

While we are in the middle of training our Dragons, please remain seated except in case of emergency. Dragons have hunting instincts that turn toward movement. So please do not distract them by getting up while others are speaking. Please make sure you read your Book of Spells to know when each piece of magic will be performed during the session. You received a copy of this book with your credentials when you registered. We don't want you to miss that special moment for which you were waiting with anticipation, and we will never know when a spell will backfire and the room will be filled with buckets and mops necessitating a change in plans.

At the close of each training session, please remain seated until the Stargazers, and their assistants, the Grand Officers and Grand Pages, have retired. The Dragons want to eat anyone who leaves before the Grand Officers, and to them you are crunchy and would taste good with ketchup.

Don't forget your magic amulets. Although they are hanging around your neck, we have disguised them as credentials, and to invoke their magic you need them to pass our guards. You will also need your magic wand, cleverly disguised as a dues card.

When it is time for you to take your turn to work with the Dragon or cast a spell or two, we will have five microphones available around the room for your use. There will be one microphone on the upper walk that will be available for our residents and others who have used the elevator and cannot comfortably come down the stairs. If you go to that microphone, please tell the Grand Page if you are speaking for or against the proposal on the floor or if you have a question.

For everyone else, in the West we will have a "for" microphone in the South and an "against" microphone in the North. If you are speaking for or against the matter under deliberation, please go to the correct microphone in the West. In the East, on either side, we will have microphones that are for sisters or brothers who have questions about the current issue.

As Sister Kim Hegg reminded you two years ago, please remember that all questions start with the magic words "Who, what, where, when, how, or why." Question spells do not start with "Do the members know, are the members aware, isn't it true that, or don't you think everyone should know." Please do not abuse the question microphones by using them to hide a speech that is really for or against the motion on the floor. If you feel that you know a fact that should be brought to the members' attention about the question under deliberation, then decide for yourself if you feel that fact weighs for or against the motion and give your remarks at the appropriate microphone in the West.

Now it is time for us to gaze upon the Stars in the Canopy of Heaven, and be guided as we do the work of our Order, onward and upward.

It is now my pleasure to present Brother Richard Mullard, who will be serving as parliamentarian during this annual session. Brother Richard would be pleased to meet with you informally if you have any questions regarding the parliamentary procedure of this Grand Chapter Session. Brother Richard, would you please present the proposed standing rules for this session.

Richard Mullard, PP, (147): Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, and thank you for this appointment.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Matron, I move the adoption of the parliamentary rules as printed.

(The motion was seconded, and a vote was taken.)

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: The parliamentary rules of the Grand Chapter Session are **ADOPTED**.

Brother Richard, thank you so much for agreeing to serve as our parliamentarian. We appreciate your expertise, and I have already sent you questions that you were kind enough to answer as I prepared for this session. We look forward to your guidance in the days ahead.

Worthy Grand Patron, it is my desire that you preside.

Arthur Weiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Brother Frank Young, Chairman of our Dispensations and Charters Committee, may we hear from you at this time.

Frank Young, GGCCM: MOTION: I move that the members of Wistaria Chapter UD be granted the vote at this 140th Session of our Grand Chapter.

(The motion was seconded, and a vote was taken.)

Arthur Weiss, Worthy Grand Patron: The motion is ADOPTED.

Sisters and Brothers, I now ask that you give attention to the address of the Worthy Grand Matron. Worthy Grand Matron, we would be pleased to hear your annual report.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

(by Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron)

I have to tell you in advance, this is probably the longest speech I have ever given at an Eastern Star event.

Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers: In accordance with our Constitution and Laws, I present to you this report of my official acts during my term of service, setting forth the general condition of our Order in California, and making such recommendations as I believe necessary for the good of our Order. My written report shall be printed in its entirety in the proceedings.

First, I would like to present my recommendations for continuing the progress and success that we have experienced this year into the years to come. While I understand that recommendations are usually made at the end of this report, my recommendations most properly fit here at the beginning.

Ralph Waldo Emerson once said that the future belongs to those who prepare for it. My recommendations all deal with issues that cut to the heart of our ability to grow and prosper as an Order. One of our greatest failings as an Order is our lack of leadership training, management training and succession planning for those who must lead this Grand Chapter. The history of our Order teaches us that until the 1920's, our Order's Head of State and Head of Government did not reside in one person. As in England, these two positions were divided. The Worthy Grand Matron was our Head of State and traveled to the various local Chapters to inspect them and give Ritual instruction. The business of the Order was given over to the Worthy Grand Patron, who as Head of Government was responsible for supervising and managing the Grand Chapter office, and for presiding over our deliberations at our Annual Session.

In the 1920's, that changed and these two halves came together in the office of Worthy Grand Matron. Then, as now, the Worthy Grand Matron embodies both the Head of State and the Head of Government. It is she, and not the Worthy Grand Patron, who is required under our Constitution and Bylaws to make Official Visits to the several districts of the Grand Chapter of California, and it is she, not he, who is the Chief Executive Officer of the Grand Chapter of California. I make this distinction because it is important to understand this difference, as I present my recommendations.

Recommendation #1 — Leadership and Management Training For Grand Line Officers

While every Grand Line Officer enters our line of succession well-prepared to serve as our Head of State, to make Official Visits, to approve bylaws, to decide whether to grant special dispensations and to select Grand Officers, each Grand Line Officer comes to the position of Worthy Grand Matron with widely differing knowledge and expertise regarding her role as Head of Government. Some may have extensive experience in accounting, others in human resources, others in management, and a few even in law. But to run this Order successfully requires a full range of leadership and management skills, which most of our Sisters have not had the opportunity to gain in their personal or professional lives.

In recent years, we have imagined that we could solve this problem by changing the method by which we select our Grand Line Officers, but it is my observation that no matter how the next Associate Grand Conductress is selected, the same problem will continue to exist. Therefore, my first recommendation is that this Grand Chapter make funds available for each of our upcoming Grand

Line Officers to receive Executive Coaching and Skills Assessment from a professional career coach who can identify areas in which training and education are needed for that Officer to be an effective possible leader and manager of our Order, and who can put together a program of study that will enable that Officer to gain any needed skills to serve more successfully as this Order's Head of Government prior to their installation as Worthy Grand Matron.

Recommendation #2 — Leadership and Management Training for the Grand Secretary

Similarly, our Grand Secretary serves as the Chief Administrative Officer of our Order. She is responsible for supervising the staff that run the day-to-day business of our Order, for interfacing with government authorities, and for assuring that the wheels of the Grand Chapter's business roll smoothly so that the purposes of our Order may advance. Yet our methods for qualifying and selecting a Grand Secretary could not be more haphazard. We seldom know more than a year in advance if there will be an election for Grand Secretary at any given session, and then we choose from among those who put themselves forward based only on a one-page résumé that cannot exceed 1,400 characters in length. Sometimes we have been lucky and we have gotten well-qualified sisters who stay in the job for years, and sometimes we have not been so lucky and the business of our Order has been thrown into turmoil. Even when the newly elected Grand Secretary is well-qualified, the first year or two of her tenure, as she learns her job, can be very difficult for her and for our Order.

I believe, therefore, that it is our duty to better prepare for our line of succession in this important office, and that the person elected should receive the necessary training to perform all facets of the job well. To obtain the necessary training, I recommend that the current Grand Secretary, and all future Grand Secretaries, receive the same Executive Coaching and Skills Assessment, as I have recommended for our Grand Line Officers, to determine a course and study appropriate, to assure their ability to lead and manage our Grand Chapter Office successfully.

Recommendation #3 — Executive Committee and Administrative Weekends

Training is only half the battle in providing successful leadership and management. Managing the business of the Order and assuring that each successive leader is fully informed and engaged in the managing of the business is the other side of the issue. In years past, lines of communication between the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and the rest of the Grand Line Officers has varied widely. In some years, meetings were called every month. In other years, there might have been one or two meetings throughout the

year. In some years, the meetings would consist primarily of the Worthy Grand Matron informing the other Grand Line Officers about problem Chapters, but with no real discussion of the future of our Order. And as I have stated, in some years there were no meetings at all and no information was passed.

In recognition of this situation, several of our Committees have gotten into the habit of spending their first meetings bringing the Worthy Grand Matron up to speed on what has been going on in the Order. Others have refused to engage in meaningful strategic planning because they felt it was pointless if the direction of our Order was going to change every October anyway, and no support could be counted on from future leaders. And still other groups have found it most expedient to do what they pleased and simply wait out any leadership that did not agree with their desired direction since many of our committees and boards have members whose terms are far longer than that of the Worthy Grand Matron.

This problem has held us back for years, if not decades, and some thought there was no solution. But there is a solution and we have implemented it with great success this year. The solution we implemented is the use of the Executive Committee consisting of all of the Grand Line Officers, meeting every month, except October and November, and discussing and deciding each issue brought to the Worthy Grand Matron in her role as Head of Government, to reach a consensus decision that all the Grand Line Officers agree to accept and to affirm in their special year of service. These decisions were recorded in the minutes of our Grand Line Executive Meetings and have allowed us, as a Grand Line, to provide leadership with stability and policies with continuity. This method has also allowed us to approve strategic plans for our Home Board and our Foundation and has given those Boards the assurance that our leadership will support their efforts.

It is important in the consideration of this concept of an Executive Committee that two points be emphasized. First, the Worthy Grand Matron retains all her decision making authority on all issues in her purview during her term of office. She does not have to accept or bend to the will of others within the scope of her prerogatives. If she does not agree with the balance of the Executive Committee, it is her unlimited right to act as she feels is appropriate for the good of the Order, bound only by the four corners of our Constitution and her oath of office. She must understand, however, that decisions made without the consensus of her fellows should not be expected to outlast her year. The second important point is that the Executive Committee scope does not include the Worthy Grand Matron's choices and duties as Head of State. No consultation is, or should be, required with respect to her selection of Grand Officers, her Official Visits, the organization of her Annual Session, and so forth.

But although we have acted as an Executive Committee this year, our Constitution does not address this idea in any fashion. Therefore, it is my recommendation that at next year's Grand Chapter Session the Grand Line introduce legislation to create this Executive Committee in our Constitution along the guidelines I have set forth. Such Committee should be charged to meet at least once a month for ten months out of every Grand Chapter year. Such legislation has been suggested in previous years. But it was my desire to have the Grand Line experience the idea of the Executive Committee during this year and allow us to iron out any questions or issues on how the Committee might operate effectively while preserving the rights and position of the Worthy Grand Matron. My thanks goes to those who recommended this approach and who have refrained from legislating it, so that we could work out how to implement it successfully this year.

In conjunction with this idea and in furtherance of the goal of running the business of the Order successfully, I recommend that one weekend of every month, except October and November, be set aside as an administrative weekend during which the various Boards and Committees that run the business of our Order can meet without the distraction of social events and duties of the Worthy Grand Matron that fulfill her role as Head of State. This allows for a set time for unexpected business activities such as interviewing new staff members and for additional meetings with groups that do not always meet on a regular basis. It also allows the Worthy Grand Matron to run the business of the Order without any need to leave early to fulfill other duties. While it is certainly too late for any adjustments to be made in the upcoming calendar year, I hope that this recommendation will be embraced in the years that follow.

Recommendation #4 - Succession Planning for the Grand Secretary

Constituting an Executive Committee will assure continuity and a smooth succession for our Grand Line leadership, but continuity and a smooth succession are also necessary for the office of Grand Secretary. With respect to succession planning for the Grand Secretary, I recommend that we create the office of Assistant Grand Secretary and begin the process of interviewing Sisters and Brothers who would be interested in learning the job of our Grand Secretary and in assisting in the management of our Grand Chapter Office, with the expectation that at some point in the future, which may not be for a number of years, such person would be a qualified candidate for the office of Grand Secretary. This person should come to the job with appropriate qualifications, and Coaching and Skills Assessment should also be made available so that when the time comes that the office of Grand Secretary changes hands our new Grand Secretary would be fully trained and skilled, assuring a smooth succession in our Grand Chapter Office and an ever-increasing opportunity of professionalism and ability. Given the current personnel in our Grand Chapter Office, and since we have made substantial cuts in our payroll expenses this

past year, it should be possible to hire a person for this role and to provide a salary commensurate with the skills we desire and to make it worth their while to wait, however long it may be, before they succeed to the office of Grand Secretary, without substantially increasing the payroll of the Grand Chapter Office over the amount spent in previous years. While any election to the office of Grand Secretary would continue to remain open to all Past Matrons and Past Patrons who desire to run, this would assure that we always have at least one qualified candidate for the office.

Recommendation #5 — Development of a Secretary/Treasurer Handbook

Succession planning and the passing down of essential information is also important for our local Chapters. While there was a time when each Chapter secretary and treasurer would train their replacement, in many of our Chapters, replacements have to take over these offices because of the disability or death of a previous officeholder. Training for these positions has become difficult to come by and our Chapters have experienced numerous problems because of this lack of transition. While nothing can substitute for real hands-on training, I recommend that a special committee be appointed to develop an informational Secretary/Treasurer's Handbook. While we currently have a publication that goes by that name, the book is more of a glossary and reference guide. It does not contain a step-by-step set of instructions or decision trees to allow a secretary or a treasurer to determine what they need to do, if they have no information about the office at all. The proposed new handbook, with the current volume as a handy glossary, would allow Sisters and Brothers stepping into these offices to get started with minimal instruction, so that the business of our Chapters can continue uninterrupted and without problems.

It is my sincere belief that the adoption of all of these recommendations and the improvement of our leadership, management and succession planning throughout our Order will give us the foundation we need to build success in future years, as we continue to implement our Grand Chapter strategic plan and the other strategic plans that will be presented to you later in this session.

Development and Implementation of the Grand Chapter Strategic Plan

Years of preparation were needed before the Grand Chapter Strategic Plan was finally put to paper. In preparation for my year of service and in anticipation of the need to develop a new strategic plan, since the previous plan was expiring in 2012, I spent the three years of my Grand Line journey observing the state of the Order and conducting surveys, interviews, and discussion groups regarding the needs and problems of our Order that could be addressed at the state level, and to determine what could be done at the state level to assist local Chapters in improving their strength, membership, community service, and Masonic Family connections. In 2012, in the months prior to my instal-

lation, using this information, I worked diligently with my soon to be fellow Grand Line Officers and together we developed a five-year Strategic Plan for our Order, which was presented at Grand Chapter last year. The Strategic Plan allows each Grand Line officer to select different goals and areas on which to concentrate, while moving our Order forward in a unified direction because all of the goals and areas are focused on the same set of hoped-for results.

But for this Year of the Dragon, having the plan was only the first part of the problem. Deciding the issues on which to focus and how to implement programs aimed at its goals also required careful thought and research. To assist in this, I had lengthy discussions with Past Grand Matrons and Patrons of our Order regarding their observations from their years of service, including a lovely three-hour lunch with Brother Loyal Stark who was kind enough to provide me with insights both from our own Grand Chapter of 20 years ago and from other Grand Jurisdictions. I attended the Junior and Senior Wardens Retreat, sponsored by the Grand Lodge of California, to see how their training programs worked, and I had focus groups among our members who worked with me to test ideas and refine concepts.

Using this information, the Worthy Grand Patron and I created programs and implemented ideas to work on each of the six strategic goals in the plan: Ritual, Leadership, Charities, Community Service, Membership, and Communication.

On Ritual:

To improve the quality of Ritual in our state, we began at our Associate Matron/Associate Patron workshop by separating the two groups for much of the event. While the Sisters focused on leadership and management skills, including membership strategies and event planning, the Brothers received six hours of Ritual instruction in every part of our Ritual, for every officer of our Chapters. It was then the Worthy Patron's responsibility to meet with each of the officers in their Chapter, before the Deputy's first meeting practice took place. Each Worthy Patron was given a form to fill out and give to the Deputy at that first practice, indicating their work with their officers.

We then proceeded to change the manner of instruction at our Grand Officers' and Deputy Grand Matrons' schools. We increased the number of instructors and broke the students into smaller groups, who concentrated on the most difficult and detailed portions of our ritual, so that our Deputies would be better equipped to teach our members.

Our next step was to reinvent our "All Member Instructionals." While our previous system of instructionals did give the members more opportunity to see the Grand Officers perform their work, we felt that the utility of the old system in teaching and practicing the ritual was severely limited. The amount of time allocated to instruction did not allow for much depth or repetition

and the style of instruction, watching and listening to instructionals, with no opportunity to participate, was not offering an effective style for learning floor work. Addressing these issues meant extending the instruction time so that more instruction could be given and so that the members could get out on the floor to practice the work with the supervision and assistance of our Grand Officers.

Based on the response of the members, our re-imagined All Member Instructionals were a huge success. The members loved meeting with their Grand Officers to learn their work and to practice their work with the Grand Officers' help and instruction. Although we were concerned that the instructionals would seem long, going from 9:00 o'clock in the morning until 4:00 in the afternoon, with a one-hour lunch break, the members told us they were excited and energized about their ritual work and very pleased with their attendance and participation.

Because the long format would require us to lower the number of instructionals and to provide our Deputies and Chapters with an additional source of information on the details of our Ritual, we appointed four Ritual Team Leaders: North, South, East and West. We asked these Ritual Team Leaders to assemble ritual teams that would exemplify the Ritual for our members at extra instructionals throughout the year, and to serve as a resource for our Deputy Grand Matrons. Our team leaders will provide a report on their activities later in the session.

Finally, we reinvented the format of our traditional Official Visits. We instructed our Deputies that in each district holding a Traditional Official Visit, the best officer for each station -- with some balancing to get a fair representation from each Chapter -- should be chosen to perform the ritual work at the Official Visit. We removed the chairs from the West and exchanged escort for introductions for all others besides ourselves.

This new script allowed the Grand Officers to sit around the room with the members, without requiring them to climb over the members to get on the floor for escort. It allowed the district to present to us its best Ritual work, and we hoped that it would inspire the local officers to work hard on their Ritual work, to earn a spot in that group that would get to perform at the Official Visit. And it cut the length of time spent in the Chapter room at a Traditional Official Visit from two to two and a half hours, down to an hour and a half, leaving more time for social enjoyment and visiting with the Grand Family. Many members told us how much they appreciated the new format. "It felt more like a real Chapter meeting," they said. Others said they loved sitting with their Grand Officers. Still others liked seeing better Ritual work and others loved the reduction of time spent on escort and introductions, particularly the reduction of introducing people who know each other to each other.

On Leadership Development:

To advance leadership development in the state, we constituted the Grand Line Officers as an Executive Committee and met once a month to discuss not only problem Chapters, but the future of our Order. Decisions were made by consensus, and working in this fashion allowed the Grand Line to provide stability for the various branches of our organization, which need confidence that today's decision will not be overturned by tomorrow's whim. It was a true pleasure to work with all of our Grand Line officers and to allow the diversity of opinions that we brought to the committee to help us collectively steer the best course for our Order.

We also followed through on an idea proposed to us by our Junior Past Grand Matron and Patron, Sister Linda and Brother Steve, and directed the Grand Chapter Office staff to develop a procedures manual that detailed how each task in the Grand Chapter office is done. This has already been useful in transitioning tasks from former employees to new ones, and will allow our staff to cross-train in the future so that every task can be accomplished, even if someone is not in the office on a particular day. This procedure manual was approved by all the Grand Line officers, as part of our Executive Committee meetings, assuring the staff that the procedures will remain relatively constant for some time to come.

For our Chapters, in addition to the leadership and management training modules presented at the Associate Matron Workshop, we presented modules on managing positive change and working on strategic planning at our Impact 2013 Leadership Sessions. These workshops gave the members a chance to set goals for their individual Chapters, and to learn how to introduce new ideas in a way that would be comfortable for all our members. You will hear the report of that committee later in this session.

On Our Charities:

On the day after Grand Installation, I began to work on improving our charities by facilitating and moderating a joint meeting between our Home and Foundation Boards of Trustees. At that meeting, we worked out a job description for a full-time Director of Charitable Giving, the expected qualifications and duties of the position, and the manner in which the position would be managed and funded. I am pleased to announce that we have hired this Director of Charitable Giving, and she is already at work on our Home and Foundation charities. She has helped us put together our recent joint newsletter, and has saved us thousands of dollars in its printing and distribution. More details on her efforts will be set forth in the reports that you will hear later from the heads of those two Boards.

But in order to focus the efforts of our new director, it was necessary to assure that those efforts would be taken to accomplish both short-term and long-term objectives. For this reason, it was my privilege to lead a two-day retreat off-site for our Home Board to create a long-term strategic plan for our Home and Outreach Program. A copy of that Strategic Plan is in your delegate packets and will be discussed by Sister Kim Cooke, President of our Home Board, in her annual report. It was also my pleasure to work with our Foundation Board, who has also created a long-term strategic plan which is in your packet, and which will be discussed by Sister Cindy Wolcott, the chairman of our Foundation. I am very excited at the production of these plans, which will allow us to expand our ability to make a difference for our members in need and to make a difference in our communities.

Finally, we were pleased to hold a Northern Festival, added to our calendar this year, in addition to our traditional Southern Festival, giving the members in the North the opportunity to show their support for our Home and Outreach Program.

On Community Service:

In addition to our ongoing support for Relay For Life, Operation We Care, and our Patient Comfort Program, each Chapter in California was asked to hold a community service project in which the members of the Chapter would be active participants. We asked that this not just be a matter of raising money for a good cause, but to get our Chapter members out into the community so that we could be recognized for our good work. To assist with this, I set up a business logo account with Lands' End Business Retailers that allows any member to buy attire with our Grand Chapter of California logo on it and which allows Chapters to get their own version with the name of their Chapter and their number added. In this way, our members can be identified and recognized as they are attending Relay for Life and other service events. The contract will remain open so items can continue to be purchased in the future.

On Membership:

Our largest effort on the strategic role of membership was to revitalize the connection between Eastern Star and the rest of our Masonic Family. We believe that the best way to grow our membership is to encourage the new Masons coming into lodges and our youth group majority members to join us. Each new Mason represents a large potential group of members, and each youth group member that joins us brings activity and an attitude of service and Masonic Family into our Order.

We started by dividing up all the Lodges, Assemblies, Bethels, and DeMolay Chapters by district, and asking each district to put on events during the year to which all of these members would be invited. This allowed us to get our Chapters to reach out to lodges that may meet in halls that no longer have an Eastern Star Chapter and to spread the word about who we are and what we do to eligible candidates, who may not know about us.

At the state level, I worked closely with Most Worshipful John Lowe, in planning out a year that had joint Grand Lodge/Grand Chapter events in it, beyond those usually held every year. In addition to the usual Jam and Jelly Day at the Masonic Home in Union City, and the picnic at the Masonic Home in Covina, we also participated with our Grand Officers and Escorts in a lodge-sponsored Masonic Family Weekend, and culminated our joint efforts with an Eastern Star sponsored Welcome Tea at Grand Lodge. We served a delightful tea to over 140 ladies. Less than a third of them were members of Eastern Star. Many of them had never been to the Grand Lodge Annual Communication before, and they were very happy to have an event to attend that gave them a chance to meet new friends and learn about our Order. The Grand Lodge Grand Line was very pleased and grateful for this event, and they have requested that we continue to hold it on an annual basis.

There can be no greater evidence of the increase of support and appreciation from the Grand Lodge of California, for the efforts that we made to bring our groups together than the attendance of the Grand Master of Masons in California, and his entire Grand Line of officers at the reception held for me and the Worthy Grand Patron this past September. We were pleased, excited, and humbled beyond all words at their gracious gesture of love and support not only for us, but for what our Orders can do together to grow and strengthen the family of Freemasonry.

To encourage service to our youth groups, the Worthy Grand Patron and I have created the "Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron Service to Youth Award." These awards are for members of our Order who have given a lifetime of service to one of our youth groups, while still giving service and remaining active in their Eastern Star Chapters. We will be presenting the first group of these awards to deserving members at our Saturday Masonic Youth Session.

The Masonic Youth Session is another step that we have taken to increase our connection to our youth groups. Instead of a long afternoon consisting primarily of speeches and escort, our Masonic Youth Session will be a Beatles music tribute concert with introduction and remarks by and for our youth members. We want to show our youth members that there are activities we can all enjoy regardless of age.

To encourage attendance and participation by our members, we instituted two programs this year. First, we created an attendance award for the most members and the greatest percentage of members attending their district's Official Visit, and their Chapter's deputy official visit. Those awards will be given out later during this session. The combination of most members and greatest percentage of members gives small and large Chapters an equal opportunity to win, and we were very pleased with the number of members it required to win one of these special awards.

Lastly, we created our Make a Difference program. This program asked members to commit to three Order-wide goals and then select a personal goal to fulfill this year. The proposed personal goals included chairing community service events, starting new Chapter activities, serving on youth group boards for those who had never done so, bringing members to Chapter meetings who had not attended for a long time, and other activities that would make a difference in the future of our Order. I am very pleased to announce that we have given out over 500 Make a Difference pins this year to Sisters and Brothers who accepted this challenge.

On Communication:

As you know, the Worthy Grand Patron and I took on as our special project, "Web Magic 2013," the design and implementation of a completely new Web site for the Grand Chapter of California. Through the generous contributions of you, our members, we raised the funds necessary to hire a professional designer to create our new look with added content, enormously greater ease of use and access to information that is useful to the public and to our members. The new Web site will also serve as a portal for our secretaries and Grand Line Officers to obtain information and send in monthly reports that were previously provided by hand. I am told that as of December 1, 2013, secretary reports will be entered via the Web site instead of by mail.

While the public and member pages are up and running well and the secretaries will receive instruction and training their use of the Web site, the ability of the Web site to feed its information back to our Raiser's Edge database is limited by the Raiser's Edge manufacturer Blackbaud. I am told that they will not allow us to feed our information back into the database without either hosting with them or buying their expensive products or both. However, I have recently learned that there is a product that might be able to act as a bridge to get the information from the Web site into the database, without cutting and pasting by our Grand Chapter Office staff, and it is our wish that the balance of our project funds be used to implement this solution to increase the efficiency of the office and the usefulness of the Web site. Our Web site committee will be giving their report later in the session and walking you through some of the wonderful features of our new Web site.

We are particularly proud of our new Cal Star News online, providing all the features that you enjoyed in our old Cal Star News. The Cal Star News online has local Chapter news articles, Masonic education pieces and a page devoted to each of our Grand Officers where they can post information and links to be enjoyed by their subordinates throughout the state. We are also proud of the event calendar, which allows members to find a flier for an event by opening the calendar and clicking on the event box.

The Web site allows members to find each other, volunteer for committees, and donate to our charities and projects. We hope that by creating this new page to the public and this new portal for communication, our members will be encouraged and have an easier time encouraging membership, participating in our events, obtaining needed assistance, and increasing their philanthropy.

These are the things that we set out to do at the beginning of the year and we are very pleased with the success of all these objectives. It is truly Serendipity; things turned out better than we could have imagined them. However, although that is what we set out to do, it did not turn out to be all that we did. Several other matters came to our attention this year and we feel they were managed to the benefit of our Order.

Grand Chapter Office Remodel

As hard as it is to believe, it was almost 15 years ago that we moved our Grand Chapter Office from San Francisco down to Yorba Linda. It was Sister Sheri Weisser, in 1999, who signed a 15-year lease for our office space in the Eastern Star Professional Plaza, owned by our Eastern Star Homes of California. That lease had a ten-year option and the time to exercise that option came due this past summer. We have exercised that option and also agreed with our Home Board on the new rent rate for the option term, which has been proved by our Finance Committee.

As is common in the commercial real estate industry, in connection with any new lease or lease renewal, a certain amount of tenant improvement money is made available for the refurbishment of tenant spaces. Each year our ESPP budget includes such funds and each time we rent a space to a tenant in our ESPP, we often provide such funds to pay for a new paint, carpet, window coverings and basic improvements. Therefore, in connection with the renewal of our lease and in accordance with the common practice in the real estate industry, the Home Board agreed to provide us with a reasonable and modest amount of tenant improvements, to update and freshen our Grand Chapter Office. Despite some of the rumors that seem to be flying around the state, let me sure you that no per capita funds were harmed or expended in the remodeling of the Grand Chapter Office.

The remodel was done in the ordinary course of running the ESPP, and we were treated essentially the same as any other tenant. However, by the wise use of our tenant improvement dollars, we have been able to turn what used to look like a tired gynecologist's office into a beautiful and professional appearing business office. Since our option period is ten years, it is unlikely that any further work will be done in the office until that option expires, but we are hopeful that this remodel will last us until then.

Sale of the Eastern Star Hall in Sacramento

As some of you may know, there used to be an Eastern Star Hall in Sacramento that was jointly owned by Grand Chapter and by a handful of subordinate Chapters that had all consolidated into one Chapter, New Hope Chapter. The hall was sold this past summer and many questions seemed to have been asked about this sale.

While the details are painful and to some extent heartbreaking, the basic reason for the sale is that the taxes on the property were not paid for a number of years and the county moved to foreclose on the property to sell it and collect the back taxes. The amount owed was so great and the finances of the Chapter so poor that the taxes could not be paid. There were also a great many questions about the percentage of ownership held by the Grand Chapter and the amount held by New Hope Chapter. There were issues with the Hall Association Board about the distribution of funds to be realized from the sale of the hall and there were issues with missing records and potentially false financial statements. The condition of the hall was also extremely poor, with the façade separating from the front of the building, with many ADA violations, and with a host of other maintenance issues.

Because the building was on the historic register, it could not be torn down and the land redeveloped; it had to be sold as is, where is, with all faults, to someone who would be willing to sink the \$1.3 to \$2 million it would take to restore the building structurally and functionally.

Working with the members of New Hope Chapter who were serving on the Hall Association Board, we reached a fair compromise on the respective ownership shares of the two owners, facilitated a sale of the building, and helped oversee distribution of the proceeds after the bills were paid. I thank the members of New Hope Chapter who worked with me to turn a devastating blow into a positive outcome. The bulk of the Grand Chapter's share of the Eastern Star Hall funds has been placed in our Grand Chapter Perpetual Fund.

Local Chapter Misappropriation of Funds

The important lesson from the loss of the Eastern Star Hall in Sacramento is that we, as an Order, are far too lax about the checks, balances, and controls on the funds of our subordinate Chapters. The New Hope situation, and at least three other situations around the state this year, arose from what we believe

to be breaches of fiduciary duty on the part of secretaries or treasurers in our local Chapters. Two sisters have resigned their membership in the past year due to such irregularities. Another is in the process of being expelled for a felony conviction on similar charges.

Sisters and Brothers, much as we strive to always say and think the best of each other, it is a sad truth that we are all only human and perfection is not possible in this world. When people of generally good moral character find themselves in desperate situations, they will act wrongly if their need is great enough and if they think they will not get caught.

We used to use a two-person system of check signing to provide a safeguard over anyone misappropriating funds, but in today's world of electronic clearinghouses, banks will no longer visually confirm the signatures on a check. One person could sign two names or even just one name and the check will go through. In some instances, one signatory is signing books of blank check and giving them to the secretary to fill out as needed, because they live too far apart to bother getting each check signed individually. And in the case of the New Hope disaster, we believe that the person with the checkbook was receiving the bank statements and then creating false bank statements for the audit committee each year to hide the misappropriation of the funds.

It is our duty to protect the property and funds of our Chapters and to remove from our Sisters and Brothers the temptation to borrow Chapter funds when financial hardships and disasters strike. Since our old method of having two signatories is almost completely ineffective in our modern world, I have asked the Finance Committee to sponsor legislation to change how we assure the safety of our funds and to monitor their expenditure. You will be considering their proposals later in this session.

Personnel Changes

It was also my duty this year to supervise and approve a number of personnel changes in our Grand Chapter Office and together with our Home Board to resolve a number of issues and personnel turnovers in our Senior Living Community management office.

Official Acts

Beyond the above actions, I also fulfilled the regular constitutional duties of the Worthy Grand Matron by a series of official acts more fully detailed as follows:

Appointment of Grand Officers

As the 2012 Associate Grand Matron, with the assistance of our 2012 Associate Grand Patron, it was my very great pleasure to choose ten Grand Officers to be a part of our Grand Family. We were looking for members who truly felt the call to service and for whom a Grand Officer appointment would be a

well-deserved and unexpected reward for their service to our Order at both the State and local levels. These Sisters and Brothers answered that call to higher service and have given of their time, their efforts, and their heart to the Order this year. They were truly deserving of their appointments and they have performed with distinction.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

(by Arthur Weiss, Worthy Grand Patron)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished Members, Sisters and Brothers:

Pursuant to Section 56, line item 3 of the Constitution & Laws governing the Grand Chapter of California, I submit this report revealing the work accomplished during the 2012-2013 Eastern Star year. All the duties required of me, by Section 56, were indeed completed. I attended every Official Visit, as well as other various itinerary events.

The Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Sarahann, and I began the year with a set of goals and objectives aligned to the 2013 to 2017 strategic plan of our Order. These objectives were successfully accomplished as the year progressed and are thoroughly documented in the report of the Worthy Grand Matron to which I refer you and as such I will not duplicate them here.

Throughout the year, in my role as adviser and counsel, the Worthy Grand Matron and I worked closely together on a number of matters relating to the government of and the good of the Order. I was extremely pleased with the process utilized to assure that all issues were communicated, thoroughly discussed, and debated, not just by the two of us, but by the entire Grand Line before we reached a consensus on a course of action. Our inclusion of the Grand Line in the decision making process was made possible by all of us acting together as an Executive Committee, the process of which the Worthy Grand Matron has already discussed.

One of the distinctive powers given to the Worthy Grand Patron, under Constitution and Laws Section 56, Line Item A, is to grant dispensations for the formation of new Chapters. This year, the Grand Chapter was honored to grant the dispensation for the first new Chapter in this jurisdiction since 2008, Wistaria Chapter UD, in Turlock. During the 2011-2012 Eastern Star year, a group of members in the Turlock area requested permission, from then Worthy Grand Patron Steve Johnson, to form a Star Club for the purpose of instituting a new Eastern Star Chapter. Brother Steve granted that permission under Section 264 of the Constitution and Laws, and the Turlock Star Club began meeting and taking the actions necessary to request a dispensation to form a new Chapter. I wish to commend Brother Steve for his countless hours of work assembling the paperwork and documenting this process in Order to have a standardized procedure for use by future Worthy Grand Patrons.

Once all the paperwork had been submitted and reviewed and the investigations were completed for all the new members to be initiated at site or affiliated with this new Chapter, I approved the request for dispensation made by Turlock Star Club, pursuant to Section 274 of the Constitution and Laws, and I gave them permission to set a date for us to hold an institution for this new Chapter. That institution was held on April 14, 2013, in Turlock, California, in the presence of almost 200 members and visitors. I had the honor of opening the Grand Chapter of California for the purpose of initiating new members at site and to conduct the ceremony of institution. The opening of the Grand Chapter and the ceremony of initiation were performed by the Grand Chapter Officers whose ritual and floor work were breathtaking to behold, and I thank each of them for making that day so very, very special. Immediately thereafter it was also my pleasure, along with the Worthy Grand Matron, to install the Chapter's first core of officers. At the conclusion, I was honored to declare Wistaria Chapter under dispensation and to pass the gavel of authority to Sister Barbara Clark, Worthy Matron, and to entrust the Chapter to her and her new core of officers.

Subsequent to its institution, Wistaria Chapter UD has continued to demonstrate that it meets all requirements of the Constitution and Laws for a properly operating Chapter. Therefore, pursuant to Section 285 of the Constitution and Laws the Chapter has submitted a petition for a charter, along with all the books, records, and bylaws required to verify its readiness to become a chartered Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction. Later, in this Grand Chapter Session, you will hear the report of the Dispensation and Charters Committee charged with the review of this documentation and their recommendation on the readiness of Wistaria Chapter to receive its charter.

The creation of a new Eastern Star Chapter requires much hard work over a long period of time to reach the point of petitioning for its charter. The successful institution of Wistaria Chapter was due to the incredible work of the committee, headed by Sister Katie Nielsen, and they are commended for their efforts and their perseverance which will continue to make Wistaria a successful Chapter well into the future.

Of this figure, 4,746 are fifty-year life members, 171 are residents of charitable homes, 215 had medical exemptions and 498 had their dues remitted. This brings the total of dues paying members to 19,116. Life Sponsors of the Eastern Star Home total 13,445. All Chapters have paid their per capita assessments.

There are three consolidations that should be final before the end of the year, bringing the total Chapters in California to 167.

We issued 355 twenty-five year pins, 300 fifty-year pins, and 21 seventy-five year pins. We also arranged to give out 18 Dr. Rob Morris service awards and 86 Service awards. We also issued several birthday anniversary certificates for members who reached their 100th birthday or more.

All publications were distributed on a timely basis in accordance with the Constitution and Laws. We were even able to distribute the amendments to the C&L and IB within 90 days of the receipt of the changes, even with a delay in being authorized to send them to the printer.

The small Itineraries and pocket calendars are available for \$4; all are on sale at the Grand Chapter booth. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER

(By Laura Aimeé, Controller)

Good Morning, my name is Laura Aimee and I am the new Controller at Grand Chapter of California. I will provide information on the activities and financial condition over the past year of our various entities.

I will start with an overview of the performance of our investments in general which includes both Endowment and Foundation funds. Over the past year the portfolio has gained 2.6%. This return is on the low end of the range of returns our investments have experienced during the past ten years. However, it does fall within a reasonable range over any given 12-month period. Historically, our portfolio has achieved extremely steady returns despite the highly volatile market environment. The average return over all time periods has been 6.6% per year. During that time, the portfolio has earned about \$5M more than has been withdrawn.

Senior Living Community: I'm going to start with the financial status of the Endowment and how it performed during the past year. At this time last year the balance in this fund was reported at \$ 29,931,000. Currently the value of the Endowment Investments is \$30,642,000, which includes a \$ 700,000 cash account previously held by Merrill Lynch and not included in the total of prior years. Over the last 10 years, our Endowment investment increased by \$ 3.4M after taking care of all our expenses. All of the revenue generated by this fund, along with the unrestricted principal is available to assist in the operation of the Senior Living Community. The cost of operating the Home this past year was \$3.6M. These expenses were covered by revenue, generated by the Home, such as Social Security and retirement benefits, transfers from the operation of the E.S.P.P., and the Endowment Fund.

Grand Chapter: The cost of operating the Grand Chapter of California this year was \$880,000 and the revenue was \$1,065,000. These numbers represent the higher revenue and the lowest expenses the Grand Chapter has from the last 5 years. This revenue comes 46% from Administration Fees charged to the other entities and 16% from Per Capita dues from membership, while the rest comes from all other sources.

Foundation: The Foundation consists of 10 Funds: Marguerite Rennie Cancer, J.C. Lee Cancer, Benevolent, Patient Comfort, Scholarship, Cashion Scholarship, Disaster, Cancer Research, Medical Research and Heart Research. Only seven of these funds participate in the Foundation Pooled Investment Account while the other three funds clear each year and therefore do not have the longevity to cover their costs. Last year the Foundation Pooled Investments were reported at \$7.5M. Currently these investments are valued at \$7.3M which leaves a loss of \$200,000 for this last fiscal year. Over the last 10 years, our Endowment investment increased by \$1.4M after taking care of all our expenses. Like we mentioned before, the Foundation Pooled Investments totals \$7.3M and it is a combination of \$1.4M that belongs to the Marguerite Rennie Cancer Fund, which has requirements for separate accountability, and \$5.9M which belong to the rest of the funds.

The assistance given this year through our Foundation totals \$209,727 of which 40% went to ESTARL Scholarships, 22% went to Rennie, 15% went to J.C. Lee and the balance to the rest of the Funds. Last year the cost to operate our Foundation was \$392,000. This was offset with bequests, donations and income from investments of \$162,000 and transfers from the Pooled Investment Fund of \$230,000. So after paying all the expenses for last year and transferring money from our investments, the California Eastern Star Foundation has \$1,216,000 more than it had 10 years ago in 2003.

Looking ahead, higher interest rates are actually a positive development because this means that the portfolio will be earning a higher yield. According to our brokers, over the long run, we may expect returns similar to those we have earned over the past ten years although those levels may be more difficult to attain. The focus is on minimizing losses during significant market downturns as we continue to promote a well-balanced asset allocation and ensure the principal is protected as much as possible during challenging market environments. Such an approach has served Eastern Star well over the past decade and hopefully in the future ahead.

Wrapping up, I would like to assure you that your SLC and Foundation Boards are taking their responsibilities seriously while preparing their budgets and watching their expenses. They are very concerned with preserving the assets of the charities for the future while getting the most benefit from their expenditures currently. As I have become more familiar with the operation of each entity, I have endeavored to assist them both in budget preparation and in their normal accounting procedures and controls. In addition they are working very well with the Finance Committee and have benefited from that relationship particularly in the area of budget preparation but also in implementing stronger controls over their accounting processes. It has been a busy 7 months for me but I think very productive. I look forward to reporting even more progress to you next year.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you very much for your report. We were very pleased to hire you this past spring, when Brother Russ Kleber retired. We thank you for your service to our Grand Chapter Office and look forward to hearing from you for many years to come.

If there be no objection, the annual report of our Controller will be referred to the Committee on Distribution. It is so ordered.

Barbara Scott, PGM, Chairman: My members are Sheri Weisser, Past Grand Matron, and Brother Jim Whiteley, Past Grand Patron, and I'd like to thank both of these folks.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION

(By Barbara Scott, PGM)

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Distribution to examine the reports of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation, and other such reports that might be referred to it.

Thirty days prior to the Grand Chapter opening, the committee will distribute to the appropriate Grand Chapter Committees the proposed amendments to the Constitution & Laws, together with any recommendations contained in the reports of the above-mentioned Grand Officers, Boards or Committees.

While we were not asked to examine the aforementioned reports, our committee discussed where we would send the 27 pieces of proposed legislation, the choices being the Committees of Finance, Constitution and Bylaws, and Jurisprudence. There were a number of proposed amendments that we agreed represented some degree of a conflict of interest, and should require

joint discussions between or among the three committees. Eleven of the proposed amendments were referred to two or more of the committees. As each is presented at the sessions, listen closely to the committees, speakers, as well as to all the discussions, and vote for the good of our Order.

I know that anything I do that is right is because of you, and anything that I do wrong is Dad's fault. I hope we are making you proud so far this session. Thank you for your report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(By Kathy Young, PM (18))

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee works hard all year long. Following the 2012 Annual Session, the committee met with the Jurisprudence Committee to make all changes required to the Constitution and Laws, as a result of the legislation adopted at the 2012 Session. In July of 2013, in conjunction with the Jurisprudence Committee, we reviewed all proposed amendments to determine if they were in proper form and if the intent of the amendment was clear.

The duty that keeps us busy throughout the year is reviewing the bylaws of subordinate Chapters and their proposed bylaws changes. This year, the committee reviewed 50 proposed bylaws changes; this included four consolidation bylaws. Once again, we strongly urge the Chapters to use the preprinted uniform code and just fill in the blanks. Usually only Chapters with trustees, term limits, or life memberships need to add to the preprinted form. These forms are available on our Web site or from the Grand Chapter Office.

Again, we would like to remind our members that changes to your bylaws do not become effective until the approved form is signed by the Worthy Grand Matron and has been received and read at a stated meeting.

We extend our thanks to the Grand Secretary and her dedicated staff for all their assistance this year. The proposed bylaws changes have been forwarded to our committee as soon as they are received in the Grand Chapter Office, and they are very quick to respond to any of our questions.

Our thanks also goes to our secretarial staff this week, Sister Jean Cook and Brother Chuck Cook. We appreciate their efforts as they prepare our presentation sheets, type and copy any changes, and are ready whenever we need them.

Worthy Grand Matron, we thank you for our appointments to this committee and we enjoyed serving you and the members of the Order.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Kathy, and please convey our thanks to your other committee members for all the work that this committee has done not only at the Grand Chapter Session, but all year long. You help our members with bylaw changes and answer so many questions and I personally thank you for your ongoing support this year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

Another question came from a member of Sister Sarahann's chapter. Again no formal opinion was needed. The question was: Why don't sharks attack Sarahann? The answer: Professional Courtesy.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

(By Dennis Jordan, Right Worthy Grand Trustee)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers:

I am honored today to give my report as the Chairman of the Finance Committee of our Grand Chapter. It is a little bittersweet to give this report as I complete ten years of service on this Committee. Of course, I **did** have a two year break between the two five year terms. To have been given this opportunity to serve has added a special meaning to my Eastern Star life.

I am more than pleased to introduce the hard working, dedicated, highly qualified members of the Finance Committee who have performed an awesome service to the Sisters and Brothers of California: Sisters Tricia Stewart, Donna Doan, Donna Tucker, and Debbie Sanborn; also, our Worthy Grand Matron Sarahann Shapiro, our Worthy Grand Patron Art Weiss, and our Grand Treasurer Fred Schulenburg.

This has been a year filled with many great undertakings. This Committee has overseen our financial endeavors with care and expertise. Our continued relationship with Merrill Lynch has once again witnessed a continuing, solid return on our investments as we follow their prudent and wise advice, thereby again securing the needed income to meet our charitable commitments while keeping our principal untouched and secure.

The details covering the financial undertakings and their successes were given in detail by the Controller in her report.

However, let it be stated strongly and clearly, to continue caring for the needs of our members and those who are blessed by our largesse, we must greatly increase our giving to our charities and to increasing our Endowment Fund that provides for our Senior Living Community.

Another important undertaking of the Committee was the search for the final selection of a new Controller to replacer our Brother Russ Kleber upon his retirement at the end of April. There was an overwhelming number of applications for the position. The Committee worked many, many hours in reading and evaluating the written applications. A group of qualified applicants were selected for an interview by three members of the Committee and the finalists were then interviewed by the entire Committee. Another important undertaking was the much needed upgrading of our Grand Chapter Office. Sisters and Brothers, it cannot be overstated to each of you as leaders in your respective chapters that you are responsible to see that all books and records in your Chapter are transparent, correct and legal, that all reports to Grand Chapter are compete, correct, and submitted on time, and that any money paid to any person, be she/he an officer, member or outsider, is a salary and must be reported as such to Grand Chapter on the proper form as well as to the state and federal offices requiring it to be reported. Please cease playing games, calling a salary a stipend, a storage fee, a computer usage fee, or anything else. I would like to thank the Finance Committee for their valuable input, assistance and cooperation with the preparation of the 2014 budget. This year a liaison was assigned to us from the Finance Committee, who has assisted us with our communication so that the needs of our residents and outreach recipients can continue to be met. Donna Doan, thank you for the extra hours that you have put in and all of your support.

The residents continue to take an active role in the Home by participating in their Resident Council, food committee and activity planning meetings.

The Festival of Trees in December, the Northern Festival and the Summer Festival in June are some of the functions this year that have added excitement for our residents and generated funds to allow the purchase of iPads by our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for the residents to use in the comfort of their own apartments.

Lines of communication with the Masonic Homes of California have remained open throughout this year, allowing us to assist more members through our outreach program. We will strive to continue the open lines of communication for the best interest of all of our Sisters and Brothers.

In addition to the beautiful home in Yorba Linda, we have been able to assist California members this year through our Outreach Program with more than \$232,000 in monetary assistance, bringing a 10 year total of more than \$2.3 million dollars which has assisted members throughout the state.

Please be aware when you review the budget for the Eastern Star Homes of California, that it not only includes the running of the Home, but the Outreach assistance that is provided to our members state wide.

We, the Board of Trustees, have worked diligently to monitor the overall performance of the Senior Living Community, Outreach Program and the Eastern Star Professional Plaza, by reviewing and analyzing all financial statements and taking an active role in overseeing that proper accountability has been established and is being met. The policies and procedures of the facility have undergone a complete update; continued efforts to improve long range capital needs and building maintenance are happening; initial and ongoing staff and board training have been underway, and while there have been personnel changes at the Senior Living Community this year, the Board is working hand

in hand with the Human Resource Manager to ensure that the most talented and qualified candidates are employed. This will enable the continued high level of care that the membership of California expects for the residents at the Senior Living Community.

Our major capital improvements this year have been adding Wi-Fi to the entire facility and adding additional security cameras.

The Board of Trustees has formulated a five year strategic plan that can be found in your credentials packet. As you review it, please realize that some of the objectives have already been accomplished. As the Board of Trustees continues to meet their objectives, the Vision, which is to provide premier life care for all our senior members who want assistance, is our main goal.

Also in your credentials packet, you received a sheet that is being projected on the screen above, entitled "Senior Living Community Endowment – Last 10 Years." This was provided with the assistance of our Controller and Merrill Lynch, which shows that we have increased our investments this year by 2.6% or \$753,000, with a total increase to our Endowment over the last 10 years of 6.5%, which is approximately \$3.4 million. If you look at the graph on the opposite side of the handout and on the projection screen now, it clearly shows that our Endowment Fund is strong, and we are in a good financial position of growth without touching the principal.

To assist with raising funds for our Endowment, we teamed up with the Foundation and are pleased with the recent hire of our new Director of Charitable Giving, Emily Clark, who has joined us from the March of Dimes.

Please visit our booth in the vendor area for information on how we can help you, your loved one or a member in need. I invite all of you to visit with our residents who are seated up top. I also encourage each of you to visit our beautiful Home in Yorba Linda so you can see how your donations are being used and how they are helping our members live a longer, more productive life with the quality they deserve.

If you have questions about the Senior Living Community, I encourage you to talk with any of the Board members. Please think of us often, and when you are planning your charitable gift giving strategies, please feel free to contact the Home to see how your gifts can assist us to "Keep the promises you made when you took the obligation at the altar."

REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

(By Corinne Lacroix, PM (346), Chairman)

The Grand Chapter Audit Committee is charged with meeting with an independent CPA firm to satisfy that the financial statements of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation are in order, to review the audits by the independent CPA firm and decide to accept it, and ensure that the audits conform to national standards.

As required by the Nonprofit Integrity Act of 2004, the independent CPA firm of CohnReznick, LLP, was contracted to audit the statements and financial positions of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation for the year ended September 30, 2012. This was the first year of their auditing contract. In January of 2013, the Audit Committee met with CohnReznick LLP to review the draft audit report for each of the foregoing entities.

The Auditors expressed the opinion that due to the Grand Chapter of California's economic interest in and control over the Eastern Star Homes of California, these two entities should consider consolidating their financial statements, which would follow the generally accepted accounting principles in the United States.

Except for the opinion expressed over the consolidation of financial statements, it was determined that the financial statements prepared by Grand Chapter management were in compliance with financial accounting standards and the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation as of September 30, 2012. The auditors of CohnReznick LLP had performed the audit in compliance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America.

It has been my pleasure to serve on the Audit Committee for these past three years and I thank the Worthy Grand Matrons who appointed me for their confidence.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Corinne, our thanks to you and your committee for working with our outside auditors to assure that we have policies and procedures that protect the assets of our Grand Chapter, and assure that our books and records are kept in accordance with good accounting practices. Thank you for all of your efforts.

However, did you know that her name was Henrietta Zoe – and that only her Gene could address her as Henrietta – and that only happened when he tried to make a point?

This is not a eulogy, but remembrances - remembering a vivacious, lovely petite redhead; remembering the many joys we shared in our friendship, the many golden opportunities that presented themselves. That is a direct quote of my Zoe's. "Opportunities" was the word she used rather than mistakes such as the opportunity to travel through areas unfamiliar when driving we had turned left instead of right to reach a designated Official Visit. Zoe would say, "Just think, we might never have seen this beautiful area if we had gone directly to the Official Visit." This occurred several times, and each time it became another remembrance! The chuckles we shared when Gene and my Ken and several other members of the Grand Family played a round of gold while we were traveling. One special occasion, we were in the northern part of our state. Gene had teed up for a hopefully successful shot towards the green when Ken called out "Look out, Gene, a snow snake!" Gene missed hitting the ball, jumped up only to find he'd been the object of a joke! Of course, these is nothing called a snow snake, but all Gene heard was the word snake! When Zoe was told of this, she shared it with our members during her speech at the next official visit.

Gene and I were Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron in 1959, he in Long Beach and I in Palmdale. We first met those many years ago, but our foursome's friendship truly began in 1971 when I was Grand Organist. Gene and Ken shared much also; both loved gold, a good joke and shared business similarities in the insurance field.

Zoe's year as Worthy Grand Matron was a happy but wet year. Her parasol became an umbrella as we trudged through a heavy rainy season in the first months of the year. Her enthusiasm was always in evidence and enjoyed by all members. Days, months and years of friendship and love; this is my eulogy for Zoe Harris, our recently departed Senior Past Grand Matron.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Denny Rae Grist, will you share with us a memory of our Brother Gene Stiles.

Denny Rae Grist, PGM: I am not going to give Gene's Masonic and Eastern Star history this morning, because that was given at his memorial and in the information sent out from Grand Chapter. Instead, I'm just going to talk about Gene.

Brother Gene, as he was affectionately known, was born in Blytheville, Arkansas on October 4, 1931. He served in the Air Force from 1951 to 1955. While on a three day pass in San Fernando, he met and was smitten with Barbara. When he knew he was going to have another three-day pass, he called Barbara if he could come and see her. She said "Yes" not only to his coming to see her but to marrying him on that three-day pass. It had to have been love at first sight, for their marriage lasted 60 years.

For those of us who knew Gene, we knew him to be a "Man's Man," compassionate, loving and a true friend. Gene was a devoted and loving husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather. He loved life and loved to be surrounded by his family and friends.

Gene was an astute man with a keen eye. When he was Associate Grand Patron and Worthy Grand Patron attending Official Visits and receptions, he would quietly count the number of attendees. He not only knew how many were in attendance, but he could tell you how many from each office was there. He was always quick to notice and compliment a lady and never failed to mention when she had a new hairdo or was wearing a new formal.

He had a quick wit and wonderful sense of humor. He could tease and be teased as well. He gave each of the 1993 Grand Officers nicknames and revealed them in his speech at their reception. He welcomed all the appointive 1993 Grand Officers as though they were really part of his family. He opened his home to them on many occasions and was always thrilled to see them after 1993 was over. He made you feel so welcome and loved, and it was great to be with him and Barbara when the occasion arose.

Gene was an honest man and gave sound advice when asked. You may not always agree with what he said, but after reflecting on it, you knew he was not only right, but trying to help you avoid doing something wrong. He was a great counsel and an even greater listener, but again you'd better be ready to hear the truth.

Gene loved to have fun. On numerous occasions, Barbara would ask him to wear different attire for party nights, etc., and Gene was happy to comply. He was known to wear tutus, women's formals, and even pretended to be Hank Williams singing "Buck Naked" wearing only tight levis and a very skimpy vest.

I could not have asked for a better fraternal dad than Gene Stiles. He, Mary, Barbara and Ed set an example for not only the 1993 Grand Family but for the others that followed. From the time Mary asked Gene to be her "Billy Bob" until he passed, there was never a cross word between any of them. They bonded completely, had wonderful respect and admiration for each other and truly loved one another as a family. When they had to be serious, they were, and conducted their business accordingly, but when it was time to have fun, they went at it with such vigor that everyone around them had a wonderful time as well.

And, oh my, how Gene loved to eat a fine meal or enjoy a hot fudge sundae. When he found great places to eat, he would share them with us and if we were in the area, he and Barbara would often join us. I loved to watch him eat his favorite foods, because watching him enjoy his meal made you hungry even when you thought you weren't. When he found new and great hot fudge, he would share with use where to purchase it so we could enjoy it as well.

Gene was a 50 year Mason who believed in and lived the principles and teaching of Masonry. He was the epitome of what every good Mason should be. He was a 48 year member of Eastern Star and thought it was one of the greatest organizations he had ever known. He was very proud to say he was a member.

Gene was truly the most unselfish individual I have ever known. He was a great leader, understanding and compassionate in his advice, and a true friend. He was someone to be admired for his man qualities and someone who made a lasting impression on our lives. He will be missed.

INSTRUCTIONS OF THE ELECTION BOARD

(by Jackie Bozeman, PM (36/62))

The Constitution & Laws of the Grand Chapter provides that every member of California, if registered and in attendance at the annual session of Grand Chapter, shall be entitled to one vote. When you registered, you received your official voting card and your official ballot. Remember to sign both cards and keep them with you at all times. If you lose or misplace your ballot cards they cannot be replaced, as each person is entitled to only one ballot. You must be present to vote. You may not give your ballot to another person to cast your vote for you.

When there is only one candidate for an office, the vote will be by show of the voting cards. If there is more than one candidate for an office, instructions will be given at the appropriate time.

Our constitution requires a two-thirds majority to pass legislation to amend our constitution and also to amend the instruction book. A simple majority is needed to pass a resolution.

When a ballot has been called, you will be given instructions at the appropriate time as to which ballot to use. Incorrect ballots will not be counted.

REPORT OF THE BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE

(by Pamela Potter, PM (21))

Sisters and Brothers, between October 1, 2012 and September 30, 2013, the Benevolent Fund had a total of 26 inquiries that were received by phone, email and snail mail. 19 of these inquiries resulted in Benevolent Fund applications. The Benevolent Fund paid a total of \$18,901.55 on 19 requests; two of those requests were also referred to Outreach for further assistance. Eight required no action for the following reasons:

- 1. Three never followed up filling out an application;
- 2. One passed away before we could assist her;
- 3. One was denied because the landlord would not give out his tax ID, and the member did not want any further help except for the rent to be paid; tax IDs are required when rent is being paid;
- 4. A member requested that their credit cards be paid, which is something the Benevolent Fund will not assist in paying;

- 5. A member did not meet the membership requirement of good standing for five years;
- 6. Another member would not give out financial information.

Sisters and Brothers, financial information is a key component in determining whether a member qualifies for Benevolent Fund assistance. We cannot help without this information.

This year has been a truly wonderful experience working with our members and being able to assist them financially. I had a few ups and downs but all in all this was a very rewarding year.

A big thank you to my predecessor Sister Sandy Nieder and her husband Roger. Without their help, my first year as chairman would have been very difficult and time consuming. Thank you for the training, along with your advice and assistance. I truly appreciate all your help. You left big shoes to fill; I'm trying very hard to fill them.

The Benevolent Fund works very closely with the Grand Chapter office. Even with the changes in practices and personnel, everyone continues to provide excellent service. I appreciate all your help and advice to a first time Benevolent Fund Chairman.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for asking to be Chairman of the Benevolent Fund. It was a wonderful experience, and I look forward to working with our members in 2014.

REPORT OF THE CONSOLIDATIONS COMMITTEE

(by Michelle Alves, PM (241), Chairman)

A consolidation, by definition, has two meanings: The first, a statutory combination of two or more corporations. As each chapter is like a business organized and run by our Constitution & Laws, the Consolidation Committee helps chapters understand the nuts and bolts of the constitutional process, a

process that does require special notices, timings, meetings, report backs, votes, and most importantly food. An Eastern Star meeting is not official unless we have food. This is a process that needs to be followed precisely because of our Constitution & Laws.

However, I truly believe that our second definition of consolidation guides our process. "Consolidation" also means solidification and strengthening. When our committee is asked to come out to a chapter meeting or an association meeting, the usual reaction is "Oh, no, it's Consolidations." However, we are there to help our members to respect the past, acknowledge the present, and build for the future.

Our first goal is to "respect the past." Remember why you joined Eastern Star in the first place: The friendship, what we stand for, truth, loyalty, faith, charity, love, fraternalism. We belong to an incredible organization that has a heritage of great people and great works.

During this last year, we have worked on 13 consolidations, visited 15 chapters for information purposes, four consolidations completed, four that will be completed by the end of the year, and five that are still in the process.

The Consolidations Committee has been honored to be working on this important and vital community to respect the past, acknowledge the present, and build to the future of our great Order.

REPORT OF THE LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE

(by JD Hammett, PGP, Chairman)

The 2013 Leadership Committee was charged with creating and presenting a state wide leadership program for all of our members and assisting the Grand Line Officers with projects as necessary.

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron asked that the Leadership Programs remain as standalone programs, meaning that they would not be held in conjunction with other Grand Chapter events. One exception: The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron requested a special Leadership Program be presented to the Grand Officers and all members of Eastern Star in Northern California on February 23, 2013 in Mountain View.

The first planning meeting of the 2013 Leadership Programs was held on October 21, 2012 at the Radisson Hotel in Fresno. All Committee members were present. The purpose of this meeting was to meet with and share with the Committee members the instructions from the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. Sister Sarahann and Brother Art had met with Brother JD and Sister Collette and presented the Leadership Program that they would like the Leadership Committee to develop for the 2013 Grand Chapter year. We were instructed to design a program that would involve three specific areas. The first would include "Managing and Promoting Positive Change – Strategic Plan" that would bring the Grand Chapter Strategic Plan into our Chapters. The second would include "Promoting Our Order and Public Relations" dealing with how to improve internal communications to increase and revitalize membership and participation. The third was to teach our members how to promote OES to improve quality of membership and attract new members while creating a positive image in the community. We were urged to utilize the video "Who Moved My Cheese?" emphasizing managing and promoting positive change.

After our first meeting, all subsequent meeting were held via conference call. It should be noted that the Leadership Committee held weekly meeting via conference call until the program was designed. We are a working Committee that has to meet to complete our assigned tasks. After the program was completed, we held biweekly status meetings.

The theme of the 2013 Leadership Programs was "IMPACT 2013 — Be Brave — Make a Difference" to incorporate the theme of our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. (IMPACT, remember, means Involving Members Promoting Active Change Together.) The 2013 Leadership Program modules were:

- "Who Moved My Cheese"
- "Managing and Promoting Positive Change Strategic Plan"
- "Promoting Our Order and Public Relations"

The Leadership Committee created and delivered 8 leadership programs:

- Saturday, January 12, 2013 Riverside Cindy Renner, Site Coordinator
- Sunday, January 13, 2013 Bellflower Debbie Lytle, Site Coordinator
- Saturday, January 26, 2013 St. Helena Sue Heller, Site Coordinator
- Sunday, January 27, 2013 Marysville Beth Massengill, Site Coordinator
- Saturday, February 23, 2013 Mountain View Margaret Wolford, Site Coordinator
- Sunday, February 24, 2013 Ukiah Gee Gee Querry, Site Coordinator
- Saturday, March 9, 2013 Lemoore Stephanie Perez, Site Coordinator
- Sunday, March 10, 2013 Atascadero Mary Aman, Site Coordinator

The Committee decided that the leadership programs would be 5 hours long with a 45 minute lunch break. Sessions would be from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. There would be 3 modules in the program – all modules would be general sessions for everyone. Each module would last 1 hour and 20 minutes.

The Leadership Committee was also asked by the Grand Line Officers to hold a Town Hall Meeting with the members in attendance at the IMPACT sessions. Two questions were presented to the membership; we gathered their responses and then submitted the responses to the Grand Line Officers. The questions were:

- 1. Who should be eligible to participate in the voting on the issue of consolidations of a chapter?
- 2. If you attend Grand Chapter, what parts of our session do you enjoy? What parts of Grand Chapter session do you dislike? If you do not attend Grand Chapter, why not?

Associate Matron/Associate Patron Workshop

The Committee was asked by the Associate Grand Matron Debbie Maiman and Associate Grand Patron Randall Cady, to plan their Associate Matron/Associate Patron Workshop scheduled for July 19-21, 2013, in Fresno.

The Committee created and presented the following modules at the workshop:

- "Getting to Know the Tools of Our Order"
- "Working with Adults"
- "Mining Your Roster"

All members of the Committee participated in the creation of the modules and Collette Serio Gole, Delma Davis, Deborah Winn and JD Hammett assisted in the facilitation of these modules at the workshop.

Conductress/Associate Conductress/ Associate Patron Designee Workshop

The Committee offered their assistance to these Grand Line Officers. They determined that our service was not necessary and chose to develop their own programs.

Burbank Chapter Mini IMPACT Session

The Leadership Committee was contacted by the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of Burbank Chapter to provide a mini-IMPACT session on August 13, 2013. JD Hammett and Deb Winn presented two modules to 40 enthusiastic members. The modules presented were "Who Moved My Cheese" and "Managing and Promoting Positive Change – Strategic Plan".

Leadership Training for the Supreme Council, Order of the Amaranth

Once again the Supreme Council asked our Leadership Committee to facilitate a workshop at the annual Supreme Council Session. This year the session was held in Harrisburg, PA. JD Hammett presented "Mining Your Roster" and "Effective Communication Skills" to the Supreme Assembly delegates.

Leadership Training for the Grand Court of California, Order of the Amaranth

The Leadership Team was asked to come to Torrance, CA and present 2 ½ hours of leadership training for members attending the Grand Court of California Session, Order of the Amaranth, Inc. Collette Serio Gole, Deb Winn, and JD Hammett represented the Committee and facilitated the following program entitled "Energize California Amaranth":

- "California Grand Court Mission, Vision and Goals"
- "Mining Your Roster"

There were over 100 enthusiastic Amaranth members in attendance and the program was very well received. The Grand Court of California continues to work their Mission Statement, Goals and a Strategic Plan and utilize information that our Leadership Team has created for them.

Leadership Training for Colorado Job's Daughters/Rainbow/DeMolay/ Order of the Amaranth/Eastern Star/Blue Lodge

The Leadership Team has been asked by the Grand Guardian Council of Colorado, Job's Daughters International, to present a leadership program for the Colorado Masonic Youth Groups and various adult Masonic Organizations. The program will be presented in the spring of 2014.

Request for Assistance from our Leadership Team

We have received numerous requests for our program from other Jurisdictions. We are only too happy to comply with these requests. Many of the Jurisdictions want us to come to their Jurisdictions and present programs. These details are in the planning stages. Also, it should be noted that our modules on the Strategic Plan have been used by other Jurisdictions to assist them with the creation and implementation of strategic plans for their Jurisdictions.

We have also received a request by the General Grand Chapter Office to send a CD with every Leadership Program we have developed since 2007 that could be shared with other Jurisdictions wanting to have Leadership Programs. We have complied with that request.

Grand Line Projects

The Committee was asked to rewrite the handbooks/manuals for the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, Grand Officers, and Deputy Grand Matrons. The notebooks are now called manuals and have been placed on CDs. The manuals contain general information that will not have to be reproduced each year. Information that is year specific will be provided in attachments and will be very easy to change each year. Delma Davis formatted the manuals, added graphics, and made CDs of the manuals.

Conclusion

Unfortunately, many of our members feel that the IMPACT Program is not for them as they are not officers of their chapters and leadership programs only apply to the officers of the chapters. These members also think that the IMPACT Programs are the same every year and have been told this information by Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. Let this Past Grand Patron go on record that the Leadership Programs are new and different every year!

Our members are also under the impression that if you go to the All Member Instructionals, you don't need to attend IMPACT sessions. This is also false. The IMPACT program does not cover any information presented at the AMIs – they are two TOTALLY different and separate programs.

It is the recommendation of the Committee that the Grand Line Officers need to motivate and encourage their associates and members to attend these Leadership Development programs and to promote IMPACT when and wherever they can.

Once again, the IMPACT programs and information presented by the Leadership Committee change every year. The information can be used and applied to not only Eastern Star but to career and everyday life.

Please visit the Leadership Committee table in the vendors hall, pick up a flyer for the 2014 IMAPCT programs. While you are there create a bumper sticker promoting Eastern Star and put it on the car we have there. We challenge each and every one of you attending this session to come to our 2014 IMPACT programs – you won't regret the time you spend with us.

Thank you to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for their support this year. The members of your 2013 Leadership Committee were honored to serve the members of our Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF THE RITUAL TEAM

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron gave each of us a challenge to gather together an area ritual team that could be mobilized for additional instruction and demonstrations of the Ritual in order to achieve Ritual Excellence in 2013.

It was with great enthusiasm that our team leaders attended Grand Officer School for their instruction, and their teams attended the local Grand Officer All Member Instructionals training sessions to be prepared for our assigned task. Armed with the AMI experience and with focus on "this is how it's done, now you fill the chair and do it..." we found that the members were enthusiastic, both enjoying themselves and greatly benefitting from this individualized training. They are still talking about it with hopes that this new learning tool will continue, so they can "see it done" and then "do it."

As with anything that is new, it takes time for the members to embrace the concept; but we have done our very best to assist in achieving Ritual Excellence up and down the state. We thank you for our appointments and thank our individual team members for their enthusiasm, assistance and love of good Ritual work in completing our assignment.

Brother Clair, would you please introduce the residents and staff of our Senior Living Community, and give us the report on your Home.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SENIOR LIVING COMMUNITY

(by Clair Meske, Executive Director(106))

It is an honor and my privilege to bring this report to you today.

First, I draw your attention to the upper level in the South. I would like to introduce some of our Residents; Sisters Barbara Miller, Cloe Hyder, Jane Suermann, Mary Brown, Betty Stipp, Sharon Viedma Aguilar, Rita Wade and Brothers El Stipp and Joe Morris.

We could never do what we do every day let alone bring so many Residents here for our Annual Session without some of the best staff in the industry. I would like to introduce the exceptional staff who are here with us today; Office Manager, Kat Farris, Activities Director Erin Wilson, Mary Dixon Outreach Assistant in the north, Florita Zita Licensed Nurse, Rosie Ruiz Caregiver, and Angelo Purnell Activity Driver. Thank you for all you do every for our Residents.

Early in my career, I experienced a tragedy that did not have to happen. It so profoundly affected me, that it has shaped my career, and to this day, is the passion that drives me to provide the best quality of care for seniors.

At the time, I managed a multi-level care facility — independent, assisted living, and skilled nursing. We received a frantic call from a discharge planner at a local hospital who didn't have anywhere for her patient to go. A woman, who had been in the hospital for treatment of severe dehydration and malnourishment, was ready to go home. But her home wasn't a safe environment for her any longer because she couldn't take care of herself. The discharge planner knew the women had little funds available but was trying to find her the best placement possible. Faced with many varying options, she knew that the women's fate was in her hands. That is why she called us. Our facility was a short distance from the community, neighborhood, friends, and family the woman knew. We had the ability to provide her the best options for long term care. We had the ability to help her financially, emotionally, and physically. She didn't need to experience dehydration or malnourishment, she didn't need to have to have the memories of being rushed to a hospital or neighbors scared and not knowing her fate. There are so many ways to avoid these situations. This was a tragedy that did not need to happen.

When I learned the cause of her dehydration and malnourishment, I was shocked and appalled. Like any caretaker, she was concerned with the health of her companion; for her, that meant providing for her cat and placing its needs above her own. Her cat was her only companionship, and that she took very seriously. She was lonely and sad, and her cat provided her what others had not. She had greatly neglected to take care of herself and so much of her energy and funds were exhausted. The only reason anyone had known something was wrong, was because her neighbors, used to seeing her daily hadn't seen her at all. With worry and concern, they called the police who later found her laying on her floor, for what they think was days.

The real tragedy was that if she would have asked, or someone had been there to offer assistance and help her make better choices for herself, this 75 year-old woman, could have lived out her life differently. A friend, family, or neighbor could have provided her company and helped her with what she needed. Instead she was alone and faced obstacles by herself. She could have moved in to our facility as an independent resident and lived with her cat for many, many more years while also having the support, companionship and worry free life she so desperately needed. But instead, she was so debilitated, that she never recovered enough to return to her home or move from the skilled nursing unit. She lived out her last few years in a shared room in a nursing home, because her body and mind never fully recovered from the health set back or the emotional abandonment she faced. There are some events in your life that you can never fully recover from.

Many people experience loneliness and depression in their old age either as a result of living alone or due to lack of close family ties and reduced connections with their Eastern Star sisters and brothers. This results in an inability to actively participate in their community, and fill a void in their life.

Studies have found, rates of loneliness in older populations can be as high as 60%, that is 6 out of every 10 of us in this room. Researchers have found that poor health and well-being among older adults who are lonely causes them to be at increased risk for nursing home placement because they can no longer care for themselves. What appears certain is that isolation and loneliness are relevant issues more common for older women. Women are more vulnerable to higher levels of loneliness. Like the woman in my experience, she proved the statistic right.

Our Senior Living Community takes this threat head on. We strive to provide the companionship, safety and comfort that each and every one of our sisters and brothers require. We urge our families and friends to help provide ongoing support to help make transitions easy — while most importantly remaining connected to the many things and people we love.

What does this have to do with you here today? Within our wonderful Order, you could be that brother or sister that can helps someone to make better choices for themselves. Stand hand in hand with me, and make this a possibility.

First, The Senior Living Community has an opening for members who are active and independent; 65 through early 80's. Our home is unique, full of love and nurturing all residents so that each and every one can live life to the fullest.

To face many of the rising costs and financial struggles our seniors face, we have designed a new program for residents. We **need** your help to spread the word about our latest move in option: the 75/25% asset option. Want to keep your car? Would you like to manage more of your financial affairs? Those are just two of the advantages of the 75/25% option.

Let's not overlook your Outreach Program. We help members find resources in their local area. If we knew about the woman I talked about, we could have helped her take care of her cat, helped her buy groceries and brought her home cooked meals. We could have been her friend, her caretaker and source of support when needed. Through our Outreach Program, we help so many in the Order who need this type of care. And, if the member qualifies and it is safe for them to stay in their own home, we may even be able to assist financially.

With your help, we can affect the lives of so many and help change their fates for the better. Loneliness is awful, and no one should face this. By pledging to help, your donations will have a direct positive impact. Immediately a brother or sisters' life will become better. Let me emphasize again, that within our wonderful Order, **you** are that brother or sister that can help someone to make better choices. **you** are the person who can help raise awareness of The Senior Living Community and that we have an opening for residents who are active and independent; 65 through early 80's.

Loneliness should never be an issue within our Order. No matter if you're a man or woman, it's important to be surrounded by people who emotionally support you. We are social beings; we thrive with having friends and family and being loved. Join us in this journey to fulfill our mission; the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California helps seniors in so many ways in both our home and in the community. It helps the operating expenses of the home so that we can provide wellness, ongoing support as well as provide passionate skilled staff. Through donating or becoming part of the Million Dollar Club **you** can make the difference.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: We thank the residents and staff members for joining us this afternoon. I have a small little gift for you I'm hoping Brother Clair will accept.

When I and Brother Art had our reception, Brother Rich Clinton videotaped it. And it was his idea that he could burn an extra disc, and perhaps sometime you can have a movie night and watch the reception of the Worthy Grand Patron and Worthy Grand Patron. I thought some of you might enjoy that. So this is for the residents.

Brother Clair, I want to thank you very much for your report. I want you to know how much I appreciate the work and efforts that you have made this year. We have faced some challenges this year, and I believe that we are all stronger and our Senior Living Community is stronger for them. Thank you for your work and care, for our Sisters and Brothers, and to assure that they continue to have a safe and happy home.

Sister Denise Armstrong, Chairman of our Credentials Committee, may we have your introduce your committee and give your report at this time.

Denise Armstrong, PM (348), Chairman: It has indeed been my honor and pleasure to serve as the Chairman of the 2013 Credentials Committee. Worthy Grand Matron, when you asked me to take on this committee, I wasn't sure if I could do it. I decided to make a deal with you thinking you wouldn't accept the deal. I would be chairman of this committee if you would come to my chapter and install me as Worthy Matron. I just knew you'd be too busy to come on a week night. Well, I was wrong, so here I am fulfilling my part of the deal. It has been fun and a great way to meet many new friends who are our Sisters and Brothers.

At this time I would like to introduce the Standing Committee: Denise Armstrong, Chairman; Joan Taylor, Co-Chairman; Deanna Carr, Marlene Larsen, Karen Nuccio, Terri Parks and Ruth Smith.

REPORT OF THE RELAY FOR LIFE COMMITTEE

Thank you for appointing me as the Chairman of the Relay for Life program for Grand Chapter this year. Relay for Life participation brings the name of Eastern Star to the public as well as giving our members a forum to work with our Masonic family to strengthen our bonds of friendship, fellowship and community service.

This year I sent a letter to each chapter through our website asking for those participating in Relay to respond to me as to how they were involved. Stella Chapter advised that they participate in the Yreka Relay along with Trinity Star Chapter in Weaverville. Molino Star is a virtual team at the Red Bluff Relay for Life. Their event was May 18th and they donated \$500 to the relay and were

recognized in the event program as well as on each participant's tee shirt. Ethel White is the captain for the Kern County Order of the Eastern Star team. Their relay is the first weekend of May in Bakersfield. Vista Cerrito participated in the Martinez Relay held July 27-28. Their name is Fighting Momma and the captains are Dan frost and Theresa Markert. Their team raised around \$4,200 and the event raised about \$69,000. Kristin Frost will be event chair next year — a huge responsibility.

Sarah Moore is the team captain of the Masonic Family and Friends team at the Castro Valley Relay, held July 20-12. They had 51 team members from the Masons, Eastern Star, Job's Daughters, Rainbow, DeMolay and Shriners. They raised close to \$4,000.Sarah was also a committee member as the Volunteer Chairman and their team participated in the luminaria event. The Castro Valley Relay raised a total of \$94,000.

Janet Smith is the team captain for the Eastern Stars team at the Pacifica Relay for Life. She reported that Summit Chapter had a team in the Oakdale Relay on April 27–28.

Ellen Kneebone is team captain for the Eastern Stars team at the Pacifica Relay for Life. Team members are from Golden Gate, Pacific Star, Del Mar and Unity Chapters. They raised a total of \$10,675 for their Relay. Ellen also worked the luminaria booth at the Half Moon Bay relay on July 27-28. They formed Team Del Mar Chapter and raised \$500.

Marsha Price was team captain in the new Mill Valley Relay. Chapter member Eleni Ross was the survivor speaker for the kick off ceremony. The Relay was on June 22-23. Their team had 18 members and was named Mill Valley OES All Stars. They raised \$2,400.

Kelli Padilla reported that the Riverside Relay for Life team raised \$4,742, with 54 participants (27 of whom were cancer survivors) and the event raised \$80,138.36.

Ellen Olsen was team captain for the Monterey Bay Stars in the Santa Cruz County Relay. They raised \$2,000, had 23 OES members who visited their campsite in addition to friends and family. A DeMolay member participated in the color guard at the opening ceremony.

I was a co-captain of the Gold Rush Masonic Family at the Placerville Relay held Sept. 7-8. We had Eastern Star, Masons, Rainbow and Job's Daughters involved. Our team raised \$1,234.64 and the event raised \$69,089.75. I was also the offline donation chairman for the committee for the second year and have volunteered for a third.

I appreciate the information sent to me this year. I'm excited to see that we have many members involved, not only at the team level, but the committee level. Thanks to all of you who support Relay for Life and the programs funded by the American Cancer Society.

It is a nonprofit organization that helps families who are in emergency situations with their children. They are collecting items of donations to fill the totes for all families of infants and children who are admitted into the UC hospitals' intensive care nursery. Often the families leave home because these children are airlifted to these hospitals so quickly that they cannot grab even the barest essentials for themselves, as the moms of Ethan & Teyler have experienced firsthand.

This is a small charity that has started in Ferndale, California. These two youngsters were stricken with cancer and had to be airlifted to UC Davis and to Stanford University. These totes would fill the essentials that they need when these parents go with their children, after they have been airlifted and they are sometimes with them for one week, two weeks, three weeks. These Totes will be filled with essentials for the parents and the families of these children to help them when they walk into the hospital so that they do not need to go to the stores and get these essentials for themselves. Daniel Hales, WP (141): Sarahann, I have watched these last five years, first while you were Grand Warder and then as you went up the Grand Line, and I have seen how much of your work, dedication, your passion, your genius, and your love that you have poured into this Order, and into this Grand Chapter, and I wanted to say that I am so proud of you, that I love you, and that this is just a tiny thing of what you are owed.

Sarahann Shapiro, Worthy Grand Matron: We want to thank all four of you for participating in the presentation of these jewels. We look forward to wearing them as a memory and a token of a journey that we have taken, all of us together during the past few years and of course during this very special year, and I love it. FAREWELL ADDRESS

Sarahann: Sisters and Brothers, one year ago in this place you entrusted us with the leadership of our Order in this Grand Jurisdiction, and one year ago, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence we pledged our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor to lead you well.

Arthur: Now, night is falling and we have come to our journey's end. Soon we will join those who came before. We leave you with the work that we have done and the ideas that we have shared. We have shown you that a bright future for our Order is possible, if you are willing to Be Brave and continue to work to achieve it.

Sarahann: At this time, we must do our best to thank those who helped show us this future and to turn our ideas into actions and events. We know that we will miss some that we should thank and we ask your forgiveness. Please accept our general thanks to all our Sisters and Brothers. If we fail to mention you, it is purely accidental.

Arthur: We begin with our Dragon Riders and Wizards, our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons. Over a year ago, we challenged you to Be Brave and to Make a Difference in your chapters. Many of you embraced this challenge and held Masonic Family events and community service events, and many of the chapters that have done so have initiated new members this year. Some

chapters have held as many as four initiations in the past year and initiated as many as a dozen new members. But to all of you who tried your best to follow where we were leading, thank you for the difference that you have made and will make in your own respective chapters.

Sarahann: To our many Standing, Special, and Grand Chapter Week committee members, thank you for stepping forward and saying yes when we asked you to serve our Order. Everything that we accomplished as an Order is only possible because of your efforts, whether your work involved meetings, craft projects, helping our members, raising funds or fighting with computers, we thank you for the efforts that made this year brighter for everyone.

Arthur: To our Grand Representatives, thank you for saying yes when you were asked to serve our Order in this very special capacity, and thank you for spreading the sunshine of California around the globe.

Sarahann: To our Wingleaders, our Deputy Grand Matrons. We started you off, as we meant to continue, exhausted and exhilarated, and you have carried that enthusiasm into your chapters. I lost count of the number of official visits where you set up the same number of chairs that your district had always set up, and then found yourselves squeezing in more tables and putting up more rows of chairs. Somehow we always managed to get everyone into a seat, but boy was it close several times. We enjoyed every one of our official visits with their creative themes and beautiful decorations. Each of our 21 social/official visits had an interesting entertainment or education program, and the ritual performed at our 17 traditional visits was the best I can remember in my six years on the road. We are very proud of all the efforts you made to energize your chapters, improve our ritual work, and increase participation throughout our state. We wish you clear skies as you fly into the future.

Arthur: We also thank you, Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, who shared their insight, skills, talent, and knowledge with us. Without you, we could not have put together our Grand Chapter's strategic plan, improved our schools of instruction, and appreciated the diversity of opinion and members who are part of our Grand Jurisdiction or achieved our results this year. You built the foundation for us to build higher, just as we hope the future years will build on what we have done. Thank you for everything you have done to help us, guide us, and support us this year. And Sister Barbara and Brother JD, you and your 2009 Grand Family have our special thanks for your love and faith in each of us, and for all the efforts that you put in to help us assure our success. We love you all.

Sarahann: What can we say to our Stargazers and their escorts? No matter how you came into this family, we have all been family together. Our journey would not have been nearly so incredible without each and every one of you, and there is no one that we would have rather had with us during this year of a

lifetime. I know it's hard as we sit here today to remember not to cry because it's over, but to smile because it happened. Even if we can't manage that today, someday we will achieve it. While the special year of service may be over, our friendship and our love will last a lifetime. No matter what any of you may go on to do, I know that we will always cherish and love one another. We will be Stargazers forever, always looking to the infinite heavens and being inspired by the magnificence of God's creation.

Arthur: We also offer our help and support to all those Stargazers whose time of service will continue this evening and on into the years to come. Our Grand Marshal, now Associate Grand Conductress elect, and our Grand Line officers, the members do not often see the important work that we do to run the business of this Order. But we have accomplished great things this year because we all worked together, made decisions together, shared our viewpoints, and charted a course that worked for all of us. The continuity and stability that our efforts have given to the business of the Order is an incredible achievement that I hope will serve you well, as each of you takes in your hands the important task of leading our grand jurisdiction. We wish you all the best in the years ahead, and know that we are here to give whatever assistance you may call upon us to provide.

Sarahann: Finally, Brother Daniel and Sister Barb, you have been the pillars against whom we have leaned these past years. No matter what we needed or asked, you were there to do anything you could to ease our burden and make our year better. We have all lost track of the number of envelopes stuffed, copies made, dinners fetched, presents wrapped, and hours and days used up with preparing, writing, packing, traveling and attending.

No words do justice to the amount of love and appreciation that we have for you, nor are there any words sufficient to express our gratitude for the enormous sacrifices you have made during these years. So we can only say "Thank you from the bottom of our hearts and we love you."

Arthur: When each of us was asked to serve as the leaders of this Order, Sarahann, when she was asked to serve as Grand Marshal, and I, when I was asked to serve as her Associate Grand Patron, we accepted that call to service because we believed that we could make a difference in our Order. We believed that our Order could be better and stronger, that the future growth would depend on certain changes being made. Making things different requires courage and a vision of a goal clear enough to move forward in the face of adversity and opposition. We believe that we had those qualities and wanted to take a chance, and see if we could help our Order move forward into the future.

Sarahann: The problem, as we saw it, was that our Order had become relatively disconnected. We were no longer strongly connected in the communities in which we lived, we were no longer connected to the other branches of our Masonic Family, we were no longer strongly connected to our newer and stronger members, and we were no longer strongly connected to the needs that society now places on our members.

But here and there around the state, we found bright spots of hope and promise. While many chapters were no longer active in their communities, some were busy doing great things and being recognized for their great works. While many chapters were not closely tied to their local lodges or youth groups, some chapters had wonderful Masonic efforts that brought together everyone for fun and fellowship.

While many chapters had brought in less than a dozen new members in the past decade, some chapters had been adding members by the handsful and keeping those new members involved and active, growing the strength of their chapters. And while many chapters were not willing to change their methods and traditions, to move from a world where women were home all day, to where women work all day, some chapters had done so, shortening their meetings and becoming more tolerant of those who were coming from meetings straight from work. From every problem that we saw, there were always some chapters who had solved it.

Arthur: The challenge, therefore, was to find a way to translate spots of success into statewide accomplishment. We considered the successful and the not so successful, and we distilled what we saw into three basic ideas about our membership and our participation in the Order.

The first basic idea was that we do this for fun. No one pays us to participate and some of us go into debt doing so. Events have to be interesting and engaging. If we are bored, we tune out. If we think our time will be wasted, we don't attend. Our time has a value and we have to use it wisely, for none of us know how much of it has been entrusted to our care. We had great attendance at our first All Member Instructional, but our attendance was even more impressive at later events, once word spread that our new format was exciting, interesting and informative.

We had great attendance at our first Official Visits. But those are always well-attended because, by tradition, a whole bunch of extra people attend those first ones in the North and South. Our Official Visit attendance was even more impressive at later visits when members heard about what we were doing, and especially that the time in the chapter room was only an hour and a half, and that we had cut out 99 percent of the escort and 75 percent of the introductions. If people vote with their feet, then the feet have spoken. If it is fun, people will come.

Sarahann: Our second basic idea was that we do this to satisfy our desire to serve others. When we help those less fortunate, we feel better about ourselves. When we belong to a group that serves others, we feel more positive about our membership. Our youth group members come to us from years spent living a life of service. How can we bring them into our chapters and fail to provide them with the opportunity to serve? What is our purpose for being, if we do not make a positive difference for each other and for our communities? For a chapter to grow in new members and retain its existing members, it must be not just the body, but the soul. God's answer to the question "Am I my Brother's keeper?" is "Yes." And the sages teach us that when a person saves one life, it is as if he had saved the whole world.

I confess that I can be quite stoic in the face of disappointment and adversity, but I was often overwhelmed with pride when I heard stories of the incredible good work that our chapters are doing to feed the hungry, to teach poor children, and to ease the suffering of those who are stricken by illness. Chapters who are most committed to these activities often have the most committed members. They have purpose, focus, and drive, they prosper and they grow. If you serve others, you will serve together.

Arthur: Our third basic idea was that we do this so that we can belong to a greater family. If we do not feel the love, support, and comfort of our Sisters and Brothers, then we have nothing. If we do not perceive our chapter as a happy and accepting place, then we will not attend. If we receive rejection, scorn, or criticism then we will go away and not come back.

Maya Angelou once said that "People will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel." Our ritual teaches us that candidates enter our portals prepared to receive the favorable impression of our mysteries and aims. Our new members come to their first meeting, their first instructional, their first official visit, and their first Grand Chapter Session excited, but sometimes nervous and worried about what to do. For members who come to us from another branch of our Masonic Family this problem is even more pronounced, because they may have a set of responses in their heads that are close, but not quite right for us. When we show happiness at their presence and tolerance for any accidental mistakes, they respond positively and return. When we start off with criticism and intolerance, they often run away and never return.

For our Brothers, when we as a chapter have a positive relationship with their lodge, they are encouraged in their chapter membership and their participation in both organizations is increased. But when the chapter and the lodge had no relationship or worse a negative relationship, then it is our membership that suffers, as the Brother is discouraged from participating in or joining our Order, and he then keeps the rest of his family away from us as well.

When our youth group members see the members of our Order helping them, then they are encouraged to join us when they reach their majority. But when they do not feel that support, they see no reason to be with us when we were not there for them.

When the tide comes in, all boats rise. When we act positively for the good of our lodges and youth groups, it comes back to us tenfold. Chapters with strong ties to their lodges and youth groups gain active members and have started growing enormously with the influx of new Masons and their families, and the renewed and positive ties between our Grand Chapter and the Grand Lodge of California, if maintained and strengthened, can help us both achieve beyond our imaginations.

Sarahann: Using these three basic ideas as our guiding principles gave us a focused vision of what we wanted to do and what we needed to try. All of the programs, projects, and events that we created or reinvented were designed to incorporate these ideas. However, we did not fool ourselves into believing that what we wanted to do would be easy. We knew that change is not popular; some people think it is a dirty word. We know that no matter what we did, some people would love it and some would hate it. We knew that no matter what we did, we would win friends and make enemies.

At the end of the day, however, none of that mattered to us if we ended our year of service having shown you, not just told you, but shown you the success that our Order can achieve a bright future guided by these three basic ideas: "Make it fun, make it serve, make it family." Perhaps all that we have done can be explained best if we end now as we began on Thursday morning with a quote from Ralph Waldo Emerson. Emerson said "The purpose of life is not to be happy, it is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, to have it make some difference that you have lived and lived well." We embarked on this year with high hopes that we would live up to this standard, and we are well pleased with our results. Our time is now finished and our labor is done.

Now it is for you to decide what to do with the difference we have made, and how you will carry this Order forward into the future. We hope that you will do it with spirit, with tolerance, and with perseverance.

ADDRESS OF THE SCI MASTER COUNCILOR

In just a moment, we will hear from one of those recipients; one of our Limitless Labradors is going to speak on behalf of the Scholarship Committee.

This year, the amount of money that might normally be expected for scholar-ships was bolstered from an increase in money from the Thelma Bailey Fund, as well as an increase from the Campbell-Dillon Fund. Because of these and other funds, we were able to award more than \$90,000 in scholarships. We received a grand total of 213 applications this year and awarded 107 scholarships. These scholarships come from our Foundation, and there are approximately nine of those funds, and the largest of those funds are the general funds in Eastern Star, and also this year the second largest fund was the Thelma Bailey Fund. I'm not going to read all nine of those funds, I'm sure you don't want to hear about them, but they are available for us to use.

As in any committee, there are several people that are involved that I have to thank. I want to thank all who participated in this very worthwhile project. There are many deserving students who depend on financial support from scholarship programs such as ours to meet their educational goals. And I might say that with today's tuition, it's just a small part, but it's a very important part. The very large number of thank-you notes that we received indicate the appreciation that the Youth Group has for our scholarships. If you did not apply this year, guess what, you have a chance for next year.

Thank you also to our dedicated staff at the Grand Chapter Office, who always made time for my many inquiries: Maryann Barrios, Jim Hannum, Russ Kleber, Katie Streeter-Bernard and Christy Baker are among those that were extremely helpful to me.

There's one person that I have to thank, without whose support and help, I could not have gone through this, and that's my wife Susan. She's very good at letting me know what to do or telling me what to do, one or the two. I would also like to thank Suzanne Johnston. I didn't see her in the audience, but she is the secretary of our chapter, who helped me immensely in understanding all of those little facets of Microsoft Excel. I'm not an expert, but I get her help.

The 2014 version of our scholarship application will soon be available on our Web site to students in Youth Groups, and if you did not apply this year, I expect to see your name next year. Thank you very much. And now from one of our Limitless Labradors, here's Piper Riley.

ADDRESS OF THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER

(by John L. Cooper, III, Grand Master of Masons in California)

It's a great privilege and a pleasure to be here with you this evening representing the more than 60,000 Masons of the State of California.

Before I share just a few very brief remarks with you, it is my pleasure to introduce some of our Grand Lodge Officers and their wives who are present with us this evening. So if you will hold your acknowledgement, while I bring them up as a group, I'll introduce them entirely, and then we can greet them as a group. First of all our Junior Grand Deacon, the Worshipful Justin Daza-Ritchie; Next our Grand Standard Bearer, Worshipful Mahmoud Ghaffari; And then our Grand Orator, Worshipful Brian Bezner; the Worshipful Cub Jack, who is the Assistant Grand Lecturer for Division VI; our Assistant Grand Lecturer for Division IV, the Worshipful Ricky Lawler, and his wife Patty; our Junior Grand Warden, the Right Worshipful John Heisner, and his wife Margo; our Senior Grand Warden, the Right Worshipful David Perry, and his wife Jeanette; our Deputy Grand Master, Right Worshipful Russell Charvonia, and his wife Linda; and of course my wife, Heather. Please join me in thanking them for joining us tonight.

Worthy Grand Matron, and Worthy Grand Patron, it's been such a wonderful opportunity to share the Family of Freemasonry with the Order of the Eastern Star.

Over the doorway to the National Archives in Washington, DC, these words appear: "The past is prolonged." I would share with you something from your past and from our past that I think represents the opportunity that we have also for the future.

In 1973, the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star of California celebrated it's one-hundredth anniversary and that year you published a centennial history of the Order. The preface to that book said this: "That great mysterious silent never resting thing called 'time' has closed a century of our Order. The Grand Chapter of California has not only grown from it is tiny beginning, with seven chapters, and only 18 persons attending the first organizational meeting, to its present emminence, but through these past 100 years it has served as living evidence of the eternal quality of the truths expressed in its ritual. These have survived not just the normal problems and struggles of bringing such an organization into existence, but through the years the challenges and trials of three terrible wars, the conflict which has torn our world apart in Korea and Vietnam. It weathered the panic of 1894, the depression years of the '30s, and is now coping as best it can with the near revolutions of our own time."

Now although written about the Order of the Eastern Star, I believe these words may equally apply to the Masonic fraternity in 1973, and I believe that it applies to both of our Orders today. And just a bit of history to remind us of the great strides that we have taken together over time, the year 1873, when your Grand Chapter was founded, was the same year in which Susan B. Anthony was arrested and fined \$100 for voting in the 1872 presidential election.

I would remind you that the Order of the Eastern Star, in my opinion, has grown up with Freemasonry, that what we share together with the ideals and the symbols and the teachings are those that we have contributed one to the other, that the strength that we have together is greater than that which either of us would have at the beginning.

The Order of the Eastern Star has contributed immensely to the ideals that we share. You are some of the earliest sponsors of our Masonic Youth groups, you are some of the ones that inspired us to develop separately and yet together our magnificent charities, and you were the ones that, with us, stood up for those ideals that animate not only each of us, but those who have followed in the footsteps of the founders of our respective Orders.

So I am very proud, on behalf of the Freemasons of California, to be here this evening to express the appreciation of those Masons for what you have meant to us over the years. And I know that under the leadership just installed this evening of these officers, that you will carry it to new heights, the ideals of the Family of Freemasonry in general, and of the Order of the Eastern Star in particular.

I'm going to take just one more moment. I believe that we have one Past Grand Master, perhaps two here: I believe Most Worshipful Larry Adamson, as well as Most Worshipful R. Stephen Doan., Ray Whittaker, and Most Worshipful Dick Hopper. I want to thank all of you for being here to join us this evening.

Randall Cady, Worthy Grand Patron: Most Worshipful, Debbie and I know that the continuing commitment to the "Raising a Reader" program is a focus of your 2014 year. We are pleased to present you with donation for this important program.

John L. Cooper, III, Grand Master: Thank you very much. And I would only say one more thing on behalf of that: Because of our mutual love of children and of our schools, the Raising a Reader program, which is now the project of all the Freemasons of California is one that we hope is going to make a tremendous and profound difference for our children in the future. So thank you very much for your support of the Raising a Reader program.

INSTALLATION ADDRESS

INSTALLATION ADDRESS

Because of the 100th session, all chapters were read for roll call and members of each chapter rose when mentioned. They also had recognition of 50 year and over members. They have a Grand Lecturer.

Colorado: In 2012, the "Canopy of Stars" session was held in Denver. Honor Stations: Associate Matron and Adah. Colors: WGM – black, gold, burgundy, pink and emerald green; WGP – all shades of blue. They have pictures of 50 year members and residents of their home in their journal. They have a night for Masonic Youth Adult Leaders; they have 10 District lecturers and 44 chapters.

Illinois: In 2011 the "Journey of Lasting Memories" session was held in Springfield. There were 158 chapters with a membership of 11,937. Their motto: Joyfully work to serve others. Live each day to the fullest. Make memories to treasure forever. Their colors: red and/or blue, yellow, white, green. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay. Projects supported: Paws for Patriots, "Kiss the Pig" for cancer, Soldier Support Fund, Diabetes.

Amendment to Bylaws: Every member in good standing of a constituted chapter of the OES in Illinois shall be a member of that Grand Chapter and entitled to a vote at Grand Chapter.

Kentucky: In 2011 the "Love Makes the World Go Around" session was held in Louisville. La Grange is the home of Rob Morris. There are 165 chapters with a membership of 113,564. Their motto: All members let God's love guide them in their daily lives. Colors were the colors of the rainbow. Projects; Service Dog Project, Walk for a Cure, Heart Fund, Shriners' Hospital, Knights Templar Eye Foundation. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay.

Maine: In 2008 the "Celebrating the Stars" session was held in Augusta. The Theme was "Embrace the emerging experience, participate in discovery. Be a butterfly, not a butterfly collector. Want the experience of the butterfly. Colors: WGM – pink, blue, green; WGP - light blue, lavender and silver. They have an

Honor Station – Chaplain. Flowers are the pink rose with baby's breath. The emblem was the open Holy Bible; Fun emblems: WGM – butterfly; WGP – lobster. They also have special songs: "Hymn of Promise" and "Surely be the Presence of the Lord" and "The Rose."

Maine: In 2009 the "Legacies Winter Wonderland" Session was held in Presque Isle. There were 68 Chapters represented with 342 eligible votes. Motto: Service first with Honor, Integrity, Caring and Love. Colors: black, gold and silver. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay. Projects: Mid West Relief Fund, Cancer.

Maine: In 2011, the "Wings of Peace" Session was held in Augusta. There were 70 chapters, 66 of which were present with 475 delegates. Theme: What our world needs more than ever is love and peace. Peace comes from when love from above descends like a dove. Colors: turquoise and fuchsia. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay. Projects: 2 Children's Dyslexia Centers, Salvation Army, a School Supply project and Service Dog project. After 57 years new badges were presented at a Dedication of Badges ceremony at the Worthy Grand Matron's home chapter.

Montana: In 2009 the "Gems of Laughter" session was held at Great Falls. Their aim: Find the fun in every job that must be done. Motto: They who laugh, last. Watchwords: Tock tock (Think about it), laugh, love, live, learn. Emblem - the cup. Flowers: Red rose, wild rose, pansies, and lilacs. Honor stations: Electa and Secretary. Fun emblems: precious gems (a girl can never have too many), pandas, Wizard of Oz, bears of any kind, black labradors, horses. Combined colors and songs: Colors of the gems and accents of silver; songs included "Morning has Broken," "One Bread One Body", Wizard of Oz Tunes, Disney tunes, and Beach Boy tunes.

Montana: In 2012 the "Beacon of Hope" session was held. Honor Stations: Ruth and Secretary.

New Brunswick: In 2008 the "Keeper of the Light" session was held in Fredericton. They had only three District DGMs. They have a Grand Nurse, even official huggers. They also have Chaplain as an Honored Station. Their emblem was the Maple Leaf. Colors: Autumn Hues. Flower: Ivory, Rose and Fall Mums. Hymns: "Here I Am, Lord", "Let There be Peace", "The Anchor" and "The King is Coming"; also "Amazing Grace". Fun emblems: WGM – Lighthouse, all things nautical, and snowmen; WGP – Chickadees

and dragons. Songs: WGM – "Keeper of the Stars" "The Rose" "Getting to Know You" and "Wish Upon a Star"; WGP – "Working Man" and "The Rose". They have a community Project – they support the Breakfast Program for elementary schools, local food banks, and bears for Police.

New Brunswick: In 2010 the "Hooked on Star" Session was held in Fredericton with 388 registered members. Motto: Forget about all the reasons why something may not work. You only need to find one good reason why it will — Dr. Robert Anthony. Colors: the colors of the Masonic Organizations. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay. Projects: Service Dogs, Cancer, Heart and Stroke, all Grand Chapter and General Grand Chapter Projects. Special Project was Pottery Project for Camp Goodtime/Rotary Camp. Changed the Bylaws regarding dues from a set amount to be an amount voted on by the chapter each year.

New Brunswick: In 2011 the "Open Circle" Session was held in Fredericton. A membership of 1,487 with 305 members registered. Motto: Keep a song in your heart and a smile on your face. Colors were blue, white and silver. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay. Autism Service Dogs, 100k Hospital Neonatal Unit. Changed the Bylaws for Sentinel from an elected office to an appointed office.

New Brunswick: In 2012 the "A New Beginning" session was held. Their Honor Stations: Star Point Officers. Colors: Shades of brown, bronze and gold. Flowers: Day lilies and all flowers in God's Garden. Fun Emblems: WGM: Penguins and sand dollars; WGP: Model Trains and real trains. They have 5 DGMs and 22 chapters.

North Dakota: In 2010 the "Our Favorite Things" session was held. They have 6 DGMs and have 18 chapters. Combined emblem: All our favorite things; Colors – pink, black, white plus all colors of the garden. Honored stations – Organist and Sentinel. The Starpoints have their own projects.

North Dakota: In 2011 the "Treasured Memories" Session was held in Fargo, with a membership of 1,103, 143 registered and 119 voting delegates. 73 out of state members registered. Watch words: Faith, Family and Friends. Colors: Star Point Colors: blue, yellow, white, green and red. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay. Projects: Stuffed Animals for Highway Patrol. Basket auction for North Dakota OES Foundation, General Grand Chapter and Support Local Food Pantries.

Oklahoma: In 2009 the "Council Fires" 46th Triennial Assembly was held in Tulsa. Total number of delegates presenting credentials and entitled to vote was 1,218. Total registration was 4,548. Aim: to seek guidance from the Great Spirit Above. Colors: red, yellow, Indian turquoise and black. Special Project: Each One Bring One. Projects: Storm Relief Fund, cancer, Heart, Shriners' Children's Hospital, Scottish Rite Learning Center, Knights Templar Eye

Foundation. Youth groups supported: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay. Twelve new Chapters were instituted worldwide. No business filed with the Appeals and Grievances Committee. Corrections and revisions were made in the Ritual and Red Book. In 2015, Pittsburg, Pennsylvania will host the Triennial Assembly.

Quebec: In 2010 the "Ode to Life" session was held in Granby with 116 registered voters and a membership of 400. Motto: Look to the future and not in the past. Colors: yellow, green, blue, silver and gold. Amended their Bylaws to read "The annual dues may be adjusted (raised or lowered) at any regular meeting by the majority vote of the members present. Special projects: Shriners' Hospital for Sick Children, Wish List, Women's Shelter, BMP Hospital.

Quebec: In 2011, the "Rising Sun" session was held in Granly. Honored station was Electa. Emblem: Electa's cup. Flowers: WGM – Yellow Rose, Morning Glory; WGP – Fern, Geranium. Colors: WGM – green, all pastels. WGP – Green. Music "What a Wonderful World" and "Everything is Beautiful".

South Dakota: In 2010 the "Garden of Roses" session was held in Pierre with 48 Chapters represented and 278 voting members with 411 registered members and guests. Motto: "Never lose an opportunity to bring sunshine into the life of another. A few encouraging words could make a huge difference in someone's life." Colors: all colors. Youth Groups supported: Rainbow for Girls and Job's Daughters. Special projects include ACTS – Assisting Children to Smile since 2005, OES Home, ESTARL, and community service.

South Dakota: In 2011 the "Random Acts of Kindness" Session was help in Pierre with 275 registered members and 409 attending. Motto: One person can make a difference, embrace your dreams, share your love. Colors were purple, black, and ivory. Any color that makes you smile. Youth groups: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, DeMolay.

Virginia: In 2009 the "Garden of Friendship" session was held in Hampton. Theme: Remember to live our Obligation. Different was that the Grand Officers have emblems: Rays of sunshine, spouses have rainbows of Love. Charities: Cancer, Diabetes, Knights Templar Eye Foundation, Children's religious books sent to missions. They have 41 districts, and many assistants to the Grand Organist.

Virginia: In 2012 the "Stars Across Virginia" session was held in Roanoke. There are 9,457 primary members with 1,028 registered voters and 821 visitors. Motto: Leading by example, together we can make a difference. Colors: WGM – black, silver, red and pastel pink. WGP – orange and maroon, yellow and pink. Youth Groups supported: Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, and DeMolay. Projects: \$100 bags, Cancer, Pennies for Paul and Piece of my Heart Quilt.

Now, therefore be it resolved, that the Constitution and Laws be amended to make it the duty of the Treasurer to be the custodian of the checkbook; and

Further, that it shall be the duty of the Secretary to receive and reconcile the bank statements on a monthly basis against the receipts and disbursements recorded in the minutes.

(By Donna Tucker, PM (360))

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Finance to whom Proposed Amendment No. 1 has been referred recommends a Yes vote for the following reasons: This provides a check and balance of the secretarial and treasurer duties.

ADOPTED.

Sec. 162. **SECRETARY.** The Secretary shall: . . .

(11) Receive and reconcile the bank statements on a monthly basis against the receipts and disbursements recorded in the minutes....

(Renumber remaining subsections.)

Sec. 162A. TREASURER. The Treasurer shall:

(1) Act as custodian of the checkbook, itsue all checks, which are to be signed by any two of the three following officers: Worthy Matron, Secretary or Treasurer;

. . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2

Whereas, the Worthy Matron, Secretary and Treasurer are the only individuals authorized by the Constitution and Laws to sign on the accounts of subordinate chapters; and

Whereas, our Constitution and Laws require that all checks be signed by at least two of the authorized signers; and

Whereas, it is not always possible to obtain the signatures of two of the authorized signers in a timely fashion; and

Whereas, banks do not enforce the two signature rule;

Now, therefore be it resolved, that checks may be signed by any one of the authorized signers.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3

Whereas, at the 2012 Grand Chapter Session, when Proposed Amendment 7 was withdrawn, the Committees on Jurisprudence and Constitutional Reorganization Committee were directed "to meet and prepare legislation further defining the role of the Finance Committee pertaining to its power over the financial matters of Grand Chapter for presentation at Grand Session 2013." The Reorganization Committee has been in email communications with Jurisprudence and the member of Jurisprudence in 2012, who had issues with specific parts of Proposed Amendment 7. After discussion, changes were made to the original Proposed Amendment, and no objection was received from any member of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Whereas, while the Finance Committee has been given broad powers over the financial matters of the Grand Chapter, it was our understanding that they were, as a committee, to function in a similar manner as a Chief Financial Officer of the organization, and not as an executive committee or as its Chief Executive Officer;

Whereas, it appears that, at times, the Finance Committee has made executive decisions and exercised executive control over the Grand Chapter; and

Whereas, we are unclear of the intent of the Grand Chapter as to the extent of the powers of the Finance Committee;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that it is the policy of the Grand Chapter of California, that the Grand Chapter itself is the ultimate authority of all matters of the Order in California;

That the Worthy Grand Matron functions as the Chief Executive Officer of the Grand Chapter and is authorized broad powers of executive authority during the vacation of the Grand Chapter;

That the Grand Secretary functions as the Chief Administrative Officer of the Grand Chapter, implementing the policies of the Grand Chapter and Worthy Grand Matron;

That the Finance Committee, as a body, functions as the Chief Financial Officer of the Grand Chapter, recommending financial policy and offering advice concerning the finances to the Grand Chapter, Worthy Grand Matron, and other entities;

That the broad advisory role of the Finance Committee over the financial matters of the Grand Chapter during its recess are acknowledged;

That in the preparation of budgets for the Grand Chapter and the charities, if conflicts cannot be resolved between the Finance Committee and other party, the matter shall be decided by the Grand Chapter; and

That it is the duty of the Finance Committee to bring legislation to resolve any ongoing conflicts regarding executive policy and financial policy.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AND JURISPRUDENCE

(By Gary Gole, PP (21/651))

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Jurisprudence to whom Proposed Amendment No. 3 has been referred recommends a Yes vote for the following reasons: The amendment clarifies and defines the policy of the Grand Chapter with respect to the powers and functions of the Worthy Grand Matron, the Grand Secretary and the Finance Committee.

NOT ADOPTED.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4

Whereas, our Constitution requires the Worthy Matron to appoint a Property Committee at her installation in November and said Property Committee is required to present its report at the first stated meeting after December 1; and,

Whereas, this short period of time occurring in the middle of the holidays and installation season does not leave adequate time for the Property Committee to perform its duties causing the filing deadline to frequently be missed; and,

Funds donated to the California Eastern Star Foundation marked as donations to the Scholarships Endowment Fund shall be added

to the restricted principal of this fund. Funds donated for scholarships that are not so designated shall be deposited in the unrestricted Scholarship Fund. The income from the Scholarships Endowment Fund and, at the discretion of the Finance Committee, net profits from the sale of investments, shall be transferred to the unrestricted Scholarship Fund and managed, used, and distributed in accordance with those provisions relating to the unrestricted Scholarship Fund.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, until the amount deposited in the Scholarships Endowment Fund reaches \$500,000, or until the Grand Chapter session held in 2012, whichever comes first, the income and net profits generated by the Scholarships Endowment Fund shall be retained in the Scholarships Endowment Fund. This paragraph will automatically be deleted in the revisions to the Constitution and Laws distributed after the 2012 Grand Chapter Session:

The total expenditures for Scholarship awards each year shall not exceed the sum of:

- 1. The amount collected by the per-capita tax, plus
- 2. Contributions to the fund, and
- 3. With the approval of the Finance Committee, up to eighty (80) percent of the increase in market value of the invested funds between January 1 and December 31 of the preceding year.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 14

Whereas, it is becoming increasingly difficult to find musicians to play for our meetings; and

Whereas, many members have expressed a desire to improve their keyboard skills to fill this need if they only had more financial resources to do such; and

Therefore we have 20 or less to work on the money making projects, so our income is not great. In my opinion it should be left up to the people in charge to make the decision how to split the bills.

Now, therefore be it resolved that in the second paragraph, second line "shall be prorated on the basis of Membership" be removed, and add May be divided equally among the participating chapters.

In the case of vacancy of both the Worthy Grand Patron and Associate Grand Patron, the Worthy Grand Matron, shall appoint a Past Grand Patron to serve as acting Worthy Grand Patron and another Past Grand Patron to serve as Associate Grand Patron until the Grand Chapter can meet and resolve the matter either at the next Annual Session, or, if there is time, at a special session.

If the installation of officers is not held at the time of the joint meeting, then the a date within sixty days of the joint meeting shall be selected for the installation, unless permission has been received from the Worthy Grand Matron that the installation may be held at a later date. The date of installation shall be the effective date of the consolidation. In addition, at the joint meeting the bylaws shall be adopted....</u>

Sec. 292. **INSTALLATION**. Officers elected at the joint Chapter consolidation meeting and appointive officers selected by the Worthy Matron elect shall be installed <u>either at the joint meeting or the date selected at the joint meeting promptly</u> and shall serve until their successors are elected and installed, as provided for officers generally....

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 21

Now, therefore be it resolved, that "For salaries of Officers;" "For limitation of tenure of office of elected Officers;" and "For expense allowance to delegates to the annual session of the Grand Chapter;" be removed from the list of provisions that may be included in a chapter's bylaws, and that Trustees be added to the list of provisions that may be included in a chapter's bylaws.

Sec. 265. **PETITION FOR DISPENSATION**. A petition for such dispensation must be prepared on forms adopted by Grand Chapter from time to time for the purpose, and filed with the Worthy Grand Patron, and shall be accompanied with a fee of fifty (\$50.00) dollars, and shall set forth the name proposed for the Chapter, the City or Town in this Grand Jurisdiction in which

such Chapter is to meet, and the names of the persons whose appointment are requested to its first four offices officers. A list of the names and contact information of all petitioners, who have been selected for appointment as officers of the proposed chapter, shall be submitted with the Petition for Dispensation...

Sec. 277. **EFFECT OF INSTITUTION**. The ceremony of institution confers the powers granted by the dispensation upon all members of the Order named in the dispensation, initiates the existence of a Chapter as a Chapter working under dispensation, and immediately following such ceremony, a Chapter shall complete its organization, including selection of officers, and all business that may be transacted at a stated meeting of a chartered Chapter. . . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 24

Whereas, it is the duty of the Constitutional Reorganization Committee to present legislation when changes beyond reorganization are required to the Constitution and Laws; and

Whereas, the last sentence of Sec. 235, which deals with Certificates of Good Standing, states, "The issuance of such certificate shall in no way affect the standing of a member in the Order."; and

Whereas, that statement is not actually completely true, since, currently, if a member requests a Certificate of Good Standing to affiliate with a chapter upon institution and does not take affirmative action to become a plural member, she or he is automatically demitted from her/his chapter upon the institution of the new chapter; and

A certificate of good standing in such form as the Grand Chapter may approve from time to time, shall be issued by the Secretary upon oral or written request of a member in good standing whose dues and assessments are paid to the end of the preceding month, and the Secretary shall immediately notify the Worthy Matron thereof. It shall be issued without action of the Chapter or of any officer and shall constitute evidence of the facts therein stated to support a petition for affiliation or any other purpose within the Order. The issuance of such certificate shall in no way affect the standing of a member in the Order.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 25

Whereas, it is the duty of the Constitutional Reorganization Committee to present legislation when changes beyond reorganization are required to the Constitution and Laws; and

Whereas, currently, if a member, in good faith, requests a demit that is granted, but it is later found that she/he had not paid dues and assessments through the month before the demit was requested, the member must pay the outstanding amounts demanded by the chapter within thirty days of the demand or the demit is void;

Whereas, this requirement is unfair to the member and possibly other chapters. There is no time limit specified in the C&L on how long it can be before the chapter makes the demand. So, it could be six months since the member received the demit, and she/he could have already joined another chapter;

Whereas, the action on the demit can, currently, only be deferred to confirm why the member is requesting the demit; and

Whereas, the chapter should confirm that the member has paid all necessary dues before the demit is granted, but should be given the opportunity to confirm this information;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that if a member, in good faith, requests a demit, and the chapter grants it, but the member had not paid dues and assessments through the previous month, then the outstanding dues and assessments are deemed remitted by the chapter;

That, if a chapter is unable, at a meeting at which a request for demit is received, to determine if the requesting member has paid all necessary dues and assessments, the granting of the demit may be deferred until the next meeting of the chapter in order that the status of the payment of the member's dues can be determined. If the demit is granted at the next meeting, it shall be issued effective the date of the meeting at which the request for demit was originally received.

Whereas, the Constitution and Laws directs that when a member demits from a chapter and returns her/his dues receipt, the amount of the dues which may have already been paid in advance for the time period after the date of the demit by the member is returned and a new receipt is issued through the date of the demit;

Whereas, the Constitution and Laws does not clearly specify the consequences of not returning the dues card when receiving a demit;

Whereas, there is confusion among the members about the effect on good standing when the dues card is not returned; and

Whereas, we believe that the consequences of failing to return the dues card should be clearly specified in the Constitution and Laws;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that if a member who receives a demit does not surrender her or his dues card then:

- 1) No refund of dues shall be issued;
- 2) The member may not use the receipt to visit another chapter. Use of such a receipt may be deemed conduct unbecoming a member; and
- 3) The member's status as a non-affiliated member is not deferred, and begins as of the date of the demit.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 27

Whereas, when a member is reinstated the Constitution and Laws currently requires the Secretary to make a marginal note of the reinstatement in the minutes of the meeting at which the member was suspended;

Whereas, the meeting at which the member was originally suspended could have been years ago, and the minute book could have been placed into storage. In the case of a consolidation, the chapter could have even been a different chapter;

Whereas, this notation does not appear to be required in the case where the suspension was less than six months;

Whereas, there appears to be little purpose of this notation. The minutes of a chapter are a record of the actions of a chapter at its meetings; they are not the membership records of the chapter. If this action is required, then in makes as much sense to go back to the minutes of the original initiation or affiliation and note the suspension;

Whereas, the reinstatement of the member will appear in the minutes of the meeting in which the action is taken, and in so doing becomes a permanent record of the chapter;

Whereas, there is no penalty for failure to perform this duty, and imposing a penalty just discourages members from taking the position of Secretary; and

Whereas, if this information is recorded anywhere in addition to the membership records, it makes more sense to make a note of it in the bylaws book, next to the member's signature;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that Secretaries are no longer are required to note the reinstatement of a member as a marginal notation in the minutes of the meeting at which she/he was suspended.

That all changes in membership status should be noted next to the member's signature in the book of bylaws.

Sec. 250. **PROVISION FOR, AND RULES GOVERNING**. Suspension for nonpayment of dues or assessments, or both, may be terminated and the member reinstated by the suspending Chapter only, unless it is extinct, and in that event by Grand Chapter, by proceeding as follows: . . .

(2) After Six Months' Suspension....

The result of the ballot <u>and all changes in a Member's membership status shall</u> <u>be noted next to the member's signature in the book of bylaws shall be entered</u> in the minutes of the meeting and a marginal reference thereto shall be made opposite the minutes of the former meeting recording the petitioner's suspension and showing the date of such action.

DECISIONS OF THE 2013 WORTHY GRAND MATRON

NO. 1: CHANGE OF MEETING PLACE AND TIME.

The Worthy Grand Matron cannot grant a special dispensation for a Chapter to change their meeting date and time from what is stated in their bylaws. A chapter must hold their meetings at the time stated in their Bylaws and to do otherwise is a violation of the C&L.

Sec. 206. **DEFINED AND ENUMERATED**. . . . she shall determine that the exercise of the authority requested would not be in direct violation of the Constitution and Laws and not contrary to the best welfare of the Order, she may grant the same. The Worthy Grand Matron cannot grant a special dispensation for a Chapter to change the date and time of their meeting from what is stated in the Chapter's bylaws. A special dispensation shall be required for the following purposes: . . .

NO. 2: CHAPTER'S BYLAWS BEING MORE RESTRICTIVE.

The Bylaws of a Chapter may be more restrictive than our C&L so long as the bylaws do not violate the C&L. An example of this was a Chapter's bylaws required the principal paid for a life membership to be maintained in a permanent life membership fund while the C&L is less restrictive and allows the principal to be transferred into a Chapter's general fund.

Sec. 126. **SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS**. Every Chapter is required to adopt a code of bylaws for its government. . . .

Such bylaws may also provide: . . .

(5) And any other provisions for the government of the Chapter not inconsistent with the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.

The bylaws of a Chapter may be more restrictive than the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter, so long as the bylaws do not violate the Constitution and Laws....

NO. 3: CHAPTER'S FUNDRAISER ON SAME DAY AS GRAND OFFICER'S RECEPTION.

A Chapter may not have a fund-raising event or other special event even if it not called a "party" on the date of a Grand Officer's reception without permission of the Worthy Grand Matron.

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SPECIAL RULES

1. Chapter programs and year books must not be finalized until the itinerary of the Worthy Grand Matron-elect is received at Grand Chapter. Chapter anniversaries, parties, <u>fundraisers</u>, <u>special events</u>, receptions for Deputy Grand Matrons or Grand Representatives shall not be scheduled on the date of a Worthy Grand Matron's Official Visit if it is within fifty (50) miles, and at no time shall any of these events be scheduled on the date of a Grand Officer's reception without permission from the Worthy Grand Matron.

NO. 4: COMPOSITION OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Since one of the duties of the Jurisprudence Committee is to give legal advice to the Worthy Grand Matron at least one member of the Committee must be an attorney licensed to practice in the State of California.

Sec. 67. QUALIFICATIONS OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS AND DUTIES OF AND EXPENDITURE OF MONEY BY COMMITTEES. All members of committees shall be members of the Grand Chapter. No person shall be eligible for membership on any committee, the duties of which shall include the investigation of, or report upon, the work or action of any standing or special committee, board, or other body of which such person is a member. Except for ex-officio members, no members shall serve on the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, Committee on Jurisprudence, Committee on Finance, Committee on Appeals and Grievances, the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California and the California Eastern Star Foundation who are related to another member serving on any of the above named boards or committees. Provided, however, that members of these committees or boards shall fill the remainder of the term to which they have been elected or appointed. At least one member of the Committee on Jurisprudence must be licensed to practice law in the State of California and a active member of the State Bar of California....

Sec. 88B. JUNE LUCRETIA BARNUM, PGM, MEMORIAL SCHOLAR-SHIP. This fund is established as a memorial to June Lucretia Barnum, who served as Worthy Grand Matron in 1991. The fund is to be administered by the finance committee and the California Eastern Star Foundation in the same manner as other charitable funds. The interest, dividends, and realized gains from sale of assets earned by the fund shall be deposited back into the fund. An annual accounting of the fund and the earnings on those funds, together with notification as to recipient(s) name(s) and address(es) is to be provided to Alpine Valley Sierra Star Chapter No. 129 For the purpose of sending a printed copy of the biography of June Lucretia Barnum, PGM, and congratulating the recipient(s).

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Independent Auditor's Report

To the Finance Committee

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (a California nonprofit corporation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

As discussed in Note 12 to the financial statements, Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star does not consolidate the financial statements of Eastern Star Homes of California. In our opinion, as a result of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star's economic interest in, and control over, Eastern Star Homes of California, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star consolidate the financial statements of Eastern Star Homes of California. If the financial statements of Eastern Star Homes of California were consolidated with those of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star, total assets would have increased by \$7,958,965 and \$8,451,349, total liabilities would have increased by \$15,665,220 and \$15,358,230, and change in net assets would have decreased by \$799,374 and \$3,586,377 as of and for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of not consolidating Eastern Star Homes of California, as discussed in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* paragraph, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Note 1 - Description of organization

Business

Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter") is a California not-for-profit unincorporated association which promotes and practices charity and fraternalism. The Grand Chapter's endowment fund is used to support the Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home").

These financial statements do not include the financial position or results of activities of the local chapters throughout the State of California and the Home.

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Grand Chapter have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Grand Chapter is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Finance Committee.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Grand Chapter are subject to either explicit donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Grand Chapter or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Grand Chapter and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

Revenue recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Bequests are recorded based on the liquidated value upon legal determination of the Grand Chapter's rights to the assets.

For financial reporting purposes, the Grand Chapter distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Grand Chapter reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promissor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Residents' assets

Residents' assets, upon completion of a 90 day cooling off period, are recognized as permanently restricted contributions on the 91st day after a resident has been admitted to the Home under a Life Care Contract. Revenue is recorded based on the estimated liquidated value of the contributed assets. The recognition of this revenue is considered to be a contribution, as the value of assets contributed on the date of admission is not sufficient to cover the costs of services rendered by the Home, the services to be rendered are consistent with the Home's mission of providing housing to members of the Order of the Eastern Star and the purpose of the Grand Chapter's endowment fund is to support the Home.

Other revenue

All non-contribution revenues are recognized when earned.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Grand Chapter receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Grand Chapter. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition is not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Investments

Investments are reported at their fair values in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost if purchased or fair value on the date of donation. Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, generally ranging from three to ten years. Expenditures for major renewals and improvements that extend the useful lives of property and equipment are capitalized. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred. Leasehold improvements are amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset or the lease term.

Income taxes

The Grand Chapter is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Grand Chapter obtained a group filing exemption covering the local chapters throughout the State of California during the 1940's. and has included those chapters' funds in its annual exempt organization returns.

The Grand Chapter has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2013 or 2012. The Grand Chapter's Federal and state income tax returns prior to the 2010 and 2009 fiscal years, respectively, are closed and management continually evaluates expiring statutes of limitations, audits, proposed settlements, changes in tax law and new authoritative rulinos.

If applicable, the Grand Chapter recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Grand Chapter to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Grand Chapter maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed Federally insured limits

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The Grand Chapter's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Grand Chapter's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact of changes.

Subsequent events

The Grand Chapter has evaluated the impact of subsequent events through January 30, 2014, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee has the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of assets based on the following guidelines established by the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws:

- At least fifteen percent (15%) of the funds available must be in:
 - o Cash and/or bank accounts.
 - Obligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith of the United States is pledged.
 - Obligations of the State of California and its political subdivisions.
 - Such evidence of corporate indebtedness as is rated "A" or better by Standard and Poors Corporation or Moody's Investors Service. Qualified investment funds limited to short-term United States Government Securities, bank certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances commercial paper, repurchase agreements and comparable securities.
 - Savings accounts in investment certificates issued by Federal Chartered Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.
- Up to ten percent (10%) may be invested in:
 - Other evidence of indebtedness, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Preferred stocks, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
- Up to seventy-five percent (75%) may be invested in:
 - Common stocks, which must be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Shares of investment trusts.
 - Mutual funds.

Note 5 - Fair value measurements

The Grand Chapter values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs is used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.
- Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.
- Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Valuations of mutual funds, exchange traded funds and equities are obtained from real-time quotes for transactions in active exchange markets involving identical assets. Fixed income, bond and treasury note investments are valued based on the income approach. For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, there have been no changes in the valuation methodologies.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Grand Chapter believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 6 - Related party transactions

The Grand Chapter received \$218,382 and \$241,486 from the Home and \$141,062 and \$182,671 from California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation") for administrative services for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Grand Chapter also leases office space from the Home (see Note 9). For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Grand Chapter incurred \$38,464 and \$38,249, respectively, of rental expense from the Home. At September 30, 2013, \$500 is due to the Foundation, and at September 30, 2012, \$13,595 is due from the Foundation. At September 30, 2013, \$19,235 is due to the Home, and at September 30, 2012, \$18,090 is due from the Home.

Note 8 - Endowments

The Grand Chapter's endowment include donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Grand Chapter has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Grand Chapter classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Grand Chapter in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Grand Chapter considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the Grand Chapter and donor-restricted endowment funds. (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Grand Chapter and (7) the Grand Chapter's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee has the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 4.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Grand Chapter has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Grand Chapter considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.

Note 9 – Commitments and contingencies

Operating lease

The Grand Chapter leases office space under an operating lease from the Home expiring in June 2014. For the year ended September 30, 2014, the minimum lease payments due under the non-cancelable operating lease is \$31,455.

Contingencies

Certain claims have been filed against the Grand Chapter in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, these matters will not have a material effect on the Grand Chapter's financial position or results of operations.

Note 10 - Employee benefit plan

The Grand Chapter maintains a Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees Individual Retirement Account ("SIMPLE IRA") plan covering substantially all employees. The Grand Chapter contributes 2% of employees' salaries, up to allowable limits, and for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, contributions totaled \$6,701 and \$8,758, respectively.

Note 11 - California chapters

At September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Grand Chapter had 170 and 174 active California chapters, respectively, which are responsible for their own fundraising, revenues and expenses. Each individual California chapter's financial statements are not consolidated into the Grand Chapter's financial statements. As of September 30, 2013 and 2012, the unaudited cash and investments, revenues and expenses of these chapters consisted of the following:

Note 12 - Nonconsolidated affiliate

The accompanying financial statements of the Grand Chapter do not include the financial statements of the Home. As a result of the Grand Chapter's economic interest in the Home, via the endowment fund, and the Grand Chapter's ability to elect individuals to the Home's Board of Trustees, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial statements of the Home should be consolidated in the Grand Chapter's financial statements. Included in total liabilities in the above schedule is an obligation to provide care for the residents of the Home for the rest of their lives, totaling \$15,408,128 and \$15,126,658 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which is expected to be funded through social security payments to the residents and the Grand Chapter's endowment fund. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow of the Home is obligated to be met by the Grand Chapter's endowment fund.

The State of California Health and Safety Code requires continuing care retirement communities to report on the adequacy of certain reserve requirements. The Home's required statutory reserve requirement at September 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$793,146 and \$809,991, respectively. The Home had a surplus of qualifying assets over the required reserve amount of \$7,079,601 and \$8,526,781 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which includes assets held in the Grand Chapter's endowment fund for the benefit of the Home.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Note 1 - Description of organization

Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home") is a nonprofit corporation organized for the purpose of operating a home, operating under the name "Senior Living Community", for the care of aged members of the Order of the Eastern Star. Residents are affiliated members in good standing for at least five years, as described in the Constitution and Laws, who are at least sixty-five years of age. Upon admission to the Home, residents contribute their assets to the endowment fund (the "Endowment Fund") of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter").

The Home also operates a medical office rental facility under the name "Eastern Star Professional Plaza."

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Home have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Home is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Home are subject to either explicit donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Home or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Home and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

At September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Home does not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Contributions from residents after admission consist primarily of social security and retirement payments to the residents.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

For financial reporting purposes, the Home distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Home reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promissor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Home receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist in resident activities. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition is not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Property and equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost if purchased or fair value on the date of donation. Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, generally ranging from two to thirty years. Expenditures for major renewals and improvements that extend the useful lives of property and equipment are capitalized. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred.

Income taxes

The Home is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

The Home has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2013 or 2012. The Home's Federal and state income tax returns prior to the 2010 and 2009 fiscal years, respectively, are closed and management continually evaluates expiring statutes of limitations, audits, proposed settlements, changes in tax law and new authoritative rulings.

If applicable, the Home recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Home to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Home maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed Federally insured limits.

Endowment fund

The Home is the income beneficiary of the Endowment Fund maintained by the Grand Chapter. Net investment income is transferred to the Home to the extent that funds are needed for operations. Additional funds as necessary for the maintenance and operation of the Home are transferred from the temporarily restricted portion of the Endowment Fund. Support from the Endowment Fund for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$2,350,000 and \$2,525,000, respectively.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2012 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2013 presentation.

Subsequent events

The Home has evaluated the impact of subsequent events through January 30, 2014, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

The Home's property also includes office facilities that are leased to the Grand Chapter and various other medical offices (see Note 8).

Note 4 - Obligation to provide future services

Applicants for admission to the Home are required to make a contribution of their assets to the Endowment Fund. In exchange for this contribution, the Home agrees to care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The Home has recorded a liability for its obligation to provide care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The obligation is calculated by estimating the cost of providing care and the use of the facilities over the remaining lives of the residents less estimated cash revenue before any realized gains from the Endowment Fund or proceeds on future property sales. The excess of projected expenses over revenues has been estimated to increase at 2.20% and 2.34% annually as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, representing inflation. The resulting liability has been discounted by 5% to reflect net present value. This liability amounted to \$15,408,128 and \$15,126,658 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The change in obligation from year to year is shown on the statements of activities.

Eastern Star Homes of California is licensed to operate a seventy-six bed continuing care home. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Note 5 - Cash reserves

The Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws require that the operating cash balance of the Home is to be limited to \$250,000 plus appropriations. Excess amounts are to be transferred to the unrestricted Endowment Fund for the future use of the Home, to be maintained by the Grand Chapter. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Home has operating cash balances of \$150.536 and \$221.168. respectively.

Note 6 - Related party transactions

The Home incurred \$218,382 and \$241,486 in administrative expense charges during the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, for services provided by the Grand Chapter. The Home also leases office space to the Grand Chapter (see Note 8). For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Home earned \$38,464 and \$38,249, respectively, of rental income from the Grand Chapter. At September 30, 2013, \$19,235 is due from the Grand Chapter, and at September 30, 2012, \$18,090 is due to the Grand Chapter.

Note 7 - Continuing care reserve requirement

The State of California Health and Safety Code requires continuing care retirement communities to report on the adequacy of certain reserve requirements. The Home's required statutory reserve requirement at September 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$793,146 and \$809,991, respectively. The Home had a surplus of qualifying assets over the required reserve amount of \$7,079,601 and \$8,526,781 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which includes assets held in the Grand Chapter's Endowment Fund for the benefit of the Home.

Note 8 - Operating leases - rental income

The Home leases office space under an operating lease to the Grand Chapter expiring in June 2014. In addition, the Home leases various medical offices under operating leases expiring through September 2017. The future minimum lease payments to be received under the non-cancelable leases are as follows:

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Note 1 - Description of organization

California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation") is a California not-for-profit corporation organized to receive gifts, bequests and contributions for the furtherance of educational, charitable and scientific purposes. The Foundation was organized in September 1997 at the direction of the members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter").

Note 2 – Summary of significant accounting policies Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations.
Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Foundation is subject to either explicit donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Foundation or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value.

For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, shall be recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Foundation receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist in member activities. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition is not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Investments

Investments are reported at their fair values in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Income taxes

The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The Foundation has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2013 or 2012. The Foundation's U.S. Federal and state income tax returns prior to the 2010 and 2009 fiscal years, respectively, are closed and management continually evaluates expiring statutes of limitations, audits, proposed settlements, changes in tax law and new authoritative rulings.

If applicable, the Foundation recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Grant expenditures

Grant expenditures are recognized in the period the grant is made, provided the grant is not subject to significant future conditions. Conditional grants are recognized as grant expense and as a grant payable in the period which the grantee meets the terms of the conditions. Grants payable that are expected to be paid in future years are recorded at present value of expected future payments.

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Foundation maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed Federally insured limits.

The Foundation's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Foundation's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact of changes.

Subsequent events

The Foundation has evaluated the impact of subsequent events through January 30, 2014, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee and the Foundation's Board of Directors have discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of assets based on the following guidelines established by the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws:

- At least fifteen percent (15%) of the funds available must be in:
 - o Cash and/or bank accounts.
 - Obligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith of the United States is pledged.
 - Obligations of the State of California and its political subdivisions.
 - Such evidence of corporate indebtedness as is rated "A" or better by Standard and Poors Corporation or Moody's Investors Service. Qualified investment funds limited to short-term United States Government Securities, bank certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances commercial paper, repurchase agreements and comparable securities.
 - Savings accounts in investment certificates issued by Federal Chartered Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.
- Up to ten percent (10%) may be invested in:
 - Other evidence of indebtedness, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Preferred stocks, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
- Up to seventy-five percent (75%) may be invested in:
 - Common stocks, which must be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - o Shares of investment trusts.
 - o Mutual funds.

Note 4 - Fair value measurements

The Foundation values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Valuations of mutual funds, exchange traded funds and equities are obtained from real-time quotes for transactions in active exchange markets involving identical assets. Fixed income, bond and treasury note investments are valued based on the income approach. For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, there have been no changes in the valuation methodologies.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5 - Related party transactions

The Foundation paid \$141,062 and \$182,671 to the Grand Chapter for administrative services for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. At September 30, 2013, \$500 is due from the Grand Chapter, and at September 30, 2012, \$13,595 is due to the Grand Chapter.

Note 7 - Endowments

The Foundation's endowment includes donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Foundation has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the Foundation and donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Foundation and (7) the Foundation's investment policies.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Foundation's Board of Directors and the Grand Chapter's Finance Committee have discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 3.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Foundation has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Foundation considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.
