is presented for your consideration in regard to the property of the Home, its condition, and the operation of this important charity as is required under the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.

At our last Grand Chapter, an Eastern Star Home Report was given by the President, Earl Marshall, outlining the history of our Home, tracing the various changes in health care over the past fifty years and enumerating some of the problems facing us in the operation of a Health Facility.

Some of the problems predicted have come to focus sooner than we had anticipated. Our Home is licensed by the State Department of Social Welfare and the State Department of Public Health under Federal Registry Title 22, as a Residential Facility of 103 residential beds and 39 nursing care beds. At the present time, there are 78 residents in the Home, one in the Mar Vista Sanitarium and one in the Crescent Bay Convalescent Hospital. Of the 78 residents, 38 are in the Infirmary or Nursing Unit. We are required by law to keep one bed in the Infirmary open for any emergency. During the year, since all of the available beds in the Infirmary were occupied, it was necessary to temporarily transfer some of the ladies to the Crescent Bay Convalescent Hospital for care. This additional cost of approximately \$2,100 per month for each lady has created an inbalance in our budget. At one time, we had six ladies outside the Home. This created a \$67,000 overage in that budget item.

Because the average age of the residents is 88.4 years, we can expect a large percentage of deaths during the year. This past year, we have had 21 deaths. This relieved some of the pressure for beds in the Infirmary and we were able to move most of the transferred ladies back to the Home.

We had 10 admissions during the year, but because the age of the applicant is getting higher each year, a larger percentage must be moved into the Infirmary for care and treatment.

In matters relating to residential care, in a non-profit facility there is and has been considerable legislative pressure. Added rules and certification requirements have pinpointed a conflict between the laws of the State of California governing non-profit corporations and our fraternal Constitution and Laws. Considerable time and study has been given to this problem by your Board of Trustees in cooperation with the Board's attorney, Brother Steve Doan, Brother Tom Sagar and the Jurisprudence Committee, Brother Gerald Cashion, P.G.P., and the Constitution and Laws Committee, and Brother James Craven, P.G.P., and the Finance Committee. As a result, certain items of legislation have been presented at this Grand Chapter Session to resolve this problem. It is the intent of these changes not to dilute in any way the Board's basic legal responsibility to manage the assets and day-to-day operation of the Eastern Star Homes of California, a non-profit public benefit corporation whose assets are irrevocably dedicated for charitable purposes. It is hoped that the voting delegates will give thoughtful consideration to these proposals.

The Eastern Star Home is, from a financial standpoint, the major "business" of the Order. In an effort to achieve the goals we have set for the Home and to have an efficient operation as possible, a sub-committee has been formed from members of the Board of Trustees and the Finance Committee. This committee has met several times this year to resolve some of the mutual problems and to effect guidelines for the future. Great progress has been made in this effort. Check lists and procedural manuals have been instigated for the handling of day-to-day financial matters in the operation of the Home. We all feel that the effort has been worthwhile.

The Board of Trustees has been extremely conscious of their stewardship in the preparation of the budget. This year's budget is based on an average of 85 residents of which 38 are in the Infirmary and 15 in the Personal Care Unit, with the balance in the Residential Wing. Because of the careful planning and the excellent cost management by Mary Lou McElroy, the Home Administrator, and her staff, transfers of funds from the Home Operating Fund and the surplus fund were not required, even though such transfers were approved at the 1986 Grand Chapter Session. The 1987–88 budget was submitted to the Finance Committee for review and approval. With their approval, later in this session you will be asked to approve the budget.

Our Eastern Star Home was dedicated during the Great Depression to provide comprehensive residential service to our members, over 65, who need and desire charitable care. Our Home has met the test of time and has met every challenge in achieving its original purpose... "to own and manage a Home for the care and support of aged, indigent or infirm Members of the California Order of the Eastern Star." Once a member decides to live in our Home and conforms to the requirements of admission, we, the members have a contractual commitment to provide total care for the remainder of their life.

We, as members of the Board of Trustees, feel that the important phrase is <u>providing a Home</u> for the ladies—not an institutional setting. We, therefore, in all of our planning, try to achieve that goal. To do this, we have a professional staff and individual employees who always keep the welfare of the ladies in mind when carrying out their duties. Many daily activities are planned for the ladies and they have but to participate to have a full and enjoyable life in their Home.

Several eagerly anticipated special events for this year included the traditional visit by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron on May 22th, the Christmas Party on December 13th, and the "Hurrah for Hollywood" Fiesta on June 6th and 7th.

The Official Visit is always a highlight for the ladies so that they can meet and get to hear messages from the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron. This year our Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Thelma Bailey, was a special plus to the visit. After the official part of the meeting, each Grand Officer escorted one of the ladies to the buffet table for refreshments. Other members escorted the remaining ladies so that each had an escort.

For the Christmas Party, the generous gifts made possible by the donations from Chapter members were distributed by Santa Claus and his helpers, making each lady feel "special" at that happy season. On behalf of the ladies, we want to thank the members for their kindness and thoughtfulness in remembering them. As an additional surprise, Sister Barbara and Brother Clint and the Grand Officers presented a stuffed animal to each of the ladies present. They later took one to each of those who were bedridden. It was a real thrill to see the ladies' expressions when this surprise came.

The "Hurrah for Hollywood" Fiesta was a well managed success and those who were in charge of this two-day event are to be complimented on a job "well done." In addition to being a social success, it was also a financial success in that over \$22,000 was donated toward the Worthy Grand Matron's special project of remodeling and refurbishing the Nurses' Station in the Infirmary.

Other activities are planned and sponsored by various groups throughout the year. The Booster Club, formed a couple of years ago, has an event planned each month for the ladies. Many Chapters come to the Home for a meeting. These special events are over and above all of the individual visits of members to the Home to visit the ladies. All of these activities are planned and carried out to assure the residents of our home that they are not forgotten.

Our Home is now an active participant in the Masonic Homes Executive Association of North America which represents some 44 Homes throughout the United States. This year the annual seminars were held in San Jose and hosted by our Masonic Home in Union City and Covina. Much beneficial information was made available to us as Trustees and to the Administrator which has already been put to use.

Two matters of special interest require your continued attention. First, you are urged to make greater use of the members of the Home Endowment Committee in your meetings, inviting them to bring their message to the membership and to encourage increased participation and interest in Home matters. Second, should you become involved in an application by one of your Chapter members for admission to the Home, treat the application and the investigation with a thoroughness and completeness that are essential to

expedite the review process. Remember that the Trustees and the Grand Secretary are available to assist you so that the application moves to the Board of Trustees in a timely manner.

It is a pleasure to offer this report to you, fully recognizing the dedication and devotion of so many people who have made this operation of our Eastern Star Home a proud benefit for our Members. Our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Barbara Campbell, and our Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Clint Dillon, have been most helpful in their participation in all phases of the activity. The Grand Chapter Office makes a major contribution to our services performed for applicants and the residents, alike. The professional staff and employees at the Home have done an exemplary job, making the Home a show place among other similar residential facilities. The Residents, through their Harmony Council and a program of volunteers, are most helpful by greeting new residents, welcoming visitors, and by conducting tours through the Home lend an air of fraternalism at its best.

To my co-members of the Board of Trustees, I offer my thanks and the thanks from the members of Grand Chapter for your many hours of service that you have given to the Home and in the difficult issues we have had to confront in this year of transition. You have always held the ultimate goal before you of "How best we can serve this important charity that we represent."

Finally, we thank the members in California for their continued support and for their generous contributions that make it all possible. You have never failed to support our Home and we again recommend the continuation of the \$2.00 assessment during the ensuing year in order to properly fund this important charity.

Dr. Fred Richburg, Potentate of Tehran Temple, wishes you a successful annual Grand Chapter of California of the Eastern Star, and we welcome all of you to Fresno, the Sunshine City.

Potentate Fred Richburg's theme this year is "We are proud to be Shrine Masons." I personally want to thank all of you who work so hard to help support the world's greatest philanthropy, "Shriner's Hospitals for Crippled and Burned Children." We support nineteen orthopedic and three burn hospitals. Our first hospital was opened in 1922 in Shreveport, Louisiana. Our twenty-two Shrine Hospitals to date have cured or improved the quality of life for approximately 300,000 children at a cost of 1.2 billion dollars. In 1986, we admitted 2072 children to our three burn hospitals and 13,859 to the nineteen orthopedic hospitals. Also, 135,266 out-patient clinic visits to the 22 hospitals, who are admitted up to 18 years of age. The average length of stay in our orthopedic hospitals is 17 days and 21 days for burned children. For reconstructive work, 7 days, and the thing to be especially proud of is 96.5 percent of the operative budget was spent in direct support of our hospitals in 1986. Only 3 1/2 percent was spent for administration costs. Remember, a crippled or burned child's smile makes it all worth while.

Once again, we encourage your continued support to our charitable programs, which is representative of all of our bodies.

Marie and I wish to express our gratitude to the Worthy Grand Matron for being included in your Grand Chapter's Program.

INSTRUCTIONS ON ELECTION PROCEDURE (By Walter Hammond, Past Patron (636), Chairman)

The following instructions will assist you in our voting procedure. Our Constitution and Laws provide that every Chapter in California is equal in voting power. Each Chapter is entitled to one vote for each of its four top officers. Plus a vote each for the Conductress and Associate Conductress

(providing that they are in attendance at the session) – if it has such officers duly installed. Each Chapter also has one collective vote for Past Matrons and one collective vote for Past Patrons. If a Past Matron, entitled to a full vote as a line officer, Deputy Grand Matron, Grand Officer or a Past Grand Elective Officer, is the only Past Matron of the Chapter attending the session, she is also entitled to the Past Matrons vote. The same is true regarding the Past Patron, with the exception of the Deputy Grand Matron part.

All delegates must be seated in the properly marked sections when voting. Any Grand Representatives, Choir Members, Inner or Outer Guards, Past Grand Elective Officers and those in the Medical Section who are delegates and entitled to vote, the ballot boxes will be passed to you providing you are seated in the proper designated sections. No ballots will be collected from any person outside of the Grand Chapter Session room.

You are not to leave your seat. Ballot boxes will be passed to you at which time you will deposit your ballot or ballots in the box. You will not vote for any candidate who has already been elected by unanimous ballot. If you are entitled to more than one ballot make sure you use the same one from each card and that they are separated.

On a ballot vote to amend any legislation, the Constitution requires a two-thirds majority to pass.

The Election Board Members will now retire to pick-up the ballot containers and report to their stations so that they are ready to pick-up ballots when the Worthy Grand Matron has declared the ballot open.

After the Worthy Grand Matron has declared the ballot closed, please remain in your seats so that the business of Grand Chapter can continue.

This indeed has been a busy year with the many consolidations and Chapters changing their bylaws for various reasons. There were approximately 151 submissions for changes in bylaws by subordinate Chapters and 6 consolidations, plus the consolidations that are now in process.

Many of the bylaws had to be returned due to the conflict with the Constitution and Laws of Grand Chapter. One of the most common was the Article under "Meetings." We have endeavored to have all subordinate Chapters use the wording of the Uniform Code when changing their bylaws and recommend that if more than one item is being changed in the bylaws, then each Chapter must use the Uniform Code and revise their entire bylaws. This in itself would eliminate many problems in the future in the subordinate Chapters.

This committee certainly acknowledges with appreciation the assistance rendered by the Jurisprudence Committee and the Finance Committee. We would also like to express our thanks and gratitude to our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva and her staff for the valuable assistance they have given to this committee.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for appointing our Sister Ardath Garst, Past Grand Matron, and Brother A. LeRoy Covey, Past Grand Patron, to this committee. Sister June, I thank you. Your incisive thinking and ability to pinpoint issues have always been generously extended at my request, and I know that your counsel to me has enabled me to make a greater contribution to our Order. I shall always be grateful.

The duties of the Committee on Jurisprudence, in addition to presenting recommendations on proposed legislation during Grand Chapter session, also include responding with advice and opinion concerning questions of the interpretation of our Constitution and Laws and other applicable Fraternal law and usage.

We stress that we only render advice and opinion as only the Worthy Grand Matron is empowered to make binding decisions. We also stress that it is our duty to advise only the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Chapter committee and members of Grand Chapter.

During this past year, we have been asked for our opinion concerning questions of the interpretation of our Constitution and Laws, questions of parliamentary procedure and other questions regarding other applicable Fraternal law and usage many, many times. In every instance, except that one or two where the problem resolved itself before the answer was given, we have provided a written opinion which we hope has been informative and helpful. I am pleased to add that in every case, by the time an opinion was ready to mail, it had been agreed to unanimously by all members of the committee. This not only gives added stability and strength to the opinions, but also discloses the desire and ability of the members to achieve harmony in our work.

Service on this committee has been a pleasure for the three of us and we extend our gratitude to the Worthy Grand Matron for our appointment. We have enjoyed serving our Grand Chapter and its members. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE (By James B. Craven, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates, Sisters and Brothers;

Before proceeding with my report, it is my pleasure to present the members of the Finance Committee: Sister Betty Stubblefield, Past Grand Matron, Brothers Phillip Brooks, Past Patron Orinda Chapter, Glenn Martin, Past Patron Yorba Linda Chapter, and Frank Young, Past Patron Idlewild Chapter.

Our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva, serves as Secretary to the Committee, and we express our appreciation to her and to our Grand Treasurer, Sister Viola Perry, and the entire office staff for the friendly cooperation and assistance they have given me and the members of the Committee this year.

MEETINGS: Seven committee meetings were held during the year, beginning in November 1986, January, March, May July, August and September 1987. Our May meeting was preceded by a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home, at which the Grand Line Officers were present.

I do wish to thank the Grand Line Officers for being in attendance at our meetings throughout the year. With their busy schedules, it was very difficult to make these meetings, but make them they did! Thanks to each and every one.

Our Committee has attended two joint meetings with Constitution and Laws, and Jurisprudence Committees, which the Grand Line also came to.

In December 1986, a new committee was formed consisting of two members of the Finance Committee and two members of the Board of Trustees. At their first meeting Phillip Brooks was elected Chairman. This committee was to rewrite and come up with new guide-lines for the disposition of the household items belonging to the ladies coming into the Home.

At our joint meeting with the Board of Trustees, we were told by our attorney, Stephen Doan, that gifts and donations to the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund were now tax deductible. This was very good news. It took over two years to get the IRS to agree, but the State of California Franchise Tax Board came through about six months after our request.

At the November, meeting we received the Marguerite Rennie Estate which has been placed in a separate fund all by itself and the money is to be used by the cancer fund only.

In January, Anne and Joe Morris made their final report to the Finance Committee of the income and expenses for the 1986 Grand Chapter Session. Also at the same meeting we were presented the 1987 Grand Chapter Session budget by the new Co-chairmen Dorothy and Clifford Feaver. They returned with a balanced budget at a later date.

Our Associate Grand Matron presented prices for temple rental and motel room rates for the School of Instruction which will follow the Grand Chapter Session. The committee approved her selections.

Phillip Brooks, next year's Chairman, has prepared our next year's budget which he will present to you shortly.

INVESTMENTS: This year Crocker Bank, the firm that was handling our investments, was taken over by Wells Fargo Bank. In the transition period, which took about three months, Mr. Wesley Petit of Crocker watched over our accounts until a new person was appointed from Wells Fargo. In the meantime, we have been talking to several other fund management firms. However, we have decided to put everything on hold until we can get legislation to change our account from a custodial account to a managerial account. We feel that a managerial account would be most beneficial for the Order mainly because the fund managers like to do what they are paid for, and that is manage the account. We are presenting new legislation asking approval for this change.

INSURANCE: We are no different than anyone else and insurance rates are going up! 94,316 members at \$1.40 is \$130,763. This is for liability insurance. You can see we are paying out a lot for our insurance coverage.

COMPUTER STATUS: This is the happiest part of my report. The Grand Chapter office has accomplished a lot, as all Chapter Secretaries have learned through the form they received for their annual reports. It is true they have found a lot of names that should not have been on it, but that could not be helped. Now I want to introduce to you the "Saturday Crew" as they have become known. The name came about when Sheri Weisser of San Lorenzo Chapter was putting the names into the computer and could see she would not make the deadline for the 1987 annual reports for the Secretaries.

So Sheri called around to eight other Sisters who could work on the computer and type. These Sisters volunteered their time and came into the Grand Chapter office on Saturdays and put into the computer all of the members' names so Sister Diane could get out the computer lists to her Secretaries. Sheri, would you please introduce to this Grand Chapter your "Saturday Crew." They are Zita Allenby, Orient (177), Lillie Mae Marsh, Hayward (331), Marcia McBrayer, Golden Wave (103), Barbara Wildman, Carita (115), Mary Kay Bowser, San Lorenzo (577), Geri Terry, Concord (384), Karen Brooks, Orinda (635), Kim Ribeira, San Lorenzo (577), and Sheri Weisser, Operations Manager, San Lorenzo (577), and Albert Silva, who is not with us today.

Thank you, Sister Sheri. Let's give these Sisters a good round of applause for all their donated hard work for our Grand Chapter office.

At the beginning of the fiscal year, each member of the Finance Committee was asked to take charge of a particular phase of our responsibilities. I want to thank the ones who performed their assignments capably and without any grumbling, and I want to thank Phillip Brooks for chairing the one meeting when I had to be absent. If in this next year his meetings go as fast as the one in July – only one hour long, it will be like listening to our Worthy Grand Matron speaking; but he got everything taken care of in a hurry just as the Worthy Grand Matron does.

I want to thank Past Grand Matron Sister Anita Simon for my appointment to the Finance Committee. It has really been a pleasure and a most rewarding experience.

We all want to express our appreciation to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for their cooperation. It takes team work and dedication to make any program a success.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BENEVOLENT FUND (By Marian F. Schwach, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers;

It is with satisfaction that we report a lessening of appeals, due partly to awakened realization of the responsibility of subordinate Chapters, partly, we like to believe, because of less stress. Government relief has been one factor in helping to solve our problems.

In many instances where relief has been extended over a period of many months, it was found necessary to interest county relief committees and welfare organizations. In several cases families were informed and found responsible and every effort is made to lessen the burden of Grand Chapter with as little distress to suffering members as possible.

Many fine letters testify to the appreciation of the recipients of our benevolence. Hospital visits are made and greatly appreciated by members who are taken ill while traveling and visiting in California. Your committee member visits these members, giving any help that is needed. It isn't always money that is needed; but to know they are not alone in a strange city – that a friend is standing by.

Again, we urge the subordinate Chapters to assume responsibility for the alleviation of distress among their members to the fullest extent possible. Owing to the multiplicity of appeals, the benevolence of the Grand Chapter, which must be extended over our entire territory, can serve only as an emergency relief which must not be confused with pension provision.

We recommend a budget of \$25,000.00 and \$300.00 for committee expenses – also the continuance of one cent (l¢) per capita. A detailed report will be published in the proceedings.

Your General Chairman wishes to express her appreciation of the splendid work of our "district" Chairmen and their successful adjustment of many difficult situations. We are grateful for the privilege of participating in this Holy work which is such a vital factor in the program of our Order.

As your Chairman many decisions are difficult to solve in out of state cases – it is then that I go for council to Sister Diane, our Grand Secretary – she is always there to listen and give helpful council. Diane, thank you for all you do beyond the call of duty. I feel blessed to call you friend.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers;

Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session, it's time for you to hear, what your Consolidation Committee has accomplished this year. We have worked very hard, there was so much to do, but first, it gives me great pride to present them to you.

Sisters, Ferne Hammond, Past Grand Matron, Agatha Bishop, Gloria Kimrey, Bobbie Glass, Jeannette Collins and Delories Bennett. Brothers, Harold Hand and Victor Legerton.

I cannot say enough in praise of our dedicated committee members. They have given many hours and driven many miles to explain procedures and to assist with consolidations. Thank you all for your careful attention to proper procedure and your consideration and kindnesses to our members and to me. I have received much praise on your behalf.

This has been another busy year for this committee as more and more Chapters consider consolidation. Two committee meetings were held early in the year, one in the North and one in the South. We were most pleased that our Worthy Grand Matron was able to attend both the Northern and the Southern meeting.

We are all aware of the drastic decline in membership that our Order has experienced. It only takes simple mathematics then to understand why there must also be a decline in the number of Chapters that the remaining membership can support. Since our last Grand Chapter session eleven (11) consolidations have been completed with five (5) more scheduled for completion in November. There are presently four (4) consolidations pending. A complete listing is included with this report.

Because of the growing number of consolidations, this committee felt that it was imperative that a handbook be provided to give our Chapters more detailed information to assist them before, during, and after a consolidation. Such a booklet has been prepared and it is available to any interested Chapter upon request. Every Chapter that votes to consider consolidation and every Chapter requesting information is sent a copy of this booklet. May I thank those who took the time to acknowledge the usefulness of this material. We appreciate the many nice compliments. I have books with me this week and will be happy to give one to the Worthy Matron of any interested Chapter.

The problems that face many of our Chapters are much the same all over the State. They are experiencing, declining membership with no potential for new members, the lack of sideliners, and the inability to obtain officers. We acknowledge that there are many dedicated and hard working members who have struggled for years to keep their Chapters together. But for many, time is running out and the hard working members are tired.

It may surprise you to learn that among the questions we are asked most frequently are, "When do we know if it's time to consolidate?" and "Why doesn't Grand Chapter tell us when we should consider consolidation?". The members of these declining Chapters know that their future is uncertain and that for the Good of the Order they should consolidate, but no one wants to take the responsibility of proposing such action. Instead they look to us for a solution. This committee recommends that the Constitution should include a section that will assist our Chapters in determining when consolidation is advisable. We will present such legislation for consideration at our 1988 session.

No committee chairman could possibly function without the backup support of our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva. This miracle worker and her efficient staff route reams of correspondence through our Grand Chapter office and answer hundreds of questions. A good amount of this paper work and many questions were generated this year because of consolidations. My sincere thank you, Sister Diane, for all you do to help me keep this committee running smoothly.

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for the support you have given us this year. The members of the Consolidation Committee are proud to be serving our Chapters in this capacity and we sincerely hope that our accomplishments have met with your approval. We believe that by joining together to create healthy, active Chapters we can attract new members to our Order.

Because you care Sisters and Brothers, our work is made possible, for you are the ones who contribute to the fund through personal donations, memorials and combined efforts on your many projects that provide the funds with which all bills are paid. Contributions and bequests are sent to the Grand Secretary's office and, for the year July 1, 1986 to June 30, 1987, contributions and bequests totaled \$127,234.00. For this same period of time, bills were paid on 108 applicants in the amount of \$201,791.00. Of this \$105,971.00 was for hospital care, for doctors and nurses \$71,217.00, for medicine, supplies and services \$24,603.00. During this period, we approved 59 applications, four of these were non-members. In addition to these amounts, since July 1, 1987 through September 30, 1987, we have approved 13 applications, one being a non-member and have paid bills in the amount of \$34,094.00 and for the same period the contributions were \$34,061.80.

May I ask the incoming Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons to contact and invite their Area Chairmen to speak at a Chapter meeting so our members may understand how this fund operates and be aware that aid is available if it is needed.

We must remember this fund was started to help those that have insufficient funds to cope with the ever increasing costs of medical care.

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve our members through this J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and with these hard working committee members.

We thank you, the members of California for making this fund possible.

Yesterday we heard the Report of the Board of Trustees of our Eastern Star Home. This Home has been a source of discussion for a long while, resulting in the formation of the "Future of Our Home" Committee and, we now will hear the report of that committee. Brother Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, and Chairman, please give your report and present your committee.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE FUTURE OF OUR HOME (By Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members. Delegates. Sisters and Brothers:

It is with pleasure that I introduce the members of this committee: Sister Nola Bragulla, Brother Lloyd Budwig. I am Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, Chairman.

We come to you with a report on the progress of this committee. We thank you Worthy Grand Matron for allowing this committee to continue for another year.

Would each of you who visited the Eastern Star Home since last Grand Chapter Session, please raise your hands. That's wonderful, Sisters and Brothers. Now will each of you who have visited the Home other than the Fiesta in the last five years, raise your hands. "No comment." Still the most urgent concern of the Home is the Infirmary, with only 39 beds. This facility is at capacity nearly all of the time, and which as you have already heard, has made the relocation of several residents to outside facilities a necessity. With the average age climbing this is not going to change. To enlarge the Infirmary cannot be done at the present site.

We have discussed at length the possibility of remodeling the west wing of the Home. On studying the floor plan, this could perhaps be done. However, this committee has reservations because:

- 1. The Home environment would remain the same, that of a Convalescent Home setting.
- 2. We are unable to keep some of the younger residents or encourage younger applicants for the reason just stated. They are not comfortable in this type of setting.
- 3. We would not be able to create a retirement atmosphere on the present site, the code and present conditions would not permit this to be done.
- 4. Are we being realistic to put several hundreds of thousands of dollars in this 55 year old building? Also, where would this money come from?
- 5. We still would not be able to take men and couples, as the Infirmary size would not change and the State Law prohibits men and women in the same room.

In reviewing some proceedings of the past we have learned that in 1953 the "Special Home Committee" had been appointed as they had some of the same problems we have today. Also, in the 100th Anniversary Book of 1973, the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons in the Pasadena area felt the need of a Retirement Home and were instrumental in starting the present Home. Upon dedicating this Home to Grand Chapter, it was their hope that the retirement setting would continue down through the years. We are not keeping that hope alive.

Some of the other possibilities that have been discussed with the Board of Trustees are:

- 1. Take members on a monthly charge basis.
- 2. Possibly taking members for short term convalescing on a charge basis.
- 3. The relocation of the Home to a site more adaptable to the retirement setting.

In pursuing the thought of relocation, there has been a preliminary contact made with a prospective developer, explaining the requirements, which are:

- a. The present Home site MUST remain intact as a Home, until the new facility is completed.
- b. The new facility would be built to our, meaning the Order's specifications.
- c. On property of our choice anywhere in the State.

There has been one such proposal made by a developer, agreeing to the above restrictions, with a negotiable sum of \$18 million dollars. This is but one offer.

Keeping this in mind, we were given a legacy some 55 years ago, that must be kept. We have an obligation to show that we the members of the Order of the Eastern Star care about the GOLDEN YEARS OF OUR SENIOR MEMBERS.

RESOLUTION 1987

The Eastern Star Home is nestled in a beautiful 20 acre setting of lawn, trees and garden. Each private and semi-private room has a wonderful view of the grounds. The past and present merge gracefully at the Home. Richly appointed lounges and bright sun-washed sitting areas are conveniently located for visiting with friends and family.

Friendly competition thrives at the billiard and card tables and on our 3-hold putting green. The sound of happy laughter can be heard as others join in a game of lawn bowling. Trips into town on the mini-coach or maybe a scenic nature trail walk for a morning or afternoons exercise around our well appointed grounds.

All of this from the privacy of ones own room or apartment plus the companionship and enjoyment that comes from being with others. The Eastern Star Home provides accommodations to meet every need. Quarters are available for married couples and private and semi-private rooms for single women and men.

Would you consider a Home like the one I just described? Give me a show of hands.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eastern Star Home property on Sunset Boulevard in Los Angeles be offered for sale pursuant to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. That the person(s) or company offering to purchase the property be required to place in Escrow monies to be used for the purchase of a new site of our choice.
- 2. That said person(s) or company agree to build a new Home in accordance with our plans.
- 3. That the present Eastern Star Home property on Sunset Boulevard to be retained as such, until completion is made on the new Home, and Home Residents have been moved in.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Future Homesite Committee be given authority by the members of this Grand Chapter to negotiate said sale; final approval being made with a majority vote of those present of the Board of Trustees and Finance Committee; with full knowledge that the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron are voting members of both Board and Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the building of the new Home will cost no more than the selling price of the Sunset Boulevard

property, resulting in fact, that the new site will be free and clear of any debt at the time of occupancy; and that the Future Homesite Committee be reimbursed for expenses incurred in line with their duties.

The funds for the expenses to be paid from the interest of the \$250,000. allocated at the 1986 Grand Session.

The reading of this RESOLUTION is for your information only; and cannot be voted on at this time, because of the same Jurisprudence ruling that applied to the Worthy Grand Patron's recommendation. We ask that you take back to your Chapters the printed copy of this Resolution included in your Registration Packet and discuss it with the members of our Order. Please contact any member of this committee and let us know your feelings, your questions and any recommendation you may have.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE ANNUAL SESSION SITE

(By Leon Moynier, Past Patron (362), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Members of the Grand Chapter of California;

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for my appointment as Chairman of this committee. It has been an honor to serve and has been very interesting and informative.

The others on the committee are Sister Grace Gould and Brother Gil Knutson, who was unable to attend this Grand Chapter Session. Thank you for your service on this committee.

To keep our annual sessions scheduled at least five years in advance, it is necessary to schedule a site for October 1992 at this session.

As you know, we are scheduled to meet again in Fresno in 1988, 1989 and 1990, then in Bakersfield in 1991.

At our Grand Session last year, the Palm Springs Convention Bureau bid for 1992, but no action was taken. Their new facility will have its Grand Opening in January 1988.

We've been contacted by San Jose and they have a new Convention Arena under construction and may wish to bid for our 1993 session.

Redding is currently taking a survey of groups using Convention Centers to learn their facility requirements and making a study to decide if it would be feasible for them to build a Convention Center in Redding.

With more communities constructing Convention Centers or planning to do so, the increased competition between cities to keep their facilities booked, should help us to find suitable sites that we can afford. An example is San Diego, where their Convention Bureau offered for the first time their downtown San Diego Convention and Performing Arts Center to us rent-free. The rental charges would be defrayed by their hotel room tax. Unfortunately, their representative could not come to personally present their offer and bid for 1992 to you. I visited their center recently and found a smaller arena, but very flexible and adequate for our shrinking attendance. They have a very large exhibit hall and a large number of meeting rooms. Four hotels are located adjacent to the center and many others a few blocks away.

To facilitate the process of a site selection for 1992, I have already presented the San Diego bid to the Finance Committee for their approval and recommendation to you. Their decision was to reject both Palm Springs and San Diego because the hotel rooms and parking fees would be too expensive.

Their recommendation is to tentatively schedule our 1992 session here in the Fresno Convention Center until further contacts can be made with the hotels and parking facility to see if special rates can be obtained that would be acceptable. The dates of October 15 through 22, 1992, are available and have been tentatively scheduled.

This year we will work out our schedules and planning so that it will get easier and easier as time goes by.

Having seen our Art Exhibit, you will realize this is something new for our Grand Chapter this year. There is some wonderful talent in our Chapters. My appreciation to the committee that arranged that under the direction of Sister Carmel Lindholm (370).

I don't want to step into my Jurisdiction's Master Councilor's speech, because he plans his speeches, and I don't, but Worthy Grand Matron, Barbara, I am going to give to you now our little DeMolay worm, and we hope it worms its way into your heart now and ever more. (Presenting stuffed toy.)

I am very proud, and I mean very privileged to introduce to you one of the finest Jurisdiction Master Councilors the Southern California Jurisdiction has ever had. I would like to present to you Brother Scott Lacy, Master Councilor of the Southern California Jurisdiction for the Order of DeMolay.

Scott Lacy, Master Councilor, Southern California Jurisdiction, Order of DeMolay: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Dad Boles, Ladies and Gentlemen, and I think that covers everybody.

I would like to thank you for allowing me to represent the Jurisdiction of Southern California here this afternoon.

I would like to bring greetings from the 3500 DeMolays of Southern California, south from Chula Vista, north to Santa Maria and Bakersfield, about 70 Chapters.

Scott Lacy, Master Councilor, Southern California Jurisdiction, Order of DeMolay: Worthy Grand Matron, I want to present you a Southern California pen and make you an Honorary Sweetheart of the Southern California Jurisdiction. Worthy Grand Patron, I would like to give you a pen and make you an Honorary Dad, also. (Presenting gifts.)

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: My thanks to both of these Master Councilors from their respective Jurisdictions. It seems only right that they should each come with exactly the same mascot. That shows their unity, though they are organized officially into two Jurisdictions.

We thank you, young men. I certainly thank you for the Honorary Sweetheart certificate.

Clinton Dillon, Worthy Grand Patron: We can all take a lesson from the message that you presented here today. It truly is inspiring, the Youth Orders are our lifeblood, and we thank you for what you're doing for the betterment of the Masonic Fraternity in the way of DeMolay.

Brother Richard Stephenson and Brother Tom Boles, I have know Tom for some time, and what an enthusiastic individual he is.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL CANCER DRESSING STATIONS (By Catherine Scott, Past Matron (428), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

I have the pleasure of presenting the two Co-Chairmen of the Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations Fund:

Sisters Betty Scriber, Sunnyvale Chapter No. 250 and Margaret LaFollette, La Sierra Chapter No. 555.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, it is a pleasure for me to present these awards on behalf of the American Cancer Society. They wish to express their appreciation for the many hours of work performed by the members of the Order of Eastern Star and for the material supplied for dressings for the use of cancer patients. In this thirtieth year of our liaison with the American Cancer Society, please accept these gifts expressing their appreciation of the untiring services performed by our volunteer workers. (Presenting Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron with marble paperweights from American Cancer Society.)

As we entered our thirtieth year, I contacted stations to see how many of the original stations were still active. At one time there were 127 stations. Now there are 87 stations and one sub-station. There are 18 of the original stations active and some still have charter members in attendance. One new station opened this year at Rio Linda No. 631, and five stations closed: Burbank, Escondido, Greenville, Santa Monica and Van Nuys.

Our thirtieth year was highlighted by appearing on television. Channel 10 of Sacramento brought their camera crew to the Masonic Temple and filmed the Temple Chapter Station as they worked. Worthy Matron, Mildred Brehm made the arrangements and Station Chairman, Sister Viola Newman, had the records of the entire thirty years on display. The filming was broadcast several times and it was rewarding to receive this media coverage throughout the State.

Another outstanding event for the stations was the visits of our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Barbara Campbell. The workers were so proud and pleased when she came and expressed her appreciation of their efforts.

My sincere appreciation for appointing Sisters Margaret and Betty as my co-chairmen. They have been outstanding. They have traveled, spoken whenever asked, visited stations and given instructions.

A grateful thanks to Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, who is an Honorary Member of my own El Camino Chapter. We appreciate her constant devotion to the project. She is always available for advice and encouragement.

My heartfelt thanks to our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva, and her competent staff who have so efficiently helped when I needed information concerning the committee.

To those wonderful people known as Station Chairmen, who give such dedicated service, my deep appreciation. Their cooperation in keeping accurate records and their prompt mailing of reports is so essential. Their surveillance and observation results in a quality of dressings that have earned many compliments and expressions of gratitude from the recipients.

Our Stations would not function if we did not have many devoted volunteer workers. We have many workers who are not members of the Order but are determined to help someone in need. Some have relatives who have received our dressings and this is their way of expressing thanks. Several stations report that Rainbow Girls help during summer months. We so appreciate our youth becoming involved.

Kolean Naten, Coordinator of the American Cancer Society Dressings Depot in Sacramento is excellent and effective in her support of the workers and their efforts. The Depot is stocked with dressings for distribution to regular patients, also immediate requests are filled. She, too, visits local Stations to apprise them of the needs of the area. The American Cancer Society furnishes pins to present to workers as recognition for years of service.

We wish to thank the many members and groups throughout the State who work each year to help our Fund. The San Diego and East Bay Breakfasts and the San Francisco Tea at the home of Sister Jane Donovan, are the largest sources of donations. We appreciate the continuing support of Past Grand Matrons Sisters Marguerite Weisheimer, Florence Dunn, Lilas Haug, Patricia Quibell and Ferne Hammond and their Associations.

The annual number of patients receiving our dressings remains fairly constant, between 1,400 and 1,800. This year we served 1,488 patients. 150 had OES/Masonic affiliation.

The dressings distributed were 36,578 dozen. The bed pads were 22,986 dozen. Stoma bibs distributed 10,203 and the prosthesis for "Reach to Recovery" kits 8,737. The number of hours worked was 48,551 and the number of volunteers was 1,102.

The balance of the fund at the beginning of the year was \$73,957. Contributions were \$70,838, Bequests were \$17,333. Material cost was \$59,512. (This price reflects a higher quality of gauze that was essential for making all unfilled dressings.) The ending balance was \$100,245.

The American Cancer Society reports that the need for our kind of dressings has diminished. Most of the patients receiving services are terminally ill and the greatest need is for bed pads and incontinent briefs. However, I am assured that they are still in need of our support even though the needs of the cancer patient is changing.

So my Sisters and Brothers, to meet the needs of the cancer patient, we must continue with devotion, skill, time and donations of funds to this worthwhile project.

Our Sister Lenora Lushbaugh, is the capable Chairman of the Cancer Dressings Booth this year. Please stop and avail yourself of our Gift Wrapping Service and take time to see the dressings on display, then return to your Chapters and report to your members the service we give to promote the comfort of cancer patients. See that our dressings program is an avenue for public relations in your community. Better the image of our Order by letting your area know these dressings are for members and non-members alike. The dressings are not charity but are theirs just for the asking. The recipients are so grateful – the rewards so many.

Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron: Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, and may I thank the Chairman of our Cancer Dressing Fund Committee and members of her committee and through them, the American Cancer Society.

I well remember, in 1956, when I first approached the American Cancer Society and asked them to work with us in distributing these dressings to needy cancer patients. I remember their reluctance to accept that responsibility. They did, however, do so; and after the end of one year, I asked them why they were so reluctant to accept it, and they said, "Well, they had seen ladies coming along who wanted to do good, and they would carry on for a few months, or maybe a year, and then drop it." And they said, "You know, we can't do that to our cancer patients. If we teach them to rely on us for dressings, we must have them to provide them."

Thirty year later, we are still doing so, and I am very grateful to all the members of our Order who have supported this very merciful project, which also has helped our Grand Chapter because of the benefit to our Chapter, because it has helped us in our non-profit situation.

Clinton Dillon, Worthy Grand Patron: I, too, would like to add my thanks to the American Cancer Society for being recognized for our work in this way.

Cancer has touched my family, and I appreciate this, and I appreciate all of those ladies sitting there, working to put those cancer dressings together, and the distribution of the dressings. It has truly been a successful project and for thirty years. We thank you so much for your labor of love.

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Catherine and Sisters Betty Scriber and Margaret LaFollette for your constant work, and to each member of the stations throughout the state, we appreciate you. It was our pleasure to visit a few of the stations this year. I am sorry we couldn't get to more, but I enjoyed being with you, and if I ever learn to fold properly, maybe I will help sometimes. But I have already been thrown out by my local Cancer Dressing Station for being too slow.

There having been no business for the Committee on Dispensation and Charters, there will be no report.

I thank you, Brother John Allen and Sisters Gilma Vick Moyers and Anita Simon, for having agreed to serve on this committee. I am very sorry that we do not have any new Chapters this year, so that you would have had some work.

Jean Powers, Associate Grand Matron: Our Sister Eleanor Marsh is Cancer Project Member of General Grand Chapter, and I request that, during the ensuing Grand Chapter year, permission be granted to engage in a project in cooperation with the General Grand Chapter Cancer Project Committee, and that pins provided by that committee be sold through the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and the Cancer Dressing Stations Committees, with the net proceeds being turned over to the Grand Chapter for credit with the General Grand Chapter and that allocation be made to the specific Grand Chapter fund from which the proceeds were received. May I put this in the form of a motion?

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: Yes, Sister Associate Matron.

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: One of our new committees will now give us their first report at a Grand Chapter. Sister Wilda, may I have you and your Aims and Objectives Committee, please.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AIMS AND OBJECTIVES (By Wilda Grunert, Past Matron (76), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California;

Last year the members of our Grand Chapter adopted an amendment creating the Aims and Objectives Committee. Those of us who were the first appointed to this committee felt a challenge of great depth, understanding, patience and responsibility. We soon realized this and set forth challenging every source of concern that confronted us. The real challenge was to determine how we might best serve the Order and fulfill the intent of the Committee. In formulating working plans this Committee met monthly, discussing and evaluating every challenge that was presented to us in letters, communications, phone calls and voiced opinions.

We are aware that many of the demands and questions confronting us in the letters addressed to our Committee have seemingly continued from year to year, such as: expensive dresses, too many corsages, too much gift giving, asking members for donations, constant money making projects, cut expenses in every possible avenue both at subordinate Chapter and Grand Chapter levels, poor ritualistic work, meetings too long by repetitious thank yous and inefficiently conducted

meetings, prolonged escorts, expensive decorations, countless party nights which entail too much traveling, shorten Grand Chapter, get on with pertinent business, and the one great item all through the years – membership loss! Now there is no way to legislate many of these complaints, but hopefully some could be corrected. We have made the present Grand Line Officers aware of the feelings of the membership in these areas of concern, but, do not overlook the possibility that the solution to some of these problems could be corrected within your own Chapters or Associations.

It is interesting to find that as far back as the early 1900's the work load for the Worthy Grand Matron was getting too heavy. Yes, our state is miles long, and has grown since then, tremendously – the cities have grown – traffic has increased – and crime. Even our Order has grown since then and with more people, more problems. The work load is tremendous now too, not only for the Worthy Grand Matron, but for the entire elected Grand Line as well. So, we as a Committee looking at the Aims and Objectives for the future of our Order as well as our members, feel convinced that it is most imperative that we continue to meet with these dedicated officers to advise, support and help eliminate some of the work load with any and all ideas that would lighten the burden of their work.

The Committee realizes numerous Chapters are having difficulty getting Line Officers. We suggest that they re-evaluate the demands they are making on these officers by putting the responsibility on so few people to meet the budget requirements, especially at a time when we are faced with greater restrictions on fund-raising activities.

The greatest change and the most frustrating challenge in our Order is that of membership; not only the decline in membership but lack of attendance. This challenge seems to be first on everyone's mind and it was the one important current situation we dealt with at every meeting. The membership situation is not new. It has been a burning thorn ever since our Order began. Yes, for a few years we were gaining members and flourishing, but with a free people progress does not stand still. With progress came - the movies - then television - now the big commercial bingo games - more organizations to join jobs became more stressful - life styles changed due to our economy forcing many families to work at two jobs - our children becoming involved in more school activities and Youth Groups thus hopefully to keep them busy and out of trouble - in the cities traffic became a tangle - meeting places for our meetings were in bad districts due to growth in the cities difficulty in parking - people afraid to go out at night - and our members once young during the flourishing years are getting

older – and with the world getting smaller due to faster and increased travel, retirement is bringing other avenues of fun times. Yes, we want the young people to join; but, we must remember they are going to college, getting their first jobs and careers started, getting married, having children and economical problems are also a big factor. So in order to find a solution to all the above matters, our committee approached our Associate Grand Matron asking her cooperation in instituting a membership program for the coming year. We are hopeful, with the cooperation of all members, this will produce good results and if it goes well perhaps it may be continued in the future.

We received letters indicating much concern about the proficiency of the ritualistic work as well as the efficiency with which the business of the Chapter is handled. So with some expertise gained from past experiences, we intend to pursue the possibility of establishing some type of proficiency examination for the appointment of Deputy Grand Matrons and/or Deputy Grand Patrons.

We are also investigating some possible changes of certain items of business which may help shorten the Chapter meetings, another concern in many letters received. Attending the meeting is an investment of time on the part of our members and they would appreciate more efficient and shorter meetings.

Another area of concern is the need for consolidations. The apparent reluctance on the part of some members to approach the subject of consolidation of their Chapter points out the need for some guidelines within our Constitution. In this way, the Worthy Grand Matron could send a member of the Consolidation Committee to a Chapter with the request that consolidation proceedings be started.

The Aims and Objectives Committee intends to work with the Consolidation Committee to determine the guide lines and possibly draft the legislation needed to accomplish this objective.

Grand Chapter is held once a year for the purpose of bringing together all the voting delegates of the subordinate Chapters and presenting to them the new legislation. The delegates at Grand Chapter last year voted to include the Conductresses and Associate Conductresses as voting members. Our Committee discussed legislation and voting delegates to a great extent. In our final analysis, we believe that instead of holding individual legislative meetings it would be advantageous and educational for all voting delegates to be subjected to the same information at one time; after all, that is what the delegates come to Grand Chapter for — legislation. We, therefore, urge the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to consider the following recommendation:

"The legislative sessions previously held by the Grand Line Officers be discontinued and that an open legislative meeting for all voting delegates be held, to be chaired by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, in conjection with Committees of Jurisprudence, Finance, and Aims and Objectives."

We also believe some productive activity could be directed by two more recommendations and we urge the Grand Line Officers to consider the savings, in money and time, that could be effected by these recommendations.

First, "In an effort to reduce monetary costs, time and effort to Grand Chapter and the subordinate Chapters as well, we recommend that the decorations for Grand Chapter be utilized for the entire week including Installation."

Second, "In an effort to save time, we recommend that the reports of the Grand Chapter Week Committees be incorporated into the report given by the General Chairman of Grand Chapter Week."

It is gratifying to know that the Worthy Grand Matron has already implemented several of the proposals and ideas that were discussed by this Committee.

This Committee looks forward to the input from all members as to their concerns about the future of our Order and will participate in sending to us, the Committee, your thoughtful comments and suggestions, in order that continuity may be maintained in all aspects regarding the Future and Aims of our Grand Chapter.

I close this report with the words given by Robert Morris as a symbol to us as members, which we repeat time and time again, - "So may it ever be" - a symbol that the membership and officers are in Unity, Peace and Harmony.

The Home Endowment Fund Committee is given the responsibility by our Worthy Grand Matron of informing and acquainting our members of the need to continue building this Fund. This committee has once again traveled many thousands of miles in their designated areas of the State to encourage our members to contribute to the fund in many different ways.

1987 was another good year for the Home Endowment Fund; however, there was a decrease in Life Sponsorships sold and contributions stayed approximately the same as last year. 32 Chapters will be receiving Silver Stars which designates they have contributed \$2.00 or more per dues paying member. A total of 1,327 Life Sponsorships were sold, and total contributions from our members of \$90,157.

We deeply appreciate the donations made to this Fund whether large or small. It is not an easy task asking members year after year to contribute to this Fund, but we must all realize the necessity of constantly building the principal, thus deriving added interest. As our economic structure changes, so does the expense of running and maintaining our Eastern Star Home.

Again this year, many Chapters have failed to reach 100% Honor Roll status by very small amounts. To all Associate Matrons here today, this could have been avoided if you will check with your Secretary in April or May to see how your Chapter stands. All contributions must be at the Grand Chapter office by June 30, but I received checks as late as this past week with the hopes they could be counted for this past year. Please follow through on this and be sure your Secretary is sending in the money at the right time.

There are a few Chapters I wish to single out for special recognition. For the second consecutive year, the largest amount was given by Area 23 which covers Gardena, Bellflower, Torrance, and the Long Beach areas. The second largest contributions were shared equally by Area 21 which includes Burbank, San Fernando Valley, Ventura and Santa Barbara area, and Area 24 in the greater Los Angeles area.

9 Chapters have achieved Honor Roll status for 20 or more consecutive years; 14 other Chapters have reached 15 or more consecutive years. Point Firmin No. 512 had the highest percent participation with Bakersfield, Veritas and Silver Spray all having 500% or more.

Top honors again go to La Posa No. 282 and Manchester No. 449 for being 100% for 26 consecutive years.

The Chapters having achieved Honor Roll status by contributing \$1.00 or more per member this year, as has been reported to me, and thus receiving their gold or silver star. These stars and/or certificates will be personally delivered to each Chapter by the Area Chairmen.

SUPPLEMENT TO THE REPORT OF THE 1986 COMMITTEE ON APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES

Reflecting Conclusion of Unfinished Committee Business (By David A. Minnich, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

The 1986 Chairman, Brother Earl Eckert, Past Grand Patron, reported, in part, that a particular matter was investigated during that year and that a recommendation was sent to the Worthy Grand Matron that the facts did establish that two trials should be held and that two subordinate Chapter officers were found, by the Trial Commissioners, to be not guilty as charged; (the 1987 Committee had only passive interest except to report the results just given).

The 1986 Chairman also recommended to the Grand Chapter, and it was accepted, that another matter, still under investigation at that time, be carried over to the incoming Committee for conclusion. The matter referred to was later to come into the jurisdiction of a subordinate Chapter wherein two members of that Chapter were tried for alleged offenses. Each was judged to have been guilty of conduct unbecoming a member of the Order and penalties of expulsion were pronounced. An appeal to those judgments and penalties was taken, jointly and together, by the expelled members, thereby returning jurisdiction to the Grand Chapter for further disposition. On the question of further or final disposition, referral is made to the several reports of the 1987 Committee on Appeals and Grievances and of Special Committees on Trial Review.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES

(By David A. Minnich, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

The Committee on Appeals and Grievance has been called upon to be involved in several distressing matters during the fraternal year just past. Charges, alleging unfraternal conduct, were filed by a total of 18 members, the number of accused members amounting to 4 and subordinate Chapters where trials were conducted, 2 (a supplemental report, previously presented, reflects passive Committee interest in 2 additional trials during January, 1987). Detailed revelation of the names of members and the names, numbers and locations of the respective Chapters within which trials were held will not be a part of this Report. It is noted, however, that for the single case where a penalty of suspension was invoked and appeal not taken, the trial procedures were reviewed, automatically, by the Grand Chapter. Also reviewed were the procedures and penalties for those cases where appeals were filed by 2 expelled members. Reports of Special Committees on Trial Review and such of their findings as may be shown by those reports are to be had elsewhere.

The Committee reports that no appeal has been referred to it respecting a decision of any presiding officer, Grand or subordinate. Exceptional pleasure is taken in reporting that, notwithstanding that the indiscriminate use of the black cube has been deplored in many past reports, no grievance alleging such deportment has been referred to this Committee during 1987.

The Committee wishes to thank our Worthy Grand Matron for her expression of exceeding trust in appointing the present members. We have been privileged to serve in a manner which we believe has been fair and equitable and where allegations have been made we have limited our official involvement to those acts which are either permitted by directive of the Worthy Grand Matron or are mandated by provisions of our Constitution and Laws.

We are appreciative of the help given when we were occasionally obliged to seek the advice of our Committee on Jurisprudence and, where appropriate, the concurrence of the Worthy Grand Matron in that Committee's opinion, as to interpretation of our laws, this Committee keeping at all times the end in view that the rights of our Sisters and Brothers, on either side of any issue, should not be unlawfully, nor unwittingly, abridged.

We are thankful also for the assistance we have received from our Grand Secretary and her staff, and from the many members of our Order who have cooperated during our investigations. Included in this latter group are the Past Matrons who served as confidential Secretaries to the Committee. To the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of the several subordinate Chapters to which trials were assigned, and to the members of those Chapters, this Committee, on behalf of your Grand Chapter, extends our most fraternal regard and gratitude.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TRIAL REVIEW (By Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron. The members of the Special Committee on Trial Review are Sister Kathleen MacDonald, Past Matron, and Brothers Henry E. Woods, Past Grand Patron, John Runcie, Past Patron, and V. O. Campbell, Past Patron.

We were prepared to report this afternoon but now, on advice of the Jurisprudence Committee, we agree we cannot make a report at this session.

The reason for this last minute change in the plans for reporting is that there is a provision for filing an appeal to the judgment of the Special Committee on Trial Review, the time limit of which has not yet run out.

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: Because the time limit for appeal to the report of this committee has not run out, we will therefore not have the report at this time. We will have it next year at the session.

Thank you very much. I appreciate the work that you people have done and shall see your report later.

"Ode to Joy"......California Singing Stars

Barbara Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron: Last year we added a part to our Constitution, Section 51, which is to make it possible to keep a more permanent record of the decisions of the Worthy Grand Matron from one year to the next, so we do not have to go back and start over. The General Grand Chapter has such a book, which is called the "Red Book", and there are all the decisions of Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons. In California we never got a start. This, then, is the first year that the Worthy Grand Matron is asked to submit opinions that she has rendered throughout the year, and then once you have heard them, they will go into a permanent record for us. So I shall read this.

DECISIONS OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON 1986 – 1987

Scholarship Fund

A Chapter may not set-up a Scholarship Fund from funds willed to it by a deceased member because our Constitution and Laws reserve all powers to Grand Chapter not specifically delegated to the subordinate Chapters. The authority to set-up a Scholarship Fund has not been delegated, and further Grand Chapter has its own comprehensive Scholarship Fund. An ongoing

Chapter Scholarship Fund would also violate the rule against "earmarking" funds; that is, it would be a violation on the use of its funds imposed on the Chapter at a future time.

Constitution and Laws Sections 96, 177.

Grand Chapter Projects

The sale of items by committees or associations as money making projects require Grand Chapter approval when such projects are designated "Grand Chapter" projects.

Constitution and Laws Section 55.

Past Matrons and Past Patrons

The Past Matrons and Past Patrons of a Chapter include its affiliated Past Matrons and Past Patrons.

Constitution and Laws Section 143.

Costs of Trial

"The costs of any record reasonably required and any other expenses incurred incident to the conduct of the trial," as used in Part VI "Laws Pertaining to Discipline," do not include expenses incurred by the accused, including attorney fees. Such costs for trial of any member, other than a Grand Officer, must be borne by the Chapter of which the accused is a member.

Constitution and Laws Section 931.

Reinstatement

When a Brother loses his good standing in the Order of the Eastern Star because he has lost his good standing as a Master Mason, he is reinstated as an affiliated Master Mason unless he was previously suspended and/or in arrears in his dues or assessments.

Constitution and Laws Sections 242, 250.

Life Membership on Dissolution of Chapter

When requested to do so, the Worthy Grand Matron has full power and discretion to approve any special arrangement to insure continuance of Life Membership in a Chapter of the Life Member's choice on dissolution of a Chapter, whether by consolidation or surrender or revocation of its charter, or otherwise.

Constitution and Laws Section 310.

Life Membership

Purchase of a Life Membership does not exclude the member from payment of Grand Chapter per capita dues, fees and assessments. However, it is proper for the Chapter, if it wishes, to make such payments for the Life Membership Fund.

Constitution and Laws Sections 181, 193.

Life Membership may not be transferred from one Chapter to another, except upon dissolution of a Chapter.

Constitution and Laws Section 310.

Appeals

A Brother (after conviction of charges of conduct unbecoming a member) appealed, and subsequent to his conviction, and prior to completion of the appeal process, he was convicted in a Masonic Lodge and expelled. He is still entitled to fully appeal the Eastern Star conviction.

Constitution and Laws Sections 951, et seq.

Recommendations to Grand Chapter

Recommendations embodied in reports to Grand Chapter shall be filed with the Grand Secretaries office 30 days prior to Grand Chapter.

Constitution and Laws Section 111. Rule 6.

W. Way and Morris Cecil, all Past Matrons or Past Patrons. We are most appreciative of Sister Parbara for emphasizing the Scholarship Fund during the year.

I do heartily thank the members of the Committee for the many hours of diligent work they have contributed to the Order in a combined effort to produce the most deserving of the numerous applicants. I say "Thank you, sincerely," to Sister Diane Silva, Grand Secretary, and Sister Viola Perry, Grand Treasurer, and their staff at the Grand Chapter Office. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers;

It has been an interesting task indeed to read through the proceedings of other Grand Jurisdictions and note their similarities and differences. The greatest joy, however, was in receiving letters from the Grand Representatives who sent their personal observations. They traveled literally to the ends of the earth to attend the Grand Chapter of their assignment. They were greeted warmly, extended every courtesy and honor and have made lasting friendships with their counterparts and, Worthy Grand Matron, may not relinquish their appointments as they have had so much fun they don't want to give it up but want to continue traveling, sharing California sunsets with the world.

Each Jurisdiction has a special name for their year, and we share the innermost thoughts of each Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron as we hear their wonderful aims and mottos and see their themes portrayed in the beautiful Grand Chapter rooms as we enter. We always see, in the center of the room, the Holy Bible on the Altar, our source of inspiration and hope wherever we meet.

There are many reasons to be proud of being a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Our founder once said, "If the Order will serve humanity and have a purpose in the world, it will live." These words are as true now as when Robert Morris uttered them over a century ago. We do have a purpose – to serve, to care, to help, to ease sorrow, to fulfill the law of Christ that we bear one another's burdens and to love one another as He loves us. We promote and support very generously many worthwhile projects and are dedicated to the principles of brotherly love, relief and truth.

Our Founder, Dr. Robert Morris, had a dream. He envisioned an organization to which men and women could both belong and share in the service to humanity. This dream, Eastern Star, has grown to be the largest such fraternal organization in the world. In 1850, Dr. Morris wrote the Ritual and formulated the degree work of our Order which was first initiated in Jackson, Mississippi, over one hundred years ago.

The Order of Eastern Star is composed of five sovereign bodies: the Independent Grand Chapter of New York is the oldest, having been organized in 1869. They use the McCoy Ritual. The second oldest is the Grand Chapter of New Jersey

organized in 1870. They use a modified version of the Robert Morris Ritual. The office of Associate Patron is non-existant in both Grand Chapter and subordinate Chapters in New Jersey. The third oldest is the General Grand Chapter which was organized in 1876 and meets every third year at a Triennium. The fourth is the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland organized in 1904. They meet semi-annually and have their own ritual. The fifth is the Grand Chapter of Australia organized in 1985, to which our own Margaret Aldershof had the pleasure of visiting this year.

The Fraternal Correspondence Committee was founded in 1876 by the Worthy Grand Matron of Connecticut who thought it would be helpful to exchange ideas and fellowship between Grand Jurisdictions. In Mississippi, there is the Little Red School House where Dr. Rob Morris was the first principal and it is now an O.E.S. Shrine. In Indiana, they hold an annual baby dedication ceremony. A five-colored ribbon is tied to the child's wrist as a pledge of love, service, and the protection of the Order of Eastern Star.

Three Grand Chapters present the Worthy Grand Matron with the keys to a car for her use during her term in office. New Brunswick has subordinate Chapter members who travel 100 miles to their meetings and Maine has one Chapter that you can only visit by boat – it is 12 miles out to sea.

Colorado supports the position that Nieces of Master Masons be allowed to join the Order of the Eastern Star and the Worthy Grand Matron commented that of the 16 amendments going to General Grand Chapter, 14 of these were regarding membership including allowing Rainbow Majority Girls to become members.

Kentucky is the home of Rob Morris where he spent the last 26 years of his life. There is an annual pilgrimage and picnic to the Memorial. Manitoba conducts a lottery and bingo games to raise funds for their Eastern Star Home, which they call a Chalet.

In Massachusetts, the Rainbow Girls have each adopted a "Grand Mother" at the O.E.S. Home to share visits with. This has proven to be an excellent program for both the girls and ladies of the Home. In New Jersey, the husband of the Most Worthy Grand Matron is entitled Worthy Grand Husband and the wife of the Most Worthy Grand Patron is entitled Worthy Grand Wife!

In South Carolina, all Chapters meet only once a month and they had a line officers' club for the first time.

The International Eastern Star Temple is located in Washington, D.C. It is the headquarters of our General Grand Chapter and the residence of our Right Worthy Grand

Secretary. The building is international, so no flag flies above it; but as darkness falls, the rays of the Star, within the pentagon, within the circle, shine for all to see. The Star represents all Subordinate Chapters, the pentagon, the Grand Chapter, and the Circle, the General Grand Chapter. A complete record of every Chapter is housed in fireproof vaults within the Temple. This Temple is maintained by the "Once in a Lifetime" dollar donated by the members. It was declared a National Heritage Monument in 1972. No visit to Washington, D.C. is complete without a tour of this beautiful landmark.

The International Peace Garden is located in the Turtle Mountains on the border of North Dakota and Manitoba. It was built in 1932 as a symbol of Peace and Harmony between Canada and the United States. It is now maintained by numerous organizations including all Masonic bodies and Eastern Star members. The Peace Garden Chapel was built by contributions from Eastern Star members and completed and dedicated in 1970.

Our greatest assets are our youth organizations, Job's Daughters, Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay for young men. Their enthusiasm and idealism are inspirational. We should be supportive of these groups – these are our future Eastern Star and Masonic members and our hope for a future. Listen to the young people, listen to their fresh and innovative ideas – don't turn them off with "We've never done it that way." Let them take an active role in the Chapter and they will bring in their friends. And, if you want to think young, look young and be young, surround yourselves with the younger generation – look at our Worthy Grand Matron, she is living proof that the Fountain of Youth lies with the Youth Groups – she discovered Rainbow for Girls years ago.

"Look to the future and not to the past to find those things you want to make last."

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, for the privilege of serving Grand Chapter.

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF GRAND JURISDICTIONS BY THE FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE COMMITTEE

ALABAMA - No Report Received.

ALBERTA - The 75th Annual "Tree of Life" Session was held in Lethbridge, Alberta, June 2,3,4, 1986, WGM Connie Hoskyn and WGP Andres Duff presiding.

There were 76 Chapters with a membership of 7,253, a net loss of 141. There were 844 members and visitors registered of which 775 were voting delegates. The Eastern Star Home is closing due to expiration of the lease. The wife of the WGP was appointed Grand Chaplain. After 75 years there were still 9 active Charter Members.

Project: The Autism Society of Alberta.

ARIZONA - The 86th Annual "The Message of Our Star Session" was held April 2,3,4,5, 1986 in Tuscon, Arizona, WGM Joan Lopshire and WGP Tom Steele presiding.

Color for the year was purple and the flowers chosen were Violets, Geraniums and Ferns. There are 59 Chapters with a membership of 11,525, a net loss of 293. Voting delegates present were 659. The OES Home is called a cottage with eleven sisters and brothers living there. Good Housekeeping Magazine selected this home as one of the 85 in the nation.

Project: Cookie Monster and Clowns was a committee formed at the request of the WGM to make and stuff small toys. These were presented by the Clowns to children about to undergo surgery. This made the young ones feel like they had a friend going with them.

ARKANSAS - No Report Received.

AUSTRALIA - The 1st Bi-Annual Session of the United Grand Chapter of Australia was held June 4,5,6,7, 1987 in the historic City Hall in Brisbane, Australia, Most Worthy Grand Matron Elaine O'Brien and Most Worthy Grand Patron, Joseph Lavaring Presiding.

There were 1,700 in attendance representing 204 Chapters. 3,790 Confirmatory Membership Diplomas were issued. Motto for the year: "The Lamp of Friendship is Lighted by the Oil of Sincerity".

Project: Children's Medical Research.

Australia and Tasmania had always been under the jurisdiction of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, but in 1985, with Scotland's consent and good wishes, the Sisters and Brothers of Australia saw a dream come true as the United Grand Chapter

of Australia received a favorable vote and was given their Charter at General Grand Chapter, held in Seattle, Washington. Many members of California O.E.S. were present at this memorable Session. This Grand Chapter is dedicated to uniting their members and blending old traditions with new ways to truly become the United Grand Chapter of Australia.

BRITISH COLUMBIA AND YUKON - The 75th Annual "Tapestry of Time" Session was held in Pentection, British Columbia, May 26,27,28, 1986, WGM Ruth Cole and WGP Graham Tench presiding.

Colors: Cornflower Blue with White accented by Silver. Flowers: Blue Cornflowers and all White flowers. There are 96 Chapters with a membership of 10,010, a net loss of 159. Registered members present were 1,590, delegates numbered 948.

Projects: ESTARL, Elizabeth Bently Scholarships, International Temple Fund, Save the Children Fund, OES Auxillary. The Rob Morris Society, with a membership of 275, meets once a month. They continue to raise, by different activities, funds which are contributed to Grand Chapter Charitable Projects.

COLORADO - The 93rd "Wheels of Heritage and Faith" Session was held September 18,19,20,21, 1986 in Colorado Springs, Colorado, WGM Connie Barnes and WGP Jack Stubbs presiding.

Colors: Colors of Colorado Flag and Earth Tones. Flowers: Mountain Columbine, Colorado Carnation and all Wild flowers. There are 107 Chapters in the jurisdiction with membership of 23,653, a loss of 562. Voting delegates present were 809. The membership committee sponsors a state-wide contest between Districts and individuals for new members. A free dinner is given to each member bringing in five new members. The first place winner received a nights lodging and dinner for two and recognition at Grand Chapter. One hundred forty-one fifty year pins were given to members this year.

Projects: ESTARL, Heart Fund, Cancer Research, Arthritis Fund, "Make a Wish" program.

Colorado has an OES Home Day when they hold an auction at the Home to help clean out the store room and garage area. Many bargains are found. This is attended by members from all over the State and is held in the autumn each year.

A petition was presented regarding membership. "Due to the rapid decline in membership in the Order of the Eastern Star, we recommend that Colorado support the position that Nieces of Master Masons be allowed to join the Order of the East". The WGM commented that of the 14 amendments going to General Grand Chapter, were regarding membership. CONNECTICUT - The 112th Annual "Rainbow of Friendship" Session was held in Farmington, Connecticut, April 24,25,26, 1986, WGM Jean Jeanfavre and WGP Lynn Sheffield presiding.

Flowers: Daisies and Daffodils. Colors: Yellow, Lavender, Green and Silver. There are 71 Chapters with a membership of 13,362, a net loss of 462. 636 delegates were present at Grand Chapter. Connecticut has no watchwords and very little emphasis is put on the Session's name or emblem. There are no Deputy Grand Matrons.

Grand Representatives wore formals of their choice with an embroidered sash of the State they represent. Election of the Grand Officers is conducted by the WGP. The WGM was elected from the floor. She was serving as Grand Ruth and was nominated to be Worthy Grand Matron on the spot because just two weeks prior to the ceremony of installation the Associate Grand Matron passed away. The WGM carried out all the wishes of the AGM. She visited each and every Chapter in the State, 71 in all.

Project: Home Endowment Fund.

DELAWARE - The 65th Annual "Starlit Garden of Life" Session was held May 12,13, 1986, in the Scottish Rite Cathedral, Wilmington, Delaware, WGM Esther Melvin and WGP Harry Meck presiding.

Emblem: The Star. Watchwords: Enthusiasm, Love, Loyalty and Laughter. Colors: Shades of Purple, Pink and a touch of dark Green. Flowers: Violet, Deep Pink Rose and Lily of the Valley. These: Fraternal Love and Friendship.

In the East was a huge picture of the sky, twinkling stars and clouds. Purple Violets and Pink Roses in baskets adorned the steps to the East. The North and South were decorated with twinkling colored stars. The West was decorated as a garden scene through patio doors. Of the 18 Chapters in Delaware there were 223 registered members in attendance. Delaware has a Grand Lecturer and Deputy Grand Lecturers assigned to each Chapter to see that officers are proficient in their work. After passing an examination, certificates are issues.

Projects: Alzheimers Research, ESTARL, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Cancer Research.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA - The Annual "Sheaf of Stars" Session of the District of Columbia was held May 7,8,9, 1985 at the Marriott Hotel. There are 16 Chapters in D.C. and 30 members in attendance at Grand Chapter.

Their Masonic Eastern Star Home was the main business and discussion and it was concluded that they will probably be forced to give-up the Home and place all members in Convalescent Homes. The District of Columbia Grand Chapter has a Grand Lecturer and a corp of officers made of WMs and WPs who are proficient in their ritual work, who present the floor work at instructionals. There are no Deputy Grand Matrons. Grand Representatives are escorted through the labrynth, introduced by the Grand Conductress and given Grand Honors in the East.

FLORIDA - The 81st Annual "Treasured Friends of the World" Session was held April 15,16,17, 1987 in Tampa, Florida, WGM Ina Frontz and WGP Lyle Tuttle presiding.

Flowers for the year are "All of God's Beautiful Flowers." The East was decorated as a Oriental Setting with all colors displayed.

There are 321 Chapters in this jurisdiction with a membership of 43,941, a net loss of 417. 472 members attendanced Grand Chapter. Florida boasts of 102 Fifty-Year Members. They have the Masonic Home of Florida with 29 resident members at a cost of \$1,400.00 per month. They have volunteers and members of the "Masonic Home Service Guild" who give of their time and talent for the guests. Donations from Chapters for the Home totaled \$11,734.00. Florida has the oldest living Past Grand Matron who is 109 years old!!

Project: "The Stars' Storehouse." This project was to erect a storehouse for the Grand Chapter paraphernalia. Sheaf Committee: Student Higher Education Award Fund. The committee has been in existance for two years and the purpose is to assist students who are seeking degrees in Medicine, Speech, Pathology, Psychology, Education and Civil Engineering. Six Awards were given this year.

GEORGIA - The 86th Annual "Sound of Music" Session was held June 8,9,10, 1987, in the City auditorium, Macon, Georgia, WGM Virginia Burdette and WGP Russell Garrett presiding.

The election of officers is held the day of installation and it is not known who the Associate Grand Patron or Associate Grand Conductress will be until the conclusion of the election. Several men ran for AGP. Since there were a large number of candidates for AGC, several ballots had to be taken.

IDAHO - The 85th Annual "Hidden Treasure" Session was held June 8,9,10, 1987, WGM Betty Thierhouse and WGP Michael Mathison presiding.

Watchwords: Dreams, Memories and Love. Emblem: Effulgent Sun. Aim: To Do Our Best for All. Symbol: Treasure Chest. Flower: Pansy.

A Treasure Chest was on the Backdrop and on the floor as well. When the Grand Officers were presented, each placed a jewel in the Treasure Chest in the West. The WGM's project was the Diabetes Foundation. The WGM visits each of the 69 Chapters each year for instruction.

ILLINOIS - The Grand Chapter Session of Illinois is accomplished in two days, with the addition of an evening pre-session for informal opening. Distinguished guests are presented and escorted at this time, also, youth organizations, representatives and ESTARL & Educational Assistance Awards are presented. The morning business session of the second day was voting on amendments and elections. The tellers were stationed at several tables on the auditorium floor, but outside the disignated area of the Chapter Room. The delegates cast written ballots that are collected and deliverd to tellers' tables. No break in the session occurs until this session has completed its work. Installation is held that evening and the youth groups perform special ceremonies to honor the newly installed Worthy Grand Matron.

A visit to the Illinois Eastern Star Home is a most pleasant part of the visit to Illinois Grand Chapter.

INDIANA - The "Touch of Love" Session was held in Indianapolis April 28,29,30, 1986, WGM Loretta Riehl and WGP Fred Rowe presiding.

Flowers: Lily of the Valley, Rose, Daffodil. Colors: Aqua, Apricot, Ivory, Gold and Silver. There are 420 Chapters with a membership of 93,744, a net loss of 2,487. There were 815 registered members at Grand Chapter. Indiana has a Baby Dedication. This year 500 babies were dedicated to the principles of OES. Indiana does not have an Eastern Star Home, but does have an OES building at the Masonic Home.

KANSAS - The 110th Annual "Pathways with Purpose" Session was held in Topeka, April 23,24,25, 1986, acting WGM Ruth Williams and WGP Buford Strader presiding.

Flowers: Wild Flowers, Garden Flowers, Chrysanthemum, Tallisman Rose. Colors: Fall Colors. Flower pins are given to each member who increases membership by 5 and certificates are awarded to Chapters. Kansas presented 395 fifty-year pins and 7 seventy-five year pins.

Projects: Masonic Home, ESTARL, Membership pins are given to Worthy Patrons who do word perfect obligations.

KENTUCKY - The 84th Annual "Star of Stars" Session was held October 26,27,28,29, 1986, in Louisville, Kentucky, WGM Thelma McKinney and WGP Russell McSevenoy presiding.

Kentucky has 286 Chapters and 22 Districts – as few as 6 and as many as 25 Chapters are in one district, with a total membership of 39,280, a net loss of 870. There were 1,804 registered members at Grand Chapter of which 1,324 were voting delegates.

Kentucky has Deputy Grand Patrons as well as Deputy Grand Matrons in each District. The Grand Sentinel is elected. Kentucky has a group of Ambassadors to promote the OES Home, one from each district. The Home is rated as the best long-term facility in Kentucky.

Kentucky is the home of Rob Morris in La Grange, Kentucky. They have a Rob Morris memorial with an annual pilgrimage to the home which includes a picnic.

Project: Sale of calendars to benefit OES Home and ESTARL, total amount \$20.911.79.

LOUISIANA - The 87th Annual "Sharing Christmas Love" Session was held March 24,25,26, 1986, in Alexandria, Louisiana, WGM Jean Jordan and WGP John Wayne Harrist presiding.

Flower: Dark Red Rose and other seasonal flowers. The WGM grew all of the frest plants and flowers used for the informal opening. Colors: Shades of Green, Blud, Red and White, with highlights of Silver or Gold. There are 248 Chapters, 30 Districts with a total membership of 22,041, a net loss of 691.

OES Pilgrimage to the Masonic Home for Children: Over 740 people attended a worship service at the Home. There was picnic and entertainment for children on the grounds. The WGM had a goal of selling "Hummingbird Pins" for the Children's Home. \$5,256.00 was donated. She also awarded "Hummingbird Pins" to frequent travelers.

Project: Loving Care: Caring for the sick and shut-ins 20,033 cards sent, 10,039 visits to nursing homes, 19,224 telephone calls.

MAINE - The 94th Annual "Garden of Prayer" Session was held May 19,20,21, 1986, in Lewiston, Maine, WGM BEth Gardner and WGP Daniel Nutter presiding.

This jurisdiction has 149 Chapters, 20 Districts with a membership of 22,972, a net loss of 753. Maine Grand Chapter had 1,062 delegates at the Session. The WGM has formed a Membership Awareness Committee that visits Chapters by invitation, to try to come up with suggestions from the membership for solutions to the problem.

MANITOBA - The 64th Annual "Rainbow" Session was held May 26,27,28, 1986, at the International Inn in Winnipeg, Manitoba, WGM Marian Bullock and WGP Wilford Cotton presiding.

Motto: "To Live by Faith and Serve with a Smile." Emblem: Effulgent Sun. Symbol: Red Heart a Symbol of Fidelity, Constancy, Loyalty, Faith and Love. Colors: Star Point Colors and colors of the Rainbow. Watchwords: Live, Love, Laugh. Live: each day, a day at a time, Love: is patient and kind, love never ends. Laugh: a laugh is sunshine in the home. Flowers: Red Rose, symbol of Love and the Emblematic Flowers.

There are 43 Chapters with a total membership of 4,240, a net loss of 144 members. Manitoba has a lottery and bingo games to raise funds for the expansion of the Eastern Star Chalet.

Projects: The Arthritis Society, ESTARL, Canadian Cancer Society, Association for Deaf and Hearing Impaired and the Manitoba Eastern Star Chalet.

ADDRESS

Worthy Grand Patron, Worthy Grand Matron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, My Worthy Patron and Matron of Campbell Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

I bring you Fraternal greetings from the Masons of California and Hawaii. As I look out on this audience, I notice the color, the beauty that has gone into this convention. When I am at the Grand Lodge, all I see is one guy with yellow pants. You add color and dignity to this Grand Assembly.

As 1987 is a good year for Barbara, so it is a good year for me, not only because I was elected, but I also had the honor of becoming a member of the Order of the Eastern Star just two months and three days ago, being a new initiate in your Chapter, and here I am addressing your Grand Chapter. Tell me how many new initiates have that opportunity.

As you heard Clinton mention, we are in the same profession. We don't always get together and talk about murder cases. We talk about something else, mostly Masonry, and I enjoy being a part of Eastern Star, because you are one of the oldest Fraternities in the world that have both men and women as members.

We in the Masonic Fraternity are old, but we only have men as members. But you are different, so I am proud to be one of you.

As you heard, this year my theme is "The time is now." The time is now to do the things that we have put off for a number of years. A special thank you to Sisters Jean Munroe, Chairman, and Catherine Scott, Chairman, and their committees for the assistance of J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund and Cancer Dressing Stations. My gratitude to

Sister Alice Wilburn for her continued work as bookkeeper and secretary handling the funds and correspondence when I was out of town.

We are almost into the third year of Sister Helen Roquemore Cox's Triennium as Most Worthy Grand Matron. After a frustrating beginning the committee functioned smoothly and with a minimum of complaints from those having their credentials validated.

Lila Bell has been the statistician for credentials for the past 15 or so years. Without her, it would be most difficult to provide Grand Chapter with the stats needed. Someone should be trained in the details of her work to be sure of having continuity of this valuable service.

I understand that the two dollar ticket is the province of credentials. Should Grand Chapter again begin on Friday, with Formal Opening prior to Informal Opening and with so many on the committee new to the world of Credentials, it seems advisable to have a ticket chairman attached to Credentials for stat purposes. The hours of ticket sales should be expanded for the convenience of those wishing to purchase them. It is difficult to obtain stats on guest tickets. We learned by accident that green tickets were being distributed in addition to the white ones. In order to report properly, we need communication from those issuing them as to the number issued. The table, chairs, skirting and all printed material should be available for use by 9:30 a.m. on the day validation begins.

Drayage did a good job of delivering material from Grand Chapter, but needs more information as to where materials go at the close of Grand Chapter.

This year there was a problem at the Grand Secretary's desk as it was not manned during session. There were approximately 40 people who wanted to purchase credentials and could not. They were quite irate and said they were going home and would not be attending. Also, two from Manitoba pre-purchased credentials and could not get them because no one was at the desk. They graciously waited until the following day but should not have had to do so.

The copy machine was returned about 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday the 20th. Credentials continues on duty and were still validating credentials at 7:00 p.m. We were unable to make copies of the final tabulation. The copier should be available for use until at least 8:00 p.m. the night of Installation.

Air conditioning in the exhibit hall was quite good most of the time. However, it was turned off when most left the building. Credentials was still on duty and it immediately became too warm and stuffy. It should be left on until the committee also leaves. The budget of \$75 was adequate for postage. With postage being increased next year, the amount possibly needs to be increased. I was fortunate in being able to have my copying done free of charge. Should a chairman not have this advantage, out of pocket expenses would be incurred.

My congratulations to the General Chairman and Co-Chairman. I heard many favorable comments about this session of Grand Chapter and much of the credit goes to them. Attached are the final statistics for the Song of the Sunset Session of Grand Chapter.

I have the honor and pleasure of presenting my co-workers on this committee, Brother Stanley M. Love, Past Grand Patron, Sister Edna S. Ree, Past Matron, and I am Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron. These two fine members have been most cooperative and helpful, and I thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for the privilege we have enjoyed in serving this Grand Chapter, and the personal pleasure I have had in working with them.

Your Special Committee on Wills and Bequests has had very few inquiries from our membership and no invitations to speak to Chapters on the subject.

We have been in touch with one another, and with members of our Order in a sincere effort to find a way to bring to our membership the importance of such bequests in a way that will help them understand the need of their supporting our Home in the years ahead.

We believe that since all Fraternal Orders are suffering from a dwindling membership, and since the average age of our members is increasing, it is quite conceivable that even more of our members may need our assistance in the future. SEC. 916A. PROCEDURE IN GENERAL. THE PRESIDING OFFICER OF THE TRIAL COMMISSION FULFILLS THE POSITION OF JUDGE DURING THE TRIAL AND SHALL DECIDE ALL OUESTIONS OF LAW, PROCEDURE AND EASTERN STAR LAW. BUT SHALL NOT HAVE THE RIGHT TO DISCUSS THE EVIDENCE WITH THE **OTHER** TRIAL COMMISSIONERS OR HAVE A VOTE IN THE FINAL DECISION OF THE COMMISSIONERS WHO SHALL ACT AS THE JURY AND DECIDE ALL OUESTIONS OF FACT. THE PRESIDING AND HOW OFFICER DECIDE SHALL WHAT MUCH TESTIMONY SHALL BE HEARD, AND SEE TO IT THAT THE TRIAL IS CONDUCTED IN ALL RESPECTS WITH DUE ORDER AND PROPRIETY. THE ORDINARY RULES OF EVIDENCE EMPLOYED IN THE CIVIL COURT OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA SHALL BE FOLLOWED AS CLOSELY AS THE CIRCUMSTANCES PERMIT.

ADMISSIONS OR CONFESSIONS OF THE ACCUSED, SUCH AS WOULD BE ADMISSIBLE IN THE COURTS,

ARE ADMISSIBLE. THE RECORDS AND REPORTER'S TRANSCRIPTS OF TESTIMONY MADE IN THE COURTS IN CRIMINAL CASES BUT NOT IN CIVIL CASES, PROPERLY AUTHENTICATED, MAY BE ALLOWED IN EVIDENCE. WHERE GUILT IS SOUGHT TO BE PROVED BY ONE WITNESS, GREAT CAUTION IS TO BE EXERCISED. A WITNESS SHALL NOT BE EXAMINED OR ANY TESTIMONY TAKEN WITHOUT OPPORTUNITY GIVEN THE ACCUSER AND THE ACCUSED TO BE PRESENT. AFFIDAVITS OR DEPOSITIONS WITHOUT NOTICE CANNOT TAKEN BE RECEIVED. TECHNICAL OBJECTIONS AS TO FORM SHALL NOT BE PERMITTED. HEARSAY EVIDENCE IS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

ANY MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR IN GOOD STANDING MAY BE PRESENT AT ALL TIMES AS SUCH TRIAL, PROVIDED THAT THE PRESIDING OFFICER MAY, FOR GOOD CAUSE AND IN THE INTEREST OF JUSTICE, EXCLUDE ANY PERSON WHOSE PRESENCE IS NOT NECESSARY TO THE ACTUAL CONDUCT OF THE TRIAL. ALL PROSPECTIVE WITNESSES SHALL BE EXCLUDED. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL A NON-MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR BE PERMITTED TO BE PRESENT AT AN EASTERN STAR TRIAL EXCEPT FOR THE LIMITED PURPOSE OF TESTIFYING.

THE ACCUSED HAS A RIGHT AS A PART OF HIS PRESENTATION TO INTRODUCE TESTIMONY WHICH IS EXPLANATORY OF HIS ACTIONS AND THE FURTHER RIGHT TO INTRODUCE EVIDENCE IN EXTENUATION AND MITIGATION. NO MEMBER AGAINST WHOM CHARGES ARE PENDING SHALL BE REQUIRED TO BE A WITNESS OR TO TESTIFY TO FACTS PENDING TO INCRIMINATE HIMSELF AND BEFORE SUCH TESTIMONY IS ACCEPTED, THE PRESIDING OFFICE MUST BE SATISFIED THAT THE ACCUSED HAS BEEN ADVISED OF HIS RIGHTS TO REMAIN SILENT.

I invited all of these men to serve again as Grand Guards in order to have a cadre of experienced Guards to fall back on. From this group I received several to serve as Co-Captains and Lieutenants. And about 40 accepted to serve as Grand Guards. Without this group of dedicated Past Patrons I would have had much difficulty in obtaining enough Guards.

I then sent invitations to serve as Grand Guards to almost every 1986 Patron. From this mailing of about 300 letters, I received about 80 acceptances. The remainder of the Guards were obtained from recommendations from various other sources.

Even though these lists are tentative, I have included them for information. For instance I have included a listing of the Guard stations, knowing that these will change as we get into the actual working in the environs of the Convention Center. However I will forward a list of the stations that we actually used at the end of the Session.

Having served many times as a Grand Outer Guard since 1973, I have experienced the Sessions of Grand Chapter when the Grand Sentinel was involved in acquiring the Guards and in recent years when the Captain of the Grand Outer Guards was left on his own to accomplish this task. Needless to say, it is very difficult obtaining enough Past Patrons to fill out the required stations. My goal was to obtain about 150 but soon settled on 130 and now hope I will still have 120 by the time Grand Chapter week is here. I believe the incentive of having the Grand Sentinel involved, at least signing the invitation letter and addressing the Guards the first day, would help considerably.

Preparing this report prior to experiencing the details of using the Fresno Convention Center may exclude some of the solutions that will be peculiar to this Session. I will prepare an addendum to this report that will be passed on to the General Chairperson for the next Session, and for next year's Captain of the Grand Outer Guards.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GUARDETTES (By Norma Peugh, Past Matron (136, Captain)

This report covers the manner used to acquire Past Matrons to serve as Guardettes and also the numbers used at each station. This being the first time a separate committee has been formed with a Captain of Guardettes, I relied heavily on my husband, Ray Peugh, Captain of Grand Outer Guards. He received much information from the 1986 Captain of the Grand Outer Guards. Ray has also served Grand Chapter many times as Co-Captain and Lieutenant and therefore experienced.

Included in the information was a list of names, Chapter numbers and addresses of 33 previously invited ladies, which I used for my first mailing. From these I received 23 responses, 19 which were available. Two of these are serving as Grand Inner Guards. In the meantime, I started receiving recommendations from some of the ladies and even a few from a Past Grand Matron, which I felt should be used.

In my second mailing, I sent out 17 more invitations and received 14 more acceptances. This gives me a total of 33 Guardettes, including 1 Co-Captain and 3 Lieutenants. I hope they all show and are willing to work.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers;

To serve Grand Chapter as Housing Chairmen for the "Song of the Sunset Session" is a great privilege. You are assembled here in Fresno for the very first time. Thank you, Sister Barbara, for allowing us this opportunity. It has been a most enlightening experience. We have become acquainted with several understanding and cooperative managers.

Loretta Maggiore of the Convention Bureau has been a tremendous help. Having worked with Loretta previously, I still marvel at her accurate record keeping. All confirmations are handled through her office.

Reports of former Housing Chairmen told of "surprises" one encounters as the months roll by. Ours include – three motels were sold, eight new managers were appointed. Our members should continue to do their reservations through the Housing Chairman and Convention Bureau. Just five days ago, one motel called and reported that they had overbooked twenty-eight rooms. All of these were made directly with the motel. We are sorry if members were inconvenienced, yet we had not been contacted for confirmation.

Statistically, we booked 1475 rooms for 3105 people. Approximately 68 stayed in RV parks, 90 came into Fresno to stay with friends, 156 made their own reservations and 484 commuted from home. We are aware that many did not report to Housing.

Now you know what Fresno can offer. We trust your stay has been enjoyable. We know it is impossible to please everyone. We tried.

It has been a real pleasure to serve you and the members of our beautiful Order.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEETING ROOMS (By Margaret Turner, Past Matron (391), Chairman)

In late February, a letter was sent to Grand Chapter Committee Chairmen who would possibly need a meeting room during Grand Chapter, along with a form regarding the size of room and equipment needed. These letters were sent to:

Music is Magic! What special sparkle is noted with the sound of music in our Grand Chapter room. Our dreams for our beautiful Choir continue, and we wish that our Singing Stars may eventually grow to 100 singers! This year we have 85. We are very proud of each of them, and thank them for producing those pear-shaped tones for our enjoyment.

We greatly appreciate our Worthy Grand Matron's invitation to sing for you, and her assistance in the original formation of the Choir five years ago. Positions in the Choir are open to anyone who can sing reasonably well, and our Chapter Members are most cordially invited to come and sing along with us. You must be able to carry light musical notes part way across the room, and must have sufficient vision to occasionally observe the director a few feet away. No applications will be accepted from persons who have not sung, hummed or whistled in the shower at some time.

Our singers experience satisfaction and joy in their service to our Grand Chapter and in their close harmony with their Sisters and Brothers. A fringe benefit is that of social security, in which you are promised the security of friendships with the other members of the Singing Stars, and in the special involvement of performing at Grand Chapter. The hours are easy, with 3 or 4 rehearsals prior to coming to our Session. Missed rehearsals are a matter of conscience and the ability to withstand the glares and pointed remarks from the Director and other chorus members.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL DUTIES (By Herbert Gore, Past Patron (365/545) and Vivian Gore, Past Matron (365/545), Co-Chairmen)

What is a Special Duties Committee and what are its duties and responsibilities. That is exactly what Viv and I ask each other after being appointed Co-Chairmen by the Worthy Grand Matron. After reviewing many of the Grand Chapter reports presented by past committee chairmen it was apparent that this committee must consist of a large group of very dedicated members ready to perform a multitude of duties, from baby sitting to moving pianos, on a mimutes notice.

Once a month we journeyed to Fresno to attend Grand Chapter Committee meetings. our first duty was to determine how many members would be needed on our committee to adequately support Grand Chapter. After reveiwing previous reports, it was determined that the committee should consist of not less than thirty-five members plus the co-chairmen. Forty-two letters were sent to prospective members during the month of February with forty-one members accepting. Later three additional letters were sent out and acceptance received.

In July, we received a letter from one of the members that she and two others would be unable to attend due to a wedding of her sister in Arizona at the same time as Grand Chapter.

A second letter was sent to all committee members during the month of April thanking each member at which time it was requested that the committee members wear red vests so they would be readily recognizable to anyone needing assistance.

A third letter was sent to all committee members during the month of July informing the members that the committee would have their first meeting at 8:00 am, 16 October in the Firebaugh and Mendota rooms of the Convention Center and also that we were hosting an open house 6 to 8 pm, 15 October in our room at the LaQuinta Motor Inn so the members could get acquainted with each other.

In March the Worthy Grand Matron asked us to coordinate with the Star-Liters of the Central San Joaquin to prepare new ballot boxes for the 1987 session of Grand Chapter. Priscilla Hughes, Past Matron of Madera Chapter and President of the Star-Liters was contacted and the project was commenced in May with ballot boxes being completed and delivered to us in September and subsequently being delivered to Brother Walter Hammond, Chairman for Elections, at Grand Chapter.

Vivian and I were given the material to make 160 Hawaiian Leis to bring to Grand Chapter to be sold, on Sunday, before the Worthy Grand Matron's "Hawaiian Sunset" Session honoring the Youth Groups and the Organists of California.

The chairman held a meeting at 8 am Friday morning before the Grand Chapter Sessions started to brief the committee members on their duties and responsibilities and to form the committee into shifts. Three shifts were formed with a flight chairman for each flight. Shifts were as follows: 8 am to 12 am, 12 am to 5 pm and 5 pm until daily sessions closed.

The first official duty assigned to the Committee at Grand Chapter was the inflating of 2100 balloons to be released in the Convention Center Parking Lot following the Firday afternoon session. Helium tanks and supplies were procured on Thursday and returned on Friday after completion of the inflation of the balloons. This resulted in a complete change of shift scheduling.

In addition in inflation of the balloons the materials to make approximately 300 additional leis, which had not been made, was delivered to Special Duties. All committee members worked on this project until 1 pm Sunday the 18th, at which time the remaining completed leis and materials were delivered to the information center for sales.

Other duties were performed as requested. However; due to the location of the Special Duties Committee on the second floor of the Exhibit Hall, very few requests for assistance were received.

At the close of the "Song of the Sunset" Session, it was very apparent that if this committee is to be affective at the 1988 Grand Chapter Sessions, it must be located on the floor of the Exhibit Hall as close as possible to the Arena.

The members of the 1987 Special Duties Committee were a very special group of people who helped on a moment's notice and greeted all with a smile and an "I help attitude." The Chairmen wich to express their grateful thank you to each member of this committee. The friendships formed during this Grand Session will last forever.

These maps were posted around the Arena so members could locate where they were to be seated. Members of our committee were also posted around the arena wearing buttons that said "Seating" so we could assist the members. Signs were also provided by Auditorium Set-up Committee.

A table and chairs were requested for the registration to be set-up near the Credentials Committee so we could receive the \$2.00 for the Informal Opening or the Installation and issue a receipt. Money box and change were provided by Chairman, also necessary supplies for the committee.

I coordinated with the Worthy Grand Matron, General Chairmen, Medical Chairman, Inner Guard Captain and Credentials Chairman.

Our Committee was on duty for seating for Formal Opening, Informal Opening, Business Sessions on Saturday. We hope the work of our Committee has been satisfactory to the members of Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION (By Mel Crader, Past Patron (365), Chairman)

There were no accidents! Many drivers who had short runs donated their fuel. It was excellent weather so only one car needed to be washed. Four Grand Officers used their spouses as drivers.

A total of 905 miles traveled were reported. Of this, 430 miles were in serving Grand Officers and 475 miles in serving Past Grands and emergency service.

The Grand Officers walking to the sessions across the street freed more drivers for service to the Past Grands and emergency service, which was much appreciated.

15 either emergency or follow-up service trips were reported as going to the hospital. Additional service was provided to a blind member, disabled members in distress, and Past Grands needing to leave early. Some airport transportation was also provided.

Due to the evacuation of the theatre Sunday morning, some scheduled trips for Past Grands were late or missed entirely. The delay could not be avoided.

29 drivers participated with varying amounts of service. This is a recommended amount of drivers needed. There will be a lot of idle time, but all many be needed at once. When at work, drivers should be clearly identified in some manner easily detected in a crowd for ease of the Past Grands.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

A Grand Guard should be stationed at ALL times at the rear emergency exit to prevent cars from blocking the ambulance or transportation cars taking the sick or injured people to the hospital. Some Past Grands need to leave early for their room and need to use this exit.

Since this seems a less desirable duty being just OUTSIDE the door, perhaps those 5 to 7 Guards standing near the rear of the stage, could take turns. This should be determined before Grand Chapter starts.

Designated parking areas for the handicapped, Grand Officers, Past Grand Officers, and transportation committee members should be clearly marked in advance. Notice of the parking across "O" street should be announced early so that the able bodied and mobile home people could leave more parking for those mentioned above.

Excluding donations, bills for the Transportation service totaled \$304.27.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON VENDORS (By Richard J. Stanton. Past Patron (555), Chairman)

This Committee consisted of three members: Richard J. "Dick" Stanton PP (555), Chairman Charles Lighty PP (555), Co-Chairman Fred Burnham PP (555), Co-Chairman

The Vendor Coordinator is responsible for the Set-up for Vendors and Committees in the Exhibit Hall at the Fresno Convention Center. He is also responsible for contacting all previous Vendors and of obtaining new vendors who would be willing to display at the 1987 Session.

As chairman, it is also my duty to reserve spaces for various committees and spaces for Youth Groups. Set-ups for Associations or other special interests, were not made without the consent of the General Chairman.

On April 6, 1987, I mailed 39 letters of Invitation to Display to possible Vendors asking if they would be interested in a Display Booth for this 1987 Session. Upon receipt of letters and phone calls, I mailed to each interested Vendor a complete summary of conditions and prices for booth spaces, also asking for deposit for space or spaces. All checks to be made to Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star. Upon receipt of Vendor deposits, checks were immediately mailed to Grand Secretary Office and a complete record of all checks received was kept by Vendor Coordinator. A second letter was mailed in July to all Vendors asking them to pay Balance Owed by September 1, 1987.

A complete floor layout was then made for Exhibit Hall and was approved by General Chairman and Convention Center, all to Code.

Since Fresno is to have Grand Chapter, California, for the next four years, it was decided by General Chairman, Cliff Fever, and Worthy Grand Matron, Barbara Campbell, and myself, that rather than rent skirting for the tables in the Exhibit Hall, that it would be cheaper to buy skirting for tables. With their approval, I purchased enough skirting for all tables for Vendors and Committees and Youth Groups. After each Session the skiring will be <u>carefully</u> removed from the table and be stored until next Session.

Move-in by Vendors, Committees and Youth Groups was on Thursday, October 15th, with all committee members present, plus volunteered help by other Order of the Eastern Star Members.

I wish to thank my Committee and Members who assisted me and a special thanks to Chairpersons, Clifford and Dorothy Fever, Worthy Grand Matron, Barbara Campbell, for her Faith in me, and last but not least the cooperation that I received from Brother Wendell Hammargren, the Vendor Coordinator at Anaheim for 12 years.

Vendors were charged \$10.00 per Lineal Front Foot for spaces. We charged for five days, although we encouraged sales to start on set-up day. The following lists all Vendors and amounts paid:
