



"Shaggy"



We need to support the efforts of those men and women involved since they are giving us the freedoms we enjoy every day.

Brother Frank Young is on the important Jurisprudence Committee and there have already been some sticky issues to work through.

The Public Relations Committee is selling the Austrian crystal Eastern Star jewelry I'm wearing. There's a necklace and earrings and a bracelet I forgot to wear, and Bobbi's friendship ring, which is the only one to be sold this triennium to spread the word to the general public of who we are, what we do, and all the good we do in our world, which also might help us gain members. We now have a new editor and we are back on track in publishing your journal. We are part of the branches of the Masonic Family tree, and that connection is prevalent as we spread the Shrine Charities, the Scottish Rite Charities, and the Youth Groups of Rainbow, Job's Daughters, and DeMolay. We are all ready to help each other in this journey of life.

Our Masonic related Scottish Rite Charities help children with hearing and speech difficulties, dyslexia and learning disabilities. These centers do such wonderful work with children as their individual needs are met.

The Alzheimer's Committee is another committee for General Grand Chapter and is being emphasized this triennium because we need to help those afflicted with this condition. It is not only dealing with people with memory loss, but it also affects their family and loved ones. It is rapidly becoming extremely prevalent and millions are suffering from this condition.

The 1618 Project was started last triennium to benefit our International Head-quarters building in Washington, DC. Rings of the five colors of our star are being sold for \$20 each and/or a beautiful bronze necklace pin for \$100. Our 100-year plus building continues to need repair and upkeep is needed to keep it in good shape. On November 8th of this year, we are having the Belmont Ball, with all proceeds going to benefit the headquarters building as well. We hope you will join us in the 95th Commemoration of the Duke of Wales' visit to Washington, DC, and his stay in our beautiful building as a courtesy to the President of the United States. If you can't attend, donations for this project are also being accepted, and this information is on the General Grand Chapter Web site. Also, if you have an item of value you would like to donate for the auction, we'd appreciate it.

The Hope for Tomorrow Triennial Assembly, 48th Assembly in Pittsburgh next year will appear on the web site soon, as the information has been sent to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary for publication. You will also be on my web site, BobbiWhite.org.

California has a legacy in the General Grand Chapter, in the Order of the Eastern Star, with Brother John McDonald serving as the Worthy Grand Organist in 1937 to 1943. And, yes, he served two terms. 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Concern:

Every new term brings with it optimism and hope that our members will have a harmonious year and remember the obligation they took at the altar upon their initiation. It was Randy's and my wish that at the end of each All Member Instructional the members join hands around the altar, and renew the obligation. The first words spoken at initiation are the oath you take to be

a member who will honor your Sisters and Brothers and not speak evil here are some, however, who forget their obligation and the lessons of our heroines. The lack of Charity, Truth, and Loving Kindness in some of our members is of the utmost concern.

Recommendations of the Worthy Grand Matron 2014:

#1 Section 73 (7) in the C&L reads "... the Controller is to report at the annual session, giving an account of all moneys received and disbursed by the Grand Chapter during the year, incorporating therein unaudited financial statements of the books of accounts of the Grand Chapter, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation, together with any comments required."

As the C&L does not express any requirement that the Controller's report be delivered orally, it is my recommendation that, at least in 2014, the Controller will provide copies of unaudited September 30, 2014 financial statements to the delegates at the annual session rather than make an oral presentation.

#2 Article III, Section 6 of the uniform code of By Laws, reads "The Secretary, Treasurer, Organist and or the Sentinel, may be allowed such compensation for services as the Chapter may direct." The word compensation seems to have created many interesting ways of payment to those who assist the chapter members and this must be clarified. It is my decision that the word compensation is defined as salaries and wages on which State and Federal rules regarding the withholding and reporting of payroll taxes should be observed. This means that Chapter should **not** be using creative ways of compensation to try and avoid following the law.

My Sisters and Brothers, every time a Chapter decides that the compensation should be creative and does not follow the rules regarding withholding it jeopardizes the welfare of all of the chapters in California. The IRS has been looking at nonprofit organizations with careful scrutiny. The IRS and other regulatory agencies have issued a group exemption with the assumption that the subordinate chapters and the Grand Chapter obey. When a chapter does not follow the rules and regulations, it is at risk of incurring penalties that not only affect the chapter but puts the Grand Chapter of the State of California in danger of losing its tax exempt status.

To alleviate any confusion regarding the word compensation I have defined compensation as salaries and wages. Therefore, there should be two reasons to write a chapter check to a member of the Order for services rendered: 1) reimbursement of expenses upon presentation of receipts and, 2) (compensation) wages or salaries for services provided. I believe this definition should be continued to avoid any possibility of putting the Chapters and the Grand Chapter of California in jeopardy of losing its tax exempt status.

#3 It became even more apparent this year that we cannot expect a Controller to manage the financial operations of the Order when she or he is not allowed complete control over the employees performing the accounting functions in the Grand Chapter office.

Our office has functioned for years with the Grand Secretary supervising all employees, including any who work almost solely for the Controller. This division of responsibility results in confusion for all concerned as to working hours, job assignments, expectations regarding job performance, and many other factors of the job. Although the C&L says that the Grand Secretary sets the working hours, duties, and vacation schedules of all paid staff, it also says that the Controller's duty is to supervise the day to day financial operations of the Grand Chapter Office. Understandably, this leads to confusion, particularly for the employees.

It was my recommendation, and I would hope that the delegates agree, that the Grand Chapter Office would function more naturally with the full-time accounting personnel reporting directly to the Controller. We fully expect the Grand Secretary and Controller to work together to assure that the office is not ever under-manned due to time off by too many employees.

The Grand Secretary still has the responsibility to be aware of time off scheduled by employees and to discuss this with the Controller if there is a problem. The Controller is now actually able to supervise and control the day to day financial operations of the Grand Chapter Office. This decision with the subsequent change in our office dynamics has worked very well. The two sides of the office seem happier with the arrangementparticularly since we threw a party for them at the Fiesta... and the workflow is moving better than it has for years.

Gifts:

I was happily overwhelmed by the support, friendship and generosity of your gifts throughout this entire journey; the fellowship was constant and the gifts will be cherished by me always. I was humbled by the number of Honorary Memberships received and will be happy to return, when I can, to visit each chapter. If I did not respond with a personal note for gifts received, it was not for lack of appreciation; thank you for all of the love gifts and treasured keepsakes given.

Conclusion:

Thank you, members of California, for giving me the opportunity to serve as your Worthy Grand Matron for this year of 2014. It was only possible because you elected me to serve and gave me the chance to dance. I have a lasting affection for our Order, and its principles. My dance card is full with the memories

made from sharing so many extraordinary steps with you. The smiles and hugs, given and received, have been energizing, and I will always be humbled by the honor and title given to me. We had the chance to sit it out or dance. Together we all chose to dance. Let music play on in our hearts.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

Worthy Grand Matron, Distinguished and Honored Members, Sisters and Brothers: Per the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter of California it is the Worthy Grand Patron's duty "to make a written report to the Grand Chapter at its annual session reviewing the work of his term of office and making such recommendations as he may deem to be for the good of the Order." I have the honor to present this report.

This amazing journey unofficially started for me on January 14, 2012 when Sister Debbie asked me to join her and left me speechless. Countless hours were spent working on this year's calendar, planning, tweaking and rearranging to fit everything in. Finally we were there but still needed to be flexible for the unexpected. This year I was able to observe the talent, dedication, and leadership within our Masonic Youth Orders. I had the pleasure to attend the Grand Guardian Council of Job's Daughters International, the Northern California DeMolay Convention, Grand Assembly for the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, and Grand Bethel for Job's Daughters International. In addition we enjoyed the relaxing time and fun at Rainbow Camp. Thank you to those Sisters and Brothers who give their time unselfishly to be the adult leaders and advisors that continue to keep these organizations alive and growing.

Special Events:

Our calendar also included many special events that raised funds for our charities and special project, and gave us an opportunity to be together for a little fellowship. These events included: the SLC Holiday Party, the Heart Research Breakfast, Our Northern Event for our project "Raising Hope", the San Diego Breakfast, the J. Clifford Lee Breakfast, The Northern Event for the Senior Living Community, the Southern Event for our Project "A little Country and a lot of Rock and Roll", The Kern County Dinner, The SLC "Home on the Range"

Fiesta, the Masonic Picnic at the Masonic Home, Jam & Jelly Day, and the East Bay Event, and special events held by the different associations. I want to thank all the Chapter members that put in the hard work and dedication to make these Events the success that they were.

One of the things that I enjoyed the most was watching the Grand Officers conducting three Initiations this year. Those were conducted in Fresno, Fairfield, and Bakersfield and I was proud of their work and proficiency. Many attended and helped welcome our 10 new members into our Order.

Special Project:

Our project this year, Raising Hope, has two parts: an internal and an external. The external, Ethan and Teyler Totes is a community non-profit organization started by two mothers whose young sons were diagnosed with cancer. After being airlifted from their homes to larger hospitals in emergency situations with little notice, both mothers decided to help other parents who were in similar situations. To honor their sons, it was named Ethan and Teyler Totes. Thanks to our members, this has been highly successful with over 1,000 of our green totes handed out and filled. We are pleased to report that both Ethan and Teyler are in remission and doing well.

The J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer Fund is the internal portion of our project which provides assistance to Eastern Star members, their dependent children, and their non-affiliated spouses afflicted with cancer. Members and minor dependent children can receive up to \$15,000 and, our goal this year was to Raise Hope for at least 5 members. Also, the Grand Organist's key-decorated collection box was at each Official Visit and event. Half of what she collected went to the J. Clifford Lee Fund and the other half to the Eastern Star Music Scholarship helping to keep music in our chapters.

Programs:

This year we had programs for both Chapter and individual participation, encouraging involvement and participation in our Order and Communities. Our Spirit Award Program was designed for Chapters to become more active in their communities and letting people know who we are and what we do. Individuals took part in our Travel and Volunteer Program, which is based on hours of participation in your chapter and volunteer service to your community. After reaching 150 hours, the time log was turned in to a Grand Representative and their travel pin was presented. Thank you to our Grand Representatives for awarding the pins, Nellis Johnson who headed our Spirit Award Program and Laurie Guggenbickler for heading up our Travel Program.

Travels:

This year we were able to have a little fun along the way. Our travels required us to put several thousand miles on our vehicles, much of this done while convoying. There was a lot of nights in hotels, hundreds of interesting places to eat, even a few tourist attractions where we were able to see some of our State's beautiful sites. Travel Instructions, comments on scenery, and even singing could be heard on the CB Radios. We had a lot of fun on our CB Radios.

We also were able to attend other jurisdictions' Grand Sessions: the Grand Chapters of Oregon in Pendleton, Arizona in Tucson, and Nevada in Las Vegas. These trips allowed us to see how other Jurisdictions conduct their Grand Chapter, and show off our Grand Officers.

Hands Across the Border:

In March we hosted a Hands Across the Border with Arizona in San Diego. We actually started on a Friday night in Yuma at their District 14's Official Visit. We ate Saturday night dinner in San Diego, brunch Sunday morning, and finished the weekend with Districts 38 and 39's Official Visit in Chula Vista. In June we were in Bishop for a Hands Across the Border with Nevada. A great meet and greet was held on Friday and fun was had at Laws Station on Saturday. Saturday evening found us at District 33's Official Visit. Everything wrapped up Sunday at the Winnedumah Lodge for breakfast and we were on the road again.

Both events were a huge success and gave us a chance to visit with the wonderful Grand Officers and members from these jurisdictions.

Boards and Committees:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

Our membership, as gathered from the Annual Reports of the 161 Chapters of this Grand Jurisdiction, is as follows:

Of this figure, 4,564 are fifty-year life members, 1752 are residents of charitable homes, 195 had medical exemptions and 524 had their dues remitted. This brings the total of dues paying members to 17,814. Life Sponsors of the Eastern Star Home total 12,774. There are 1,161 members who belong to two Chapters in California. All Chapters have paid their per capita assessments timely.

It has been reported to you that San Fernando Chapter No. 398 surrendered their charter effective Aug. 15, 2014. There are also four consolidations that should be final before the end of the year, bringing the total Chapters in California to 156.

We issued 319 twenty-five year pins, 272 fifty-year pins, and 18 seventy-five year pins. We also arranged to give out 37 Dr. Rob Morris service awards and 115 Service awards. We also issued 25 birthday anniversary certificates for members who reached their 100th birthday or more and 3 chapter anniversary certificates.

All publications were distributed on a timely basis in accordance with the Constitution and Laws.

The synopsis of this Session will be available within the next few weeks, and may be reserved for \$3.00 at the office by Credentials. It will also again this year be posted on the website. The small Itineraries and pocket calendars are available; you can get them at the Grand Chapter area. For those who would like to place ads in the 2015 State Roster, order forms are also available at the Grand Chapter booth.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Every year is a new beginning and a new challenge for you and the staff of the Grand Chapter Office. Each Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron bring with them a new agenda and style of leadership. We thank you for your knowledge and the help you give to the members and the secretaries. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

I would first like to thank the membership for electing me to serve as Grand Treasurer. Sister Debbie and Brother Randy, thank you for allowing me to be part of your grand Family; it has been a fabulous year.

This year, as in years past, the chapter Treasurers and Secretaries had a lot of questions as to what a salary is or isn't. I worked with the Finance Committee and attempted to once again clarify the word "salary" as it would pertain to the IRS. I would like to remind everyone here today that this is truly no laughing matter; our tax status can be affected by not reporting salary correctly. This could ultimately affect our organization as a whole, and we must report properly. It is truly about more than just your chapter; it is about the entire organization.

There also seems to be some confusion as to whether the books of the chapter Treasurer and Secretary can be kept electronically or by hand; the answer is "yes" to either and the retention time does not change regardless of the method a chapter uses.

I highly recommend that the upcoming Grand Line provide time for training for those serving their chapter as Treasurer at the beginning of the year and again in the middle of the year prior to the year-end reports; this should also include the Secretaries of the chapters.

I received many, many questions about the yearly Chapter Audit of their books. It was surprising to me to find out that many chapters are not completing this audit as required by the C&L and when they do, they don't even know what to audit during the process. I created a cheat sheet for this process that I hope will be shared in the future with both the Treasurers and Secretaries. I encourage every Chapter Audit Committee to try and find something that the Treasurer and/or Secretary can improve on or correct as that is the reason for an Audit.

I would recommend to the upcoming Grand Line that the meetings of the Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees for the Senior Living Community not be scheduled for the same time or overlap. Both Finance and the Board of Trustees' meetings are too important not to attend in their entirety. The full participation of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron is essential and I believe by having their complete focus and attention, more work would be accomplished in a timelier manner.

This year the Grand Secretary had knee surgery almost immediately following Grand Chapter, so I had the privilege of making sure the office was running as smoothly as possible and addressing any concerns with the Worthy Grand Matron and/or Finance. Of course this responsibility included approving checks and signing them in addition to verifying that proper paperwork was included as documentation.

I conducted sexual harassment training for the Grand Chapter office, the Senior Living Community and the Board of Trustees. I was allowed to use my Human Resource training to hopefully assist with the growth of the Grand Chapter office.

I have had the pleasure of working with our Controller, Stacy Warren, and have been impressed with her ability to adapt to an ever changing environment. In addition to working with Stacy, I have had the pleasure of working with our Grand Secretary, Maryann Barrios, and her staff at the Grand Chapter office.

I attended all of the "All Members Instructionals" and too many Official Visits to count. I had the honor and privilege to install 22 Treasurers, 4 Secretaries, a Chaplain, and a handful of Star Points.

I also was assigned to officially audit the books of one chapter that despite the fact that there was no wrong doing, still seems to be working through issues within the makeup of their chapter. It is my sincere hope that they will put their differences aside for the betterment of the chapter and continue to serve our Order as one unit.

One of the duties of the Grand Treasurer is to act as the corporate Treasurer to the Board of Trustees and attend their meetings. It has been a pleasure to work with all of the member of this Board. This position also allows the Grand Treasurer to answer or shed light on questions from the Finance Committee regarding the Budget and other financial matters that the Board of Trustees is responsible for, and I believe that I served our Order well in this capacity.

The Grand Treasurer is also a voting member of the Finance Committee. I have had the sincere pleasure to work with the Finance Committee this year and see the effectiveness of Tricia Stewart as Chairman. Tricia has worked non-stop this year making sure that the finances of our Order are not overlooked. The dedication of this entire committee cannot be explained in this report, but I assure you that these members are some of the hardest working people I have ever met, and they have my admiration and support. They have worked tirelessly this year, not just one meeting a month, but rather have worked daily to see that the needs of our Grand Chapter are met which included conference calls and daily emails. Finance is not a committee for the weak at heart; they are faced daily with decisions that are not always easy to make, and when they make those tough decisions, they have to answer to all of our membership.

Our investments are handled by Merrill Lynch. Under their prudent guidance, our portfolio is doing well. The main focus has been on protecting ourselves during these tough economic times. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(by Jim Whiteley, PGP, President)

Sisters and Brothers, our Constitution and Laws require that the Trustees make a complete report of the property, condition and operation of our charity (better known as the Senior Living Community) for the preceding year. Our Yorba Linda campus currently occupies approximately 11.85 acres with 8.1 acres dedicated to our Home, 1.8 acres dedicated to our Eastern Star Professional Plaza and approximately 1.95 acres of open land of which one acre is currently leased out as a berry farm. The buildings that support our Home

and our Professional Plaza were built in 1959. We purchased the property and accomplished a significant refurbishment of the building which supports our Home in 1998 and early 1999. The Home was dedicated on June 6, 1999 and we have enjoyed 15 years of residency as of this year.

We started the 2014 year with a complete inspection of our facilities and, in the process, many safety and plant operational deficiencies were identified. All safety deficiencies have been corrected with the exception of areas that require improved lighting. Lighting improvements will be addressed in our 2015 budget. All plant operational type deficiencies have been prioritized and many have been corrected. The remaining items will be funded by the 2015 budget.

During the year the following key items have been accomplished:

- our "Disaster and Emergency Manual" has been revised
- a request was made and a permit received to operate three air compressors and two boilers
- a "Lock-Out/Tag-Out" program was implemented to meet OSHA requirements
- a full load drop utility test on the electrical emergency power generating system was performed
- a hazardous material inventory and business plans were submitted to the Orange County Environmental Health Department
- the five year maintenance plan has been updated
- and parking lot repair, resurfacing, and restriping was accomplished

Several other system annual and semiannual certifications have been accomplished as required by the many regulations with which we must comply. In addition, all routine maintenance tasks have been completed in a timely and satisfactorily manner.

The time has come for us to invest in some significant updates to our Home and the Eastern Star Professional Plaza. Some of the updates planned for 2015 will be:

- · a new roof on the SLC
- extensive painting both interior and exterior security and lighting upgrades.

The current roof on the SLC consists of several roofing layers that have been applied over the past 55 years. It has been tested and approved to allow one more layer of roofing which will be certified for 25 years. The Eastern Star Professional Plaza will receive some window replacements, dry rot repair, cabinet replacements and painting.

The operation of our SLC has prospered this year under the direction of our new Executive Director, Sister Kimberly Cooke, and her staff of well qualified managers. A complete review of all State and Federal licensing requirements was completed and all non-compliance issues have been corrected. We have received and passed the following inspections and audits to further certify the satisfactory operation of our Home:

- the California Board of Barbering and Cosmetology
- the Orange County Environmental Health for Hazardous Materials
- the Orange County Certified Unified Program Agency for Business Plans and Hazardous Materials

and Audits by

- the Yorba Linda Pharmacy for the proper control of prescription and non-prescription medication
- the Department of Social Services (resident files)
- the Environmental Health Hazard (kitchen)
- the Berkshire Hathaway for workers compensation
- the CohnReznick, LLT accounting firm for our financial accountability
- and the Department of Transportation.

Some of the other accomplishments for the year are as follows:

- a mandatory evacuation drill for the residents and staff was completed
- a sexual harassment training for management and staff was completed
- mandatory staff and safety meetings were implemented
- all computer software was properly licensed
- a prescription monitoring program was established
- the medication dispensing process was improved
- the reception and tracking of all calls for Star Care and Outreach Assistance was improved just to name a few.

Your Board of Trustees has been very busy meeting its responsibility of oversight for the operation of our SLC, the Eastern Star Professional Plaza, and the performance of our Outreach Program. It is very important to your Board of Trustees and the Management of our Home to ensure that every qualified member of our Order has access to the programs under our care. We continue our work to implement the goals of our Strategic Plan and will accomplish an update of the plan early in 2015. We will be reviewing the goal of providing a Skilled Nursing Facility and a Dementia Facility within five and ten years respectively. We will need to verify the need for, and the desire of, our members to establish these facilities. The thought is that as many of us live longer, the need for this level of care will be much greater in the future. Your input is very

important to us and we invite you to share your thoughts and comments. We have entered into discussion with the Masonic Homes of California to explore what our respective future needs might be and ways that we can work together to accomplish them.

We have worked closely with our Foundation Board and our Director of Charitable Giving, Emily Clark, to find ways to raise funds to benefit our respective endowments. Emily has a high level of energy and has worked very hard for our Order this past year. She has improved several of our existing programs and has implemented some new ideas and we have reaped many benefits from her efforts. With your help, we know that our fund raising efforts will reach a new level in 2015. Please consider inviting Emily and/or one of our Endowment Committee Members to your Chapter to explore ways that your members can work to help our fund raising efforts. Your Board Members are always available to help answer any question that you may have and even make a visit to your Chapter upon request.

We look forward to seeing you at some of our future events such as the Festival of Trees at the SLC on December 3 through the 5th, our Northern Event for the SLC on March 14, and our Southern Event known as the "Festival" on June 6. Your support is always appreciated.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Brother Jim, thank you for your report. The Board of Trustees has been busy this year facing opportunities to improve the Senior Living Community structure and the comfort of our residents. Your leadership in difficult moments has been appreciated by Randy, me, and all of the Board members.

Serving on the Board of Trustees takes more than one meeting a month. With your leadership, the entire Board has moved forward this year with decisions that have benefited our residents and the Order. We thank you and the board members for their dedication and willingness to go that extra mile for our members.

Sister Tricia Stewart, Chairman of our Finance Committee, we would be pleased to have you introduce the members of your committee and present your annual report.

Tricia Stewart, PM (17/23), Chairman, Finance Commitee: It gives me great pleasure to introduce those who spent this year dancing the Finance Committee quickstep: Sisters Donna Doan, Donna Tucker, PGT, and Debbie Sanborn, Grand Adah, and Brother Larry Coffin, PGP, along with our Worthy Grand Matron Debbie Maiman, Worthy Grand Patron Randy Cady, and Grand Treasurer Kim Cooke. Other performers in our dance troupe were: Associate

Grand Matron Martha Peters, Associate Grand Patron Roger Nieder, Grand Conductress Chris Dias, and Associate Grand Conductress Linda Hoeser. Every member of this Committee gave me valuable advice and insight during the year and it has been a pleasure and honor to share this dance with them.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

(by Patricia Stewart, PM (17/23), Chairman)

I have now waltzed through all or a portion of each of the last 8 years on the Finance Committee. My thanks, (should I call them that?) go to Past Grand Matron Linda Bernhard for reappointing me in July 2012 and to Worthy Grand Matron Debbie Maiman for being so enthusiastic about it. With friends like that...

Many thanks go to our Grand Secretary Maryann Barrios and her staff for providing the rhythm which keeps not only Finance but all the Grand Chapter committees functioning. Whenever I sent an email to one of them asking for something the response was immediate. They are dedicated employees and every one of them would certainly appreciate a thank you occasionally and maybe a twirl around the dance floor for the things they do behind the scenes to keep our Grand Chapter running smoothly.

To Kim Cooke, Executive Director, Kat Farris, and the staff and residents of the Senior Living Community, what a lively disco you have at your facility and yet you always graciously found time to welcome our Committee into your facility for our meetings. Thank you.

As I came close to losing my step in the dance this year (and everyone from 2003 knows that I have an exquisite sense of rhythm), we were fortunate to hire Stacy Warren as our Controller. The calm she has brought to the hustle of our accounting function is immeasurable. She is mastering the twists and turns of her work and keeps in perfect step with the rest of the operation.

Our Worthy Grand Matron made the decision to dance freestyle this year for the Controller's Report. In lieu of an oral presentation, our Controller has included unaudited September 30 financial statements in your packets for Grand Chapter, the Foundation, and the Senior Living Community which have been included in your packets. Please take the time to review them and seek out Stacy with your questions, remembering that she has just recently inherited the choreography of previous Controllers. I encourage each of you to visit the Grand Secretary's booth in the vendors' area and meet Stacy. Ask her your questions. Remember that she is new but, if she does not have an immediate answer for you, she will get back to you with one.

The dance card has been completely full this year for the Finance Committee. Sec. 73 of our C&L directs that "to the end that the financial affairs of Grand Chapter shall be efficiently, prudently, uniformly, and expeditiously administered, it is hereby declared to be the policy of Grand Chapter that this committee shall have and exercise full authority and control over all financial matters of the Grand Chapter, (except as otherwise provided in this Constitution and Laws)."

Our dwindling membership with the related drop in per capita income coupled with the increased costs of everything from the utilities to run our facilities to the costs of providing meaningful benefits from our charities have created a never-ending crunch on our funds. The glory days of 40 or 50 years ago are gone, perhaps forever. We on the Finance Committee take our responsibilities very seriously as we seek to balance the Grand Chapter budget and assist the other entities in balancing theirs. We do not have the luxury afforded Grand Lodge of being able to increase per capita somewhat to match the budget. And we can't print money like our government. Months are spent every year trying to prepare workable budgets within the income constraints we are facing. It has become harder each year and I foresee it will be even more difficult in the future.

Our investments under the guidance of Merrill Lynch continue to perform to our expectations of a target return in the range of 4-7%. The total portfolio was up roughly 4.3% for this past fiscal year with an average return of 6.4% per year with fairly low volatility since we invested with them in 2002. In other words, we have achieved stable, attractive returns through significant market volatility (and seem to be doing so again more recently). In anticipation of a foreseen drop in the market within the next year or so and also as a result of major changes in fund managers, Merrill Lynch recommended some major adjustments in our portfolio which were voted on and passed.

Market volatility has materially picked up since the end of September. The global stock market is down about 5% thus far in the month of October as of Tuesday. The Eastern Star portfolio is down about 1% during the same time period. Of course, we never want to be down, but declines are inevitable for a portfolio that takes some risk. To be down one-fifth of the market is a good sign for this portfolio. The strong balance in the portfolio is once again helping during a market turndown.

After several years of trust settlement, the Restricted Home Endowment Fund received the final distribution, in the amount of \$51,745.79, from the Dales Trust established by PGM Lura Rae Dales and her husband, Milton. Total distributions from this trust equaled \$81,745.79.

The Scholarship Fund received a donation from the Van Riesen Trust of \$195,000. It cannot be too strongly emphasized that, as we encourage our members in the future to bequeath to our Scholarship Fund, we should tell them the benefits of directing their gift towards the Restricted Scholarship Fund so that their legacy will be guaranteed to last for years.

An analysis and restatement of the June Barnum Scholarship was prepared and the required accountings to the chapter for prior and current years sent. This is a condition of the Scholarship, as codified in the C&L and must be observed in the future.

In addition an analysis and restatement of the Music Scholarship prior year contributions was prepared and the general ledger was restated to reflect the proper balance.

A policy was adopted whereby Grand Chapter will purchase and sell at a profit the fabric for Worthy Matron, Deputy Grand Matron, and Grand Officer dresses. This policy will allow the relevant Grand Line officer to choose the fabric and set a price, which must include a profit. She will maintain the accounting for the fabric yardage and sales. Checks will be made to Grand Chapter, which will then reimburse to the proper party the cost of shipping the fabric to buyers. If the Grand Officer has paid a down payment or a cost in excess of the allowance, she will be reimbursed the down payment as soon as funds are available and the excess cost as soon as Grand Chapter's cost is recouped. All other proceeds will belong to Grand Chapter as income.

A policy was established that extra checkbooks for various events and Grand Chapter committees are not necessary and are detrimental to good accounting controls. It is acceptable to give the committee, for instance a meal committee, deposit slips so that they can receive and deposit reservations but good controls requires that the expenses go through the same approval process as other expenditures.

The Grand Line and Finance Committee discussed and analyzed the use of credit cards in the Grand Chapter office. A number of credit cards were held and used by Grand Chapter office employees. It was decided and communicated to the staff that only the Grand Secretary would carry a credit card. All other credit cards would be maintained in the safe and checked out only for special purposes to be returned immediately after and checked back in.

During some computer maintenance in September 2013 we lost reliable access to the Papersave computer software system. Thousands of dollars and a full year later we hope it is functioning properly. Lessons learnedkeep backups current and install software updates when received.

I cannot stress enough how important it is that every chapter in California obey the Federal and State laws governing them. The overall concept in giving a group exemption, such as that granted to the Grand Chapter of California, is that the parent has control over the subordinates. If the subordinate chapters do not perform the traditional dance steps, then they put the entire organization in danger of losing its step and therefore its tax-exempt status. Please take these two thoughts back to your chapters: First-- Send copies of all IRS and State of California notices to Grand Chapter and, before responding to them, ascertain with Grand Chapter whether you should respond or do nothing. Second—if your Chapter pays anyone for any kind of service, that is payroll subject to withholding. You should be filing payroll tax returns. If it is too difficult to prepare the returns, then hire someone. If your chapter can afford to pay wages and salaries, then they should be able to afford the cost of payroll tax return preparation also.

During 2014 we have assisted our Worthy Grand Matron by contacting a number of chapters who were having financial or other difficulties. Sometimes a member of the Committee went into the chapter and spent some time looking at their books and records. At other times we were able to address some problems with phone calls.

We also fielded many, many questions concerning the preparation of payroll tax returns. Frankly, Finance Committee members do not always have experience or knowledge in the area of payroll taxes; neither does the Grand Chapter staff.

As our membership numbers dwindle and chapters face financial hardship, we find more and more instances where this sort of assistance is needed. This becomes a burden to Finance Committee members and to the Grand Chapter office staff when added to their many regular duties and we often feel caught in the exuberance of a never-ending Charleston. My recommendation would be to assemble a committee of qualified (I stress that term) members who could assist in such matters. This committee would include members willing to soft shoe into a chapter to look over their books and members who can do a mean jitterbug in payroll tax matters. There are members in this State qualified to help with these activities who might be willing to spend some time on one or two projects without taking on the almost fulltime commitment demanded of the Finance Committee.

The most pressing problem hanging over our heads this past year has been our ongoing difficulties with the IRS. The tax-exempt status of about half of our chapters has been revoked over the last few years. Sister Denny Rae Grist has worked diligently with a tax attorney from Boston for over two years now as we attempt to restore the tax-exempt status for these chapters.

The Cincinnati IRS office has performed a delightful cakewalk and agreed from the beginning that the revocation was erroneous. Unfortunately, the revocation was performed by the Ogden office which has tap danced around the issue for months. They just recently admitted there might have been an "inadvertent revocation" and agreed to send out letters reinstating the status of those chapters. After 3 months, we still have seen no letters.

However, and this is the **great news** with which I wish to end this report, Sister Denny Rae has just told me that the IRS has already electronically reinstated, retroactively, the non-profit status of all Chapters. Letters confirming that fact should be going out very soon. I don't know if this means much to many of you sitting out there but to those of us on the Finance Committee, this is wonderful news and it gives me a great deal of pleasure to be able to end my report and year with this announcement.

My many thanks to all with whom I have served and particularly to the 2014 Finance Committee members. The appointed members of the Committee who will be leading it over the next few years are dedicated and capable members who have the financial well-being of the Order at heart. You can rest easy knowing that they are dedicated to performing their duties to the very best of their abilities. My Grand Treasurer, Kim Cooke, has been wonderful. I know that she has some new job that everyone has made a big deal over but to me she will always be "my Grand Treasurer". She has been a rock for me and helped through so many of the difficult decisions this year carried. Brother Randy, it has been wonderful sitting on the Committee with a member from MY chapter. For so many years Hollywood Chapter always had the Committee majority. It was nice for little old Ferndale to have excess representation for a year. Your support and calm good sense was comforting to all of us this year. Sister Debbie, I have an affectionate nickname for you which goes against everything in your nature. You have stepped up and made decisions that I would never have believed possible from a circle person. There was so much thought put into each difficult decision and I saw you put yourself into others' shoes and suffer along with them. Even when I personally did not agree with the decision you had to make, I knew you had put hours of thought into it and had made the only decision you felt you could. It's been an honor serving you this year.

The last 8 years have been an excellent and mostly enjoyable experience and I have learned more than can ever be told. I thank all of you, past years and present, for the opportunity to serve our Order and wish future Finance Committees the very best luck.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Tricia, in 2012, you were asked to return to serve on the Finance Committee when a member needed to resign, and you said "Yes." You stepped back onto the committee without losing a beat. I have called on you many times, and each occurrence you have listened and answered the questions with patience and understanding.

I have been truly grateful for your leadership. The knowledge I gained these last two years has been irreplaceable. I thank each member of this committee for taking your obligation seriously and for constantly working for the good of our Order.

The major duties of this committee are to examine all proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws and report thereon to Grand Chapter, and to examine all proposed codes of bylaws of subordinate chartered Chapters and all proposed amendments thereto and to report thereon with its recommendations to the Worthy Grand Matron.

Worthy Grand Matron, I thank you for appointing me Chairman of the committee this year and for appointing two members to work with me. This Sister and Brother were extremely helpful and I would like to present them at this time. Serving with me were Sister Linda Bernhard, PGM, and Earl Eckert, PGP. I could not have completed the duties assigned if it was not for their help and I thank them not only for that, but for serving on the committee. Brother Earl gave us quite a scare this summer when he had to undergo open heart surgery, but he has recovered and has his old sense of humor back as well, which pleases me greatly. Thank you both.

In July of this year, this committee met in Stockton with Jurisprudence, Finance, the WGM, the Parliamentarian and part of the Grand Line to review the proposed amendments. Some of those who could not attend joined us via teleconference. All proposed amendments were reviewed to determine if they were in proper form and that the intent was clear. Where it was not, Brother Rob Scott, Chairman of Jurisprudence and I had a conference call with Jim Hannum and Shirley Orth, two of the proponents of several pieces of the legislation. Via this conference call, we were able to clarify our questions so this legislation could be brought forward to be voted on at Grand Chapter. I also had a telephone conversation with another proponent wherein some wording had to be added to one piece of the proposed legislation, which also was accomplished by this call.

This year we reviewed 43 proposed bylaw changes from subordinate chapters. Of these, 10 were for consolidated chapters and one of these has been disapproved twice. As of this date, it has not come back to the Committee. When it was not possible to approve the requested change, every effort was made to contact the Secretary and correct the minor errors over the telephone. When this was not possible, the request was returned.

Sisters and Brothers, it would make this process much easier if you would merely use the Uniform Code that is supplied by Grand Chapter and "fill in the blanks." It is also important that the chapters update their bylaws at the conclusion of every Grand Chapter session, incorporating the changes made at the session into their own Chapter Bylaws. We also would like to remind the members that the changes to your bylaws do not become effective until they have been approved by the Worthy Grand Matron, returned to the Secretary and read in your Chapter meeting.

This committee would also like to thank Maryann Barrios, Grand Secretary, and Pamela Sandstrom of the Grand Chapter office for all their assistance in not only processing the proposed bylaws changes requested by the subordinate Chapters, but for answering numerous questions that arose when attempting to process some of the requests. We would also like to thank the Grand Chapter Secretarial Staff of Jean Cook and Ginger Basset for helping us get the proposed legislation in order and ready for presentation. These two Sisters work very hard during this week, always behind the scenes and we appreciate all they do for us.

Worthy Grand Matron, again, thank you for the appointment to this Committee. It has been a very rewarding experience for me and for Linda and Earl as well. Whenever we could help a Chapter out, it made our job so much more enjoyable and we felt like we were doing something worthwhile.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Denny Rae, Randy and I knew the Constitution and Laws Committee would need to have a chairman well-versed in the ins and outs of our regulations and it was you. And I thank you, Sister Linda and Brother Earl, for assisting the chapters in changing their bylaws and answering any questions that might have come their way.

I knew we were in good hands. You have been a support to me these many years and a friend whom I respect. Now I can even say we were roomies in Arizona at their Grand Chapter this year. I had a great time and we laughed a lot. Thank you so much.

Brother Howard Freelove, the members of San Diego have had an opportunity hear your talent many times over the years. This afternoon your voice will be shared with all of California, and we thank you so much.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Brother Rob Scott, Chairman of Jurisprudence, we would be pleased to have you give your report at this time.

Rob Scott, PP (163), Chairman, Jurisprudence Committee: I would like to introduce the members of my committee. This is great. This is the first time Gary has done what I asked him to do all year.

First, there is Gary Gole, Past Patron of South Pasadena Chapter No. 21 and Dr. Rob Morris Chapter No. 651. Gary is the mensch of Grand Chapter. There's no one more intimately familiar with the Constitution and Laws than Gary, and if on any occasion this year the work of the committee made us look good, we have Gary to thank for that. Gary is also a partner in a law firm in Beverly Hills, so if you need legal assistance — and a lot of money — look him up.

Then there is Virginia Williams, Past Matron of Santa Cruz Redwoods Chapter No. 273, and Athena Chapter No. 46. Virginia's job on our committee is to keep Gary and me in line. She's kind of like the conscience of the committee. You know, last year, as Gary mentioned, Karen Fletcher was on the committee and Karen carries a gun. So Karen didn't really have a whole lot of trouble keeping everyone in line. Virginia, being unarmed, had to be a lot more creative, and she's doing a good job; no major embarrassments this year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE

(by Rob Scott, PP (163), Chairman)

The committee works all year rendering opinions and interpreting documents and contracts, and giving advice to our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. Pursuant to the Constitution and Laws, the committee meets with the Constitution and Bylaws Committee to make sure proposed legislation is unambiguous, in proper form, and not in violation of the Constitution and Laws or the rules of General Grand Chapter.

During Grand Chapter Week, the committee helped prepare and present legislation to the Grand Chapter. If any member has a question concerning fraternal law, please contact the committee. Your questions must be in writing and will take approximately three weeks to render a formal opinion.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Brother Rob. Whenever I had a question and needed interpretation, you, Gary, and Virginia were there to assist me in the understanding of the subtleties of our constitution. Interpretations are not quite the same, but talking through the situation gives us the opportunity to understand it together. I am grateful for your good and thorough advice.

Sister Rebecca Darrow, of the Audit Committee, we would be pleased to have you introduce the members of the committee and present your report.

Rebecca Darrow, PM (171), Chairman, Audit Committee: Members of the committee are David Von Bima, PGP from Chapter No. 33; the Chairman of the committee is Adam Buttons who could not be here tonight.

REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

(by Rebecca Darrow, РМ (171))

The Grand Chapter Audit Committee is charged with meeting with an independent CPA firm to satisfy the financial statements of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the Eastern Star Foundation, in order to review the audits by the independent CPA firm and decide whether or not to accept it, and to ensure that the audits conform to national standards.

As required by the Nonprofit Integrity Act of 2004, the independent CPA firm of Cohn Reznick, LLP, was contracted to audit the statements and the positions of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation with the year ending September 30, 2013. This was the first year of their auditing contract. In January of 2014, the Audit Committee met with Cohn Reznick to review the draft audit report for each of the entities.

The auditors expressed the opinion that due to the Grand Chapter of California's economic interest in and control over the Eastern Star Homes of California, these two entities should consider consolidating their financial statements which would follow the generally accepted accounting principles in the United States.

Except for the opinion expressed over the consolidation of the financial statements, it was determined that the financial statements prepared by Grand Chapter management were in compliance with financial accounting standards, and the accounting statements presented fairly in all material aspects the financial position of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California, and the California Eastern Star Foundation as of September 30, 2013. The auditors of Cohn Reznick have prepared the audit in compliance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America.

It has been a pleasure to serve on the Audit Committee for the past three years, and I thank the Worthy Grand Matron for this appointment and confidence in me.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Rebecca, for coming to me when our chairmen could not be here. We thank you very much for the work of your committee.

Sister Elsa Templin, may we have the report of your Election Committee at this time?

Jeraldine Creager, PGM: Sister Ardath Garst was initiated into Gardena Chapter No. 260 on September 2, 1943. Through consolidation, she was a member of San Pedro Harbor No. 174. She served her chapter as Worthy Matron in 1970. In 1993, she received her 50-year pin. She served our Grand Chapter as Grand Warder in 1974. She continued to serve on a number of Grand Chapter committees.

On October 21, 1983, the stage was set for the beginning of a beautiful year for Sister Ardath Garst, Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Warren Wildman, Worthy Grand Patron of 1984. Their emblems were depicted on the stage in the Sacramento Memorial Auditorium. Their emblems, the wind chimes and windmills, were symbolic of the energy of the wind.

Part of the narration of that evening was the following message: You need not listen to hear the symphony of sounds the winds can produce. From the roarings of the gale as it rips the leaves from the trees are in this quieter form, the breeze gently causes wind chimes to sing out with their beautiful notes of harmony. But even the wonders of the wind are held by magnitude of the Supreme Being, that great force that controls all powers of the universe.

The Bible tells us that God spoke out of the turmoil of the whirlwind. Can you hear your voice in the wind? Listen. During the recessional at Grand Chapter, the following words were spoken: "Your year is really over and now it's time to go; the ringing chimes are silent, the light no longer glows. Your loved ones wait here for you, they want you by their side. They know it's been a good year, one to look back on with pride. And always in the distance when breezes stir the air, you will hear soft music from your chimes, the lights will still be there."

And so it was on November 6, 2013, that the chimes were silenced, no longer blowing in the wind, yet they are still ringing in the hearts of those who knew her. Yes, it was time for her to go, to meet her husband Frank who was waiting for her. And always in the distance when breezes stir the air, we will hear soft music from her chimes and the light of her life will always be there.

She had been a member of the Order for over 70 years and two months.

Sherie Gustafson, PGM: On behalf of our Sister Paula Remington, Past Grand Matron 1992, it is with a heavy heart that I bring her message to you. She is a sweet, gracious lady who has given her all to the Order of Eastern Star. There is no way I could ever fill her shoes. But as her Grand Marshal, I am honored to speak in her behalf regarding our Brother Vernon L. Gordon, Past Grand Patron, 1992, and Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of California and Hawaii.

Even today, there may be few in this room who did not have the opportunity to meet with him personally, to shake his hand, to share his smile, or to be embraced as part of the "Hugging Crew of '92."

In January, each of our chapters received a synopsis of the many activities of this outstanding leader in our Order: Worthy Patron in 1962, several chapter offices, multiple years serving our Grand Chapter Committees, including Appeals and Grievances, Constitution and Bylaws, Home Board, Aims & Objectives, Jurisprudence, Liaison to Grand Lodge, International Order of DeMolay and Speakers Bureau.

Brother Vernon was a Senior DeMolay. He was extremely active in the California Masonic Grand Lodge and served as the Most Worshipful Grand Master in 1980. This presentation reminds us of the points and places of service, but it does not begin to describe him as to his character, his principles, and why we admired him and were drawn to him.

Who was this person, who was a man among men and a gentleman among women? Our Brother Vernon Gordon caught our attention and held our friendship because he long knew many Masonic principles and participated and presided with them in his daily life. He was a very religious person and openly spoke his prayer and his belief in help from God. He set an example for all of us by the quality of his ritual work. Many members were attracted to him and further saw him practice the teachings of our degrees in his public life.

He inspired us, he challenged us, and he uplifted us. In his prepared speeches, he always brought a message of doing good and of being better. He often cautioned that we should seek quality in potential members and should not gain members by sacrificing character.

He had been asked by Paula and Tom for him and Mae to join them to be the Worthy Grand Patron in 1992, and it took him awhile to answer that question. They were so pleased when they said "Yes." Perhaps he remembered the song in Oklahoma, that the farmer and the cattleman should be friends.

Brother Vernon's many years of preparation showed many times in 1992. He was a likeable person, he gave me good counsel, when he spoke he had a message which lifted his audience, which inspired them and which encouraged them to follow his example and lead and to carry on our Eastern Star principles in our daily lives. He often quoted outside sources and the Holy Bible messages. Our members were drawn to his leadership. Vernon Gordon lived by example, an exemplary life worthy of our emulation. Who could not admire humility of his prayer? With our prayer the Lord let us live, that while we live, we live for Thee. Not as we take, but as we give; not as we pray, but as we live.

California Grand Chapter has been blessed by the light and service of Vernon L. Gordon. May he now rest "la palma de la mano de Dios," in the palm of God's hand.

Sheri Weisser, PGM: Brother Irvin "Bill" Betts passed away on January 25, 2014, after a lengthy illness. Bill was born on October 19, 1929, in Nebraska. He was the second of nine children of Omar and Ezada Betts. Bill spent his early years in Fruitland, Idaho, and served in the Idaho National Guard. He married Joan Carter, in Phoenix Arizona, on July 18, 1950, and moved to Southern California. Bill served the City of Sierra Madre Police Department for 29 years, retiring as chief of police in 1994.

Brother Bill was initiated into Southland Chapter No. 307, Pasadena, on February 2, 1965. He served his chapter as Worthy Patron in 1970, 1987, 1990, 1999, and 2007; Associate Patron in 1986, '89, '92, and 2006; and Chaplain in 1997. Bill became a life sponsor of the Senior Living Community in 1991. Brother Bill was appointed to serve as Grand Sentinel in 1993, and was elected Associate Grand Patron in 1994. He was honored to serve as the 1995 Worthy Grand Patron.

REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

It was my sincere pleasure to work on this committee. I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to Past Grand Matron Beverly Wade for selecting me to work on this wonderful committee. It has been a very hard five years, but a very worthwhile five years. We do **so** much good with our scholarship funds, and we help so many young people (and not-so-young, sometimes!).

The people who worked on this committee this year were really great. I would like to introduce them: Nancy Bay, Brenda Hanson-Smith, Nina Murray and Barbara Rahl. Also, James Hannum in the Grand Chapter office was a great deal of help. Our committee appreciates the efforts of James and his helpers in helping to make this happen this year. I believe James will have copies of the **new** scholarship application ready to hand out to our youth and anyone else who would like one.

This year, we were able to give out 37 scholarship awards. The amount for each scholarship was a lot less than we would have liked, as there was so little money available.

In the "special" awards category, we gave a music scholarship award. This is a new award given to one who is in Eastern Star, and who will use the funds for piano lessons; this will benefit an Eastern Star chapter which might otherwise have no Organist.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSOLIDATIONS

A consolidation, by definition, has two meanings: The first is a statutory combination of two or more corporations. Each chapter is like a business organized and run by our Constitution and Laws, and concerns personnel, assets, and liabilities. The Grand Chapter Consolidation Committee guides chapters in understanding the nuts and bolts of the constitutional process, a process that dues require special notices, timings, meetings, report backs, votes, and most importantly, food. An Eastern star meeting is not official unless we have food. This is a process that needs to be followed precisely because of our Constitution and Laws.

However, I truly believe that our second definition of consolidation guides our process. "Consolidation" also means solidification and strengthening. When our committee is asked to come out to a chapter meeting or an association meeting, the usual reaction is "Oh, no, it's Consolidations." However, we are there to help our members to respect the past, acknowledge the present, and build for the future.

I also had to ask our Sister Michelle to go to San Fernando Chapter when they relinquished their charter, and she's the one who graciously and kindly went there and took the paraphernalia that needed to come back to the Grand Chapter Office.

It is a hardworking committee and the dedication it takes to be informing and kind to all concerned members is a necessary gift to be successful on this committee. Thank you, and all of your committee members, for all you have done this year to help our chapters.

REPORT OF THE BENEVOLENT FUND COMMITTEE

(by Pamela Potter, PM (21), Chairman)

Sisters and Brothers, the Benevolent Fund has handled a total of 32 inquiries, received by phone, email or snail mail for the year ended September 30, 2014. Twelve of these inquiries resulted in Benevolent Fund applications. This year we have paid out a total of \$15,782.28 on these twelve requests. We had 20 requests denied and eight never called back after the initial inquiry. One was referred to Jurisprudence; after that the member did not call back. Five requests were denied as not covered under the Benevolent Fund; four didn't meet the five year membership requirement, and two were referred to StarCare.

The Benevolent Fund works very closely with StarCare and Outreach; it has been a pleasure to work with Lauren Derryberry. I thank her for all the assistance she has given me this year. Also a big thank you goes to the Grand Chapter office. I appreciated all the assistance you continue to give me; without your help my job would be very difficult.

Worthy Grand Matron, thank you for asking me to continue on as chairman of the Benevolent Fund; it has been an honor to serve our members.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Pam, thank you, my friend, for the kindness shown to our members and the need of assistance from this fund. Knowing that this fund is available for relief in a financial emergency is another reason that we are a vital fraternity with members caring for members. We thank the members of the committee for your service this year.

Sister Laird Crandall, Chairman of our Membership Committee, may we have your report at this time, and if you have any of your committee members, if you would introduce them.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

(by Laird Crandall, PM (650), Chairman)

Initially, the Committee met after the October 2013 installation with Debbie Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron and Randall Cady, Worthy Grand Patron, where they indicated the focus for the year would be revitalizing chapter membership. They also wanted chapter membership committees to be educating its members about the benefits the Order offers through our charities and asked us to work in concert with the Consolidation committee so that we could attend chapters contemplating this direction and give them support. For some chapters, consolidation is not the answer and support and encouragement from a membership committee person can assist them in revitalizing their chapter. We were asked to attend IMPACT sessions and AMIS to let the local members know of their local contacts and to provide materials, if possible.

To that end, we charted out our course of action for the year targeting the members who already belong to Eastern Star but come infrequently or not at all. The Membership Committee, initially composed of 20 persons, were assigned to one or more districts, dividing the state into manageable areas. They attempted to contact and work with the subordinate chapter membership committee members.

A total of 77 chapters in California were contacted directly, by telephone, email, or in person to gather information or assist with membership. Some committee members visited chapters presented workshops and spoke while encouraging them in their membership activities.

More than 247 chapter members were contacted by the membership committee throughout the state from October 20, 2013 to October 1,2014.

Focusing on Chapter Revitalization, the committee was trained on the Leadership Committee's module "Mining Your Roster" as our primary tool to help chapters. We also were given a script and instruction sheet that members could use when making calls to members as well as a Member Contact Form for the chapter members to report back to their own membership committee.

While planning our strategies, we did not ignore assisting with the recruitment of new members and were willing to help chapters with a broad spectrum of needs. The committee gathered, enhanced and created some valuable membership materials and made them available to the chapters including

- "50 Ways To Promote Membership"
- "Revitalization"
- "Elements of Membership Retention"
- "Member Guide Book"
- "Community Visibility" and
- "Formal Mentorship Program

This body of materials will hopefully all be posted to the Grand Chapter Website for all to use. Having viable useful materials is essential for our chapters to continue to maintain and increase membership

From our work this year, we make these recommendations:

- Make a smooth transition from year to year by involving the incoming Chair in the committee and making certain all materials and pertinent material are handed over. This committee's work is on a continuous basis and can affect our chapters positively regardless of the Grand Chapter year transition.
- 2. Select committee members to serve who are willing to be active in meetings, conference calls and travel if need be, so the work of the committee doesn't fall on a half a dozen. This is truly a working committee and those asked to serve need to realize this.
- 3. Utilize our Grand Chapter website for posting membership materials for easy access and let chapters know they exist. Membership has developed wonderful materials for our chapters.
- 4. Continue to encourage all chapters to have a working Membership Committee (vs appointing the chapter as a whole.) Ask the DGMs to review this requirement with the Worthy Matrons. Grand Chapter's Membership Committee is not a last resort, to be called only in dire circumstances, but is there to provide ongoing support for our chapters.
- Continue to work with the Leadership Committee to get information out to chapters.

6. Continue to work with the Consolidation Committee so that "First Aid" is sent into chapters before the "Undertakers" arrive.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Laird, and your committee, we did ask you to move in a little bit of a different direction this year and you have done well. Thank you so much for going into those chapters that asked to see you so that we could help them, and we appreciate it.

This year we asked the Membership Committee to look into some ways of helping our chapters who are struggling not only with new membership, but also with ideas for bringing members back into the chapters. We thank the committee members for visiting those chapters to give them support when needed. In some instances, we asked them to visit first to give assistance, and as our chairman said rather than send in the Consolidation Committee, working together with consolidations has given our chapters some options and some ideas that they may not have known they had.

REPORT OF THE LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE

(by JD Hammett, PGP)

This Chairman and the members of the Leadership Committee give a special thank you to Sister Delma who always makes us look outstanding with her development of the highest level of professionalism in the power point presentations for our programs.

The 2014 Leadership Committee was charged with creating and presenting a state-wide leadership program for all of our members and assisting the Grand Line Officers with projects as necessary. The Grand Line authorized the use of the term "IMPACT — Involving Members Promoting Active Change Together" for our Leadership Programs.

The WGM, Sister Debbie, and WGP, Brother Randy, requested that the 2014 Leadership Programs remain as standalone program, meaning that they would not be held in conjunction with other Grand Chapter events. They directed the Committee to design a program that would include the following topics:

- The History of Eastern Star
- Focusing on our Existing Membership
- Community Service focusing on taking care of our own and our charities

Our first meeting, was a face to face meeting at Sister Collette's home. All subsequent meetings were held via conference call. Grand Chapter does not have a conference call service that we could use so all of our telephone calls were held by using a member's business service. It should be noted that the Leadership Committee holds weekly meetings via conference call until the program is designed. We are a working Committee that requires meetings, calls, follow-up meetings and more calls to complete our assigned tasks. After the program was completed, we held bi-weekly status meetings.

At our first meeting we drafted a mission statement for the Leadership Committee. Our mission statement is "To educate our members in a positive environment and provide the opportunity to create vision, share ideas, collaborate and develop leadership skills for all members."

The theme of the 2014 IMPACT Programs was "You Should Be Dancing", to incorporate the 2014 dance theme of our WGM and WGP. The 2014 IMPACT Program modules were:

The Leadership Committee created and delivered eight leadership programs:

- Sunday, March 9 Atascadero/Central Coastal Area Mary Aman, Site Coordinator

- Sunday, March 23 Roseville/Greater Sacramento Debra Knutson, Site Coordinator

The committee decided that the IMPACT program would be 5 hours in length with a 45 minute lunch break. Sessions would be from 10:00 AM-3:00 PM. There would be 3 modules in the program — all modules would be general sessions for everyone. Each module would last for 1 hour and 20 minutes. We also featured the motivational video "It's So Simple". "It's So Simple" is based on Southwest Airlines four principles:

- Attitude
- Freedom to Be Yourself

Associate Matron/Associate Patron Workshop:

The Committee was asked by the Associate Grand Matron, Martha Peters, and Associate Grand Patron, Roger Nieder, to present two modules at their Associate Matron/Associate Patron Workshop held July 25–27, 2014 in Stockton, CA. The modules presented were "The Working Tools of Our Order" which also included a hands-on exercise using our Constitution and Instruction Book and "Mining Your Roster".

All members of the Committee participated in the creation of the modules and Collette Gole, Delma Davis, and JD Hammett assisted in the facilitation of these modules at the workshop.

Leadership Training for the Supreme Council, Order of the Amaranth:

Once again, the Supreme Council asked our Leadership Committee to facilitate a workshop at the annual Supreme Council Session in Cincinnati, OH. JD Hammett presented, "Creating and Living a Strategic Plan" to the Supreme Assembly delegates.

Leadership training for the Colorado Masonic Family sponsored by Job's Daughters of Colorado and the World Youth Foundation:

The Leadership Team was invited by the Grand Guardian Council of Colorado Job's Daughters and the Job's Daughters World Youth Foundation to present a leadership program for the Colorado Masonic Youth Groups and Adult Masonic Organizations. The program was presented on May 3, 2014 in Denver, CO. The Leadership Team created and delivered a "Leadership Round-Up" that included Ice Breaker exercises and 4 modules. The modules presented were:

- "What's Your Shape"
- · "FISH Philosophy"
- "ABCs of Membership" Active/Bring Back/Current
- "Mining Your Roster" for the Adults "Youth Discussion, Bumper Stickers, and Elevator Speeches" for the Youth
- "It's So Simple"

Request for Assistance from Our Leadership Team:

We have received numerous requests for our programs from other jurisdictions. We are only too happy to comply with these requests. Many of the jurisdictions want us to come to their jurisdictions and present programs. These details are in the planning stages. Also it should be noted that our modules on the "Strategic Plan" have been used by other jurisdictions to assist them with creation and implementations of strategic plans for their jurisdiction.

We received a request from the Grand Chapter of Nevada to review our 2014 IMPACT Program and to borrow our videos "FISH Philosophy" and "It's So Simple". We complied and understand they had a very successful day of leadership programs during August, 2014.

Conclusion:

Myths:

Many of our members are still under the impression that the IMPACT Program is for chapter officers only. This is a myth. The IMPACT program is open to all members regardless of whether they hold an office or not.

Many of our members think that the IMPACT Program is the same every year. This is a myth. IMPACT sessions include a different program every year based on the wishes of the WGM and WGP.

Many of our members are under the impression that if you go to the All Member Instructional you don't need to attend the IMPACT Program. This is yet another myth. The IMPACT program does not cover any information presented at an AMI — they are two totally different and separate programs.

We'd like to share some information with you. The Grand Lodge of California this past year spent \$198,265 for Masonic Education and Leadership programs.

They get it! Our Brothers understand the importance of leadership development programs. They encourage participation - what about Eastern Star? Can we make this a priority? Maybe the question should be do you want to make this a priority? We are hopeful that your response would be a resounding "yes we do".

Each year the Leadership creates a new program that is in alignment with the current Strategic Plan. For example, our 2013 and 2014 programs were designed based on 5 year strategic plan accepted by the Grand Line for 2013 - 2017. The incoming WGM and WGP also meet with the Leadership Committee to give us their recommendations for the program based on the part of the strategic plan they want to emphasize.

It is the recommendation of this Committee that the Grand Line Officers need to motivate and encourage their associates and members to attend these leadership development programs and to promote IMPACT when and where ever they can. We would suggest to the Chapter Conductresses, Associate Matrons, Associate Patrons, Worthy Patrons and Worthy Matrons to add the IMPACT sessions to their calendars and encourage chapter participation by attending a session.

We want to remind you one more time that the IMPACT programs and information presented by the Leadership Committee changes every year. Also, the information can be used and applied not only Eastern Star but to career and every day personal life. So come to the next IMPACT program in your area and make an impact on our Order. Keep the Vision of Eastern Star Alive!

Good afternoon, everyone. Thank you for that response. I was hoping I was going to have that.

To the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron, thank you. Also to the Distinguished Members of Order of the Eastern Star, I'm actually, hopefully thinking about being a third generation Eastern Star myself. My grandmother and my mother, my grandfather actually was a Mason as well as my dad — they didn't stay in it, but at least the elders did. So for them I will consider as well being with all of you today. So thank you for touching my heart.

For Ontario, we are excited to give you something new and something different. Our city is the small town just 30 miles east of Los Angeles, so you still get that great feeling as though you are in LA, but you don't have the same rates which is a good thing. We can get you to Disneyland in 45 minutes for your kids and grandchildren. We can also get you to San Diego in an hour. So we give you a different type of feel to have you stay even longer.

One thing I will say as far as our hotels, our hotel community is just like a small family. We have over 6,000 rooms in our area that run the gamut of small hotels to your four star hotels.

Our hotel rates will change when your group comes; we negotiate it on your behalf. The rates are \$99 to \$109, and that's for three years. That's something that we were looking at, pricing for you as well.

The site selection committee was great. I haven't had a chance to really wow them as Visalia has done, but I definitely know that when your group does come to Ontario, you will be feeling just like you were at home.

One thing that I have had questions about is "Will there be user-friendly seating?" And, yes, that is something we are going to partner with the Order of Eastern Star and split the costs for you or really kind of change the format, more like a stadium feel where you can actually look up and see what is happening down on the floor. So that's something your group will be able to decide and we're able to make that happen.

Not only will you be able to enjoy your convention, but you'll also be able to shop at one of California largest outlet malls, which is Ontario Mills. It gets more visitors a year than Disneyland. I say it's because it has air-conditioning, parking, and it's free.

So definitely look for your group coming to Ontario or at least considering us for your 2017, '18 and '19 years. And if you want me to sign, I think you should sign too.

ADDRESS BY FRESNO CONVENTION BUREAU

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the Order of Eastern Star, usually I don't have a problem standing in front of a large group of people and talking. You can ask these women next to me, I didn't stop talking all day. But when I stand up before you I'm shaking, I'm humbled, and it's because of that that it's probably one of the most humbling experiences I have ever had.

Coming from a family of masons, members of the Eastern Star, and being a Bethel 223 Majority Member of Job's Daughters, it's hard for me not to be emotional standing here. And I'm supposed to be talking about Fresno, and I'll get to that.

But what I want to say to you first is no matter what happens, the experience of being the spirit in the middle of this room is something I will never forget. I feel my grandmother tapping me on the shoulder, telling me to make her proud and to remember all the lessons she taught me. So I just want to tell you thank you for letting me be here today, because I know what a privilege it has been for us to be standing in this room.

Now, on to Fresno, California's year-round playground. I'm here to invite you back. You have been to Fresno and we love the Order of the Eastern Star. We love when you come; we're very privileged you have come to visit us in the past. And not only have we developed a relationship with you, we have listened to you. So when I talk a little bit more later about what we commit to, hopefully you will see that we have listened.

First of all, we're centrally located which is, you know, another advantage, of course. We have an international airport, we have exceptional restaurants, way too many of them, we have exceptional shopping, things that you can enjoy. Our hotels are affordable, but I have some exciting news for you: There are two downtown hotels, for example, the Radisson that was across the street from the convention facilities themselves have changed its name to Double Tree, and has undergone renovations. The first big change is the Downtown Partnership has created an ambassadors' program, and we in the last year have been delighted to use in partnership for every convention that we have. They have booths, they have ambassadors in uniform on every single corner to help you along the way as you navigate through the blocks downtown to either your meetings, your hotels, or the eateries. We're working again with all of the business and the restaurants surrounding the convention center to stay open and to accommodate you more, and of course have welcome signs so that you know they are waiting for you and they are excited about you being there.

And then as well, the convention center itself has hired 24-hour security service so we will have that security for you that's never been present before is now for conventions that come to town, making people feel better about walking around downtown. Sometimes you get a little bit nervous when it's dark. So we wanted to make sure there were people there, and this is for all of our conventions to make it safer, to make it friendlier for you, again, to navigate your way.

We believe we are the perfect place for your 2017 through 2019 Annual Grand Chapter Sessions. Fresno misses you, and we look forward to having you come back soon.

Wayne Adams, PP (93): We want to thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for appointing me chairman and for my subcommittee, and they want to thank you also for all the help you have given.

Debra Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: Sisters and Brothers, it is with much pride and joy that I introduce our Sister Stacy Craig and Jennifer Bailey who we have been in contact with most of the year, along with Joy Victorine and Sarah Reback.

The members of California embraced Ethan and Teyler Totes with a vengeance and what you see here is — we have already sent about 200 to them — but what you see here is not all. We really filled 1,000 Totes, so we will have a few more coming in December. The residents of our Senior Living Community have been helping us to put some of the bags together. They have an assembly line, but they got tired. So we gave them a little respite, but we're going to put them back to work next week.

Stacy Craig: This is amazing to say the least. My son was diagnosed with a very, very rare form of cancer when he was four years old, and we had to travel for about four and a half years, for five hours out of our area. And we had about 20 life flights out, and there was so many times when we would get to the hospital and I forgot all the necessities, because all we're focused on is get our son there and get him well. So this is exactly what I wish we had when I was going through it.

On a good note, Ethan is now three years cancer free. He's been part of our inspiration for these totes. This is Jennifer and her son Teyler is the other inspiration, and I'll have her share her story.

Jennifer Bailey: My goodness. I made some notes, that's just how I am.

Just a little of background, two weeks before my due date my son Teyler stopped moving, and I went to our midwife and told her he had stopped moving and she said it's probably, you know, just him getting bigger, but you can go over to the hospital if you want to get some extra testing. And I said, great, let's do that, I'm going to trust my instincts. Sure enough something was wrong. He was born immediately, by emergency C-section and he only had 3 percent of his blood. It's amazing, it's a miracle that he survived. We immediately were shipped down to UCSF.

Being down there, there was a woman — she was a lactation specialist — and we didn't know if he was going to live or if he was going to die, but we kept praying. So being down at this huge hospital, we were terrified. I was in the lactation room and I had fallen apart on the floor and I was sitting there sobbing, and she had come in and she wrapped her arms around me and just let me cry. So really that's kind of where the importance of what we're doing, you know, just humanity and in giving back.

So nobody can prepare you for the statement "I'm doing everything I can to save your son," because in that moment all you want to do is take your child's spot. Every parent prays for the day he takes his child to college. Jeanette and I have had that privilege to do it twice. This fall we dropped our baby girl off in Fresno at Fresno State. We had no friends there, she did not have even the name of her roommate, but because an advisory girl or member by the name of Joanne Stern contacted an area Grand Deputy, Mrs. Redmond, Courtney had an instant connection. But see, Mrs. Redmond could have taken my daughter's name and put it down somewhere and forgotten about it.

We're great about doing that, aren't we? "I'll call them when I get to it. I'll call them when I think about it. I'll call them when it's convenient." I'm just as guilty of that, but Mrs. Redmond didn't do that. She picked up the phone and said "Hi, Courtney, I'm Mrs. Redmond. How would you like to come to a Rainbow meeting?" She did not know my daughter from anywhere; the only connection they had was Rainbow. That's the heart of our youth orders.

And as a parent I'm blessed. Do we have any girls from the Heart of the Valley Assembly? I know we have some advisory board members here. Every university should have a Heart of the Valley near it, because they made my daughter feel important and accepted. I could not be there for her 18th birthday, but they were. They gave her a balloon, some cards and some gifts. They baked her a birthday cake. That meant a lot to us, it meant a lot to us as parents, that somebody there would watch over our child and give them the opportunity to make wise decisions.

My daughter went to Alaska this year, and mom and dad couldn't go. We were too committed on our jobs and we really just couldn't take any more time off from work, but Mrs. Stern could. "I'll go . . . ," and she went. Nothing says more than our youth orders. The words I say today will never be justice for the actions that are said today because words are cheap, but actions are important.

Our sacrifice to our children is to make sure our lodges are homes where they can be safe, where they can grow, where they can become the people they are. Because sitting in our assemblies today, in our bethels, in our chapters, may be the next young person that finds the cure for cancer. They may be the one that finds the cure for Alzheimer's. The next Steve Jobs could be sitting in your youth orders today. The next Sandra Day O'Connor could be sitting in your youth orders.

I learned a long time ago that I need to treat our youth as if they are something special. I'll cheer for the Giants. Man, I'll walk the field and go crazy cheering for the Giants. I'll watch them on TV and scream and yell. I'll go to my youth orders and take that same passion. Hey I start cheering for them, because you know that someday they will lead this world and they are going to remember that some guy by the name of Dave Perry said "Hey, you're special; hey, you're needed; hey, you're accepted, you're here and we're here for you."

The Masons of California have made a commitment to our youth orders. See, we have contributed in the past, dollars and time. We're committed, we're not going to let them stop. I'm asking you today as parents and grandparents if you have children our youth orders' ages, you need to get them involved. They need someplace where they can go and turn to and be accepted.

They need somebody to help them make good decisions. Our lives are about the decisions we make and they have consequences, and they make decisions today at the age of 12 and 13 that I would not had to make until I was in my '20s, and they need somebody there to get them there. You'll say to yourselves: I'm glad I got them there or I wished I had, because they make a difference in your lives. I encourage you not to just contribute, but to commit to our youth orders and make that difference in the world.

See, alone we can do so little, but together we can do so much. I thank you for your time and efforts and God bless you all.



COMMITTEE REPORTS NOT GIVEN DURING SESSION

FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

(by Claudia Unger, PM, (128/195), Chairman)

I want to thank the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron for this appointment to the best committee in Grand Chapter! I would also like to thank the Grand Representatives who have sent in reports of their visits to other jurisdictions. It is such a thrill to discover the names of our California members among the dignitaries in faraway places. How great to have our own Glenn Munkres give the visiting Worthy Grand Matron and Patron welcome response, in his capacity as Worthy Grand Patron of Quebec! On a personal note, I enjoyed "catching up" with Tennessee (my own Grand Representative commission in 2000–01), Puerto Rico (my husband's commission from 2007–09), and Delaware (our daughter is currently serving as Grand Representative of Delaware in Oregon)!

As has been said many times before, there are so many similarities between Grand Jurisdictions: we follow almost the same format, honor and are honored by our Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, civic leaders, and our military at home and abroad; we pay tribute to those members who have passed on; and rekindle friendships near and far away. That being said, we also share in the downside of decreasing membership, increasing costs, and the issues incurred in meeting the needs of an aging fraternal family (in LA there were several Special Dispensations issued to allow meetings to be held downstairs as the members could no longer climb up to the Chapter Room). These opportunities (thank you Sue McKinney, PGM) are being addressed in various ways: in the General Grand Chapter of New York, there are only two paid positions -the Right Worthy Grand Secretary and one assistant; in another, a committee was formed to determine the difference between Grand Chapter Session "needs" and "wants", and if the business can be conducted in a shorter period of time. Although many jurisdictions have already made the switch to hotel ballrooms for their sessions, declining attendance has triggered hefty room usage fees that were previously comped; and, of course, speaking of session expense, the contract promised two-three years ago is rarely the same as the one presented for signature!

All jurisdictions practice the principles of brotherly love, relief, and truth, and support our General Grand Chapter charities, but there is a growing trend toward community service and local visibility. In several states, each Grand Starpoint has a charity to be supported by her subordinate chapter associates. All jurisdictions seem to support some form of cancer research/care, scholarship, and outreach for children, whether it be toys for hospitalized children, a school breakfast/lunch program, or "Make a Wish." Sometimes a local disaster triggers a response, such as the Arizona fires (both planting of trees to replace

those destroyed in the fire, and a monetary memorial to the firefighters lost in the maelstrom), or aid to the victims of Hurricane Sandy on the East Coast. Virginia's chapters purchased a "Dream Racer" car for the Shrine Hospital — fifty members traveled to Greenville, SC to make the presentation. It was built with the help of a NASCAR grant, and has space for an oxygen bottle, an IV pole, and a CD player! The Worthy Grand Matron chose this special project to honor her sister, who had been a patient at the Shrine Hospital. Another Worthy Grand Patron chose to support the Liver Foundation, as his grandson suffered from a liver disease. Many honored Angel Flight, the Wounded Warrior Project, or an organization similar to our Paws for Purple Hearts.

I was surprised to discover that some jurisdictions still have delegates for voting on the amendments. Legislation at one Grand Chapter to allow everyone a vote was defeated on the large chapter versus small chapter/urban versus rural equal representation argument. Little do they realize that those who want to attend Grand Chapter will do so, regardless of the distance or expense!

Not all jurisdictions have Deputy Grand Matrons - some have Grand Lecturers, and often times these can be Brothers. Proficiency testing varies among jurisdictions; California seems to be among the more lenient in granting certificates. Some jurisdictions have "extra" Grand Officers, such as Grand Historian, Grand Trustee, and even a Grand Fraternal Correspondent (this was unusual; most Fraternal Correspondents are Grand Conductresses and Associate Grand Conductresses)!

Communication is an ongoing problem in many jurisdictions. It is being addressed in several ways. In Alberta, the Worthy Grand Matron visits the shut-ins as she travels the province. In North Dakota, the Worthy Grand Matron writes a personal letter to each initiate, welcoming them to the order and inviting them to attend Grand Chapter (there are only 17 chapters in the state, so this may not be the burden it seems!). Most jurisdictions have a newspaper, but many have forgone the paper-and-ink version in favor of an electronic publication. All maintain websites with a lot of good information both for members and casual "surfers." Along the same lines, many jurisdictions now publish their Grand Chapter proceedings on a CD — this format is quicker and easier to produce, store or mail.

Most jurisdictions report declining participation in their youth groups, but there are exceptions. Rainbow is growing in at least one state, and the State Master Counselor of Kentucky is a senior at the University of Louisville, sings in the church choir, works the third shift at UPS, is a member of the Masonic Lodge and currently serving as Worthy Patron!

In closing, again let me express my gratitude for this wonderful appointment! I've had such a good time researching the proceedings, surfing the websites, and reading the reports from our Grand Representatives.

SPECIAL PROJECT — RAISING HOPE — SOUTHERN EVENT

This was a two-part job.

First, I needed to make sure that the Deputies from each District had the Totes filled with the items needed in each Tote and ready to be collected at each Official Visit of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron. In some cases there were more Totes than there was room in the vehicles to take them to the SLC. Some areas did not fill the needed Totes by the deadline while others filled more than they were given.

The second part was the Dinner Dance in Long Beach on April 26, 2014. This was a little more of a challenge. One, this was not my area of the State. I was told after planning had begun that there was a dinner. Plans originally were for snacks and drinks only.

Keeping the decorations very simple saved a lot of money. The DJ and Lodge Room were free and the committee in charge of the Dinner was a whiz in the kitchen. The committee saved a lot of money on the food as well as getting some of it donated.

At the last minute more people showed up and wanted to be a part of the Dinner. The count went from 92 at around 4 in the afternoon to 136 at 7 PM, not including the kitchen staff. People do **not** RSVP, and that's a shame. Thanks to the kitchen crew, however, there was plenty of food for everyone.

The profit for the Dinner Dance ended up being \$5,000.00, which went to the J. Clifford Lee Memorial Cancer fund.

RELAY FOR LIFE

I want to thank Worthy Grand Matron Debbie and Worthy Grand Patron Randy for designating Relay for Life as the program funded with Cancer Research donations in 2014. I also want to thank her for asking me to be Chairman this year for this project.

With every cancer diagnosis come statistics, numbers and questions: "What are my odds? How many treatments will I need? How many treatments are left?" Whether you're counting days, doctor appointments or dollars, there's something greater than all those numbers. Hope.

Cancer patients are turning to the American Cancer Society in record numbers, some seeking answers, others assistance and still others support. But all need hope. You are that hope. Through events like Relay for Life, the American Cancer Society mobilizes the world's largest movement to defeat cancer once and for all. And they do this by raising funds to fight for every birthday, threatened by every cancer, in every community.

I sent a message to all chapters utilizing the Grand Chapter monthly communications asking for information from each chapter who participated in their local Relay for Life for specific information. I would like to share the responses I received.

West Sacramento had 7 members participating on June 21 and 22. They raised \$1,336 by serving dinner and onsite sales of brownies, cupcakes, cookies, hats and lemonade. Team Captains Karen Reid and Cindy Peiper both walked 30 miles during the 24 hours. The Relay raised a total of \$52,000.

Santa Clara participated in their 12th Relay on May 3 and 4. Their fundraising was selling 4 inch ceramic stars with the different color cancer ribbons on which they wrote the names of honorees, luminaries, and wind chimes with stars. Their goal was 1000 stars in honor of our Starpoints - fairest among thousands. Mary Jane Stiff was the team captain this year.

Vallejo's Relay was on August 2 and 3. Toni Kendall was the team captain and the team name was Jo-Ra-De Masonic Families. There were 20 on their team, three on their Relay committee, and members were from the youth orders, Masons and Gateway chapter. They also had three Survivors on the team. They raised \$4,700 for the team and the Relay raised approximately \$132,000. Their fundraising efforts included selling desserts at the Masonic dinners, dine and donate at Habit Burger, serving a breakfast, joining with the Masons who had a luminaria bag donation night at one of their dinners, and throughout the year selling mustard donated by Napa Mustard Company, with special labels created for them.

Käthe Larick reported the Eastern Star Striders team participated in the Relay on June 28th. The team included members from three districts throughout San Diego. The team had 28 members, eight of whom were cancer survivors. The team raised a little over \$1,700 and the whole Relay raised \$22,130. Their onsite fundraising was a Cakewalk to Kick Cancer. They also took part in the Fight Back Moment onsite fundraiser where they invited people to have a seat on a purple couch and hold up a sign of their defining moment to join the fight.

Joanne Gibson reported on Semper Fidelis Chapter's participation in the Livermore Relay on June 21–22. Their team name was OES Stars for Life and raised \$1,825. They had seven members on the team. The Rainbow Girls walked during the midnight hours and helped Luminaria Chairman, WM Patty Crohare, decorate the bags and set them up on the track. Their fundraisers were getting business card advertisers, raffling an afghan made by one of their members, and all the donations collected by each participant.

I hope that next year I will hear from more teams to show how Eastern Star is participating in our communities. Together we can make the name of California Eastern Star synonymous with Relay for Life.

I want to thank WGM Debbie Maiman for giving me the privilege of serving as Chairman of the Marguerite Rennie Memorial Fund.

As chairman, I receive original bills from our members showing services rendered and check to make sure that the insurance payments and other allowances have been deducted. I then complete a transmittal form and forward to the Grand Chapter Office for payment to the facility that performed the service or reimbursement to the member if they had paid the amount due. If the bills do not contain the correct information for payment, they are returned to the member requesting the missing information before payment can be authorized.

This past fiscal year, 10 members have received assistance in the amount of \$32,556.94. We also have nine inactive member files who did not request assistance this year, but may need it in the future. We received five new applications for assistance this year. I am sorry to report that we had six deaths this past year.

This fund is very special to members in time of need. Many of our members are on fixed incomes and this fund allows them to feel secure, knowing their bills will be paid and their finances can be used for food, shelter and other needs. I receive notes and calls stating how appreciative they are of this fund. I believe this fund is one of the nicest and most helpful things that we do for our members. Let us continue to fund this program for the good of our members.

SUMMER FESTIVAL — "HOME ON THE RANGE"

(Throughout the Session the various Committees presented the following legislation to the delegates.)

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1

Whereas, some of our Grand Line Officers now simultaneously serve as elected Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees; and,

Whereas, Being a Grand Line Officer involves much of the time, talents and energy to said Grand Officer to be a leader of our Organization and the time and ability to train our Chapters and members; and,

Whereas, Being a Trustee involves much time and talent and energy to care for the residents of the Eastern Star Home; and,

Whereas, Our Elected Grand Officers can attend the business meetings of the Home Board and be kept informed of the business at hand and not have the responsibility of the day to day operation of the workings of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home. Being a Grand Officer takes a lot of time and preparation to be able to meet and assist the members of the Chapters in California in becoming better leaders of our Organization. Being a Trustee and a Grand Officer takes away that time to devote to our Chapters and members; and

Whereas, the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron are members of the Board of Trustees by virtue of their office;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that except for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron who are ex officio members of the Board of Trustees, elected Grand Officers cannot serve as a Trustee of the Eastern Star Home and if they are a Trustee and elected to a Grand Officer position, they must resign as a Trustee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AND JURISPRUDENCE

(by Gary Gole, PP (21/651))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, and Jurisprudence, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 1 has been referred recommends a "Yes" vote for the following reasons: It would eliminate conflicts between being a Grand Officer and a Trustee of the Home Board. Also a time commitment of being a Grand Officer and a Home Board Trustee could be difficult, especially with calendar conflicts.

ADOPTED

Sec. 451. TRUSTEES: POWERS, NUMBER AND TERM. . . .

5th paragraph

Members must reside in California to be eligible to serve as a Trustee. No member with a close relation, defined as a parent, sibling, parent-in-law, sibling-in-law, child or step-child, residing in the Senior Living Community shall be eligible to be elected or appointed to serve as a Trustee. A person serving as Trustee, elected in 2004 or thereafter, whose close relation becomes a resident of the Senior Living Community shall resign such position. Except for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, an elected Grand Officer cannot serve as a Trustee of the Senior Living Community. A Trustee elected as a Grand Officer shall resign as Trustee.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2

Whereas, it has been the practice of the Worthy Grand Matron at the request of the Associate Grand Matron and Grand Conductress to appoint a co-chairman to certain Standing Committees. This co-chairman has, generally, gone on to serve as chairman of that committee;

Whereas, we believe that this practice is good policy because it allows a member of a committee with a one year appointment to gain the necessary experience to serve as chairman the following year; and

Whereas, this procedure has been allowed for special and Grand Chapter Week committees;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Associate Grand Matron may recommend a member to be appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron as Co-Chairman of Credentials, Eastern Star Patient Comfort Program, and Housing;

That the Associate Grand Matron and Grand Conductress may each recommend one of the two Co-Chairmen to Membership;

That the Associate Grand Matron and Grand Conductress intend that the member appointed as Co-Chairman is to serve as the Chairman of that committee during their years as Worthy Grand Matron; however, this does not mean that the member must be appointed as Chairman;

That the member to be appointed is willing to eventually serve as chairman of that committee;

That except for cause, the Worthy Grand Matron shall make this appointment;

In the absence of the Chairman, they do not automatically assume the Chairmanship — if the position of Chairman is vacated the new Chairman is appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 2 has been referred, recommend a "No" vote for the following reason: We already do this, and this amendment is not necessary to codify our actions.

ADOPTED

Sec. 86A. GRAND CHAPTER WEEK ACTIVITIES ANCILLARY COMMITTEES....

(c) Housing — the Ancillary Committee on Housing shall consist of three members. The Associate Grand Matron may recommend a member to be appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron as Co-Chairman of Housing. The Associate Grand Matron intends that this member will serve as the chairman during her year as Worthy Grand Matron; however, this does not mean that the member must be appointed as Chairman. The member appointed as Co-Chairman must be willing to serve as Chairman. Except for cause, the Worthy Grand Matron shall make this appointment. In the absence of the Chairman, the Co-Chairman does not automatically assume the Chairman-ship. If the position of Chairman is vacated the new Chairman is appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron. It shall be the duty of the Ancillary Committee on Housing to coordinate housing and housing related issues for the Grand Chapter Week as the Worthy Grand Matron may direct.

Sec. 91. EASTERN STAR PATIENT COMFORT PROGRAM....

2nd paragraph

A State Chairman and eleven Co-Chairmen shall be appointed from areas throughout the state to publicize this non-profit project and be a liaison between the State Chairman and the local chairman of each Patient Comfort Program Station. The Associate Grand Matron may recommend a member to be appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron as Co-Chairman. The Associate Grand Matron intends that this member will serve as the chairman during her year as Worthy Grand Matron; however, this does not mean that the member must be appointed as Chairman. The member appointed as Co-Chairman must be willing to serve as Chairman. Except for cause, the Worthy Grand Matron shall make this appointment. In the absence of the Chairman, the Co-Chairman does not automatically assume the Chairmanship. If the position of Chairman is vacated the new Chairman is appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron. One of the eleven Co-Chairmen or the State Chairman will have served the preceding year.

. . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3

Whereas, a Special Dispensation is required to move the location of a stated Chapter meeting, but not an anteroom meeting;

Whereas, we believe that this discrepancy occurred when the Special Dispensation to move the location of a Chapter meeting was added as housekeeping in 2006; and

Whereas, a Chapter does not need to obtain a Special Dispensation to conduct business on the night of its stated meeting, during an Official Visit, in which it is opened;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that in order to move the location of an anteroom meeting, a Special Dispensation is required, unless the meeting is being moved for the purpose of the Official Visit. In which case, no Special Dispensation is required, only notice to the members.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AND FINANCE

(by Donna Tucker, PGT (360))

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws, and Finance, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 3 has been referred recommends a "Yes" vote for the following reason: This will treat the moving of an anteroom meeting the same as holding a regular stated meeting.

ADOPTED

Sec. 150. ANTEROOM MEETINGS....

3rd paragraph

The bylaws may state that the time and/or place for anteroom meetings shall be different from the time and place for stated meetings if the particular day(s) for those meetings is specifically set forth in the bylaws. In all other cases, a change in the time or place requires a Special Dispensation and special notice to the members of the chapter. On the occasion of the Official Visit of the Worthy Grand Matron only notice to the membership is needed.

. .

Sec. 206. **DEFINED AND ENUMERATED...**

(8) To change the place of any stated <u>or ante room</u> meeting of a subordinate chapter from the location stated in said chapter's bylaws, <u>except on the occasion of the Official Visit of the Worthy Grand Matron</u>, in which case only notice to the membership is needed.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4

Whereas, the proposed terms of a consolidation are adopted at the consolidation committee meeting;

Whereas, every Chapter involved in a consolidation needs to be equally represented at those meetings; and

Whereas, if one of the committee members is unable to attend a meeting, a replacement needs to be appointed to represent the Chapter;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that all three members of every Chapter involved in a consolidation must be present at all meetings of the consolidation committee.

That if any member of the consolidation committee cannot attend one of the meetings, she or he must inform the Worthy Matron of her/his Chapter.

That upon being informed that a consolidation committee member cannot attend one of its meetings, the Worthy Matron shall appoint a replacement member. That appointment does not have to be permanent, but may be pro tem.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(by Earl Eckert, PGP (123))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 4 has been referred, recommends a "Yes" vote for the follow reason: By providing specific wording to replace a committee member unable to attend the consolidation committee meeting, it will assure equal representation of participating chapters.

ADOPTED

Sec. 290. CHAPTER CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE. Following a favorable vote by two or more Chapters on the proposal to consolidate, the Worthy Matron of each Chapter shall appoint three members from that Chapter to act as the Consolidation Committee. These members shall not be related. The Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of each chapter shall be ex officio members of the committee. They will have no vote. The member of Grand Chapter assigned to assist, shall be notified of the names of the committee members and shall preside at a meeting of this committee to consider proposals involving consolidation. All three members of every Chapter involved in the consolidation must be present at all meetings of the consolidation committee. If any member of the consolidation committee cannot attend one of the meetings, she or he must inform the Worthy Matron of her/his Chapter. The Worthy Matron shall appoint a replacement member. That appointment does not have to be permanent, but may be pro tem. . . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 5

Whereas, currently, a member affiliating with a Chapter on institution may be automatically demitted from her/his current Chapter;

Whereas, this differs from the normal practices of leaving a Chapter, where a member must actively request a demit to leave a Chapter;

Whereas, the rules for a plural or dual member affiliating with a Chapter upon institution differ from the normal rules regarding a dual or plural member joining a new Chapter — a dual or plural member wanting to join another Chapter must normally demit from one of her/his Chapters and obtain a Certificate of Good Standing from the other to use to affiliate with the new Chapter; and

Whereas, the current practice adds additional duties to the Secretary of the newly instituted Chapter at a time when the Secretary already has an enormous amount of additional work to perform, and these duties should, instead, be borne by the member;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that a plural member, who seeks to join with a new Chapter upon institution, must first demit from one of her/his Chapters and request a Certificate of Good Standing from the other, which shall be presented with the member's Petition to Affiliate upon Institution.

That a member of a single Chapter, who wishes to affiliate with a new Chapter upon institution and retain membership in only that Chapter, must request a Demit from her/his current Chapter. This request may be made either before or after joining with the new Chapter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(By Linda Bernhard, PGM, (106))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 5 has been referred, recommend a "Yes" vote for the following reason: You want to ensure your membership in at least one California chapter before demitting to take the chance on a chapter under dispensation.

ADOPTED

Sec. 265. **PETITION FOR DISPENSATION...**

2nd paragraph

Such petition shall be signed by at least thirty-five persons. In a city or town where another Chapter is located, at least ten of such petitioners shall be members of the Order at the time of petition, and not more than forty percent (40%) of such petitioners may affiliate by demits or letters of good standing, or

become plural members from any one established Chapter in California until the Charter shall have been issued to the petitioners. A plural member, who seeks to join with a new Chapter upon institution, must first demit from one of her/his Chapters and request a Certificate of Good Standing from the other, which shall be presented with the member's Petition to Affiliate upon Institution. A member of a single Chapter, who wishes to affiliate with a new Chapter upon Institution and retain membership in only that Chapter, must request a Demit from her/his current Chapter. This request may be made either before or after joining with the new Chapter. The petitioner whose appointment is requested as Worthy Matron of the proposed Chapter shall be a member of the Order at the time of petition.

. . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 6

Whereas, the Constitution and Laws currently allows the Worthy Grand Matron to appoint someone to oversee the interests of a Chapter whose charter has been suspended;

Whereas, since the powers and function of the Chapter have been suspended with the charter, the officers of the Chapter cannot perform such action, unless otherwise authorized to do so; and

Whereas, we believe that, unless the Worthy Grand Matron is planning on overseeing these responsibilities herself, it is necessary that someone be appointed to be responsible for collecting the monies belonging to the Chapter, paying any necessary bills, and otherwise protecting its assets;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that upon suspension of a Chapter's charter, the Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint a member of the Grand Chapter to oversee the property and finances of the chapter. The Worthy Grand Matron may direct or authorize her appointee to:

- 1. Take possession of all books, accounts, jewels, furniture, and other possessions of the Chapter.
- 2. Pay necessary expenses of the Chapter, or may reserve the right to approve expenses herself.
- 3. Act as a receiver for the Chapter so far as may be necessary to protect its property and pay its urgent indebtedness.
- Collect all amounts owing to the Chapter, and shall keep a record of all amounts received and disbursed.

The appointee shall preserve the funds and property to the best of her or his ability, keep the Worthy Grand Matron fully informed as to all actions taken, and shall not incur any indebtedness, or obligate the Grand Chapter.

By the annual session of Grand Chapter, or upon termination of the suspension, the appointee shall provide a written report to the Worthy Grand Matron of all actions taken, all funds received and disbursed, and all membership losses from the Chapter.

- The information in this report shall be included in the Worthy Grand Matron's report to the Grand Chapter even if the suspension is lifted prior to the annual session.
- If the suspension is lifted, a copy of the report shall also be given to the Worthy Matron of the chapter, along with all other property of the Chapter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AND FINANCE

(by Donna Doan, PM, (245/651))

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Finance to whom Proposed Amendment No. 6 has been referred recommend a "No" vote for the following reason: This eliminates discretion currently available to the Worthy Grand Matron to determine whether if such an appointment is even necessary.

NOT ADOPTED

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 7

Whereas, in Sec. 250, the Constitution and Laws currently provides that if a member who has submitted a Petition for Reinstatement is no longer a resident of the jurisdiction of the Chapter, the Worthy Matron shall request the Worthy Matron of a Chapter within whose jurisdiction the petitioner is residing to appoint an investigating committee;

Whereas, the concept of the jurisdiction of a Chapter is now obsolete and is no longer provided for in the Constitution and Laws;

Whereas, there still needs to be a means by which petitioners who do not live locally to a Chapter can be investigated; and

Whereas, this procedure should apply equally to investigations of any petitions;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the portion of Sec. 250 dealing with investigation of Petitions for Reinstatement of members who live outside of the jurisdiction of the Chapter be removed.

That if a petitioner for affiliation or a petitioner for reinstatement resides outside of the state of California, the Worthy Matron may request a courtesy investigation of the petitioner through the Grand Secretary of California.

That if a petitioner for initiation, affiliation, or reinstatement resides further than thirty (30) miles by vehicle from the Chapter, the Worthy Matron may request the Worthy Matron of a Chapter local to where the petitioner resides to appoint an investigation committee.

That the reports of the investigation committee shall be certified with the seal of the investigating Chapter and returned to the requesting Chapter.

Note: This note is not to be included as part of the resolution portion of this legislation, but is solely to define the limits on which we will allow certain amendments. It is our intent to not allow an amendment of the distance in this legislation to less than the 30 miles stated. However, amending the distance to not more than 120 miles would be permissible.

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws to whom Proposed Amendment No. 7 has been referred recommends a "No" vote for the following reason: The proposed legislation is unnecessary. The current code does not prevent it and it does not need to be codified.

NOT ADOPTED

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 8

Whereas, a Chapter on probation cannot issue Demits or accept petitions for initiation or affiliation without permission of the Worthy Grand Matron;

Whereas, it is not clear to us why the issuance of Certificates of Good Standing was not included in that list;

Whereas, like a Demit, a Certificate of Good Standing can be used to affiliate with a new Chapter;

Whereas, we believe that if a Chapter is on probation it should only be able to issue Certificates of Good Standing with the permission of the Worthy Grand Matron;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that if a Chapter is on probation, the Secretary may only issue a Certificate of Good Standing to a member with the permission of the Worthy Grand Matron.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(by Denny Rae Grist, PGM, (48))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws to whom Proposed Amendment No. 8 has been referred recommend a "Yes" vote. This legislation ensures the Worthy Grand Matron is aware that a request has been made and is in favor of issuing the certificate.

ADOPTED

Sec. 301. **EFFECT OF PROBATION.** It shall have the effect of a fair warning to a subordinate Chapter that the conduct of a member or members or action taken by the Chapter must cease or be corrected.

(A) A Chapter on probation cannot allow demits, <u>issue Certificates of Good Standing</u>, accept petitions for initiation, not accept members by affiliation except with the written approval of the Worthy Grand Matron.

••

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 9

Whereas, in Sec. 236 the Constitution and Laws currently provides, "Any member who is not in good standing because of suspension after trial in the Order or in a lodge of Master Masons, may be restored to membership in the Order by the Grand Chapter, in its sole discretion, and be entitled to receive a demit.";

Whereas, this statement is confusing because Part VI already provides for the restoration of a member suspended by trial in the Order, and also because it doesn't make any statement regarding expelled members;

Whereas, the C.M.C. currently provides for: suspension for a definite amount of time, less than one year, with automatic restoration occurring at the end of the term; suspension for an indefinite term, with the suspension being able to be lifted by the Lodges; and expulsion, where the membership may only be restored by Grand Lodge;

Whereas, since a Mason who was suspended by trial in Lodge is either automatically restored to the rights and privileges of the Lodge at the end of his suspension, or can be restored by his Lodges, in the case of an indefinite suspension, then, if no trial has been held in the Order, restoration of such a Brother to the Chapter should not require action of the Grand Chapter, and should be handled as any other case where a Mason loses his good standing in Lodge and later is reinstated; and

Whereas, we believe that the above reference in the Constitution and Laws to "suspension" should actually be "expulsion";

Now, therefore, be it resolved that Sec. 236 be corrected to read, "Any member who is not in good standing because of expulsion after trial in the Order, may be restored to membership in the Order, at the sole discretion of the Grand Chapter, and be entitled to receive a Certificate of Restoration."

That a Brother, who is not in good standing because of suspension or expulsion from a Lodge, may be restored to membership in the Order only after being restored to membership in the Lodge. A Brother who has been suspended may be restored by the normal procedure for reinstatement after loss of Masonic Standing. A Brother who has been expelled may only be restored to membership by the Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(by Rob Scott, PP, (163))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws to whom Proposed Amendment No. 9 has been referred recommends a "Yes" vote for the following reasons: Our current code is confusing by its failure to mention expulsion as noted by the proponents of the legislation, and as the proposed legislation is consistent with the rules of the General Grand Chapter and the California Masonic Code the committee recommends a "Yes" vote.

ADOPTED

Sec. 236. **DEMITS...**

last paragraph

Any member who is not in good standing because of suspension after trial in the Order or in a lodge of Master Masons, may be restored to membership in the Order by the Grand Chapter, in its sole discretion, and be entitled to receive a demit.

Any member who is not in good standing because of expulsion after trial in the Order, may be restored to membership in the Order, at the sole discretion of the Grand Chapter, and be entitled to receive a Certificate of Restoration.

A Brother, who is not in good standing because of suspension or expulsion from a Lodge, may be restored to membership in the Order only after being restored to membership in the Lodge. A Brother who has been suspended may be restored by the normal procedure for reinstatement after loss of Masonic Standing. A Brother who has been expelled may only be restored to membership by the Grand Chapter.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 10

Whereas, in the process described in the Constitution and Laws for obtaining approval of changes to bylaws, it is stated, "The Grand Chapter office shall ascertain that the essential material is submitted, then transmit the material to the chairman of Constitution and Bylaws for study and the proper recommendation, after which the material will be returned to the Grand Chapter office to be forwarded to the Worthy Grand Matron, or the Worthy Grand Patron in the case of Chapters under dispensation. When approved, or disapproved, the Worthy Grand Matron or the Worthy Grand Patron, shall return a certified copy to the Chapter, filing a copy, with the original bylaws, with the Grand Secretary.";

Whereas, while the Grand Secretary, could, certainly, delegate the matter to a staff member, we believe that the duty of reviewing the submitted bylaws more properly belongs to the Grand Secretary, rather than the Grand Chapter office as a whole;

Whereas, current practice does not conform to the procedure currently given in the Constitution and Laws, but, instead, the bylaws are sent back to the Grand Chapter office after approval or disapproval by the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, and a copy is then sent to the Chapter;

Whereas, we believe that it is unnecessary, in the Constitution and Laws, to indicate the exact path that the bylaws take during its approval process;

Whereas, it is further stated that upon receipt of the approval or disapproval, "The Secretary of the Chapter shall read the same, and the notice of approval or disapproval at the first stated meeting after its receipt and enter a record thereof in the minutes."; and

Whereas, we believe that it is unnecessary to re-read the changes in the bylaws during the Chapter meeting — the proposed changes having already been published, discussed, and voted upon at a previous meeting — just reading the approval or disapproval should be sufficient in the meeting, with copies of the updated bylaws eventually being sent to the members;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that it is the duty of the Grand Secretary to review the materials to determine if all the necessary documentation was received. If all of the necessary documents were received, then, before being forwarded to the Worthy Grand Matron, or Worthy Grand Parton, if appropriate, the documents, or copies, shall be sent to the Constitution and Bylaws committee for review and recommendation.

That once approved, or disapproved, a copy of the bylaws and the approval form shall be sent to the Chapter with all of the other documents placed in the Chapter's file in the Grand Chapter office.

That, when the approval, or disapproval, is received by the Chapter Secretary, just the approval, or disapproval, shall be read at the next stated meeting of the Chapter, and a record entered into the Chapter's minutes.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws to whom proposed amendment 10 has been referred recommend a "No" vote. This amendment does not delineate what documents are to be checked by the Grand Secretary and the Grand Secretary is currently doing a very good job in handling bylaws revisions.

ADOPTED

Sec. 128. PROCEDURE TO OBTAIN APPROVAL....

2nd & 3rd paragraphs

The Grand Secretary Chapter office shall ascertain that the essential material is submitted, then transmit the material to the chairman of Constitution and Bylaws Committee for study and the proper recommendation, after which the material will be returned to the Grand Secretary Chapter office to be forwarded to the Worthy Grand Matron, or the Worthy Grand Patron in the case of chapters under dispensation, for approval or disapproval. When approved, or disapproved, the Worthy Grand Matron or the Worthy Grand Patron, shall return a certified copy to the Chapter, filing a copy, with all of the documents the original bylaws, with the Grand Secretary to be placed in the Chapter's file in the Grand Chapter office.

The Secretary of the Chapter shall read the same, and the notice of approval or disapproval at the first stated meeting after its receipt and enter a record thereof in the minutes. If approved, the same shall become effective upon such reading. If disapproved, the motion for adoption thereof shall be nullified, without prejudice to any future action regarding the subject matter thereof.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 11

Whereas, in order to meet the reporting requirements of the Internal Revenue Service it is necessary to record the gross receipts and gross expenses of all Chapter events;

Whereas, failure to keep proper financial records and make full and correct financial reports could result in the loss of the tax exempt status of the Grand Chapter;

Whereas, it is not clear that the membership is aware of the seriousness of the state and federal investigations into tax exempt organizations;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that Chapters must include in their financial records the gross receipts and expenses of all events, including events held by subordinate clubs.

That failure to keep proper financial records and report all income and expenses may result in the placing of a Chapter on probation, or suspension or revocation of its charter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AND FINANCE

(By Patricia Stewart, PM, (17/23))

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Finance, to whom Proposed Amendment No. 11 has been referred, recommend a "Yes" vote for the following reasons: To protect the group tax exemption of Grand Chapter, subordinate chapters must conform to the tax law requirements, and the form 99 be submitted to IRS reporting on the financial transactions of Grand Chapter, and its subordinates, requires this information.

ADOPTED

Sec. 172. RECEIPT, REPORT AND DEPOSIT OF FUNDS. All money paid to the Secretary for the Chapter or for the Grand Chapter, including dues, initiation and affiliation fees, Grand Chapter assessments and donations to projects shall be read by the Secretary in the receipts of the meeting and properly recorded in the minutes. The Chapter must include in their financial records the gross receipts and expenses of all events, including events held by subsidiary organizations as described in Section 178. Failure to keep proper financial records and report on all income and expenses may result in the placing of a Chapter on probation, or suspension or revocation if its charter. These moneys must be paid forthwith to the Treasurer and a receipt taken therefor. The Treasurer shall thereupon deposit such funds, in the name of the Chapter and/or the name of the event for which the funds have been collected if the funds will be used for that event and for no other purpose, in any bank, credit union or savings and loan designated by it as a depository and meeting the depository insurance requirements of Sec. 101. Under no circumstances shall funds belonging to the chapter be deposited into an account under the name of any chapter member. When subsequently reading the minutes, dues and assessments may be reported as totals only.

Sec. 178. SUBSIDIARY ORGANIZATIONS....

3rd paragraph

The net proceeds of all money raising functions sponsored by any chapter club shall be turned over to the Secretary of the Chapter within sixty days following the event, with a statement of receipts and expenditures. The Chapter must include in their financial records the gross receipts and expenditures as specified in Section 172. An amount not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) may be retained by each club for working capital if needed. All amounts over that limit must be turned over to the chapter. Funds earned by any club for the chapter may not be earmarked nor restricted in the use to which the chapter may put such funds.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 12

Whereas, the Constitution and Laws currently provides various reports, including those of the Audit and Property Committees, be given on the first meeting after the first of December;

Whereas, this means that if a Chapter's first meeting in December is on the 1st, the reports cannot be given at that meeting;

Whereas, it makes no sense to us why the 1st of December is unacceptable for presentation of the report, but the 2nd of December is fine; and

Whereas, the current law also makes the meeting at which the reports are given to the Chapter inconsistent for Chapters that meet during the first week of the month — most of the time the reports would be given at the first meeting, but sometimes they would be given at the second (or in January);

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the annual reports to the Chapter be given at the first meeting after the 30th of November.

The Committees on Constitution and Bylaws recommends a "Yes" vote for the following reason: This section will, without doubt, include the meeting held on the 1st of December.

MOTION, by the proponents to amend the amendment as follows: after "Annual report to the chapter," insert ",which are currently given at the first stated meeting after December 1st, shall".

(Discussion was held on the Motion to amend.)

A proponent: The proponents of the amendment to the amendment were merely trying to exclude the property report. So we respectfully request that it be withdrawn, that our amendment to the amendment be withdrawn, with the understanding the property report is still to be given at the time currently designated in our constitution, and that it is only when the other annual reports of the chapter, which currently are due the first stated meeting after December 1, will be changed to after November 30.

Debbie Maiman, Worthy Grand Matron: The motion to amend Proposed Amendment No. 12 is **WITHDRAWN**.

(Discussion continued on the original Proposed Amendment No. 12.)

ADOPTED

Sec. 167. **AUDITING COMMITTEE.** The Worthy Matron, at her installation, shall appoint an Auditing Committee to consist of three or more members at least three of whom shall examine and pass upon all bills and claims against the Chapter before they are paid; to examine the books, vouchers and accounts of the Secretary and Treasurer; and to make a report upon the financial condition and affairs of the Chapter as of the end of the fiscal year. This report shall be presented at the first stated meeting of the Chapter held after November 30 December 1, with such recommendations as the Committee may deem to be for the benefit of the Chapter. Except for ex-officio members, no member of the Auditing Committee shall be the spouse, parent, or child of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Secretary or the Treasurer of the Chapter. The Secretary and the Treasurer shall not be appointed to the Auditing Committee.

Sec. 251. **REPORTS.** The books of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be closed and audited at the end of the fiscal year. At the first stated meeting after November 30 December 1, the Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees shall make their annual reports to the Chapter regarding the prior fiscal year. The Secretary and Treasurer shall deliver the books and other property of the Chapter in their possession, or under their control, to their successors when installed.

Uniform Code of Bylaws:

ARTICLE III DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Sec. 4. The fiscal year of the Chapter year shall be from October 1 to September 30, after which the books of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be closed and audited. At the first stated meeting after November 30 December 1, the reports of the Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees regarding the prior fiscal year shall be read. The Secretary and Treasurer shall deliver the books and other property of the Chapter to their successors when duly installed.

ARTICLE VI COMMITTEES

Sec. 1. The Worthy Matron, at her installation, shall appoint the following committees: . . .

(b) An Auditing Committee to consist of three or more members at least three of whom shall examine and pass upon all bills and claims against the Chapter before they are paid; to examine the books, vouchers and accounts of the Secretary and Treasurer; and to make a report upon the financial condition and affairs of the Chapter as of the end of the fiscal year. This report shall be presented at the first stated meeting of the Chapter held after November 30 December 1, with such recommendations as the Committee may deem to be for the benefit of the Chapter. Except for ex-officio members, no member of the Auditing Committee shall be the spouse, parent, or child of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Secretary or the Treasurer of the Chapter. The Secretary and the Treasurer shall not be appointed to the Auditing Committee.

. . .

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 13

Whereas, it is not clear in the Constitution and Laws if a member, of a Chapter whose charter has been suspended, can receive a demit or a certificate of good standing;

Whereas, we believe that there are circumstances when such a member should be allowed to demit from the Chapter, or receive a Certificate of Good Standing;

Whereas, since all of the functions of the Chapter have been suspended, the Chapter can, clearly, not take any action;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that a member of a Chapter, whose charter has been suspended, may be permitted to receive a Certificate of Good Standing from the Grand Secretary.

- 1. The member's dues and assessments must be paid to the end of the preceding month.
- 2. A dual or plural member may not receive a Certificate of Good Standing from a Chapter with a suspended charter.
- 3. Any request for a Certificate of Good Standing shall be sent to the Grand Secretary.
- 4. Before the Certificate is issued, the Grand Secretary must obtain the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron that the member is entitled to the certificate and that she is permitted to issue the Certificate to that member.

That a member of a Chapter, whose charter has been suspended, may be entitled to receive a Demit from the Grand Secretary.

- 1. The member's dues and assessments must be paid to the end of the preceding month.
- 2. Any request for a Demit shall be sent to the Grand Secretary.
- 3. Before the Demit is issued, the Grand Secretary must obtain the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron that the member is entitled to the Demit and that it may be issued to that member.
- 4. The member shall be issued a Demit or a Certificate of Discontinuance of Multiple Membership as appropriate.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

(by Linda Bernhard, PGM, (106))

The Committee on Constitution and Bylaws to whom Proposed Amendment No. 13 has been referred, recommend a "Yes" vote for the following reason: The Worthy Grand Matron has extensive knowledge of the people and issues involved when a chapter has reached the serious step of being placed on suspension.

ADOPTED

- Sec. 306. **EFFECT OF SUSPENSION.** The suspension of the charter of a subordinate Chapter shall have the effect of suspending the functions of the Chapter until such suspension may be set aside, or until final action thereon is taken by the Grand Chapter in annual session, whereupon the Grand Chapter may restore the charter or revoke it as it may deem just.
 - (A) A plural or dual member of a Chapter whose charter has been suspended may not receive a Certificate of Good Standing from said Chapter.
 - (B) A member who does not hold plural or dual membership in another Chapter may receive a Certificate of Good Standing provided
 - (1) The member's dues and assessments must be paid to the end of the preceding month.
 - (2) Any request for a Certificate of Good Standing shall be sent to the Grand Secretary.
 - (3) Before the Certificate is issued, the Grand Secretary must obtain the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron that the member is entitled to the Certificate and that she is permitted to issue the Certificate to that member.
 - (C) A member of a Chapter whose charter has been suspended may be entitled to receive a Demit from the Grand Secretary provided
 - (1) The member's dues and assessments must be paid to the end of the preceding month.
 - (2) Any request for a Demit shall be sent to the Grand Secretary
 - (3) Before the Demit is issued, the Grand Secretary must obtain the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron that the member is entitled to the Demit and that it may be issued to that member.
 - (4) The member shall be issued a Demit or a Certificate of Discontinuance of Multiple Membership as appropriate.

DECISIONS OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

NO. 1: GRAND LODGE RESTRICTIONS OF PUBLICATION OF MEMBER INFORMATION.

An amendment to the California Masonic Code passed in 2013, which concerns the publications of information about members. The amendment is not binding on Grand Chapter, so the Eastern Star members do not have to follow it.

The California Masonic Code provides that only other Masonic organizations are subject to the same "standards of conduct and propriety," as our lodges. Other Masonic organizations are not subject to the administrative rules of Grand Lodge. As the recent amendments do not relate to the standards of conduct and propriety, they are not binding on our Grand Chapter.

Sec. 179. RESTRICTIONS; PROJECTS; SPONSORSHIP OF YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS....

2nd paragraph

Commercialism in the Order of the Eastern Star shall be defined by the California Masonic Code. No chapter shall hold any sort of raffle that requires the payment of money to obtain a chance to win. Eastern Star members must remain within the guidelines of Grand Lodge in soliciting advertising <u>and are subject to the same standards of conduct and propriety as are lodges. Eastern Star members are not subject to the administrative rules of Grand Lodge.</u>

NO. 2: RÉSUMÉS FOR HOME BOARD.

Résumés submitted by candidates for the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home shall contain only statements of his or her qualifying training and their experience, and may not contain statements concerning why they are running for the board and/or what they hope to accomplish if elected.

Sec. 10. ELIGIBILITY TO OFFICE....

3rd paragraph

All candidates for elective office or for the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Home shall, subject to the provisions in Sec. 111, Rule 14, file with the Grand Secretary, by the deadline prescribed for filing amendments to the Constitution and Laws as described in Sec. 113(1), a résumé of his or her qualifying training and/or experience, not to exceed 1400 characters in length. <u>Résumés</u> of candidates for the Board of Trustees may not contain statements concerning

why she/he is running for the Board of Trustees and/or what she/he hopes to accomplish if elected. All résumés of all candidates for an elective office or for a seat on the Board of Trustees shall be distributed in the same manner as amendments to the Constitution and Laws as described in Sec. 113(2).

NO. 3: PICUTRES DURING MEETINGS

The Book of Instruction provides in general pictures may not be taken during any ritualistic ceremony, only being taken at open installation and receptions.

Pictures are permitted at all times when ritual is not being performed from the Book of Ritual or from the Instruction Book. This would include 25 and 50-year pin presentations, the Deputy Grand Matron's reception during which she is in the east, but no ritual is being performed, and at other times such as Good of the Order which is not ritualistic in basis.

INSTRUCTION BOOK

p. 7

SPECIAL RULES

3. Pictures cannot be taken during Opening, Closing, Initiation or Balloting.

NO. 4: BYLAWS — INITIATION FEES

A chapter may amend its bylaws, raising its fee for initiation by adding the current cost of purchasing a ritual for a new member, but it may not amend its bylaws to increase the fee by whatever the cost of the current ritual is.

Sec. 198. **MEMBERSHIP FEES.** The initiation fee shall not be less than five dollars. Chapter bylaws may include the purchase of a Ritual in the initiation fee. That fee may not increase with the cost of the Ritual without a bylaw change. The affiliation fee shall not be less than two dollars and fifty cents and not more than one-half of the initiation fee, and in either case, the fee must accompany the petition. No affiliation fee shall be charged any petitioner, formerly affiliated in this jurisdiction, who is a resident of a Masonic Home in this State.

Sec. 64. NUMBER OF MEMBERS....

(i) The Committee on Eastern Star Patient Comfort Program . . .

Sec. 67. QUALIFICATIONS OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS AND DUTIES OF AND EXPENDITURE OF MONEY BY COMMITTEES....

All members of committees shall be members of the Grand Chapter. No person shall be eligible for membership on any committee, the duties of which shall include the investigation of, or report upon, the work or action of any standing or special committee, board, or other body of which such person is a member. Except for ex-officio members, no members shall serve on the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, Committee on Jurisprudence, Committee on Finance, Committee on Appeals and Grievances, the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Star Homes of California and the California Eastern Star Foundation who are related to another member serving on any of the above named boards or committees. Provided, however, that members of these committees or boards shall fill the remainder of the term to which they have been elected or appointed. At least one member of the Committee on Jurisprudence must be licensed to practice law in the State of California and an active member of the State Bar of California.

Sec. 97 PENALTIES....

2nd paragraph

Any chapter failing to pay for the updates required to be sent to them under Section 113(6) within three months of the delivery of such updates shall be subject to fine by the Grand Chapter in the amount of \$50.00. Any chapter failing to pay for its dues receipts within three months of the delivery of the dues receipts shall be subject to fine by the Grand Chapter in the amount of \$50.00. Any Chapter who does not submit their property report before May March 1 of each year must pay a fine of \$50.00. Any Chapter that has not filed its year-end financial report with the Grand Chapter Office by the constitutional deadline of December 1st shall pay a fine of \$50.00. If either the property report or financial report has not been received by the Grand Chapter or if any of these amounts and the fines, thereto, remain unpaid by September 1s of the year in which such reports or payments came due, then no members of such chapter shall be entitled to vote or participate in the transactions of the Grand Chapter until such reports or payments, including fines, are fully paid.

Sec. 186. MASONIC AFFILIATION OR RELATIONSHIP. To be eligible for membership in the Order in this jurisdiction, one must be either an affiliated Master Mason in good standing in a regular Masonic Lodge recognized as such by the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of California; or the wives, daughters, legally adopted daughters, mothers, widows, sisters, half sisters, granddaughters, stepmothers, stepdaughters, stepsisters, daughters-in-law, grandmothers, great granddaughters, nieces, great nieces, mothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, aunts, and first and second female cousins daughters of sisters or brothers of affiliated Master Masons, in good standing, or if deceased were in good standing at the time of their death, as well as members — either active for three (3) years or majority of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls or of the International Order of Job's Daughters, each of whom having attained the age of eighteen (18) years, are eligible to membership in the Order of the Eastern Star.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star is a California not-for-profit unincorporated association which promotes and practices charity and fraternalism. Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Endowment Fund") is used to support Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home").

These combined financial statements do not include the financial position or results of activities of the local chapters throughout the State of California and the Home.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Principles of combination

The accompanying combined financial statements include the accounts of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star and the Endowment Fund (collectively, the "Grand Chapter"), which are under common control. All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in combination.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Grand Chapter have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Grand Chapter is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Finance Committee.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Grand Chapter is subject to either explicit donor-imposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Grand Chapter or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Grand Chapter and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Grand Chapter to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Grand Chapter maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

The Grand Chapter's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Grand Chapter's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact of changes.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Investments

Investments, other than certificates of deposit, are reported at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Certificates of deposit held for investment are classified as investments and are reported at amortized cost. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment is carried at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and amortization.

Cost of normal maintenance and repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense when incurred. Major replacements or betterments of properties are capitalized.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Depreciation and amortization

Depreciation of property and equipment is provided using the straight-line method over the assets' estimated useful lives of three to five years. Leasehold improvements are amortized using the straight-line method over the lesser of the estimated useful lives of the assets or lease term.

Impairment of long-lived assets

When facts and circumstances indicate that the carrying values of long-lived assets may be impaired, the Grand Chapter performs an evaluation of recoverability by comparing the carrying values of the assets to projected future cash flows in addition to other quantitative and qualitative analyses. No impairment charges were recorded for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Revenue recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Bequests are recorded based on the liquidated value upon legal determination of the Grand Chapter's rights to the assets.

For financial reporting purposes, the Grand Chapter distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Grand Chapter reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenue recognition (Continued)

Contributions (Continued)

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Residents' assets

Residents' assets, upon completion of a 90 day cooling off period, are recognized as permanently restricted contributions on the 91st day after a resident has been admitted to the Home under a Life Care Contract. Revenue is recorded based on the estimated liquidated value of the contributed assets. The recognition of this revenue is considered to be a contribution, as the value of assets contributed on the date of admission is not sufficient to cover the costs of services rendered by the Home, the services to be rendered are consistent with the Home's mission of providing housing to members of the Order of the Eastern Star and the purpose of the Grand Chapter's endowment fund is to support the Home.

Other revenue

All non-contribution revenues are recognized when earned.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Grand Chapter receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Grand Chapter. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criterion for recognition was not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the combined statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income taxes

Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") and Section 23701(b) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California. The Grand Chapter obtained a group filing exemption covering the local chapters throughout the State of California during the 1940's, and has included those chapters' funds in its annual exempt organization returns.

The Endowment Fund is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

The Grand Chapter has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2014 or 2013. The Grand Chapter's federal income tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for a period of three years from the filing of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filing of a return.

If applicable, the Grand Chapter recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense, and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities in the combined financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications of 2013 amounts have been made to conform with the 2014 presentation.

The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee has the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of assets based on the following guidelines established by the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws:

- At least fifteen percent (15%) of the funds available must be in:
 - Cash and/or bank accounts.
 - Obligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith of the United States is pledged.
 - Obligations of the State of California and its political subdivisions.
 - Such evidence of corporate indebtedness as is rated "A" or better by Standard and Poor's Corporation or Moody's Investors Service. Qualified investment funds limited to short-term United States Government Securities, bank certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances commercial paper, repurchase agreements and comparable securities.
 - Savings accounts in investment certificates issued by Federal Chartered Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.
- Up to ten percent (10%) may be invested in:
 - Other evidence of indebtedness, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Preferred stocks, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
- Up to seventy-five percent (75%) may be invested in:
 - Common stocks, which must be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - o Shares of investment trusts.
 - o Mutual funds.

NOTE 5 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Grand Chapter values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs is used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 5 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.

Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Grand Chapter believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Administrative services

During the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Grand Chapter provided administrative services to its affiliates, from which it earned revenues as follows:

Operating lease

The Grand Chapter acts as an agent and collects certain dues from members of the Grand Chapter which are remitted to the Home and California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation").

At September 30, 2014, \$16,629 is due from the Home and at September 30, 2013, \$19,235 is due to the Home. At September 30, 2014, \$2,221 is due from the Foundation and at September 30, 2013, \$500 is due to the Foundation.

NOTE 8 - ENDOWMENTS

The Grand Chapter's endowment includes donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 8 - ENDOWMENTS (Continued)

The Grand Chapter has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Grand Chapter classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Grand Chapter in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Grand Chapter considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the Grand Chapter and donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Grand Chapter and (7) the Grand Chapter's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee has the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 4.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Grand Chapter has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Grand Chapter considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.

Contingencies

Certain claims have been filed against the Grand Chapter in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, these matters will not have a material effect on the Grand Chapter's financial position or results of operations.

NOTE 10 - EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLAN

The Grand Chapter maintains a Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees Individual Retirement Account ("SIMPLE IRA") plan covering substantially all employees. The Grand Chapter contributes 2% of employees' salaries, up to allowable limits, and for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, contributions totaled \$6,538 and \$6,701, respectively.

NOTE 11 - CALIFORNIA CHAPTERS

At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Grand Chapter had 167 and 170 active California chapters, respectively, which are responsible for their own fundraising, revenues and expenses. Each individual California chapter's financial statements are not consolidated into the Grand Chapter's financial statements. As of September 30, 2014 and 2013, the unaudited cash and investments, revenues and expenses of these chapters consisted of the following:

NOTE 12 - NONCONSOLIDATED AFFILIATE

The accompanying combined financial statements of the Grand Chapter do not include the financial statements of the Home. As a result of the Grand Chapter's economic interest in the Home, via the Endowment Fund, and the Grand Chapter's ability to elect individuals to the Home's Board of Trustees, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial statements of the Home should be consolidated in the Grand Chapter's financial statements. Selected summary information relating to the audited financial statements of the Home as of September 30, 2014 and 2013 is as follows:

Included in total liabilities in the above schedule is an obligation to provide care for the residents of the Home for the rest of their lives, totaling \$15,207,971 and \$15,408,128 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, which is expected to be funded through social security payments to the residents and the Endowment Fund. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow of the Home is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund.

The State of California Health and Safety Code requires continuing care retirement communities to report on the adequacy of certain reserve requirements. The Home's required statutory reserve requirement at September 30, 2014 and 2013 was \$821,937 and \$793,146, respectively. The Home had a surplus of qualifying assets over the required reserve amount of \$5,652,872 and \$7,079,601 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, which includes temporarily restricted net assets held in the Endowment Fund for the benefit of the Home.

NOTE 13 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been evaluated by the Grand Chapter through January 27, 2015, which is the date the combined financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home") is a California not-for-profit corporation organized in 1930 for the purpose of operating a home, under the name of "Senior Living Community," for the care of aged members of the Order of the Eastern Star. Residents are affiliated members in good standing for at least five years, as described in the Constitution and Laws, who are at least sixty-five years of age. Upon admission to the Home, residents contribute their assets to the Endowment Fund (the "Endowment Fund") of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter").

The Home also operates a medical office rental facility under the name "Eastern Star Professional Plaza"

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Home have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Home is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Home is subject to either explicit donorimposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Home or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Home and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Home does not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets

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NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Home to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Home maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment is carried at cost, net of accumulated depreciation.

Cost of normal maintenance and repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense when incurred. Major replacements or betterments of properties are capitalized.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property and equipment is provided using the straight-line method over the assets' estimated useful lives of two to thirty years.

Impairment of long-lived assets

When facts and circumstances indicate that the carrying values of long-lived assets may be impaired, the Home performs an evaluation of recoverability by comparing the carrying values of the assets to projected future cash flows in addition to other quantitative and qualitative analyses. No impairment charges were recorded for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Revenue recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Contributions from residents after admission consist primarily of social security and retirement payments to the residents.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenue recognition (Continued)

Contributions (Continued)

For financial reporting purposes, the Home distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Home reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Home receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Home. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition were not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

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NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income taxes

The Home is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

The Home has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2014 or 2013. The Home's federal income tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for a period of three years from the filing of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filing of a return.

If applicable, the Home recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense, and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Endowment Fund

The Home is the income beneficiary of the Endowment Fund. Net investment income is transferred to the Home to the extent that funds are needed for operations. Additional funds as necessary for the maintenance and operation of the Home are transferred from the temporarily restricted portion of the Endowment Fund. Support from the Endowment Fund for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013 was \$3,115,000 and \$2,350,000, respectively. At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Endowment Fund has temporarily restricted net assets of \$5,869,975 and \$7,704,112, respectively, and permanently restricted net assets of \$24,165,115 and \$24,134,934, respectively.

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities in the consolidated financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The Home's property also includes office facilities that are leased to the Grand Chapter and various other medical offices (Note 8).

NOTE 4 - OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE FUTURE SERVICES

Applicants for admission to the Home are required to make a contribution of their personal assets to the Endowment Fund. In exchange for this contribution, the Home agrees to care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The Home has recorded a liability for its obligation to provide care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The obligation is calculated by estimating the cost of providing care and the use of the facilities over the remaining lives of the residents less estimated cash revenue before any realized gains from the Endowment Fund or proceeds on future property sales. The excess of projected expenses over revenues has been estimated to increase at 2.02% and 2.20% annually as of September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, representing inflation. The resulting liability has been discounted by 5% to reflect net present value. This liability amounted to \$15,207,971 and \$15,408,128 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The change in obligation from year to year is shown on the statements of activities.

The Home is licensed to operate a seventy-six bed continuing care home, and at September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Home had 48 and 50 residents, respectively. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund (Note 2).

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 5 - CASH RESERVES

The Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws require that the operating cash balance of the Home is to be limited to \$250,000 plus appropriations. Excess amounts are to be transferred to the unrestricted Endowment Fund for the future use of the Home, to be maintained by the Grand Chapter. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund. At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Home had operating cash balances of \$585,313 and \$150,536, respectively. As of November 2014, the Home had reduced its cash balance to less than \$250,000, in compliance with the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Home incurred \$232,798 and \$218,382 in administrative expense charges during the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, for services provided by the Grand Chapter. The Home also leases office space to the Grand Chapter (Note 8). For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Home earned \$39,881 and \$38,464, respectively, of rental income from the Grand Chapter. At September 30, 2014, \$16,629 is due to the Grand Chapter and at September 30, 2013, \$19,235 is due from the Grand Chapter.

For the year ended September 30, 2014, California Eastern Star Foundation reimbursed the Home \$45,401 under an employee-sharing agreement. There was no employee-sharing during the year ended September 30, 2013. At September 30, 2014, \$21,574 is due from the Foundation.

NOTE 7 - CONTINUING CARE RESERVE REQUIREMENT

The State of California Health and Safety Code requires continuing care retirement communities to report on the adequacy of certain reserve requirements. The Home's required statutory reserve at September 30, 2014 and 2013 was \$821,937 and \$793,146, respectively. The Home had a surplus of qualifying assets over the required reserve amount of \$5,652,872 and \$7,079,601 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, which includes temporarily restricted net assets held in the Endowment Fund for the benefit of the Home.

NOTE 8 - OPERATING LEASES - RENTAL INCOME

The Home leases office space under an operating lease to the Grand Chapter expiring in June 2024. In addition, the Home leases various medical offices under operating leases expiring through July 2018. At September 30, 2014, property and equipment held for leasing consists of the following:

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation") is a California not-for-profit corporation organized to receive gifts, bequests and contributions for the furtherance of educational, charitable and scientific purposes. The Foundation was organized in 1997 at the direction of the members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter"), and operated in accordance with the Grand Chapter constitution and laws.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial statement presentation

The Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted - Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily restricted - Net assets whose use by the Foundation is subject to either explicit donorimposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Foundation or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Foundation maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Concentrations (Continued)

The Foundation's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Foundation's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact of changes.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Investments

Investments are reported at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Revenue recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value.

For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenue recognition (Continued)

Contributions (Continued)

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated noncash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Foundation receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Foundation. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition were not satisfied.

Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Income taxes

The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

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NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income taxes (Continued)

The Foundation has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2014 or 2013. The Foundation's federal income tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for a period of three years from the filing of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filing of a return.

If applicable, the Foundation recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense, and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Grant expenditures

Grant expenditures are recognized in the period the grant is made, provided the grant is not subject to significant future conditions. Conditional grants are recognized as grant expense and as a grant payable in the period which the grantee meets the terms of the conditions. Grants payable that are expected to be paid in future years are recorded at present value of expected future payments.

The Foundation's Board of Directors and the Grand Chapter's Finance Committee have the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of assets based on the following guidelines established by the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws:

- At least fifteen percent (15%) of the funds available must be in:
 - Cash and/or bank accounts.
 - Obligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith of the United States is pledged.
 - Obligations of the State of California and its political subdivisions.
 - Such evidence of corporate indebtedness as is rated "A" or better by Standard and Poors Corporation or Moody's Investors Service. Qualified investment funds limited to short-term United States Government Securities, bank certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances commercial paper, repurchase agreements and comparable securities.
 - Savings accounts in investment certificates issued by Federal Chartered Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

NOTE 3 - INVESTMENTS (Continued)

- Up to ten percent (10%) may be invested in:
 - Other evidence of indebtedness, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Preferred stocks, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
- Up to seventy-five percent (75%) may be invested in:
 - Common stocks, which must be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Shares of investment trusts.
 - Mutual funds.

NOTE 4 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Foundation values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs is used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.
- Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.
- Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Valuations of mutual funds and exchange traded funds are obtained from real-time quotes for transactions in active exchange markets involving identical assets. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, there have been no changes in the valuation methodologies.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Foundation incurred administrative services of \$126,311 and \$141,062 from the Grand Chapter for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. At September 30, 2014, \$2,221 is due to the Grand Chapter, and at September 30, 2013, \$500 is due from the Grand Chapter.

For the year ended September 30, 2014, the Foundation reimbursed Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home") \$45,401 under an employee-sharing agreement. There was no employee-sharing activity during the year ended September 30, 2013. At September 30, 2014, \$21,574 is due to the Home

NOTE 7 - ENDOWMENTS

The Foundation's endowment includes donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Foundation has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donorrestricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds. (2) the purposes of the Foundation and donor-restricted endowment funds. (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation. (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Foundation and (7) the Foundation's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Foundation's Board of Directors and the Grand Chapter's Finance Committee have the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 3.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Foundation has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Foundation considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.
