



JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: We express our appreciation to our Past Grand Matrons, who brought in our Emblems and our Bible so beautifully, and to Sister Marilyn Harris, P.M., for the marimba solo of "The Lord's Prayer." We want all of you in attendance to know how pleased we are that you are here.

There are a number of things to which we would call your attention: You will find various items of information in your program, and we hope you will go through it carefully.

The Grand Goddesses will be seated in each section and will ask to see your dues receipt and credentials when you enter each time.

There will be a Grand Page seated just east of the Grand Conductress, and Associate Grand Conductress, and this is the Page nearest the East, on each side, in the event there is an important message to be delivered to the East or announced to the members. Only emergency announcements, please.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON (Jean Powers, Worthy Grand Matron)

Many lovely thoughts raced through my mind as I sat and began to record all that has happened in 1988. It has been a good year in so many ways, for many of the dreams from my "Pocket Full of Dreams" that have been gathered these preceding four years have been fulfilled. From the time of service as Grand Marshal, ideas were posed, observances were made, and notes kept in preparation for this year of 1988. Much of what was learned in those years was a result of "listening hard"...listening to what was being said about receptions, instructionals, grand sessions, Deputy Grand Matrons, installations, poor initiatory work, and too much repetition, too many long speeches with no message, were just a few, not to mention the lack of attendance

at meetings, the lack of officer enthusiasm and participation of the members.

When the emblem of authority was given into my keeping, I was deeply conscious of the great responsibility that rested upon me and I recognized the need of help and guidance from a Higher Authority. My constant prayer has been:

Trying always to listen to the inner voice that each one of us has, if we but heed. I am deeply and humbly grateful to HIM and to all of you who have been such a great help to me this year.

No Worthy Grand Matron ever accomplishes everything that she would like to and I have been no exception. However, I hope that whatever I have accomplished this past year will prove worthy of a place among the records of those who have served so faithfully in the previous years, and have made this Order what it is today.

As we approach the closing of this year, I have come to realize that although I have given much, I have received far more than I have been able to contribute and shall hold this year as one of the greatest treasures in my life. As the end approaches I do so with a heart full of gratitude for the opportunity of serving as your Worthy Grand Matron.

This has been a full year of service and a happy one. We have visited all of the ninety-one districts in our Grand Jurisdiction and found everywhere a cordial welcome and the spirit of our Order gaining renewed vigor for their task of regaining membership. Early in the year the Grand Family visited every part of this great state presenting our ritual and floor work to the members. These "ALL OFFICER INSTRUCTIONALS" were started in 1985 and

It is an arduous and difficult task for the Grand Family - Officers and Trailers working side-by-side to "go to the membership" showing we care enough to come to them, even in the remote areas. We reached all twenty-three association areas from January 8th through February 7th ... traveling many miles each weekend, sometimes doing five in a weekend. This program is well received and provides excellent public relations with people in all walks of life. The toys are given in lieu of a carrying piece for the escort of the Worthy Grand Matron at her Official Visits to the Districts. These toys are then accumulated until we have bundles of at least twenty-five toys and are then taken to children's wards in hospitals, or burn centers, and/or care facilities for those residents who need to know that someone cares, and wishes them well. Some of the toys have also been

taken to the Paramedics for their program and aid in relieving anxiety to a child of trauma. Each toy is tagged "A GIFT OF LOVE FROM THE MEMBERS OF THE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR". The program has stimulated such interest in the membership that they bring toys in abundance to the Official Visits for distribution, contributing to this worthwhile program. Over 1,400 toys were distributed throughout the year.

At the session of Grand Chapter last year, your Worthy Grand Matron was directed to appoint a Membership Committee to provide programs for the chapters' Membership Chairmen appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron to generate interest in membership. Sister Ella Norris, Past Matron of Alameda No. 577, was appointed State Chairman with two area chairmen in the north and two in the south to assist each Chapter membership chairman with their programs. Several Laymen's Nights were planned and proved to be excellent sources for new members. An outline will be designed by the Chairman to pass along to any District or Chapter that desires to plan such an evening in their area. Special interest was given to the parents of our Youth Organizations that are not members of the Order, as well as the wives of many of our Master Masons.

Sister Ella was also the designer of "88 Star Tracks Program" generating new interest in our Chapters by planned visitations. Sometimes as many as fifty or sixty would visit one Chapter --taking their sack lunch so as not to cause the Refreshments Committee any anxiety. A planned point program was devised whereby the members could earn "88" points by attending certain functions in our various Masonic Affiliated Organizations, and those reaching 88 points were awarded the "88 Star Tracks pin", a round blue and a white star in center with an "88" in the star. This program was a great success, and Chapters were once again enjoying visitors and members on the sidelines. Hats off to Sister Ella Norris! The Grand Representatives assisted throughout the state in boosting the "88 Star Tracks Program", and aided in distribution of pins when earned.

Decisions

In accordance with the Constitution and Laws, the following were Decisions made by your Worthy Grand Matron this year:

1. Stepdaughter - Eligibility for Membership

A Stepdaughter of a Master Mason would qualify for membership in the Order. (Section 186).

2. <u>Membership in Eastern Star Home - Honorary</u> <u>Membership</u>

An honorary member of a chapter in this jurisdiction, where the member's affiliation is outside this jurisdiction is not eligible for membership in the Eastern Star Home unless that member fulfills all the requirements set forth in Section 458 of our Constitution and Laws. (Section 458)

3. <u>Life Membership/Affiliation with Another Chapter -</u> Responsibility for Dues in the Affiliated Chapter.

A member who has a life membership in one chapter can affiliate with another, however, the member will be responsible for dues in the affiliated chapter. (Section 193)

4. Request for Reimbursement of Attorney Fees When There Has Been No Trial.

A trial is necessary before attorney fees can be reimbursed to a member by that member's chapter. (Section 931)

Why not have your Past Matrons' Association organize a meeting with the Consolidation Committee person in that area. Chairman of this committee has offered to go wherever needed. Obtain the book that has been prepared on Consolidations to have some of the most important and often asked questions answered. We have developed a good working Constitution -- so let us use what we now have to its fullest.

Another heartache is the misuse of the black cube. The Constitution and Laws clearly states the procedures to follow in screening petitions and conducting investigations, prior to balloting on petitions. The black cube is NOT the tool for personal revenge against a prospective member.

There are still some Chapters with serious problems of discord among the members. I call them "People Problems"!! Sisters and Brothers not remembering their obligation and actually working at keeping disruption of Chapter harmony.

Neither of these problems can be cured by further legislation.

It has been proven time and again, if you look for trouble, you will find it, or some embellish facts to MAKE trouble!

The only part of the universe we can be absolutely sure of improving is ourselves! Sisters and Brothers, why not try to be the kind of Sister or Brother you would others be to you? This Order is far larger, and far more important than a personal grievance one may have with another Sister or Brother. "Anger is the wind that blows out the lamp of the mind!!"

Improve SELF!! Think and Talk and Be the best that you can be, and this Order will not only survive but thrive, and once again become a fraternity that has for its precept. "Love One Another".

Sow a thought and you reap an act; Sow an Act and you reap a habit...

Sow a Habit and you reap a character; Sow a character and you reap a destiny!

Pray for others. You cannot pray the Lord's Prayer and even once say "I". From the very beginning, it never once says "ME": "OUR FATHER", "GIVE US", "LEAD US", DELIVER US".

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON (Bernard Seamans, Worthy Grand Patron)

Summary of significant accounting policies:

Method of accounting:

The accounts are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment valuation:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the over-the-counter market are valued at the bid price. See Note 2.

Purchases and sales of securities:

Purchases and sales of securities are reflected on a trade date basis. Realized gains and losses on sales of securities are based on the first-in, first-out method. See Note 2.

Dividend income:

Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Interest income:

Interest income is recorded as earned on an accrual basis.

Inventory of provisions and medical supplies:

The inventory is stated at cost (first-in, first-out method).

Depreciation:

Depreciation on assets recorded in the Property Fund is recorded as an expense and as a transfer to the Property Fund in the Eastern Star Homes Operating Fund's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 1988. In prior years, depreciation was recorded as a direct reduction of fund balance in the Property Fund.

Property:

The land on which the buildings of the Eastern Star Home are located was received as a gift. The book value of the land was established by the Board of Trustees of the Home in 1956. The buildings and other property recorded on the books prior to July 1, 1977 are stated at values determined by the Board of Trustees of the Home. All additions of property acquired after June 30, 1977 have been recorded at cost and transferred from the Operating Fund to the Property Fund. The property is being depreciated on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

When property is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is recognized in income and any cash transferred to the Operating Fund.

Services:

Services donated by a large number of people are important to the activities of the Eastern Star Home of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.

Income taxes:

There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income as the Eastern Star Homes of California is an exempt nonprofit corporation and has no unrelated taxable business income.

2. Investments:

Fund records include a Market Valuation Account which represents the difference between the original carrying basis of the securities and their respective market values. The change in the valuation balance results from dispositions of securities as well as changes in market values. Gains and losses on securities sold during the year are computed from the carrying value basis.

1. Summary of significant accounting policies:

Method of accounting:

The accounts are maintained on the modified cash basis of accounting under which revenue is generally taken into account when received and expenses generally when paid. The results are not materially different from the accrual method of accounting. The Endowment Fund statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment valuation:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the over-the-counter market are valued at the bid price. See Note 2.

Inventory of supplies:

The inventory is stated at cost and is valued on first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis.

Furniture and equipment:

Furniture and equipment are stated at cost and are being depreciated on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture 10 years Equipment 5 years

When furniture or equipment is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the account and any gain or loss is recognized in income.

Services:

Services donated by a large number of people are important to the activities of the Grand Chapter of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.

Income taxes:

There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income as the Grand Chapter of California is an exempt nonprofit, unincorporated association and has no unrelated taxable business income.

Investments:

Fund records include a Market Valuation Account which represents the difference between the original carrying basis of the securities and their respective market values. The change in the valuation balance results from dispositions of securities as well as changes in market values. Gains and losses on securities sold during the year are computed from the carrying value basis.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER (Sheri Weisser, Grand Treasurer)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sister and Brothers:

It has been an honor for me to serve as the Grand Treasurer of California this past year. It has been a year of challenges and a great learning experience. My job was made easier by the experience and knowledge of our Grand Secretary, Diane Silva. Sister Diane, my grateful thanks for all your help, advice, and wisdom of experience. It has been a pleasure working with you and I have enjoyed our travels together. I treasure our friendship.

The financial reports for fiscal year July 1, 1987 through June 30, 1988 have been distributed to each delegate and will be printed in the proceedings. I would like to thank the Finance Committee for their support, particularly Brother Philip Brooks, Chairman, who patiently answered all my questions.

This year all of the Home's bills have been paid by computer generated checks. This past month we have been able to go "on line" with the accounting for both the Grand Chapter and the Home.

As Grand Treasurer I have attended all of the Finance Committee meetings and all but one of the Home Board meetings. The Finance Committee members and the Trustees of the Home Board are to be commended for their many hours of dedicated service to our Order. These Sisters and Brothers volunteer their time and talents for the betterment of our Order. Their only pay is the satisfaction of serving our Order and the expression of appreciation from you, our members.

I was unable to attend three of the All Officer Instructionals. While traveling throughout our State, I found many of our members did not realize the Grand Treasurer works at the Grand Chapter office five days a week! Because this is a working position, it was impossible for me to attend many Official Visits; however, I did attend many in the San Francisco Bay Area. I was also able to attend the Receptions of each of our Grand Officers.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, I have enjoyed serving with your Grand Family as we traveled to Schools

of Instruction, Official Visits and Receptions we became better acquainted and they are indeed "Special".

To the Treasurers of California, my loving thanks for your many courtesies and for your support of the Secretary/Treasurer Booth at the Fiesta. I have enjoyed meeting with many of you during the Instructionals and at the Official Visits.

Each of us thinks our Chapter is the best and I am very proud to be a member of San Lorenzo Chapter. A little over a year ago we lost our meeting place and nearly all of our paraphernalia because of a fire. Our Officers and Members rallied 'round and we are now settled into a new meeting place and have replaced nearly all our paraphernalia. Thank you San Lorenzo members for your love and support.

My grateful thanks to our office staff -- Lorraine Bode, Ruth Heulse, Carol Ramos and Mary Kay Bowser. Thank you for your assistance and friendship. May Kay, words cannot express my appreciation for all your help this past year. Thank you for your friendship and for keeping everything in perspective.

To my husband, Al, your patience and understanding has been appreciated. Thank you for all that you do for me.

I thank the delegates for the trust they placed in me and it is my hope that I have fulfilled the duties of my office to their satisfaction.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move the acceptance of this report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Sheri.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND LAWS

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there is no objection, the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws and the Instruction Book, as presented and distributed according to the Constitution, will be considered as read.

It is so ordered.

Sisters and Brothers, we are about to take up the business of our Grand Chapter, and let me remind you that we are governed by the rules set forth in our Constitution and Bylaws. If our Constitution is silent on procedural matters, we shall be governed by Roberts' Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

Rule 13 requires that every member addressing the Grand Chapter shall announce his or her name and the name, number, and location of the chapter to which he or she belongs.

If speaking on a question that is properly on the floor, the speaker shall state whether he or she is for or against the question.

No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission from the presiding officer or of Grand Chapter, except members of Committees in relation to their reports.

No one may speak longer than three minutes at a time.

Unless the ballot vote has been called, the vote shall be taken by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter, which is the raising of the colored card given out at the time of registration. A ballot vote may be ordered at the discretion of the Presiding Officer or at the request of five members, providing such request is made by such five members, at the time such question is under discussion, and before the result of the vote has been declared by the Presiding Officer.

When you need additional information on a subject, you may rise to a Point of Information.

If you are unsure about the proper parliamentary procedure to use, you may rise to a Parliamentary Inquiry.

If you feel there has been a rule violation, you may rise to a Point of Order.

If you do not agree with the Chair's ruling on a Point of Order, you may Appeal the Decision of the Chair.

If you wish to stop debate, you should Move the Previous Question. A motion for the previous question to stop debate and call for a vote shall not be in order unless at least three members have been heard on each side of the question, if they desire to be heard.

Finally, you are asked not to applaud, speak out, or otherwise display your feelings as a result of discussion on a matter.

Brother Warren Wildman, Past Grand Patron, President of our Home Board Trustees, may we have your report at this time; and would you present the members of the Board, please.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME TRUSTEES

(Warren Wildman, Past Grand Patron, President, Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, it is indeed an honor and pleasure for me to present to you the members of our Eastern Star Home Board:

Our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean Powers; our Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Bernie Seamans; our Vice President, Sister Lila Hummell; Connie Harrington; Kathryn Carmignani; Earl Heverly; Elston McGinty; and Milton Dales, and of course our Ex-Officio Members, Sisters Diane Silva, Secretary and Sheri Weisser, Treasurer.

Your Board of Trustees this year has benefited from the splendid cooperation of our Worthy Grand Matron Sister Jean Powers to share her preliminary itinerary for the year with us so that our meetings could be scheduled when she and our Worthy Grand Patron would be available to meet with us, for they are voting members of your Board of Trustees. I am happy to report that they were in attendance at all of our meetings and shared in our deliberations and decisions. A standing invitation was extended to our Grand Line Officers and I am also happy to report that they were also in attendance at our Board Meetings. They were invited to join in our deliberations and discussions, but were not permitted to vote on any matters before the Trustees. We thank all of them for their interest, input and cooperation.

Following the election at our 1987 Annual Session your Board organized for the 1987-88 year by electing Warren W. Wildman, President and Lila Hummel, Vice President. Our Grand Secretary serves as Secretary to the Board as does our Grand Treasurer who serves as Treasurer.

We, the members of the Board, are pleased to submit for your consideration a portion of the Annual Report for the fiscal year of July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988, as required by our Constitution and Laws.

During the year, the Board received a total of 23 applications for residency in our Home and their disposition is as follows: two deceased prior to admission, seven accepted, three not approved due to not being able to pass the physical requirements, nine withdrawn and two were awaiting action of the Board.

The requirements for residency in the Eastern Star Home require the applicant to be 65 years of age, a member in good standing in California for 10 years, next prior to application, a member of the Chapter through which the application was made for at least five consecutive years; able to care for themselves in their own room; be ambulatory upon admittance and they are required to transfer and assign all assets upon entrance to the Home. A member upon entrance is assured of life care.

Your Board has concerned themselves with seeing that all licensing requirements are met. This year new regulations have necessitated that all employees who have any contact with the residents must be fingerprinted, the gardeners being the only employees exempted. The nurses' aides were required to attend first aid CPR classes. All of your Trustees were furnished copies of the regulations that pertain to our license from Title 22. This will enable them to familiarize themselves with not only staffing requirements, but also facility maintenance and equipment -- all very important requirements.

Several surprise inspections were conducted by an Inspector from the Licensing Agency and who listed several deficiencies. Our most capable and efficient Administrator, Mary Lou McElroy, appealed the report at the time of the inspection. Our Legal Counsel as well as several Trustees and several residents attended the appeal hearing along with our Administrator, where everything was worked out. It should be noted here that many of the new regulations are bringing about a need for higher staffing levels, which means higher budgetary costs.

It is interesting to note that in an article in the September 1988 issue of the Non-Profit Times the President of the Robert Wood Johnson's Foundation, the nation's largest health care philanthropy, pointed out, "It has been anticipated there is going to be a deficiency of over 400,000 nurses in this country within the next few years. It's been estimated...about 15 to 18 percent of hospital beds in this country are now closed because they can't get enough nurses".

At our Grand Chapter Session, 10 years ago in 1978, a special report was given after a one-year study and research as to the future of our Home. Areas of concern in that study included (1)

Sale of the Home and possible revenue, (2) Relocate the Home, (3) Bring the Home up to code, (4) Purchase a building that has been used as a Facility, (5) Consolidation of the Eastern Star Home and the Masonic Home and (6) Build a new home on one level.

The recommendations made to this Grand Chapter by the study group were as follows:

- "1. That the Home be brought in line with current safety Health Building Codes, so that we will have a Home which will last many years ahead. As previously stated, the 1978 costs would be approximately \$500,000. The financing of this project to be obtained from the existing Operating Fund of the Home. Expenditures programmed over a period of the next three to five years following Grand Chapter approval."
- "2. That we sell or lease the four lots that exist on the North side of our property, in a manner that would be most profitable to the Eastern Star Home Operation Fund."

The recommendations were approved by a vote of the members of Grand Chapter. To our knowledge and belief Recommendation #1 has been complied with, while Recommendation #2 was studied and considered. It was felt that with the concerns of the Homeowners' Association and with a potential great loss of property value if our holdings were divided, no effort has been taken to sell or lease the lots.

While it has been stated that as "Nothing has been done for 10 years" at the Home there was a need to have a committee seek a future site on which to build a new home. Not only have several hundreds of thousands of dollars been spent on capital improvements at our Home to meet code requirements your Boards during these past 10 years have performed their fiduciary responsibilities in a very prudent and responsible manner.

We are deeply concerned about moving ahead too fast in seeking a future site to build a new Home. It is felt that a great deal of preliminary study and planning needs to be done before proceeding with relocating or building a new Home. We must give consideration to the fact that many of our residents in our present Home are most happy there and have encouraged your Trustees not to move them to a different location. It must be borne in mind that while our present building and land have a high appraisal for sale, it is fully paid for and has been affordable to our membership through their contributions and the assessment which they must vote each year. We need to understand that any

shortfall of funds for construction or operating costs must be borne by the membership either through voluntary contributions or a voted increased assessment.

Residency at our Home has declined during the past 10 years for several reasons. Members are waiting longer in life to make application and many become ineligible because they become non-ambulatory. Many do not want to turn over all of their assets upon admission. Other facilities have been built by the private sector and some are subsidized by Federal programs.

With so many vacant rooms your Board is presenting to you, the voting delegates, legislation that would permit the residency of paying guests within our Home. They would have to meet all of the requirements of regular residency except that they would have to pay a fee for admittance and a monthly fee which would be based upon actual costs for services provided. These guests would not be required to turn over all of their assets, nor would they be provided medical care.

Each of us as members of our Order are part owner of our Home and as individual landlords we must assume the responsibility and obligation to support it through service and personal financial support. We acknowledge with loving gratitude the work of all who participated in the "COUNTRY FAIRE" Fiesta held on June 4th and 5th. In excess of \$23,000. was realized and will be used on our Worthy Grand Matron's specially designated project at the Home.

The OES Home Booster's Club continues with their good work and have provided on a monthly basis an opportunity for our residents to go out for dinners at restaurants, plus exemplifying the work for our residents, parties on special holidays and they are most helpful in so many ways. We thank them for their support in letting all of our members know that we do have rooms available for those who seek residency.

On behalf of each of you we commend highly our Administrator Mary Lou McElroy and her competent staff for the continuous loving care they give to our Sisters and Brothers who now reside within our Eastern Star Home. Of course we do not want to overlook the service our Grand Secretary Diane Silva and our Grand Treasurer Sheri Weisser perform for our Homes. Their continuing and dedicated service is deeply appreciated and we commend them also for their service.

The complete report of the Home Board will be printed in the Proceedings.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move the acceptance of this report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Brother Warren

If there be no objection, this report will be accepted.

It is so ordered.

Brother Warren, are you going to present the budget at this time?

WARREN WILDMAN, PAST GRAND PATRON, PRESIDENT, EASTERN STAR HOME TRUSTEES: Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, with your permission, I would ask that the member, Connie Harrington, who heads up our Finance Committee within the Board of Trustees, be permitted to present the budget and the assessment report.

EASTERN STAR HOME BUDGET (Connie Harrington, P.M.)

The proposed budget for the Eastern Star Home, of \$2,019,864., is 6.5% higher than the budget for 1987-88. This is a small increase given that in 1988 the shortage of nurses has caused an escalation in nursing salaries. Also, the 1988 increase in the minimum wage caused The Board to recommend adjustments in most hourly positions in order to maintain a differential between new employees and long-term employees.

I would like to take some time to tell you about some of the things that make up the budget. The income items are selfexplanatory, therefore, I would like to review the expense items.

General Administrative: This area covers the salaries for the Administrator, the Assistant Administrator and other office employees. It also includes Grand Chapter Office expense, help wanted advertising, office supplies and equipment, investment fees and telephones.

Operations and Maintenance: This area includes salaries for the maintenance personnel and custodians, security guard service, and gas and electricity.

Building and Equipment Repairs: Covers all the maintenance contracts, elevator contracts, TV service and various allocations for plumbing, electrical and heating repairs.

Dietary: Covers salaries for a Dietician and a number of cooks, food and food preparation supplies.

Housekeeping and Laundry: Covers salaries for the housekeepers and laundry workers, linen and laundry and housekeeping supplies.

Skilled Nursing: Covers salaries for a Director of Nurses, R.N.'s, L.V.N.'s, C.N.A.'s, a records clerk and the House Doctor. Also included are budgeted payments to an outside Doctor, Dentist, Ophthalmologist, Podiatrist, Speech Therapist and Physical Therapist. Other budget items in this category are outside facility expenses, drugs, x-rays and labs, and other related supplies.

Services to Residents: Includes salaries for an Activity Director and a Hairdresser. Also included is the monthly cash allowances to the ladies, hearing aids and eyeglasses.

I don't think that insurance and taxes and licenses require much explanation. As you can see a lot of time and work goes into the preparation of this budget. As Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Eastern Star Home, I move that this budget be accepted.

I move the adoption of the proposed budget.

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote the adoption of the proposed Eastern Star Home budget as printed on page 33 in your booklet.

Sisters and Brothers, is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the proposed Eastern Star budget, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

(The motion carried.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Connie.

CONNIE HARRINGTON, P.M., TRUSTEE OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME: Worthy Grand Matron, I now move for the continuance of the \$2.00 assessment for 1988-1989.

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It has been moved and seconded that the \$2.00 Home assessment be continued for the ensuing period. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the continuation of the \$2.00 Home assessment for the Eastern Star Home for the ensuing year signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, by the same sign.

(The motion carried.)

A loving thank you to our Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees. We do appreciate the dedication of this hard-working Board. Thank you, Brother Warren, for your leadership of our Home Board.

Brother Walter Hammond, P.P., Chairman of the Elections Committee, please report on your appointments to the Elections Committee and also present your Committee members.

VERNON L. GORDON, PAST GRAND MASTER, GRAND LODGE OF CALIFORNIA: Thank you very much, Worthy Grand Patron.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Matron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, my Sisters and Brothers:

Worthy Grand Patron, before I begin my remarks, I would beg from you a few moments to share a story that unfolded in my mind as I sat in the West and looked at the beautiful backdrop with the title "It's a Beautiful World," and I couldn't help remembering a vivid story that occurred some few short years back. It happened just west of here, in Fresno County.

A group of people were traveling on a lonely country road. There were several people in a van, they lost control of this van, and it plunged into a canal, and as I looked at this water, how beautiful and serene it appears on the backdrop, but water can indeed be life threatening at times.

This van plunged into the canal, spilling its load of precious cargo into the water, and these folks could neither speak nor understand the language of this country. Most people who

happened by looked on helplessly and curiously, but suddenly a man appeared on the scene, and he happened to be a Mason and, without thought for his own safety, plunged into the water and single-handedly pulled at least seven out, and indeed there may have been more, because no one could count at that moment. Despite the language barrier that existed between these people, those seven people had little trouble in communicating to this Brother the love and affection that they felt for him in this special moment in their lives, when perhaps their whole life appeared before them.

Thanks to this Brother, today this is a very beautiful world because of what he did on that particular day in one of our yesterdays. That Brother is a member of Calkota Chapter in Kerman; his is also Worshipful Master of the Kerman Lodge. I would like to have Brother Kenny Bowles stand and be recognized -- he's going to kill me for this.

My Sisters and Brothers, it is a signal honor to represent our Grand Master here this evening, and I would like to say to you that our new Grand Master and the officers who will be installed here at the end of this Communication, and indeed each one of us who are standing here at this special time, are on the threshold of a new decade. We, who serve through the term of 1988-89 must prepare ourselves and this great fraternal family for the 1990's, for those who succeed us will open the door into that new decade, and the decade of the nineties will, in turn, be a pivotal time in our history, because it will be the threshold for a new century.

Hardened and calloused indeed is the individual who, in a world grown secular and materialistic, refuses to frankly face the question, "What am I doing to make the world a better place to live?"

To neglect this question and not seek a reply is a distinct threat to our heritage of this great Masonic family. And while there is an insistent call upon us as individuals to contribute in this respect, it is as members of this Masonic family that a double responsibility is laid upon us. The hope of the world and the future of our society rests squarely on our shoulders and upon our hearts, demanding that we do our part.

Does this sound like high-flying platitude to you? Then consider that the hope of the world and the future of our society depends upon the return and adherence to the precepts, the principles, and the values that we practice as a matter of routine.

We are the only Order that can encourage these virtues and ideals, free from the one-sidedness of religion, the blatant display of intolerance in vocation, in profession, and in business.

My Sisters and Brothers, as we stand on the threshold of the decade of the nineties, the future of this Fraternity rests with each one of us in this room, at this moment. We are challenged as we prepare for the new decade and, indeed, for the new century, to instill new pride in our own members. Not just the pride of wearing a Fraternal emblem, but pride in what we stand for, pride in the principles which have made our several Orders stand apart from the rest of the world.

We must not just talk about greatness; we must show it by example. We must take time to rededicate ourselves to the principles and tenets which have made our Fraternity what it is today, those principles of brotherly love, relief, truth, fortitude, justice, and, above all, concern for our fellow human beings. We must make our Fraternal family stand tall in our communities, let our light shine to others, and let our lives be shining examples of the worth of this institution.

But the question still remains, "Will we, as members, grasp the opportunity, as we stand on the threshold, to make all that we profess to believe in a vital part of the 1990's?

Why is this so important? It's important because, by the middle of the next decade, the permanent direction of this Fraternity will have been established; and whether that direction shall be the high road or the low road will not be in the hands of the custodians of that era. No, it will have long been established by what we do on the threshold and in the formative years of the new decade.

As we set out to achieve these goals and as we profess our tenets of brotherly love, relief, truth, that I spoke of a moment ago, we must not give credence to the notion, shared by many, that we are a religion or a substitute for religion.

One of our failings has been the failure to communicate to the religious leaders of this world -- and we indeed are a threat to some of them in their minds -- we have failed to communicate with them that we are not a religious order. We must emphasize that in clear and unmistakable terms -- that we are religious in spirit only. Admittedly, there are points of resemblance in our beliefs and rituals to those of religions, but they are far outweighed by points of difference.

Every organized religion in the world should be supporting us, if they knew and understood what and who we are.

Masonry, as an organization, does not profess revelation. We have no sacred literature, such as the Old Testament, the New Testament, or the Koran. We postulate no dogmas, carry out no sacraments, possess no clergy or seminaries. Our rituals are not life-pervasive. We have none of the liturgy or prayers used by Judaism, Catholicism, or Protestantism, with their respective attendant rituals. We have nothing even similar to the great hymnologies of those three great faiths.

Our great Masonic family does not even embrace everyone. If you don't fall within a certain set of guidelines, and they're strict at that, you cannot be a member of this Fraternal family. You are, however, included in your own religious fellowship by the simple act of being born, but no one, I repeat, no one has ever been born into Freemasonry.

All of this and more make up our goals and our challenges, as we face the new decade of the new century.

If we accept these goals, we will move ahead onto the high road and face the future. Even if we face the new decade with questions and anticipation, we must face it with optimism and not pessimism. An optimist is one who sees a light that is not there, but the pessimist comes along and snuffs it out.

My Sisters and Brothers, which of these roles will you play in the 1990's? Will your enthusiasm be such that it will become contagious in the new decade? Will you, by your own actions, give new meaning to the phrase "By their fruits you shall know them?"

Our new Grand Master is both enthusiastic and optimistic about our future. He needs your help, and I hope you will join him.

May God guide you as you contemplate this challenge.

It is my pleasure at this time to present the first order of business, Proposed Amendment No. 1, as it appears on page 3 of your booklet.

Amendment No. 1 proposes to change the length of the Grand Chapter Session from four days to three days and would also include in that three days a Sunday, if it so happened.

This has been considered by the Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and by Jurisprudence. We have determined that there would be no time for Informal Opening if there were a three-day limitation. You would have no time for Courtesies to Dignitaries, such as we are afforded in other jurisdictions. And, also, we have the effect of Section 111, Rule 4, paragraph 3, which limits the evenings that we can use for considering legislation.

Although the recommendation is honorable in trying to arrive at a lessening cost for visiting Grand Chapter, our Committees recommend a "no" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sisters and Brothers, you are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 23, as printed. Is there any discussion?

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Brother Walter, Chairman of our Election Board, do we need to explain the proper voting procedure?

While we're waiting for Walter, Brother Tom Chamberlain, would you give us some of your beautiful musical notes at this time.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Brother Tom Chamberlain from the Palo Alto Chapter, that was just beautiful.

WALTER HAMMOND, P.P., CHAIRMAN, ELECTION BOARD: If you will look at pages 38 and 39 in your booklet, you will have the correct spelling of the two names that are candidates for the office of the Home Board of Trustees from the South.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: We are now voting by written ballot for one name for the position of member of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home from the South.

I declare the ballot open.

You will deposit your ballots in the boxes, which will be passed to you.

Have all voted who are entitled to do so? I declare the ballot closed.

Sister Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron and Chairman of the Aims and Objectives Committee, please give your report of the Aims and Objectives Committee and present your Committee at this time.

REPORT OF AIMS AND OBJECTIVES COMMITTEE (Presented by Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Did our Committee hear from you this year? We sent a letter to your Chapter inviting your constructive suggestions for the betterment of our Order, that we might know your concerns and work toward solving them. That same letter indicated a data request form was being prepared, and asked that all Past Matrons and Past Patrons willing to serve Grand Chapter avail themselves of the opportunity to complete and return these resume forms.

We thank those of you who did write our committee. The responses were not always the constructive suggestions we were seeking, but they were concerns you, our members, have regarding your Chapter and our Order. Joyce Moss has served as secretary of our Committee the past two years, and she, or the Chairman, has attempted to acknowledge each letter received. We want you to know the members of this Committee share your concerns, and they are being addressed in our meetings. Some of the concerns are duplications of those expressed last year; the cost of serving as a line officer; the expense of dresses and the quality of workmanship in some group dresses. These items have been referred to our Grand Line Officers for their information, and whatever steps they can take toward corrections.

In our several meetings we have addressed many items of concern which have been presented to us during the two years the Committee has been in existence. These included many references to the quality of the Ritualistic Work, as well as the efficiency of our Presiding Officers. These items are of great interest and concern to this Committee, and also to our present Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Grand Line Officers, as well. We have been privileged to have all of these officers at one of our meetings this year, and some of them at all of our meetings. It has been a pleasure to work with them and learn of their real concerns; to see their willingness to try some different method of seeking solutions; and impressed to have them give this additional time to better understand the needs of our Chapters and our members, especially when the demands on their time are already so great.

As a Past Matron or Past Patron of your Chapter, did you send in a resume form in response to our request? Our Committee thanks all of you who did, for you have helped put

information at the fingertips of our Grand Line Officers enabling them to better know your qualifications for serving our Order, as well as your interest in doing so. It is virtually impossible, in a state the size of ours, for these officers to meet and know the abilities of all those eligible for appointments within our Grand Chapter.

Our Committee had understood there was sufficient capacity on our computer to list much of the information requested on the resume form, and felt this would be an ideal way for our Grand Line Officers to more readily find just the right person for some assignment. Unfortunately, our information was incorrect, so none of the information sent to us is being placed in the computer. However, to gain the greatest benefit from the resumes, all received to date have been photocopied, the original being sent to our Associate Grand Matron, and duplicates to our Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress. The original printing of the forms and the copying was accomplished at no cost to Grand Chapter. There was the mailing cost in sending the forms to the Chapters and in forwarding the replies. Our Committee thanks those members who made their facilities available, and those who gave their time to this endeavor.

Resume forms will be retained for a period of three years. New ones may be completed and sent at the end of that time, or whenever you want to update your resume. We realize many of you feel to submit such a form is a violation of a long-standing thought that we should not project ourselves in such a manner to be considered for an appointment. Please reconsider your thinking on this and view it as a way of assisting those who have the responsibility for making these Grand Chapter appointments, by providing them with the background information necessary to make the best decisions. The resume is intended for their confidential use.

One of the duties of this Committee, as outlined in the Constitution, is to assist members of Grand Chapter in proposing legislation. Members of our Committee have met with members of the Consolidation Committee in both northern and southern California, to review and discuss proposed legislation which they felt was needed in the consolidation process.

In response to requests from many Associate Conductresses to their Grand Officer, members of this Committee reviewed the wording in our Instruction Book given by these officers to candidates prior to their initiation. This resulted in a proposed change to be considered at this Grand Chapter Session. When a number of letters were received from one northern district of our state expressing concern over possible changes in the selection process for Deputy Grand Matrons, Gordon Browning, of our Committee visited the area and held two meetings with members of the several Chapters. In addition, members of the Committee have been extended invitations to attend Chapter and/or Association meetings to explain the work of the Committee.

Other letters, telephone calls, personal conversations, etc. have brought numerous and varied subjects to our attention. We cannot address each of these in our report, but we have tried to consider everyone's thoughts. When one subject comes up time and again, the need for some action seems indicated. It is because of these concerns that the following recommendation is made:

The Aims and Objectives Committee recommends that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee to make, or cause to be made, a study of the Grand Chapter Office in regard to the functions performed and assignment of duties to the office staff; and to determine from said study whether changes are warranted. Such committee to present its findings and recommendations to the Worthy Grand Matron for her consideration and/or implementation, and to present any necessary legislation pertaining thereto at the 1989 Grand Chapter Session.

We express our appreciation to our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean Powers, for acting on the recommendation in the 1987 report of this Committee, regarding a legislative meeting for all delegates. We feel this is a very positive step to make available to all voting delegates, including our voting Past Matrons and Past Patrons, the same information regarding the legislation before Grand Chapter. It is not the responsibility of a Grand Line Officer to make their Subordinate Chapter Officers aware of the legislation to be presented, but rather the responsibility each voting delegate has in representing their respective Chapters to be informed on the amendments being presented. This is why our Constitution requires that these amendments be distributed prior to Grand Chapter, giving everyone ample time to consider the proposals and the effect they could have on our Chapters and our Grand Chapter.

We thank you for your interest in our activities, and for responding to our communications by presenting your ideas to us. The members of this committee are sincere, dedicated members of our Order, and willing to give of their time and effort to work for the Good of our Order. However, only by all of us working together -- our members, our committees and our Grand Officers -- can we hope to keep our Order in this great state of California the wonderful fraternal organization it has been for these past 115 years.

In ad libbing from my report, I must say that sometimes, when you try something for the very first time, it does not always turn out like you imagined it would. Already our Chairmen of Jurisprudence and Constitution and Laws for the next year have put their heads together, and there will be a different format for the legislative meeting next year.

The report is signed by four members of the Committee and the two ex officio members.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move the acceptance of the report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there is no objection, this report will be accepted.

GORDON BROWNING, P.P., MEMBER, AIMS AND OBJECTIVES COMMITTEE: If I may, I would like to offer an amendment to the report for several reasons, which I will enumerate.

Reason number one, the Aims and Objectives Committee, as I was to understand it, was established to address the serious problems of poor attendance and declining membership. This recommendation does neither. If adopted, it does establish a precedent which will greatly expand the responsibilities of the Aims and Objectives Committee, with the predictable consequence that its effort to seek solutions to declining membership and poor attendance will be so diluted that, once again, the complaints and recommendations of the membership about long meetings, proficiency, needless repetition, etc., will not receive proper attention.

Number two, the members of the Aims and Objectives Committee never entertained a motion to recommend the appointment of such a committee.

Number three, the manner in which this recommendation became a part of the Aims and Objectives Committee report violates every rule of appropriate committee procedure. The Committee members did not receive a copy, this Committee member did not receive a copy of the recommendation until just prior to the time the report was to be delivered at Friday Afternoon's Session.

I ask for a second to this motion to amend the report and pray that you brothers and sisters will vote for it.

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It has been moved and seconded that the report of the Chairman of Aims and Objectives Committee be amended to delete the recommendation portion of her report.

Is there any discussion?

LURA RAE DALES, PAST GRAND MATRON, CHAIRMAN, AIMS AND OBJECTIVES COMMITTEE: Worthy Grand Matron, may I speak to the motion?

I will read to you from the Constitution the duties of the Aims and Objectives Committee:

"It shall be the duty of the Committee on Aims and Objectives to conduct a continuing study of the status of the Order in California and to report to the Grand Chapter such projections of the future of the Order in California as may be reasonably inferred therefrom.

"To propose and assist members of Grand Chapter in proposing such legislation as will further the aims and objectives of the Order in California, and to advise and assist the elective Grand Officers in projecting future aims and objectives of the Order in California, and to formulate plans for the implementation of those aims and objectives."

Our Brother is correct in some of his statements. Our Committee was not to just address membership and this type thing, but the Committee last year, in determining, for its very first year, what was the most important thing to be determined, believed it was membership.

As we progressed through this year, it became obvious that, with the delay of things coming out of the Grand Chapter office, and there are many other things that I can name that brought about our recommendation in our report that I do not feel it is very fair to bring out at this time -- we have worked very closely with Grand Line Officers, and we do feel that we can be of assistance to them in this regard, as far as this recommendation is concerned.

We feel that there is a great amount of work in the Grand Secretary's office. She has worked very diligently, as has our Grand Treasurer, before she became Grand Treasurer even, in trying to get out the things on the computer, understanding the system that was created for them, and this type of thing.

We felt that if members of our Order could serve on this committee and make a study, it would be very worthwhile. If we cannot find those members to serve on this committee, who can cause a study to be made, a time study of some type, how can we best help our officers in that office and get back on track as far as timely sending things out of the office, including Grand Chapter Proceedings.

So we met with the Grand Line, and the original wording of this recommendation was sent to all Committee members. I have talked with all of them.

Our Brother, who has proposed this motion, felt that he would like this held over until next year, and that the Committee pursue it further. I feel we cannot wait until next year. I feel our incoming Worthy Grand Matron should have the right to accept this recommendation and appoint a committee, if she wishes to, or ignore our recommendation. She will be working with our Finance Committee closely, and we have a management letter from our auditing firm that I have been privileged to be given a copy of, and that I don't think you would like to have some of the things said that are in here.

It indicates to us that many things need to be addressed.

Please give the incoming Worthy Grand Matron the opportunity of doing as she sees best by either accepting our recommendation pursuant to this or in her own manner.

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Is there further discussion?

GORDON BROWNING, P.P., MEMBER, AIMS AND OBJECTIVES COMMITTEE: Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

So that the members present that are going to be voting understand the major issue, the major issue is not, in my mind, whether or not the office of the Grand Secretary or the office is being properly run, or managed, or whatever; the issue is that we have written procedures, we have rules that any organization must follow if we're going to function properly and with any level of democratic effort.

In this instance, we have a recommendation that has been placed before this body to vote on that was never presented formally to the Aims and Objectives Committee. There was never a quorum present at any Committee meeting where this was voted on.

This was placed before you a result of a meeting between two members of the Committee. That does not constitute a quorum, and this was placed in the Aims and Objectives Committee report, and its starts out by saying "The Aims and Objectives Committee recommends." We did not recommend at any time, at any meeting, that this be placed before you.

So what I am concerned about is the principal of democracy is based on the appropriate following of rules, so we all know how we're going to function and operate.

If we are not going to follow the rules and procedures, let's abolish the committee process and let a couple of people run the organization. I don't feel that is what the members want.

I'm not questioning whether we need to get something done about the office, but I do challenge, and challenge with the utmost sincerity, the manner in which this has been brought before you. I think it is totally inappropriate.

EARL ECKERT, PAST GRAND PATRON: Worthy Grand Matron, I would like to move a subsidiary motion, that this recommendation be referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence and Constitution and Laws and be brought back before the close of this Session for consideration.

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: The question before you, Sisters and Brothers, is the referral of this resolution, this recommendation, to be referred to the Jurisprudence Committee and Constitution and Laws, to be brought back before the Body before the close of our Session.

It has been moved and seconded. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of referring this recommendation to the Jurisprudence and Constitution and Laws Committees to be brought back to this Body before the close of the Session, signify by the voting sign of the Order; those opposed, by the same sign.

It is so ordered, and you have voted to refer this to the Committees of Jurisprudence and Constitution and Laws.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Sisters and Brothers, I would like your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 3, to Section 65, on page 7 of your booklet.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4:

Sec. 89 89A . J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND.

(All references throughout the Constitution and Laws to Sec. 89 changed to 89A.)
(new)

SEC. 89B. MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND. AID FROM THIS FUND SHALL BE GIVEN TO MEMBERS IN GOOD STANDING OF THE ORDER IN CALIFORNIA CHAPTERS, AND/OR MEMBERS OF THEIR IMMEDIATE FAMILIES WHO ARE ALSO MEMBERS OF THEIR HOUSEHOLD OR DEPENDENT UPON THEM FOR SUPPORT, WHO ARE CANCER PATIENTS AND IN NEED OF FINANCIAL AID PURSUANT TO THE

FOLLOWING CONDITIONS.

- (A) APPLICATIONS. ALL APPLICATIONS FOR AID SHALL BE MADE THROUGH THE WORTHY MATRON, OR IN HER ABSENCE THROUGH THE ACTING WORTHY MATRON, OF THE CHAPTER IN WHICH MEMBERSHIP IS HELD, UPON FORMS PROVIDED BY THE GRAND CHAPTER. THE NAME OF THE MEMBER RECEIVING AID SHALL NOT BE ANNOUNCED.
- (B) INVESTIGATION. COMPLETED APPLICATION FORMS SHALL BE SENT TO THE COMMITTEE MEMBER RESIDING IN THE AREA WHERE THE APPLICANT RESIDES, FOR INVESTIGATION.
- (C) THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF AID IN ANY CASE FOR A MEMBER SHALL BE ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,500.00).
- (D) EXPENSES. ALL AWARDS AND EXPENSES OF THE COMMITTEE, EXCEPT MILEAGE TO THE ANNUAL SESSION OF THE GRAND CHAPTER, SHALL BE CHARGED TO THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND.
- (E) VACANCIES ON THE COMMITTEE. VACANCIES ON THE COMMITTEE SHALL BE FILLED BY THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON FOR THE UNEXPIRED TERM.
- (F) FUNDS. ALL CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND SHALL BE USED AND EXPENDED AS HEREIN PROVIDED, ANY PROVISIONS OF SECTION 50 OF THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER TO THE CONTRARY NOTWITHSTANDING.
- (G) AN APPLICANT FOR AID FROM THIS FUND MUST HAVE BEEN A MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING OF A CALIFORNIA CHAPTER FOR AT LEAST TWO (2) YEARS IMMEDIATELY PRIOR TO FILING APPLICATION FOR AID.
- (H) AN APPLICANT FOR AID FROM THIS FUND MUST NOT CURRENTLY BE A RECIPIENT OF ASSISTANCE FROM THE J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND AND MUST NOT HAVE AN APPLICATION FOR ASSISTANCE FORM THE J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND PENDING AT THE TIME OF MAKING APPLICATION TO THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND.
- (I) IF, PRIOR TO MAKING APPLICATION TO THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND, THE APPLICANT WAS A RECIPIENT OF AID FROM THE J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND, ASSISTANCE WILL NOT BE GRANTED UNLESS THE MAXIMUM AID AVAILABLE FROM THE J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND HAS FIRST BEEN RECEIVED BY THE MEMBER.
- (J) ASSISTANCE FROM THE FUND WILL BE TERMINATED IF, WHILE ASSISTANCE IS BEING RECEIVED FROM THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND, THE APPLICANT MAKES APPLICATION TO

- AND IS GRANTED ASSISTANCE FROM THE J. CLIFFORD LEE MEMORIAL CANCER FUND.
- (K) ASSISTANCE FROM THE FUND WILL NOT BE GRANTED AFTER THE DEATH OF THE PROPOSED RECIPIENT OF AID UNLESS THE APPLICATION FOR AID HAS BEEN MADE PRIOR TO HIS OR HER DECEASE, AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (A).
- (L) AN APPLICANT FOR AID FROM THE FUND WILL NOT BE REIMBURSED FOR BILLS PREVIOUSLY INCURRED AND PAID.
- (M) ALL QUESTIONS MUST BE ANSWERED TRUTHFULLY, OTHERWISE THE GRANT WILL BE DISALLOWED.
- (N) IN THE MATTER OF AN EXTREME EMERGENCY, THE CHAIRMAN (OR THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON) SHALL HAVE THE POWER TO ACT AS IS DEEMED IMMINENT. FOLLOW-UP OF CASE HISTORY SHALL BE REQUIRED THE SAME AS FOR ANY OTHER APPLICATION FOR RELIEF.
- (0) IN THE EVENT OF THE DEATH OF A MEMBER RECEIVING AID FROM THE CANCER FUND AND WHERE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR BURIAL IS REQUIRED, THE CHAPTER OF WHICH THE DECEASED WAS A MEMBER SHALL MAKE APPLICATION FOR SUCH EMERGENCY BURIAL RELIEF TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sisters and Brothers, you are about to vote on the amendment to Amendment No. 4. Is there any discussion?

There being no discussion, you are about to vote on the amendment to Amendment No. 4. It reads, again: "Only interest income from the fund may be drawn upon for grants and expenses."

All those in favor of the adoption of the amendment to Amendment No. 4, Section 89(F), signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign. The motion is carried. You will add, (F), the last sentence will read: "Only interest income from the fund may be drawn upon for grants and expenses."

We will now vote on the amendment, as amended.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Sisters and Brothers, this amendment establishes the details, the procedure of operation for this particular Committee.

With the amendment, the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, Jurisprudence, and Finance, to whom this amendment was referred, recommend a "yes" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 89B, as amended. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 89B, as amended, signify by the usual voting sign of the Order; those opposed, the same sign.

There being more than two-thirds in the affirmative, the motion is carried.

Brother Leroy, would you like to present Amendment No. 5, page 10.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Sisters and Brothers, I now invite your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 5 to Section 94, on page 10 of your booklet.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 5:

Sec. 94. APPOINTMENTS AND TERMS OF. The Worthy Grand Matron may commission a Grand Representative of this Grand Chapter residing in the jurisdiction of each Grand Chapter with which this Grand Chapter enjoys fraternal correspondence. Such commission shall be issued only upon the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron of such other Grand Chapter, and the term of office of such representatives shall be *thréé* TWO years. The Worthy Grand Matron shall also, upon the request of the Worthy Grand Matron of any other Grand Chapter enjoying like relation, recommend a mémber PAST MATRON OR A PAST

PATRON of this Grand Chapter, other than a present Grand Officer of Beputy Erand Matron for appointment as Grand Representative of such other Grand Chapter, in the jurisdiction of the Grand Chapter of California.

No one shall be reappointed; nor shall a Chapter have more than one Grand Representative at a time, NOR SHALL A FORMER OR PRESENT DEPUTY GRAND MATRON BE APPOINTED AS A GRAND REPRESENTATIVE.

Signed: Donald D. Jones, P.P. (144)

There is one change, also, in this, with the agreement of the proponent, Brother Donald Jones. Where you have "three" struck out in line 8, we now wish to reinsert the "three" and strike out the "two."

The purpose of that is because some jurisdictions request that the Grand Representative be appointed for three years. A majority are only two, but there are some jurisdictions for three years, so the proponent has agreed that it be left in as "three."

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there is no objection, I will declare that as housekeeping and instruct the Secretary to reverse it to read as "three."

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Sisters and Brothers, this amendment deals with the appointments of Grand Representatives and Deputy Grand Matrons, and perhaps prevents or assists the sharing of the wealth, whichever way you want to look at it.

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 5 to Section 94 has been referred, recommends a "no" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Is there any further discussion?

Discussion followed.

EDITHANN KING, PAST MATRON (47): I move that this proposed amendment be amended to insert in front of "three

years" the words "up to."

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It has been moved and seconded that we amend Proposed Amendment No. 5 to read, by inserting the two words "up to" before the words "three years."

Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the proposed amendment to Amendment No. 5 to read "up to three years," signify the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

The proposed amendment to the amendment to Section 94 is adopted.

Further extensive discussion followed.

The previous question was moved and seconded.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It has been moved and seconded that we close debate.

All those in favor, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter, those opposed, the same sign.

It is so ordered, and debate is closed.

Sisters and Brothers, you are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 94.

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 84, as amended, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

The Proposed Amendment to Section 94 is not adopted.

Brother Walter Hammond, may we have the report of the Election Board.

REPORT OF ELECTION BOARD (Presented by Walter Hammond, P.P., Chairman)

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

The results on Ballot No. 1, Proposed Amendment No. 2: Total votes cast -- 2,151; two-thirds vote necessary -- 1,434; the yes votes totaled 608, and the no votes totaled 1,471. This motion is lost.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: The Proposed Amendment to Section 29 is not adopted.

WALTER HAMMOND, P.P., CHAIRMAN, ELECTION BOARD: The counts for the ballots for the office of Trustee for the Eastern Star Home South. The results are the following; John Masson -- 799 votes; Mel Aldershof -- 1,354 votes; with total votes being cast -- 2,153.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Brother Aldershof, having received the requisite number of votes for the Trustee for the Eastern Star Homes from the South for the ensuing three years, I declare him elected.

Brother Frank Young will present Proposed Amendment No. 6 on page 11.

FRANK YOUNG, P.P., FINANCE COMMITTEE: Worthy Grand Matron, my name is Frank Young from Idelwild Chapter 19.

The members of the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws and Finance, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 6 to Section 96 has been referred, make no recommendation.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 6:

Sec. 96. DUES PAYABLE BY SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS.

(f) Scholarship Fund. For a special fund, to be known as the Scholarship Fund, for the payment of awards made to needy worthy students as provided in Section 88, Len TWENTY-FIVE cents for every member in good standing.

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 96 signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

There being less than two-thirds, the amendment is not adopted.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Amendment No. 7 on page 12.

Sisters and Brothers, I would like to call your attention to Amendment No. 7 to Section 162 on page 12 of your booklet.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 7:

Sec. 162. SECRETARY.

- (2) Receive all moneys due the Chapter and pay the same over to the Treasurer, taking **Kér** A receipt therefor;
- (8) Have present at each meeting the current minute book, Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter and the bylaws of the Chapter, and such other equipment as ske may/regulate REQUIRED; for/the/performante/61/Net/duties/
 - (9) SNE Shall read all communications pertaining to

the Chapter or the Order, promptly, report all others and read such as are required:

(16) To perform all other duties required *6f* Kéf by the bylaws and pertaining to Kéf THE office.

In keeping the records and otherwise performing the duties of Nér THE office, &Né shall acquire from the Grand Secretary and shall use books, forms and other supplies as provided by the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.

The proposed Amendment to Section 2 is adopted.

Sister Ardath, would you like to present Proposed Amendment No. 8.

ARDATH GARST, PAST GRAND MATRON, MEMBER, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: If you will refer to Proposed Amendment No. 8 to Section 172 on page 13. PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 8:

Sec. 172. RECEIPT, REPORT AND DEPOSIT OF FUNDS. All money paid to the Secretary for the Chapter or for the Grand Chapter, including dues, initiation and affiliation fees, Grand Chapter assessments and donations to projects shall be read by the Secretary in the receipts of the meeting and PROPERLY RECORDED IN THE MINUTES. REPORT OF THE BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE (Marian Schwach, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

"The greatest gift life can give is the opportunity of service."

Worthy Grand Matron, the members of the Benevolent Fund Committee express their gratitude to you and Grand Chapter, for the opportunity of assisting those who need our help.

Today, we come to realize more and more, these are the days that try men's souls; days when the light that emanates from the "Star in the East" seems to grow dim.

It is the pleasure of the Benevolent Fund Committee to appear before you to report on our activities of the year. We have had fewer requests for assistance this year, indicating either less financial distress among our members, or welfare and Social Security have helped greatly.

However, the members whom we have helped, have been very distressing cases. Most requests have come, not from members in the sunset of life -- but from those in the prime of life.

Home and hospital visits have been made -- many times it isn't financial aid that is needed, but an understanding heart and sympathy in their troubles and sorrows. We try to let them know they are not alone.

We are particularly grateful to the Worthy Matrons and their officers who have worked sympathetically with the ever faithful members of this Committee.

However, we do believe that the Relief Committee of our

Chapters should keep better informed as to the functions of this Fund. We have suggested on several occasions that our Area Chairmen be invited to acquaint the members with this work and to assist in any emergency. In some instances, members have passed away before the Relief Committee of the Chapter knew there was a need -- until application was made for funeral assistance.

Due to the essence of time a detailed report will be published in the proceedings. We recommend a budget of \$25,000. and \$300. for Committee expenses -- also the continuance of one (1) cent per capita.

Worthy Grand Matron, this is unfinished business from our last Grand Chapter Session, from a Special Committee on Trial Review, appointed by our sister, Barbara, last year.

Your Special Committee on Trial Review was prepared to report at last year's Session of this Grand Body, on a case referred to this Committee and reviewed by it, but because there is a provision for filing an appeal to the judgment of the Committee on Trial Review in Section 957 of the Constitution and Laws, the time limit for which still had eight days to run following the close of our 1987 Session, after consulting with the Jurisprudence Committee, this report was postponed until this Session.

In a letter dated September 4, 1987, our Worthy Grand Matron assigned to this Special Committee the duty of reviewing and considering an appeal following judgment against the appellants who were each found guilty of conduct unbecoming a member following trial on July 27 and 29, 1987.

In compliance with Section 954 of the Constitution and Laws, a date was set, for review and consideration and the members of the Special Committee were notified in a letter dated September

11, 1987. Also in compliance with Section 954 of the Constitution and Laws, a full transcript of the trial, together with all supplementary papers deemed necessary were sent to the members of the Special Committee.

A notice of the date, time and place of this Trial Review was also sent to the accused, accusers and the Trial Prosecutor. All were subsequently reminded that Section 954, fifth paragraph, forbids any of them to be present during the actual deliberations of the Special Committee.

No statement was filed in opposition to this review as is provided for in Section 954, third paragraph.

The Special Committee on Trial Review held their review and consideration beginning at 10:00 a.m. on September 29th in Conference Room 1213 of the Flood Building, 870 Market Street, San Francisco. These accommodations were obtained for us by our Grand Secretary, and we are very grateful to her and her staff. All members of the Special Committee were present and each and every one of them obviously had carefully studied the transcript of the trial and the supplementary papers as was evidenced by their notes and thoughtful comments.

All provisions governing our deliberations provided in Sections 953 and 954 of the Constitution and Laws were strictly followed.

The transcript of the trial showed that the accused and their counsel had attended the entire first day of the trial, and a portion of the second (and final) day, when after the accused Brother testified, and before the accused Sister could be called, they walked out of the trial with their counsel.

The Chairman of the Trial Commission ruled that "court believes that consent was given for trial by both parties because of their presence".

The trial continued as provided in Section 923 (when there is failure of the accused to appear) and note was made that they had indeed appeared and thus service had been proper.

The Special Committee proceeded to consider the points listed in the appeal which were:

- 1. That it was not a legal trial.
- 2. That the facts presented at the trial do not support the findings.

The Special Committee agrees with the ruling of the Trial Commissioners that it was a legal trial. It is true that some of the offenses were committed more than a year before the filing of these charges, but the very complicated facts did not emerge all at once. The accusers, and there are six who signed the charges, did not know of all offenses within the time limits.

Also, and more importantly, some of the accusers contacted two incumbent Worthy Grand Matrons prior to the appeal to our 1987 Worthy Grand Matron. The matter was twice referred to the then current Appeals and Grievances Committee, but went no further until many more details surfaced and were documented. The 1987 Appeals and Grievance Committee, after it was referred to them, recommended that it go to trial.

Since some of the accusers had made two attempts to bring these charges to the proper authorities well within the time limits prescribed by the Constitution and Laws, this last filing can well be construed as a re-filing as described in a communication from our Jurisprudence Committee to the question as to the time limit, where they say that "if you have filed, or attempted to file, the charges at a time prior to November 21, 1986 and within the one-year period beginning August 1985, it would thus make the charges filed on November 21, 1986 and December 17, 1986 simply re-filing of those original charges".

As to the Appeal charge that the facts do not support the findings. The facts of this case are very sad, unpleasant and uncalled for, facts that would make you both angry and heartsick; and our Order has been harmed by having such events occur.

Sisters and Brothers, this report could go on with a recital of a number of unhappy details, but it would serve no useful purpose. Therefore may we conclude it at this time by report to you that our Special Committee on Trial Review, after a detailed search of the transcript and other documents unanimously agreed to affirm the judgment of the Trial Commissioners, including the penalty, which they had pronounced.

I move the acceptance of this report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there be no objection, this report will be accepted.

MARGUERITE WEISHEIMER, PAST GRAND MATRON, MEMBER, JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE AND CHAIRMAN, TRIAL REVIEW COMMITTEE: I'm happy, my Sisters and Brothers, to tell you that these are fine people, who certainly

made their very best effort through this proceeding, and if I were in trouble, I would be content to have people such as this judge me.

Although it was an unhappy situation to be in and we cannot sincerely thank Sister Barbara for giving it to us, we did the best we could.

I am pleased to have you all know Sister Kathleen MacDonald, Past Matron; V.O. Campbell, Past Patron; Brother Henry Woods, Past Grand Patron; and I am Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Marguerite and the members of your committee.

Brother Phil Brooks, Chairman of the Finance Committee, would you like to present your committee and give your report at this time.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE (Phillip Brooks, P.P., Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members. Sisters and Brothers:

The opportunity to serve the Order of the Eastern Star of California as Chairman of the Finance Committee this past year, was humbling and rewarding. For this, I express my appreciation.

Prior to the beginning of the year, Sister Jean and I established a calendar of meetings which would afford the opportunity of both herself, and the Grand Line, to attend a maximum number of Finance Committee meetings. This helped ensure the participation of the elected and appointed members of the committee. Sister Jean, we appreciate your willingness, interest, and dedication to the responsibilities of the Finance Committee.

At the beginning of the year, each member of the Committee was assigned a specific area of responsibility. The areas included: liaison with the Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees; liaison with the Grand Chapter Committee which is responsible for the Grand Chapter Session; Insurance, for which we spend over \$130,000. a year; Investments, which amount to \$17 million; and liaison with our CPA firm, which audits our books and records and prepares the audited statements which are required to be

presented to this Grand Body by our Constitution and Laws.

The efforts of all the members of the Finance Committee are appreciated; and at this time I am pleased to present them to you:

Glenn Martin, P.P., Vice-Chairman, who served as liaison with the Home Board of Trustees.

Betty Stubblefield, Past Grand Matron, who served as liaison with the Grand Chapter Week Committee.

Frank Young, P.P., who spearheaded our investments.

Jesse Fluharty, P.P., who oversaw our insurance.

I, Phillip Brooks, was responsible for the liaison with our CPA firm.

The Finance Committee set its goals high. We had our successes and disappointments. It is always easy to address successes and I shall do that first.

Two years ago we enlisted the services of Chan Asset Management -- Birr, Wilson & Co., to analyze the performance of the investment portfolios of a number of Investment Managers. Based upon their recommendation, and the due diligence of our committee, we selected the firm of Harris Bretall Sullivan & Smith, Inc. as the manager of our portfolio. They also manage the portfolio of one of our Scottish Rite Bodies.

We should extend particular appreciation to Frank Young for his effort and dedication in spearheading this project. As a result of his efforts and the other members of the Committee, and with the revision of Section 73 of our Constitution, our investments will be more effectively managed and reported.

In addition to the change in Investment Managers, the Finance Committee is reviewing the costs and efficiencies of the custodian of our portfolio, which is currently Wells Fargo Bank. We anticipate that this will be changed to an equally responsible fiduciary on a more cost-effective basis in the future.

Another significant change was with the CPA firm which audits our books and records. Because of the retirement of partners of our former firm, the changing needs of Eastern Star, and the pressing concerns we all have with our Eastern Star Home, the Finance Committee solicited audit proposals from

national and regional CPA firms and our prior CPA firm.

Our decision was to select Laventhal & Horwath, an international CPA firm with offices in San Francisco. Their reputation as a premier health care consultant was the swaying evidence for their selection. Since their engagement, we have benefitted, not only from their audit report and management letter, but from their providing enlightenment and education in the health care industry. The members of the Finance Committee are looking forward to the additional assistance they will provide.

We, as members of the Order of the Eastern Star in California, have responsibilities: to ourself, our family, our Chapter, our Grand Chapter, and the Order. This responsibility is collective and mutual. Most importantly, however, we, as members of Grand Chapter, have a responsibility to each Chapter and member. Our assumption of responsibility must be measured and honest, to insure that we can rely on our commitment to each other.

This year, the Finance Committee was presented with the economic needs of the Eastern Star Temple in Sacramento. While the Finance Committee is aware that Grand Chapter was given a nominal ownership interest in this Temple, and is compassionately concerned with the success of this Temple, in these difficult times, the Finance Committee felt it inappropriate to provide economic support to the Sacramento Temple in its hour of need. In fact, with the limited resources of Grand Chapter, its present commitment to the designated charities, marginal ability to control the activities of a Temple operation, and the potential, adverse, legal and economic repercussions, the Finance Committee advises the Grand Chapter to disassociate itself from any entanglements which do not directly contribute to our charities. Each Chapter or Temple must survive on its merits and contribution.

Our world has grown increasingly complex. One of the most distasteful areas with which we deal is insurance. Grand Chapter is no different. We maintain our insurance by use of a separate and distinct fund. Each year, Chapters are billed for their proportionate share of our insurance costs. These bills are prepared and sent to the Chapters based on estimated costs provided by our insurance broker.

When we received our insurance coverage estimates this last year, the Committee was astonished, but by necessity and obligation were required to asses each Chapter, based on their membership, an amount which would cover the estimated costs. After investigation and inquiry, which extended beyond the date by which the Grand Chapter had to bill the Chapters, we found that the initial estimates were in gross error. Therefore, at the end of this Grand Chapter Session each Chapter will be given a one dollars per assessed member refund to return the excess insurance billing. This check will be handed out at the same time as the mileage checks.

It should be noted to this Grand Chapter that, because of the loss of personnel in the Grand Chapter office and the considerable time required to computerize our membership and accounting records, many accounting records were delayed in their preparation. In fact, to insure the timely preparation of our audited financial statements, which are included with the Grand Chapter materials you received at registration, we had to hire additional outside accounting help. The additional cost was seven thousand dollars. We believe that this was a one-time cost and should not recur.

The activities at the Grand Chapter office are many and varied. While most of the necessary duties have been well performed, our CPA firm, in their management letter, indicated that a number of functions did not take place on a timely basis. They have recommended that additional personnel, experienced in office management and accounting, be hired to insure that these tasks are timely performed.

Again, the members of the Finance Committee thank you for the opportunity to have served.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move that this report be accepted and submitted to the Committee on Distribution.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there be no objection, this report will be accepted and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

It is so ordered.

Thank you, Brother Phil, and your committee, for the work that you perform for us. We are very fortunate to have you and members of your committee, which give so much of your dedicated time to this Grand Chapter and for the benefit of us all.

PHILLIP BROOKS, CHAIRMAN, FINANCE COMMITTEE: We will present the budget at this time.

I am Glenn Martin, Past Patron of Yorba Linda Chapter (347) and a member of the Finance Committee of Grand Chapter for four years.

I wish to call your attention to page 32 of the Voter's Pamphlet to consider the proposed budget of the Grand Chapter for the coming year.

I am in receipt of a letter from a concerned Brother who felt that some items needed further explanation. I wish to thank him for the timely written notification of his feelings.

The allowances for the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron and Associate Grand Patron were increased from \$17,050 to \$20,960. There has not been an increase in these allowances for over five years yet, most of you know that Motel 6 now costs \$21.95. The Associate Grand Patron has been allowed an allowance of \$500., where previously there was none. The combination of the allowance plus the Love Gifts received by each officer, at the many functions they attend throughout the year, doesn't begin to cover the expense they incur. The allowance gives a reflection of the importance we place on the duties they perform.

The \$38,000. depreciation expense, which is shown in your Audit Report pamphlet (page 4), reflects the normal amortization of our office equipment, including the Grand Chapter computer, acquired in 1985.

The previous increase in total dues and assessments from \$4.61 to \$5.61 was based upon the estimated costs of insurance for this year. As was previously explained in the report of the Finance Committee, the \$1.00 will be refunded at the close of this Grand Session. The proposed Grand Chapter Budget for 1988-1989 does not require an increase in our dues and assessments.

I move the adoption of the 1988-1989 Grand Chapter Budget.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote on the adoption of the proposed Grand Chapter budget as printed. Is there any discussion?

Brother Leroy Covey, would you like to present Proposed Amendment No. 12, on page 17.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: I call your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 12 to Section 458, and it is found on page 17 of your Legislation Book.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 12:

ADMISSIONS TO THE HOME. 458. Admission Sec. residence in the Home in accordance with its purpose may be granted by the Trustees, only to affiliated members of the Order in good standing, who are at such time at least 65 years of age, and who have been affiliated members of the Order in good standing for not less than ten years in this Grand Jurisdiction next prior to application, and of the Chapter through which application is made for at least five consecutive years next prior to application, except when the Board of Trustees find extenuating circumstances concerning applicants who have been members of this Grand Jurisdiction for fifteen years or more, the five year requirement in Chapter through membership application is made may be waived, except that members from Chapters in existence less than five years are eligible if members in this jurisdiction for ten years. AS TO PERSONS OTHERWISE QUALIFIED, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES HISTORICALLY MAKES NO DISTINCTION ON ACCOUNT OF RACE. COLOR. NATIONAL AMONG RELIGION. ORIGIN OR ANCESTRY APPLICANTS FOR ADMISSION TO THE HOME.

The Committee on Constitution and Laws, to whom Amendment No. 12 to Section 458 has been referred, recommends a "yes" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sisters and Brothers, you are about to vote on the adoption of Proposed Amendment 12 to Section 458, as printed. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 458, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

The Proposed Amendment to Section 458 is adopted.

We ask you now to go to Proposed Amendment No. 13, page 18, and I believe this is our Brother Bill Rose.

WILLIAM ROSE, P.P., MEMBER, JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE: Proposed Amendment No. 13, as it appears on page 18 and 19, provides for two different types of residents.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 13:

- Sec. 459. RESIDENT/S PROPERTIES/ **EØNSENT** 70 ASSIGNMENT! FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS OF RESIDENTS. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MAY GRANT ADMISSION FOR RESIDENCE IN THE HOME TO REGULAR RESIDENTS RESIDENTS. AND PAYING ACCORDANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES:
- (A) REGULAR RESIDENTS SHALL BE ADMITTED TO THE HOME WITHOUT ANY EXPECTATION OR REQUIREMENT TO PAY FOR THE HOUSING AND HEALTH CARE PROVIDED BY THE HOME. HOWEVER. A REGULAR RESIDENT MUST BE WILLING TO EXECUTE AN ASSIGNMENT UNDER WHICH SHE OR HE TURNS OVER TO EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA WHATEVER ASSETS SHE OR HE MAY BE POSSESSED OR MAY BECOME POSSESSED. The Board of Trustees may consent to the voluntary assignment of property to the corporation by a REGULAR Resident, on or after approval of application for residence. but may not accept any duties

obligations in the nature of a trust, as a fiduciary or in a capacity of management or supervision of any such property or any interest therein, for the benefit or on behalf of the assignor or any other person. No such assignment may be made subject to any condition, contingent liability or reversionary interest; nor may it be made in consideration of residence or continuance of residence; nor may any engagement of any kind be made in regard thereto.

All property hereafter assigned to Eastern Star Homes of California by REGULAR Residents thereof, and all cash gifts or proceeds from the sales of real or personal property received from REGULAR Residents, shall on receipt become part of the Endowment Fund irrevocably dedicated to the Home.

- (B) PAYING RESIDENTS SHALL PAY A MONTHLY CHARGE FOR THE HOUSING AND HEALTH CARE PROVIDED BY THE HOME AND SHALL NOT BE REQUESTED TO EXECUTE THE ASSIGNMENT OF ALL ASSETS OFFERED BY REGULAR RESIDENTS PURSUANT TO SECTION 459 (A). THE OBLIGATION TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE MAY BE SECURED IN SUCH MANNER AS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MAY DETERMINE. MONTHLY CHARGE SHALL BE SET AT THE LOWEST FEASIBLE COST. TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION SUCH EXPENSES AS THE PAYMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS AND THE MAINTENANCE OF ADEQUATE RESERVES SUFFICIENT TO INSURE THE LIFE CARE OF EACH RESIDENT AND RESERVES FOR PHYSICAL EXPANSION OF THE FACILITY. ANY PAYING RESIDENT WHO, SUBSEQUENT TO ADMISSION. UNABLE TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE SHALL AUTOMATICALLY BECOME A REGULAR RESIDENT UPON EXECUTION OF AN ASSIGNMENT UNDER WHICH SHE OR HE TURNS OVER TO EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA WHATEVER ASSETS SHE OR HE MAY BE POSSESSED OR MAY BECOME POSSESSED, SUCH ASSIGNMENT TO BE OFFERED AND BE SUBJECT TO BOARD ACCEPTANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 459(A). NO PAYING RESIDENT MAY BE ASKED TO LEAVE THE HOME MERELY BECAUSE SHE OR HE HAS BECOME UNABLE TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE.
- (C) IN GRANTING ADMISSION TO RESIDENTS, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES SHALL ALWAYS GIVE PRIORITY TO THOSE ELIGIBLE MEMBERS WHO ARE UNABLE TO MEET THE FULL COST OF CARE.

The first paragraph on page 18(a) provides for regular residents, and that identifies the type of residents that we have at this moment.

Paragraph 1(B) on page 19 identifies a new type of resident that is proposed and that will be a paying resident with no relinquishment of all of their assets. It is a month-to-month tenancy, so to speak.

They could have certain privileges; however, it is not identified in the legislation as submitted. Several items were questioned at the time this was originally considered. The application fee that may be chargeable. Will they have autos permitted? Will the medical care that they may need be an additional charge over and above the monthly tenancy? And will they have the right to infirmary care?

These things were not addressed; and for this reason, the Committees that this was referred to have no recommendation to submit to you.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 459, as printed. Is there any discussion?

Extensive discussion followed.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 459, as printed.

Those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 459, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

For a lack of verifying that we have a two-thirds vote, we will call for a ballot vote.

I now declare the ballot open.

WALTER HAMMOND, CHAIRMAN, ELECTION BOARD: This will be ballot No. 2.

Take your ballot No. 2 off of your group of numbers and place it in the container, please.

MUSICAL SELECTION. California Singing Stars Choir.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you. That was just beautiful. Thank you so much.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Proposed Amendment No. 9.

Sisters and Brothers, I call your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 9, Section 289, which can be found on page 14 of your booklet.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 9:

Sec. 289. POWER AND PROPOSAL. 3rd paragraph:

Any Chapter receiving a proposal to consider consolidation must notify its members, as aforesaid, before a vote on the proposal shall be taken. THE GRAND SECRETARY AND the Chapter making the proposal shall be notified of the results of the vote. If the proposal it is adopted the Grand Secretary will also be notified. The acceptance of a proposal to consider consolidation does not obligate a Chapter to complete a consolidation.

(Remainder of section unchanged.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You are about to vote on the adoption of a Proposed Amendment to Section 289, as printed. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Section 289, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

The Proposed amendment to Section 289 is adopted.

Sec. 289. POWER AND PROPOSAL. 4th paragraph:

When a Chapter has adopted a proposal to consolidate after notice as provided in Section 146 and shown notice thereof received by the Grand Secretary. aforesaid, or when a Chapter considering consolidation requests assistance, the Workhy Brand Makron CHAIRMAN OF CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE shall APPOINT ASSIGN member of the Consolidation Committee to assist the Chapters regarding all procedures necessary for completion of a consolidation. In the event no member of the Consolidation Committee is available, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a member of Grand Chapter to act as a pro tempore member of the Consolidation Committee.

A. LEROY COVEY, PAST GRAND PATRON, CHAIRMAN, CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE: Sisters and Brothers, I invite your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 11 to Section 290, to be found on page 16, another one submitted by our Consolidation Committee.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 11:

Sec. 290. CHAPTER CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE.

Following a favorable vote by two or more Chapters on the proposal to consolidate, the Worthy Matron of each Chapter shall appoint three members from that Chapter to act as the Consolidation Committee. The member of Grand Chapter assigned to assist, shall be notified of the names of the committee members and shall preside at INE committee A meeting/ 78% OF THIS committee &8%%77 #66% to consider proposals involving consolidation. A STATEMENT OF THE FINANCIAL CONDITIONS OF EACH CHAPTER SHALL BE READ AT THIS MEETING. AND A CURRENT INVENTORY OF EACH CHAPTER'S PROPERTY SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE. IMMEDIATELY UPON THIS FIRST MEETING. ALL SUCH PARTICIPATING CHAPTERS SHALL LIMIT THEIR EXPENDITURES TO THE PAYMENT OF NECESSARY OPERATING EXPENSES, MONEY DUE GRAND CHAPTER, AND MONEY DISPENSED BY THE RELIEF COMMITTEE IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 170. FUNDS SHALL BE APPROVED FOR USE AT A FUTURE DATE AND NO PROPERTY LISTED AS CHAPTER INVENTORY SHALL BE DISPOSED OF. THESE RESTRICTIONS SHALL APPLY UNTIL THE CONSOLIDATION INSTALLATION OR UNTIL SUCH TIME AS CONSOLIDATION PROCEDURES ARE TERMINATED.

REPORT OF MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND (Hildegard Smith, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

I am honored to present Sister Patricia Quibell, Past Grand Matron, and Brother Dennis Jordan, Past Grand Patron. Thank you so much.

Prior to my report, may I thank the delegates for their support of the legislation earlier today. We truly are grateful to you.

Our task in the preparation of legislation for our future application of awards for the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund was educational, informative and interesting.

The committee communicated many times during the year and met in Los Angeles to finalize the legislation for the delegates' acceptance.

Our sincere appreciation is expressed to Sister June Lucretia Barnum, our Associate Grand Conductress, for her wise counsel and preparation of this legislation. Her knowledge of proper terminology and her willingness to assist us greatly lightened our duties.

The basis of the legislation to be presented for the voting delegates is patterned after the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer fund, with but few variations.

For our new delegates attending Grand Chapter for the first time, the question may arise as to "What is the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund?'.

Specifically, it was a bequest made to the Order of Eastern Star in California in the amount of \$650,000, by the late Ralph Rennie, in memory of his wife, Marguerite. The Will specified the following conditions:

- 1. The funds to generate interest which is to be awarded to cancer victims of our Order or their immediate families.
- 2. There was to be no deviation from the policies outlined in the Will. Any deviation would result in the termination of the fund to our Order.
- 3. The fund is controlled by the Finance Committee of our Grand Chapter for proper investment.

Each of our voting delegates has undoubtedly familiarized himself with the terms of the Fund as listed on pages 8 and 9 of the Legislative pamphlet distributed. Proposed Amendment No. 4 as prepared by the Committee expressly states all provisions. The Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund was accepted and the committee appointed following the close of our 1987 Grand Chapter year. The bequest specifically stated its requirements under terms of the Will and these were adhered to in every instance.

No requests for aid were made in 1988 due to the need for adopted legislation at this Grand Chapter session.

It is with anticipation that we, the members of the Committee, look forward to the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund's generating sufficient income to assist the applicants in the future.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move the acceptance of this report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Hildegard. The time you have given to this Committee is much appreciated by this Worthy Grand Matron. My loving thanks to you and your Committee for this service.

If there be no objection, the report of the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund will be accepted and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

REPORT OF CONSOLIDATIONS COMMITTEE (Dorothy Walton, P.M., Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

As long as there is a need to strengthen our Order through consolidation, this committee will continue to be one of the busiest of the Grand Chapter Standing Committees. These dedicated members have given many hours and traveled many miles serving our Chapters this year and it is with much pride that I present them to you --

Sisters Ferne Hammond, Past Grand Matron, Bobbie Glass, Agatha Bishop, Shirley Alexander, Gloria Kimrey, Edith Pedersen, Brothers Harold Hand and Victor Legerton.

My sincere thank you to each of you for your dedication to this Committee and your kindness and consideration to our members and to me.

Two Committee meetings were held this year, one in the North and one in the South. We were most pleased to have our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron join us at the Southern meeting. The Northern meeting was highlighted with the opportunity to meet with the Aims and Objectives Committee, together with our Grand Line Officers. To be able to discuss consolidation with the Grand Line was a great help to this Committee and we would hope that this practice will be continued.

Several years ago our Committee set out to improve the image of consolidation. We were determined to take the mystery out of the procedure and to let the members know that consolidation is not the end of a Chapter, but rather that it can be a bright new beginning. We are making progress in our efforts to educate the members and we are gratified that many of our Chapters have accepted consolidation and are joining together to create healthy, stronger Chapters that will attract new members into our Order.

Though a better understanding of the consolidation process has encouraged small, struggling Chapters to propose consolidation, there are still incidents of large, healthy Chapters who reject these pleas for help. Sadly, a few small Chapters have been turned down for consolidation simply because the larger Chapter does not really need it, or because of discord between a few members. It is regretful that the inspiring teachings of our Order do not always produce a sense of compassion and understanding.

We are proud of the fourteen (14) happy consolidations that have been completed since our last Grand Chapter Session. There are five (5) more scheduled for completion in November and several others are in different stages of progress. A complete listing is included with this report. The problems plaguing many of our Chapters remain consistently the same all over the state. They are, declining membership with little potential for new members, the lack of sideliners, the inability to obtain officers, and, most notably in some areas, too many Chapters meeting too close together. We remind you that it is not the number of Chapters but rather the number of active members that will keep our Order strong.

Each member of this Committee has been pleased to accept invitations to speak at various Chapter meetings this year. I have also been privileged to speak to several larger groups in different parts of the state. We thank the members for the courtesies and many kindnesses extended to us in the areas we have visited. We are always grateful for the opportunity to explain consolidation and to answer any questions concerning the procedure.

May I extend my grateful thank you to our Grand Secretary, Sister Diane Silva and her dedicated staff. They handle all correspondence connected with consolidation promptly and efficiently and a phone call to our Grand Chapter Office is always greeted with cheerfulness. Sister Diane is never too busy to answer a question, and even on the telephone you can hear the smile in her voice.

We thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean for your support of this committee and your sincere interest in our work this year. It has been our pleasure to serve you, and my own personal joy to have become better acquainted with you. You are truly a charming, dedicated lady.

Finally, if your Chapter is faced with consolidation, do not look back. Our Order cannot grow by dwelling on yesterday. We must recognize and admit to the problems facing our Chapters today, for it is only by planning and looking to tomorrow that we can build a successful, healthy future for our beautiful Order.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move that this report be accepted.

REPORT OF ELECTIONS COMMITTEE (Walter Hammond, P.P., Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, the results of ballot No. 2 on Proposed Amendment No. 13.

Total votes cast were 2,227; two-thirds necessary, 1,484. The "yes" votes totaled 1,297; and the "no" votes totaled 930. This motion is lost.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Brother Walter.

The Proposed Amendment to Section 459 is not adopted.

Brother Delroy Aldershof, we would like for you to speak to us at this time.

REPORT OF FUTURE HOME SITE COMMITTEE (Presented by Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron, Chairman)

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Voting Delegates, Sisters and Brothers:

This Committee, consisting of Nola Bragulla; Kay Carmignani, Liaison to the Home Board; Lloyd Budwig; and myself, Del Aldershof, want to thank you, Sister Jean Powers, our Worthy Grand Matron, for our appointments. We all feel and acknowledge the importance of continually striving to provide a Home offering companionship, security, recreation, and now the new ingredient, independence, in our Eastern Star environment. To carry this concept a little further, we believe a new Home with three care levels; 1) Our concern would be our Personal Care Unit, a non-medical wing for individuals who require limited assistance in their daily needs for life; 2) A unit or wing for retirement for persons who cherish their independence yet appreciate the assurance that help is available if needed -- also duplexes for couples; 3) Skilled nursing unit.

The amenities would include craft center and game room,

ceramics, painting, sewing, hobby shop, etc. beauty parlor, library, glass enclosed walkways between administration building and separate wings all on one level, except the two-story Administration Building. Emergency call system in all rooms -- connected to the Office and Health Care department.

Three-hole pitch and putt golf course for use and beauty, a small lake and waterfall. Garden plots for residents, walkways for afternoon or morning strolls.

This can be accomplished with the sale of the existing Home, with the proceeds going to purchase a new site, necessary studies, permits and construction as outlined in the Resolution presented by this Committee.

Our average member is growing older. There should be more need for the Home. We have lost membership, but we are still the third largest Eastern Star Grand Chapter in the United States. The time has come to make the decision.

In January, 1977, Judge Leo S. Rich, of the Superior Court, ordered, adjudged and decreed that the 50-mile radius of Westgate Property on the existing site restriction in the Deed be removed. One of his finds was - and remember, this was 1977 - that the property was too valuable for existing use, and that transportation in the area was not suitable for the employees' use.

I repeat the time has come to make a decision ---

Worthy Grand Matron, I move to accept the report and have it referred to the Committee on Distribution.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there be no objection, this report will be accepted and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

It is so ordered.

FRANK YOUNG, P.P., FINANCE COMMITTEE: I direct your attention to the resolution on page 29 in your legislation and, also, more particularly, to the Substitute Resolution that was distributed with your materials when you received your credentials.

SUBSTITUTE RESOLUTION ADOPTED AT THE 1988 GRAND CHAPTER SESSION

APPOINTMENT OF A COMMITTEE TO SELECT A SITE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW EASTERN STAR HOME OF CALIFORNIA

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that subject committee be comprised of no less than three nor more than five members of Grand Chapter.

DUTIES OF THE HOME SITE AND NEW CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

- 1. To investigate available possibilities for the sale of the Eastern Star Home property on Sunset Boulevard in Los Angeles, approval of any sale of the property shall be made only with the majority of the Board of Trustees and Finance Committee, including the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron as voting members.
- 2. That the following terms and conditions must be met by the persons or company offering to purchase the present Eastern Star Home property:
 - a. Total monies received from the sale of the present Eastern Star Home to be placed in escrow to provide funds with which to purchase the necessary land for the new location and such other necessary expenditures as may be needed for the complete construction of the new Home.
 - b. That said persons or company agree to build a new Home in accordance with our plans if so desired.
 - c. That the building of the new Home will cost no more than the selling price of the Sunset Boulevard property, resulting, in fact, that the new Eastern Star Home will be free and clear of any debt at the time of occupancy.
- 3. That the Home Site and New Construction Committee will locate no less than twenty acres, but preferably up to forty acres, in an area deemed suitable for such a project, negotiate and purchase same only upon the approval of the Board of Trustees and the Finance Committee, including the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron as voting members.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Home Site and New Construction Committee be reimbursed for normal expenses

incurred in line with their duties.

This is the Substitute Resolution, Appointment of a Committee to select a site for the construction of a new Eastern Star Home of California.

To the members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star, the Committees on Constitution and Bylaws, Jurisprudence, and Finance, to whom this resolution has been referred, recommend a "no" vote for the following reason:

We understand that the Board of Trustees of the Home is considering operational alternatives for the Home, including continuation of the present form of operating the Home; keeping the Home in its present site, but modifying operations and/or physical facility; selling the Home with its yet to be defined operational characteristics; selling the Home, investing the proceeds and using the income generated to support qualified members on an as is needed basis.

We believe that these alternatives warrant careful and diligent consideration, since both the well-being of the current residents, as well as millions of dollars of members' funds, are involved.

We recommend that, at a minimum, the following questions be addressed: What is the future demand of the members for services offered by the Home?

If the existing Home is maintained or a new Home constructed, will the demand for its services be great enough to justify the continued support of the members and the income from the Endowment Fund?

How does the amount of declining membership affect the Home?

How many members will be eligible for admission to the Home in the next 20 years?

Would members rather stay close to their homes and friends in nearby residential or skilled nursing facilities as opposed to moving to a site far away from their homes?

What kind of services will be needed in the future by the residents of the Home?

Will there be enough skilled nursing facility and licensed beds?

What should the mix of residential rooms versus skilled nursing beds be?

How will the current nursing shortage affect services that can be provided, and what impact will that have on related costs.

Shall the Home attempt to provide respite for a shorter period to generate additional income?

What is the cost to renovate the current facility versus building a new facility?

How will the municipal requirements affect this decision?

We believe that, by addressing the above questions in a diligent and thorough manner, a more informed and intelligent decision can be made on this matter. That is why we recommend a "no" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sisters and Brothers, to clarify, we are considering the Substitute Resolution. This is the one that was given on a separate sheet of paper when you received your little booklet.

You're now voting on the adoption of the proposed Resolution, as printed in the Substitute Resolution. Is there any discussion?

DELROY ALDERSHOF, CHAIRMAN, FUTURE HOME SITE COMMITTEE: I would like to answer some of the questions that were raised by the Finance Committee and, also, any other questions that might arise in your mind as you are listening.

In talking to the Deputy Grand Master, he informed me that 85 of our sisters in the last few years have applied for and now have residency in the Masonic Homes. Why didn't they apply at our Home on Sunset Boulevard? I can assure you those 85 sisters did not live in Union City. In fact, they came from our own area; two of them came from my Lodge.

As to the future needs, I feel that the Eastern Star, as I mentioned, we are the third largest in the United States. A Sister mentioned the state of Arizona. They have a free care facility; they have less than 35,000 members in the entire state of Arizona. They are paying their way; we are paying a budget of over \$2,000,000 for 63 sisters.

I don't care how you remodel that Home, we're going to have trouble with the neighbors; we're going to have trouble with our Code with the City and the State.

There are so many requirements that are going to be down on us that we will not have the money to take care of that Home.

The Union City Home was in the same situation 15 years ago. They completely remodeled, but they had the money to do it -- we don't.

Our money is tied up in an asset. That asset is worth over \$15,000,000. This type of Home that I am speaking of, of which there is a rendering in the arena where the booths are, can be built for \$11,278,000, leaving us over three or four million dollars in surplus. And I believe that we can get more than the \$15,000,000 for the Home, but the costs I'm talking about are \$11,000,000 at today's costs, complete costs.

I had all the costs run out by a construction company, and they assured me that they would build that Home of that rendering I have in the arena for \$11,000,000.

They talk, if we sell that Home, we're going to have a white elephant on our hands. No, believe me, if the day ever comes when we have to merge with Grand Lodge -- and it might be 20 years down the line, 30 years down the line -- we will have a facility that Grand Lodge will be happy to work with us.

We have talked about doing something about this Home for years. There have been surveys made in 1981; there was a survey of \$15,000. We are right on schedule.

It was stated in the report that, by this year, we will have to make a decision on selling that home or doing something with it. I give credit to the Board of Trustees; they are trying everything possible to increase the residents in that Home. But how many of you would like to give up your home, share a bathroom with somebody for the rest of your life, which is being done in the Home? Or walk down the hall and take a bath or shower with other Sisters, because you don't have those facilities in your room?

And a room that is so small that you don't feel like entertaining in?

I am talking about building a facility with rooms that are 15 x 25, so that they can enjoy their days and evenings.

Where can a Sister walk in our facility? How many accidents have we had where a Sister tried to cross Sunset Boulevard? Every time there is an accident, they have to stop the Sisters from walking out on Sunset Boulevard.

We need a facility away from the city, but we still have to be close enough for employment, for an airport, for a hospital.

We all realize that these are necessities, so think not only of today, but think of tomorrow, because you yourself might need that Home, and you want a Home that you would be able to live in and enjoy.

If there are any questions on this, I would be happy to answer them.

Extensive further discussion followed.

The previous question was moved and seconded.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: All in favor of the motion signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

The motion carried. We will stop debate.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Sisters and brothers, you are about to vote on the adoption of the Substitute Resolution, as printed on a separate piece of paper.

All those in favor of the adoption of the proposed Substitute Resolution, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

It was difficult to say, because this resolution is a majority vote. We will have to have a written ballot.

I declare the ballot open.

MUSICAL INTERLUDE: "Just Once in a Lifetime," Tom Chamberlain, Past Patron (213).

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Brother Tom. That was beautiful.

Please remember our special youth program tomorrow. Our youth are the seeds of the future, and we ask that you buy the seeds and present them to our youth. They have a fine program

for us, and we will also be honored by the presence and receive an address of our Most Worshipful Grand Master Stanley Channon.

We ask that you make every effort to be here, and it is an open meeting, so if you have friends in the area, you can invite them.

The program this evening is for your entertainment and will begin promptly at 8:00 p.m. We have promised our Entertainment Committee that you will be in the Auditorium on time.

ROBERT C. ATKINSON, PAST GRAND PATRON (By Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron)

Someone very wise once wrote in a Masonic publication that true fraternalism is a family affair. Never was this more truly exemplified than in the life of Dr. Robert C. Atkinson, Past Grand Patron, who was so affectionately known to those of us who knew him long and well as Dr. Bob. It is impossible to think of Dr. Bob without thinking of his family, all of whom were involved in fraternal life, and enjoyed sharing this experience with him.

He was initiated in 1921 when his mother was Worthy Matron of his own Golden West Chapter. He served as its Worthy Patron in 1927 with his sister, Isabel McCarthy, as Worthy Matron, who was a Deputy Grand Matron in 1951.

His dear wife, Charlotte, was Worthy Matron in 1932, Deputy Grand Matron in 1942, and Grand Adah in 1945. His Brothers, Dr. John and Dr. Joe, were both active in Masonry and its related bodies, and Dr. John's wife, Florence, also served as a Deputy Grand Matron in 1944.

Dr. Bob's wife, Charlotte, and his sister, Isabel, were both members of the Northern California Degree Team for many years, as was this speaker. This group served Grand Chapter by exemplifying and teaching the work of our Order for the Deputy Grand Matrons at each School of Instruction until the Grand Officers took over that duty because of a Constitutional Amendment adopted at the 1951 Session.

Dr. Bob served as General Chairman of Grand Chapter Week Activities in 1952 and again in 1956, as Grand Sentinel in 1956, Associate Grand Patron in 1961, and Worthy Grand Patron in 1962 with Helen O. Isberg as Worthy Grand Matron.

As a Past Grand Patron, he served on many of our more important Committees, including Jurisprudence and Finance, and was honored with an appointment as Chairman of the International Temple Fund of the General Grand Chapter for the years of 1971, 1972 and 1973. His earnest efforts succeeded in having California become 100% in donations to the International Eastern Star Temple Fund for the first time in 1973.

As Worthy Grand Patron, he instituted three new Chapters: Desert Candle No. 633, Santa Rosa No. 634, and Orinda No. 635.

Yes, Fraternalism was truly a family affair to Dr. Bob, and he and his Charlotte, his sister and his brothers and their children all warmly supported each other in Masonry, Shrinedome, and their well loved Eastern Star, as well as in their personal lives. This kind, gentle, soft-spoken man had many devoted friends in our Order, and we who knew him well, will not forget him.

JENS MORLEY, PAST GRAND PATRON (By Gerald Aegerter, Past Patron [143])

"THIS IS MY FATHER'S WORLD" Past Grand Master, Most Worshipful Vernon Gordon, P.P. (555)

"OUR WORLD IS HIS WORLD"

It is most fitting that we should pause, in the midst of the activity of this Grand Session to measure what we ARE against what we do. To exhibit to the community that we do live as we pray...that we trust in HIM...and that we do NOT lean unto our own understanding. That woven into our ordinary actions is a basic reverence for creation AND for the Creator.

Our world is HIS world. In it...and through it...as we learn to trust in God, THE ETERNAL, we shall find in our hearts an eternity that will transcend the earthly part of "Our Father's World".

It is likewise fitting for us to pause and take account of ourselves and everything around us. It's necessary for us to understand that, while we may hold the deed to this world and everything herein contained, it is God the Father who holds the mortgage and HE can foreclose at HIS own discretion, even as to the very breath of our life.

It is God, in HIS infinite wisdom, who determines the length of our life, but it is also HE who, by HIS grace, grants to us the responsibility of determining its depth.

What is the definition of the word Father? Webster's new collegiate dictionary offers two simple examples. The first is, "A man who has begotten a child." The second, "The first person of the Trinity". It does not refer to either as an entity of love, compassion and caring. The knowledge of this comes from our own personal expectations and experiences.

As we take time here this morning to contemplate our "Father's World", we should also, in order to put things in proper perspective, reflect upon our own conceptions of the love of God, the Father of us all. You see, while HIS love for each of us is intensive and all inclusive, it is sometimes mysterious and difficult to understand. It is HE who watches as religionist, agnostic and atheist alike fail in one endeavor after another, wanting each to succeed, but knowing that true success must be earned.

It is HE who stands painfully by and watches as the very creatures who were created after His own image torment each other with hatred, bigotry, selfishness, and greed, yet, knowing that man's love for man cannot come by decree, but, rather, it is a matter that must be experienced by heart and mind and conscience.

You see, it was God's original intention for His creatures to enjoy life in a paradise. But Man's action altered that plan. The words in Isaiah 35:4, "Tell the Broken Hearted...Behold the Lord comes and shall rescue you, and the redeemed shall rejoice" -- are a message of hope. The barren condition of a life originally endowed with the greatness of God's image, now beset with failures, can be restored.

There is a movement, even in my own Methodist Church hierarchy—to REMOVE the Gender reference to God as God the Father. There are literally dozens of Biblical references that would be difficult to explain, if this comes about, and yet they persist. They may even succeed, but, it will not alter the truth. Truth IS because it is, not because people say so. Truth does not emanate from the declaration of any person or group of persons of those things which they wish to believe. Truth emanates from the acts of God, and remains so regardless of the effect upon preconceived beliefs. The truth is, God is God, and God is the Father.

I have elected to interject a bit of scripture at this point...taken from the first and second chapters of Genesis, in order to underscore the basic text of my message.

"Then God said, "Let us make man in our own image, after our likeness, and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth." So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created Him; male and female He created them. And God blessed them, and said to them, "Be Fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and

subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth."

"These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created. In the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens, when no plant of the field was yet in the earth and no herb of the field had yet sprung up, for the Lord God had not caused it to rain upon the earth, and there was no man to till the ground; but a mist went up from the earth and watered the whole face of the ground -- then the Lord formed man of the dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became living being."

"And the Lord planted a garden in Eden, in the East and there He put man whom He had formed. And out of the ground the Lord God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for good, and the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of knowledge and of good and evil."

This certainly sounds like a beautiful and foolproof plan. How could such a plan, ordained by God, be flawed? Well, if you reflect back upon the words, you will find an intentional omission. While this Biblical plan grants man certain areas of dominion, it makes no mention of Power, and Authority, between man and man.

Granted is dominion over fish, fowl, cattle, and all the earth. If the truth were known, we enjoy controlling these things. Man in the natural strives to be in a position to dominate.

One problem here is, that most of us, with this urge toward dominion, fail to control our own emotions. The flaw in the plan is that we, you and I, begin to believe that we have dominion over each other.

Some of the most beautiful paintings from Asia, both on old scrolls and in modern drawings, show scenes of nature with majestic mountains, beautiful streams and waterfalls, and somewhere in the picture are one or two tiny human figures almost lost in the magnificent scene.

These Asian drawings raise some questions in our minds about our place in God's creation. Have we elevated ourselves to a place where we fail to see ourselves as but a small part of God's world? Could it be that we have escalated the needs of human beings, and wasted God's creation to such an extent that we now face depletion of air, water, and energy? Have we in our selfishness created a world of mass starvation and of exploitation of human and natural resources, when God intended the fullness of the earth for all creation?

We need to reverse our perception of ourselves in relation to the earth's fullness. We need to acknowledge all that we have as a gift from God, to be shared compassionately with everything that lives NOW and to be responsibly conserved for the future.

As we view a snow-capped mountain towering over a green valley, or see the stars shining bright in a dark sky, what awe they inspire in us! In the magnificence of this creation, poets and artists see the hand of Almighty God. The Psalmist sings, "When I consider the works of Thy hands, who am I that you take note of me."

We've come a long way in our efforts to understand the universe, and to work within its laws. Discovery follows discovery, as we search the lands, the skies, and the ocean depths. Invention follows invention, as we make machines that fly, computers that seem to think, "chips" that work miracles, and lasers that seem to do the impossible. We sometimes feel that we are developing such competence that we are becoming sufficient ourselves.

But the more we discover and learn, the more we realize how finite we are. The limitations of our physical bodies, the tempering blows of human failure, the unanswerable questions, the ultimate mysteries humble us and remind us that we are children of God, living in His world, subject to His laws. We are HIS, a part of HIS creation, and not the masters of it. Our discoveries turn out to be steps along the route that was laid out, "even before the mountain was formed".

Stark evidence was furnished of the limitations of man, little more than a month ago, and it carried the manmade title of "Gilbert". We were scientifically capable of detecting its presence, and tracking its course, but totally helpless to diminish its power or alter its course. Another example was the headline in our local paper, with reference to the tremendous fire in Yellowstone National park. It stated very simply, and yet powerfully, "Beyond the control of man".

God has, however, given to humankind the power to control his own actions. Both as it relates to himself, and in relation to others. This great Order that we represent here today is based upon a personal relationship between God and humans. God is a "Thou" and not an "it". To know something as an "it" is one thing. But, to know a person as a "Thou" in a love relationship is very different.

There are several examples of this simple distinction. A Psychiatrist? At least insofar as he or she is a scientist and not also a friend, may deal with a patient as an "it". The relationship is impersonal. And yet, a member of this Order, or the collective body of a Chapter, can deal with the same patient as a Person, one to be forgiven, one to be understood, one to be loved.

A husband and wife can walk hand and hand through a lifetime, and never exhaust the limits of personal knowing. And a love relationship on the human plane is only a foretaste of knowing the love of God. God dwells in our lives, and to establish a relationship with God means a relationship with other members of this human world also.

There are two popular conceptions of God. One, that He is a part of this earth, a part of our people, and a part of our civilization. Another, and probably the most popular, is that God sits on His throne somewhere in the faraway sky, looking down on us and wondering why we do the things we do.

Many of the great thinkers of the world have tried to prove the existence of God. They use powerful arguments, according to reason, supposition, and all the rest, but, it simply boils down to this: "If God could be proven He wouldn't be God". To prove His existence below the spiritual would lower Him to our level, and as much as we try, it can't be done.

We read a moment ago that "The Lord formed man from the dust, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living being." Now, this act alone did not set man apart from all of the other living creatures he had created, for they also were living and breathing objects. The thing that sets man apart is that, when God was creating him, He also placed within man a spark of His own divinity. You can call it conscience, or spirit, or soul, or whatever you will, but, it is present in each one of us.

You and I can't help adding fuel to that tiny spark in our personality and spirit, if we take an honest part in the work of this great Fraternal Order.

OUR WORLD IS HIS WORLD...and, if you really want God to come alive in your life, if you really want to be a part of His

world, then, do something nice for a friend, or a stranger, visit someone in the hospital; be an example to our young people, an example they need not hesitate to follow; as you deal with your Sisters and Brothers of THIS Order. Be to their virtues very kind, and be to their faults a little blind; be responsive to the scripture that says, "Let your light so shine before man that they will see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven.

We were placed on this earth, my Sisters and Brothers, NOT to add more flood waters, but, rather, to build more bridges.

This is a transient world, and it doesn't satisfy us because you dream and I dream. You hope and I hope. We do this because, while all of the other creatures are a part of God's EARTH, we are a part of God's UNIVERSE. And so, we reach out far beyond where we see, planning for our children and other people's children, planning for their children's children...investing, not just for the time when we shall be here, but, investing in eternity.

We are more than all that we see with these eyes that someday will not see. We are more than all that these hands can grasp, when someday these hands will no longer grasp. We were created, my Sisters and Brothers, with the power of endless life.

It's not always easy traveling around in this world of our Father's. How many times have you been late getting somewhere. A place where you had never been, and the later it got the more confused you became about directions. And finally you stop at the crossroads market, and you tell them where you are trying to go, and seeming so simple to them, they tell you to take the left fork out of town, go a little ways past the old fence that is down, turn right and go several miles until you come to the first road past the second windmill...and so on. You jump in your car and speed off, but, before you have traveled even one block you realize that you're just as confused as when you stopped.

And so, you frantically pull into a service station, and you make the same inquiry, but, before the attendant can answer, the man who had just finished putting gas in his car, looks up, smiles, and says, "I'm going right by there, come, follow me." What a beautiful sound, and what a welcome relief to your mind.

Too often we lose our way in God's spiritual world, and we become confused with our own thoughts. We want to be a part of God's world but we're not certain of our direction. We often find ourselves on the wrong road, traveling in the wrong direction.

And then, in a moment of despair and confusion we remember that God has sent a message and a messenger to help us find our way. We remember those reassuring words, "All who seek the way to my Father's house must go where I go; come, Follow Me."

This IS our Father's world. In our plans for ourselves, He has provided us with several alternatives. But, in His plans for us He offers but one choice. Perhaps it was this reality that prompted these poetic words:

"From soaring mountaintops of truth, from great ideals that tower...in majesty from human lives...lived in Thy spirit's power..

Forever Thou art offering, Lord, Thy help for every ill; Yet, none can ever receive Thy help...unless he says, "I will."

Be a part of God's world...and let God be a part of your life.

REPORT OF CAL STAR NEWS COMMITTEE (Bernice Dyck, P.M., Editor)

I want to present these publicity books to you. I don't mean to be an Indian giver, but I want you to know that these books are not quite finished yet.

If there is a person here who has a finished scrapbook, I want to meet you.

I apologize for our local papers saying that Sister Yvonne and Brother Tom would preside over these Grand Sessions. Last Thursday, when the article appeared, Brother Bernie was ready to wash up and go home, because he thought he was not going to be needed, and you should have seen the smile.

In the books, you will see a copy of that, that was in the paper, but you're also going to see the article that I submitted to the paper that they were supposed to print. The only way I can control print is to be the editor and do it myself.

I introduce to you, Sister B.J. Kirste, P.M., the Circulation Manager. The best label sticker in our beautiful world! Thank you, B.J., for your continuing cooperation.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of Eastern Star, the visiting Youth Leaders, Sisters, Brothers, Friends and Readers of CAL STAR NEWS!

As you can see, the Deputy Grand Matrons of 1988 are assisting with this report. Will the 1989 potential Deputy Grand Matrons take note -- there's more to your future title than you think...

Recently our Worthy Grand Patron smilingly thanked all CAL STAR NEWS workers and he included both the unknown and known. That was just perfect because, there is more to publishing our state newspaper than just one or two names. We thank all those responsible for whatever they do; reporters, subscription solicitors, photographers, promoters, assistant editors, and especially -- the subscribers!

The reason I am here -- is to report to you! First I want to know -- do you enjoy a good swim? Most of us native to Fresno

really enjoy the water -- especially in the summertime! Doesn't this backdrop remind you of a great waterslide? We can almost hear the water as it falls from the sky into our beautiful world. The lake looks so inviting -- but before we swim, I remind you -- this really is a report about your state newspaper which is CAL STAR NEWS!

In the Grand Chapter year of 1983 we began with one subscription. The 1983 Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Anita Simon, certainly has faith in her fellowman! She made suggestions, gave encouragement and obtained the support of her Grand Line Officers to sponsor your publication.

The 1983 Worthy Grand Patron renewed his subscription just yesterday and I quote: "why that was almost painless" and then he promised to share with the other Past Grands -- just how easy it is to subscribe to our quarterly newspaper. That same year, 1983, several of us put our heads together, worked out a budget, got bids, and made plans. There are two very fine newspapers after which we patterned our publication -- have you ever noticed how much our Cal Star News looks like the Job's Daughter and Rainbow Girls publications? We figure -- why change a good thing!

From that first subscription we began selling and selling until we had enough working capital to put out the first issue. It didn't even have a name -- in fact, we called it "NO NAME". Before your next issue came out, a Sister up North named it and now you know it as <u>CAL STAR NEWS!</u>

As we began it was truly -- sink or swim! We started swimming and oh how hard we practiced! The beginning was as much of a challenge as trying to swim across the lake pictured on the backdrop. We were dog-paddling and then, because we didn't drown, we started putting out a really good paper and the subscriptions increased. With all that, the Chapter interests increased and the reporters started sending in great stories and interesting pictures until we have a publication of great cooperation.

From the first issue until last month, we have had (NOTE, HAVE HAD) over 7,200 names on the mailing list but...not all at one time! Some come and some go and we have never mailed more than 3,700 copies at one time. We are still treading water at this point but are comfortable while so doing. We encouraged and really wanted 4,000 subscribers by this 1988 Grand Session and we are short just 300. But, we are not going to get out of the swim -- we are having a wonderful time!

How are the finances? We have our heads above water. Our costs have increased with improvements. The four issues we published this year truly made us a NON-PROFIT PART of this non-profit order! That is not "bad news" and here's the reason why. The costs are exactly 50 cents a copy, exactly what it costs each of you when you subscribe. This cost includes typesetting and all materials, printing the four column tabloid sized paper, the mailing and the supplies and materials involved. It would be a bit more profitable if our subscribers would inform us when they move. When your copy is returned undeliverable, it costs us 30 cents and then we have to redirect it to you first-class mail which costs at least 45 cents each. If we mail your paper and you don't get it -- please check with your local postmaster. That's what he is for -- and many times, he or she doesn't realize they have a 2nd or 3rd class mail problem. We especially have problems with rural route carriers -- our circulation manager really gets upset with the post offices and, so can you. There's lots of good financial news coming from this report. Because of the faith our subscribers have in us, they are subscribing for 2, 3, and 5 and some 10 years in advance. This money is put into a savings account and we can get a little fancy, now and then, because of the earned interest. WE NEVER TOUCH THE PRINCIPAL -- that would get us into deep water!

You see, we are really doing swimmingly well...we are even managing to do the butterfly stroke as we close 1988.

Here's the zinger! We didn't hit the 4,000 meter mark in 1988. We are asking you to take a big dive with us in 1989 -- we are going to keep you in training for future swims -- forget that 4,000 mark, that was then and this is now. We are going to see if we can't make an even bigger splash in 1989. How about...5,000 copies going into the mail for our December issue? We know it can be done -- and in the Exhibit Hall you will find our booth to sign up or renew. That old computer will work overtime to handle any and all the subs you give us. When we look at that readout -- and we see who our subscribers are -- it's amazing how it is reflected by office, chapter and localities -- aha...we know who you are! Please take some of our forms home with you and share with others. Two Sisters who are attending this Grand Chapter for the first time stopped by the booth and visited. They are new in the line and -- didn't know about CAL STAR NEWS.

These two Sisters are Shirley Gaither, Molino Chapter No. 83 and Grace Smalley, Redding No. 44. They inquired about the paper and it was explained what to expect from their new subscription. Then we asked them -- what do you want to read in our publication and they began by saying -- "what kind of

entertainment can we find to stimulate Chapter meetings?" "What are some clever themes and decoration ideas?" These two new Sisters give us a challenge and we pass this along to you. Your reports can write about those great plans you carry out so successfully. There are many readers who will be interested in what your Chapter does. Then on the other hand -- if you want to publicize some special moneymaker, give us three months lead time -- we are not your local daily. WE publish four times a year -- WINTER, SPRING, SUMMER AND FALL!

Now, since we have had our swim together and we head for the shoreline -- remember, our paper doesn't cost much. It's easy to spend that \$2.00 for something so worthwhile and that's what it takes for one year. But then -- how about \$4.00 for two years, \$6.00 for three years and so on! Subscribe for yourself; your stay-at-home members; your family in other towns or states; Grand Representatives in other jurisdictions -- there are many who would enjoy learning what our members are doing.

Come on in, the water is fine! Get into the swim -- and remember: Good publicity to the members is called communication. Communication is a form of knowledge. Yes, remember your communication...CAL STAR NEWS.

That's THIRTY for 1988.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Bernice Dyck, for the monumental task of producing our Eastern Star paper. We do appreciate all you do to provide us with news of our Order throughout the state.

We love you, Bernice, and thank you for all you do for us in this state.

Sisters and Brothers, have you renewed your subscription? How about a gift subscription for all your shut-ins.

Sisters and Brothers, let's give this lady a great show of our appreciation for her wonderful work. (Applause.)

Sister Janet, do you have a Musical Moment for us?

BERNARD SEAMANS, WORTHY GRAND PATRON: Sisters and Brothers, we are highly honored this afternoon to have with us the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California

and Hawaii, Brother Stanley L. Channon.

Most Worshipful Sir, may we hear your message at this time.

STANLEY L. CHANNON, MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER OF MASONS IN CALIFORNIA AND HAWAII: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Leaders of the Youth Groups, Members of the Eastern Star, Brethren:

This is indeed a momentous occasion for me to be with you this afternoon, and I appreciate the invitation to attend, Worthy Grand Matron.

It is very appropriate that you should be having the emphasis on youth this afternoon, because the theme I have chosen for the Grand Lodge this year is "Accent on Youth." I hope you like that.

There is a reason for that. If you look at the statistics in our Grand Lodge membership, you will find that the average age of the Masons in our Jurisdiction is 64 years of age, and so, obviously, we must look toward the youth to fill in the ranks in the future.

This year we are emphasizing youth in all of our programs. We are doing it in several ways: We are, first of all, increasing our attention to the Youth Orders. We have increased the membership of the Youth Order Committee by 25%; we now have 48 members on that Committee, and they're going to be reaching into every corner of this Jurisdiction to assist the Youth Orders in their programs and to assist the Lodges in their interest in the Youth Orders.

In addition to that, we are looking at another avenue of youth: We want to encourage younger members to join our Fraternity, so I am issuing a challenge to all Masons in this Jurisdiction this year to seek out and interest one, at least one, young man who might be a good prospect for membership in our Fraternity.

Now, our rules do not allow us to solicit members, but there is nothing wrong with providing information. For too long we have kept this to ourselves and not let others know what we are doing. It is important, therefore, that we get out of that shell and, as Grand Master Jack Levitt put it a couple of years ago, "Bring our light out from under the bushel," and let it be known that we are Freemasons, and that we stand for everything that is good.

It is very fortunate today that I can appear before you,

particularly the ladies in this audience, because you ladies can also be of help to us. You ladies are not restricted from asking prospective young men to become interested in our Fraternity.

To give you some statistics, at one time at our peak in California, we had over 240,000 member. This year we're down to 157,000. We are losing members at the rate of 5,000 a year, for various reasons, one of the reasons being that our members are getting older and we're losing more through death, and we're not replacing those members with sufficient younger members or new members to bring those statistics back to where we have a 0 decline.

My objective this year is to achieve that 0 decline and level off at the end of this year and start the upward swing again to climb up to the pinnacle of membership of good men, in order to increase and enhance our Fraternity.

If one out of 20 of our members were to be successful in meeting the challenge that I am putting out, we would have 8,000 new members, and that would be a 3,000 surplus or addition, you might say, which would mean we were on the positive side again.

Now, if the ladies in this audience could do the same, I don't know how many ladies we have throughout the Jurisdiction here; but if you count all the wives of all the members, that is another 160,000; and if we had your influence, we would have another 8,000; so we would really be on the up swing.

So think positively, think young, and act young.

There are other things that are important. Once we attract younger members, we must keep them. We must provide programs of interest. We must have visibility in the community, because young people like to be a part of what is happening in the world. They like to contribute to the community.

So we are going to enhance the way we are visible in the community in various ways: At our Grand Lodge Communication last week, the Grand Lodge Delegates from throughout this Jurisdiction approved a fairly substantial increase in our budget, to provide for funds to produce videotapes, films, cassettes, and so forth, to assist in spreading the word of Freemasons through this Jurisdiction on public television, on radio, newspapers, etc.

We are going to make use of the modern communications media in order to teach those who may be interested in our Fraternity. We are also becoming more involved in community activities. Rather than bring people into our Lodges and tell them about opportunity, we like to go out and tell more people in the community how good we are and the good things we do.

I'm sure that many of you may not realize that the Masonic Fraternities throughout North America contribute 1.5 million dollars each and every day to charity.

I had the good fortune to speak to the San Francisco Rotary last week in San Francisco during the Communication, and I pointed this out to them. I compared what we're doing with what the Rotary clubs are doing throughout the world. Some of them were quite amazed that we did these things. They did not know that we contributed that sort of money to charity. I enumerated all the charities we are concerned with throughout this Masonic Family, and they were very appreciative, and they learned something from it.

This is the kind of thing we need to do more of.

Another thing that we're going to concentrate on this year is improving the education of our members and of our candidates as they come into the Fraternity. And in addition to that, we're going to provide additional workshops for leadership training; our Masters and Wardens and others may be interested.

We have taken on another program, too, to increase our public visibility and, at the same time, do some real good in the communities throughout California, and I refer to the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program, which we have just undertaken to support the public schools in their drive against drug and alcohol abuse, particularly in the third, fourth, and fifth grades.

We have been shocked, absolutely shocked, at the severity of this problem in our public schools; and I have been informed that, even in kindergarten classes, attempts have been made to reach the young children by providing them with stick-on patches with little pieces of drugs in them. This is scary.

I can go on and on and tell you horror stories about the drug problem in our schools. The school superintendents have given us information about the problem, statistics about the problem. We have talked to law enforcement people, and we have decided that we can do a great deal of good as a Fraternity by contributing to the support of the public schools in their fight against drugs.

The program is like this: We will collect funds from our

members, and we will dispense those funds through the California Masonic Foundation, which is a charitable organization, the only charity through which we can dispense funds and receive public funds.

As we gather momentum in this program, I am sure we will get contributions, probably large contributions, from interested members of the public.

The program has been underway now just for a little over a month, and we have almost \$200,000 contributed already. Now, that money will be used by the schools, and the way in which it will be used is as follows: Our Public Schools Committee, which has been increased in number, in order to cope with this problem, will contact the various schools throughout California and determine what the needs are.

There are two ways in which we can help: We can purchase or help to purchase educational materials or kits that have been prepared by organizations such as the University of Washington and others, and these kits will be used by the teachers in the classrooms.

Now, the teachers also have to be trained, in order to use these kits, and that means taking time from their teaching work to receive the training. Some of our funds will go for training the teachers.

We are also preparing pamphlets, which will be taken through the schools and taken home to the parents, and on the back of the pamphlet will be the legend that this pamphlet was contributed by the Freemasons of California in their drive to stamp out drugs.

So that is the way the money will be used, and as it grows, I'm sure we will find additional contributions coming in.

In concert with this program, the theme we have chosen for this year in public schools is "Public Schools, Learning for Living. A Place to Stop Drug Abuse."

So that has been put into a pamphlet and a placard and will appear on the cover of school books, which are being supplied by our Public School Committee, to remind children that drugs are a "no, no."

So you see, we are really attacking one problem which we feel we will get tremendous community support on and certainly will get some recognition. All of these things that I just described to you and others which I have not even mentioned amounted to only a 78 cent increase in the per capita. I bought a cup of coffee in San Francisco the other day, and I paid \$1.50 for it, so I am talking about the price of half a cup of coffee for the things we're trying to achieve, which is not very much.

Finally, I want to make this point: We can provide all the assistance to the Lodges, to the various Committees of the Grand Lodge in their efforts to aid the Lodges in their work, but it is up to the individual Mason to display all those qualities that should be displayed by Masons. In the final analysis, it is the individual Mason who presents an opportunity to the public. If they see a good man, they may become interested. If not, they may not.

I would like to close now by just thanking you for the opportunity to speak to you today, and I would ask that you spread the word that you have heard today among your friends and among the other Masons that may not be with us. We would like to have this word spread throughout the Jurisdiction as rapidly as possible.

Thank you very much.

Worthy Grand Matron, in case I thought you detected it, I have a slight accent, and for those who may not be able to recognize it, Australia is my place of birth, and I have with me one of these little fellows who hates Qantas, a little koala. It is not a koala bear; it is a koala.

I would like to present this little koala to you, and I would also like to present to you this little memento.

(Presenting gift.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It is a lovely tray with the koala on the tray.

Thank you so very much. What a treasure that will be. I appreciate it so much. Thank you for these treasured gifts and for your inspiring message. God bless you in your service.

STANLEY L. CHANNON, MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER OF MASONS IN CALIFORNIA AND HAWAII: Worthy Grand Patron, I don't think you would like to keep a koala in your house. I would like to give you another koala, which has a square and compass on it, and also I have a little blue button here with a square compass and the words "Accent on

Youth," and these will be given out to all Masons throughout this Jurisdiction this year.

I would like to present that to you.

(Presenting gift.)

I have another small gift as a memento of this occasion for you.

BERNARD SEAMANS, WORTHY GRAND PATRON: This is a notepad holder or a plastic holder to hold notepaper, and on the side of it is the seal of the Grand Lodge of California Free and Accepted Masons.

Thank you so much.

I have two pins for you that you can throw in boxes somewhere. This year I chose the penguin, and we, the Worthy Patrons, are known as the "Perky Penguins" this year. If you look at it very closely, the Worthy Grand Matron and her Worthy Matrons have been known as the "Golden Butterflies," so when we made up this pin, we thought we'd better have them in there. As you know, we Brothers are not the top officer in this organization; the Worthy Grand Matron sets the orders, and we follow them. But in the case of this pin, the butterfly you will find is located at the very extreme end of the tail of the penguin, and no matter how quick we are, that butterfly can swing us around the way it wants to.

STANLEY L. CHANNON, MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER OF MASONS IN CALIFORNIA AND HAWAII: I would like to invite the three young ladies from the Youth Order to come forward. I didn't think I could get off the stage alive if I did not give these girls one of these little koalas.

(Presenting gifts.)

BERNARD SEAMANS, WORTHY GRAND PATRON: Most Worshipful Brother, we thank you so much for your meaningful remarks and your attendance at this Grand Session, together with your lady, Beth, which will be a highlight of this "It's a Beautiful World" Session.

As you travel the Masonic road through your universe this year, may it be a happy and healthful trip.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: My thanks from all the members of this Grand Chapter to you, Most Worshipful Stanley Channon, for your presence and your message and the honor of having you and your lovely wife here with us today.

Following our closing and proclamation by our Grand Marshal, we ask that all the youth present today, as well as their advisors and families, those Star members who wish, approach the main floor. We would like the young people that are with us today to come around the Altar, and all others that can, to come on the main floor. You will be presented with the seeds of our future at that time. MINUTES: The minutes of the Saturday Morning and Afternoon and Sunday Morning and Afternoon Sessions were approved as read.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there be no objection, the report on Sunday Afternoon by our Sister Bernice Dyck, Editor of the Cal Star News and Chairman of the Publicity Committee, will be accepted.

It is so ordered.

Brother Walter Hammond, may we have the Election Committee report.

REPORT OF THE ELECTION COMMITTEE (By Walter Hammond, P.P., Chairman)

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

On the count of the ballots on the Substitute Resolution, it shows the following: "Yes" votes -- 1,011; "No" votes - 841; Total votes collected - 1,852.

The "Yes" vote was 54.6%, which is a majority.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: This is referring to the Substitute Resolution, as presented, and it being over the majority, 54.6%, it is adopted.

WILLIAM O. ROSE, P.P., MEMBER, JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE: Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, I would like to report on the action taken by the Joint

Committees, to which the objection to the Aims and Objectives Committee report was referred.

The report is as follows: The two Committees, Constitution and Laws and Jurisprudence, to whom was referred the proposed amendment to the report of the Aims and Objectives Committee, which amendment would have the effect of removing a recommendation from the basic report, do report as follows:

Number one. The goal of the Aims and Objectives Committee has been made by its publication in the original report.

Number two. The minority opinion is not against the goal attempted to be achieved by the basic report, only of the procedure that was used.

Number three. Section 111, Rule 6, of our Constitution and Bylaws, provides that "Any recommendations to be embodied in such reports shall be filed with the Grand Secretary's office thirty days prior to Grand Chapter."

Number four. The Committee has agreed to strike the part from the report, as received by this Grand Body.

Number five. The maker of the motion to strike the paragraph has agreed to withdraw his motion.

Therefore, the point is now moot, and you are in a position to receive the report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: If there be no objection, this report is accepted as corrected by striking the part from the report regarding recommendation as received.

If you will turn to page 24 in your booklets, Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, will present Proposed Amendment No. 17.

MARGUERITE WEISHEIMER, PAST GRAND MATRON, MEMBER, JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE: I call your attention to Proposed Amendment No. 17 to the Instruction Book on page 24. It is page 30 in the Instruction Book, page 24 in your Legislation Book.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT No. 17:

Page 30, 2nd paragraph:

A visiting member of the Order acting as Associate Matron, Associate Patron or Associate Conductress, is not entitled to inspect or prepare the ballot box. This is the responsibility of the Associate Conductress. (See: "Chapter Set Up".) IF THE ASSOCIATE CONDUCTRESS IS NOT PRESENT, A MEMBER OF THE CHAPTER WHO HAS PREVIOUSLY SERVED AS ASSOCIATE CONDUCTRESS SHOULD FILL THE STATION FOR THIS ORDER OF BUSINESS. OTHER POSITIONS ARE FILLED AS DIRECTED UNDER LEGAL MEETINGS,, PP 4 & 5.

(Remainder of section unchanged.)

Signed: Lois A. Forell, P.M.(39)
Michaelyn Harrison, P.M.(26)

The Joint Committees of Constitution and Bylaws and Jurisprudence, to whom this proposed amendment was referred, recommend a "no" vote.

This amendment would provide that, when an Associate Conductress was absent or non-existent at the time of a ballot vote, anyone carrying the ballot box for that ballot should be the one who previously filled the station of Associate Conductress.

Our reasons for a "no" vote are as follows: A number of Past Matrons in our Chapters have never been Associate Conductresses. Many of them have gone from the floor to a higher office.

Number two, the Worthy Matrons often have to fill in for absent officers at the last moment. There are often few sideliners; they will fill a station from the sideline, and a ballot could be called for unexpectedly, for example, to ask for a Special Dispensation.

These conditions can make it very difficult, even impossible, for a Chapter's Worthy Matron, if this amendment is adopted, to require someone, who had previously filled the office, to do that duty. Therefore, we do recommend a "no" vote.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Marguerite.

You are about to vote on the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Balloting, as printed. Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of the adoption of the Proposed Amendment to Balloting, as printed, signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, the same sign.

(The motion is lost.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Proposed Amendment No. 18, our Sister Ardath Garst, Past Grand Matron:

- (D) EXPENSES. ALL AWARDS AND EXPENSES OF THE COMMITTEE, EXCEPT MILEAGE TO THE ANNUAL SESSION OF THE GRAND CHAPTER, SHALL BE CHARGED TO THE MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND.
- (E) VACANCIES ON THE COMMITTEE. VACANCIES ON THE COMMITTEE SHALL BE FILLED BY THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON FOR THE UNEXPIRED TERM.

- Sec. 459. RESIDENT/S PROPERTIES! COMSENT TO ASSIGNMENT! FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS OF RESIDENTS. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MAY GRANT ADMISSION FOR RESIDENCE IN THE HOME TO REGULAR RESIDENTS AND PAYING RESIDENTS, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES:
- (A) REGULAR RESIDENTS SHALL BE ADMITTED TO THE HOME WITHOUT ANY EXPECTATION OR REQUIREMENT TO PAY FOR THE HOUSING AND HEALTH CARE PROVIDED BY THE HOME. HOWEVER, A REGULAR RESIDENT MUST BE WILLING TO EXECUTE AN ASSIGNMENT UNDER WHICH SHE OR HE TURNS OVER TO EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA WHATEVER ASSETS SHE OR HE MAY BE POSSESSED OR MAY BECOME POSSESSED. The Board of Trustees may consent to the voluntary assignment of property to the corporation by a REGULAR Resident, on or after approval of application for residence, but may not accept any duties or obligations in the nature of a trust, as a fiduciary or in

a capacity of management or supervision of any such property or any interest therein, for the benefit or on behalf of the assignor or any other person. No such assignment may be made subject to any condition, contingent liability or reversionary interest; nor may it be made in consideration of residence or continuance of residence; nor may any engagement of any kind be made in regard thereto.

All property hereafter assigned to Eastern Star Homes of California by REGULAR Residents thereof, and all cash gifts or proceeds from the sales of real or personal property received from REGULAR Residents, shall on receipt become part of the Endowment Fund irrevocably dedicated to the Home.

- PAYING RESIDENTS SHALL PAY A MONTHLY CHARGE FOR THE HOUSING AND HEALTH CARE PROVIDED BY THE HOME AND SHALL NOT BE REQUESTED TO EXECUTE THE ASSIGNMENT OF ALL ASSETS OFFERED BY REGULAR RESIDENTS PURSUANT TO SECTION 459 (A). THE OBLIGATION TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE MAY BE SECURED IN SUCH MANNER AS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MAY DETERMINE. MONTHLY CHARGE SHALL BE SET AT THE LOWEST FEASIBLE COST, TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION SUCH EXPENSES AS THE PAYMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS AND THE MAINTENANCE OF ADEQUATE RESERVES SUFFICIENT TO INSURE THE LIFE CARE OF EACH RESIDENT AND RESERVES FOR PHYSICAL EXPANSION OF THE FACILITY. PAYING RESIDENT WHO, SUBSEQUENT TO ADMISSION, BECOMES UNABLE TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE SHALL AUTOMATICALLY BECOME A REGULAR RESIDENT UPON EXECUTION OF AN ASSIGNMENT UNDER WHICH SHE OR HE TURNS OVER TO EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA WHATEVER ASSETS SHE OR HE MAY BE POSSESSED OR MAY BECOME POSSESSED, SUCH ASSIGNMENT TO BE OFFERED AND BE SUBJECT TO BOARD ACCEPTANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 459(A). NO PAYING RESIDENT MAY BE ASKED TO LEAVE THE HOME MERELY BECAUSE SHE OR HE HAS BECOME UNABLE TO PAY THE MONTHLY CHARGE.
- (C) IN GRANTING ADMISSION TO RESIDENTS, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES SHALL ALWAYS GIVE PRIORITY TO THOSE ELIGIBLE

Sister Marguerite Weisheimer, may we have your report on Wills and Bequests at this time.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WILLS AND BEQUESTS (Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

I have the honor and pleasure of presenting my co-workers on the committee. Brother Stanley M. Love, Past Grand Patron and Sister Edna S. Ree, Past Matron, and I am Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron.

Again this year I thank you for the privilege of being associated with these fine members and I do appreciate their thoughtful letters to me and the suggestions they have presented. They have been very cooperative, and I am sure no others could have been more helpful.

We have each done our best to create interest in a program to increase interest in possible bequests to our Home, and the other Charitable Funds of our Grand Chapter. Sister Edna wrote a very nice article for the Cal Star News and sent out letters in her area. I know that Brother Stanley and I have each spoken of the importance of such bequests, however, we were mindful of the fact that when we received our appointments last year we were told that we might speak to Chapters on this subject only when we were requested to do so, and, sadly, we have received no such requests. I have also been told that the Endowment Fund Committee does cover this subject in their talks to the Chapters in their areas, and we are now wondering if this Committee is

superfluous, and a duplication of their efforts, and that perhaps this part of their talks could be emphasized so that our Committee would not be intruding on their duties.

I have not seen Sister Edna Ree, a Past Matron, who is on our committee, but I have been told she is not well. I hope that is not true; I hope she's in good health; and if she's here and will come up to the stage, I will be delighted to present her at the end of this short report.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Marguerite, for that lovely report, and we do appreciate all that you have done, working with the members on the committee and informing our members about wills and bequests.

Sister Berta Gillaspy will give her report on the Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL CANCER DRESSING STATIONS (Berta Gillaspy, P.P., Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Matron, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers: I have the pleasure to present one of the Co-Chairmen of our committee this year, Sister Frances Barks of Upland Chapter. Sister Betty Scriber of Sunnyvale Chapter is not here due to illness, and I thank these friends for their kind support to the Sisters throughout the year.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, recognition of the Cancer Dressing Stations and presentation of certificates of appreciation to workers was well received and greatly appreciated by our volunteers. Signing each certificate by the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Secretary did not go unnoticed. A bouquet of love is sent your way for this generous gesture. Fourteen hundred seventy-five certificates (1,475) were completed for presentation at luncheons, before-chapter potlucks, planned dinners, and special Chapter meetings honoring these special people who man the stations with love and service. Highlighting this program this year brought forth renewed interest with new stations opening in Redding, Westwood, Pleasant Hill, Fairfield-Suisuin and reactivation of Seal Rock-Brilliant Star.

Late in April, a crisis erupted before our very eyes when the manufacturer of the cellucotton notified our supplier that he would no longer make the product needed for dressing and bed pads; this, with a back order of 50 cases in the hands of the supplier. With the assistance of the supplier, the ACS service coordinator, Sister Kolean Naten, Sister Betty Scriber, and much phoning, a manufacturer was located in California willing to gear up within weeks to meet our needs. The crisis was over: we were able to keep all stations open without interruption.

Opportunities have been given to speak about this program before Chapters, and Hi-Twelve Clubs of Masons. We have emphasized to all that the dressing are provided free of cost to patients through the ACS and membership in our Order is not a requirement. A stroll down the pharmacy aisle adding up the cost of three dressing changes per day multiplied by thirty days will reveal the substantial savings to patients. We wish to thank the many individuals, the Chapters for coin marches and special events, memorials, the associations for contributions and yes, even the Stations themselves for contributions to help our fund remain solvent and healthy. We invite you to read a reprint in the Cal Star News of a thank you letter received from a recipient of the dressings -- it says it all.

Statistics are a tangible means of evaluation for some of us. Here are some for your consideration. The 91 Stations and 2 Substations reported 27,450 dozens, or 329,400 dressings made; 22,542 bed pads made; 3,610 laryngectomy bibs; 9,515 breast prothesis made. American Cancer Society reports 27,605 dozen or 331,260 dressing distributed and 9,442 breast prothesis distributed. With 1,695 patients served by ACS and 39 served directly from Stations it can be stated this program which began in 1957 under the auspices of Marguerite Weisheimer, Past Grand Matron, can be judged filling a great need.

We take this opportunity to thank the Station Chairmen for their fine cooperation, to the Grand Secretary and her staff for their assistance, and the many contributors to this fund. Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean, our special thanks for spotlighting this excellent program this year, bringing it to the attention of the full membership, and for this appointment and marvelous experience -- the privilege of working with the "cream of the crop", the volunteers at the Cancer Dressing Stations.

Finally, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, on behalf of Catherine Cordova, California, Division Director of Service and Rehabilitation, in appreciation for your continued support and promotion of this program, I present these special paper weights from the American Cancer Society to each of you.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you.

This means so much to me.

I need to tell you a little story: When I came to California in 1957 and realized the project of our Sister Marguerite, I was so touched, having been one who had walked through the Valley of the Shadow and been cured.

I realized how beautiful this service was to everyone, not just to our fraternal members. I became a volunteer at the American Cancer Society in Pomona; and for several years, I managed the Pomona office.

I cannot tell you, my Sisters and Brothers, how much you are revered by the people that use those dressings. And when our Sister Berta approached me and had this idea, I thought God sent her to me, because it is exactly what I wanted to do. Thank you, Berta, and thank you, all of our wonderful volunteers who give so much service to our Cancer Dressing Stations. God bless you.

My sincere thanks to each of these Sisters and Brothers for the time, effort, and understanding that they have given to our less fortunate members and their families.

Saturday I was told that the printing of little pamphlets, which we had before, had been approved; and so each Secretary will be getting a package of these to be sent to each member, and I sincerely hope with all my heart, Secretaries, that you will take care of this and not put them on the shelf.

I think there are many members who are home and cannot attend Chapters, and they should know about our fund. They do need it.

Sister Jean Powers, Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Bernard "Bernie" Seamans, Worthy Grand Patron, it has been an honor to have served with you this year and I thank you most sincerely.

The actual paying of the bills is done in the Grand Secretary's office and I thank Sister Diane Silva, Grand Secretary and her great staff for all their fine service. Sister Diane many thanks for your help when a problem arose.

The greatest thanks of all, go to you members of our Order for without your contributions there would be no funds. The many associations and groups who plan and execute a fundraising event each year. The individuals that contribute to this fund make it possible and for those whom you have helped, are helping, and will help, we give you grateful thanks.

During the Grand Chapter year July 1, 1987 through June 30, 1988 bills have been paid for 99 applicants totaling \$138,865. Of this \$65,371 was for hospital care, \$46,562 for doctors and nurses and \$27,932 for medicine, drugs and services. There were 54 new applicants of which 4 were dependents. During this time the contributions and bequests were \$312,109. Among the bequests were \$103,086 from the Estate of Sister Edith E. Shaw, a member of Bell Chapter No. 286, \$59,082 from the Estate of Alene Kearns, Past Matron of South West Chapter No. 345. There were many more contributions from projects and memorials that went direct to the Grand Chapter office and for these contributions a heartfelt thanks.

Since July 1, 1988 to October 10, 1988 bills have been paid in the amount of \$30,594.21; \$12,698.94 was for doctors and nurses; \$12,374.96 for hospital and lab; and \$5,520.31 for medicine and services. The contributions for this period was \$18,371.39. There was a bequest of \$2,000. from the Estate of Charles Chapman and a bequest from the Estate of Pauline Davis.

We must remember this fund was started to help those that have insufficient funds to cope with the increasing costs of medical care. If you or a member of your immediate family is ill with cancer, and the cost of care is beyond your means, contact the Worthy Matron of your chapter.

I sincerely hope that the Worthy Matrons Elect will include a talk by an Area Chairman in her program for the coming year.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have served our members through the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund these past ten years. It has been a rewarding experience for me and makes me proud to be a member of the Eastern Star.

As of this Grand Chapter there will be a new General Chairman, Sister Helen Bratschie, who is no stranger to many of you. The Committee will be in good hands under her chairmanship.

REPORT OF ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE (Gilman Knutson, P.P., Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

I would like to introduce my committee, Brother Felix Carter and Brother Joe Morris.

The committee visited the San Diego Convention Center and was cordially received.

VIVIAN BALLOU, DIRECTOR OF CONVENTION SALES, FRESNO CONVENTION CENTER: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members of the Order of the Eastern Star:

A belated warm welcome from the City and County of Fresno.

We are pleased to be hosting your convention this week, and we hope to see you again in 1989 and 1990.

It is my pleasure to have the opportunity to present to you Fresno's bid for 1991, 1992, and 1993, why you should select Fresno for your future years.

that the Grand Chapter, in its previous Session, has voted to go to Bakersfield, if they wish to change it, there will have to be a motion to do that.

Did I make myself clear?

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: You're asking for a motion to rescind the action that was taken by vote at our last Grand Chapter Session. The vote was made to assemble in Bakersfield in 1992, no, it is 1991.

GILMAN KNUTSON, P.P., CHAIRMAN, ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE: Excuse me, we have talked to Sister June and she is most willing to have the Delegates decide, and she says very plainly, and I would like to call on the Vice Chairman of our Committee, Felix Carter, and maybe he would like to talk to the motion.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: We don't have a motion yet. We will need the motion and the second before discussion.

FELIX CARTER, P.P., MEMBER, ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE: I make a motion, Worthy Grand Matron, that we change the site location from Bakersfield to Fresno for the 1991 Session.

(The motion was seconded.)

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: It has been moved and seconded that we change the action taken at our last Grand Chapter Session to rescind the vote and change our site for our Session in 1991 from Bakersfield to Fresno.

REPORT OF APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES COMMITTEE (Vernon Gordon, Chairman)

By comparison to reports filed in previous years, your Committee on Appeals and Grievances experienced a year of relative quiet. I must state for the record, however, that each member of the Committee was always at ready to answer any call for service, either from the Chairman of the Committee or the Worthy Grand Matron. The Order is fortunate indeed to have members so dedicated, and of such high moral fiber, to represent and defend the concerns of the Chapters and their members. To each member of this Committee I extend my heartfelt gratitude.

Four separate issues were assigned to the Committee during the last term, two of which involved the same Chapter (which were later determined to be a part of the same problem), and in addition to those assignments, the Committee Chairman received numerous calls from other Chapters and members which were, in his judgment, outside the purview of this Committee.

The assignments which involved no formal charges against a Member, Officer or Grand Officer were handled by specific members of the Committee. In each instance, and to the extent of our knowledge, the matters were resolved to the degree of the scope and ability of the Committee. It should be pointed out that most, if not all, of the unrest among the members of the Chapters could, and should, be resolved among the members themselves. They need to get involved.

The Committee had referred to it, under Section 909, of the Constitution and Laws, one case involving charges of Conduct Unbecoming a Member and Abuse of Power by a Worthy Matron. The first responsibility of this Committee in such instance, under the provisions of Section 909, is an attempt to reconcile the differences. We are pleased to report that conciliation was effected in this case and a trial was averted. It should be pointed out that in almost every case involving reconciliation efforts, the preponderance of compromise of principle lies with the Accusers. This was indeed the case in this issue, and our Committee is truly grateful to the Accusers for their thoughtful and fraternal consideration for the good of the Order.

The names of members, as well as the names and numbers of Chapters have been omitted from this report. A detailed record, however, has been made a part of the permanent files of this Committee, and are available to any person having proper authority to view the same.

The Committee is grateful to the Worthy Grand Matron for granting each of us the opportunity to be of service to the Grand Chapter, and we extend to her our unfeigned thanks for the many additional kindnesses which she extended to us.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Brother Vernon, this is a difficult responsibility; but you and your Committee Members have handled it so very well.

Thank you for your devoted love and understanding and your tolerance and patience of the innumerable problems that have been presented to you this year.

Thank you so much.

REPORT OF SPECIAL MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE (Ella Norris, P.M., Chairman)

All Chapters were invited to participate in the Membership Competition. Out of 446 Chapters, 385 Chapters responded. The competition was for two categories. One for a Single Effort made by an Individual Chapter and the other for a Combined Effort of the District. The state was divided into three divisions. Northern Division, consisting of Districts 1 through 30. The Central Division, consisting of Districts 31 through 60. The Southern Division, consisting of Districts 61 through 91. Twelve Hundred Fifty-one new members were initiated into the Order from October 1987 to October 1988.

Sisters and Brothers, you see what really can happen when you go out and work at it. Also, the various north and south sections of our large state, the work that has been done, I know our Deputy Grand Matrons have encouraged, and we do present them with an award as well. We recognize you and are very proud of what you have accomplished.

REPORT OF MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE (Ella Norris, P.M., Chairman)

Evidence of a serious decline in membership prompted action to be taken and a Membership Committee formed.

Publicity for membership was sent to the Cal Star News asking all members in California for their views and ideas on how to increase the membership in our Order. In the following three issues of the Cal Star News ideas and information concerning membership was published.

Worthy Matrons in their home Chapters appointed

Membership Chairmen to work on enlisting new members through Youth Groups, Blue Lodges, and Masonic related friends, and send a brief report to the State Chairman on their progress.

Laymen's Nights were recommended and guidelines were written and distributed to those who showed an interest. Fraternal notices were encouraged to be placed in the local newspapers, stating time, day and location, including the phone numbers of the presiding Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron.

The Deputy Grand Matrons were asked to assist in this program with a letter sent to the president of the Association asking them to give a brief talk on membership to each one of the chapters in their Districts.

The results of the statewide competition were very rewarding. It proves that there are people out there that would like to become a member of our Order. They have to be asked, not by Grand Chapter, not by the Worthy Grand Matron, nor some committee, but by the Individual Members in a Chapter.

Letters were sent to every Chapter requesting a list of new members that were initiated in this Grand Chapter year. As of this date there were 1,251 new members. This average per Chapter of new initiates is about 2.8 new members this year.

As you will note, we tried many different approaches to the problem, and the success of the program mentioned was varied, depending on the cooperation, and the dedication to succeed of those involved.

One of the inescapable facts is quite obvious: IF WE ARE GOING TO TURN THE DECREASING MEMBERSHIP AROUND, IT WILL NO LONGER BE "WE" ... INSTEAD IT HAS TO BE "ME".

We have all heard the various reasons why membership is decreasing...the various groups we have to look at for new members, etc.

However: talk without action on the part of each and every one of us will not do the job. One of the messages of the Worthy Grand Matron this year was that "EACH ONE MUST REACH ONE". Each member has to take the responsibility of bringing another member into the Order. THAT is the action that is required of each one of us!

Just ask the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of Concord Chapter. They will tell you it is worth the work.

If there be no objection, the report of the Membership Committee will be accepted.

Sister Ella, we thank you for all of the efforts you have made on this Committee this year. It was a new one, and it takes a little while to get started, but you have put so much into it, and we thank you for your enthusiasm and all you have done in the aid of our Chapters this year and in planning these awards.

Thank you, Sister Ella; you are just a dear.

We want another report from you. Sisters and Brothers, this lady has such a vivacious way about her, she has been our State Chairman for our '88 Star Tracks Program.

Sister Ella, will you tell us about your program and present your committee.

REPORT OF SPECIAL STAR TRACKS PROGRAM COMMITTEE

(Presented by Ella Norris, P.M., Chairman)

The 1988 Star Tracks Program was received with enthusiasm. The Cal Star News published the program points system, and the members got right away making tracks by attending Eastern Star, Youth Groups, Blue Lodge, and various other Masonic Installations.

Party Nights, Stated Meetings, Visiting the Sick, Sending Cards, attending Grand Officers and Deputy Grand Matrons Receptions, and striving for a perfect attendance in their Chapters all contributed to the points.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Sister Ella Norris, for your drafting our Star Tracks Program of '88. The members have had fun making tracks, and the Presiding Officers have been so thrilled to have sideliners at their meeting, and unexpected visitors are such fun for all.

If there be no objection, the 1988 Star Track Program report is accepted.

SOLO: Zola Steele, P.M., (160), "Till There Was You."

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, our Sister Zola. You are just a talented lady, and thank you for sharing that talent. It was truly beautiful.

Sisters and Brothers, it has been called to my attention that Grand Chapter is to be scheduled five years for Sessions, and we are now scheduled for only three, just through 1991. We need to schedule 1992 and 1993 at this Session, and they may be tentative. Of course, they can be changed; but we need to have this according to law.

Brother Gil Knutson, may we hear from you again.

GILMAN KNUTSON, P.P., CHAIRMAN, ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE: I'm sorry, Worthy Grand Matron, that we did not get this done, but we have tentative agreement for the next five years for our convention to be held here in Fresno. That means that, if we change one of the dates, that will be okay, but we have five years signed.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: We need a motion.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers: Before I start my report I certainly must thank Sister Jeraldine Southward for my appointment to this Committee. The last three years have been especially enlightening and enjoyable.

May I present Boyana Brown-Redman, Katherine Hill, and Kathleen MacDonald.

Brother Morris Cecil is in the audience somewhere, but he's very busy on the Decorations Committee for the Installation.

I wish to thank these members of the Committee. You can't imagine how much work these people put in. I will tell you a little more about it in my report.

Of the 420 applications which were complete, we were able to approve a total of 114. Total funds available was \$54,300. Three Religious Scholarships and 100 four-year college awards at \$500. each and 11 two-year college awards at \$250. were made. The total awarded was \$54,250. Recipients included 11 Rainbow Girls, 14 Job's Daughters, eight members of Eastern Star, and two DeMolays. Several members of our Masonic Family had to be denied, due to the lack of funds and for other reasons.

Had the Committee been able to expend only the funds which were raised as a result of the present assessment of 10 cents per member, we would have had only \$9,438.90, less the necessary Committee expenses, available for awards. A great vote of thanks

must be extended to those Chapters and individuals who, through projects, gifts, and personal effort made the funds available.

The Committee wishes to especially acknowledge the gifts made by the Officers and Members of Ungava Chapter No. 106, Riverside. A total of more than \$10,000. was given to the Fund this year. This is my own Chapter and I wish to publicly thank the members for such a generous gift. Had it not been for this gift, many more deserving applicants, including more members of our Masonic Family, would have had to be denied.

To further complicate the problems which will be faced in the future, it has been determined, by the Finance Committee that funds donated to this Grand Chapter project are not tax exempt for Federal Income Tax purposes. This will surely limit donations in time to come.

It is therefore recommended that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a Committee of three eligible and qualified persons to attempt to establish the tax exempt status of this fund.

I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the great amount of help given to the Committee this year by my wife Sister Isabel and also by both Sisters Diane Silva, Grand Secretary and Sheri Weisser, Grand Treasurer. Their assistance was immeasurable.

Worthy Grand Matron, I move that this report be accepted and that the recommendation be placed before the Grand Chapter.

JEAN POWERS, WORTHY GRAND MATRON: Thank you, Brother Jay, for your devotion to this cause. We know how very much it means to you and appreciate all the time and effort, and we know it was a great deal of time that you and your Committee have spent in making the selections, how very carefully you have worked on this; and we do thank you.

This report will be accepted and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE COMMITTEE Betty Hamlin, P.M., Chairman

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean Powers and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Bernie Seamans, for the opportunity to serve you and our Grand Chapter on the Fraternal Correspondence Committee. It has been an enjoyable and enlightening experience to journey to these other Jurisdictions "via their Proceedings".

We found that although each Grand Chapter is unique, we are, in many ways, very similar. In many Jurisdictions, this Committee is composed of the Grand Conductress, Associate Grand Conductress, and another Grand Officer -- oft times the Grand Warder. We found that Michigan is our oldest Grand Jurisdiction, and Nova Scotia-Prince Edward Island the youngest. Puerto Rico is the smallest, and Delaware the smallest in the United States. Texas has the largest number of Chapters, and Ohio the largest number of members. California is not alone in loss of memberships, as this seems to be the universal problem in every state.

The Order of the Eastern Star is composed of five Sovereign Bodies: 1) The Independent Grand Chapter of New York, which is the oldest, formed in 1869. They use the McCoy Ritual, and display the Star with the white point up. 2) The Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersy is the second oldest, organized in 1870, and is governed by a modified version of the Robert Morris Ritual. 3) The General Grand Chapter is the largest Jurisdiction, organized in 1876, and to which California belongs. It has jurisdiction over all Grand Chapters in the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico, and subordinate Chapters in many foreign countries. 4) The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, of which the Queen Mother of England is a member, organized in 1904. 5) The United Grand Chapter of Australia, which was instituted in June 1985, with Mr. James Kerr, Most Worthy Grand Patron of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, presiding at the ceremonies. We are the largest fraternal organization in the world to which both men and women belong.

The International Temple is located in Washington, D.C. The Right Worthy Grand Secretary of General Grand is required to reside at the Temple. No flag flies over the building, but it does display a lighted star within a pentagon, within a circle. The star represents the subordinate Chapters, the pentagon the Grand Chapter, and the circle the General Grand Chapter. This denotes the fact that the sun never sets on the Order of the Eastern Star.

All of the Grand Jurisdictions open by placing the Holy Bible upon the Altar. Flags are presented, and honored, distinguished members and guests are greeted with warmth and love. All meetings open and close with prayer. Millions of dollars are contributed annually to such projects as the Heart Fund, Cancer Research, Arthritis, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, ESTARL, Masonic and Eastern Star Homes, our Youth Groups, Diabetes, etc. These are just a few of the worthwhile projects supported by the Order of the Eastern Star.

As we continue with the serious and moving ceremony of Installation, let it be for each of us a time for personal dedication and inspiration.

First, enter our Ambassadors of Good Will, the Grand Representatives of California, representing the Grand Jurisdictions in California, our Sisters and Brothers, who, in love, give much to strengthen the fraternal bonds between each Jurisdiction.

(Grand Representatives marched into the Grand Chapter Room and took their places.)

Now, enter our Deputy Grand Matrons, appointed for their ability to represent our Worthy Grand Matron in their respective Districts. They must devote their time and capabilities while fulfilling their duties as Instructors.

(The 1988 and 1989 Deputy Grand Matrons marched into the Grand Chapter Room and took their places.)

Now, we present our 1989 Worthy Matrons-Elect and our 1989 Worthy Patrons-Elect.

(Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons stood.)

The Worthy Patrons, our Road Runners for 1989, share an emblem that teaches one to always look to God and always treat our fellow man fairly and justly.

Just as our Brothers give us our Masonic background, they will form the frame and ribs of the fans that are symbolic for the coming year. In 1989, the Worthy Matrons, or Happy Hummers, as they are known through the State, will spread their motto, "Let love be our password," as they perform their duties. SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF GRAND JURISDICTIONS BY THE FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE COMMITTEE

ALBERTA: Alberta's Finance Committee recommended "That the Worthy Grand Matron be provided with a mobile telephone, with the understanding that Grand Chapter pays for the installation and the Worthy Grand Matron pays the toll charges." This was passed. The Marshal, not the Worthy Patron, takes the minutes to the East for the signature of the Worthy Matron after the Secretary has read the minutes at their Chapter meetings.

ARIZONA: The "Sunrise Session" of Grand Chapter of Arizona was held in the Hilton Hotel in Phoenix, Arizona on April 1-4, 1987. Worthy Grand Matron Sister Sara Brugh and Worthy Grand Patron Brother Wendell Richins presided over the 87th Annual Session. The Grand Chapter Session was attended by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Helen Roquemore Cox, and the Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Ray W. McRoberts, one of Arizona's own Past Grand Patrons. Many plans were made known as to the General Grand Chapter Session to be held in Atlanta, Georgia in November, 1988.

ARKANSAS: In Arkansas every member is asked to contribute \$1.00 to ESTARL and their committee believes recipients leaving the field of Religious Education should be contacted for repayment of the award. They have a Grand Chapter "Mom", Grand Chapter "Sweetheart", and a Grand Chapter "Dad".

AUSTRALIA: Some 2,500 Sisters and Brothers traveled to Brisbane, Queensland to witness the Institution of the United Grand Chapter of Australia on June 8, 1985. Many distinguished guests from the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland were present. Mr. James Kerr, Most Worthy Grand Patron of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, O.E.S., presided at the ceremonies. Sister Elaine O'Brien, Most Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Joseph Lavaring, Most Worthy Grand Patron, and their corps of officers were duly installed, and proceeded to prepare for the business of the First Biennial Session on June 4-7, 1987.

COLORADO: The Grand Chapter of Colorado held its 95th Annual Session in the City Auditorium of Colorado Springs, Colorado. Sister Arlyne M. Potter, Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Ellis Latimer, Worthy Grand Patron, presided over the "Harvest of Love" Session. The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron had a special "Love Project" to help make the Order in Colorado a benevolent organization in action as well as in name. A silver dollar was given to each of the Worthy Patrons at the beginning of the year. They were told to take this "talent" and make it multiply. The money earned was to be used to either begin or replenish a benevolent fund in their Chapter, to be used to help anyone who was in need, whether they were a member of the Order or a person in the community needing help. This has been so well supported that many Chapters have changed their bylaws to incorporate this idea. Some of the Chapters raised anywhere from \$400. or \$500. to as much as \$1,500. to \$2,000. This project was based on verses 14-19 of the 25th Chapter of Matthew, "The Parable of the Talents".

CONNECTICUT: In Connecticut, the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress are the Fraternal Correspondence Committee, sometimes assisted by the Associate Grand Matron, or a member (P.G.M. or P.M.) appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron.

PLORIDA: The 82nd Session of the Grand Chapter of Florida was held on April 14-17, 1987, at the Curtis Hixon Convention Center in Tampa, Florida. Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Bobbie P. Davidson, and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Earl (Buddy) Herndon, presided over the "Spring of Life" Session, attended by 2,417 registered members with 246 Chapters out of 248 represented.

The Grand East was beautifully decorated in keeping with the "Spring of Life" theme, while a special round table (to one side) held the display for the Worthy Grand Matron's honor station, Adah, a White Bible, Sword and Veil, with pots of live violets.

GEORGIA: Taken from the Worthy Grand Matron's Report: "I firmly believe that the time has come when the O.E.S. needs publicity. By this I mean to publicize our many charitable acts and purposes and to let people know that we are a 'live' organization. For this reason, I appointed a State Publicity Committee with a Brother and a Sister as Co-Chairmen, Several T.V. interviews and newspaper interviews were well received."

IDAHO: "Hitch Your Wagon to Our Star" Session was held June 9-11, 1986. The Worthy Grand Matron's Chapter had its 100th birthday this year and was the first Chapter in Idaho to do so.

INDIANA: Indiana has a Baby Dedication Ceremony. In 1986 there were almost 500 babies dedicated. (No figure for 1987 was found.)

IOWA: The "Discover the Treasures and Pleasures of Iowa" Session was held on October 27-29, 1987. This 110th Annual Session met in the Consistory Building in Des Moines, Iowa. Worthy Grand Matron Sister Margaret Batschelet and Worthy Grand Patron Brother James Archer presided over these meetings with Love, Service, Laughter, and Music. Many drills and ceremonies were used throughout the three days. The list of Distinguished Guests was headed by Virginia M. Jones, Right Worthy Grand Secretary of the General Grand Chapter, and a Past Grand Matron of Iowa, and Ray G. Osborne, Right Worthy Grand Sentinel of General Grand Chapter, and Grand Treasurer of Tennessee. The Worthy Grand Matron's Special Project netted \$13,662.22 for "Dollars for Diabetes for Research".

KANSAS: The 111th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Kansas was held on April 21-23, 1987, in Topeka, Kansas, for the 46th consecutive year. The 1988 Grand Session will be held in the new Expo Center in Topeka. They were honored by a visit of the Governor of Kansas, the Honorable Mike Hayden, as well as numerous dignitaries from General Grand Chapter, the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Kansas, and his corps of officers, other related Masonic Orders, and the Youth Groups. Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Ruth Williams and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Stephen W. Karstadt gave their Farewells at the closing session, and their Grand Marshal and Grand Chaplain immediately assisted in the Installation of the 1987-1988 Grand Officers.

KENTUCKY: Kentucky had Brothers as Grand Marshal and Grand Warder. The wife of the Worthy Grand Patron was Grand Electa. Kentucky is the home of "Rob Morris' Home" in Lagrange, Kentucky. Also, Kentucky has Deputy Grand Matrons and Deputy Grand Patrons.

LOUISIANA; The 88th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Louisiana was held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on March 23-25, 1987. Their session as preceded by an ESTARL Service and Memorial Service on Sunday, March 22 with over 500 Eastern Star members and friends in attendance. Louisiana held its Farewell Session on Wednesday evening, March 25, and recessed for only a short time to prepare for Installation, both of which are open to families and friends of all involved. They sponsored a "Star Fashion Museum" with 21 booths featuring Eastern Star mementoes.

MAINE: The Grand Chapter of Maine held its 95th Annual "Fruit of the Spirit" Session in Bangor Auditorium in Bangor, Maine on May 18-20, 1987. Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Wanda L. Foster and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Alfred L. Grimes presided over the deliberations. The Grand Chapter of Maine participates in Exchange Nights with its Sister Jurisdictions. The Grand Family

of New Brunswick, Canada, comes into Presque Isle, Maine, and exemplifies the Ritual work for the Maine Grand Officers and members, and on a subsequent evening the Maine Grand Officers reciprocate for the New Brunswick Grand Family and members in Riverview, New Brunswick, Canada. In November, 1987 a new venture was held. The jurisdictions of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts held Northern New England Night, in the Masonic Temple in Boston. This was the first time that an Eastern Star meeting had been held in this temple. It was deemed by all four Grand Bodies to be a great success.

MANITOBA: "The Garden of Love" Session was held May 25-27, 1987. Manitoba did not lose any of its 43 Chapters during this year. Manitoba is in the process of writing a pamphlet in cooperation with the Grand Lodge to explain who is eligible for membership and what Eastern Star is. The Eastern Star and the Grand Lodge in this jurisdiction work well together. The Masons presented the Eastern Star with \$70,000. toward the proposed addition of a personal care unit to the Eastern Star Chalet.

MARYLAND: The 89th Annual Session of Maryland, designated as "The Treasure-Seekers Session", was held in Hagerstown, Maryland, on April 26-29, 1987. This "Heavenly Treasure Session" emphasized that "No treasure is more precious than the Hand of God and the Love and Respect of a Friend". The Grand Session was honored by a visit from the Most Worthy Grand Matron of General Grand Chapter, and many of her officers. Many dignitaries were invited to participate by acting as Chaplain at many of the sessions, and also providing special music. Installation of the new Grand Officers was held immediately following "Farewell" at the afternoon session on April 29.

MASSACHUSEITS: The "Search for Tranquility" Session was held May 14-16, 1987. The Worthy Grand Matron appointed a committee to prepare a long range membership drive. The committee consisting of three Past Grand and five lay members made two recommendations: that good works be advertised and that an illustrated color brochure be produced telling who the Eastern Star is, what it does, and what it has to offer.

MICHGAN: The "Windmill of Friendship" Session of the Grand Chapter of Michigan was held October 14-16, 1986, in Kalamazoo, Michigan. This is the oldest jurisdiction in the world, being organized in 1867, making this their 120th Session. The night preceding Informal Opening was spent at the "Apple Blossom Banquet" with approximately 900 in attendance. Mistress of Ceremonies for this event was Geraldine G. Roe, Michigan's Grand Secretary. Greetings and welcome were extended to all by the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Jean W. Bateman and Worthy Grand Patron Brother Glenn A. Martin. The grand proceedings indicated a wonderful fun time was had by all.

MINNESOTA: Minnesota urges each Chapter to have a Community Project. This will let non-members become aware of the good deeds of our Order. Grand Chapter requires an examination (proficiency) be given to all candidates for Associate Grand Conductress.

MISSISSIPPI: The "Truth and Faith" Session was held April 13-15, 1987. The Worthy Grand Matron held 31 Schools of Instruction with one being held in each District. At these the Worthy Grand Matron personally gave instruction on balloting and the signs and passes. There was also a school of instruction for the District Deputy Grand Matrons. Mississippi also has a program in which members may take an exam and those who pass receive a Proficiency Certificate at Grand Chapter. This session, 22 such certificates were presented. The Grand Chapter provides a car for the use of the Worthy Grand Matron during her year in the East. This Worthy Grand Matron put 37,000 miles on her car.

MISSOURI: The "Cup of Love" Session of the Grand Chapter of Missouri was held in the Civic Arena of St. Joseph, Missouri, on October 12-14, 1987. The

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Opal C. Shultz, and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Leon Leirer presided over a Grand Session attended by 2,175 members. Their "OWN" Sister Lois J. Newman, Right Worthy Associate Grand Matron of General Grand Chapter was accompanied by the Most Worthy Grand Patron, the Right Worthy Associate Grand Patron, and many other dignitaries. The special projects for their year were:

MONTANA: The "Carousel of Love" Session was held June 17-20, 1987. Montana Grand Chapter is actively working to stem the tide of lost membership. The Grand Chapter has a press committee whose job is to arrange press releases prior to the Official Visits. They also have a transportation committee to arrange buses to increase attendance at Exchange Nights, Grand Visitations, and Chapter Anniversaries. They also have a Grand Librarian who makes program information available to the Chapters. Montana also administers a Voluntary Pre-Paid Life Membership Plan. Funds are invested by the Grand Chapter which then returns to the Chapter the dues plus one dollar for each member enrolled.

NEBRASKA: Nebraska Masons and Star jointly sponsor a Children's Home, and are opening the Senior Girls' Home, which has been closed for 17 years. In Nebraska, the Grand Sentinel moves to Grand Marshal and then to Associate Grand Patron. The Grand Warder moves to Associate Grand Conductress.

NEVADA: The "View Beyond the Horizon" Session was held October 5-7, 1987. Nevada Grand Chapter supports OES Home Fund, ESTARL, Cancer Research, Heart, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Wonderful World of Youth, Shrine Transportation Fund, Salvation Army, St. Judes Ranch, and Benevolent Fund.

NEW BRUNSWICK: New Brunswick, Canada, has an Assistant Grand Secretary, Assistant Grand Marshal, and an Assistant Grand Organist. Chapter secretaries send Chapter notices to the first five Grand Officers. They have 36 Chapters with a membership of 3,872. At their Grand Session, a "Bell" rings from time to time, and a gift is presented to the member with the winning ticket.

NEW HAMPSHIRE: New Hampshire's special project was ESTARL, and they raised \$3,320.15. This was done by 48 Chapters with a membership of 7,682.

NEW JERSEY: New Jersey's annual session was held May 19-21, 1987. New Jersey has an Eastern Star Charity Foundation which keeps books separately from the Grand Chapter funds and handles the charitable funds. The Grand Secretary lists in the Proceedings all of the Chapters which have surrendered Charters since 1870. The last time a Charter was surrendered was in 1982.

NEW MEXICO: In New Mexico, the Grand Sentinel is elected and then moves to Associate Grand Patron. They have 52 Chapters, with a membership of 8,228.

NORTH DAKOTA: The "Garden of Friendship" Session was held June 3-5, 1987. Nevada Grand Chapter supports ESTARL, Peace Garden Overlook, Heart Fund, Cancer Fund, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Rainbow Girls, DeMolay, Youth Scholarships, International Temple Fund and Peace Chapel.

NOVA SCOTIA AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND: The "Sounds of Music, Sounds of Love" Session was held July 7-9, 1987. This year the Grand Master of Nova Scotia served as Worthy Patron with the Worthy Grand Matron. He

invited her to speak at Grand Lodge. This was a first and the hope was expressed that it was the beginning of a tradition. Because of fewer people, jobs are distributed differently in this jurisdiction. Six Deputy Grand Matrons were appointed and the Associate Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Matron each serves in this capacity in her own Districts. The Grand Line Officers also handle Fraternal Correspondence. The Worthy Matrons serve as pages and the Worthy Patrons as guards during Grand Chapter.

OKLAHOMA: The "Silver Bells of Love" Session of the Grand Chapter of Oklahoma held its 79th Annual Session in the Scottish Rite Cathedral in Guthrie, Oklahoma on October 19-22, 1987. Worthy Grand Matron Sister Veda Belle Nowlin and Worthy Grand Patron Brother Louis E. Duggan, and their corps of officers, carried their theme "Remember the Past, Serve the Present, and Look Forward with Plans for the Future" throughout their Grand Jurisdiction and into the Grand Chapter Session. The Mayor of Guthrie, James W. Weems, in his remarks at the Informal Opening, told of growing up in the Masonic Children's Home. It seems that the Worthy Grand Matron's home Chapter, Kansas Chapter, was his sponsor, and helped him have happy memories of this birthday, Christmas, and other holidays. He seemed truly appreciative of their efforts on his behalf. The Grand Session was preceded by an ESTARL Award Ceremony on Sunday, October 18, and they made awards totaling \$12,325.

ONTARIO: The "Stairway to Happiness" Session was held September 21-24, 1986. Ontario supports International Temple, Cancer, Heart Fund, Multiple Sclerosis, Blood Analyzer for Collingwood Hospital, Diabetes, ESTARL, Florence Nightingale Home Foundation and Grand Chapter Benevolent Committee.

OREGON: Oregon's Fraternal Correspondence report gives highlights of each jurisdiction as the Grand Representatives and their counterparts present the State Flag which they represent. Everyone participated in collecting stuffed animals for the Shrine Hospital during the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron District Meetings.

PENNSYLVANIA: The "Gleaner Session" was held June 29-30, July 1, 1987. Pennsylvania runs two Eastern Star Homes, an East home and a West home. Each has a capacity of 60 residents and both homes were full. The Fraternal Committee helps in any case where a Sister or Brother needs it — utility bills, monthly assistance for those who lose jobs, have marital problems or have suffered injuries and cannot work. The most unusual case involved a bee hive located in the home of a child allergic to bee stings. The roof of the home had to be removed to find the queen bee and eradicate the hive. The Fund helped with the expense.

QUEBEC: The 65th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Quebec was held October 7-9, 1987 in St. Laurence, Quebec. Worthy Grand Matron Sister Louise Wilkinson and Worthy Grand Patron Brother Edward Neal welcomed all to the "Joy of Nature" Session. Many distinguished guests were received, and a greeting to all was extended by the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Quebec, Brother Durward B. Geffken. In addition to supporting Cancer Research, ESTARL, and Youth Groups, the special projects were the Research Department of the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children, and Alzheimer's Disease. During the Session under "new business", Quebec Grand Chapter conferred Honorary Membership upon our Sidney Miller, Past Matron of Emera Chapter #561 and Past Grand Representative of Quebec in California.

SASKATCIEWAN: The Grand Chapter of Saskatchewan held its 71st "Canopy of Stars" Session at the Heritage Inn in Moose Jaw Saskatchewan on April 27-29, 1987. The Worthy Grand Matron Sister Ida Lawrence and Worthy Grand Patron Brother Charles Hutchinson presided over the proceedings with Faith, Love, and Laughter (these being the watchwords for the year). The Worthy

Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron had the privilege of constituting a new Chapter, Maryfield #143, on July 4, 1986. The Worthy Grand Matron also had the privilege of participating in the ceremony of initiation of Brother Orvil E. Mything, Grand Master of Masons in Saskatchewan, into the Order of Eastern Star on August 26, 1986, at Azure Chapter #42.

SCOTLAND: The 82nd Half-Year meeting of the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland was held in the City Hall, Perth, on Saturday, October 11, 1986. Their Annual Meeting was held on Saturday, April 11, 1987, in the same City Hall, Edward Street, Perth. All business is conducted in a one-day session. The day is concluded with a dinner dance. The October meeting is strictly business, and is attended by only the voting delegates.

SOUTH DAKOTA: The "Light" Session was held October 6-8, 1987. Projects supported by South Dakota include Eastern Star Home, Heart Fund, Cancer Fund, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Wonderful World of Youth, International Temple, ESTARL, and Educational Fund.

TENNESSEE: "Memphis Dawn in Dixie" Session was held April 27-29, 1987. The Grand Chapter of Tennessee gave \$67,018.05 to the many charities they supported during the year. In Tennessee, both the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer offices are filled by Past Grands. This year, the Grand Treasurer was Ray Osborne, Right Worthy Grand Sentinel. There is also a Committee on Ritualistic Work consisting of two Past Grand Matrons and one Past Grand Patron. They supervise the work of the Grand Instructors who are Past Matrons and Past Patrons.

TEXAS: "Fruits of Our Labor" Session was held October 22-24, 1987. Despite a membership loss of 2,251, Texas created four new Chapters. One was constituted and three were instituted. Texas has a poet laureate who composes poems for their newspaper and for special occasions when asked.

UTAH: "In the Spirit of the Star" Session was held October 7-9, 1987. Charities supported by Utah include Multiple Sclerosis, American Red Cross, Shelter Care, Diabetes Foundation, OES Home and Benevolent Fund, National Kidney Foundation, St. Benedicts Ogden, Arthritis Foundation, Shrine Caravan, Muscular Dystrophy Foundation, Ronald Mcdonald House, Jobs Daughters and DeMolay.

VERMONT: The "Trustful Faith Session" of the Grand Chapter of Vermont was held on June 3-4, 1987, at Johnson State College in Johnson, Vermont. Their Grand Jurisdiction has 76 Chapters, divided into 11 Districts, each represented by a District Deputy Grand Matron and a District Deputy Grand Patron. These along with the Grand Lecturer present the Schools of Instruction for each District. The 116th Annual Session will be held on June 3-4, 1988, in Killington, Vermont.

WASHINGTON: Washington has a membership of 33,471 in 205 Chapters. They contributed \$17,656.69 to Cancer Research Fund.

WEST VIRGINIA: The 84th Annual "Hills of Home" Session of the Grand Chapter of West Virginia was held in the Charleston Civic Center of Charleston, West Virginia on October 1-3, 1987, with Sister Betty Lee Porter, Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Denver Roberts, Worthy Grand Patron, presiding. The Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress of the General Grand Chapter, Sister Maxine Justice, Past Grand Matron, was in attendance at this session. A report was made of the "Triennial Plate" project. The proceeds are to be used for their own Sister Maxine Justice when she serves as Most Worthy Grand Matron. A total of 26 Chapters were 100% for paying into this fund. Also their Grand Secretary Sister Genevieve Bee, G.G.C.C.M., is a candidate for Right Worthy Grand Secretary.

WISCONSIN: In Wisconsin, Eastern Star Emblems now appear with emblems of other fraternal organizations on signs at the edges of towns.

WYOMING: "Symphony of Stars" Session was held August 13-15, 1987. The Worthy Grand Matron's special project was membership. At her 46 Official Visits, she honored the youngest active member in each Chapter and they were escorted and presented at Grand Chapter. They also divided the state into six districts with the chairman and the Grand Starpoint officers each taking a District.
