





# **SERMON**

"Receiving God's Gifts" (Scripture: John 13:1-20) (By Christine Albany)

Good Morning! It is a privilege and honor for me to be standing before you today. As an Eastern Star scholar, I am delighted to be able to say "thank you" in person. Thank you to all of you for your continued financial support for my studies at San Francisco Theological Seminary. I feel like you are all participants in my journey toward ordination as a minister of the Word and Sacrament, partners with me as I study to become a Hospital Chaplain. I need your support on this journey and gratefully accept your gifts.

These are not easy words for me to say, "I need your support", "I need help", does not trip easily off my tongue. I am not skilled at asking or receiving. Three years ago I was a successful career women with my own business. Today I am a graduate student following what I believe to be God's call to ministry. This has been a radical lifestyle change, one I have willingly made, but radical none the less. I have had to ask for help to build a new life and God's tender support has been there.

I have received gifts and support beyond my wildest imaginings. Friends and family have offered furniture for my

seminary apartment. My church family bought me a computer and offered me a part time job. Foundations have given me scholarships. Everything that I have needed to make the transition from working woman to seminary student has been offered to me. God's gifts, coming in all shapes and sizes through the generosity of others. I feel certain that these are God's gifts to support me in ministry and yet I continue to be a reluctant recipient.

I would rather be the one giving the gifts. It is more comfortable for me to help others than be on the receiving end of the scheme. Does anyone else feel like that? Are any of you more comfortable tending to the needs of others? Sheepish about asking for help for yourself? Is it difficult for any of you to ask God for help? How about receiving gifts? Do any of you say when someone gives you a gift, "Oh, you shouldn't have done it." or "Give it to her, she needs it more than I do." When you are sick is it difficult for you to let other people take care of you? To let others see your needs, your suffering?

Why is it sometimes uncomfortable for us to receive? For us to accept and acknowledge the many gifts God sends us and rejoice and joyfully receive every one. This has been my struggle over the last year and I would like to share some of my thoughts with you this morning.

God asks us to serve others. Many of us have been taught since childhood that it is indeed more blessed to give than to receive. God wants us to give selflessly. We have learned to put others needs before our own.

As a young mother I can remember doctoring everyone else when a cold would hit our family, thinking to myself that Mothers do not get sick. Can't get sick. We need to care for the family. But of course Mothers and Fathers do get sick and when that would happen, how difficult it was to lie abed and let someone else do for me. Roles were reversed in these situations and I did not have much practice being a patient. Tis better...tis easier, to give than receive.

In my work as a Hospital Chaplain, I talk with many folks in nursing homes who are now being cared for by their children. They feel useless. Helpless. They are unaccustomed to being taken care of; distressed that they can no longer contribute. God asks us to serve. We are not experienced receivers.

We have been taught that thinking about our own needs and desires is selfish. Never take the last piece of pie! Ask if anyone wants it first. Eat those brussel sprouts; there are plenty of people who would be grateful for these brussel sprouts to eat! I have said these things to my own children and they were said to me. Yes, it is true that it is rude to grab the last piece of pie, but how delightful when no one wants it. Thank you God! And brussel sprouts, as a child I had real trouble recognizing brussel sprouts as a gift! Some of us may not have much training in graciously receiving or even recognizing God's gifts.

Another reason it might be difficult for us to receive help could be the feelings of vulnerability we might experience. If we admit we can not manage on our own, will people think less of us? Will they see our inadequacies, flaws, our inability to cope with life. We like to be in control. Show our best faces...even to God! Being vulnerable is risky business...letting others into our lives. Fear and anxiety producing...is receiving help worth the risk of losing control?

Can we admit that our own needs are important? Do we feel worthy? So many people have serious needs, surely I do not deserve this wonderful gift that you have just given me. We want love, appreciation, assistance and yet we often "turn the teacup upside down after someone has filled it." We do not think we deserve God's gifts to us. For me this is the most problematic aspect of joyously receiving the many blessings God freely gives. I know that I am emphatically not worthy...not good enough, clean enough, deserving enough, and yet I am offered abundance at every corner. Assistance, support, love beyond my feeble understanding.

What is it that God wants for us? Is it possible that recognizing and accepting God's messengers and the gifts they bring is an significant part of God's plan for us? Part of the

wonderful circle of love we are privileged to experience? Is learning to receive part of learning to give?

Imagine with me for moment if you can, that you are present in the Upper Room as John describes the scene in our scripture reading this morning. The Passover meal is in progress.

Celebrating the Passover meant remembering God's love for God's people. It was a communal expression of hope and thanksgiving. It was an important meal.

Jesus and the disciples are seated around the table. During the meal Jesus leaves the table, removes his clothing and puts a towel around his waist. He pours water into a basin and kneels down before his friends and takes their tired dusty feet tenderly into his hands and washes them. What a shock! This is unprecedented behavior! In those days, foot washing was common before a meal, but it was a gesture of hospitality performed by servants...not by guests...not by the Lord, the teacher!

What would you do if Jesus approached you, to wash your feet? Think about it.

All those feelings of unworthiness and vulnerability come to my mind. My rough dirty feet will be exposed, my callouses. Jesus will see my weakness. I do not deserve this! I am the one who should be washing Jesus' feet!

And Peter, does protest. "Lord, do you wash my feet?" he says. And Jesus says, "What I am doing you do not know now, afterward you will understand."

We know as did the early readers of John's text what will happen later on. Jesus is preparing to give us God's ultimate gift on the cross. But Peter and the rest of the disciples appear to have no sense of the significance of the moment. "You will never wash my feet" Peter says. Even when Jesus further explains, If I do not wash you, you have no part in me. Peter misunderstands. He regards Jesus' act as mere hospitality. He

misses the point. He does not recognize the true value and importance of receiving Jesus' gift.

Unlike Peter, we know what happens to Jesus after this Passover meal, but like Peter are we unwilling to accept the implications of receiving this gift?

After Jesus had washed everyone's feet he put his clothes back on and said to the disciples, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet.

I think that it is easy for us to gloss over the significance of receiving in this story. We hurry on to Jesus charge to "serve others". It is more familiar to us; more a part of our expectations. But like Peter we may be missing the point.

Only after Jesus had lovingly served and ministered to each one of his disciples did he challenge and command them to reach out and lovingly minister to each other.

Jesus was not just being a model of service to others. I believe that he was asking each of them to receive God's greatest gift, God's gift of unconditional love. To accept God's gift of grace and forgiveness. To be healed. To fill their cup with wholeness and healing, so that only then as healed persons, they would be free to give lovingly to others.

If this is true, than receiving is a Holy act. It is an integral part of God's plan for us. It unites us to each other and to the Divine mystery of God's unconditional love for us. Every encounter we have holds this opportunity to give and receive love.

I am reminded of the first time my youngest son created his very own Christmas gift for me at kindergarten. He was so proud as he offered me his lump of brightly painted clay. I did not have a clue exactly what it was supposed to be...an ashtray? a vase? but it did not matter. The love and enthusiasm on his face was the real gift. My gracious and loving acceptance of his offering was an important ingredient in that precious moment.

In some cultures giving and receiving gifts is a routine part of daily relationships. The Japanese constantly give one another beautifully wrapped packages of small mementos for every occasion. To refuse these gifts would be a breach of cultural etiquette. It would indicate that we do not accept the giver.

God is the ultimate giver. The source of all our gifts. Only God is the endless source of regenerating love! God wants us to celebrate and joyfully receive! God wants us to delight in and gratefully accept love made manifest in offers of help. The presence of friends and family in times of need. Even in lumps of clay that might be ashtrays.

Can you acknowledge God's kindness and accept what God is giving? Are you trying to be the source and resource for everybody else? Are you trying to "wash the feet" of others when your own basin is empty?

In John 13 Jesus says "Truly, truly I say to you, he who receives any one whom I send receives me; and he who receives me receives him who sent me." When our own cup is full we can sincerely share our source of nourishment with others.

Let us pray: Gracious Creator God, enable us to become skilled receivers. Help us to recognize and gratefully accept Your presence in our daily lives. Teach us to purposefully give and receive in our relationships with others. Open our hearts to acknowledge You as the true source of all our gifts, that we might receive and share the love of Your most precious gift to the world, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### PRESENTATION OF THE FLAG

144th Fighter Wing Fresno, California Air National Guard

Narrator: Chief Master Sergeant Gene Miller

The history of California is as rich, as diverse, as exciting as what California is today, the State referred to always in the superlative -- the biggest, the richest, the greatest.

A military presence began that history in terms of eventual settlement and statehood, and the California National Guard retains a military presence to this day, but with a difference.

The Guard is comprised of citizen soldiers, ready to become soldiers and airmen should circumstances require them to do so, but living as citizens among you in the rich tradition of the militia. To them, your neighbors, as well as to the history of this state and of the United States, our ceremony is dedicated.

California! A land so fair, as one account of it said, that it could not be of this world. But there were incredible hardships endured to get here and to stay here by those who came to explore and stayed to partake of the riches in the land and of the land.

Early explorers came to seek haven in harbors or harvest on the prairies. Others came with friars' robes to introduce equal parts of agriculture and Christianity, and one of the greatest migrations and immigrations in the history of the world occurred in response to the cry "There's gold at Sutters' mill!" And when they came, they brought their culture, their language, their knowledge, their belief. Each had a unique contribution. They brought with them their national origin, their distinctive garb and memories of their heritage, symbolically. Much of what they brought was represented by their flags.

Seven flags flew over California prior to the first Bear Flag:

Flags of the Spanish Empire flew over California from 1542 to 1785. Juan Cabrillo entered San Diego Harbor in 1542 and claimed the land for Spain, rising the Spanish state ensign. This flag was white, with the diagonal saltire of Carlos the Fifth. (Presenting flag)

The flag of England was the second flag. It appeared in 1579. Planted by Sir Francis Drake at Drake's Bay, it flew over California for only 37 days. The flag was white, bearing the red cross of Saint George. (Presenting flag)

The Spanish national ensign was the third flag. Replacing two previous Spanish flags was the newly-created Spanish national flag. This flag was raised over the Monterey Presidio in 1785, where it continued to fly until the end of Spanish rule in 1822. The flag is predominantly yellow, with bands of red across the top and bottom. The center of the flag bears the arms of Castile and Leon, enclosed by the collar of the Order of the Golden Fleece, topped by the crown of Spain. (Presenting flag)

The fourth flag was the flag of the Russian-American Company, which flew during the period 1812 to 1841. Russian trading posts were established along the northern coast of California, principally at Fort Ross. They remained until the Swiss explorer, Captain John Sutter, bought out their properties in 1841.

Eight years later, Sutter and his son laid out streets and squares for a new city along the bank of a river to the west of Sutter's fort. Like the river, the city was called "Sacramento." But in 1841, when Sutter attempted to expand his holdings northward, he purchased the outposts of the Russian-American Company, whose flag was white, displaying two bars of equal width, one blue

and one red, covering the lower half of the flag. The white portion bears a double eagle. (Presenting flag)

The Buenos Aires flag was the fifth to appear. It flew briefly in 1818, raised over the Presidio of Monterey by Hypolite Bouchard, who, like Francis Drake, was either a naval captain or a pirate, depending upon whose account of his activities you choose to believe. Bouchard raided and captured Monterey, but sailed again in only 16 days. The flag had three bars of equal width, the outer two of blue, and the middle one of white, with a yellow sun to the left of the center. (Presenting flag)

The sixth flag was the flag of the Republic of Mexico. Having secured her independence from Spain in 1822, "Los Estados Unidos Mexicanos" -- the Mexican Republic -- was formed a year later. The Mexican banner was raised over California from 1823 to 1846, and flown until it was replaced by the American flag.

The Mexican flag has three broad vertical stripes, one each of green, white and red, with an eagle perched on a cactus, serpent-in-claw, in the center of the white stripe.

The Fremont flag was the seventh flag, raised over California in 1846. There are 26 stars, representing the 26 states then in the Union. The eagle carried a pipe of peace, instead of the usual 13 arrows, to assure all who saw it that Fremont's mission was one of peaceful exploration.

In 1775, the Continental Congress established the United States Army, the senior service. Since that time, this foundation of our nation's defense has been engaged in 17 separate wars, which have encompassed 167 campaigns.

The flag represents all elements of the Army -- active, National Guard and Army Reserve -- and reflects the honors and traditions which each of those components has contributed over more than two centuries.

The California Army National Guard is a strong member of the Army team, with its 40th Mechanized Infantry Division, 49th Military Police Brigade, 175th Medical Brigade, and the 115th Support Group, collectively, totaling 162 units located in 113 communities throughout California.

Representing those organizations, their 17,000 members, and the Army of which they stand ready to become a vital part, here is the flag of the United State Army. (Presenting Flag)

Although tracing its history to the daring balloonists of the Civil War, the youngest member of our Armed Forces actually enjoyed a rather modest inauguration in 1907. Its evolution to the present day saw the United States become and remain the world leader in air power.

A significant part of the overall capability of the Air Force is found in the California Air National Guard with a Tactical Airlift Wing, Air Defense Wing, Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Group, Tactical Air Support Group, and a Combat Communications Group.

The flag represents the vision, the courage and the dedication of those who have contributed their dreams and their lives to achieve the most awesome and effective Air Force the world has ever known. The dominant feature is an American bald eagle, with outstretched wings.

The eagle has a dual symbolism. Since this nation's founding, the bald eagle has been a national emblem, and its wings are reminders of the wings long associated with the Air Force. Behind the eagle, a patch of clouds speaks to the bird's environment, the skies the Air Force flies. The thirteen stars encircling the eagle and the shield are the traditional salute to the original thirteen colonies which won our independence and nationhood.

Here to represent the Air Force and the 5,000 men and women of the California Air National Guard is the flag of the United States Air Force! (Presenting flag)

Although not officially adopted as the state flag until 1911, the Bear Flag was first raised over California on June 14, 1846. The maker of that first flag, William Todd, described it as follows: "A piece of new, unbleached cotton domestic, with a four-inch stripe of red flannel attached to its lower side. A star was placed in the upper left-hand corner, and a grizzly bear is at the center, beneath the bear, the word 'California."

Todd is said to have placed the star on the flag to represent the young California Republic, with the grizzly to represent strength and courage.

In 1850, guns boomed, bells rang, and people danced in the streets toasting their status as citizens of the 31st state, and a great many of those toasts, we're told, were raised in honor of the flag of the California Republic. And now, the familiar Bear Flag! (Presenting flag)

Just as the culture and customs of every people in the world have poured into the legendary American melting pot, so has our flag found its present form from many and varied beginnings.

The original colonists, fighting war and wilderness, hoisted such famous banners as the pine tree, the coiled rattlesnake and the anchor of hope. These flags were emblazoned with slogans ranging from the pine tree's "An Appeal to Heaven" to the rattlesnake's "Don't Tread on Me."

Congress established the thirteen stars and stripes on June 14, 1777, declaring that the stars were to represent "a new constellation." After adding both a star and a stripe for Kentucky and Vermont, the Congress reverted to thirteen stripes as representing the original colonies, with provision to add a star for each newly-admitted state thereafter. It was George Washington, who said "We take the stars from the heavens; the red from our Mother Country, separating it by white stripes to show our separation from her; and the white stripe shall go down to posterity representing liberty." (Presenting flag)

I would be remiss if I did not remember to say something to the pledge group from this area that are here today. Those little young ladies back there in their little white pinafores are the special girls for training to go into our Order. They are so sweet. All gave me hugs this afternoon.

As a part of the entertainment today, each of these young people have some kind of talent, whether it be in their school work or in the ritualistic work or out on the football field or the soccer field, softball, or maybe it's an instrument that they play, or they have beautiful voices. They are special to us and although we cannot have everyone here do something, we have chosen two pieces of entertainment for you this afternoon and the first one is a young lady from the Job's Daughters. Her name is Kelly Carpenter. She is a Past Honored Queen of Merced, No. 65, and she is going to sing "Tomorrow." (Kelly Carpenter then sang "Tomorrow.")

We are Family. Today is the Masonic Honor Session and we, the Masonic Youth of California, would like to pay tribute to a few of the organizations who make up our Family.

Before these Orders existed, there was the Supreme Being, symbol of infinite knowledge, infinite power, and infinite presence. Then there is that great light, the Holy Bible. It should be the center of our life, and it will be the center of our tribute today.

Each part of our Masonic Family plays an important part in our tribute. We will represent each organization today by placing symbolic colors on the Altar.

First, blue and white, to represent the Masons.

It is fitting that they should be the first to be represented, for they are the beginning. The foundation of Masonry, truth and honesty, are bound to the practice of four cardinal virtues: self control in word and act; fortitude in a noble purpose wise judgment and justice to the humble and greatest alike.

The Masonic Lodge has been established in its present form since 1717. Since Brotherly love, relief and truth, backed by a reliance on faith, hope and charity are fundamental tenets of Freemasonry, the exercise of benevolence to promote human welfare is basic to its existence. None of the other organizations could have begun without them. We each receive our heritage from these gentlemen. You are our Dads.

Let us next add the five colors representing the Eastern Star.

The blue, yellow, white, green and red represent the daughters, widows, wives, sisters and mothers of Master Masons. These colors are the rays of the star. A star gives guiding light. The Eastern Star gives a guiding hand to each of us as it helps us maintain our goals. Fidelity, constancy, loyalty, faith and love are your teachings. You contribute much time and energy in loving kindness for the good of all mankind. You are our Mothers.

We now add an evergreen for the other Masonic Family members: the Scottish Rite, the York Rite, the Shrine, the Amaranth, the Daughters of the Nile, White Shrine, Ladies Oriental Shrine, and others.

These Orders are made up of Master Masons, their wives, mothers, sisters, daughters, and widows, each emulating the fundamental principles of Masonry. You ladies and gentlemen represent our Aunts and Uncles.

Let us now add the colors of purple and white to represent the Job's Daughters.

Mrs. Ethel Mick established the Order in 1920 to band together young girls with Masonic relationship, for character building through moral and spiritual development, by teaching a greater reverence for God and the Holy Scriptures, loyalty to the flag and the country for which it stands, and respect for parents and guardians. The ritual is based on the Book of Job.

The character of Job emphasizes innocence, piety, modesty, straightforwardness, honesty, and pity for the widows and orphans. The lessons of fairness and virtue are qualities which highly adorn the Daughters of Job.

We now place seven more colors on the Altar: red for love, orange for religion, yellow for nature, green for immortality, blue for fidelity, indigo for patriotism, and violet for service. These colors represent the Sisters of the Rainbow.

In 1922, Past Grand Master and Past Grand Patron, the Reverend Mark Sexson conceived the Order for girls not having Masonic relationship. The goal is to teach young women service to others and humanity. Seven lessons taught to the girls at their initiation are represented by the colors of the rainbow. There are also teachings of faith, hope and charity, to guide our sisters to a better way of life.

To complete our Masonic Family, we need a Son.

We now add the colors of DeMolay, blue, red and gold.

Although it has been more than 660 years since Jacques DeMolay died as a martyr to truth and fidelity, the ideas for which he gave his life are being perpetuated by young men the world over as members of the Order of DeMolay. The Order builds character and provides a good environment for a wholesome occupation of spare time.

These young men also play an important part in our Family. They are the future Masons on whom the strength of our Masonic Family will depend in the years to come.

And now, as you behold the Altar, you will notice that a circle has been formed around the Holy Bible.

A circle is defined as an unbroken line. It is also made up of arcs. When one arc is separated from the circle, the remaining part is no longer a circle, for it has a gap in it. It was once said of a nation, "United we stand; divided we fall." So may we compare this nation to our circle and our circle to our Masonic Family. A circle means many things -- friendship, love, unity, infinity. Whatever word you choose to represent your circle, it must have a center, and this center is God.

If you will all join hands, our Chaplain will lead us in prayer.

Prayer: Our Heavenly Father, we ask Thy blessing upon our Masonic Family assembled here this afternoon. We know that Thou are ever present and tenderly protective of Thy children. May each of us reflect on all that Thou art. Empower us with high ideals. May we be patient in tribulation, faithful to whatever trust may be ours, and finally may we receive the reward which

Thou, in Thy wisdom, may be stow upon us. We ask this in Thy Holy name. Amen.

As the youth representatives collect the ribbons, we hope you have learned a little about our Masonic Family. We would like you to know that the Youth Organizations of California appreciate you and thank you all for your guidance and support, for we are all Family.

#### REMARKS

# REMARKS

I want to tell you that the scholarships from Eastern Star have helped tremendously in easing some of the burden of escalating fees. When I started at CSU, the fees per semester were about \$275. Now they are \$850 per semester, and that does not include books. I understand now that fees are going up again next year even more for graduate students.

The Masonic organizations, such as Eastern Star, help students deal with the rising cost of our education. I feel very fortunate to have been involved with Masonry all my life. My grandparents, mother and cousins all have been involved in the Eastern Star, Job's, and DeMolay, and have shown me the opportunity these wonderful organizations can give me and other students. Again, thank you very much.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIP

(By Jean Multhaup (203), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Delegates to this Grand Chapter, Sisters and Brothers:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to you the members of this hard-working committee: Sisters Dee Dee Victorine, Maryon Gledhill and Lynne Nevins, all Past Matrons and Brother Ken Metzger, Past Patron.

The highlights of this year's activities were as follows: 393 applications were read. Approximately 4000 applications were distributed by the Grand Chapter office, I received 677. 256 incomplete and 28 were received after the April 1st deadline.

We were advised by the Grand Chapter office, that \$29,896 was available for General Education Scholarships. \$41,954 less than last year. \$777.00 was available for the ESTARL Scholarship. \$1,423 less than last year. \$4,000 available for the Gerald P. Cashion Memorial Fund to be given to a student pursuing a degree in Business Administration at a four-year college or university. \$1,000 for the Paula Remington Scholarship for music majors.

Thanks to the generosity of the members of California, our committee was pleased to award from the General Education money totaling \$29,750 distributed as follows:

- 52 4 year awards at \$500 = \$26,000
- 7 2 year awards at \$250 = \$1,750
- 4 ESTARL awards at \$500 = \$2,000

A total of 66 awards were distributed as follows: In addition to the 63 awards from the General Education monies, 1 ESTARL Scholarship for \$777, 1 memorial award and 1 special award, as previously stated. 10% of the awards were given for non-financial need. Of the total awards presented, 2 are Eastern Star members, 7 Rainbow Girls, 6 Job's Daughters, with no applications received from DeMolay members. 8 stated that they have some Masonic affiliation. Also, to date, we have received 24 notes of appreciation, all so grateful for our assistance. We found it so terribly discouraging in processing these applications that so many of the applicants had parents that had been DeMolay, Job's Daughters or Rainbow Girls and yet they themselves were not members of our Youth Groups, nor had the parents become members of our Order. A list of the recipients can be found in the Cal Star News.

What a rewarding experience these past five years has been for me in serving on this committee. My sincerest appreciation to Sister Yvonne Beckenhauer, Past Grand Matron for her appointment and confidence in my abilities and the outstanding groups of committee members. To the members of the 1993 committee, thank you for your long, tedious hours of service spent in reviewing and evaluating the applications. I know you fell in love with all of them and you, as I, felt badly that we could not give to all! To the Grand Chapter office staff, also my sincerest thanks for all of your assistance to the Scholarship Committee.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Jean. We know how dear this committee is to you. I felt that it was important for our Youth Groups to be aware of our Scholarship Fund. We wish it were possible to grant scholarships to all who apply. On behalf of all the recipients who received awards this year, we thank you and your committee for a job well done.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NECROLOGY AND DIVINE SERVICES

The total collected at our Divine Service this morning was \$2,256. We sold seeds in the amount of \$842.02. We have divided that amount among the three Youth Groups, with DeMolay's share being divided between the Northern and Southern Jurisdiction. A check for \$1,032.67 goes to each of the Youth Orders.

David Delano, Master Councilor, South: I want to first thank the Worthy Grand Matron. Also, it is the 75th anniversary of the

DeMolay, and we ask you to please accept this pin, which says "75 years 1919 to 1994, DeMolay Diamond Jubilee," and please accept that and wear it with pride.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, David. I will wear this pin with pride, representing the DeMolay boys. Thank you so much.

Gene Stiles, Worthy Grand Patron: When a brand new and young Master Mason begins to practice his new craft of Freemasonry, that he has worked so hard to learn, and now wants to put into practice, he is taught information about the Grand Master and other Grand Officers in Grand Lodge.

The most important thing he is taught is how dedicated these leaders are and what quality of leadership they bring to the Craft. Quality of leadership is a keystone of our Grand Master.

Sisters, Brothers and Friends, I have the great honor of presenting the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Warren Blomseth, Grand Master of Masons in California. May we have your remarks at this time.

# REMARKS

(By Warren J. Blomseth,
Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in California)

I thank you very much for that warm welcome. Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Guests and Visitors, Leaders and Members of the Masonic Youth Groups, Sisters and Brothers of the Eastern Star, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I thank you for the kind and thoughtful invitation to be with you this afternoon and for the warmth of your reception. You made my wife, Dee, and me very welcome and we feel very much at home in your midst.

This will be my fifth address since I was elected Grand Master just four days ago and it now appears I shall have no problem at all in delivering at least 100 of such addresses during the course of the year and before next October. I have every intention of

making each address unique and varied, so as to preserve my marriage, on the one hand, and my personal sanity on the other.

Today's message is titled "Youth Floats in Greatness," greatness having a very special meaning within the family of Freemasonry. I understand your theme this year is "Youth, the Seeds of Our Order," and that this Session is titled "Masonic Family Honor Session," and subtitled, if you will, "Youth Honored."

With the theme and session title, I knew that my message had to center upon our Masonic youth; and I do so with great personal pride.

Incidentally, you may know that my theme for the Grand Lodge this year is "The Challenge of Change, the Reward of Renewal."

I am a product of our Masonic Youth Groups. I believe that my brief files that I presented make it very clear that that began my journey within our Family of Freemasonry.

One of the surprises for me personally when I joined DeMolay was how many mentors, old and young, that I found within Fruitvale Chapter and how easy it was to look up to them and to do my very best to emulate those mentors.

We worked hard in those days to have good ritual, great events and dances, successful fund raisers, and particularly we worked hard to have a winning basketball league team. Then we worked hard to attract new members to our Chapter.

While all of this was going on -- and we thought that was all that was going on -- we were, in fact, also building character. The ritual and the very fabric of the International Order of DeMolay was teaching us a renewed strength and belief in many critical areas.

Certainly one of the things that came to me in such a strong manner was love of parents, the comradeship, courtesy, clean living, and patriotism, and championship for our free public school system, and reinforcement of our personal belief in a Supreme Being, in God Almighty. I know that is exactly what today's members are also learning.

In 1994, as indicated, we will be celebrating the 75th anniversary of the founding of the Order of DeMolay; and as Grand Master, I'm pleased to confirm that DeMolay will be a feature in the Masonic Tournament of Roses Parade on January 1, 1994, which float is sponsored by the Grand Lodge.

The full theme is "Builders of Democracy," which is appropriate for Masonry, and for DeMolay, and for all of us who belong to the Family of Freemasonry. DeMolay's International Master Councilor will be riding in the float along with the celebrity senior DeMolay. Though I understand he is fully qualified, President Clinton is not available to share the float with us. Reasons have it that he has other things to do in connection with running our country, but he has been very warm to our DeMolay, and we greatly appreciate that, and we honor him as a senior DeMolay.

There will be hundreds of DeMolay, Rainbow and Job's Daughters who will decorate the float, and we thank all of them for their great service to the float program.

Last year some 800 of our youth showed up, registered, reported and went to work in the decorating shed and worked for hours upon hours prior to the parade. They were supervised by the Advisors of our Youth Groups, who were working supervisors, and they all did a fantastic job.

Believe me, we are doing everything in our power to make this year's float a financial success as well. As you know, the float program is entirely supported by voluntary contributions.

Why is the financial success of this year's parade so important to me? Because I want the Grand Lodge of California, on behalf of the Freemasons of California and the Family of Freemasons, to continue sponsorship of the Tournament of Roses Parade on an annual basis for, at the very least, the next several years, so that we may also honor the 75th anniversary of the International Order of Job's Daughters and the International Order of Rainbow for Girls. What a great way to honor our three Youth Groups!

I do not think there is a better international showcase for the Family of Freemasonry and for our Youth Groups than the Tournament of Roses Parade, and I ask you to join me in funding the float and in enjoying the fun of being a float sponsor.

A final word on our float program, which I would direct to our youth and our leaders: I want you to know that there would be no float program without your considerable help. As I mentioned earlier, you are the decorators of the float, the ones who make the float so beautiful. You give it the life of seeds and of flowers, and thousands of hours are cheerfully donated to your Family of Freemasonry.

The decoration work is magnificently done, and what a great gift that is to our Family. I thank you on behalf of the Family of Freemasonry.

As President of the California Masonic Foundation last year, I was pleased to secure Board approval to raise the annual leadership grant to all three of our youth organizations by 25%, and I hope that we can do even more in the years to come. You, our Youth Groups, truly deserve Freemasonry's support; and I pledge to work long and hard for that purpose.

Dee and I are pleased to personally support the Foundation in its work of providing financial support in scholarship awards as our major charity for 1994.

Now, I would like to conclude this message with a few brief words directed specifically to the Sisters and Brothers and leadership of the Eastern Star. However, our youth organizations will not be excluded, for they, too, I believe, should be part and parcel of these comments.

The title of "Masonic Family Honor Session" caused me to turn my thoughts and attention to the recognition that Freemasonry owes to the Eastern Star Chapters and their members within the State of California. Your charitable works, the role you play in the area of service to others, warrants special note. Service to others is a constant theme within the Order of the Eastern Star, as it is within our three youth organizations. My favorite definition of where service belongs in our life may surprise you. "Greatness is not found in possessions, power, position or prestige. It is discovered in goodness, humility, service and character."

Is that not a good, solid statement which clarifies what service is by associating it with three other very important human qualities -- goodness, humility, character?

I believe we can all agree that these three qualities are always -- not sometimes, but always -- a part of the personality of people who truly serve others. If you and I have the right family values, supported by church, schools and communities, as we grew up, we tend to take goodness and humility as a given, as the right thing to do. We would naturally build these qualities into our lives. Most people do just that.

Now our respective organizations, the Eastern Star, Job's Daughters, Rainbow, DeMolay, and Freemasonry, are dedicated to teaching, reinforcing, fostering, promoting and rewarding those who add character to goodness and humility. We each belong to one or more Masonic organizations which have special membership awards and qualify candidates by measuring character as well as their willingness to be of service to others and past service, which, together with a high level of character development, are essential qualities for those to be elevated to positions of leadership and of responsibility.

Let's concentrate on character for just a moment. How important is character to you, to me, to all of us in this afternoon's Session, to our communities, our state and our country? James Madison had the answer well over 200 years ago, when he wrote:

"If there is not virtue among us, if there is not good within us, then there is no form of government that can render us secure. Moral and ethic education and common values are character and, indeed, are critical for the very survival, let alone the success of a free democratic society." In 1966, I prepared the Grand Oration, and as I did so, I felt I had to give special attention to the word "free" in Freemasonry, for we must never forget that, without our freedom and our liberty, there would be no Freemasonry, no Eastern Star, no Job's Daughters, no Rainbow, no DeMolay.

The freedom and liberty we now have is based on an understanding that every citizen agrees to and commits to certain well-defined moral and ethical underpinnings or framework -- respect for the law and the rights of individuals, voluntary participation in public life and concern with the common good. Most importantly, the freedom of liberty rests on a foundation of duty and responsibility. As Brother Will Rogers said, "It's a great country, but you can't live in it for nothing."

Our respective organizations support each other, regardless of our age, as we carry out our duties and responsibilities as citizens in a free country.

May each of us return to our home Chapters, Bethels, Assemblies and Lodges, willing to be of even greater service in the years ahead of us. May we do so with the certain knowledge that greatness is not found in possessions, power, position or prestige. It is discovered in goodness, humility, service and character.

I thank you for your hospitality, fellowship and friendship. May God continue to bless your works and guide your service to others. May each of us, one and all, prosper even as we build your great Orders and face the challenge of change in the sure knowledge that each of us will enjoy the rewards of renewal. I thank you.

Gene Stiles, Worthy Grand Patron: We have now heard from our symbolic father of this Fraternal Family. We now know and understand why this Brother Mason and gentleman is held in such high esteem in our Masonic circles. He is truly a leader of quality, and he is dedicated to the advancement of Freemasonry and the entire Masonic Family.

I do thank you so much for the fine message and, Most Worshipful Sir, it is my pleasure and honor to present to you this gift on behalf of the Worthy Grand Matron and myself. (Presenting gift)

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, we appreciate you taking the time to be with us this afternoon. Your words have given us much food for thought. You are just beginning your year as Grand Master, and we wish for you good health and safe travels.

## PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND NATIONAL ANTHEM

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Good morning, Sisters and Brothers. I am so pleased to see so many present for the Formal Opening of our "Wishing Well of Happiness" Session.

A big bouquet of roses to the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, who participated in this morning's ceremony. It was beautifully done.

California Singing Stars, we thank you for your music this morning and look forward to hearing you sing throughout this week.

Now I would like to give you a little information before proceeding with the business of this morning's session. There are a number of things I wish to bring to your attention for the benefit of the members. We fully realize there are times when we must leave the session. We respectfully request that, except in an emergency, no one leave the room during the time when a report is being given.

When you received your credentials, you received a program listing the week's activities. Please read it carefully.

After the close of each Session, please remain seated until the Retiring March of the Grand Officers and the Grand Pages is completed. We will appreciate this courtesy.

We will assume the reverent attitude during all Altar work, inasmuch as the reverent attitude is not secret.

The "Southern Blue Bells," also known as the Grand Inner Guards, will be seated in each section and will ask to see your credential when you enter each the section. This will eliminate the need for them to walk up and down the steps when proving the Chapter. Please wear your credentials so they may be seen by the Grand Guards when entering the Convention Center and Auditorium.

If you need to send a note to the East, there will be Grand Pages-at-Large seated on the stage and near the Associate Grand Conductress' station in the Northeast to assist you. Only emergency announcements will be made by the Worthy Grand Patron. Other messages will be left at the information booth.

I am sure that you have noticed the Wishing Well in the West, just behind our Associate Grand Matron and Associate Grand Patron. We hope that you are going to make many wishes this week. Each day I will announce which one of our charities will receive the money from the Wishing Well that day. Each day will be different. Today the money dropped in the Wishing Well will go to the Scholarship Fund.

Chapters or Associations wishing to make contributions to any of our projects, should put the contribution into an envelope and give it to the Grand Secretary's Page. Please note the amount and the name of the project.

At this time it is my pleasure to present Sister Clare Center, Past Matron of Crystal Chapter, who will be serving as the Parliamentarian during this Session.

Sister Clare will be pleased to meet with you informally, if you have any question regarding parliamentary procedure of our Grand Chapter Session.

Now, Sister Claire, will you please present the Standing Rules for this Session.

Clare Center, Past Matron (57), Parliamentarian: Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron. Before presenting the Standing Rules for adoption, a word of explanation for the benefit of the members of the Assembly.

On the reports that are presented to Grand Chapter, if no action is necessary and the report is for information only, it is not necessary to move to receive the report and have it printed in the proceedings. The act of giving a report is the same as receiving it and all reports are automatically printed in the proceedings. Therefore, such motions are superfluous.

## PRESENTATION OF STANDING RULES FOR SESSION

(By Parliamentarian Clare Center (57), Past Matron)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

- 1. Addressing Grand Chapter: Every member addressing Grand Chapter shall go to the nearest microphone. When recognized by the presiding officer, the member shall announce her or his name, number, and location of her or his Chapter. If speaking to a question properly on the floor, the speaker shall state whether she or he is for or against the question.
- 2. Limitation on debate: Each speaker shall be limited to two minutes in debate.

Each member shall speak no more than once on the same subject without permission from the presiding officer, or of the Grand Chapter; except members of committees may speak more than once in relation to the report of the committee.

A proponent of the proposed amendment or the maker of a motion will be allowed to speak first in support of the proposed amendment or the motion and shall also be allowed to speak last. Debate will be limited to three speakers for each side of the question; except that a proponent of the proposed amendment or the maker of the motion who has spoken first shall also be allowed to speak last, notwithstanding that there have been two other speakers in favor of the amendment or motion, provided that there have been speakers in opposition to the proposed amendment or motion.

- 3. Voting sign: The voting sign of the Grand Chapter shall be by raising the ballots in the form of colored cards provided to each voting delegate at the time of registration.
- 4. Moving the previous question: The previous question may be moved to close debate and require a vote on the question immediately pending and others pending, if stated in the motion. It is undebatable and requires a two-thirds vote; provided, however, that a motion for the previous question shall not be in

order unless at least three members of Grand Chapter have been heard on each side of the question should they desire to speak on the subject.

- 5. Requesting a ballot vote: A ballot vote may be ordered upon any question, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or at the request of five members, provided such request by made by such five members at the time the question is under discussion and before the result of the vote has been declared by the presiding officer. The request for a ballot vote may be withdrawn with the consent of the Grand Chapter up to the time the vote is taken.
- 6. Vote required: A majority vote shall determine all questions, except proposed amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws shall require a two-thirds vote for adoption; and except as may otherwise be specifically provided.
- Requests for Order and Information: When a voting 7. delegate believes the Rules of Grand Chapter are being violated, he may make a Point of Order by addressing Grand Chapter in the usual manner and, after being recognized by the Worthy Grand Matron, say "Worthy Grand Matron, I rise to a Point of Order." Point of Order need not be seconded and is undebatable. Any voting delegate desiring further information or explanation of an amendment or a motion may obtain the floor in the usual manner and, after being recognized by the Worthy Grand Matron, may state his or her request. A request or inquiry requires no second and is not debatable. A voting delegate desiring to obtain information on a matter of parliamentary law or the Rules of Grand Chapter bearing directly on the business on the floor, may address Grand Chapter in the usual manner and say, "Worthy Grand Matron, I rise for a parliamentary inquiry." parliamentary inquiry requires no second, is undebatable and is answered by the presiding officer.
- 8. Amending a proposed amendment: Any amendment to a proposed amendment which shall change five or more words of the proposed amendment shall be submitted in triplicate before the member proceeds to the microphone. The member desiring to amend the proposed amendment, shall obtain the forms from

the desk of the Grand Secretary. The member shall present one copy of the completed form to the Worthy Grand Matron, one copy to the Grand Secretary, and retain the third copy.

9. Elections: When three or more candidates are standing for one office and if, after the second ballot, no one has a majority of the votes cast, the name of the candidate receiving the least number of votes will not be considered for the third ballot.

On each ballot thereafter, the name of the candidate receiving the least number of votes will not be considered for the succeeding ballot until one candidate has received a majority of the votes cast and is declared elected.

10. "Robert's Rules of Order": The most recently revised edition of "Robert's Rules of Order" shall be the authority in all cases not covered by these Standing Rules.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Matron, I move the adoption of these Standing Rules. (The motion was seconded.)

Chapter. Worthy Grand Matron, may we have your report at this time.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Worthy Grand Patron. But, first, our Brother Al Westergren, the husband of our Grand Ruth, could not be with us Saturday evening when our escorts were presented, but he is with us this morning for a short time.

Brother Al, it is wonderful to see you and I am glad you are here. I thanked the other escorts on Saturday for always being with us this year, "hurry up and wait," and carry our umbrellas, and all the good things they did for us, and we thank you for doing these things also.

**PROJECTS:** I selected the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund as one of my projects this year because so many of our members are stricken each year with this insidious disease. The response from the membership to this fund has been outstanding.

This year I asked that in lieu of the traditional carrying piece for the Worthy Grand Matron at the Official Visits to the Districts, the Worthy Matrons make a donation to a special project. It was my desire that the money donated to this special project go toward the furnishing of the Chapel in the new Eastern Star Home to be built in Clovis. A total of \$7,536.16 was donated to this fund. My loving thanks to the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons for so whole heartedly supporting this special project.

EARN YOUR WINGS PROGRAM: This year the members were urged to "Come Fly With Me in '93". The idea being to urge members to visit other Chapters and other Masonic Affiliated Organizations. A point system was devised whereby when you had earned "93" points you were presented with your "Wings". The program proved so popular (actually, members wanted wings) that we ran out of pins. To those members who earned their wings and did not receive a pin, please accept my apology.

CONSOLIDATIONS: There have been many consolidations this year. Sister Debra Maiman, Chairman of Consolidations and her committee have worked tirelessly with the Chapters seeking information on the proper procedure for consolidation. These Chapters are to be commended for their efforts to strengthen their Chapters.

**IRREGULARITIES AND CONCERNS:** Soon after my Installation as Worthy Grand Matron I realized that when I was presented with a gavel, someone should have given me a magic wand as well. I received numerous phone calls and letters beseeching me to "do something" about various problems in their Chapter. Many of their questions could have been answered if they had consulted the Instruction Book or the Constitution and Laws themselves. Some areas continue to report the indiscriminate use of the black cube. Our Instruction Book clearly states the only two valid reasons for rejection of a petitioner: (a) not of good moral character and (b) a known troublemaker. When reports have come to me of Masonic Officers' petitions being rejected I can't help but wonder: if they are good enough to be Masons why are they not good enough for us?

One of my concerns this year has been the number of reports of members copying the Ritual. In some instances enlarging it on 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper to make it easier to read. In my April

letter to the Chapters I asked that if offices refused or could not learn their Ritual work, that they read it from the Ritual and not copy it. However, at no time have I ever advocated not learning your Ritual work.

EASTERN STAR HOME BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The Delegates will hear a complete report and recommendations from the Eastern Star Home Board on Wednesday morning. It has been my honor to serve as an ex-officio member of this Board this year. Many major decisions have been made by the Board and many more will have to be made in the near future. I believe we stand at a crossroad concerning our Home. My prayers will be with the Board as they confront the decisions that have to be made. The dedicated members who serve on our Home Board are to be complimented on their untiring efforts on behalf of our Eastern Star Home.

MISCONDUCT: Just one week after my Installation as Worthy Grand Matron, I knew the "honeymoon" was already over.

Mt. Fern Chapter: On November 8, 1992 I received a call from the Worthy Matron-elect of Mt. Fern Chapter No. 62 informing me that she would not take any instructions from the Deputy Grand Matron of District 8 and that none of Mt. Fern members would be attending my Official Visit to that District because none of Mt. Fern members would ever again set foot in Crystal Chapter. Thinking she was just upset I waited a few days and called her to discuss her remarks. After being informed that she was very serious, I suggested she read Part Il Section 62-6 of the Constitution and Laws. She became hysterical and gave the phone to her husband, the Worthy Patron-elect of Mt. Fern Chapter. He proceeded to make several unsubstantiated charges against members of the Grand Chapter Office and told me I may as well file charges against him because he would be talking against the Order of the Eastern Star that it is not what it used to be.

On Thursday evening, November 12, 1992, the Deputy Grand Matron of District 8 did attempt to visit Mt. Fern Chapter for their Farewell and Installation.

The Worthy Patron-elect stepped in front of her, barring the door, and told her she was not welcome. She informed him he could stop her from attending the Farewell part of the evening but the Installation was an open meeting. While waiting in the dining room, a member of Mt. Fern Chapter invited her to the meeting, but again the doorway was blocked by the Worthy Patron-elect. The Deputy Grand Matron was allowed, later, to attend the Installation portion of the meeting.

On November 15, 1992 I was informed that the Installation of the Mt. Fern Chapter officers was not done according to the Ritual. Upon investigation I learned that indeed it was illegal. The Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron had been installed at the same time using words that had been written by the Worthy Matron-Elect. The Secretary and Treasurer had been installed at the same time using words written by the Worthy Matron-Elect. All other officers were installed at the same time using words written by the Worthy Matron-Elect.

On December 1, 1992, I mailed a summons to all members of Mt. Fern Chapter No. 62 advising them of a special meeting to be held at the Georgetown Masonic Temple on December 10, 1992 at 8 PM Brother Loyal Stark, PGP, Sisters Nancy Thomas and Robin Merman-Dorin, Chairman and member of the Jurisprudence Committee, Sister Denny Rae Grist, Grand Marshal, Brother Glenn Jones, PP Rising Star Chapter No. 593 and my husband Ed Meixner, PP accompanied me to this special meeting.

At 8:00 P.M., I called the meeting to order, the Chaplain gave the opening prayer, the Conductress opened the Bible and Brother Loyal Stark, PGP had all in attendance repeat the Obligation of the Order.

I then read the reasons for calling the special meeting, declared their Installation of Officers null and void, informed them they would have to hold a legal Installation and, until that time, the 1992 Officers would be considered the legal officers of the Chapter. I then placed the Chapter on probation with Brother Glenn Jones, Past Patron of Rising Star Chapter No. 593, Sacramento to act as over-seer of all Chapter meetings of any

kind as long as the Probation was in effect. The Chaplain gave the closing prayer and I declared the meeting adjourned. I later learned that my suspicion had been confirmed, that the Worthy Patron had, by his own admission, recorded the entire meeting.

Brother Glenn Jones has continued to report to me regularly all year and at no time have I found reason to lift the Probation of Mt. Fern Chapter No. 62. Therefore, I strongly recommend to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron that she continue the probation of Mt. Fern Chapter No. 62 until such time as she feels they are complying with the Rules and Regulations of the Order.

Robert B. Svendsen: On or about February 12, the Grand Treasurer, Sister Sheri Weisser, called me with information that Goodall Bus Company in San Diego had not been paid for transportation services for our Grand Chapter Session in San Diego.

After extensive investigation she learned that Pat Hannum, Chairman of Housing for the San Diego Session, had on February 10 issued a check with "Pay to" blank in the amount of \$13,000.00 for partial payment to Goodall for shuttle bus service. She gave the check to Robert Svendsen, Chairman of the Grand Chapter Session in San Diego, to make the payment on the shuttle bus bill.

On March 1, the Chairman of Transportation for the 1992 Session called the Grand Treasurer and informed her the bill had not been paid.

After numerous phone calls by the Grand Treasurer to Bob Svendsen and promises that the bill had been paid, or that the check was in the mail to the Grand Chapter Office, it became evident we were getting the run-around and there was doubt any money would be forthcoming.

At the Finance Committee meeting on March 13, I requested that Brother Delroy Aldershof and Sister Shirley Crist, members of the Committee, make a trip to San Diego. Brother Delroy to pick up the check for \$13,000.00 from Bob Svendson and Sister Shirley to pick up the Housing records from Pat Hannum.

Brother Delroy called Bob Svendsen to arrange a convenient time for him to come to San Diego and again Bob Svendsen said, "he had put the check in the mail to the Grand Chapter Office that very day." When the check never arrived at the Grand Chapter Office, Brother Delroy made several more calls; each time being assured the check was in the mail.

On May 7, pursuant to Sec. 256 of the Constitution and Laws, a Demand Letter was sent to Brother Bob Svendsen informing him that failure to deliver a check for \$13,000.00 to Brother Thomas Sagar, Past Grand Patron, would result in disciplinary action being taken pursuant to our Constitution and Laws.

On June 7, the Grand Treasurer called the Bonding Company to inform them that Grand Chapter would be filing a claim for \$13,000.00. Unfortunately, Bob Svendsen was only bonded for \$10,000.00. The Bonding Company informed the Grand Treasurer of the need to file criminal charges against Bob Svendsen. Charges were filed with the San Diego Police Department and on September 16, 1993, Bob Svendsen was convicted of one count of Grand Theft. He made restitution for the \$13,000.00 on that date through his attorney.

Eastern Star charges against Bob Svendsen for Conduct Unbecoming a Member have been filed against Brother Bob Svendsen and a trial is set for November 6, 1993.

Hacienda Chapter No. 614: On or about May 3, 1993, I was notified that Hacienda Chapter was in the process of dissolving their Chapter. The first communication stating the desires of the Chapter was handed to the Past Matrons and Past Patrons who attended the stated meeting on March 10, 1993. At their March 24 stated meeting another letter was handed to the 23 members present, this time listing the possible courses of action the Chapter could take. Copies of these letters are on file in the Grand Chapter Office.

On April 14, the members present voted to:

1. Give "Life Sponsorships to the Eastern Star Home" to members who did not currently possess them.

- 2. Hold a catered dinner for all members of the Chapter.
- 3. Distribute most of the remaining funds of the Chapter in the sum of \$23,136.00 back to the members at the rate of \$11.00 per share; a share equals each year of membership in the Chapter. I asked the Associate Grand Matron, Sister Barbara Pierce, to represent me at Hacienda Chapter's stated meeting on May 12 and inform them that they had illegally dispersed Chapter funds. Their conduct was improper and in violation of Sections 174 and 175 of our Constitution and Laws. The members were informed that all money given to them by the Chapter must be returned to the Chapter Treasury.

The Associate Grand Matron was accompanied by Sister Collette Gole, Member of the Jurisprudence Committee, Brother Lloyd Budwig, member of the Appeals and Grievances Committee and Brothers Gary Gole and Ron Pierce.

After the Associate Grand Matron left the Chapter room, the Chapter voted to surrender the Chapter's Charter.

On May 26, I again asked the Worthy Grand Patron and the Associate Grand Matron to visit Hacienda Chapter and inform them that I was, as of May 26, 1993 placing Hacienda Chapter No. 614 on suspension.

At my request, Brother Clinton O. Dillon, Past Grand Patron took charge of all property belonging to Hacienda Chapter. Brother Mike Sanders, Chairman of Appeals and Grievance was contacted and on June 15, 16 and 17, 1993, he conducted hearings at the Whittier Masonic Temple on the actions of Hacienda Chapter from March 1, 1993 through May 26, 1993. The Committee has since recommended to me that charges of Conduct Unbecoming a Member be filed against five members of Hacienda Chapter No. 614. These charges have been filed and trials are pending at this time.

After numerous letters and phone calls from Hacienda Chapter members asking me for another chance for their Chapter, on September 8, 1993, I set aside the Suspension of the Chapter's Charter. A new corps of officers were elected and installed by the Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Matron. Brother Clinton O. Dillon, Past Grand Patron, returned all of the chapter's property to the Chapter including all of the Chapter funds that had been returned to the Grand Chapter Office at that time. Even though the Chapter has been reinstated, the trials are still pending.

Livingston Chapter: On September 2, 1993, I was informed that Livingston Chapter No. 531 had allowed a non-member to be present at one of the stated meetings of the Chapter. Many excuses were offered as to why this was allowed to happen but none were acceptable. I recommend this be a warning to other Chapters to be more cautious in checking dues receipts, especially on party nights held on a stated meeting. A letter of reprimand was sent to the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron and a copy of the letter was sent to the Grand Chapter Office to be kept on file.

### **DECISIONS:**

- 1. Legislation considered at one session of Grand Chapter, carried over and considered at the next session of Grand Chapter, has been considered at two consecutive sessions of Grand Chapter and cannot be brought up at the next succeeding session.
- 2. Eastern Star members must remain within the guidelines of Grand Lodge in soliciting advertising for Chapter publications.
- 3. Consolidating Chapters must select as the new number one of the numbers belonging to the Consolidating Chapters.
- 4. There can be no "grandfathering" to affect payments made to Life Membership funds prior to the legislative changes made in 1992.

**RECOMMENDATIONS:** I make no recommendations for more legislation to increase our rules and regulations. The need is for all our members to obey the teachings of our Ritual and the rules and regulations already set forth in our Constitution and Laws.

GOOD OF THE ORDER: Reports received from the Deputy Grand Matrons throughout the State indicate some of our Chapters are growing in membership while others are barely holding their own. The most distressing figures on those reports are the numbers of demits requested. In some Chapters these outnumber the total of all other reasons for loss in membership of the Chapter.

This year I asked the Worthy Matrons to participate in a program I called One-on-One. Each Worthy Matron was to appoint a committee that would contact every member of their Chapter either by phone or letter just to let them know they were being thought about. In some areas this has caused an increase in attendance at Chapter meetings. Let us continue to reach out to our members. They need to realize that we need them and they need us. Together we can make a difference in our Chapters, in our communities and in our country.

APPRECIATION: To the members of Silver Spray Chapter No. 59, mere words cannot express the gratitude I feel in my heart for the love and support you have given to me these past five years. I thank you most sincerely for the three lovely receptions given in my honor. Each one holds special memories that will last a lifetime. I am especially grateful to Sister Jean Hopton who served as General Chairman for all three receptions. She is here with me this week serving as Chairman of the Grand Pages.

GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER: California was truly honored by the General Grand Chapter this Triennium. Our Sister Ferne Hammond as Worthy Grand Organist, Sister Patricia Quibell, ESTARL Committee Post Graduate Awards Program, Brother A. Leroy Covey, member of Public Relations and Sister June Lucretia Barnum, Parliamentarian of the General Grand Chapter. Our wish is that your service to the General Grand Chapter has been a rewarding experience for each of you.

PAST GRAND MATRONS AND PAST GRAND PATRONS: Within your group is an abundance of knowledge and information which can be useful tools in strengthening our Order. I have asked for and you have willingly shared this knowledge with me. We thank you for your attendance at the Official Visits and special events and many of the receptions. You have been most helpful and supportive.

To our Associate Grand Matron and Associate Grand Patron, Sister Barbara Pierce and Brother Frank Young, I know the feelings in your hearts at this time. In just three short days the mantle of authority carrying with it the joys as well as the responsibilities of directing this Grand Chapter will be placed in your hands. As the Bluebirds fly away and the graceful swan comes gliding in across the still water, we wish for you success and happiness and may you be given strength and wisdom in the fulfillment of your dreams.

Sister Diane Silva, Grand Secretary, you have been a tremendous help to me this year. You are a walking encyclopedia of information on Eastern Star. Thank you for sharing that information with me when I needed it.

Sister Sheri Weisser, Grand Treasurer, your job has not been an easy one this year, but you graciously accepted those extra duties and worked for the Good of the Order. My heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Sister Kathleen MacDonald, Grand Conductress and Sister Sherie Gustafson, Associate Grand Conductress, we wish you much happiness and success as you continue on your way up the Grand Line. Our sincere appreciation for your support this year.

Sister Denny Rae Grist, Grand Marshal and my fraternal "daughter", how very proud I have been of you this year. You have served this difficult office with dignity and pride. You have anticipated my every need and did your best to fulfill them. Please know you will always have my love and support.

To the Appointive Grand Officers, my chosen "Family". You were chosen for the special qualities you possess. I have had many members tell me this year how friendly you are - but then, I knew that! Your love and support has been all I could wish for. I can not help but believe the guiding hand of Providence led me to each one of you.

To all the Grand Escorts, thank you for always being there to help, rain or shine. Your happiness, loyalty and many courtesies this year have given me an added joy. You are truly "Grand Escorts", those who have made it possible for the Grand Officers to serve. May God's richest blessing be with you always.

**DEPUTY GRAND MATRONS:** My Ramblin' Roses - you were entrusted with the important task of giving instructions in the Ritual and floor work in our subordinate Chapters. You have performed this work well and we thank you for your many courtesies and your loyal support. May your reward be the many friendships you have formed this year.

WORTHY GRAND PATRON: Brother Gene, it has been my honor to serve with you these past two years. As in the words to the song, "It Had to be You". It has been a source of real joy to have you and your Barbara with us these past two years. Our Order today is better for your having served in this the highest office offered to a Brother. You and Barbara have become dear friends to Ed and me and we say to you:

If we could find a wishing well where all wishes come true,
We would reach down deep within it
and make this wish for you.

May all God's richest gifts of hope and love and peace
Fill your life with happiness and never, never cease.

MY HUSBAND: Brother Ed, our journey is almost over. My loving thanks to you for the thousands upon thousands of miles you have traveled with me these past five years with never a grumble. In a few short days we will go home for some much needed rest. However, we both like to travel so I am sure it won't be long until we will be off again somewhere. As our membership decreases the income to the Grand Chapter Office decreases, but the expenses increase. This is your problem.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

(By Sheri Weisser)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

As required by our Constitution and Laws, I am pleased to present my annual report at this time.

In mid-August the auditors began their audit of the books of the Eastern Star Home and Grand Chapter and its various funds. They completed their audit at the end of September and a copy of the audit report was distributed to each delegate at the time of registration.

As you read these audit reports, you noticed that the "unrestricted" funds of the Grand Chapter were placed in an Investment "Pool." The Unrestricted Endowment and the Future Home Site Fund were also placed in a "Pool." This was a change suggested by our auditors last year and implemented this year at the direction of the Finance Committee.

During the year we processed all the receipts for the various funds, paid the committee expenses, processed invoices approved by the various committee chairmen, disbursed the scholarship grants to the various schools, disbursed Benevolent grants to our needy members, paid the bills of the Grand Chapter, reimbursed the Deputy Grand Matrons for mileage and School of Instruction expenses, issued more than 1000 mileage and compensation checks which will be distributed at this Session, and recorded the investment activity of the various funds. We also processed all the receipts for the Eastern Homes and the Endowment Fund, paid

all the bills for the operation of the Home, and recorded the investment activity of the Endowment Fund and the Future Home Site Fund.

In addition to performing the accounting duties associated with this office, I attended all of the Finance Committee meetings and many of the Home Board meetings. I was also pleased to be able to attend many Installations, Official Visits, All Officer Instructionals and subordinate Chapter meetings.

On December 31, 1992, our bookkeeper, Lorraine Bode retired and we were unable to replace her until August of 1993 when we hired Dori Strother. Sister Dori is a member of Pleasanton Chapter and is currently serving as their Esther. Dori, I cannot tell you how much I appreciate your ability and eagerness to learn. You were hired at one of the most hectic times in our office and I have not been able to spend the proper time in training you on our equipment and procedures. However, you just "roll with the punches," get out the manual and figure it out! Thank you for helping to ease my load and for keeping our spirits up with your sense of humor.

In the audit report you will notice that \$80,000 was transferred from the General Fund to the Convention and Mileage Fund. Our Constitution and Laws require that the Convention and Mileage Fund maintain a balance equal to the total of the mileage paid the last three years. Prior to the transfer the fund did not meet that criteria for the following reasons.

As you can see from the audit report, the Session expenses exceeded revenue by nearly \$50,000. The General Chairman requested a budget of \$9,700 for shuttle services, with anticipated income of \$9,000. This amount was approved by the Finance Committee. However, without prior approval from the Finance Committee, additional hours and buses were ordered, resulting in shuttle expenses of \$41,000 with income of only \$18,690. The expenses for the auditorium and sound and lighting were underbudgeted, as was the cost of the rooms for the Grand Secretary's staff. Additionally, the mileage paid to San Diego was approximately \$5,000 higher than that paid to Fresno.

It distresses me to report to you that a theft of our funds In the process of occurred, which was eventually repaid. determining why the Shuttle Bus Company had not been paid, it appeared that the \$13,000 check issued by the Housing Chairman had not been delivered to the Bus Company by the General Chairman. I notified the Worthy Grand Matron and the bonding company of the possible loss. A report was filed with the San Diego Police Department, who investigated the reported loss. Charges of Felony Grand Theft were filed against the General Chairman. At the Felony Readiness Hearing on September 16, the General Chairman pled Guilty to a charge of Misdemeanor Grand Theft and was sentenced after showing proof of intended restitution. On September 17, I received a \$10,000 check from the bonding company - the maximum amount of our bond. On September 20, when I received the restitution check from the attorney representing the defendant, I returned the \$10,000 to the bonding company.

The Finance Committee has subsequently instituted stricter "Internal Control" requirements in an effort to ensure that a loss of this type does not occur again.

I would like to express my appreciation to the Treasurers of California for their many courtesies this year. I have enjoyed meeting with you when I was in your area and hope that you found our meetings informative. Thank you for your service to your Chapters.

Sister Diane Silva, our Grand Secretary, we have had another year of working and traveling together. We have had fun and thank you for your friendship.

To Mary Kay Bowser - my page and my friend - sometimes I think our brains must be connected on the same circuit - we seem to think the same thing at the same time! Thank you for all that you do, in the office and as my page; but especially thank you for being my friend.

Sister Mary, our Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Gene, our Worthy Grand Patron, I have truly enjoyed serving in your Grand Family this year. Your path has not always been smooth,

but you always met the challenge with the best interests of our members and our Order at heart. May your Wishing Wells always be filled with the treasures of the memories of this year.

An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the various funds of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star as of June 30, 1993 and 1992 and the results of their operations and changes in fund balances for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying data contained on pages 2, 3, 6, 7 and 13 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. This information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audits of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.



## GRAND CHAPTER OF CALIFORNIA ORDER OF EASTERN STAR NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

#### NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

#### Organization:

The Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star is a California nonprofit unincorporated association which promotes and practices Charity and Fraternalism.

#### Method of Accounting:

The financial statements are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting whereby revenue is recognized when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred.

#### Revenue Recognition:

Contribution and per capita revenue from chapters are recognized as income on their assessment date, June 30. Donations and memorials are recognized as revenue when received. Bequests are generally contingent on the occurrence of future events and are recorded as income when determinable.

#### Grants and Scholarships:

Grants and scholarships are recognized as a liability and expense when awarded.

#### Investment Valuation:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the over-the-counter market are valued at the bid price (see Note 2).

#### Inventory of Supplies:

The inventory is stated at cost and is valued on first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis.

#### Furniture and Equipment:

Furniture and equipment are stated at cost and are depreciated based on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture Equipment 10 years 5 years

When furniture or equipment is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the account and any gain or loss is recognized in income.

#### Services:

Services donated by a large number of people are important to the activities of the Grand Chapter of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.

## GRAND CHAPTER OF CALIFORNIA ORDER OF EASTERN STAR NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

### NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES: (Continued)

#### Income Taxes:

There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income as the Grand Chapter of California has been granted exemption from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code and has no unrelated taxable business income.

#### NOTE 2 - INVESTMENTS:

During 1989, the Scholarship Fund, Insurance Fund, Heart Fund, Future Home Site Fund of the Home, Benevolent Fund and the General Fund pooled monies and collectively purchased investments. The investments were carried on the statement of assets, liabilities and fund balance of the Benevolent Fund. The Benevolent Fund transferred annually to each respective Fund their share of investment income and realized gains from the collectively purchased investments. Unrealized gains remained a part of the fund balance of the Benevolent Fund. During 1993, the investment pool was dissolved and each Fund's share of the cumulative unrealized gain of the pool on date of dissolution was transferred to the respective Funds. The net investment earnings of the pools are allocated to the various funds, based on their share of the pool. Realized and unrealized investment gains or losses are also allocated.

The Grand Chapter of California investment policy conforms to Section 73(7), Constitution and Laws, Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star.

#### NOTE 3 - DUE TO/FROM OTHER FUNDS:

For the most part, inter-fund receivables and payables arise from the General Fund's receipt of income and payment of expenses on behalf of other funds. The inter-fund receivables and payables are temporary balances and change upon actual transfers of cash.

## GRAND CHAPTER OF CALIFORNIA ORDER OF EASTERN STAR NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

#### NOTE 4 - LEASES:

The Grand Chapter leases office space under a long-term noncancellable operating lease agreement expiring in 1996. Rent expenses for years ended June 30, 1993 and 1992 were \$40,670 and \$37,990, respectively. Future minimum payments under the remaining term of the lease are as follows:

#### NOTE 5 - INVENTORY:

The Endowment Fund receives personal property from residents entering the Eastern Star Home. The property is recorded at fair market value upon receipt. The Fund held \$9,000 in property for sale at June 30, 1993 and no property at June 30, 1992.

#### NOTE 6 - RESIDENT LIABILITY:

At times, certain residents of the Eastern Star Homes are entitled to a refund, should they elect to leave the Homes. A resident of Eastern Star Homes since December 1990 departed the Homes in July 1992. The total assets the resident assigned to Eastern Star Homes plus subsequent receipts of social security and pensions less per diem and expenses associated with the sale of the resident's home amount to \$82,304. This amount was paid to the resident during the current fiscal year.

#### NOTE 7 - RESTRICTED AND UNRESTRICTED ENDOWMENT FUNDS:

The Endowment Fund was established to provide funds for the support of Eastern Star Homes of California. Section 460 of the Grand Chapter Constitution requires transfer to the unrestricted Endowment Fund an amount by which the Homes Operating Fund exceeds \$250,000. There were no required transfers as of June 30, 1993 and 1992.

Principal and income of the unrestricted fund balance are to be used for the benefit of the Homes. The income but not the principal of the restricted fund balance is also to be used for the benefit of the Homes. During 1993 and 1992, the Grand Chapter Endowment Fund transferred bequests totaling \$303,182 and \$149,102, respectively, and unrestricted fund balance of \$462,989 and \$379,945, respectively, to the Eastern Star Homes of California to supplement operations of the Homes.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

#### NOTE 7 - RESTRICTED AND UNRESTRICTED ENDOWMENT FUNDS: (Continued)

Endowment Fund net investment income transferred to the Homes in 1993 amounted to \$494,929, as compared to \$660,609 in 1992. In addition, \$1,600,000 was transferred to the Homes in 1993 for the future home site land purchase.

#### NOTE 8 - FUND TRANSFER:

Due to the deficit sustained in the Convention and Mileage Fund for the year ended June 30, 1993, the Finance Committee authorized \$80,000 to be transferred from the General Fund to the Convention and Mileage Fund in order to maintain a fund balance at least equal to the last three years' mileage expenditures, as required by the Constitution and Laws.


#### NOTE 9 - GRAND THEFT INCIDENT:



#### EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEARS ENDED JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

#### Organization:

Eastern Star Homes of California is a nonprofit corporation organized for the purpose of operating a home for the care of aged members of the Order of Eastern Star. Residents are affiliated members in good standing who are at least 65 years of age.

#### Method of Accounting:

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

#### Investment Valuation:

Investments in securities traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the fiscal year and securities traded in the over-the-counter market are valued at the bid price (see Note 2).

#### Purchases and Sales of Securities:

Purchases and sales of securities are reflected on a trade date basis. Realized gains and losses on sales of securities are based on the first-in, first-out method (see Note 2).

#### Dividend Income:

Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.

#### Interest Income:

Interest income is recorded as earned on an accrual basis.

#### Inventory of Provisions and Medical Supplies:

The inventory is stated at cost (first-in, first-out method).

#### Property:

The land on which the buildings of the Eastern Star Home are located was received as a gift. The book value of the land was established by the Board of Trustees of the Home in 1956. The buildings and other property recorded on the books prior to July 1, 1977 are stated at values determined by the Board of Trustees of the Home. All additions of property acquired after June 30, 1977 have been recorded at cost and transferred from the Operating Fund to the Property Fund. The property is being depreciated on the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Land improvements 10 years
Building improvements 5 and 10 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment 5 and 10 years
Automobiles 5 years

# EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEARS ENDED JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES: (Continued)

## Property: (Continued)

When property is sold or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is recognized in income and any cash is transferred to the Operating Fund.

### Services:

Services donated by a large number of people are important to the activities of the Eastern Star Home of California. The financial statements do not reflect the value of these donated services.

### Income Taxes:

There is no provision for Federal or California taxes on income since the Eastern Star Homes of California is an exempt nonprofit corporation under IRS Code Section 501(c)(3) and has no unrelated taxable business income.

### Refund Policy:

Certain residents of the home are entitled to a refund of the unexpended portion of their contribution to the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star should they elect to leave the home. No liability for any refund obligation under existing life care contracts is recorded herein since such refunds would be paid by the Endowment Fund.

# **Endowment Fund Subsidy:**

The assets of the unrestricted Endowment Fund are available to subsidize the operating deficits of Eastern Star Homes. Transfers of funds from the Endowment Fund are recorded to the extent they are required to subsidize the cash operating deficit of Eastern Star Homes. At June 30, 1993 and 1992 the statement of support, revenue and expenses reflects transfers of \$465,809 and \$379,944, respectively.

### Future Home Site Fund:

This fund was created to isolate the revenue and expense associated with acquisition of the future site of the home. The Operating Fund contributed \$250,000 to initiate the fund. The future home site located in Clovis, California which was acquired on October 15, 1992 will remain in this fund until placed in service.

# Reclassifications:

Certain balances shown on the 1992 financial statements have been reclassified to conform with the 1993 presentation.

# EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEARS ENDED JUNE 30, 1993 AND 1992

### NOTE 2 - INVESTMENTS:

During 1989, the Future Home Site Fund pooled monies with other funds of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star and collectively purchased investments. The Future Home Site Fund recorded its share of investment income and realized gains from the collectively pooled investments. Unrealized gains were not recorded by the Future Home Site Fund. During 1993 this investment pool was dissolved and the Future Home Site Fund's share of cumulative unrealized gains of the pool on the date of dissolution was recorded at \$55,680.

During 1993, the Future Home Site Fund and the Unrestricted Endowment Fund pooled monies and collectively purchased investments. This investment pool is carried on the balance sheet of each fund as "share of investment pool". At June 30, 1993, the investment pool's cost and market value is as follows:

The net investment earnings including realized and unrealized investment gains or losses are allocated to each fund based on its share of contributions to the pool.

The Eastern Star Homes of California investment policy conforms to Section 73(7), Constitution and Laws, Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star.

### NOTE 3 - OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE FUTURE SERVICES:

Applicants for admission to the home are required to make a contribution (advance fee) to the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star. In exchange for this contribution, Eastern Star Homes agrees to care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The Endowment Fund recognizes contribution income in the period that the contribution is made since that fund has no obligation to provide future services.

Eastern Star Homes has recorded a liability for its obligation to provide care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The obligation is calculated by estimating the cost of providing care and the use of the facilities over the remaining lives of the residents less estimated cash revenue before any subsidy transfers from the Endowment Fund. The liability has been discounted by five percent to reflect net present values. This liability amounted to \$3,476,925 and \$3,385,696 at June 30, 1993 and 1992, respectively. The change in the obligation from year to year is shown on the statement of support, revenue and expenses.

### NOTE 4 - CAPITAL EXPENDITURES:

Capital expenditures made with funds transferred from the Operating Fund to the Property Fund were as follows:

### NOTE 5 - DEPOSITS ON SALE OF REAL PROPERTY:

Eastern Star Homes received \$405,000 as a deposit toward the sale of the Home. All deposited funds are non-refundable to the buyer unless the seller defaults or the Home is substantially damaged or destroyed and buyer elects to terminate. The deposit was recognized as revenue when the purchase agreement lapsed on December 15, 1992.

# NOTE 6 - ENDOWMENT FUND:

Eastern Star Homes of California is the income beneficiary of an Endowment Fund maintained by the Grand Chapter of California, Order of Eastern Star. Net investment income is transferred to the Homes Operating Fund.

The Endowment Fund investments were \$16,174,512 and \$17,122,123 at June 30, 1993 and 1992, respectively.

### NOTE 7 - INTERFUND TRANSFERS:

Interfund balances represent amounts of a temporary nature which have not cleared as of the balance sheet date.

### NOTE 9 - OPERATING FUND DEFICIT:

The unappropriated fund balance of the Operating Fund has a deficit balance in excess of \$3,000,000 at June 30, 1993 and 1992. This deficit was created by recording the obligation to provide services under life care contracts. As described in Note 3, the operating Fund does not receive the advance fees paid by incoming residents which go instead to the Endowment Fund. Management of Eastern Star Homes believes that any sale of the home will generate a gain sufficient to eliminate this deficit.

## NOTE 10 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTION:

Eastern Star Homes incurred \$104,000 of administrative expenses for services provided by the Grand Chapter of California Order of Eastern Star.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES OF CALIFORNIA

(By Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President)

Sisters and Brothers, it is my pleasure to introduce the members of the Home Board who are with us this morning: Sister Barbara Campbell, Past Grand Matron; and Brothers John Masson and Elston McGinty.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of this Grand Chapter: I cannot say enough about each of the members of this Board and all they have given of themselves this past year. It has been a great pleasure to work with all of these members as they have shared their talents in handling the operation of our Home. They are truly dedicated to our Order.

This year our Board Member Elston McGinty retires from our Board after having spent the last six years on the Board. I need to share with you that, in these six years, he has missed only one Board Meeting. Again, Mac, this Board would like to say "thanks" for all you have given to our Home. You have truly represented the members of this Grand Chapter well over the last six years. Thanks for all you have given the Board and to the residents of our Eastern Star Home.

Another big loss to our Board will be our Sister Barbara Campbell, Past Grand Matron, who has elected not to seek reelection for a second term. She has been so super to be with during all she has undertaken during her term on the Board. This lady is so calm in the eye of a storm, and she will be truly missed by Our Board; and each one of you needs to give a big thanks to this super lady.

Your Board of Trustees have had a full year of one decision after another, in order that we might keep the Home as a Home where you and I might want to spend our days. It has been a full time experience for each of us as we have worked through all the different operations of the Home.

This past year has been one your Board of Trustees will not forget. We have had many visitations from those Departments of the State of California which govern our actions at the Home. We came close to losing our license, changed Administrators, hired a lot of people, spent a lot of money, made a lot of changes, or the sale of our Home did not happen, just to name a few of the activities your Board has had to deal with during this past year.

It truly has been a challenging year for our Board, but I need to share with you that your Trustees and the staff of the Home really did an outstanding job of keeping every aspect of the Home intact. While passing out thanks, I need to say how important the members of the Boosters Club have been to this Board of Trustees. This outstanding group of members have given so much to the life of our residents that words can not thank them enough. I hope today they will accept our humble thank you for a super job this past year.

Our past year has been one of a lot of concern. We have had several visits from the Department of Social Services, the Department of Health, and the Senior Ombudsman Program, all looking into the operation of our Home, making sure that the care of our members was being handled in the manner specified by law. In most every case, we were within the limits of the law. However, in a few cases, we had slipped and needed a reminder that we needed to take a closer look at all facets of our Home. I need to say we did just that and made a personal visit to the Department of Social Services with our Attorney, R. Stephen Doan, just to make sure we were handling all their concerns in the manner we should be and, I may add, in the manner required by law.

Because of the changes required by the State, changes were put into effect as soon as they were requested. We changed Administrators, hired several employees, and did all that was required to maintain the status of our license.

Our Administrator, Joe Gentilcore, came to us from the Jewish Home in Reseda, where he was serving as the Administrator of that facility. He does have many years of experience in the operation of a Home such as ours. He really did an outstanding job of making sure all aspects of the requirements set down by the State of California were taken care of, and he kept us in the good graces of the various Departments of the State. Our hat is off to Joe for the excellence he displayed, as well as that of the staff for dedicated service during very difficult times.

Our membership in the Home has dwindled to 54 residents in the Home at this time. We have room for many more than that, and it is our wish that during this past year we max have had the opportunity to look at a lot more of our members seeking residency in our facility. We however, we know that our Home is not as beautiful as it once was, the building is in need of a lot of repairs, and face lift to bring it back to the facility it once was. We know that the building is getting old, and many of our facilities within the Home are also old, and not attractive as they once were. Our electrical, plumbing systems are a real concern as is the entire exterior and interior of the building. They too are getting old, and are not meeting the standards of today's requirements as set down by the governing agencies.

Last year we told you of a new home that we were looking into, and we had a design that was shared with you during our last Grand Chapter Session. We told you the Home was in escrow and should be out of escrow in December of 1992; and at that time, the Board would make a decision as to what we were going to do, start a new Home or what?

As I indicated earlier, that did not happen. The sale did default, and we are currently looking at other buyers for our facility. Our latest estimate of the worth of our property is far reduced from the estimate we were looking at in 1989, and your Board is working hard on that issue. The real estate market is just not what it was a few years ago, as many of you already know.

I remember our Past President Warren Wildman standing here last year and asking if we should stay in the Home business. Well, your Board has worked with that issue all year, and Worthy Grand Matron, with your approval, this Board would like to make a special presentation to the Grand Chapter on Wednesday morning as to the status of our Home and the direction your Board of Trustees would recommend that we go in the future of our Home.

We worked very hard to control the expenditures this past year; but with the demands placed upon the Board in the way of additional personnel and progams, we have fallen short in making the budget for the year for the year 1992-93. As a matter of fact, we estimated that we would be \$450,000-plus over-expended for this past year; and in a few moments we will be presenting a

budget which will further exceed the amount received by the Board to operate the Home in the coming year.

My Sisters and Brothers, we are concerned; and we urge you to attend the Wednesday Morning Session as we bring to you the direction your Board of Trustees is directing their efforts this next year.

This year there will be an amended resolution presented to you to vote on that will change the amount of money that will come to the Board to make its budget. In the past, we have had growth-type investments that has been great for Grand Chapter and for our Endowment Program. However, because of the fact that our investments were in growth accounts, it made the dividends coming from those investments unavailable to the Home Board to pay for the expenditures of the Home. Hopefully, the proposed amendment will correct this; and we will have some income type of investment that will come closer to paying the bills of our Home.

We are still not out of the woods as to requirements of the various State of California licensing agencies in some departments of our Home, but we are working with the State agencies on all aspects of their demands.

Your Board of Trustees is requesting a continuation of the \$3.00 Home Assessment for our Home. We are not as of this time requesting any more. If we were to ask for the required amount, it would be in the \$5 to \$6 dollar figure just to break even. But because of the request of the Finance Committee to Grand Chapter this year, we are anticipating this resolution being passed, and the required money needed to make the expenses of our Home will be more readily available to pay the expenses as they arise.

Worthy Grand Matron, we consider your Fiesta at the Home a great success. Even if it did not do as much financially as you hoped, we saw a group of people pull together, handle a situation, make a change in the middle of the stream, and it worked. The storm that hit on the first day of our Fiesta really put a damper on the planned activities, but your Grand Officers and the

members of the Grand Chapter in attendance really banded together, and we truly saw our Order working together to a common goal. Our members are to be commended.

It has been exciting for each member of our Board to serve this Grand Chapter this past year, and our deep thanks to you and your Worthy Grand Patron for all the support you have given to our Board this past year. God bless both of you.

Our Grand Line Officers have been very faithful in attending our Board Meetings, and we thank them as well for their attendance.

We could not close our report without a special thanks to Sister Diane Silva, Grand Secretary, and Sister Sheri Weisser, our Grand Treasurer. These two fine ladies have gone beyond the call of duty to serve this Board, and we are grateful.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, thank you for the opportunity to report to the Grand Chapter the report of our Home.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Brother Tom. To all the members of the Board of Trustees, it has been my privilege to serve with you this year as an ex-officio member, so I know first hand the dedication each of you feels toward our Eastern Star Home. We thank you for the loving concern for the ladies in our Home.

Brother Tom McKinney, will you now present the proposed budget?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Honored Members, my Brothers and Sisters, the following is a report of the proposed budget for our Eastern Star Homes for 1993-94:

The budget proposal submitted for your consideration was developed to meet a set of goals which include the following:

- 1. Provide the appropriate staff in numbers and qualifications to comply with the State and Federal licensure regulations. Failure to provide these has put our licenses at risk with the State Agencies.
- 2. Provide services and programs which meet the medical and psychosocial needs of our residents.
- 3. Fund non-controllable expenses. The major budget increases in these items include:
- A. Workers' Compensation increase of \$21,600 above our current \$90,000 level of expenditure.
- B. Employee health and dental insurance increased \$22,000.
- C. Payroll taxes will increase \$26,200 next year, due to the additional employees required by licensure, plus a modest 3% wage increase package for existing employees.
- 4. Contain costs everywhere without sacrificing quality or scope of service.
- 5. Restructure the budget to comply with State Uniform Chart of Accounts and to provide a more meaningful management tool.
- 6. Construct a budget on the best data base possible. To do this, we examined three areas:
- A. Our nine-month operating statement was used to project our annualized projected actual expenses for this year. These numbers were used as the basis for this year's budget.
- B. Vendor payment records were researched for unusual levels of expenses or non-budgeted items.
  - C. Staffing patterns and wages were evaluated.
- 7. Provide a basis for evaluating our current budget, our current level of expenditure, and our proposed budget.

Administration is \$766,000, a \$29,100 increase.

Operations and maintenance, \$233,200, an \$8,800 increase.

Dietary is \$253,900, a \$44,500 increase.

Housekeeping and laundry, \$116,000, a \$9,600 increase.

Laundry is \$23,700, a \$2,800 increase.

Skilled nursing is \$761,600, a \$27,800 increase.

And services to our residents are \$70,000, an increase of \$39,000, making our total proposed budget for '93-94 \$2,224,500, an increase of \$159,300.

Our facility recap is wages \$1,041,900; payroll taxes are \$101,200; education and training is \$1,800; health insurance is

\$126,000; Workers' Compensation Insurance is \$117,600; and the total workers' benefits amount to \$346,600, the total payroll being \$1,388,500.

Our operating expense is \$502,900.

Taxes and licenses are \$115,900.

Insurance, which is non-payroll, \$39,800.

Our Grand Chapter fee, administrative fee, is \$104,000; and extraordinary expenses are \$73,500.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BENEVOLENT FUND

(By Marian Schwach, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

In the Bible we are told, "Bear ye one another's Burdens" - (Galatians 6-2). The Benevolent Fund exists for the purpose of giving assistance to our members in sorrow and distress calling for help. Each request received is examined with care and granted when found to be worthy. We try to give in their hour of need. There are many ways to assist our Sisters and Brothers, not only in a monetary way, but to let them know there are those who care and share their sorrows and fears.

This year, as always, many requests for assistance have been received. We are grateful to you, the members, for making it possible to grant most of these requests. The charity of our Order is not seasonable. Every day requests are received. We try to give a word of encouragement; the evidence of loving interest, sincere sympathy. Your committee members try to carry the charitable spirit always in their hearts.

After careful investigation of the relief requested, assistance is given with understanding and kindness. A detailed report will be in the proceeding. We request a budget of \$25,000 and \$300 for committee expenses. Also, the continuance of the ten cents (10) per capita.

I only wish time would permit the reading of the many letters received from members expressing their gratitude for the assistance given in their time of need. One dear member nearing her 91st birthday expressed the appreciation which so many feel in a letter which begins, "God Bless you all".

In our investigations we find lack of family support, lack of information on where to go for assistance. At the beginning of the year, I requested the Area Chairman to send letters to the Worthy Matrons of their District suggesting they be invited to their Chapters to speak and inform the members on the purpose of the Fund and the procedure of obtaining assistance. We find most members have no knowledge of the Benevolent Fund, but are grateful to know it exists.

My heartfelt gratitude to Sister Diane, our Grand Secretary, and Sister Sheri for their ever ready and helpful assistance. There are times when another opinion is needed. When called upon, their response is immediate.

My Sister and Brothers, we grow tall only when we are thoughtful. We live only when we serve. We are compensated in a permanent way only when we do something worthwhile for somebody else. In John 13:35 it is written, "By this all men will know you are my Disciples, if you have love for one another."

Worthy Grand Matron, if I may, a personal note. It has been a privilege to serve you as the Chairman of the Benevolent Fund. In 1975, Sister Eleanor Marsh appointed me Chairman. During these 19 years I have tried to answer the call of our members in need of our assistance. Many times the task was heartbreaking, especially upon receiving letters telling of their serious illness and letters from members telling of their distress and disaster during the time of the earthquake, floods and fire. All requests for help were answered and my wonderful committee and I tried to

reassure them the Benevolent Fund would assist in any way possible.

During these 19 years, I have been given the privilege of serving you, the members. It has been a most rewarding experience. The time has passed so quickly, it seems as if it were yesterday I assumed this Chairmanship. To the Past Grand Matrons who appointed me through these 19 years, I express my heartfelt gratitude for the confidence they placed in me.

However, because of age, dimming eyesight and health, the time has come when another must take up the "TORCH" which was handed to me from capable hands and which I have tried to hold high and keep burning.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES

(By Michael Sanders, Past Patron (44/153), Chairman)

Thank you Worthy Grand Matron, in reading the report of this Committee, I would like to introduce its members who are present here today:

Brothers Fred Canant, Sisters Joyce Moss, Melvin Van Buskirk, Mary Jane Wade, Katie Nielsen, Loyal Stark, John Storlie, Sherie Gustafson and Lloyd Budwig who will be succeeding me as Chairman with the new year and whom I wish every bit of luck and humor he can possibly muster. My only advice to my successor is that approximately half way through his term, he would be very unwise to say "Sister Worthy Grand Matron, we sure have not had much to do this year." Brother Lloyd, learn from the mistakes of your predecessor.

Your Committee on Appeals & Grievances had a relatively quiet first half, which was compensated by a relatively active second half.

Many requests for our assistance were made without the actual filing of a grievance and these matters were assigned to individual members of the Committee, properly investigated and concluded in a satisfactory manner without further action being necessary.

Three separate matters were referred to this Committee by the Worthy Grand Matron, under Section 74 of our Constitution.

The first involved a situation where a member of last years Grand Chapter Week Committee having undue access to Grand Chapter Week funds, opened and closed one or more bank accounts and withdrew or wrote checks to himself in the amount of \$13,000. The words "undue access" should be emphasized here because it can be noted that this entire matter could never have occurred, had proper security safeguards been followed by the Sister in charge of the funds in question. Too many times we have seen the practice of signing blank checks as a convenience to another Sister or Brother who will eventually use the check.

This is a clear and unsafe procedure. It should not be done in any situation unless of course the signer is prepared to be held responsible for any and all funds lost by his or her irresponsible actions.

The Worthy Grand Matron referred the matter to this committee and after investigation and discussion by three or more members (Section 907), three members of the Appeals & Grievances Committee did file charges of "Conduct Unbecoming a Member" (Section 901). The proper service of charges was delayed, however the accused member has answered the charges and a Eastern Star trial will take place on November 6th, 1993. The results of which will be reported to you in next year's annual Non-Masonic behavior charges have also been filed against the offending member and his Masonic Lodge Trial will take place some time after our trial. It should also be noted that a criminal complaint was also sworn out against the member in question. He subsequently agreed to plead guilty to a lesser charge which the courts did allow, provided full restitution was He has returned all missing funds and our bonding company has been reimbursed.

The second and most exhaustive matter referred to us was what appeared to be on the surface an apparent voluntary forfeiture of a Chapter's Charter, the Chapter's unauthorized splitting up of all of its assets to its members and the Worthy Grand Matron's subsequent suspension of the Chapter's Charter.

Three days of intensive investigative hearings were held by three members of your Committee on Appeals & Grievances at the conclusion of which, we determined that:

- 1. The procedures used to dissolve the Chapter were not in accordance with our Constitution and therefore the Chapter was not legally dissolved;
- 2. The distribution of Chapter Funds was illegal and therefore all members should be required to return the funds or face charges; and

3. That three members had conspired to promote all of the illegal procedures above and that their heavy handed guidance and/or intimidation was beyond a doubt "Conduct Unbecoming Members of our Order." Charges were filed by this Committee against the three members in question and that trial will be held on October 30th, 1993, and will again be concluded and reported to you at next year's Grand Chapter.

It was only after these three exhaustive days of testimony that the sub-committee realized how intensive the emotional damage to the majority of the members had been; as a result of the aforementioned intimidation. It was this gut wrenching testimony which prompted your sub-committee to sponsor proposed legislation, which would actually list such behavior in our Constitution as a chargeable offense. Such legislation has been submitted to you in the form of Proposed Amendment No. 33. We believe that if this behavior is listed, that it will act as a deterrent to those in the future who might try similar tactics to obtain what they desire at the expense of others. We ask you to consider the plight of the ninety some members of this Chapter before you dismiss our legislation as frivolous.

Considerable correspondence from this Committee to each member of this Chapter requesting the return of funds to their Chapter prompted all but three members to respond. These three, by their lack of response have refused to pay, two members have died, six have declared their inability to pay, eight have returned partial payments with signed agreements to continue paying and eighty one-members have returned all funds in question. Those members who were financially embarrassed and are making payments have been granted anonymity and are being allowed to return the funds through the Grand Secretary's office.

Your Committee on Appeals & Grievances has preferred charges of "Conduct Unbecoming a Member" against only two of the three who refused to return the funds; because the third already has had more serious charges filed against her. The results, verdicts and determinations of these trials will also not be reported until next year.

It should be noted with pleasure that this Chapter whose suspension was subsequently lifted on the recommendation of this Committee by the Worthy Grand Matron, now thrives under new leadership.

This was a costly and painful mistake made by too many members, who were no longer coming to Chapter and allowed a few heavy handed past leaders to make the decisions for all. We might all learn from this regrettable example.

The last matter referred to us truly exemplifies or illustrates the often heard statement that "the Committee on Appeals & Grievances most often is in charge of investigating the stupidity of certain members." We were asked to investigate a Chapter (or more specifically a Worthy Matron) who had allowed a NON-MEMBER to sit in on an entire meeting (including opening and closing).

An investigation was made and it was the recommendation of this Committee that no legal action would adequately serve any purpose at this time. However, we did recommend that the Worthy Grand Matron send a sharp letter of reprimand to be read in open Chapter by her personal representative.

After considerable afterthought, the Worthy Grand Matron sent said letter directly to the presiding officers, with instructions that they should share the contents with the other officers responsible for this unbelievable disregard for attention to duties.

It should be pointed out that although not every member of this Committee was involved with Committee business this past year, each and every member was always ready to answer any call, either from the Chairman of the Committee or the Worthy Grand Matron.

To each member of the Committee, please accept my personal thank you for your support. It should also be noted that without the excellent guidance from the Jurisprudence Committee covering so much of the unclear instructions laid down in the Constitution and the unbelievable support and assistance from the Grand Secretary's office, our tasks described above could never

have been accomplished. Sister Diane, your help to me and this Committee this past year will always be remembered and appreciated

Many other Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, Past Matrons and Past Patrons as well as members, have been extremely helpful throughout the year during the course of our investigations and we express to each of them our fraternal best wishes and thanks.

The Committee is grateful to you, Worthy Grand Matron, for granting us the opportunity of serving this Grand Chapter as well as the trust you placed in us.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Brother Mike, to say that you and your committee have had a busy year would be an understatement. You have had to deal with some difficult situations and you are to be commended for the manner in which you performed your duties. My sincere thanks to each member of this committee for your services for the "Good of the Order."

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of California:

Good afternoon. It is my pleasure to introduce the members of the Aims & Objectives Committee and I want at this time to thank each one for their service on this Committee this year. It has been a pleasure to work with them for the good of our beautiful Order. Sisters Jeraldine Southward, Past Grand Matron, Nola Bragulla, Sandy Miller and Brother Verne Jewett. Our ex-officio members are Sister Paula Remington, Past Grand Matron, and Brother Vernon Gordon, Past Grand Patron.

The demands and unanswered questions of an uncertain future continue to impose themselves upon us. We are finding it increasingly difficult to know how to approach them in the light of the knowledge and expertise gained from past experience. They demand a new approach.

There is a deep concern that we may well be prevented from discerning the proper path we should take by our understandably strong and preferred attachment to the past. We may well be like a butterfly ready to leave the cocoon and fly, but unable to recognize this because of still intractable bonds of memory which hold it to the familiar and cherished form of the caterpillar.

We know that the purpose, meaning and message of the Order of the Eastern Star cannot and should not be altered. But we must be aware of the changes that are happening in the world around us. These changes are affecting the lives of our members. This is a period of great stress for individual and social consciousness and for all institutions formed by past growth and development patterns. We cannot assume that the old method of reasoning and planning will work. The governing body of our Order must change from a symbol of authority to a support structure and facilitator of human and community development. We are demanding more and more of our contributing members. Yet, we are not listening to them and fulfilling their needs.

This Committee feels the Tenacious Workshops held by Kay Cosby, Past Grand Matron, in 1990 were great learning and listening sessions. Therefore, we recommend to the incoming Worthy Grand Matron that similar workshops be held in 1994 with the Aims & Objectives Committee as the coordinator, with her approval.

In our research this Committee found that the recommendations made by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron at their Grand Chapter session are presently put in the Proceedings and then forgotten. Therefore, we recommend that the recommendations of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be printed along with the other legislation and distributed to the voting delegates for their action at the Grand Chapter session.

The future presents itself as uncharted territory. It is not possible for a few members working together to offer all of the answers or even a proper and comprehensive plan of action. It will take the planning and work of many. It will take a change of attitude on the part of all of us. We must be willing to let go of some of the happenings of the past if we are to leave the cocoon and fly into the future.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HOME ENDOWMENT FUND

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

It is my great pleasure to introduce the members of the Endowment Committee of 1992-93. Sisters Dorothy Cox, Joanna Barker, Judy Wyatt, Gertrude Boom, Marion Caldwell, Barbara Ratti, Helen Jukes, Yvonne King, Donna Edwards, Dona Mincy, Jadeen Loungarikis, Nona Mae Groom, Wanda Lloyd, Ann Smith, Betty Jean Abshier, Susan Mingus, Marie MacCallum, Joyce Bertilson, Esther Sampson, Betty Ensminger, and Shirley Perry. Brothers Don Cross, Edgar Blake, Loren Curtis, Robert Bramman and Clinton Lee.

I would like to make special mention of Brother Ralph Moore who served on the committee the entire year. The week after the members final committee reports were due, Sister Elizabeth, Ralph's wife, called me and told me how much Ralph had enjoyed serving the Grand Chapter on this committee. She then went on to tell me that Ralph had passed away the previous week but that she had completed his report and mailed it to me. This dedication, my Sisters and Brothers, is the thing that makes this Order great and will ensure its continuing success.

The members of the Endowment Committee traveled 32,144 miles and spent approximately \$4,000 of their own money in their efforts to encourage donations to this fund. Tax deductible donations, by the way.

The results were most gratifying. Reveille Chapter No. 47, Ojai Chapter No. 528, and Long Beach Bettina Chapter No. 173 each gave 600%. Estero Bay Chapter No. 587 gave 500%, Santa Monica Chapter No. 113 gave 400%.

Two hundred and eight Chapters gave one hundred per cent or one dollar for each per capita member and an additional one hundred and twelve Chapters made a donation. Out of our whole Grand Chapter only twenty eight Chapters made no donation.

The Endowment Committee members also presented nine plaques to Chapters with five years of 100% donations, eleven to Chapters with ten continuous years, three to Chapters with fifteen continuous years and four to Chapters with twenty continuous years and four to Chapters with twenty-five continuous years donations. The plaques were purchased with money donated by the Endowment Committee members and at no expense to the Grand Chapter.

None of these numbers begin to tell the story of the importance of the Endowment Fund or our Sisters who are benefitting from the dollars donated.

Our donations were down this year, we collected \$72,503 in Life Sponsor Donations and Star Plus Donations. I have no excuses only an increased desire to improve our performance next year.

I would like to give a special thank you to Brother Tom McKinney and the entire Home Board for allowing me to attend their meetings. Thus keeping me informed as to the needs and happenings at the Home. I could then in turn keep the Area Committee Members informed.

Thank you to all the dedicated Secretaries who sent in their reports to the Area People.

A very special thank you to the Grand Chapter Office for their kind and patient assistance and most especially to you, Worthy Grand Matron, for allowing me to assume this responsibility.

My sincere thanks to each of you for the hard work and dedication you have shown to our members at a time when they are in need. Many of you have expressed to me the satisfaction you have received by serving on this Committee and I, too, must say that being a part of this Committee is one of the more worthwhile services I have performed since becoming a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Again, my heartfelt thanks to each of you.

This year I asked each of the Area Chairmen to send me a list of the Chapters where they spoke regarding the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund. 14 Area Chairmen responded and I was most pleased at how many visits they had made to the Chapters in their areas. As a result of their hard work, I received 72 applications requesting aid from the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund - 70 applications were approved, 61 were for a full grant of \$15,000.00 and 9 for grants of \$7,500.00, and 1 application could not be approved as the member died before the investigation could be made, and 1 application was denied as the person was not eligible. This is a marked increase in the number of approved applications over previous years. During the last year, the fund received \$69,640.00 in bequests and contributions and \$141,942 was expended for patient care. This means we spent \$72,302 more than was contributed. I certainly want to encourage our members to give generously to this fund. I receive many letters and calls from recipients of this fund, expressing their thanks and gratitude to the members of our Order for their generosity.

On behalf of the recipients of this fund, I want to thank our Grand Treasurer, Sheri Weisser, and her staff for the efficient manner in which they pay bills and requests which I submit to them. It is a comfort to our members to have some of their financial burden lifted.

Many associations and groups throughout the state make donations to the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund, and I want to emphasize that it is only through this Grand Chapter Committee that financial assistance is given to our members who have had the misfortune of being diagnosed with cancer.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MARGUERITE RENNIE MEMORIAL FUND

(By Robert D. Rose, Past Patron (186), Chairman(

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Gene Stiles, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

It is with pleasure that I introduce the Members of the Committee: Sisters Joan Stark, Past Matron (455) and Dolores Cashion, Past Matron (21).

The goal of this Committee this year was education, not too many of our Brothers and Sisters knew any thing about the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund. We have traveled to many Chapters and explained just what the fund was all about and how to apply for its funds. For those of you who still do not know about the fund, I will quickly explain it to you. In 1987, in the will of the late Brother Ralph Rennie, an amount of over \$500,000.00 was left to Grand Chapter to be set up in a trust fund to be named the "Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund" in memory of his late wife. The principal was to be invested, but not to be withdrawn, also stipulated was that the name of the fund shall never be changed or this fund merged with any other fund. In 1988, the amount of \$1,500.00 was established to be given to any member who needed further monies to help pay medical bills due to a cancer related illness.

Due to the expert handling of the fund's money by the Finance Committee of Grand Chapter, this fund now has well over 1 Million Dollars in it. Unfortunately, no one applied for any assistance in 1993, but, with the high medical costs of today, \$1,500.00 really goes nowhere, that is why legislation has been introduced at this Grand Chapter Sessions to not only raise the amount given to a member who needs financial assistance to \$15,000.00 but, also to give to a dependent of a member \$7,500.00 and to a minor child, the full amount, this is the same amount given by the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund. A person may not apply for funds from both the J. Clifford Lee Fund and the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund at the same time.

The reason for this legislation change is simple, the very high cost of medical care today, \$1,500.00 hardly pays for a night in the cancer ward, or for a single test. Again, if a person receives \$15,000.00 from the Marguerite Rennie Fund and \$15,000.00 from the J. Clifford Lee Fund, that is \$30,000.00. Medical costs can run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, \$30,000.00 will help to pay some of these costs.

There is no solicitation of funds from anyone to support the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund, all the money comes from interest on the original principal.

Sisters and Brothers, the money is there, please, if you know of anyone who needs financial assistance, have them apply for the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund, just before the money allotted runs out, have the person apply for the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund or vice-versa, anyway it done, there is money to assist our members.

I want to thank Sister June Lucretia Barnum, Past Grand Matron, for appointing me to this Committee three years ago and I hope I have done a satisfactory job.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Brother Robert and Sisters Joan Stark and Dolores Cashion for all you have done this year to enlighten members about this fund. It is not as well known as our J. Clifford Lee Fund, but it is just as important. Thank you very much.

Sisters and Brothers, we are now in for a real treat. We have with us this morning Sister Patti-Raye Cleland, who is the Chairman of the Heart Research Fund. In case she has mentioned in her report something special that has happened to her, I won't steal her thunder at this point; but if she does not tell you during her report, I will tell you later.

When I notified the committee members, I told them that they would be given three minutes, put in bold, with no exceptions. We all know there is an exception to every rule, and this, my Sisters and Brothers, is an exception.

Sister Patti-Raye, at your convenience, whatever you need, we are at your service this morning.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HEART FOUNDATION (By Patti Raye Cleland, Past Matron, (396/305), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Sshhhhhhhh...Listen very carefully!!!!! Tha-thump!! Thathump!! Tha-thump!! Sshhhhhhh!!! Once again!! Tha-thump!! Tha-thump!! Tha-thump!! No...That's not the tap of your foot or a drum roll...That's the beat of your heart.... That all important body organ that keeps us alive and going about our daily activities. And that's also the way our special letters began at the beginning of this year to announce that February 1993 had been declared Heart Research Month as fully sponsored by our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mary Meixner. With Sister Mary's permission, special letters were addressed to each Deputy Grand Matron and placed in their hands last October at the first School of Instruction. Along with that special letter to these Deputy Grand Matrons were copies of another letter to be given to each Worthy Matron of that Deputy Grand Matron's district. There were sufficient copies to be given to every 1993 Worthy Matron of our state. The Deputies were asked to place the information in the hands of our Worthy Matrons prior to their installations with hopes, through this early distribution, our Worthy Matrons would give special attention and plan projects to give recognition to our Heart Research Program for 1993. Another letter was mailed to our Deputy Grand Matrons in March asking them to remind our Worthy Matrons and our members that time was still possible to contribute by June 30, the end of our fiscal year.

I am overjoyed to report that \$20,768.00 has been received for our 1992/1993 fiscal year. \$8,000.00 more than previous years. Thank you, Sisters and Brothers, for your dedicated efforts to benefit our Heart Research Program.

Thank you, especially to our Deputy Grand Matrons and Worthy Matrons, for taking such an interest and participation in this project. Without you our achievement would not have been so successful.

And Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for this appointment, for your dedication to this project and your interest in heart research. It has been an overwhelming experience to have to live and relive cardio vascular disease, a stroke, and heart transplantation to prove a point of the seriousness of this disease.

Special appreciation is extended to our Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer for their many tasks involved in processing our contributions. You and your staff members are appreciated far more than you are told.

Heart disease is our nation's number one killer. Cardio vascular disease claims the lives of one of every two Americans annually that is over one million deaths per year.

Heart attacks claim 420,000 lives and strokes claim 150,000 lives. Stroke is the third largest killer falling behind heart attacks and cancer.

1.5 Million Americans suffer heart attacks on an annual basis and 500,000 suffer strokes.

Physical inactivity has been upgraded to be considered a risk factor for heart disease and strokes along with high blood pressure, cigarette smoking and high blood cholesterol. Twenty to 30 percent of the United States population (that's 50 to 75 million people) are so sedentary that they have a three to four times higher risk for developing heart disease than their counterparts.

So be it for the grim facts. To spare you further morbid details and to refresh your memory, our California Eastern Star involvement in heart research is credited to our own Sister Thelma Bailey, who, at the time of serving our General Grand Chapter as Most Worthy Grand Matron, had the wisdom to recognize that this deadly disease needed attention from and for millions of people-members or not - who suffer from coronary vascular and related diseases.

After 16 years of suffering a debilitating heart condition which began with my first damaging heart attack in 1976 at age 38, including multiple episodes of angina, three more major and damaging heart attacks, triple bypass surgery, angioplasty, a stroke (leaving me comatose and unable to speak or move the right side for ten days) and undergoing a barrage of diagnostic procedures and tests, I found I had been given a possible 6 months to live. With that in mind I was evaluated for a heart transplant in April

1992. After a short stay at home I returned to the hospital on an emergency basis and remained on a life support system until a donor heart was received. A perfect match was made and on June 13, 1992 the surgery was performed.

The road to recovery has been difficult compared to other heart transplant recipients. I have not had an easy time from the beginning when the decision had to be made for this transplant. My support network was small and there was no one to help with the decision making process.

Now my days are filled by taking powerful medications with devastating and miserable side effects, an abundance of emotional distress and the financial burden is awesome. I have seemingly become another personality. I have become indecisive, fearful of what the day or night may bring, severe loneliness, excessive trembling at times, shortness of breath due to lung complications, fluid retention, muscle and joint irritation, weight gain, loss of and hair growth, nausea and other stomach related problems, diabetes, infections and rejections and the threat of cancer is always a possibility. I have to struggle to be aware of these side effects so not to become a nuisance to my family, close friends and others.

My Sisters and Brothers, science has perfected the procedure of a transplant but there are many hours, days, and most of all dollars necessary to give a transplant patient the life that they wagered for when they made the big decision.

My life prior to the transplant will never be recognized as my life today because of the effects long term cardio vascular disease and the lingering side effects of the stroke made a trade for a possible longer life and now must accept the difficulties of learning a new roll in life as that of a heart transplant recipient. My new heart was a gift of life from a 25 year old young man from the San Joaquin Valley. I take only one day, and more likely, only moments at a time so that I might make full benefit of this treasured gift from this very young man.

For the past few weeks I sometimes think there is a light to be seen at the end of the tunnel; it is only a faint glimmer. I have managed to hold onto my courage to make it back to Grand Chapter and attend this Grand Session, the Order of the Eastern Star often remains an inspiration and a source of encouragement. From a personal standpoint and through the benefits of heart research, I someday hope that, through the improvement of medications the side effects will be less severe. And the present body invasion procedure of the cardiac biopsy will be developed into a non-invasive, non-life threatening procedure. I would like to also see more direct publicity from the Order of the Eastern Star to the general public on our Order's involvement toward Heart Research.

The real moral of my personal story is really quite simple ... Without the years of dedication of Heart Research and the application of diagnostic techniques and medications, the ability to understand the mechanisms of heart disorders and the establishment of cardio vascular diagnosis and evaluation on a precisely defined scientific basis, I would not be here today to thank you for your attention and for your generous love given to our Order's Heart Research Fund.

For the past 2 years, I have had a very special, personal expression to give attention to our Heart Research fund; "Your heart is your life, keep it beating!!"

Knowing that our Worthy Grand Matron and I share something in common and that be our native American ancestry, Sister Mary, I have translated this expression from English to my native American language, that of the Choctaw Indian nation of the State of Oklahoma. A tribe in which I do honestly carry a membership roll card. This is for you..."Hachiskno iklanna yammak hachiskno aiokchanya, hilipachi ilappa milikminli!!"....."Your heart is your life, keep it beating!!"

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Patti-Raye, I was so thrilled when you called and told me that you were going to be able to be here this morning to give this report. I had despaired that possibly you would not be able to be here. I thank God that you were able to be here and give us this wonderful report.

As soon as we get home from this Grand Chapter Session, I will be calling you to make an appointment to give this \$20,000 plus dollars to the University of California, San Francisco Hospital, on behalf of the members of the Order of the Eastern Star. This is the hospital in which Sister Patti Raye received her heart transplant.

We will look forward to presenting them with this money. I understand that Sister Paula has not made her decision or has not given it as yet. If she cares to come up and join us, we would be happy to have her go with us, or to take her contribution from 1992 along with us to present to this hospital.

Thank you, once again, my friend, for having the courage to come this morning and to give us this wonderful report.

The hour of 10:00 a.m. having arrived, we will proceed with the election of the Grand Officers for 1994 and the election of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home. Are there any further nominations to be placed upon the podium?

Sisters and Brothers, there will be no recess. Ballots will be collected, and the Grand Chapter will resume its deliberations after the election.

# INSTRUCTION OF THE ELECTION COMMITTEE (By Lydia Eckert, Past Matron (556/165), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session;

The following instructions will assist you in our voting procedure. The Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter provide that every Chapter in California is equal in voting power. Each Chapter is entitled to one vote for each of its four top officers as well as a vote for each Conductress and Associate Conductress providing they are in attendance, and if such officers

have been duly installed. In addition, the Past Matrons of each Chapter have one collective vote and the Past Patrons of each Chapter have one collective vote. If a Past Matron or Past Patron who is entitled to a full vote as a line officer, Deputy Grand Matron, Grand Officer or a Past Elective Grand Officer is the only Past Matron or Past Patron attending, they would be entitled to the Past Matron's or Past Patron's vote.

Once again, all delegates must be seated in the properly designated sections to vote. The ballot containers will be passed to those delegates seated in the Grand Representatives section, Choir, Past Elective Grand Officers and the Medical Section. No ballots will be collected from any person outside of the Grand Chapter room.

Please remain in your seats during balloting. The ballot containers will be passed to you, at which time you will deposit your ballot in the container. You will not be balloting for any candidate who has been elected by unanimous ballot. If there are two or more candidates listed for the same office, then you will vote your preference by writing in their name on that part of the ballot. Your ballot has taken into consideration the possibility of more than one vote for the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home. Please be aware of that, and separate your ballot in the proper place. You can find the correct spelling of the names of the candidates for the Board of Trustees on pages 49 to 56 in your booklet.

The Constitution requires a two thirds majority to pass legislation to amend our Constitution and Laws. A simple majority is required to amend the Instruction Book.

The members of the Election Committee will now pick up their ballot containers and report to their assigned sections. After the Worthy Grand Matron has declared the ballot closed, please remain in your seats so that the business of the Grand Chapter can continue.

Service to our Grand Chapter is an honor and a challenge. Housing tests ones skills in diplomacy and patience when dealing with the many personalities of our Sisters and Brothers. We have tried to please each of you as far as possible. After our first meeting last November, I met with Loretta Maggiore of the Fresno Convention Bureau. We discussed our local hotels as to location, cleanliness, and attitude of staff. We selected fourteen hotels and motels to which she sent contracts requesting room blocks, bed sizes, and prices. We visited each facility and were shown typical rooms by the managers. We negotiated prices for their rooms except for the Centre Plaza Holiday Inn which was already under contract at set prices. We appreciate the efficient manner Loretta worked with these hotels on our behalf.

Three thousand five hundred (3500) housing forms were printed and mailed to our Grand Secretary, Diane Silva, in February, to be mailed to our Chapters and out-of-state Grand Secretaries. The completed forms soon began arriving at my house, then to Loretta at the Fresno Convention Bureau, on to the hotels, and, finally, your reservation was returned to you.

Eight hundred fifty (850) rooms were committed to our convention. We used seven hundred ninety-one (791) and housed one thousand six hundred ninety-eight (1,698) delegates through our Fresno Convention Bureau. Two hundred twenty-eight (228) rooms were booked by our members, themselves, for approximately five hundred twenty-six (526) delegates. RV facilities were booked for fifty- eight (58) delegates, and two hundred twenty-nine (229) delegates stayed in homes. Deposits of \$47,520 were received and taken to the Fresno Convention Bureau for placement at the proper hotel or motel.

I appreciate the help of my two co-chairmen, Darlene Morris and Elizabeth Flowers. We have become good friends and workmates. Housing has been a new and enlightening experience for all three of us.

We urge you, members, to use our housing service as our Grand Chapter needs our complete support.

Thank you Worthy Grand Matron, Mary Meixner, for your patience, your kindness, and your knowledge you so willingly shared with us. We are privileged to serve you and our Order.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME

(By Joseph Gentilcore, Administrator, Read by Gene Stiles, Worthy Grand Patron)

In all the years since A Tale of Two Cities was first published in 1859, it can hardly have ever seemed so real as it did when I accepted the administrative responsibilities for our Home. The opening line of the classic Charles Dickens novel tells this year's story, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times."

April of 1993 was the worst of times. The Department of Health Services inspectors, the Department of Social Services evaluators, and the Ombudsman had all descended upon our Home for several months like the plague of locusts in the Old Testament. They attacked and destroyed everything in sight.

The Administrator abruptly ended seventeen long and devoted years of service. The critical Director of Nursing position had been vacant for two years. This limited the scope and availability of medical and nursing care being provided. Our Dietary Department was in disarray, because they did not have a qualified director. The ladies in our Residential Care Section had been without an activities staff person to organize and conduct programs for several years. Rumors were rampant that the Home would close. Our residents were leaderless, insecure, afraid and powerless.

March began what I believe will be the best of times. My employment interview with President Tom McKinney and Trustee Glen Worrell disclosed their caring and concern for our residents' welfare. Their commitment to do whatever it requires was also clearly evidenced by our Worthy Grand Matron and the entire Board of Trustees at our first meeting. Their burden has been

great. We owe them a tremendous debt of gratitude for how they have worked so diligently and tirelessly during these very difficult times.

Together we embarked on a new mission. Our goal was and is to provide quality care in a home-like environment which allows the residents to live in dignity. We needed to do several things quickly in order to satisfy the licensure requirements and insure that the State would not take further actions against us. We taught the staff the new regulations; then they were empowered to take leadership and responsibility for getting their departments into compliance. Three weeks later, the state officials re-inspected our facility. They were amazed to see all the deficiencies had been corrected. The staff worked very hard and deserve a special word of thanks.

Having secured our licenses to operate for another year, we moved to address the care and quality of life issues. Numerous meetings were held with staff and with residents to reassure and comfort them. Many changes were made to return power and choices to our residents. The business office and the Administrator became available to everyone, anytime, for any reason. A Residents' Food Service Advisory Committee was formed. They have been meeting monthly to review menus, food likes and dislikes, methods of service and general operations. A well-qualified and experienced Director of Dietary Services was hired. The Registered Dietician now develops menus and programs reflecting resident input. Mealtime is a happier social time, and Robert Ponce continues to make improvements in his department.

Our skilled nursing unit, the infirmary, has been undergoing numerous changes under the leadership of our new Director of Nursing Services. Kathy Parrack instituted an inter-disciplinary team approach. Each of the professionals sit together to assess the needs of each resident on a quarterly basis or whenever there is a change in condition. The appropriate resources contribute to a written plan of care for the person being assessed. We discovered conditions which needed immediate and sometimes expensive attention. Dental and eye care had been minimal. Physical Therapy had been intermittent. We were able to get all

our ladies screened and have begun work on restoring their self-help abilities by getting work done on their vision and dental needs. One of our aides was trained by our Licensed Physical Therapist to do restorative therapy for our ladies.

Each resident now has her own personal clothing, and we do not allow "sharing." Future donors of clothing are asked to help us personalize items so each resident has choices in colors and styles. We must treat each person as an individual and not as just a part of the group who all look and behave the same.

The ladies in our Retirement Unit no longer wait patiently in the infirmary halls to see the doctor when they can catch him. Community physicians have been screened and recruited to ensure a full range of qualified medical practitioners, and hospitals are available to meet every need. The ladies can choose their own physician from those on our approved list. The residents are driven to their doctors' offices for appointments where they can spend time with their doctor in privacy and receive quality care. Most of this service is paid for by MediCare, so it improves the quality of services, restores dignity to the individual, and stretches our budget.

Agnes Garcia is our new full-time Director of Activities. Before, the ladies complained that there was nothing to do. Now they complain that there is so much going on they cannot get to everything in a day. An Activities Planning Advisory Committee was formed to provide guidance for developing our monthly calendar of events. We are currently recruiting another full-time person to provide the required social services and additional activities for our infirmary residents who now have a part-time employee.

The Trustees and the Grand Treasurer were asked to adopt a totally different approach to budgeting and cost accounting. We now use a departmentalized program budget, which had been developed for our profession. It provides better accountability and a clearer picture of how our operation is running. It will also make it much easier to prepare the state-mandated fiscal reports and audits.

Reporting on the wonderful contributions of the Booster's Club, the local Chapters who visit, and that fantastic Fiesta would take pages. Maintaining these contacts and relationships is vital to the psycho-social well being of our residents. Only God can reward these faithful members who perform their missions of love. I hope this next year we can maintain these wonderful social events and Chapter Meetings for the ladies. In addition, there is an urgent need for members to visit or write letters to our residents on a one-to-one basis. They have lost so much. They miss the personal contact of a friend who visits or writes to them personally.

We must also express sincere thanks to all the members who so generously and willingly responded to our requests for help. Local Chapter members have come in to augment staff in the business office. Individuals have donated time, money, and material for projects. And to all who responded by sending such beautiful lap robes, which should last for several years, a big thank you.

A group of far-sighted pioneers met in the mid-1920's to plan for the future. They saw the need. This Home has met that need well for over 60 years. Now a group of visionaries is being called upon to chart a new course in response to new and complex challenges. We have come through a storm, but the sun is rising in the East. Our dedicated leaders have set high goals. They are developing plans for the future. We must all work together, be creative, break the fetters of traditional thinking, move forward with bold and strong steps. Your past support and understanding is a strong foundation. Now your moral and financial support are needed more than ever. We must provide for those who gave so much during their productive years. Together, we can make great things happen. This can be the beginning of the best of times.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME OF CALIFORNIA

(By Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers: On Monday morning I presented a budget that was given to you, and I need to apologize for the fact that I presented a budget with rounded figures instead of actual dollars.

The dollars as displayed in your Legislative Booklet are correct with the exception of one area:

Last May, when we presented our budget to the Finance Committee, we left off, out of the Skilled Nursing Facility, \$21,600, that has to be spent with regard to Workmen's Compensation.

The figure that is in your Book is \$2,213,440. I mentioned this fact to the Finance Committee this morning, and they shared with me that I should go ahead and include that in my proposed budget so that the figures that you have are all correct until you get down to where it says "Skilled Nursing Facility," and then I

would ask you add in to that \$21,600, so that that figure, instead of \$740,570, would be \$762,170, making the total of \$2,235,040.

# SPECIAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME OF CALIFORNIA

(By Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, my Sisters and Brothers:

We, the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes, have come to share with you that our Home is in a serious condition. We are spending at an alarming rate, and we see no way that we are going to be able to keep the expenses from over riding our income by several hundred thousand dollars each year from this point on.

The passage of Proposed Amendment No. 9 will allow us to be able to pay our bills and utilize some of the funds now being put away in growth accounts. The fact is that we are still spending a lot of money; and with the decline of membership, and the demands that are continuing to be placed on us as a Home, our expenses will continue to rise.

As I shared earlier, this past March we came close to losing our license to operate a Home. At the prospect of losing our license, we formed a sub-committee to meet with the Masonic Homes of California. With this concern, we asked if they could offer assistance or suggestions which would allow us to continue the life care for our residents.

Roy Henville, Past Grand Master and President of the Masonic Homes, did not hesitate one moment in saying that they would be able to assist and take us in under their umbrella until such time we were able to get ourselves back in the good graces with the State Licensing agencies. This Board is so grateful to the Masonic Homes Board for the concern they displayed to us during those trying times.

Your Board was so concerned about the status of our license and the escalating cost that, once our immediate problem was solved, we approached the Masonic Homes Board with the concept of uniting the two Homes.

We began meeting with the Masonic Homes Board starting in March of this year to discuss the possibility of merging of the two Homes. Many of you have heard about the "June" letter we received from the Homes Board, demanding many items such as all of our Home Endowment Fund, and that no one without California Masonic eligibility would be allowed to enter the Masonic Homes, and their list of demands went on.

Our sub-committee of Sister Barbara Campbell and Brother John Masson and myself, met with the Homes Board in late June and shared with them our concerns regarding this letter. Both committees agreed that we would negotiate all aspects of that letter and that the "June" letter was deemed preliminary. You may have also heard about a letter from our attorney regarding how he perceived the merging of the two identities, and that our Trustees would have to resign, and the Grand Master would appoint Trustees to complete the merging of the two Homes. Our attorney's letter was discussed at our Board meeting, and the

Board agreed that we were not going to allow the procedures outlined in the attorney's letter to happen.

The Board of Trustees directed me to contact Roy Henville. the President of the Masonic Homes Board, and communicate to him that we wanted to meet with his committee starting in November of this year, to negotiate every item of merging our two Homes into one. Our Board of Trustees, had made the decision that we wanted to look at each factor of the merger that we might be able to bring back to this Grand Chapter, a sound decision. Brother Roy Henville suggested that our Board consider that we retain our Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund and Board of Trustees and use those funds to pay the expenses of those Eastern Star Members who do not have California Masonic eligibility. This, my Sisters and Brothers, provides Masonic Home care for all members of California Eastern Star. suggested that our Board look into the residential care program in place in the Masonic Homes. This program assists members to stay in their own communities. This is the goal of our Board.

The demands that have been placed on the operation of a Home such as ours are growing on a daily basis. The financial impact to us is more than the pocketbook can bear. This past year, we were \$462,000-plus thousand dollars overspent; and there is not the backup in the various current funds any longer to carry us through to the next year. We must do something to correct the situation. With the passage of the Proposed Amendment No. 9, this will give us some relief to pay our bills. We feel this is only a temporary relief, and we will still continue to see rising costs, and soon we may be back to ask again for more relief.

We have been asked if the construction of a new home is another alternative to merging. Sure it is, but we need to share that the value of our present Home is questionable at this time, and without the sale of our present Home, we would never be able to afford a new Home.

We shared on Monday morning that an estimate to construct a new Home is in the range of \$15,000,000. Currently we have received two different estimates that we should consider the Home value around \$12,000,000. to \$15,000,000. The real estate market is down and with no end in sight. The operation costs to operate a new Home would be equal to or greater than the Home we currently have, so a concern exists if that truly is an option today.

One only has to look at the audit report as found in your Legislative Booklet given to you as you registered at this Grand Chapter Session. If you have not taken the time to review this report, just let me say it really speaks for itself as to the cost of maintaining a Home. As I shared earlier this week, we are still having to look into the possibility of hiring more professional employees to meet the requirements of the State.

I do want to make mention of one item in the audit report that each of us must always remember. There is an amount of \$3,476,925 that we must always retain in the Endowment Fund that is required by law. This amount is to provide future services if the Home were unable to provide for our current residents.

One might ask, "Why do we need the \$3.00 if we are looking to merge our Home with that of the Masonic Homes?" I will try to answer that concern in just a few minutes.

It is the intent of this Board of Trustees, by a unanimous vote, to meet with the Masonic Homes Board of the Grand Lodge of California to negotiate a merging of the two Homes into one. We have included a copy of the Letter of Intent in the package you received this morning as you entered the Grand Chapter.

We have included with this report several questions and answers to this proposal which we are actively looking into, and today we will be asking for your support and vote of confidence to go ahead and work out the necessary changes to accomplish this proposed merging of the two Homes.

In our negotiations, we will be addressing each item of our Eastern Star Constitution, as well as each concern our Board has as to the welfare of the residents of our Home. You will notice we hope to start our meetings with the Masonic Homes Board in November. This should give us ample time to be in a position to

present a legislative package, to you the members, at our next Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994.

As the Finance Committee will share with you, they, too, are very concerned with how we are going to continue to operate a Home as we know it today. The finances are not there for us to continue, and we are so thankful to our Masonic Brothers, who have indicated that they are understanding the situation and extending a helping hand to us.

As you know, the Grand Chapter of California has control over the Endowment Fund. The Board of Trustees merely operates the Home on your behalf from the interest received off the Endowment Fund and other accounts assigned for that purpose. Your Board of Trustees is committed to insure the well being of each of our residents, and I can assure you that all their concerns will be addressed as we meet with the Masonic Homes Board.

Allow me to address some of the questions you have before you this morning. Why is the Eastern Star Home Board considering the merger of the Eastern Star Home and the Masonic Homes of California?

As we indicated, there are several reasons to consider a merger. Some are as follows:

The assets the Board had to operate the Home in the last three years have been far less than the actual necessary costs to operate the Home.

Our membership in the Home has dropped to 54 residents; and with Chapters consolidating and the membership rolls getting smaller, there is a concern as to where we are going to get members to enter the Home. We have had three members enter the Home this last year; and as you can see, the cost per resident has rapidly risen.

The age of our members entering our Home has risen, also; and they are coming to the Home with far less, waiting until the last possible moment to enter into our facility. Most, lately, have come with only their Social Security as their only asset. We have had two in the last year come to the Board, and the Board has had to try to sell two mobile homes, which have proven to be very costly.

We are seeing families not really wanting to allow their loved ones to enter the Home and give up all their assets to the Order of the Eastern Star, and they are making other plans for their mother or their sister.

As I shared with you Monday, our existing Home has deteriorated to an extent that large expenditures will be required to bring the Home up to the standards it should be.

Will the Endowment Fund be transferred to the Masonic Homes Board of Trustees to manage? At this time we will not transfer the Endowment Fund to the Masonic Homes Board of Trustees. Currently, a plan is being considered that we continue with our Board of Trustees, who will manage the Endowment Fund, paying the necessary funds to the Masonic Homes of California to care for those members who do not have Masonic residency requirements to enter the Masonic Home.

I would like to use, at this time, my wife, Sue, who is a Masonic California wife. She would have no problem going straight into the California Masonic Homes because of my membership in a California Lodge. The Masonic Homes accept wives and widows of Master Masons for California Masons.

Your Board of Trustees has met with the Masonic Homes Board and indicated to them that they did not want any second class folks to enter the Home. That is the reason our Home Endowment Fund will be maintained by our Board and that those Sisters that do not have California residency requirements but do have the Eastern Star residency requirements will be allowed to enter the Home, and their fees or charges will be paid out of our Endowment Fund.

Are there any tax concerns on the transfer of the Endowment Fund? There are no tax concerns as long as we work with another 501(C)(3) charity, which the Masonic Homes of

California is as well. I just explained that our members of the Eastern Star who do not have California Masonic eligibility will also be allowed now and in the future to go into the Masonic Home.

When we do and if we do, where will the proceeds of the sale of our Home and the property in Clovis go? When the sale of our Home takes place, the money derived from that sale will be added to our Endowment Fund, as well as the funds derived from the sale of the Clovis property. That, too, will go into the Home Endowment Fund.

The question that we receive a lot: Will our members go to the Home in Union City or to Covina? The Masonic Homes of California is currently in a three-year remodel and reconstruction program; and in all likelihood, there will be no room at either facility until the construction is completed. At that time the Masonic Homes Board will make the decision as to where our members will be placed.

Again, my Sisters and Brothers, let me assure you that every item that we are discussing today will be negotiated as we proceed.

Why continue with the present Endowment Fund, the Home assessment, the Life Sponsorships, and the Star Plus Programs? My Sisters and Brothers, we will always have members in our Homes Program, and we need always to be ready to take care of our members who are admitted to the Homes. I believe, as we have already indicated, that we will add an additional program to the present Homes Program, and that program has not been put into place, but a program to assist our members in the communities, rather than going into a Home.

And, my Sisters and Brothers, no matter if our members are in our facility or in another facility, we need to always share that we need to take care of those Sisters and Brothers, because they have signed a life-term contract with us that we will always maintain them.

How will investigations be handled? Investigations of non-California Masonic-eligible members will be investigated per instructions from Grand Chapter and approved by the Masonic Homes after they are approved by your Board of Trustees and the Grand Chapter. Investigation of eligible members will be investigated by the Masonic Homes of California, as they will apply to them.

Where does the assessment fund go now, and where will it go in the future? The assessment fund goes into the operating fund of the Home; and in the future, it will still be used to assist in the operation of the Homes Program.

Will we need a Booster Club or an Endowment Committee? We will always need a Booster's Club to assist in the Homes Program. The members of California have no idea how important the members of the Booster's Club are. It has been the success of our existing Home, and we just wish that the members of California who do not have the opportunity to spend as much time as our Booster's Club members do would take that opportunity. Our members still need to feel like they are members of our great Order and not just residents of the Home.

We will always need an Endowment Committee. We need to continue to remind our members of the needs of the members who enter our Home. We will always have members who will be entering the Masonic Homes.

I might share with you right now that there are more women that have residency in the California Masonic Homes than men, with a great deal of those being our Sisters.

Will we have a Fiesta? The Board feels that a Fiesta is an important event, and we see one in the South one year and one in the North the next. We feel this merger will give ownership to the members of the Eastern Star to a Home in the North as well as in the South.

Will the Eastern Star still have a Board of Trustees? As you know, the Home is for sale; and your Board has looked at several organizations to handle that sale for us. To date, we have not

selected a group to represent us in the sale of the Home. The current market is so depressed that we have not rushed into a contract to sell the Home as of this date. We have a couple of different parties that have expressed interest enough that they have reviewed the property several times; and if we sell the Home tomorrow, the Board would have to take a look at the time frame requested by the buyer and take into account the residents that live at our Home and the time frame the Masonic Homes are in at the time and make our decision based on that. If the Home were to sell soon and the buyer requested possession as soon as possible, we would probably look at finding third party providers to take care of our residents until such time as we could get them into the Masonic Homes. All aspects of this proposed merger will be thoroughly reviewed by all state licensing agencies to ensure the welfare of our residents.

I need to share with you right now that we do have a party that has shared with us that they are sending us a Letter of Intent. We have no idea of the contents of that letter.

We, your Board of Trustees, realize that there are a lot of concerns as to the merging of our facility with that of the Masonic Homes, but we feel this is a great opportunity for the members of the California Eastern Star. If this Grand Chapter concurs with your Board of Trustees, we will be meeting with the Masonic Homes Board to prepare the final necessary agreements to make the merger go smoothly. We can today approve the concept and go forward to allow the Masonic Homes to take over the operation of our present Home and merge our program into theirs as soon as possible.

Your Board of Trustees has approved the concept of merging, and we are now presenting this program to you for your concurrence.

Worthy Grand Matron, I learned this morning that we do have a minority report to be presented at this time.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Sisters and Brothers, a minority member of the committee desires to make a report.

If there be no objection, we will allow that. Brother McGinty, are you prepared to give your report?

### MINORITY REPORT TO THE SPECIAL REPORT RELATING TO THE MERGER OF THE EASTERN STAR HOMES WITH THE MASONIC HOMES

(By Elston McGinty, Past Patron (171), Member, Board of Trustees)

Good morning, delegates.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members and Delegates of this Great Order:

In a matter as important as this is to the members of California Eastern Star, it is necessary that all the facts be disclosed and all alternatives be presented for your consideration. As you entered today, you received a special report regarding the proposed merger of our Homes with the California Masonic Homes. It is unfortunate that the delegates have not had sufficient opportunity to fully study and evaluate the merits of this special report.

A statement was made in the special report to the affect that the Board voted unanimously to meet with the Masonic Home Board to negotiate a merging of the two Homes. It is important for the delegates to be aware that the purpose of this vote was to explore the possibility of a merger.

Please refer to page 4, next to the last paragraph, which says: "If Grand Chapter concurs with your Board of Trustees, we will be meeting with the Masonic Homes Board to prepare the final necessary agreements to make the merger go smoothly." It should be noted that, in the Letter of Intent, on the next page, in the first paragraph, it states that the meetings with the Masonic Home Board were to pursue the feasibility and concept of transferring the Eastern Star Home and its assets into the Masonic Homes. It is my opinion that these statements are conflicting.

At the September 10th meeting, the Board became aware that the conditions set forth by the Masonic Homes Board were not acceptable and consequently voted to change the direction in which we should approach the possibility of a merger. It appeared to me that, before the September Board meeting, we were close to having the merger agreed upon before the members of the Eastern Star were even made aware of the conditions which the Masonic Homes Board had submitted to us. Therefore, to support this belief, I quote from a letter dated August 27, 1993, from Brother R. Stephen Doan, who at that time was the Most Worshipful Grand Master, the attorney for the Eastern Star Home Board, indicating the manner in which the action would be completed:

"The Bylaws of the Eastern Star Homes of California will be amended to permit Grand Lodge rather than Grand Chapter to fill our Board."

Now, there has been some changes. Keep in mind these were proposals that were presented but never made aware of the members.

"The current Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes will resign."

"Grand Lodge will select new Trustees for the Eastern Star Home."

"The Eastern Star Endowment Fund will be transferred to a Grand Lodge entity, with the conditions that such funds be used to support the current residents and future applicants for the Masonic Homes who meet your, but not the Masonic Homes, entrance requirements."

The following are the original conditions set forth by the Masonic Homes Board:

All assets of the Eastern Star Homes of California will be transferred to a newly-formed entity of the California Masonic Homes. At the time of this Letter of Conditions, no further applications to the Eastern Star Homes would be accepted by the Eastern Star Home Board.

The new Masonic Homes entity will accept the life-care responsibilities for all present residents of the Eastern Star Homes for which present life-care responsibilities exist. Once the current Eastern Star Home is closed, this care may require placement in community-based facilities pending the completion of major renovation projects in progress at both of the Masonic Homes.

Earnings from the Eastern Star Homes Endowment Fund in excess of expenditures to support all present residents of the Eastern Star Homes will be used for those members of the Eastern Star who are ineligible for the California Masonic Homes, and only those earnings will be used for such relief. No Masonic Homes Endowment Funds will be used for that purpose.

Applications eligible for the Masonic Homes will be submitted to the Masonic Homes Board. Such applications will be accepted based on the ability of the Eastern Star Home Endowment Fund to support additional applicants for life-care, using accepted actuarial standards for this determination.

California Eastern Star applicants will be determined by the Masonic Homes Board and may include, but not be limited to, admission to one of the California Homes.

Applications for Masonic care of Eastern Star members who qualify for care by the Masonic Homes by virtue of a Masonic relationship with a California Lodge will be submitted to the Masonic Homes Board through a California Masonic Lodge in the manner currently required of all eligible applicants, and no Eastern Star Homes Endowment Fund earnings will be used for that purpose.

All real property presently controlled by the O.E.S. Homes may be disposed of by the controlling Masonic Homes entity, and the net proceeds will be added to the O.E.S. Endowment Fund. Should the earnings of the O.E.S. Home Endowment fall short of the expenses of supporting the Eastern Star residents presently in the O.E.S. Home or any future residents, the fund principal that is an important item, may be used to offset the shortfall.

The California O.E.S. will continue as a minimum effort their present Home Endowment Fund assessment, their O.E.S. Homes assessment, any initiates' and affiliates' Homes fees, any out-of-state financial support for the Homes, and any other dues, fees or assessments which are presently used to support the O.E.S. operations. Such amounts will be paid to the entity of the California Masonic Homes responsible for the administration of the Eastern Star members' care through their Homes funds."

To my knowledge, there has not been notice given that we are in danger of foreclosure of our Home with the proposed merger which we are to consider today. As stated in our financial report, there is approximately \$17,000,000. currently in our Endowment Fund. In the past, we have not had the opportunity of receiving the benefits of our gains from this investment fund to apply to the operation and maintenance of the Home. It has been the practice of the Finance Committee, with the Board's approval, to reinvest all returns from sales of investments into future growth investments. If the Proposed Amendment No. 9 is passed, it will therefore eliminate a deficit budget, as has been presented in past years.

It is not the intention of this Board to withdraw more than is necessary to maintain the operation of our Home. Additional profits would be reinvested as the Finance Committee determines.

In response to the initial conditions that were presented to the Board in a letter dated June 10, 1993, I am fully aware that some of the conditions may have since been revised. It is my opinion that these revisions should have been presented to our Board in writing, so all of the Board members would have had the same facts. It is my strong belief that the conditions should have been included in the mailing to the Chapter Secretaries in order that the members would have been fully informed.

The President of our Board attended the workshop of the Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons, as well as the September meeting of the Southern Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. These members were told that the cost of building the Clovis project would be in excess of \$23,000,000. As recently as our Board meeting here in Fresno, I brought to the attention of the Board a letter from the builder to the architect, dated October 13, 1993 -- that is fairly current -- which states that the cost of completing the Clovis project would be \$11,417,926. The architect supplied me with a letter substantiating the fact that today's development cost has not changed since the September 1992 project cost summary was presented. He felt confident that the project cost of \$11.4 million is achievable in today's bidding climate.

For the information of the delegates, the Grand Chapter Office would be a part of the Clovis facility. It would include a 99-bed facility and, in addition, forty independent living units for paying residents that would offset a large portion of the cost of the facility.

It has been my privilege to have been sent by the Board of Trustees to the Masonic Homes Conferences in five different states, where I gained knowledge and experience regarding the proposed development plan at the Clovis site.

In closing, no matter what the outcome of this vote, I would hope and pray that every effort will be made by the new Board of Trustees to obtain equitable conditions from the Masonic Homes Board under which we can be satisfied that we are fulfilling our obligation to our members who have placed their trust in our care.

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: MOTION: I move that this Grand Chapter approve the concept of merging with the Masonic

Homes of California as a concept and that this Board be given a vote of confidence by this Grand Chapter to meet with the Masonic Homes and the Grand Lodge of California and to report back at the next Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994 with a legislative package for consideration. (The motion was seconded.)

June Lucretia Barnum, Past Grand Matron, Chairman, Constitution and Bylaws Committee: MOTION: Worthy Grand Matron, in view of the importance of this issue to this delegation, I move that the Standing Rules be suspended with respect to the limitations on debate, and that we extend the limits of debate to six members on each side of the proposition, and that each speaker be permitted to speak for four minutes. (The motion was seconded.)

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: It has been moved and seconded that we set aside our Standing Rules for this one order of business; that our members be allowed to have six speakers for and six speakers against, with a limit of four minutes each.

Is there any discussion?

All those in favor of changing this Rule signify by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, by the same sign.

MOTION: ADOPTED

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: It has been moved and seconded that the Grand Chapter approve the concept of merger with the California Masonic Homes, and that this Board of Trustees be given a vote of confidence by this Grand Chapter to meet with the Masonic Homes Board of the Grand Lodge of California, and to report back at the next Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994 with a legislative package.

Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron: In 1985 the Worthy Grand Patron in his report told of the problems of our Home, and it has taken us eight years for the Home Board to decide whether we should sell, build, and now turn it completely over to the Masonic Order. I say, turn it over completely.

You have heard both reports, the majority and the minority. This was considered at the beginning of the year, not now. The membership has not been invited or informed of what has proceeded in the last eight years.

In selling the Home to a company that did not even have a financial statement and tied us up for three years. There were others that were worth six billion dollars that were turned down by representatives of Grand Lodge.

Now we have come to a point where you walk in this morning and get a pamphlet that is six pages long and expect you to understand what is being offered to the Sisters of our Home.

Most of our Sisters are eligible to go into the Masonic Home. They prefer to come into the Eastern Star Home. We do not need the permission of the Grand Lodge to send those Sisters or whatever it is to the Masonic Homes. They have that eligibility. But they wanted to come into the Eastern Star Home.

They were taken care of in the manner in which they expected to be taken care of up until the last couple of years. We have failed our Sisters. Now the State is mandating what we are supposed to do. We are following those mandates. We should have known before.

I have sat in many sessions and just worried about crumbs in the toasters on the breakfast tables. That has been discussed for hours. I have sat in sessions where our roof needed repairing; they took one bid for \$15,000. I rejected it, as much as I could; and we asked for more bids; and we got it done for \$1,500.

Now, through the years, this is an example of what has taken place. I feel that our main concerns are our Sisters in our Home, and the future Sisters that want to go into our Eastern Star Home, along with the husbands that are sojourners.

Now, I heard that the Eastern Star Sisters would be accepted, but I did not hear anything about their husbands being accepted in the Masonic Homes. If they opened it up to all the sojourners in the State of California that have Eastern Star membership -- what I want to say is, also, you heard mention of \$15,000,000 to build the Home.

We submitted estimates, drawings and renderings for a Home that would have only cost \$12,000,000. You can build property today for \$65 to \$95 a square foot. Now, if you build a hundred thousand square feet at \$95 a square foot, you have got \$9,500,000. If you build at \$65 a square foot, you have got \$6,500,000.

There has been no consideration what our cost would be, plus the fact we do have people that are still interested in purchasing that Home down there.

We do not need another survey; we had a survey and it came in at \$12,000,000. The first bid that my committee brought in was for \$19,000,000, and then it went up to \$30,000,000.

Stephen Wallace, Past Patron (171): I rise to a point of inquiry: Brother Tom McKinney made reference to the phrase "our attorney" during the delivery of his report. Does this phrase refer to the person of Mr. R. Stephen Doan; and if that is so, does the Board of Trustees anticipate the continued use of his services during the coming year's deliberations, when he is the Junior Past Grand Master of Masons in California and his interest may be to the betterment of the Grand Lodge and not to the benefit of our members in the Eastern Star Home? Thank you.

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Your Board of Trustees has agreed with you, my Brother, that there is a conflict of interest and that we will be utilizing the services of another attorney with regard to the merging or the proposed concept of merging with the Masonic Homes of California.

Patricia Davis, Associate Matron (126): I am going to be speaking for, but I wanted to ask if it was possible for the

delegates to receive a copy of Brother McKinney's report after lunch.

Also, I had a question: Those of us who are neither wives or widows of Master Masons, but sisters, daughters, granddaughters, would we be eligible to go into the Masonic Home?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: My Sister, as I indicated in my report, yes, you would have eligibility into the Masonic Homes because of being a member of the Eastern Star and having ten years of service to our Chapters. This will enable all California members, men and women alike, for residency in the Masonic Homes.

Patricia Davis, Associate Matron (126): Then I have a statement to make:

My husband, who is not a member of Eastern Star, but I understood he would be eligible with me to go into the Home through either of the purchasing or paying rent for one of the little homes. He was very interested in that in case we needed to have that kind of service, and I think there are others in our organization who would like to have some kind of independent living.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: My Sister, that concept was in Brother Mac's report, that is if the Home was built.

Patricia Davis, Associate Matron (126): Yes, that is what I would like to see happen. Thank you.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Do you want to change whether you were speaking for or against this, then? I need to know.

Patricia Davis, Associate Matron (126): I am sorry, I was speaking against the concept of going in with Masonic Homes.

Marion Wright, Worthy Matron (260): Worthy Grand Matron, I am speaking against the merger with the Masonic Homes.

We heard many words before, but I think now is the time to listen to Brother McGinty. It is too early for this merger.

For sixty years the Eastern Star Home was run by the Order of the Eastern Star, and there has always been a loving support for the care of the ladies therein, and now it is very important that we must consider the ladies.

If there are moves due now, there is no place to put them now; and they will have to go into nursing homes. Is that what you want? Do you want them to be away from their friends and their neighbors that they have learned to know in the Eastern Star Home?

We need more time for negotiations. That is the thing now. There should be more possibilities for women in the Eastern Star to have a say in this matter. This move will mean more money to the Masons, with all due respect to you Brothers, and they will have a lot more to say in the matter of running the Home of the Eastern Star.

Again, I say we need more time to negotiate upon such an important and serious project as this. The Conductresses and Associate Conductresses, as well as all voting delegates, should be allowed access to all communications going in and coming from committee members and know what goes on behind their closed doors. There should be a reporter there to let all know what is going on day by day, week by week, month by month.

The money will be transferred to Masonic Homes. There is no doubt about that. The Eastern Star members will go into Masonic Homes, and we do not know what the new Homes Program is going to be, and until all questions of importance have been answered to the satisfaction of the Eastern Star members, this move should not be considered. Thank you so very much.

Brian Whitaker, Past Patron (528): I am a registered civil engineer within the State of California. I do not have any direct experience in construction of care homes for older persons, but I do have experience with construction of major municipal projects.

I am currently a principal engineer with the Municipal Water District.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Brother Brian, are you speaking for or against?

Brian Whitaker, Past Patron (528): I am speaking for the proposal of merger.

We have been given a lot of figures about the cost of construction. I have not had the opportunity to review any plans, nor do I know of any plans available for detailed review of what the construction might be, although I do have very little doubt that you have construction companies approaching you, telling you that they can build the facility for a certain price.

My experience is that those costs are generally going to be low, and they will tend to go up as you get more and more detailed in your design. I think that we need to be very careful about what we consider here as far as that we go off and spend for engineering and the planning of a new Home that would be operated by Eastern Star.

We have before us the opportunity to work with our Brothers in the Grand Lodge, who have experience at building such facilities and operating such facilities; and I think we should take advantage of that. I think that we have, in the last couple of days here, vested some authority in new members of our Home Board and in the past have given those same well-respected members of our Order authority. I think we need to respect that authority and the responsibilities you have given them to lead us forward.

I do not think what they are asking you for today, as I understand it, is final authority to make a deal. I think what they are asking from you is a vote of confidence to go and negotiate on your behalf and come back before you next year with the information and the forthrightness that they presented today on what a final decision should be. And I think we should pursue that. Thank you.

Helen Figel, Past Matron (205): The sale of our Home is going on too long. We have to make a decision.

I am in favor of the merger of our Eastern Star Home with the Masonic Homes. I have one question, though: When the sale goes through, do we have to wait to come back to this body to give permission to the Trustees to move our members to a temporary facility and until they can be joined in their permanent quarters, maybe north or south? If so, let us make this motion today. Let us get on with the sale of the Home. We have been coming back to Grand Chapter for too many years on this.

I also feel, with some members that have not gone into the Home because it was in the south or some have gone in the north, and with the facilities at both ends of the state, it gives a wider opportunity to the members to be near their loved ones. Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Jean Godair, Past Matron (639): I speak for consideration of a merger.

Having worked in the medical profession for many years, I have seen regulatory costs continue to rise, while government reimbursement continues to drop. And with Mr. Clinton's new Health Act, it is going to be even worse.

If we can merge and make a stronger financial basis for the Masonic Homes, I think we should consider that. Thank you.

Charles Premo, Past Patron (632): I am speaking for. I have also served two years on the Eastern Star Charity Foundation Board in Connecticut, and the Eastern Star in Connecticut is handling their operation the same way they are proposing here, and I know how effective it can be.

That hospital is a world leader in the care of geriatrics; it is an open home for ill Divinity students; it is the best operation that I have ever seen. The women are well cared for, well considered. Each year each Master Junior and Senior Warden is sent to the Eastern Star Home and to the Masonic Home and has to see that the care is there. If each one of you here could see that kind of

care, I think all of your fears would be waylaid, so therefore I propose that this at least be adopted so we consider lesser expense to our Order.

Yesterday we voted we did not want to spend a penny a week for our Grand Chapter.

Helen Sampson, Worthy Matron and Past Matron (242): I have two members in the Home at the present time. One is a non-paying member.

We have one member as a non-paying resident. The other is a paying resident. Nobody has addressed the situation of the paying residents in the Home. She is eligible to go to the Masonic Home, but would they be willing to take her with her not willing to give up her financial assets?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: My Sister, currently the Grand Lodge and the Masonic Homes of California have no program whereby they accept paying members. Right now that is a negotiated item that would be on our list to see what we are going to do.

It is a unique situation we have, as you indicated, just one paying member within our Home. It could be that she might be able to go to the Resident Assistance Program; but at this time, we do not have any decision on that.

Worthy Grand Matron, if I might, one of the Sisters in the balcony had a question in regard to would we be placing our members in third party homes.

My Sisters and Brothers, even if we do, which could be an alternative to building the new Home, there is no guarantee that, because of the window of building the new and selling the old, that there would not be some time frame that we would have to put our members in a third party residence or care facility to take care of them for our interim time. Right now we do not have control over that. That will be taken care of when we do sell or build or buy or whatever we plan on doing.

Clinton Lee, Worthy Patron (405): I rise to speak in favor of the motion.

All of us care for these ladies. Some of you, who heard me speak, know I deeply care. But I also care for the condition of the Home, the condition of the environment that they are in, and what may happen.

We just recently went through a year where we ran an over \$400,000 deficit. The budget you approved this morning is for a \$500,000 deficit. Unlike our government, we can not print money and sell bonds to foreign nations. We need to find the money to run the Home for ourselves.

We have been reluctant in adding anything to our assessments anywhere. The future seems to be pointing in a certain direction.

I heard it alluded to earlier that someone, at one point, offered \$30,000,000 for this Home, which is now worth a third of that or less because of the value of the market. I wonder why we did not take it? I also heard alluded to by previous speakers that perhaps this should have been more discussed.

I am not a long-time member; I have only been here for about 15 years; but I can not ever recall a letter being sent to every Chapter in the state, to be read by a Secretary, to advise us of the status of the Home, what is going on, and where we were at. In my previous 14 years, it has been a deep, dark secret.

I would strongly urge you to give this Board, who had the courage to take this action, your total support, your unanimous support, in giving them the right to go ahead and to negotiate.

They are not asking you to do it; they are saying they want to go out and do the best they can for our ladies and for the Good of the Order and come back next year. Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Valerie Winter, Worthy Matron (140): I speak in favor of this.

I, like many of you out there, am a care giver. I happen to have a mother and a mother-in-law, both of whom are widows and live alone.

My mother lives in the Masonic Home in Union City. As Past President of the East Bay Past Matrons, I have worked very closely with this Masonic Home. All of this care for all of our elderly, I believe now is the time to look into every concept possible; and I think that our Board of Trustees should have our vote to look into this concept.

They are not asking us to approve it today. They are asking for permission to negotiate. The Masonic Homes are wonderful. The one in Union City has done more for my mother in the last year and a half than I could have done, and I certainly hope that you give this Board the approval to go forward. Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: My Sisters and Brothers, we have now had six members speak for this; and three have spoken against it. Do we have someone who wishes to speak against?

Ardath Garst, Past Grand Matron: I wish to ask a question. If we approve this concept of this merger, may I have an answer to this?

The Masonic Home Board voted to admit non-Masonic children into the Covina Home, because there were so many non-Masonic children and so few Masonic children who needed to be helped. Why can not the Masonic Home Board do the same thing for our ladies who do not have California Masonic relationships?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: Thank you, my Sister. I will be tickled to death to respond to that.

The Masonic Homes Board has given us a window whereby those ladies or men that do not have California eligibility because of their membership, they came to us from another state or whatever, that they, too, would be considered as eligible to go into the Masonic Homes.

Our money, the Home Endowment money, that our Board of Trustees will manage will be for those members that do not have Masonic eligibility. Those members that have Masonic eligibility would be covered under the Masonic Homes Program right now. So we do have an avenue so that, today, or when this is all put together, all California members of Eastern Star would have an opportunity in the Masonic Homes.

Ardath Garst, Past Grand Matron: I understand that. However, I do not believe that we are discussing the same thing.

If we are going to be giving all of our assets to the Masonic special entity, or if we keep control of it, the result will be exactly the same for the lady who does not have California Masonic relationship; is that true?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: No, my Sister. As I indicated, the fund would be managed by the Eastern Star, and let me use you as an example.

You went to the Masonic Home. Your bill is \$1,700, which would be paid by the Eastern Star Home Endowment operating fund to the Masonic Homes to cover your expenses.

Those Sisters, such as my wife, Sue, if she went into the Masonic Home, they would be covered by the Masonic Homes Endowment Program and not our Endowment Program, so that, by doing that, every member of California, whether they have California residency or just Eastern Star residency, will have an opportunity for admission into the Masonic Homes.

Ardath Garst, Past Grand Matron: But that still does not preclude the possibility that they will possibly have to go to a community-based facility.

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That is true. In our negotiations,

that is one of the programs we have to look at. As far as we know, the Grand Lodge is now in a program whereby they are going to be remodeling both Union City and Covina; and because of that, there may be a time frame -- and certainly this will be covered in our negotiations with the Home Board as to what is going to be happening in the interim time.

As I indicated to you, we are going to negotiate every item of this and may be negotiating three years ahead now to get this all to happen, because as you have indicated, there is a concern about moving our members from one residence to another. If there is no room at the inn, they would have to be placed in facilities.

Bill Williamson, Worthy Patron (55): I am not speaking for or against. I have a couple of questions:

The minority report that was given a few minutes ago, was it after the fact of the letter that you had received from the Masonic Board? That is the way it sounded; it looked like the majority report had already answered that; and I got confused as to the time of that period.

Also, I would like to know, if we do not approve the request of the majority Board now, what alternative do we have, other than just staying status quo that we are presently doing?

The third question is, have we considered the fact that our Masonic Brothers, including myself, have taken an obligation to our wives, widows, and sisters? How has that been considered, if you will, please, Worthy Grand Matron?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: My Brother, the letters that our Brother Mac referred to were letters that had been received by our Home Board with conditions that were set down by the Masonic Homes Board.

As Mac indicated in his report, those items that he mentioned in the report have been negotiated on most every item, so that we are beyond that original letter, or what the Masonic Homes Committee and our committee have deemed as a preliminary letter. We are beyond that state now, as well as the letter that was written by our attorney. That letter was received by our Board, and we agreed as a body that we would not adhere to those procedures, as outlined by him.

Bill Williamson, Worthy Patron (55): So the minority report has already gone past? That is what you are telling me?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: Yes.

A Member from the Floor: I am speaking for neither. I have a question that I would like to have answered. It is a short one:

Has this proposal been discussed on the floor of Grand Ledge Annual Session, or is it waiting for the report of their Masonic Home Board to discuss it? I think we have had a marvelous opportunity this morning to discuss this, and I thank you for that.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: It is my understanding that it was not; but since I was not at Grand Lodge and they are really funny about that, Brother Tom, would you answer that?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: The discussion on the merging of the two Homes or the concept of the merging of the two Homes was not discussed at Grand Lodge this year, primarily for the reason that the Eastern Star Home Board is taking this to the Masonic Homes Board; and at this time we did not really have the conception or your approval to do so; and our Board felt that we needed to bring this to you, the members, so that we could get your concurrence before we stepped out of line and did something that was not your wish.

Linda Goff, Past Matron (428): I have a question. My question is of the proposer of the motion, and it is about the wording of the motion.

As you have just indicated, most of what you are asking us to do in this motion has already occurred; and if what you asked for is a vote of confidence to explore the concept of merging, have not we already done that? And would the Masonic Home Boards be willing to continue these discussions without some firm wording from this body?

Because you can talk a long time without ever getting to the point of being authorized to do something.

Where are we within that spectrum of decision-making, and will the wording of this motion, as it stands now, actually allow you to go further with this process? And would you please repeat the motion as well?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: As we indicated in our report, we have met with the Masonic Homes Board with the idea in mind that we want to first of all get their assistance in the particular situation we were at the time; and because of that situation, we did ask them if they would be interested in merging our Eastern Star Home with their Home.

We have progressed to a point whereby we did get to a point where we did get by the two letters that we have received, one, the June 13th letter from the Homes Board.

However, we stopped negotiations because we felt that we needed to bring this issue to Grand Chapter and not go around you but include you in our decisions. Does that answer your question? I will read the motion. I move that this Grand Chapter approve this concept of merging with the Masonic Homes of California as a concept, and that this Board of Trustees be given a vote of confidence by this Grand Chapter to meet with the Masonic Homes Board of the Grand Lodge of California and report back to our next Session in October of 1994.

Linda Goff, Past Matron (428): But that did not answer my question.

What does that allow you to do, other than to come back next year and try this one more time? Can you actually make any decisions during the ensuing year?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That will allow us to go forward and cover every concern that this Board and our members might have so that, as we come back next October, we will be able to present an entire, complete legislative package that we can accomplish in merging with the Masonic Homes of California.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Do we have anyone who wishes to speak against?

Teresa Covington, Past Matron (133): I am so strongly against this concept, I cannot believe that anyone in Grand Chapter would even consider getting rid of our Eastern Star Home, which we have worked for for so many years with the Fiesta, and it is like taking a relative and saying, "Okay, next door neighbor, I am tired of taking care of her; you take care of it. It is too much money; it is too much time; and it is too much effort."

That is not what the Order of the Eastern Star is about. It is about taking care of each other, however hard and however much work; and there is not anyone in this auditorium that has not worked very hard for this Eastern Star Home and be part of this organization. Please think very seriously about agreeing to going with the Masonic Homes. Thank you.

Elsie Manning, Past Matron (72): I know that in the very distant past there was a merger with the Masonic Homes with the Order of Amaranth in regard, I believe, to a scholarship fund; and I wondered if there might be anybody in the body that might know if this merger retained as a result.

The other thing I want to know is if there is a possibility of retaining the property in Clovis for a central location, if the merger occurs?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: Yes, my Sister, there is currently that property that belongs to the Order of the Eastern Star. If we were to sell, the proceeds from that would go to the Home Endowment Fund.

If Grand Chapter elected not to sell that, we could do something else.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: We have had six speakers for and four against.

Patsy Baker, Past Matron (178): Worthy Grand Matron, the Sister that spoke about the Amaranth Home for Girls, they did sell; they did not merge anything. They sold the Home. They gave the money to Grand Lodge, and the Grand Lodge does give scholarships to girls from that money. There was not any type of merger; it was an outright sale; and they no longer take care of the girls.

Lura Rae Dales, Past Grand Matron: I tried to stay away from the microphone, but I am too emotional about the subject to do so. I do not have prepared remarks. My remarks will come from my heart.

My Worthy Grand Matron of 1952 taught her Worthy Matrons to know about our Home and to work for that Home and believe in the Home, and I have done just that for all of these years.

I served as a Member on the Board of Trustees for seven years before being elected Associate Grand Conductress of this body, and my projects during that time of being Worthy Grand Matron were for our Home.

We each take an obligation in our Order. We each learn the lessons of our Ritual, and they are to love one another and to take care of one another.

I think our most important project in this Grand Chapter over these 60 years has been our Eastern Star Home and the care we have given to the residents, who found it necessary to seek a home there with their Sisters. And Brothers, if they would like to come, that would make it even more interesting for them.

I cannot see giving up an Eastern Star Home in California. I can see our giving up the present facility, because it is an old building and is requiring heavy maintenance. But we have the facility in Clovis, and certainly, in time, we can sell that facility and have the funds to build a new facility, where we are not dependent on the Masonic Brothers for care. We can take care of our Sisters, can't we?

I will give many more times the per capita or the assessment that we are currently being asked, to see that a member of my Chapter or your Chapter would be able to go to the Home, where she would like to go, and be with her other Sisters, to enjoy their company and the plans and programs that the Chapters come and put on for them.

This motion asks that you approve the concept of merging with the Masonic Homes of California. I think that the Masons are asking too much of us. They want our Endowment Fund. They want us to pay for those ladies who they might put someplace else.

You see what they do when they get into further plans with them, but just, please, give them some consideration and see if we cannot -- you are going to hear something in a little while that is going to wipe away part of that deficit spending, so just think about it when you cast your vote, and see if you can not have it in your heart to give a little more for your Sisters and our Chapter.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: We have now had five speakers against and six for.

Frederick Bertea, Worthy Patron (436): There was a similar question before me that I was going to ask, but they did not really answer it, and my question is: Supposing that the proposal that we are going to vote on now, all this merger negotiating does not go through, do they have an alternative plan as to where we are going to go from there?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), Member, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: My Brother, if this were to not take place, your Board of Trustees would continue on as we are right now.

Our concern is, since we related to you this morning to where we are as a Grand Chapter and the cost involved, certainly we are very much concerned with the life care that we have with the Sisters and, hopefully, some day, Brothers, that live in our Home. But that right now is our alternative. If we do not go forward, then we will regroup and continue on as we are right now.

Frederick Bertea, Worthy Patron (436): But if this does not go through, are you looking at alternative plans of action, then? Is that what you said?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That is right.

Frederick Bertea, Worthy Patron (436): Another question: If the Masonic Home in Covina is expanding, supposedly they are under construction, can maybe, in our negotiations, we ask them to have this wing for people that are in the Home now, that maybe they could go into there rather than Union City? Is that a possibility to negotiate?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: I think those are items that will be under negotiations when we discuss what is going to take place. As I indicated earlier, this is all a concept; and we are going to negotiate every item; and it may be that the Sisters in the north would go to the north, and the Sisters in the south, to the south.

Frederick Bertea, Worthy Patron (436): One more: The current Home, they said they had three wings empty. Is there a possibility they have considered maybe getting outside people, you know, to get money to rent places, so we can get more money? Have they looked into that rather than Masonic-oriented people?

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: My Brother, we are getting into details of discussion. That is not what we are supposed to be discussing here this morning.

Tom Remington, Worthy Patron (276): I would like a further point of clarification, because I believe that it is important to the members of this Grand Chapter, as well as to members of the

Eastern Star Home Board, that everyone understands what the adoption of this motion actually means to us.

The motion says that "I move that the Grand Chapter approve this concept of merging," etc., and that we give the Board a vote of confidence, and that they come back in October of '94 with a legislative package. It sounds all very well and good, so we are authorizing them to go ahead.

But in the paragraph ahead of that, on page 4, it says: "We can today approve this concept and go forward to allow the Masonic Homes to take over the operation of our present Home and merge our program with theirs as soon as possible."

Now, are we talking about some of this merging, some of this operation, some of the transfer of funds, some of the responsibility for our members in our Home being transferred to the Masonic Homes Board prior to the 1994 Session of Grand Chapter?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: No, my Brother. We are planning -- and as I tried to share with you, and I am not an elector with words -- we will be negotiating with our Masonic Homes of California, a plan whereby we can present back to this Grand Chapter for their approval, prior to anything taking place.

Tom Remington, Worthy Patron (276): But all of the operation of our Home and all of our funds would remain under our control until at least the Grand Chapter Session of 1994; is that correct?

Thomas McKinney, Past Grand Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That is correct. No change will take place until this Grand Chapter Session next year approves such change.

Tom Remington, Worthy Patron (276): And the tone of the negotiations would be that we are negotiating in good faith, but final approval rests with the Grand Chapter of California in October of '94?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That is right, my Brother.

Judith Wyatt, Past Matron (55/513): Brother Tom, I believe most of our members seem to feel that our \$3.00 Home Assessment covers the expenses of the Home.

The Home Endowment Committee members are trying to spread the word amongst the members that the assessment does not cover, at least I found that so in my area.

I am asking if we can stress that our members realize here how important the Home Endowment Fund is. It will help support our Home and keep it where it is, correct, or build a new Home in Clovis.

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: As I indicated in our report earlier, the assessment would have to be several times what it is right now in order for that to ever take place.

Judith Wyatt, Past Matron (55/513): That is why we need more contributions to the Home Endowment Fund, to keep the assessment down and still support our Home. Thank you.

Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron: I have heard that there will be an assessment continued on the Eastern Star members to pay in the Masonic Homes.

What I would like to know, out of the \$15.00 per capita, what percentage of that is assessment for the Masonic Homes today; and in the event that this does pass, will we have the opportunity to vote on any assessment rises in the future?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: As I indicated in our report earlier, our Board feels that we will always have an assessment, because we are always going to be in the Home business. Whether it is our facility or the Masonic Homes, we are still going to have members in that program. So whether we need a

\$3.00 assessment or a \$2.00 or a \$5.00, that will be a discussion item at every Grand Chapter Session.

Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron: But will it be dictated to us by the Masonic Order what that assessment is going to be? Will we not be able to vote on it like we can at the present time?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: My Brother, the assessment will be assessed by your Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes. Grand Lodge will not be making that assessment; we will be basing that on what it costs us to handle the operating costs that we have to do with our Home Endowment Fund to care of our residents in the Home.

Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron: They will not be telling you what the cost is going to be?

Thomas McKinney, Past Patron (643), President, Board of Trustees, Eastern Star Home: That is right.

June Lucretia Barnum, Past Grand Matron: MOTION: Worthy Grand Matron, I move to amend the motion to add the following words at the end of the motion: "and that no transfer of funds or property of the Eastern Star Homes of California be made to the Masonic Homes prior to consideration at the Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994." (The motion was seconded.)

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Sisters and Brothers, we have an amendment to the motion. It would read that "this Grand Chapter approve the concept of a merging with the Masonic Homes of California concept, and this Board of Trustees be given a vote of confidence by this Grand Chapter to meet with the Masonic Homes Board of the Grand Lodge of California and report back to the next Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994 with a legislative package for consideration, and that no transfer of funds or property of the Eastern Star Homes of California be made to the Masonic Homes prior to Grand Chapter Session in October of 1994. Is there any discussion?

Frank Young, Associate Grand Patron: Is it true that this vote would not be binding upon the Home Board? They are a separate organization, and the motion that was placed upon them, I do not believe can be binding on this separate organization.

Philip Brooks, Past Patron (635), Member, Finance Committee: Brother Frank, you are exactly right. But let us look at the practicality of the situation:

It will take a two-thirds vote of this Grand Chapter Body to transfer, or move, or do anything other than support the existing Home that we have. That is its sole purpose, its sole existence. Therefore, no matter what happens, no matter what we have as a member of the Board of Trustees, we will always be limited to access to those funds by this Grand Chapter Body, and it is absolutely impossible to sustain the Home without that.

If I may, Worthy Grand Matron, let me just get to the chase real quick: I am the guy that sits with the CPA firms that review the financial statements just before they come out. I am a CPA as well. There is one statement that was made during the course of that meeting. Our CPA firm had to give consideration as to whether or not they were going to put a statement in our financial statement, saying "We do not believe that this organization is financially viable." That is how close. They mentioned it. It did not get in there; but if we continue \$400,000, \$500,000 deficit, it will be in there; and then we will not control the Home any longer; this Board of Trustees will not control the Home; the State of California will. Thank you.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Is there any further discussion to the amendment to the motion?

Marvin Wallace, Associate Patron (555): I am in favor of the motion to give the Board a vote of confidence. However, to expedite the procedures of the merger of the Home, what I would like to see happen --

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: My Brother, at this time we are only discussing the amendment to the motion.

Marvin Wallace, Associate Patron (555): My apologies, Worthy Grand Matron. I shall wait.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you.

Is there further discussion on the amendment to the motion?

Hearing none, you are about to vote on the amendment to the motion to add, after "with a legislative package for consideration," the wording "and that no transfer of funds or property of the Eastern Star Home be made to the Masonic Homes of California prior to the Grand Chapter Session in October 1994."

All those in favor of this amendment to the motion will vote by the usual voting sign of Grand Chapter; those opposed, by the same sign.

### AMENDMENT ADOPTED

We are back to the main motion, as amended. We need one more speaker against.

Jim Newton, Worthy Patron (528): I speak in opposition. I believe we have had six for, five against; I therefore move the question.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: My Brother, you are absolutely right. We have had six speakers for and six speakers against.

Sister Lydia Eckert, I call for a ballot vote on this proposal. Will you please instruct our delegates on the proper procedure of voting?

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Delegates to this Grand Chapter Session:

Good afternoon, It is a delight to be here with you. # REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

(By David Von Bima, Past Patron (33), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

It is with pleasure that I present the Finance Committee: Brother Delroy Aldershof, Past Grand Patron; Sister Shirley Christ, Past Matron; and Brothers David Poole and Steven Nicholas, Past Patrons.

I thank the Worthy Grand Matron, the Grand Treasurer and all of the Grand Line Officers who attended our meetings whenever their schedules permitted.

I want to thank our Sister Sheri Weisser for acting as Secretary to the committee. She is a fountain of knowledge concerning the financial operation of the Grand Chapter Office. Thanks also to Diane Silva for helping whenever required; and to Tom McKinney, President of the Home Board of Trustees for expanding the cooperation between the Home Board and the Finance Committee.

The Grand Treasurer in her report to Grand Chapter Monday spoke of two financial problems which arose in connection with our Grand Chapter Session in San Diego last year. Although this is the 120th annual session of Grand Chapter, to my knowledge, these types of problems have not been experienced in the past. Because ours is a volunteer organization and a social organization, we as members would like to believe that we can seal every deal with a handshake and that it is not necessary to follow sound business procedures. Unfortunately as society becomes more complicated and our specifications for what is needed to run a successful Grand Chapter Week more numerous and exacting we find that we must institute sound business practices or remain susceptible to possible future problems similar to those experienced this past year.

To this end the Finance Committee with the assistance of the Grand Treasurer has developed and adopted a set of guidelines which will lessen the chances of this happening again. The guidelines, among others, include the following rules:

# Grand Chapter Week

Budget - If the already approved budget is substantially "over budget", written approval must be received from the Finance Committee.

Committee Checking Accounts -

- 1. The signature cards must have 5 signatures. Two of the 5 must sign each check. The 5 signatures are to be the General Chairman, Committee Chairman, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer and a designee of the Committee Chairman, preferably not a spouse.
- 2. Signators are NOT to sign blank checks. This defeats the purpose of having two signatures.
- 3. Within 30 days after the Grand Chapter Installation, the account must be closed and all monies, cancelled checks, bank statements and all other pertinent records must be sent to the Grand Chapter Office.

Contracts - The Grand Secretary is required to sign ALL contracts. The Finance and Jurisprudence Committees must approve all contracts.

Contracts for the week may include:

Arena/Convention Center Hotel/Motel Entertainment Transportation

The Constitution and Laws of Grand Chapter charge this committee to exercise full authority and control over all financial matters of the Grand Chapter. Toward this end, our committee met ten days this past year. We met in joint session with the Committees on Constitution and Laws and Jurisprudence in San Francisco and twice with the Home Board of Trustees; once in San Francisco and once in Los Angeles at the Home. We held all other meetings in the office of the Grand Chapter in San Francisco.

One of the first items addressed by the Committee was the concern voiced by some members at last year's Grand Chapter Session as to the adequacy and reliability of the Wang Computer System. To this end I engaged the services of Todd Williams, Worthy Patron of Santa Cruz Redwood Chapter No. 237, who has his own computer consulting service. Brother Williams was kind

enough to donate his services. He submitted a detailed report to the committee which we considered at our December meeting. In summary his key findings were as follows:

The current Wang System at the Grand Chapter Office should give us several more years of good service. The software and maintenance contracts with Wang, although not cheap, were reasonable considering the alternatives. We should start a reserve fund for the future so that when it comes time to make inevitable move we have the money put away to deal with the problem.

The committee reviewed monthly financial statements for the Grand Chapter and Eastern Star Homes of California. We reviewed contracts for expenditures as required.

We met with Bill Watts, General Chairman of Grand Chapter Week for 1993 and approved his budget for this session.

Almost every time the Finance Committee met in San Francisco, a representative of Harris Bretall Sullivan and Smith, our investment counselors, joined us and presented their performance report. For the year ended June 30, 1993 our investments increased by 11.7%. This was compared to the Standard and Poor 500 increase of 13.6% and to the Dow Jones Industrial Average increase of 9.3%. Since placing our investments with Harris Bretall Sullivan and Smith in 1988 our bond portfolio has increased an average of 10.4% per year and our equities have increased an average of 14.3% per year.

With our stocks growing at 14.3% per year, the committee has spent many hours discussing how to get more investment income for the operation of our Eastern Star Home without giving up most of the superior growth that our stock portfolio has enjoyed. Legislation was drafted to help solve this problem.

The committee considered at length the pros and cons of changing the fiscal year of Grand Chapter from June 30th to September 30th so that Grand Chapter will not have to operate for over three months each year without a budget and also so that our fiscal year will more closely match our Grand Chapter year. Legislation was submitted to accomplish this change.

On behalf of all members of the committee I would like it to be known that we are always ready and willing to answer any questions from any Eastern Star Member.

I wish to conclude my report by thanking Sister June Lucretia Barnum, Past Grand Matron, for appointing me to this committee and for giving me the chance to serve our Order. I also wish to extend my heart felt thanks to each member of this committee for long hours of service, their dedication to the Order and for their loyal support.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Brother David, for your report. I have been able to attend all but one Finance Committee meeting this year. I gained a better appreciation for your concern and untiring efforts in the interest of finances of this Grand Chapter. My grateful appreciation to each member of this committee for your service this year.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL CANCER DRESSING STATIONS

(By Betty Veffredo, Past Matron (104), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Worthy Grand Matron, I thank you on behalf of the American Cancer Society for appointing me Chairman of the Memorial Cancer Dressings Stations for a second year. The five Sisters you appointed to work as Co-Chairman on this Committee have been a joy to work with, and have done a wonderful job. Thank you for their appointments. I enjoyed the many phone calls from the Station Chairman and getting to know them better. I wish that I could have met more of them in person.

As we entered our thirty-sixth year of service we started with 73 stations, 44 in the North and 29 in the South. We have lost over the year one station in the North and one in the South. Gained two new ones in the North and one in the South that had been working but no reports for three years. We ended the year with 74 stations.

This year our stations have been very willing to supply the need of 1,418 patients, of these 149 were Masonic family. This was done with an average of 2,851 volunteers, that have worked 36,165 hours, making 13,184 dozen dressings. This adds up to a total of 158,208 dressings that were made at a cost of \$42,195. With the other items made it totals 167,973 plus 182 pairs of slippers.

This year started very busy with how to get needed dressings to the American Cancer Society units that had been used to just ordering from the depot that had a supply, to a station that had to make the dressings at its next meeting or to me the State Chairman. To my knowledge it went very successful. I was able to locate the dressings and get them sent by mail. When it came to sending bed pads, I did what I call net-worked them. Example: A station sent the bed pads by a member to a Reception, then I got someone from the area at the Reception that needed them to take them to the American Cancer Society unit in that area. My thanks go to Past Grand Matron, Patricia Quibell, Past Grand Officers, Sisters and Brothers who were very willing to give a helping hand and it worked.

This year the State Chairman filled orders of the birds-eye material for the bibs and the bias tape. I sent 22 orders by United Parcel and delivered 24 orders myself. There were seven

United Parcels of dressings sent and ten deliveries to American Cancer Unites myself or net-worked.

The Memorial Cancer Dressing Stations Committee are very thankful for all the fund raising breakfasts and teas that have been on going for a number of years. We pay tribute to the support of the 1957 San Francisco Past Matrons, Past Patrons and to their Chapters for the tea they have every year. Thanks to all the members for the donations this year and we were so glad that we did not have to send a letter out asking for help.

This year the Committee visited many of the Dressing Stations and we were asked to speak at more Chapters. Some of us spoke at other functions also. We hope you have stopped by the Cancer Dressing Gift Wrap as the money they make will help purchase our materials for 1994.

Thank you again, Worthy Grand Matron, for appointing us a giving us the pleasure of serving our Grand Chapter on this very special project that is so close to all of us.

- (4) There can be no "grandfathering" to affect payments made to Life Membership Funds prior to legislative changes made in 1992.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

(By Nancy Thomas, Past Matron (571), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers:

I have the pleasure to introduce the members of this committee: Sisters Collette Serio Gole, Past Matron (133), Robin Merman-Dorian, Past Matron (36). Collette and I have served several times before on this Committee. It is Sister Robin's first year of service on Jurisprudence. I want to thank each of these Sisters publicly for all their hard work on this Committee this year.

Jurisprudence is a year long working Committee. Our Committee performs four essential functions during the year:

- 1. We advise the Worthy Grand Matron as to legal questions;
- 2. We give advice to Grand Chapter Committee Members and the members of Grand Chapter;
- 3. We give opinions concerning questions of interpretation of our Constitution and Laws, applicable fraternal law and its usage;
- 4. We assist in the presentation of legislation at our Grand Chapter Sessions.

This year we have rendered only 21 opinions to members of the Order or committee members. Our efforts this year have been primarily involved in giving advice to the Worthy Grand Matron and the Committee on Appeals and Grievances. As you have heard in the Worthy Grand Matron's report to you there have been several very serious problems arising in Chapters throughout the State. One Chapter was placed on probation early in the year and a second Chapter had its charter suspended during May, June, July and August. In each of these cases considerable time was spent by this Committee assisting the Worthy Grand Matron and Associate Grand Matron in these serious tasks.

My Sisters and my Brothers, we have a Constitution and Laws which contains the rules by which we must act. These documents are in each of your Chapters and many of you have your own copies. I ask you to read them, and abide by these rules. The disregard of our Constitution and Laws and our Obligation taken during initiation led directly to the probation and suspension of these two Chapters. During the year we also provided legal advise concerning the defalcation of our funds and some concerns and issues affecting our Eastern Star Home.

If you desire an opinion from this Committee you must write the Chairman a letter detailing all of the facts which concern you. The Committee will then draft an answer and circulate it among the members. An opinion will be sent to you and the Worthy Grand Matron will advise you if she will make that opinion her decision. Some of her decisions are made permanent by inclusion in Section 7 of our Constitution and Laws.

Worthy Grand Matron, we have enjoyed working with you this past year and thank you for our appointments to this very important Committee. It has been a year of turmoil, but we believe our Order has benefitted by you decisive handling of difficult situations. You have been faced with many unique problems this year and the members should be proud of your tenacity in handling each separate problem with grace and dignity.

Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Nancy. I thank you and your Committee for being ready this year at a

moment's notice to answer all my questions, for always being there when I needed you. I also thank Collette and Robin for serving on this Committee with you.

Sister June Lucretia Barnum, will you present the members of our Constitution and Laws Committee and give your report of this time.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(By June Lucretia Barnum, Past Grand Matron, Chairman)

I am delighted to present the report of the activities of the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws for this 1993 Grand Chapter year.

We have appreciated serving Grand Chapter and I personally thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for appointing Sister Lura Rae and Brother Earl as my "team mates" for the year. For me service on this particular committee was a new experience and it gave me confidence to have the "pros" on hand.

The work of this Committee during the year is principally the review of proposed bylaws amendments from Chapters and assisting them in putting them in proper form and in compliance with our laws before they are sent on to the Worthy Grand This year there have been Matron for final approval. approximately 100 submitted, ranging from simple dues increases to complex revisions of the entire bylaws. The list of requests submitted will appear in detail in the Proceedings. If I could say that these reached us in proper form and in compliance with Grand Chapter's laws and policies so that it was merely a matter of initialling them and sending them on to the Worthy Grand Matron, the task would be an easy one. Unfortunately, there are a disproportionate number of requests which cannot be approved as submitted (well over half) and often it has required a great deal of patience and persistence on both sides to accomplish the result the Chapter has wanted within the framework of our law. We urge the delegates to remember these thoughts when your Chapter seeks to amend its bylaws; and try to help steer your Chapter on a course which will lead to approval without delays or difficulties.

When amendments to our Constitution and Laws are proposed, the Constitution requires that they be sent to this committee for review prior to their distribution, so that we can attempt to have the intent of the proponent clearly set forth with proper grammar and punctuation. This is very sensitive to accomplish, as sometimes we can foresee that the proposal is contrary to some other law of ours or is incomplete in that the proponent has failed to take into consideration other portions of our law to which the proposed amendment is related. Those considerations are not a part of the duty of this Committee and, technically, we could just stop there and let the proposal come before you knowing that it cannot be adopted, even though the intent is clear and the grammar is perfect.

This Committee has acted in a voluntary capacity to try to be more responsive than that. The Committee must report to the Grand Chapter whether proposed legislation is consistent with the general purposes and policies of the Grand Chapter. Thus, there is a point when we must give you, the delegates, our recommendation to adopt or not to adopt the proposed amendments as presented. To bridge the gap between mere form and conformity with our laws and policies, we, together with the Committees on Jurisprudence and Finance, have met in joint session and reviewed the legislation prior to its printing and mailing. When we believe a proposal does not meet that criteria, we have informally discussed this with the proponent, in an effort to have it brought into compliance before you receive it. We hope this has been of value to the proponents and to you.

This Committee has also been responsible for the legislative education session. We hope you liked the changes in the format which we introduced this year.

We have had a pleasing working relationship with members of the Committee on Jurisprudence: not only in connection with the proposed legislation before this session, but also in the approval of so-called "housekeeping" matters when our Constitution has required corrections (as will be separately listed in the Proceedings); and, also when there has been a sort of over-lap between our duty and that of the Committee on Jurisprudence in interpretations when a Chapter is proposing a bylaw provision which is somewhat unusual.

During the year, the staff at the Grand Chapter Office has always been ready to give a helping hand whenever it might be we needed. Sisters Diane and Sheri, I particularly thank you for always being willing to take a phone call from me, knowing that it probably meant trouble. And during this week, we have been grateful for the help of the Secretarial Staff of the Grand Chapter Week Committee. Sisters Suzie Thornton and Della Seith have been on duty and ready to work whenever we have asked.

Our duties for the year have now been completed. All proposed legislation distributed to us has been acted upon and the books of this Committee can be closed for the year.

During 1994, with the new officers in our Grand Family, we expect this friendship to become even stronger. We look forward to working together in this year of service to our great Order.

Brother Jim Craven, please accept my thanks for installing me this evening. I enjoy those special times we have together and have learned much from your counsel and guidance. The happiest business in all the world is that of making friends, and no investment on the street pays larger dividends, for life is more than stocks and bonds, and love than rate percent, and he who gives in friendship's name shall reap what he has spent.

Masonic history informs us that at the building of King Solomon's Temple, the overseers of the work were taught that "Square Work and Square Work only is such as is needed in the building of the Temple." When the Keystone was presented to the craftsmen, because they only recognized right angles and perpendiculars, they rejected it as unfit for the building and "heaved it over into the rubbish."

The Keystone is the last and uppermost stone in an arch and has the added property of completing and locking the parts of the arch together providing strength and support to the building. The overseers realized King Solomon's Temple could not be finished without the Keystone. A search was made for the discarded stone, and when found, it was put in its proper place and the Temple was completed.

Like the ancient craftsmen, we as members of the Eastern Star, must carefully examine our work and be willing to accept new ideas and concepts while building our Chapters. In the early years of our Order, to attend a meeting, you hitched the horse to the buggy and traveled for hours on less than adequate roads to arrive at the Chapter. The meeting was conducted in ritualistic form and after the meeting a social hour was enjoyed by all in attendance.

To attend a meeting today, we jump in our cars and travel for hours on congested freeways to get to our Chapter. The meeting is conducted in ritualistic form and after the meeting a social hour is enjoyed by all in attendance.

So you say, what has changed. In our early days, the Eastern Star meeting was a special event in the lives of the members and in the community. It was the social gathering of the month and members looked forward to it with great anticipation. It was a time to visit with your friends and neighbors and to catch up on local news. It was not hard to get new members because every eligible person wanted to join and participate in the fellowship and fun.

Today Eastern Star meetings are no longer the important social event in the lives of our members or in our community. Technological advances have made it too easy for our members to stay at home. We do not need to attend a meeting to learn what is going on in our community. We only have to turn on the television. We do not need to attend a meeting to talk to our friends and neighbors. Dialing the telephone is much easier. Today, to the general public, Eastern Star is just another organization and the only thing they know, or care to remember about us, is that we wear formals and tuxedos to our meetings and have "secrets."

My Sisters and Brothers, the teachings of our Ritual are timeless. The principles, and values, of our Order are worthy and should never change. However, I suggest that we examine our actions, the methods we use to attract members to our meetings and the image that we project to the members of our community.

We all resist change and look with apprehension on the unknown. I am sure that everyone in this room has heard, or maybe even said, "but we always do it that way." Well, just maybe "that way," is not the only way to obtain the desired result. We must listen carefully to our Sisters and Brothers. We should not dismiss a new idea just because it is different and requires some adjustment on our part. It is up to all of us to seek out new ideas and work toward making the necessary changes within our Chapters to meet the needs of our members.

Prospective members may share some of this apprehension of the unknown when making the decision to join our Order. This is understandable, when you consider that we, like our Masonic Brothers, are not an organization that has advertised our good deeds to the world. We must open our doors and let our light shine brightly before all men.

This year we are asking all Chapters in California to participate in the new Grand Chapter Community Service Program and the General Grand Chapter ROSE Program. These community service efforts do not need to be issues of major significance like solving world hunger or eradicating drug abuse. They can be something on a far smaller scale; something as simple as adopting a highway, collecting books for a local library, or supporting the volunteer needs of a public school. These activities will help change the image of Eastern Star in the eyes of the public. They will provide the recognition our Order deserves and will help to eliminate the fear of the unknown for prospective members.

Like the craftsmen, who initially rejected the Keystone because it was new and different, we must examine the new ideas and suggestions of our members. We must recognize the need to change. ## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BANQUET

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Since Grand Chapter 1992 had been held in San Diego, it was necessary to begin again locating places in Fresno for our meal events. Early in the year, I contacted the Catering Managers of the facilities we had used in the past and found some of them were the ones we had worked with in 1989. We asked them to send to us their current menus and floor plans and reserved all facilities at the Holiday Inn Centre Plaza and Fresno Hilton Hotel.

We also reserved banquet rooms at the facilities we would be using for State Dinners on Monday night. I tried to schedule as many meal events as possible at the Holiday Inn Centre Plaza for convenience of the members and then used the Hilton for overflow. Some Chairmen requested certain facilities in Fresno and all were accommodated.

It has been very rewarding speaking with so many of our members and helping them to solve any problems they may have had. I did request all Meal Event requests to be in writing with a SASE if at all possible. However, if I had a phone call it did not make sense for me to send a Meal Event request form and then have them send it back, therefore if I was able to schedule an event over the phone I did so.

An accurate record was kept of phone calls and postage used so Grand Chapter would be aware of the expenses incurred by this committee. Grand Chapter requested about 3000 meal request forms and these were sent to them. Copying for this committee was done at COSTCO at a substantial saving. I carried forms with me to be handed out if requested. I made Meal Request Confirmation form in triplicate, one to Chairman,

one to facility and one for my files. I sent out a copy of the menu with each meal confirmation. Also noting gratuity of 15% and current Fresno City Tax of 7.85%. We used 10 facilities for meal events as follows:

Breakfasts - 32 Luncheons - 38 Dinners - 20

The Arena was used for the "Gathering of Nations Fun Night Banquet" under the capable Chairmanship of Bernice Dyck.

We thank you, Sister Mary, for asking us to serve as Banquet Coordinators for 1993 and for your confidence in our capabilities.

We are honored to have been a part of this very special "Wishing Well of Happiness" Session.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE "GATHERING OF THE NATIONS" BANQUET

(By Bernice Dyck, Past Matron (89), Chairman)

A complete and final report has been placed in the hands of the Grand Chapter Office, the 1993 Worthy Grand Matron, the Co-Chairmen, Bill and Zane Watts and in the committee binder for Grand Chapter. A file is also on hand with Bernice Dyck for later questions.

I thank Sister Mary Meixner, the 1993 Worthy Grand Matron, for the privilege to serve Grand Chapter as Chairman for the fun night banquet.

October 20 was the date, the floor of the arena was the place. The approved budget was submitted on accommodating 1200 diners - and the count for dinner was approximately 1,537. We covered the membership in California with fliers and by August 1, 1993, we were well over half of having paid reservations for our budgeted figure. Peg Scofield (320) was the reservation chairman and she handled over \$36,000 prior to the event. We had assigned seating and solicited for reservations January 1, 1993 but promised that no tickets would be returned until mid-August. This saved many letters and phone calls as the changes were made.

We charged \$22.50 which covered the following menu: Predressed Romaine La Flora Salad, Bourelaise Fillet Mignon Steaks, Scalloped Potatoes, Green Beans Almonden, rolls, butter, coffee, tea and on each table was a large Lemon Chiffon cake with individual plates for serving. The entertainment was all Native Americans, several Indian tribes from the San Joaquin Valley. They performed before, during and after dinner. For their efforts, \$1,000 was donated to their "keep our young Indians drug and alcohol free" program. This donation was figured into the ticket price of the banquet. There is a video of the entire banquet on file with the chairman and the Worthy Grand Matron.

The favors were 1,600 miniature Kachina dolls; hand made, painted and dressed with feather tops. The center pieces were designed and made by the Worthy Matrons of the Orange County

Association. The decorations were hula hoops which had white butcher paper inside the circle and each had a Native American design or painting which were all done by Bob Moore (557).

The Worthy Grand Matron sounded the 10/20 afternoon gavel at exactly 3:22 p.m. The Grand Chapter floor was cleared in minutes, the arena cleared and the Convention Center crew moved in. The table and chair setters went to work followed by the Caterer's crew and their linens, table settings etc. The decorators went to work and by 5:45 p.m., we could have started receiving guests. However, we opened the doors at 6:45 p.m. and in came the "Indians." I have been asked not to call the attires "costumes" because most were really and truly Native American in nature. There were a few Western outfits, but what a colorful sight it was. At 8:00 p.m. the hot dinners started and in one hour and 15 minutes everybody present had been served a hot and delicious dinner.

Many hands made light and interesting work. Eloise Schafer (242) opened with a "flying feather" presentation. During intermission Eloise Beverly (99) gave hand made porcelain Indian dolls to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. The dolls had been on display in the art exhibit prior to the banquet.

Special appreciation goes to Pardini's Catering, Convention Center, David Bearheart the Omsbudman for Fresno City and his Native American program, Peg Scofield, Bill and Zane Watts, Harry Dyck for his wallet and patience, sound and lighting, nursing staff, guards and all those who worked so very hard to help make the 1993 "Gathering of the Nations" a great success. The committee literally stemmed from the North to the South and the ocean to the valley! We were able to accommodate all those who wanted to attend by holding the affair on the floor of the arena and we gave them the best dinner possible while entertaining them with the greatest bunch of feather-decked and drum-beating kids there are.

#### REPORT AFTER THE BANQUET

It is said -- "If you build it they will come, if you build it they will come!" and I have never had such great help and cooperation from so many Sisters and Brothers in all my life. Almost 2 years of planning became a most successful night. We served approximately 1538 delicious dinners (at least mine was wonderful) and we did it here in the arena where it has never been attempted before. For a while I thought building this event for Sister Mary Meixner was a hopeless task. But with the great cooperation from almost 75 people, workers from beginning to end, we got it built and we are told it was built successfully.

There are too many to thank individually but each of you who had a very tiny task to the very largest job did your assignment well. All those volunteers who appeared on the scene to help, have my utmost praise and thanks.

Sister Peggy Scofield -- what can I say. You handled thousands of dollars and yes, we had a few problems but thanks to the cooperation of our Sisters and Brothers, we got the job done and I thank you.

To everybody else -- a big thanks. I have already written to the entertainment to tell them how we enjoyed them. They are a very religious unit dedicated to their young. Their costs were built into the cost of your ticket.

Costs -- The base was \$19.50 for dinner. The other \$3.00 covered the expense of renting tables and chairs; paying to have the arena retractable seats pushed back and then brought forward. The sound and lighting man and many little incidentals one would not ordinarily think of. We had center pieces done by the Worthy Matron's Association of Orange County. We had table favors and programs.

Yes, Worthy Matron, you said build it; we built it and the final financial report will be given to the Grand Chapter Committee Chairman. For all intents and purposes, the event paid for itself!

Now that it is over I will say: "Thanks for the privilege."

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE ROSE AWARD PROGRAM - 1992-1993

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

The Rose Award Program was introduced by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Virginia M. Painter, in November 1991 at the Triennial Assembly in St. Louis, Missouri. This program consists of four awards: the Service Excellence Award, for 200 hours of Community Service; the Special Recognition Award for services rendered to the Order of the Eastern Star, the Rose Medallion Award for 600 hours of service to your Community or Eastern Star for uncompensated service to one or both of these noteworthy programs. The categories for each award are listed in the Rose Award Brochure. The remaining award is the Rose Award Certificate and will be issued when each of the above awards have been completed.

It seems most appropriate, therefore, that in establishing a special General Grand Chapter Award which is directed toward the recognition of those involved in meritorious, charitable, and/or public service, the image of the Rose should be selected. The Red Rose has long been recognized as a flower of special significance. Electa's Rose is a symbol of her Charity, Truth, and Loving Kindness, as well as her dedication to those in need.

Recipients who have received this Rose Award Certificate, will be entered on a list and sent to the General Chairman, Sister Joan Lopshire, Past Grand Matron of Arizona, so that special recognition can be given at the 1994 General Grand Chapter Session in Tennessee.

This program was introduced after the California Grand Chapter Session in Fresno in October 1991. The General Chairman for this program, Sister Joan Lopshire, Past Grand Matron of Arizona, did not receive the program until late February 1992. In order to expedite the Rose Award Program, Sister Joan Lopshire sent out copies of the Rose Award

Brochures to each of the Grand Jurisdictions. The Grand Secretaries, in turn, mailed them to the respective Chairman.

It should be noted that Sister Ella Norris, Grand Electa 1991-1992 did not receive the brochures concerning this program until late July of 1992. Sister Ella Norris forwarded all the information she had to this years Chairman. Unfortunately, and due to the lateness of the program getting started for the 1991-1992, no awards were issued to eligible members. All of the information with regards to this program has had to be duplicated and sent out to those who requested information plus each of the awards are a paper certificate only. The Rose Medallions were not manufactured until late February 1993 and as of this writing, this Chairman has not received any medallions. These medallions are currently on order. The certificates were duplicated by this Chairman on good stock parchment paper, with a gold seal and red ribbon affixed on the certificate. This touch definitely improved and dressed up these certificates.

This is a collective program and members may apply for one or more of the awards as often as they like providing all the requirements are met. The Rose Award Program started on November 1, 1991, and will continue through November 1, 1994, at which time the program will terminate.

Twenty-three requests have been sent out to Sisters and Brothers throughout our state; fifty-two Awards of Service Excellence have been issued; twenty-four Awards of Recognition issued; one Rose Award Certificate issued and fifteen Rose Medallions have been ordered and are needed to complete this years program. The members who have contacted me have been very enthusiastic and are anxious to keep participating in this worthwhile program. However, I do feel that more information needs to be printed and sent to the individual Chapter. Plus, the forms have been difficult to decipher and need to be clarified.

The Rose Award has been designed to advertise and promote the Good of our Order, and to recognize those Sisters and Brothers who have been involved within their Chapters and throughout their respective communities. We urgently need public awareness of the many volunteer hours of service performed by Eastern Star Members, thus providing a favorable impact upon our future growth.

It has been indeed my honor and privilege to serve as the 1992-1993 Chairman, and I sincerely thank our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mary Meixner, for this opportunity to be of service to our membership, our Grand Chapter and General Grand Chapter.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOUND AND LIGHTING

(By John D. Dodd, Past Patron (643), Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Mary Meixner, Worthy Grand Patron, Gene Stiles:

On behalf of the Sound & Lighting Committee for your 1993 Grand Chapter Session, I would like to thank you for extending me and my Committee your friendship and faith and allowing me the opportunity to serve as your Chairman for your 1993 Session. I was very proud to serve with such wonderful and competent people on my Committee. My Co-Chairman, Judi Dodd, my wife, also served a dual role as a Nurse. Committee members Vern and Gerry Starr, Mickey Tolf, Bob Hopton, and Roy Dale helped the job go as smoothly as it did under the changing events.

This year was a little different in that we rented our Audio Mike System, instead of using our old audio equipment which we put into early retirement. I think this is the best way to go about setting up Grand Chapter in the future. By renting this equipment, we saved on the purchasing of new equipment, which today would cost Grand Chapter in the neighborhood of \$14,000 to \$16,000. Since it is only used for one week of the year, this is more economical.

The cost and availability of the equipment was such that expenses were well below the budget set up for this. I recommend that for all the following sessions in Fresno, the equipment be rented again from the same company in Fresno. They were there any time I needed them and replaced any non-

functioning equipment, plus supplied the batteries for the mikes. They also delivered and picked-up the equipment for us.

The Grand Chapter meetings throughout the year were very productive, and I believe I was able to put my point across that planning and requests for Sound and Lighting are vital in making Grand Chapter Sessions as smooth and trouble free as possible.

The deadline for requirements should be in no later than two weeks prior to Grand Chapter. There will, of course, be last minute additions and changes, but these will always crop-up in an event of this complexity.

The budget set-up for us this year was set for the renting and purchasing of audio equipment and was for \$2,600.00. We were able to keep everything under budget and our final expenses were \$1,804.14 for the 1993 Grand Chapter. The major expense was the renting of the various audio mike equipment. This worked out great as they delivered the equipment and picked it up at the end of Grand Chapter. Also any trouble, of which there was very little, they were there within 15 minutes with new equipment to replace faulty equipment. The idea of renting equipment is the best way to go in the future. The cost of renting this equipment should not go up that much each year, and I propose we see if we can sign a five-year contract with this company so our cost will stay the same each year.

During this Grand Chapter Session we had very few problems. Of these, one was equipment (mikes), being on the same frequency which the rental company solved very quickly. The others were human in nature. It is apparent that the majority of problems happen during legislation and are due mainly to the manning of microphones by non-technical (sound) personnel who do not understand Microphones and insist on tampering with them. This seems to happen at every Grand Chapter legislation session. In my recommendations, I believe I have a solution to this problem.

Another problem was again not being given advance notice of what is going on and the requirements needed for sound. This year it was better than in the past, so we were able to keep the problems low.

This year the Convention staffing was cut in half and their equipment was not ordered ahead of time. My staff tried to handle more than we usually do, plus we were short two members due to a death in their family. In my recommendation, I intend to increase my committee to handle any last minute changes.

One of the problems was we never received any sound and lighting requirement for Wednesday Evenings Grand Rep presentation, so we had to improvise as best as possible with the limited staff and equipment.

#### Recommendation 1:

In the future, audio sound equipment not supplied by the Convention Center, be rented from a local audio and sound company here in Fresno. This at a pre-determined price either per session or under a long-term contract (5-6 years). The requirement being up to the Chairman of Sound & Lighting.

#### Recommendation 2:

That all microphones during legislation be manned by sound and lighting personnel only, and still have Inner Guards there to assist in handling people coming to speak and with the flashlight recognition to the main podium. That no switches on the mikes be operated by anyone but sound personnel.

#### Recommendation 3:

That requests for sound and lighting for any event be turned into the Sound Committee Chairman no later than two weeks before the opening of Grand Chapter session. Any later requests cause many problems in having enough mikes in correct places.

#### Recommendation 4:

Than the Convention office be aware of our requirement for Grand Chapter in plenty of time, so that we have enough Convention staff and equipment. This year we were very short-handed with Convention staff, and in some cases we only had one man on duty during our busy period.

# REPORT ON THE COMMITTEE ON THE "TRACKS" PROGRAM "EARN YOUR WINGS--COME FLY WITH ME IN '93"

The "Earn Your Wings" program this year, "Come Fly With Me in '93" was a resounding success. I thank you, Sister Mary, for your confidence in me by asking me to be Chairman of this program. The number of points collected by some of our members was staggering. I congratulate them on their enthusiasm, not only for our Order, but for their support of our Youth and of the Masons. Congratulations on a very successful travel program in 1993!

ONE (1) HOUR PRIOR TO AND ONE-HALF (1/2) HOUR IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE OPENING OF EACH BUSINESS SESSION OF GRAND CHAPTER. THESE ESTABLISHED HOURS SHALL BE IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE HOURS OF THE GRAND SECRETARY'S OFFICE STAFF OUTSIDE OF THE GRAND CHAPTER ROOM. For the purpose of election, only, registration shall close between the hours of 9 a.m. A.M. and 1 p.m. P.M. on the day of election.
