



ADDRESS OF WELCOME

(by Sarahann Shapiro, Past Grand Matron and Art Weiss, Past Grand Patron)

Art Weiss, PGP: Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Matron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored members, sisters, brothers, and friends. We are delighted you have joined us tonight for this Informal Opening prior to the start of our 144th "Treasures of Freedom" annual session.

Sarahann Shapiro, **PGM**: Because we know that many of you have traveled long distances, it is our pleasure to serve as handy native guides and give you some useful tips and tricks to orient yourself in our adventurous State of California.

Art: You will find many things that seem similar to what you might have at home, but everything has a little California twist.

Sarahann: For example, the Most Worthy Grand Matron may find similarity in Southern California where we have Disneyland, Universal Studios and Sea World. We acknowledge, of course, that Florida has much larger versions of these attractions, but then we think that our versions have all the best rides and have weeded out all the ones that would have had a ticket below E.

Art: Our Most Worthy Grand Patron may find similarity in Northern California where we have Pittsburg, St Mary's and Redding. Of course, we think that you have them spelled incorrectly in Pennsylvania, but our members would never be so rude as to correct you.

Sarahann: There are also a few things that you will need to know to find common items in California. For example, if you are looking for a jar of Hellman's, try Best Foods.

Art: If you want a hamburger with a smiley face star on the box, you are looking for Carl's Junior, not Hardy's.

Sarahann: And if you want that familiar orange juice, what they call pure California orange juice in Florida is called pure Florida orange juice here. I guess they think they can sell it for more money if they say it comes from farther away. Personally, I have never been able to tell the difference.

Art: For the session there are a couple of important differences for you to know. First, in California, persons being escorted are not introduced by name on the floor. All names are given in the East. So, if you do not hear your name on the floor, the person leading you has not forgotten you are behind her. She is taking you East so that the Worthy Grand Matron may introduce you.

Sarahann: Please do not be startled when the room explodes in applause after Grand Honors are given. We love to cheer for our Distinguished and Honored members. In fact, when we travel, we have to remember not to clap. If you see a member from California swinging their arms after Grand Honors in another jurisdiction, you will know that they have barely managed to catch themselves from being the lone sound in an otherwise quiet room.

Art: Finally, please do not take offense if at the start of remarks after the first one each day does not begin with the long list of titles and greetings. We feel that the first speech of the day, having included all those words, has established protocol for the rest of the day. Some people may even say "protocol having been established" before they skip all the titles. No insult or disrespect is intended.

Sarahann: Now, some of these differences may seem odd to some of our visitors. We think that some of these differences have risen because of the difficulty of travel in our state leading to a scarcity of opportunities to see and appreciate our Distinguished and Honored members. While California may be only the second largest state in the contiguous 48, the travel distances can be daunting.

In fact, I once had a client who came here for a meeting at my office in San Jose from his home state of New Jersey. When the meeting was over, he said to me, "Since I was out here in California, I thought I might visit my cousin. How long do you think it will take me to drive to Los Angeles?"

When I told him that if he was going to do that, he should just change his plane ticket to fly home from there because it was a six-hour drive, he looked astonished and replied, "But aren't San Jose and Los Angeles in the same state? How can they be that far apart?"

After confirming that I knew of what I spoke and it really was a six-hour drive, he said, "Well, I guess that won't work. It is much more than I had in mind. Maybe I will visit my old college buddy. How long will it take me to drive to San Diego?"

Art: It is sometimes hard for members from East coast states to realize the size of California. Although members from Florida have some idea of how far you drive here, since they can go from the panhandle to Miami.

Here in California, from our northwestern-most chapter in Arcata, to our southern-most chapter in Brawley, is about 850 miles.

Sarahann: That's only 200 miles less than the distance between the homes of our Most Worthy Grand Matron in Florida and our Most Worthy Grand Patron in Pennsylvania. In fact, if our Most Worthy Grand Matron were to start driving north from her home, she would make it to Richmond, Virginia before driving the length of California.

Art: And if our Most Worthy Grand Patron were to leave his home and drive south, he would be 30 miles past Birmingham, Alabama and have passed through seven states before going the same distance.

Sarahann: Because of the great distances involved, we have developed some distinct cultural differences between the northern part of our state and the southern part of our state. While no generalization is true in every case, there are some reliable indicators to know whether a person is from the north or from the south.

Art: For example, if you hear someone ask for directions and they tell you to get on the 101, they are from the south.

If they tell you to take 101 or Highway 101, they are from the north.

Sarahann: If you ask a person how far it is to another town and they answer by telling you how long it takes to get there, they are from the south.

If they actually tell you how many miles it is, they are from the north.

Art: Our members from the south are not willing to drive north any farther than Bakersfield and have trouble remembering that the state goes on for another 275 miles after you get to Sacramento, because that is the location of the last major airport in the north.

Our members in the north don't understand why members from the south balk at driving 60 miles, forgetting that it takes an hour in the north and three hours in the south to go the same distance.

Sarahann: And finally, people from the north are convinced that everyone in the south is a water waster, or we would not have to send all our water down there for them to drink.

Art: However, despite the occasional oddball who suggests that California should be divided into anywhere from two to six separate states, we like the diversity that our different regions provide. There are few recreations or pastimes that you cannot enjoy in California that are available anywhere else in the contiguous 48

states. Here you have beaches, forests, mountains, rivers, lakes and deserts, low humidity and a lack of mosquitoes. What more could anyone want?

Sarahann: We are very proud of our State, our Grand Chapter and our members, and we want to give our most pleased and humble thanks to our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron for the appointment of several of our members to committees and as the recipients of your special appointments. We are so very proud of all of our members who have received such recognition and appreciate the honors you have shown California.

Art: We look forward to your attendance during this year's session and the opportunity to show you the many skills and talents of our members. We were pleased to be able to start tonight with our Sister Cherri Whiteley who has already begun our lovely evening playing for us this evening, with much more to come. (*Applause*)

Sarahann: Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, tonight is the beginning of the end of your adventurous and fabulous year of service. You have traveled all over the state finding the treasures of our Order, and remembering our members, and now return to where we began for your final adventure, leading us through the annual business of our Order with fun and fellowship for everyone.

We look forward to watching you preside as the culmination of a year of service to our Order and to our Grand Chapter. We have been proud of the dedication and commitment that you have given to our Order. Not only this year, but throughout your respective journeys through the Grand Line.

We could not be more pleased at the work that you have done, the obstacles that you have overcome and your devotion to the improvement of our Grand Chapter in every aspect and for every member.

Sarahann: Sister Linda, it is with the greatest love and pride that I present to you your gavel for the first time at this Grand Chapter Session. I know that you will be kind, firm and understanding as you preside over the proceedings and business of the session, and that you will listen courteously and deal fairly with everyone that brings forward business for the consideration of the members, treasuring our members, and trusting that they shall speak and act for the good of our Order.

Art: Brother Bill, you also will wield this gavel at times during our session, and I know that you will also be fair and impartial as you preside over those deliberations that are assigned to you.

As you have spent the year remembering the member, I have no doubt that you will listen with good attention and with an eye to assisting our members as they consider the issues brought before them.

Sarahann and Art: Congratulations and Welcome!

ADDRESS OF THE MOST WORTHY GRAND MATRON

(Helen J. Westmoreland, PGM, Florida)

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, Past Most Worthy Grand Patron, General Grand Chapter officers and my sisters and brothers.

I have been looking forward to being here in California and seeing and meeting old and new friends. I am always glad when I can be at a Chapter again with your sweet Brother Loyal Stark and his wife Joan. What an inspiration they have been to many people around the world, and I just wanted to say how much I have missed seeing you. Love you. Joan, I love you too.

I like to recognize my appointments in their own Grand Jurisdiction, and today is no different. We have Brother Dennis Jordan, Board of Grand Trustees. Don Snyder, Bylaws Committee. JD Hammett, Chairman of the Charters Committee. Collette Serio Gole, Jurisprudence Committee. And what a wonderful job she has been doing. Jim Whiteley, Public Relations Committee. Michael Cornell, Chairman of the Regenerative Medicine Committee. Absolutely marvelous man to serve on that committee. He is working hard because that is one of my special projects. And there's going to be a resolution coming out. I hope you will all read it, think about it, and vote for it. Barbara Scott, Youth Committee. Nancy Jordan and Marty McKidd, my Hummingbirds, and Anne Murphy, Eagle to the Most Worthy Grand Patron.

What a wonderful group. And I know everyone here is all product of all the wonderful work you're currently doing and will be doing at our annual session in Orlando.

There are many differences between California and there are not many differences. I want to tell you, the group that introduced us and talked to us about California, that's marvelous what they did. I can't wait to get the Proceedings so I can have a copy of that. It was just marvelous. I'm laughing back there.

Because where I live in the panhandle – and she mentioned that, too – it is ten hours down to Miami. And I won't go there in the daytime by myself, much less at night. And I was born in Florida.

We are both on the coast, both have high volume of tourism, but one thing that you – that we don't have – are wildfires. And we are not saying that – we do have the hurricane, and we just had a couple. But California, our thoughts and prayers are with those who are in harm's way, and with those fires, we pray for their safety.

We also know that you travel and like to work, so just sign up for anything you would like to do at the Triennial Assembly and I will put you to work. Don't worry about that.

I love history and especially that of the forming of nations and those who stood for a cause and endured many challenges along the way. Being the wife of a career military man, I have a deep love and respect for those who are currently serving and those that have served for a cause greater than themselves.

As far as I am concerned, we cannot do enough for our military men and women, but we can give them our thanks whenever we see them. And I have a husband who was military. He died from heart problems. I had a son-in-law who was a fireman at the Air Force base – and this is not in my speech, but I am going to tell you anyway. He is from Hanford, California. He was six-foot-four, worked out at the base gym every day, went with the 33rd tac firemen to the gulf war and they got the most killed. He came back and transferred to Robbins Air Force base in Georgia, and every morning he worked out at the gym. June of 1997, he went into the office and he said, "Guys, I do not have the flexibility in my right leg I used to have." And they said, "No, James, you are dragging it."

He was operated on the third day of July 1997, in Keesler Air Force Base in Mississippi. He had an astrocytoma wrapped around his spine and they could not get it off. September of 1997 until he died in 2003, he never walked another step. But he was a good father and a good – wonderful, wonderful husband, and a really good son-in-law. His two children, one of them is married to a captain and they are stationed in Oklahoma, and he's a pilot.

They have just had their first great-grandchild, and that's my special one. September, born nine-pounds one-ounce, 22 inches-long when he was born. And I have not seen him yet, but I am going to Thanksgiving. I can't wait to get there.

And his is working on a criminal justice degree in college and combat – he's just been overseas and I don't know where he was – he's back home now and I will get to see him at Thanksgiving.

So, pray for my family as well as yours, and everyone who is here, wherever they are serving for us, so we can have freedom in our world and do the things that we want to do here.

Women are important -- another thing it's not in my speech. I get lost. I want to say to the spouses, whether a man spouse or a woman spouse, and others, in the military. We stayed home and we worked. We take care of things while you are out there fighting.

I was more or less by myself from January 1968 until my husband retired 1 October 1974. He never went anywhere during that time frame I could go with him. And I stayed home and worked, mowed the grass, took care of our little girls, all that stuff. Anyway, you women and you men – and there are a lot of men now who are staying home and their wives are off over doing jobs somewhere. So, we got to think about them. We work hard.

I love history and especially that as to the forming of nations, and those that stood for a cause and endured many challenges along the way. I feel the same way about this. As far as I am concerned, we cannot do enough for our military men and women and we can give them our thanks whenever we see them. And I have got a beautiful coin for the first responders right here, and somebody is kind enough to put a hole in it so I can wear it as an emblem.

And I have to tell you about this, too. I have got something to sell and I'm not giving to a couple men around here, I'm not sure yet.

I feel the same way about what we are doing for our regenerative medicine for the Wake Forest Regenerative Medicine Institute. We are on the cusp of new developments using technology to advance. It seems like something out of science fiction novel, but just think, we are part of this. We are responsible for some of the research being completed. Our support is necessary to ensure the advancement of the new ways of healing. And there's someone sitting on the stage right now who was with me on that event and he talked to Dr. Datar who was in charge of that. Dr. Datar was a DeMolay in Florida. He's now running this big event that's going on at Wake Forest where they take your stem cells, put it in your body, and they it put it into an eleven-year-old child, a bladder. They built him one out of his stem cells. And this is -- anyway, he is now grown. He didn't get ill. It grew with him as he grew. He never rejected it and never had another operation.

So, this thing is working, and you will see it work in other parts of our world.

First responders. The first on the scene, the first to come to your aid and the first to put themselves in harm's way to secure your safety. We should never take for granted the support and dedication these men and women have, because you never know when you may be the one that the first responders are attending to. And that has happened to us just not too long ago when we lost our Right Worthy Grand

Secretary, Gary Miller. They came to support him and while he didn't make it, they did get him to the hospital.

Have you noticed that all these previously mentioned groups have one thing in common? They all help others. They all seek to ensure safety, advancement and security for all. They are the real heroes.

If you do not know about any of these special projects, please let me know and I will be most happy to put you in touch with the right person to talk about it.

We have been attending several chapters overseas this year, and what wonderful trips they were. We have been to Guam, Taiwan, the Philippines, Romania, Australia, Scotland, Ireland and Germany.

I have eaten everything from dumplings to soup from frog mucous but, I have to say, it is the warmth and love from the members of those chapters that will forever remain in my thoughts and dreams.

The hospitality everywhere could not have been any better, and I encourage each of you and every one of you to visit with those various countries and attend a chapter meeting. Believe me, you will not regret meeting and socializing with new friends.

We have seen some amazing sights, and such a deep-rooted history. A few days is just not enough. And I am ready to go back just after I win the lottery, because I buy a ticket once in a while. Our travel agent does such a great job on our travel arrangements, and if you want to go with us anywhere, just check the calendar and come with us. We would like to have as many travel with us as possible. Who knows, you may even meet new friends that will span a lifetime.

Don't miss out. We are going to be finishing our travels in 2017 in November with our trip to visit the chapters in Hawaii. So, dust off your suitcase and join me for a world-wide adventure in the land of milk and honey.

For those you who would like to know a little more about the jewelry, I have the hummingbird. It was created in Alabama, and she is an art teacher and she printed in out on the front of her card. And I said, may I use that? So, the hummingbird, we have got the jewelry. And I will tell you that our committee person is Julie MacMillan and her husband Bob, and they are outside with the jewelry. You will also find housing reservation forms that are available to you.

I could tell you that when I left home the other day, out of 1,200 rooms that we have blocked in a 2000-room hotel – it is the largest Marriott in the world – 44 percent of my rooms have already been reserved.

So, the message is that if you think or even plan on coming to General Grand Chapter, I needed your reservation forms yesterday.

I'm going to leave you with one little note, because I'm from Florida but, if you remember, years ago when you mailed a letter you put on the C-a-l-i-f abbreviation for California.

Do you know what that stands for? Come and live in Florida.

ADDRESS OF THE MOST WORTHY GRAND PATRON

(Robert C. Penoyer, PGP, Pennsylvania)

Thank you.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Most Worthy Grand Matron, Past Most Worthy Grand Patron, sisters and brothers, good evening.

This is my second visit to the Grand Chapter of California. I was here four years ago when you were up the road a few miles, in Fresno, and I certainly had a good time and enjoyed the visit that moment. But at that time, my wife was not able to travel with me. But she is here tonight and I want to introduce her before I forget about it. My lovely wife Mary.

Membership is something that we need to consider more and more. I realize that your jurisdiction has seen declining membership, just as most of our other jurisdictions. However, there are positive signs that Eastern Star in the world is growing. And new chapters are being born.

During our last Triennium, our Past Most Worthy Grand Patron Brother John Grobler constituted the Grand Chapter of Italy. We are currently working on creating a Grand Chapter in the Philippines. And I'm hoping by the end of this Triennium, or at least early in the next Triennium we'll have a Grand Chapter in the Philippines. We already have 30 chapters over there and over 900 members in the Philippines, so we are looking forward to seeing that happen.

We are seeing new chapters created in Romania, Bolivia, and Brazil. In the past month there have been eight new chapters instituted in Brazil and three chapters constituted.

So, there is growth in the world outside the United States.

We have received letters of inquiry from other countries that are showing an interest in starting Eastern Star chapters with the assistance of the Grand Masters of the Grand Lodges supporting that endeavor.

Those are the positive aspects for our future.

However, here in our country, where Eastern Star was born over 150 years ago, the picture has not been so bright.

I do not profess to have an answer to stem the decline in membership. I do know that only through the commitment and dedication of each and every one of you, within the hearing of my voice to solicit eligible people to join our ranks, can we turn that tide. You can do this. You wouldn't be here now if you did not believe in the precepts of our Order or enjoyed the friendships that you have gained through your membership in Eastern Star.

Think about it. How many of your friends, your sisters, your brothers, would you know now if you hadn't decided to make the commitment to join our beautiful Order?

As I have traveled the many jurisdictions over these past few years, I have heard the variety of reasons as to why we lose members, and I believe it is beneficial to review some of those reasons.

New members are not asked to do anything. People join for a reason and we need to find that reason and see that it is fulfilled.

Members are neglected by cliques that form in some of the chapters, or they drift away due to the lack of attention or recognition.

Many members get frustrated by long-time members who will not relinquish responsibility of leadership to those willing to assume new stations or positions.

Jealousy rears its ugly head when someone receives an appointment or accolade. It would be nice to congratulate that sister or brother that you professed to love. Remember your Obligation. Let us love one another.

Members are criticized openly or by whispers when they do something incorrectly. Many members become discouraged by the poor ritualistic work that is being done in many of our chapters today.

Sisters and brothers, we need to be more proactive and sustain the membership in our chapters. There are many things we can do which may be out of the ordinary

to enhance our membership, such as work with our Masonic lodges and get them to encourage members to join our organization. This can be done by asking the Master of the lodge to let you speak on behalf of our Order.

Many of our chapters acquired new members by having joint Masonic Eastern Star dinners and meetings, and have members invite friends and spouses to come and listen to a presentation of Eastern Star and Masonry.

We must improve our ritualistic work. We need to do high quality work or no one will be interested in it.

Involve your new members in your committees so they can feel part of our good work.

Make use of our new social media tools, Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and other forms to advance the possibility of reaching new prospective members quickly and painlessly.

Get involved in community groups and spread the word of the charity work we do and seldom get credit for it. We need to get out of the comfort zone of our Chapter walls and let the world know what we can do for our fellow man, and what we always have done for our fellow man.

Potential new members are out there in our communities and waiting for our encouragement.

One thing is certain. If we do nothing, nothing will change. We need to be more involved in the ever-changing world around us. We may – we need to try many different ideas – a few which I have touched on and I know your fertile minds can think of many more.

You are the only ones that can bring in new members. Only you can sign the petitions for degrees. Only you can help improve the ritualistic work in our chapters, and only you can make our chapters grow and known throughout the world. You can make a difference because you are the most important person in this room.

Sisters and brothers think about this: If every one of you in this room would bring in one new member, in a year just think of the exponential growth that this organization would have. And I challenge you to think about that and do it. Go out there and bring in one new member this year.

Each and every one of you.

Just remember, that this is the greatest organization for men and women in the world. Spread the word.

Brother Michael Cornell, Chairman of Regenerative Medicine, may we have your report at this time?

REGENERATIVE MEDICINE REPORT

(Michael Cornell, PGP, Chairman)

Thank you Worthy, Grand Matron.

If you attended Grand Chapter last year and listened to my speech, you heard me use the word "imagine" a lot. Imagine if there was no longer a need for an organ transplant list. Imagine if a cure for diabetes has been developed. Imagine if there was a better way to treat burn victims and imagine if you could replace a defective organ with a new one. The hope for all of this still exists, but now the reality has to be explained.

You may recall that I told you that WFIRM is the only regenerative medicine institute in the world that does it all. Tissue engineering, cell and gene therapies and organ regeneration. Their mission statement reads as follows:

WFIRM, leading the global transformation from treatments to cures.

If you stop and think about that for a bit, that means a world that talks about cures instead of treatments. What has them all working hours these days is that their science continues to move forward rapidly. Currently they have eight what they call technologies – think biologicals or living treatments – cued up for the FDA process, and another in the pipeline. Some examples would be bladders, blood cells and sphincter muscles. And here is where it starts to get really exciting. After years of research and study and discovery, they are now approaching actual manufacturing. That's fabulous news. The tricky part is that, just like everything else about regenerative medicine, no one has ever done this before. No company

yet specializes in this unique and Star Trek but real-life products. None have manufactured this type of product and living treatment before.

What challenges do they face? First – and this is extremely important – nothing they develop can be used by patients until they make it through the FDA process. That process is currently long and complicated. You may not know that the cost of developing a new drug averages \$2.6 billion and takes eight to twenty years. Even more discouraging is that 90 percent of them fail before they ever get to a patient.

As the leading institute for this type of science in the world, they are working with the FDA and other regulatory authorities to look for ways to streamline the regulatory process for regenerative medicine-type technologies.

You probably have heard of clinical trials. Clinical trials are the mechanism by which medical science tests new drugs, new procedures and new healing technologies.

For drug development, clinical trials occur in three steps: Phase I, Phase II and Phase III.

Phase I is designed to see whether the drug or therapy developed is actually safe for use. The Phase I scientists don't necessarily expect to gather data on the results of the treatment or drug on the condition but, rather, determine whether it is safe to test on patients.

Phase II is designed to continue to test safely, but also to begin to see if the proposed treatment on the medical condition it is designed to treat.

Phase III, when indicated, then becomes a trial that focuses primarily on the results of the treatment on the actual medical problem.

During all three phases enrolled patients get the very best of medical treatment. Indeed, there are studies that show clinical trial patients receive better overall care because they are so carefully and continually monitored.

That said, we also celebrate those patients who participate in clinical trials as heroes for medicine. They, in a way, are pioneers and what we learn from their response to new treatments or drugs will help patients afflicted with their medical condition all over the world.

One of the research areas in which WFIRM is showing tremendous progress is wound healing. Currently, researchers at WFIRM are awaiting FDA approval to enter a Phase I clinical trial for a new technology to address this issue. This trial is particularly critical to our wounded soldiers and first responders and has positive implications for all sorts of wounds such as bed sores in the elderly, burns, and other skin traumas.

Enhancing the amniotic stem cells found in the placenta tissue or afterbirth, and this type of stem cell was discovered by the Institute in 2007, WFIRM has developed a new technology to help wound healing. In Phase I clinical trial they will place this technology in wounds and test the safety of this possible treatment.

Patients selected for this trial will more than likely be patients who need skin grafts. The surgeons will use the amniotic treatment to treat the harvest site after grafting. Once researchers have been able to demonstrate the safety of the procedure for the FDA, then they will begin Phase II trials which will focus on addressing how effective the treatment is.

Here is one interesting note about regenerative medicine. Unlike clinical trials for new drugs where part of the study population receives the new drug and part receives a placebo, in most instances those participating in clinical trials all receive the treatment.

Because all do, researchers are able to observe not only safety, but also the effect perhaps of the actual treatment. In some instances, the data is so impressive that the FDA does not require a Phase III. Thus accelerating the time it takes to get from the bench research phase to the actual treatment phase for patients.

In people with Type 1 diabetes, the body doesn't produce enough insulin to effectively regulate levels of blood sugar. In healthy individuals, insulin is produced by beta cells in the pancreas. For many years, scientist have been exploring potential ways to replace these beta cells and restore insulin production.

One option, transplanting cells from donors, has met with limited success because of the lack of donor cells and because recipients face the possibility of rejecting the transplant.

At WFIRM, researchers are working on two projects for the goal of restoring the body's natural capacity to produce insulin.

One is engineering pancreatic beta cells. This project involves a new type of stem cells discovered by the Institute. It is derived from amniotic fluid. These cells can give rise to many of the specialized cell types found in the human body. Scientists are working to coax these cells to differentiate into pancreatic insulin-producing cells. The ultimate goal is to produce cells that are able to regulate insulin levels based on the amount of glucose the cells are exposed to.

The team's work slowly – shows early promise. Ongoing work focuses on how to extend this effect by understanding more about how the cells function in the pancreas.

The bio-artificial pancreas project addresses the major obstacles to the transplantation of insulin-producing cells, lack of donor cells and issues with rejection. The project involves using donor cells that are encapsulated with a thin membrane that allows oxygen and nutrients to enter the capsule but prevents issues that would cause the patient to reject the cells. With this approach, the replacement cells can come from animals or could be engineered from stem cells.

One major obstacle, being able to efficiently encapsulate the large number of cells needed for therapy, has been solved with advances in engineering.

Second, this is where Eastern Star is so important and why they are so grateful. They have to have financial resources. They are a very frugal organization. They

work hard to make every dollar stretch as far as possible. Some of the price tags may be horrifying.

For example, they have a proposal now where they believe they can get from bench research to first immuno-clinical trials on a cure – not a treatment, but a cure – for Type 1 diabetes for 30 million dollars.

Thirty million sounds like an incredible amount of money until you compare that figure to the cost of treating a person with Type 1 diabetes and all the complications for their lifetime.

Now we come to the challenges that they face, and they can all be summed up with one word. Funding. Most of their funding comes from the federal government, which is they are concerned with the cut that is being proposed in the current budget. The researchers at the Institute are expected to find funding for part of their salaries. They are hopeful that the medical industry will come forward and increase their support for their research.

When people ask why it takes so long to get the research done and to patients, these are the two biggest issues that slow them down: Regulation and funding.

Now, how is OES raising the funds to support WFIRM? If you looked at my table, you will see that we are selling wristbands and starfish pins. Why a starfish? A starfish is one of the animals in the world that can heal themselves once they are injured. They can lose one of their legs and it will regenerate.

There's also a bottle, a Coke bottle out there with dimes in it. The Deputy in my District, Sister Kathie, she thought up this idea that that Coke bottle would hold \$100 in dimes. It doesn't. It holds 120. I get to count them. And she has members around the state – there is probably more now – collecting dimes for me.

My committee member in Louisiana decided that she wanted every chapter in her state to contribute \$1,000 to the project. She started by asking her chapter members to give her items they no longer wanted. She took them to an auction. Over time, they collected money until they had over a thousand dollars. They took the extra money and paid it forward to another chapter. It has been paid forward 16 times, and she has 17 chapters that now have raised over a thousand dollars in Louisiana.

My committee also sponsored a cruise this past January, and we will have another one in this upcoming January around the Hawaiian Islands.

Together, we can bring this science to many patients. Together, we can change the world. OES plus WFIRM. Just imagine.

Members of the Election Board Committee are listed in the program and many are seated in section 211. I thank each one of them for the work they will be doing during this Grand Session. Every member is essential to this committee and their service appreciated. Please give them every courtesy during the legislative process.

An orientation meeting of the Election Board Committee was held prior to the opening of our Grand Chapter Session. Members were given instructions on the balloting process and have received individual assignments. I have confidence that the members of this committee are prepared to perform their duty.

At this time, I would like to recognize my special assistants, Co-Chairman Elsa Templin, Peggy Buck, Diana Davidson, Suzanne Gallicho, Donna Herring, Past Grand Matron, and Deborah Winn. And captains Alan White, Jim Chormicle, Past Grand Matron, Michael Cornell, Past Grand Patron, Bill Netemeyer and Bob Slater.

These members have specific duties that are key to the balloting process and I thank them for agreeing to serve in these positions.

I will now review the general instructions regarding voting which are printed in your legislative book on page 6.

The Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter provides that every member in California, if registered and in attendance at this Grand Chapter Session, shall be entitled to one vote. When you registered you received your official voting card and official ballot. Remember to keep them with you at all times. If you lose or misplace your ballot card they cannot be replaced and each person is entitled to only one ballot.

You must be present in order to vote. You may not give your ballot to another person to cast your vote for you.

When there is only one candidate for an office, the vote will be by the show of the voting card. If there is more than one candidate for an office, instructions will be given at the appropriate time.

Our Constitution requires a two-thirds majority to pass legislation and to amend our Constitution and also to amend the Instruction Book. A simple majority is needed to pass a resolution.

When a written ballot has been called for, you will be given instructions at the appropriate time as to which ballot to use. Please listen carefully when the instructions are given. All incorrect ballots will not be counted.

And it is very important that members remain seated during the balloting process to allow the tellers to have free access to the aisles and stairs. Please do not set anything in the aisles or on the stairs. The ballot container will be passed to you and the tellers will collect the ballots only from those members who are seated. The exception to this will be the guards who will step to the nearest teller and deposit their own ballot. No ballots will be collected outside the Grand Chapter room or in undesignated areas.

Please remember, only official ballots are to be placed in the ballot container and nothing else. And please do not fold your ballot.

After the Worthy Grand Matron has declared the ballot open, members of the Election Committee will report to their assigned sections. Each section will be covered, so please be patient and have your ballot ready when a committee member arrives in your section.

Remember, the ballot will not be closed until all ballots have been collected. After the Worthy Grand Matron has declared the ballot closed, remain in your seats so that the business of Grand Chapter may continue.

Thank you for your cooperation and patience during the balloting process.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SENIOR LIVING COMMUNITY

(By Judy Figueroa, Acting Executive Director)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored members.

On behalf of the residents and staff at the Senior Living Community, we are prepared to present the following annual report highlighting the success and challenges this past year.

We would also like to express our appreciation to the Board of Trustees and the Eastern Star chapters for their dedication and support for our community.

Our senior community offers a continuum of care model that provides a full spectrum of care services. Residents are treated with respect and dignity while partnering with the staff to define what quality of life means to each individual.

During the past year we have served an average of 45 seniors on our campus. The resident mix of 20 percent independent, 72 percent assisted living, 8 percent of our placement in skilled nursing or memory care.

During the past year the average age of our residents was 90 years. This year, two of our residents have celebrated their 100th birthday.

We are also excited to announce that the Board of Trustees have approved memory care on our campus. This means our residents outplaced will be brought home to the campus, if it is appropriate for them.

As a resident-centered mission-driven community, the Senior Living Community promotes quality of life by empowering our residents, their families and our community to live well and have an active, beautiful and rewarding life. The residents enjoy a variety of activities both on and off campus. Staff promotes educational, physical, spiritual socialization in daily activities. Just to name a few, they have trips to the museum, baseball games, shopping, book clubs, tai chi, and we can't forget about Bingo.

This year, we have reorganized departments and added new programs for our residents. A Social Service Department has been created to meet the psycho-social needs of our residents. We have also developed a Wellness Center program with a Certified Restorative Nurse's Assistant to work daily with our residents on the gym and on an individual basis. She also will be working closely with the physical therapist to provide continuity of care for our residents who have been discharged from the hospital or from the skilled nursing facilities.

We have focused on keeping our residents and families engaged this year. Our residents are actively volunteering in the beauty shop ordering supplies, making appointments, announcements at mealtimes, being buddies to our new residents coming in. These are just to name a few.

Our residents are becoming very active in the community. We have started a new Resident Volunteer Emergency program. These residents will be trained to assist our staff in case of disaster on the campus. We have an active Resident Council and Executive Council. We are also encouraging our other residents to participate in volunteering on campus.

Staff is working with residents to create a monthly newsletter, which will be out in November. This year we implemented a family meeting, which is quarterly, and our first meeting was great. We had a wonderful large participation from the families. These quarterly meetings help with the families and the residents to know what's happening on campus and getting the residents and the families more engaged.

Staff and residents have been challenged this past year with the untimely death of their Executive Director Kim Cooke. The uncertainty of the new leadership and what changes were ahead of them was clearly on the minds of the residents, staff and families. With the support of our Board of Trustees and staff pulling together, working as a team, residents and staff were able to move forward.

Staff has been focusing on different types of revenue that would benefit our Senior Living Community. We are in the process of applying for VA benefits for those residents who are eligible. We are also applying for Medi-Cal waiver which would allow us to keep our residents on campus instead of sending them to skilled nursing facilities. We will receive \$50 to \$200 a day, depending on the level of care needed.

I am positive that we will see an increase in admissions when our memory care is advertised to the public. I would like the Senior Living Community to be open to the Masonic Homes residents who need memory care.

Staff is actively marketing to hospitals, doctors' offices, senior placement and home health agencies, focusing more on the assisted living admissions.

Residents and staff participated in the Health Care Fair at the Yorba Linda Senior Center last week. They passed out our brochures and other helpful information that we developed for seniors. We had a great turnout at our table. The residents and staff enjoyed the networking.

Before I finish, I would like to introduce our residents and staff that are here today.

Alvin Stipp, former President of the Resident Council, Rosalee Becker, Beverly Coombs, Marilyn Brindell, Verna Hamilton, Joe Morris and Rita Wade.

I would also like to introduce our staff that brought our residents here today. Cindy Halverson, Social Service Designee, Brandi McGinnis, Director of Social Services, Rosie Rena, Health Service Coordinator, and Ellie Furtado, Resident Restorative Nurses Assistant.

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to work as Interim Executive Director. The Senior Living Community of Eastern Star Homes is a beautiful campus with wonderful residents and staff. I truly believe, with all the marketing strategies and networking in the community and surrounding communities, we will be successful.

I want to thank the Senior Living staff for all the hard work and accomplishments that we have achieved this year. I would also like to thank the residents for their dedication and commitment in the many hours of volunteering on campus.

On behalf of the residents and staff of the Senior Living Community, we are very happy to be able to present the very special Fraternalism Award for 2017. This year, we are recognizing four very hard-working members of our group. The residents and staff are very appreciative of their unselfish giving of their time and talents. Some of the support is as follows:

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: We are most grateful for the work and dedication that our Booster club gives to our Senior Living Community. It is the dedication of our many volunteers that allow our home to sparkle for our residents.

We also have the pleasure of presenting the funds that we have collected in the Heart Fund of our Eastern Star Foundation. These are from previous years, as well as 2017.

Please join me in welcoming Ashley Teran, Director of Development Department of Medicine for the UC Irvine Heart Disease Prevention program, who will tell us a bit about their program.

HEART FUND PRESENTATION

(By Ashley Teran, Director of Development, Department of Medicine, UCI Heart Disease Prevention Program)

Good afternoon, everybody.

I sure wish I would have known how lovely you are all dressed, so excuse my attire.

Thank you. I represent UC Irvine Health and I work for the Department of Medicine, specifically the Cardiology division.

I was honored that Bill invited me to be here today, because the time for your support is so critical right now and it is so fortuitous. UCI has recently become the first in the UC system to be a fully-integrated medical center. And what that means is, basically, we really want to shift from reaction to prevention medicine.

So one of the things we are doing in the Cardiology Prevention Center, is that clinically what that means is basically under one roof and under one system we are going to have exercise assistance on site, dietitians, obviously the cardiologists themselves, because we want our patients to have a holistic care experience. And we are honored that the California Eastern Star Foundation has actually named a fund and we're going to be recognizing your support as part of our research efforts.

Two-thirds of our diabetic population will suffer from heart attack or stroke. I mean, your timing for support is really meeting a national need and we are so very grateful. And the reason that we think we can do a little bit better and we want your funds to go that much further in directing this national need, we don't want to assess just one risk factor for diabetes or for cardiology-cardiac events in our diabetic patients. We want to address all these.

In fact, our early research efforts of doing this, we were actually able to improve cardiovascular disease detection 62 percent versus seven percent, which was what was done previously in major heart studies. So, this is huge and we cannot say thank you enough. It is really going to make a big impact on how we improve our patient care in the cardiology program, and also with educating physicians around the nation. So, thank you very much.

And there's a note from the Program Director, but I will just sum it up. He says thank you. He is so sorry he can't be here. He is exceedingly grateful. He wants to pour your money into the research efforts for the community and also for physician education, so that other physicians will know how to better diagnosis cardiology-cardiac incidents in our diabetic patients.

And the final thing I wanted to close on, is we are really honored and we hope if you are ever out in Orange County, please let me know and I would be glad to host you on an update on sort of what your funds have achieved in the community. It would be our honor and our pleasure and, more than that, we were able to get a press release on all the great work that the California Eastern Star Foundation is doing, because I can tell it is a great deal. We are so very grateful, again, and I hope you all enjoy your conference.

Thank you, again.

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: The California Eastern Star Foundation is pleased to present to University of Irvine for their heart research, a check in the amount of \$27,304.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Today we also have the pleasure of presenting to a wonderful program the funds that have been collected in our Eastern Star Foundation for cancer research.

Please join me in welcoming Justin Schroer, Director of Development from the UC Davis Comprehensive Cancer Center, which will tell us a little bit about their program.

CANCER RESEARCH FUND PRESENTATION

(By Justin Schroer, Director of Development, UC Davis Comprehensive Cancer Center)

Thank you everyone. Good afternoon.

I'm here on behalf of UC Davis Comprehensive Cancer Center, as well as Dr. Marcio Malogolowkin -- that was the name. It can be a difficult one, from time to time, so I fully understand. We call him affectionately, Dr. Marcio. And he is our Division Chief of Pediatric Hematology Oncology at UC Davis Cancer Center. He couldn't be here today. He is on call this weekend, treating our kids of the Sacramento area, and so he wanted me to come down here and say thank you for all of your support and what you guys have been able to do for us. He is truly

grateful, we are very truly grateful and the children of Sacramento are truly grateful.

We have prepared a short video that he wanted to give his own thanks, so I think that we have a short video cued up.

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: On behalf of the California Eastern Star Foundation, we are so pleased to be able to present to the UC Davis Pediatric Oncology Research -- and this means a lot to everybody in this room and all of the members of Eastern Star in California, because of the children that it affects and it takes care of. We want to present you with a check for \$82,448.

Another important task when reopening the center was to seek and hire individuals to care for our guests. I am proud to say we have achieved that spot on. Our customer satisfaction rating has consistently been in the 90s. From our grounds crew, housekeeping and banquet staff, we hold dear your experience and will go above and beyond to be sure your time spent with us is a memorable one.

Your taste buds won't be disappointed, either, as the culinary team at Riverside Convention Center is led by Celebrity Chef Brad Martin of ABC's The Taste, who was mentored by world-renowned chef Anthony Bourdain.

Riverside has the unique, cozy feel of a small town with its walkable main street, boasting a variety of restaurants and shops. For walking or hiking there is nearby Mount Rubidoux is a favorite with its invigorating 2.7-mile route. We are steps away from the historical Mission Inn Hotel and Spa, offering our guests the charm of Spanish revival architecture which is seen throughout downtown Riverside.

For visitors who may prefer a more contemporary, modern choice, the Riverside Marriott at the convention center, as well as the Hyatt Place are both adjacent to our center. Each of our partner hotels have restaurants and cafes and offer full-service amenities and, also want to add, plenty of closet space for these lovely gowns. We invite you to return to Riverside and experience the new side of boutique hospitality.

ONTARIO CONVENTION CENTER PRESENTATION

Good afternoon. First of all, I want to say thank you very much for once again giving Ontario the opportunity to showcase how important and how great our destination, Ontario, will be for the Order of the Eastern Star.

There's a lot of new things happening in Ontario that are very exciting to our city that we feel would be great for your organization.

One of the key things about it is our affordability.

Our hotels, our convention center, that's one thing that we strive for, being one of the most affordable destinations in Southern California. Our hotel rates range anywhere from \$99 to \$139, depending on the hotel that you want to stay at.

Customized menus. Our convention center will work hand in hand with you to make sure that we are staying within your budget, to make sure it is affordable and accessible for your group.

Another good thing about it is our accessibility. The Ontario Convention Center is conveniently located two blocks from the convention center. All of our hotels offer complimentary shuttles to and from the convention center, as well as anywhere within four miles.

Also, we have the freeways. We are very accessible via many freeways that connect in Ontario, the 210 freeway, the 10 freeway, the 57 freeway and the 15 freeway. So, we are a great hub in Ontario.

Things we are known for Ontario is our airport. As of November last year the City of Ontario took over the airport from L.A. so in the next coming years you will see more air time, more air flights. Our airport authority, as we speak, is meeting with different airlines to bring more affordable rates to the Ontario airport.

Renovation of hotels. The DoubleTree Ontario is going through a full hotel renovation that will be done by 2019. So it will be ready for 2020 when you – hopefully – will be there.

Another new brand that will be coming in by 2019 is a new Delta by Marriott, which will also be there, and it is directly across the street from the convention center.

So, things that are important to your group. We know safety is one of the important things that you guys are looking for. We have security 24-hours-a-day, plus roaming security through the convention center.

The convenience of the hotels. The hotels are directly right next-door, within walking distance to the convention center, so there would be no need to commute or get a car. All of our hotels offer complimentary parking and we have also negotiated a lower parking rate at the convention center.

Something that I know that you prefer, which I am looking at right now, is theater seating. We have committed to your group to bring in theater seating at our Exhibit Hall. That way, there is no change in your diagrams for your program.

And privacy. We know that that is something that is very important to you, and we have committed to make sure that everything that you request will be told to our staff and our event management team.

Again, we are very, very excited. We have worked with other organizations, so we feel that we are very experienced and know exactly what you are looking for, and we hope that you will give us the opportunity to show you how Ontario is the perfect place for your next conference.

PROVING OF THE GRAND CHAPTER

(Proving of Grand Chapter and Opening of the Holy Bible)

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Eileen, may we have your report on the Annual Site Committee.

ANNUAL SESSION SITE COMMITTEE REPORT

(By Eileen Simmons, PM (2/28) Chairman)

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, sisters and brothers, this committee was charged with the responsibility of selecting, contacting and researching convention sites for the consideration by the membership. The committee was directed with the task of obtaining proposals for the three-year period of 2020 through 2022 Grand Chapter Session. The rationale being that entering into a three-year contract would afford continuity for the venues and the members, with the possibility of receiving additional benefits and discounts for entering into a three-year contract.

The members of this committee, along with myself, were Brothers Patrick Burke, Past Patron, who was not able to be with us today, and Roger Nieder, Past Grand Patron

Brother Patrick joined this committee in early 2017 after Brother Brad Dahl resigned after moving out of California. I want to extend my heartfelt thank you for each of these brothers for their time and experience for obtaining proposals for this committee.

One of the greatest concerns and realities facing the committee was the declining attendance at our Grand Chapter Session. Comparing attendance from 2014, 2015

and 2016, there was an 18.4 percent decline in attendance from 2014 to 2015, and 11.5 percent decline from 2015 to 2016.

As our membership continues to age, the decline in attendance seems to be the trend. While we hope that the efforts of all members and the Membership Committee are working to turn this around, it will take time. For purposes of receiving proposals for each of the venues, we used an estimated attendance of 1,100. We felt this was on the high side but did not want to run the risk that venues classifying us too small for the facility.

The good news is that both Visalia and Ontario are open to renegotiate the room block and banquet estimates as the particular Grand Chapter Session grows closer. For example, the 2020 session, we would have the opportunity to decrease our numbers in 2019 when the contract for that particular Grand Chapter is signed. Unfortunately, Riverside was unable to offer this concession.

Another challenging estimate is the number of room nights required. This number represents the total rooms occupied by our members on each night and the total for the week. This is a very hard estimate to provide for the hotel. In most cases, the number of room nights may directly affect the discounts we receive. This continues to be a requirement that members utilize the room blocks arranged for Grand Chapter in order to meet the minimum established for each of the hotels and the overall contract for the session.

This data, plus information on the requirements for hotels, vendors, events, seating, catering and ADA compatibility was used to construct the request for proposal. This document was then sent to the venues to solicit a proposal. It should be noted that room costs and parking were singled out as hot buttons for our organization.

The committee reached out to several convention sites, including Visalia, Ontario, Riverside, San Jose and Santa Clara.

It was determined that San Jose and Santa Clara were not viable sites due to dates not being available, or housing costs being well out of the range of our members. Therefore, we invited Visalia, Ontario and Riverside to submit a proposal for a three-year period between 2020 and 2022. In your packets is a sheet which briefly summarizes the data on Visalia, Ontario and Riverside.

On June 20, 2017, Brother Roger and I traveled to the Ontario Convention Center and Riverside Convention Center to tour each location in one day. We visually walked through the potential areas at the respective convention centers where the Grand Chapter Session would take place, to ensure it would meet our needs. We also visited several of the hotels in each city that we would be utilizing.

This committee met with the Finance Committee in person on July 7, 2017, and a follow-up meeting on August 17, 2017. Together, we reviewed the proposals and answered any questions which came up from the Finance Committee.

I remind you that in your packets is a grid sheet that briefly summarizes the data on Visalia, Ontario and Riverside. We have heard from the representatives and their short presentation.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron the committee thanks you for your support and it has been our pleasure to serve our Order.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Eileen, do have a motion to make on selection of a session site for our annual sessions in 2020 to 2022?

Eileen Simmons, Chairman: Worthy Grand Matron, I do.

This morning we will take up the final business of this annual session and recognize all those who have made this year and this session such a success.

Your balance of raising funds to support the operating expenses of our Grand Chapter and working with local communities with food banks through your Eastern Star Cares projects has been admirable.

You have assisted not only in sustaining our Order in California, but you have encouraged our members to be engaged and visible in our communities.

Success all the way around.

Sister Linda, you have endeared yourself to our members with your humor, knowledge of our Order and compassion. I could not be prouder of my Grand Ruth.

My friend, your devotion and love for our Order runs deep. A true gift to each of us in California.

Brother Bill, your leadership and dedication has earned you the love of our membership. Your strong Masonic ties and the support you have shown our members is something that will be remembered for years to come.

You know, it has been ten years ago today since Brother Skip and I had the pleasure of presiding over our own Farewell Session, with Sister Linda sitting in that yellow chair as Grand Ruth and probably at this point in a puddle of tears.

That being said, regardless of the year of service, ten years ago or today, this particular session is always a time of tears as the Grand Officers bid farewell and prepare themselves to re-enter society where they are no longer required to live their lives in protocol order.

When you think about it, this session is not too much different than a Parole Board hearing. Think about it. It has all the elements:

This year's theme, "Treasures of Freedom."

Having to present your ID to get past the guards in order to get in the room.

Being dressed alike. Thank goodness for no horizontal stripes.

Having to follow the lines on the floor, marching inside lines versus the painted lines to the infirm – infirm – whatever. That place. The infirmary – it's Saturday morning – or the Warden's office.

You got three hots and a cot in prison, just like at Grand Chapter. Catered meals – although not always hot – and a room at the Marriott.

And then the ultimate. You stand before your peers or the Parole Board with your Public Defender – or in Linda and Bill's case, the Jurisprudence Committee – to plead your case.

You articulate the great work you have accomplished and now you have served your debt to society and you pray. You pray that you will receive credit for time served based on your good-time/work-time credits and that somehow, somehow, you will be released on the promise that you will be living a productive and prosocial life.

And then, when that fateful decision is rendered and you are allowed to return home with your new prison clothes and your \$200 in gate money – which is really all that's left from money of the Grand Officers – you come to the shocking realization that serving our Order is never over. In fact, all of us who have gone before you can attest that you will just be another LWOPer. Life Without Parole.

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, I thank you for the opportunity to welcome our members and our visitors this morning. Congratulations on your outstanding service and your impending somewhat modified term of parole.

Sister Linda, it is my pleasure to present to you your gavel this morning as you preside over this, your Farewell session. Congratulations.

Linda Hoeser, WGM: Sister Karen, how can words express my gratitude for your friendship, support and love. It was my honor and privilege to serve as your Grand Ruth in 2007, and I have tried to emulate many of the qualities that I have admired from your special year of service. Thank you for presenting my gavel to me this morning.

And even though ten years ago I thought the journey had ended, on Monday morning Sister Karen sent an email out to the 2007 Grand Officers with a list of 26 events we were required to attend the next year.

Worthy Grand Patron, may we hear from you.

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Sister Karen, I want to thank you for your Welcome. And I had written a witty little, try to be funny little line here but, you know, I just can't get myself to say it. Because the bottom line comes with the amount of admiration I have for you and the friendship that you have always shown me and leadership that you have always shown this Order, has done nothing but help guide Sister Linda and I do better and better.

So, thank you for being such the wonderful person that you are. Thank you.

PROVING OF GRAND CHAPTER

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Grand Conductress, you will attend at the Altar.

OPENING OF THE HOLY BIBLE

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: I now declare this Saturday morning session of the Grand Chapter of California called from refreshment to labor.

(Grand Marshal made the proper proclamation)

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Grand Family, Sisters and Brothers. I hope the parties ended at least by midnight. I know one of them did because we got kicked out by security. I've never said that the 2017s were innocent or quiet.

I would like to report on our Silent Auction that we held yesterday and thank you for the participation. We raised \$4,331 for the Disaster Fund.

And I also received a donation of \$171.41 this morning from the 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016 luncheon. Thank you.

There has also been inquiry of how our Andy's Candies and Doughnuts Delights did during the year. Where is Brother Andy hiding? Through the sale of Andy's Candies, we received \$3,200.

Worthy Grand Patron it is my desire that you preside.

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Brother Gary Gole, we understand that you have a decision for us to consider for inclusion in the Constitution. Please proceed.

DECISIONS OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): Thank you, Worthy Grand Patron.

This year, the Worthy Grand Matron requests your approval to include two of her decisions in our Constitution and Laws to clarify existing rules and to provide guidance in the future years without the need for members to repeat the same question. These decisions will be presented one at a time.

Opinion No. 1. The first decision held that a minor child of a member who is diagnosed with cancer can receive assistance from the J. Clifford Lee Cancer Fund and the Marguerite Rennie Cancer Fund, even after the member has received the maximum allowable assistance from these funds.

So, if a member has received \$15,000 in assistance from both the J. Clifford Lee fund and the Marguerite Rennie Cancer Fund, and his or her minor child has been diagnosed with cancer, assistance can be applied for, for the minor child.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Patron, I move that we adopt this decision of the Worthy Grand Matron.

(Motion seconded and vote taken)

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Worthy Grand Matron's Decision No. 1 is **ADOPTED**.

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): The next decision has three distinct parts and we are going to deal with the decision and deal with each part of the decision.

The first part of the opinion dealt with the question of whether a petition could be received at a special meeting. This part of the decision held that a petition could not be received at a special meeting.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Patron, I move that we adopt this part of the decision of the Worthy Grand Matron.

(Motion seconded and vote taken)

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Part One of Decision No. 2 is ADOPTED.

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): The second part of this decision dealt with the rights and privileges of a member who has not paid dues for the current year. This part of the decision held that six months after failure to pay dues a member may be suspended but, until the member is actually and formally suspended, they are still entitled to exercise all rights and privileges of the Order within their own chapter.

Six months after failure to pay their dues, if they want to visit another chapter, they will need a current dues card.

So, the member fails to pay dues for six months, they may be suspended, but until they are formally suspended, they retain all rights and privileges of the Order in their own chapter. However, after six months they will need a current dues card to attend another chapter.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Patron, I move that we adopt this part of the decision of the Worthy Grand Matron.

(Motion seconded and vote taken)

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Part Two of Decision No. 2 is **ADOPTED**.

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): The third part of the decision dealt with whether a member can resign from the Order while their dues are not current. This part of the decision held that a member whose dues are delinquent cannot resign from the Order but can be suspended after the proper procedure is followed.

MOTION: Worthy Grand Patron, I move that this part of the decision of the Worthy Grand Matron be adopted.

(Motion seconded and vote taken)

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Part Three of Decision No. 2 is **ADOPTED**.

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): Thank you, Worthy Grand Patron.

Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron: Thank you, Gary.

Worthy Grand Matron, it is my desire that you resume your authority.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Sister Sarahann, do we have any further legislation?

Sarahann Shapiro, PM (141): No, we do not Worthy Grand Matron.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you. Sister Janet Robinson, Chairman of our Distribution Committee, may we have your final report?

Janet Robinson, PGM: Worthy Grand Matron, all amendments to the Constitution have been referred to the proper Grand Chapter committees and submitted to the membership. Our job is completed.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Sister Janet. Brother Gary Gole, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, may we have your final report?

Gary Gole, PP (21/651): Thank you Worthy Grand Matron. All legislation that has been referred to the Jurisprudence Committee has been dealt with and completed. Thank you.

Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron: Thank you, Brother Gary. Brother Gary, Sisters Brandon and Vivian, thank you for your work all year long as well as during this Grand Chapter Session.

Sister Delma Davis, would you care to do a special presentation at this time.

Delma Davis, PM (31): Sisters and Brothers, just as we started our year with Roar and Soar in 2017, we finished the year Back in the Plains. Grand Officers, you know your part.

MISS CALIFORNIA JOB'S DAUGHTERS ADDRESS

Thank you Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron.

My name is Sara Colbert and I am Miss California Job's Daughters for 2017-2018. Krista introduced the Grand Bethel girls that are here with us, but I would

also like to introduce our Grand Guardian and Associate Grand Guardian, Mrs. Beverly Grant and Mr. Kendall Mills.

I would like to congratulate all the Grand Chapter officers on a successful year this year, and I extend my best wishes to the incoming Grand Chapter officers.

I would like to take a moment to share with you some history of Job's Daughters. Job's Daughters was founded in 1920 by Mrs. Ethyl T. Wead Mick in Omaha, Nebraska. The Order was created for the purpose of joining together young women who believe in God and develop leadership skills, public speaking skills, character and life-long friendships in young women between the ages of 10 and 20.

Here is a glimpse into my Job's Daughter story. I became a member of Job's Daughters when I was ten years old. But I was a really shy ten-year-old. I was the little girl that would sink down in her seat when the teacher was calling on students. Speaking in front of the class was my biggest fear and I was scared to death of talking with people.

The first office I was appointed to in the Bethel was Fourth Messenger. The duty of the Fourth Messenger is to share the fourth part of the Story of Job to the initiates. This requires a two to three-minute portion of ritual that must be memorized.

I was very upset that I was appointed to the office of Fourth Messenger. The last thing I wanted to do was stand up in front of people and talk while all the eyes in the room were on me.

Although I strongly disliked the station, as a ten-year-old, this experience sparked a passion for ritual work within me.

Following the station, I went on to accept more responsibilities in the Bethel, learning and performing more of the Job's Daughters ritual. I soon went on to learn all five parts of the Story of Job and have competed in the Story of Job ritual competition at our Grand Bethel session and twice at our International session.

Now, look where I stand today. Precisely the last place that my ten-year-old self would have wanted to have been. I didn't realize it during this time, but these ritual competitions were teaching me very important public speaking skills. To me, I was just participating in some competitions with my youth group but, along the way, I was developing confidence, leadership skills, public speaking skills and poise, all while doing something that I enjoyed.

This is exactly what our founder envisioned for our members.

I am so glad that there are organizations like Eastern Star that gave me the opportunity to continue working with my passion for ritual, even after I become a Majority Member of Job's Daughters.

I progressed through the line of elected officers in Bethel No. 278 Granada Hills and became a Past Honored Queen. Along the way, I was given more responsibilities in the Bethel.

I held the office of Honored Queen from June to December in 2014, where I planned our installation ceremony, a calendar of meetings, fundraisers and fun events for the Bethel, along with a balanced budget.

I later became a member of Bethel 89, Ventura and along with their members and leadership figures helped to build the Bethel up.

In 2017 I competed for the title of Miss California Job's Daughter with seven other amazing Bethel sisters. This competition includes a written test on the laws and rules of Job's Daughters, a ritual recitation, an interview, and a final question on stage at our Grand Bethel session. All things my ten-year-old self would have been terrified of.

My point of the story is that Job's Daughters has taught me so much and strengthened my confidence. All these things have helped me in all aspects of my life and have given me the courage to set high goals for myself for the future.

I couldn't even imagine the type of person I would have been if I had never gotten involved with our beautiful organization. I firmly believe that Job's Daughters is teaching the women of the future how to be strong, but not just strong, Jobie strong.

It is not just the strength to obey, but the strength to lead.

It is not just the strength in numbers, but the strength of sisters.

It is not just the strength to lift, but the strength to raise.

And it is not just the strength to get yourself over, but the strength to get over yourself.

There's strong, and then there's Jobie strong.

I'd like to thank the members of the Grand Chapter, for giving me the opportunity to speak on behalf of the Job's Daughters of California, and I would like to invite you to attend our Grand Bethel session in Visalia, California – here, actually – from June 21 to June 24, 2018.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

(by Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron) Report given during the Thursday Morning Session

Official Acts

Each Worthy Grand Matron is privileged to select and serve with ten Appointive Grand Officers. Many of our members are very deserving of this honor. It was my desire to appoint ten members who not only had served our Order, but who are outgoing, enthusiastic and would promote fellowship throughout the State. These ladies and gentlemen shared their humor and love for our Order with every member they encountered. Their service this year has made me very proud.

Ken Miller, Grand Chaplain, Laura Bouwens, Grand Marshal, Linda Fuentes, Grand Organist, Joanne Gibson, Grand Adah, Cindy Murphy, Grand Ruth, Beth Massengill, Grand Esther, Lynn Tripler, Grand Martha, Becky Burson, Grand Electa, Stephanie Perez, Grand Warder and Bob Hovorka, Jr., Grand Sentinal.

Our 2017 Grand Family was made complete with the addition of our Elective Grand Officers. Our Grand Secretary continued learning the duties of her office, all the while answering numerous questions for me. Our Grand Treasurer came back for a second time, fulfilling a request from me to complete the Treasurer's Handbook. I thank them both for their service.

Our Grand Line has been tremendously supportive this year. I thank them for their continued work for the good of the Order and look forward to supporting each of you in the coming years.

In addition to the Grand Officers, we were blessed to have Grand Escorts accompany us all year. These dear friends helped to make our Greatest Adventure one of joy and laughter. We also had our share of sadness with the loss of Brother Bob Murphy, the husband of our Grand Ruth, and the loss of Sister Betty, the grandmother of our Grand Warder.

Deputy Grand Matrons

It was my pleasure to have 40 Past Matrons to serve their respective districts as representatives of me, plus have a Chairman to watch over them. Each Deputy Grand Matron was chosen for their abilities, and it was important that each serve with respect, civility and integrity. Their names and districts will be printed in the Proceedings.

I thank you ladies for performing your duties. You have roared throughout the State. Thank you for accepting your positions.

My thanks to Sister Tamra Keen for serving as Chairman of our Tiger Eyes, and to Sisters Becky Herzog and Connie Snow for serving as Presidents of the two Deputy Grand Matron Associations.

Grand Representatives

I had the privilege of recommending the name of 31 Sisters and Brothers to Worthy Grand Matrons of other Jurisdictions for appointments as Grand Representatives of that jurisdiction in California. It was exciting to share these appointments, and I wish our ambassadors safe adventures. Their names will be printed in the official Proceedings.

I need to mention, that even though in our program we have do have a Grand Representative for Puerto Rico, this is not an official act as we have not been able to receive any kind of official appointment for Puerto Rico, and that was before the recent hurricanes.

Standing and Special Grand Chapter Week Committees

My grateful thanks is extended to the members who accepted the responsibility of their appointments on Standing and Special Grand Chapter Week Committees. The Grand Chapter and I are very indebted to each of you for your faithful service. Each committee and every member serving on a committee will be listed in the official Proceedings.

Official Visits of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron

This year, our Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons were given the option of holding a traditional Official Visit or a social-style Official Visit. Each visit, regardless of style, was unique and enjoyable.

We heard beautiful ritual work at our Traditionals and enjoyed many varieties of social style which were open to nonmembers of the Order. At many of these we had speakers from local food banks. It was enlightening and we were thrilled to hear of the impact California Eastern Star was doing with our Food Bank project this year.

We enjoyed a special day with Mr. Lincoln where the Worthy Grand Patron and I each received a United States flag that had been flown over the capitol.

We signed the historical Sullivan Bible, packed items for shelters, went on safaris with actual zoo animals, visited museums, the Shrine Hospital in Sacramento, and attended a Mushroom Festival where the Worthy Grand Patron and others cooked hamburgers over a grill.

Due to illness, I was unable to attend the Official Visits of 3 and 21. All Official Visits and dates will be listed in the proceedings.

Festival 2017

Our Freedom of Treasures Festival was a one-day event held in June at our Senior Living Community. We had vendors, a car show, live music and food trucks. We were pleased to spend the day with our residents and staff. The staff did an amazing job.

The mood was a bit somber due to the recent and unexpected death of our Executive Director, Sister Kim Cooke. My thanks to Brother Simon Dias and the staff for making this event possible. A full report for the Senior Living Community will be given later today or tomorrow by the President of the Senior Living Board of Trustees and the Current Executive Director.

All official communications and special dispensations will be printed in full in the Proceedings.

Troubled chapters

It was also my unpleasant duty to deal with several chapters who are experiencing very low attendance and misappropriation of funds.

Fidelity Chapter No. 131 was placed on probation due to accusations of missing property and complete lack of harmony within the Chapter. A five-year audit was done by the Grand Secretary which showed lack of following procedures but no misappropriation of funds. The Chapter was removed from probation. However, the 2017 Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron soon resigned.

I was informed on October 13th that at the Chapter elections a Past Matron who was not currently in the line was elected as Worthy Matron. After elections, the Secretary, Conductress and Worthy Patron resigned their positions and left the meeting. There continues to be a lack of cooperation and harmony.

Pentalpha Chapter No. 339. Disharmony among the members of this Chapter continues. Appeals and Grievances will work with this Chapter but, without a change in attitude, this Chapter will not survive.

There are approximately 15 chapters who are struggling to make a quorum. Our Associate Grand Matron and her Membership Committee will be working with these chapters.

Desert Rose No. 327. It was discovered that the Treasurer had not been making timely deposits and the Treasurer was removed from office. An audit by the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer showed monies missing of approximately \$2,460. A letter has been sent to the former Treasurer asking about restitution and this matter is still under investigation.

Reveille Chapter No. 47. There was a misappropriation of funds by the Treasurer of this Chapter. An audit by the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer showed an amount of \$25,300. This matter was turned over to police. Per the Court, the member has until November 1st to make full restitution. If this is met, the member will plead to a misdemeanor and be placed on probation. If full restitution is not made by November 1st, a felony trial will proceed.

There is also lack of active members in this Chapter. The Chapter has no elected Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Conductress or Associate Conductress for 2018.

Victor Valley No. 242. This Chapter has had constant disharmony and tension. On October 13th I placed them on probation for the following reasons:

Lack of elections of officers to continue the operations of the Chapter for the ensuing year.

Improprieties with respect to Chapter records and property.

Disrespect among the members of the Chapter, constant disharmony and tension among the members at stated meetings and outside the Chapter meetings.

As this probation is only valid until the close of this Grand session, it is my recommendation that our Associate Grand Matron continue with a new probation of this Chapter once she has been installed as our new Worthy Grand Matron.

Chapter Concerns

Many of our Chapter members have voiced their concerns about the rising cost of rent being charged. It is difficult for a Chapter to be charged \$1,000 a month in rent. We are often in conflict in obtaining necessary meeting space for receptions or other events when a Masonic lodge can be rented out to public groups for twice the rent a Chapter can pay.

Membership

Our Grand Secretary will be reviewing in detail our gains and losses in her report. However, I would like to give a summary as of September 30, 2017.

As of October 1, 2016, we had a membership of 20,048 members.

We had only gains of 356 members with a loss of 1,731 members, bringing our membership in good standing to 18,673.

Our state membership team, chaired by Brother JD Hammett, General Grand Chapter Committee Member, and his marvelous Membership team, have been taking aggressive steps to turn this tide. They have held several Membership task force meetings and provided results and actions they consider necessary for our growth. These results have been provided to our Grand Line for further consideration and action. I thank the entire Membership team for their hard work.

Grand Chapter budget

One year ago, Brother Bill and I asked you to support our Indy's Fraternal Project. As you will hear in our finance report later today, I am happy to announce that the 2017 budget was met. Your generous donations to our Grand Chapter made a difference. My special thanks to all who supported our Fund and a very special thank you to the members of New Hope Chapter, Gold Ridge Star Chapter, and Los Molinos Chapter.

Conclusion

In spite of our smaller membership, our members continue to enjoy many social activities and support each other. They enjoy being part of the Masonic family. As we go forward, it will be necessary to focus on our youth and also to see that our members remember their Obligation, that they treat each other with respect and kindness, and remember the scripture, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

Our Greatest Adventure is what lies ahead. May it be a good one.



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

Protocol having been established, according to the Constitution and Laws governing the Grand Chapter of California it states in section 56 that I am to make a written report to the Grand Chapter at its annual session reviewing my term and make such recommendations deemed to be for the good of the Order.

Well, here we go.

From the beginning, we were starting from a place no others had started from before. The Worthy Grand Matron Linda and I made a commitment to move forward in a positive manner. With the aid of an amazing Grand Family and the hard work and dedication of the members, we made some very incredible things happen and showed that we can have fun along the way.

Training and Instructionals

We conducted seven All Member Instructionals or AMIs throughout the state. The attendance was high and the enthusiasm was rewarding to all participants.

This was accomplished by combining hands-on one-on-one instruction with the leaders of the – with the Leadership team, and open communication with our officers.

Grand Representatives

As previously mentioned, we had the opportunity to appoint 31 Grand Representatives and they have represented us well throughout the country.

Meetings and Committees

Regularly we have regularly attended Finance and Home Board meetings, along with numerous other meetings that have come up throughout the year. This year we were tasked with obtaining additional sources of revenue to augment the income generated by and for the operation of our Senior Living Community. This alone absorbed cumulative weeks of time of the Associate Grand Patron and myself, along with other Home Board members, defining and refining projects that could and would effect long-term revenue sources.

Official Visits

I personally attended 38 of the 40 Official Visits this past year, missing the last two in the north due to a family emergency. To those two districts, I extend my deepest apology but, as I have always said, family first. The most important thing.

Star Clubs

Regrettably, I have no Star Clubs to report on in Eastern Star year.

Collaboration

We convened several Grand Line meetings, it being the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron's desire to work open and collectively in an open and collective manner, deliberating and determining with the Grand Line, including the Grand Marshal, on issues affecting the future of our Order. It is our belief that open -- opening lines of communication and including those about to lead our organization in the long-term decision-making process would only strengthen the Order even more.

Out-of-State Travel

We had a large contingent attending our Tri-State Hands Across the Border held in Boulder City, Lake Mead, Nevada.

We also attended Out-of-State Grand Chapters, beginning with our friends in Arizona, then a family road trip to Oregon, followed by a few flights and a motor home to Casper, Wyoming. And just a few short weeks ago we were in Reno, Nevada, for their Grand Chapter. Warm welcomes and greetings were extended by all.

Projects

Throughout the year we conducted two projects designated as our special projects. Our Eastern Star Cares Food Bank project was a rousing success, with accolades and thanks coming from food banks up and down our state, and the knowledge that our members in California Eastern Star were responsible for feeding tens of thousands of men, women and children throughout the state. Thus proving, Eastern Star cares.

We also conducted in Indy's Fraternal Treasure project to assist Grand Chapter in offsetting some of its deficits assumed in the beginning of the year. As of this writing, we collected in excess of \$47,000. That's you guys. And as a little side note this just came in night before last. District 10 ran a Penny War, collected and promoted fellowship amongst its district and collected -- just amongst that district - in pennies, \$1,300 towards the project. Very proud of them.

Youth Orders

I represented California Eastern Star at all four of our youth groups Annual sessions: Grand Assembly, Grand Bethel, and both DeMolay Conclaves, North and South. Attending along with other Grand Line Officers, the Grand Lodge, and the Mayo program to assist our youth orders, adult youth orders leaders in their programs and projects.

Grand Chapter Office

In February, I was given the duty to relocate our Grand Chapter office back to the complex adjacent to our Senior Living Community. Having -- having tried the offices within the Senior Living Community and realizing that it just wasn't working, we began the assignment of moving in to the office -- an office that had been vacant for just -- for a couple of years in the Eastern Star Professional Plaza.

Unfortunately, as previously noted, our Executive Director Kim Cooke unexpectedly passed and things were placed on hold. Then, when we were about to take possession of the unit, it suddenly became unavailable.

Eventually working with the Home Board, we were able to secure another unit in the Professional Plaza. Once it was vacated and made ready, we began the tedious process of moving. Hopefully, that will be completed in the next few weeks.

Conclusion and Recommendations

Having not sought this office and agreeing to work together for the good of the Order, I found it frustrating that someone would have to fight so hard to volunteer, and even more astonishing is who you have to battle with.



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

In 2016 the Adventure began. We roared our way up and down the State of California, looking for treasures, and along the way we started filling our treasure chest with shining gems at each place we visited. I would like to thank each Chapter and every member for the great memories you have given us to fill our treasure chest with.

As you are aware, the Grand Chapter office has been very busy this year. I would like to recognize some wonderful members who have taken time to assist in the many mass mailings and filling of our supply orders.

Thank you to Delma Davis, Susan and Curt Massey, and extra special thank you to our Grand Treasurer, Sandra Geanoulis for the countless times of making the drive to the Grand Chapter office to help in many different ways.

This year we had four mass mailings that went out to 149 chapters. In addition to the four mass mailings, we completed 1,321 mailings to fulfill the request of supplies and certificates.

All publications, with the exception of our 2015 and 2016 Proceeding books, have been completed. It is with great hope that these two proceedings will be completed very soon.

During this year, I enjoyed meeting with Chapter Secretaries at seven AMIs, giving each in attendance packets with valuable information that will help ease their difficult duties.

With a great pleasure and a lot of hard work the Grand Treasurer and I were able to complete the updated version of the Secretary/Treasurer Handbook which is now on our website.

I would like to share some statistical information with you.

We issued 133 25-year pins and certificates; 191 50-year certificates and pins and 17 75-year certificates and pins; 132 Life Sponsor certificates; 53 Service Awards and 18 Rob Morris Awards.

Our membership, as accumulated from our annual report of 149 chapters of this Grand Jurisdiction, is as follows:

Out of this figure 3,649 are 50-year Life Members, 151 are residents of charitable homes, 178 members with medical exemption, and 406 have their dues remitted. This brings the Total Dues-Paying Members to 14,460.

Life Sponsors of the Eastern Star Home totals 10,884. There are 1,078 members who belong to two chapters in California. All chapters have paid their per capita assessments.

This fiscal year we have had two consolidations and anticipate two more chapters to complete their consolidations, bringing the Total Chapters in California to 145.

The small itinerary and pocket calendars will be available for purchase at five dollars each, and a preorder form for the state roster will be available in the Grand Chapter office.

We have included in each packet a flier for our roster advertising. What a great way to honor that someone special in your chapter and/or district.

The synopses of this session will be available within the next few weeks and will be posted on the website.

Sister Linda and Brother Bill, this has been a wonderful year. You have chosen a wonderful family in which I have been honored to be a part. I thank you for your friendship, love and support that you have given me this year. I wish you both happiness and fond memories of the 2017 year.

To our 2017 Grand Family, you have made me smile so many times, and of course a few tears were shed this year, but you have filled my heart with pride and forever we will be family.

I have the privilege to serve as the secretary to our Eastern Star Home Board of Trustees and Finance Committee. Thank you, Jim Whiteley and members of the Home Board of Trustees, and to Debbie Sanborn, who has kept me smiling all year long. And to the members of the Finance Committee, I have enjoyed working with each and every one of you.



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron.

The duties of the Grand Treasurer as stated in our ritual and our Constitution and Laws is to attend carefully to the financial interests of the Order, to serve as a member on the Finance Committee, and to act as a Treasurer of the Eastern Star Home Board Trustees. To that end, I endeavored to fulfill the responsibilities to which I was elected and hope that you, the delegates, are satisfied with my performance.

Immediately following election to the office, the Grand Secretary and I worked to develop useful and practical instruction material for the Secretaries and Treasurers who attended the All Member Instructionals. The feedback we received was favorable. For those Treasurers not able to attend the AMI, I mailed or otherwise delivered the material to them.

The Grand Secretary and I coordinated and communicated the new EDD requirements for filing employment taxes online, and how the Secretary and Treasurer can accommodate this.

During my interactions with Treasurers at the several Official Visits and other events, I took the opportunity to discuss with them activities and practices within their respective chapters.

I encouraged utilizing electronic programs and computer technology where appropriate.

I responded to email and phone communications with Treasurers on concerns or questions they had and was able to consult with them on best practices.

I am happy to report that the project started in 2015, the edited and revised Secretary/Treasurer Handbook was completed early this term and is now available on our website under Publications.

I encourage not only the Secretaries and Treasurers to study this document, but all elected Line Officers. You never know what secrets you may find there.

It was my pleasure to spend time in the Grand Chapter office on several occasions where I assisted in filling supply orders and helped prepare the annual financial report forms and instructions for the subordinate chapters. It was a pleasure to work with Tammy.

As a member of the Finance Committee, I attended all but one meeting. On my recommendation the Finance Committee approved and allowed transfers of funds to the perpetual fund to help subsidize the budget. I suggest that this action be considered next year as well.

I'd like to commend the Finance Committee for its utilization of Zoom Meeting technology which avoids travel and enables members to attend remotely. I felt a little like a newscaster where I only had to be properly groomed from the waist up.

I attended all but two Home Board meetings and was able to contribute from a Treasurer point of view where appropriate.

Due to our current fiscal picture, our Board has a daunting task ahead of them in protecting the ability to provide continuing care for our members.

During the course of the year it was necessary for me to participate in the audits of four chapters. Two were centered around compliance concerns and the other two dealt with the removal of the Chapter Treasurer for cause.

Additionally, I discovered through casual observation several chapters whose Treasurers were not completely or properly performing their duties. I attempted to counsel and instruct them in correct practices but am now concerned about how many others are out there not fully understanding their duties.

Although this office is more of a working position, I certainly did enjoy many pleasant times as the Grand Family traveled the state and beyond. One of these wonderful times was our visit to Wyoming Grand Chapter where the Grand contingent of California members showed up to support the incoming Worthy Grand Matron, Stephanie Cox, a former Deputy Grand Matron of California. Our own Janet Robinson, Past Grand Matron, was her Installing Officer. But the best part for the Grand Secretary and I was the special acknowledgment given the chapter Secretaries and Treasurers. We were so impressed by the recognition given them that we were determined to do something similar here.

Thank you, Sister Linda and Brother Bill, for allowing us to acknowledge and cheer our hard-working officers.

Thank you also, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, for the belief you had in me when you asked me to run once again for this office. I thought long and hard about it, but in the end, I can see the advantage of a Grand Treasurer serving more than one year. I therefore make the following recommendation to the Elected Line Officers, that they consider inviting the Grand Treasurer to run in subsequent years rather than looking to fill the position with a new member each year.

I further submit the recommendation that there be a formalized job description for the Grand Treasurer. I first stepped into this job in 2015 not completely sure of my duties. Those filling this office have all brought their thinking to the job, but a formalized statement of expectations and job duties would benefit all and ensure that we are fully utilizing a valuable manpower resource, little sister.

And finally, as agreed between the Grand Secretary and me, there should be some system of random chapter audits performed by Grand Chapter. The intention is not to hunt down infractions, but to discover where chapters are unaware or have become complacent in their records and practices. In doing so, we will be able to

get ahead of issues that, if left unchecked, could become serious troubles for the Chapter.

Finally, I wish to publicly thank my husband George for being such a good sport as we packed our bags for yet another weekend, for being patient while Tammy and I solved world hunger, and for maintaining his humor at 11:00 p.m. at night.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER

(By Deborah Baker, Controller) Report given during the Thursday Morning Session

What inspires each of us? What is your motivation? Each of us is driven by our own moral compass, which can be very different, but as Brothers and Sisters in a fraternal organization we share many common goals and ideals. Therefore, it is more likely that we are inspired and motivated by similar things. I believe that more than just a few people in this room are inspired by the good works that can be accomplished either individually or as being part of a team.

The Grand Chapter of California exists for the beneficent purposes of our members and our communities. I hope you are aware of what your membership in this Order does for you, your fellow members, our communities and other benevolent projects we participate in locally, across the United States, and beyond. Do you ever stop to think about it? I do.

The position of the Controller is an interesting one. Of course, it includes the regular day-to-day financial operations of paying the bills, making sure there's enough money in the bank to cover those checks, and providing timely monthly reports and analyses.

Then there are the annual duties of working with the auditors as they review our financial activities to prove that our records are sound. We are staying true to internal controls and our own Constitution and Laws, and we are not misrepresenting our financial position.

Plus, we make sure that all the proper reporting is completed with the IRS and the State Franchise Tax Board to keep our nonprofit status intact.

But beyond these necessary tasks, lies my inspiration to accomplishing my job with this organization.

When we process the distribution of funds on behalf of our Foundation and their many charities, those tasks fill me with a sense of purpose and fulfillment. It is a feeling that you just can't get from any other jobs.

It might be for a sad situation where any of the JC Lee or Marguerite Rene Cancer funds, the Disaster or Benevolent funds are requested for need. It can also be a Scholarship award in those very happy cases where we are supporting students as they continue in their studies.

There is also the wonderful feeling that happens when we process distributions for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron's special projects to another organization.

But even when the special project is collecting for one of our own needs, there is still a sense of accomplishment and pride in watching our members giving so much.

Then there is our Senior Living Community, which is a daily source of my inspiration and happiness and a constant reminder of the good that we do as an Order. The residents and I share smiles and exchange pleasantries when we pass in the hallways. I occasionally step in and place a few pieces in the jigsaw puzzle, and I try to also the attend the weekly card game gatherings after work. The residents are so kind to share their home with us.

Now that I have an understanding of what inspires me, here are some highlights of the fiscal year which just ended on September 30, 2017. Please keep in mind that the figures quoted are still preliminary results.

The Foundation is managing over \$9.1 million, which is up over last fiscal year by more than half-a-million dollars.

The \$881,000 of income this year came from donations and how well our investments performed.

The \$449,000 of expenses were over budget, but we are making some significant distributions this week.

We continue to be in a good financial position to assist in the areas of our specific Foundation charities when the need arises.

Together, the SLC and ESPP kept their total expenses under budget for the year at about \$3.9 million. This is about \$200,000 less than was spent in the 2015-16 years. The combined income stayed about the same as the previous year at about \$1.2 million.

I'm certain you will learn more about the future plans for the Home from other reports delivered during this session.

The Endowment Fund which exists to support the Home increased total assets by almost \$4 million, despite the fact that they transferred two-and-a-half million dollars of support to the SLC during the year.

The more than six-and-a-half million dollars of income was due to some significantly large bequests received this year, plus investment performance, resident contributions and Life sponsorships and Star Plus donations.

The \$62,000 expenses, which were lower than the previous year, are primarily management fees for investment, audit and tax services, plus the administration fees to the Grand Chapter office.

Grand Chapter recorded income of \$787,000 which was higher than budgeted. This is primarily due to a couple of windfalls, of which the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron special project is one example.

The bottom line, expenses of \$654,000 were higher than expected, but that was mostly to keep up with the demand of the membership supply order activity.

As we have turned the corner into our next fiscal year, we shall face new challenges and opportunity for achievements.

Our office has already transitioned to new accounting software which will cost less and should bring improvements to our productivity and ease of completing tasks. This major accomplishment is another great motivation for me.

I hope that you will join me in staying inspired for our Order.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

(By Debbie Sanborn, PM (555) Chairman) Report given during the Thursday Afternoon Session

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron. I have the pleasure of introducing those who served on the Finance Committee in 2017. Brothers Larry Coffin, Past Grand Patron, who will be chairman of the Finance Committee for 2018. Sister Denny Rae Grist, Past Grand Matron, R. Stephen Doan, Rob Scott, Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron, Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron, and Sandra Geanoulis, Grand Treasurer. The other Grand Line officers served as ex-officio members without a vote.

I was appointed to the Finance Committee in 2013 by Sarahann Shapiro, Past Grand Matron. Thank you to Sarahann for the opportunity to serve on this committee.

As reported at last year's Grand Chapter Session by then chairman, Donna Tucker, the prior year was marked by many changes. Shortly after the Grand Chapter Session in 2015, reductions were made to the Grand Chapter expenses. These cuts were continued with the 2017 year, but there was still a shortfall between the anticipated income and expenses for the year.

At Grand Chapter last year our members were asked to pass a special assessment to bridge this gap and they did. Due in large part to this special assessment and the Worthy Grand Matron/Worthy Grand Patron special project, the 2017 budget was met.

In 2016 a new investment advisor, Harris Financial Advisors, was hired, and since then we have seen improved performance of our investments.

For the audit for our September 30, 2015 financial statement the accounting firm of Mueller Probst was engaged for a second year.

In November of 2016, a joint meeting was held with the members of the Audit Committee, Finance Committee and the auditors, as a review of the prior year audit process as a preliminary meeting for the coming year. This year marked an improved understanding by the auditors of our organization. Changes were made to the data collection process which helped to facilitate the completion of the audit and preparation of the income tax return. The same firm has been engaged again for a third year, and preparations for the coming audits are already underway.

A review of the Grand Chapter accounting document management software indicated that a change in software could generate substantial savings in the coming year. The Grand Chapter employees researched document software appropriate for our organization.

After review, the Finance Committee approved replacing the existing software. This is a big project and it has taken several months to implement. I'm happy to report that, effective beginning of this current fiscal year, we have completely transitioned to the new system.

This year, half of the Finance Committee meetings were held in person and the other half via video conferencing.

Some of the actions of the committee this year were:

- Approve the 2017-2018 budget of the three entities and the 2018 Grand Chapter Session Week budget.
- Approve the availability of funds for scholarship awards as reflected by the Scholarship Committee.
- And, as mentioned earlier, approved the new accounting and document management software.

The Committee also met with the Home Board, Annual Session Site and Audit Committees.

Thank you, Sister Linda and Brother Bill for letting me share in your Great Adventure.

To Sister Alyson and Fred, I wish you well in the coming year.

Thank you to the Grand Chapter office staff for all their help.

And to the members of the Finance Committee, I greatly appreciate all the time and dedication to this Order that each of you give. It has been a pleasure to work with you.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To The Finance Committee Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star and Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star

We have audited the accompanying 2017 and 2016 combined financial statements of *Grand Chapter of California*, *Order of the Eastern Star and Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California*, *Order of the Eastern Star which* comprise the combined statements of financial position as of September 30, 2017 and 2016, and the related combined statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Combined Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these combined financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of combined financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

NOTE 1 NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star ("GC" or the "Grand Chapter") is a California not-for-profit unincorporated association which promotes and practices charity and fraternalism. Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star (the "Endowment Fund") is a separate 501(c)(3) fund of the Grand Chapter used to support Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Homes") a related not-for-profit organization founded by the Grand Chapter.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Principles of Combination

The accompanying combined financial statements include the accounts of Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star and the Endowment Fund (collectively, the "Grand Chapter"), which are under common control. All significant inter-company balances and transactions have been eliminated in combination.

The combined financial statements do not include the financial position or results of activities of the Eastern Star Homes of California or local chapters throughout the State of California, or the California Eastern Star Foundation, a related not-for-profit organization. Management has evaluated the structure and relationships of these related organizations in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) 958-810 and determined that consolidation would not be required or appropriate as the Grand Chapter does not have an economic interest in these related organizations.

Basis of Accounting

The combined financial statements of the Grand Chapter have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America

Financial Statement Presentation

The Grand Chapter is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

 ${\it Unrestricted} - {\rm Net} \ assets \ that \ are \ not \ subject \ to \ explicit \ donor-imposed \ stipulations. \ Unrestricted \ net \ assets \ may \ be \ designated \ for \ specific \ purposes \ by \ action \ of \ the \ Finance \ Committee.$

Temporarily restricted — Net assets whose use by the Grand Chapter is subject to either explicit dono-imposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Grand Chapter or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Grand Chapter and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Grand Chapter to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Grand Chapter maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

The Grand Chapter's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Grand Chapter's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Investments

Investments, other than certificates of deposit, are reported at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Certificates of deposit held for investment are classified as investments and are reported at amortized cost. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is carried at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and amortization.

Cost of normal maintenance and repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense when incurred. Major replacements or betterments of properties are capitalized.

Depreciation and Amortization

Depreciation of property and equipment is provided using the straight-line method over the assets' estimated useful lives of three to five years. Leasehold improvements are amortized using the straight-line method over the lesser of the estimated useful lives of the assets or lease term.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

When facts and circumstances indicate that the carrying values of long-lived assets may be impaired, the Grand Chapter performs an evaluation of recoverability by comparing the carrying values of the assets to projected future cash flows in addition to other quantitative and qualitative analyses. No impairment charges were recorded for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Bequests are recorded based on the liquidated value upon legal determination of the Grand Chapter's rights to the assets.

For financial reporting purposes, the Grand Chapter distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated must be stipulated must be supported as the proported as the stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are recorded as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Grand Chapter reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Revenue Recognition

Residents' Assets

Revenue from residents' assets represents contributions to the Endowment Fund by residents upon admission into the Homes. The recognition of this revenue is considered to be a contribution, as the value of assets contributed on the date of admission is not sufficient to cover the costs of services rendered by the Home over the life of the residents. The services to be rendered are consistent with the Homes' mission of providing housing to members of the Order of the Eastern Star and the purpose of the Grand Chapter's endowment fund is to support the Home. Upon completion of a 90 day cooling off period, residents' assets are recognized as temporarily restricted contributions on the 91st day after a resident has been admitted to the Home under a Life Care Contract. Revenue is recorded based on the estimated liquidated value of the contributed assets.

Other Revenu

All non-contribution revenue are recognized when earned.

Donated Goods, Facilities and Services

Donated non-cash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals processing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Grand Chapter receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Grand Chapter. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition was not satisfied.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the combined statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Income Taxes

Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") and Section 23701(b) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California. The Grand Chapter obtained a group filing exemption covering the local chapters throughout the State of California during the 1940's, and has included those chapters' funds in its annual exempt organization returns.

The Endowment Fund is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

Income Taxes (Continued)

The Grand Chapter and the Endowment Fund have no unrecognized tax benefits recorded or unrecorded at September 30, 2017 and 2016. The Grand Chapter's and Endowment Fund's federal information tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service generally for a period of three years from the filling of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filling of a return.

If applicable, the Grand Chapter and the Endowment Fund recognize interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense, and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in the statements of financial position.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities in the combined financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 3 STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Company considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

There was no cash paid during the year for interest.

NOTE 6 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Grand Chapter values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs is used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical asset or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.

Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Furthermore, although the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Operating Leases

The Grand Chapter leases office spaces from the Home (Note 10). For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Grand Chapter incurred \$18,405 and \$23,201, respectively, of rent expense on the leases.

Other Transactions

The Grand Chapter acts as an agent and collects certain dues from members of the Grand Chapter which are remitted to the Home and California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation").

The Grand Chapter had an existing business relationship with an insurance company owned by an officer of the Organization. For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016 the Grand Chapter paid \$97,785 and \$1,780, respectively, to the insurance company. For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, there were no amounts due to the insurance company.

NOTE 9 ENDOWMENT FUND

The Grand Chapter's endowment includes donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Grand Chapter has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Grand Chapter classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Grand Chapter in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Grand Chapter considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (a) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the Grand Chapter and donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Grand Chapter and (7) the Grand Chapter is investment policies.

NOTE 9 ENDOWMENT FUND (CONTINUED)

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Grand Chapter's Finance Committee has the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 4.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Grand Chapter has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Grand Chapter considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donorrestrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.

Contingencies

Certain claims have been filed against the Grand Chapter in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, these matters will not have a material effect on the Grand Chapter's financial position or results of operations.

NOTE 11 EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLAN

The Grand Chapter maintains a Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees Individual Retirement Account ("SIMPLE IRA") plan covering substantially all employees. The Grand Chapter contributes 2% of employees's salaries, up to allowable limits, and for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016; contributions totaled \$915 and \$2,055, respectively. The plan will be terminated in December 2017. See subsequent event disclosure on plan termination.

NOTE 12 CALIFORNIA CHAPTERS

At September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Grand Chapter had 147 and 152 active California chapters, respectively, which are responsible for their own fundraising, revenue and expenses. Each individual California chapter's financial statements are not consolidated into the Grand Chapter's financial statements. As of September 30, 2017 and 2016, the unaudited cash and investments, revenue and expenses of these chapters consisted of the following:

Certain reclassifications have been made to the prior year financial statements to conform with the current year presentation. Total assets, total liabilities, and changes in net assets were not affected.

NOTE 14 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

During December, 2017, the Organization discovered it had been named as a beneficiary of a portion of the income of three separate perpetual trusts. The aggregate fair market value of the Organization's portion of the beneficial interests in these trusts totaled \$1,064,160 at September 30, 2017, which will be recorded as a permanently restricted asset during the subsequent year end.

As of December 31, 2017, management of Grand Chapter made the decision to terminate its savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees Individual Retirement Account plan.

Subsequent events have been evaluated by the Grand Chapter through the date of the auditors' report, which is the date the combined financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 1 DESCRIPTION OF OPERATIONS

Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home") is a California not-for-profit corporation organized in 1930 for the purpose of operating a home, under the name of "Senior Living Community," for the care of aged members of the Order of the Eastern Star. The Home also operates a medical office rental facility under the name "Eastern Star Professional Plaza."

The Home is the income beneficiary of the Endowment Fund ("the Endowment Fund") of the Grand Chapter of California Order of the Eastern Star (the "Grand Chapter"). Net investment income is transferred to the Home to the extent that funds are needed for operations. Additional funds as necessary for the maintenance and operation of the Home are transferred from the temporarily restricted portion of the Endowment Fund.

Residents are affiliated members of the Grand Chapter, in good standing for at least five years, who are at least sixty-five years of age, as described in the Constitution and Laws. Upon admission to the Home, residents contribute their assets to the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star. Fee for service arrangements are also available for members and nonaffiliated applicants.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Home have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Home is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets which are described as follows:

 ${\it Unrestricted} - {\rm Net} \ assets \ that \ are \ not \ subject \ to \ explicit \ donor-imposed \ stipulations. \ Unrestricted \ net \ assets \ may \ be \ designated \ for \ specific \ purposes \ by \ action \ of \ the \ Board \ of \ Directors.$

Temporarily restricted – Net assets whose use by the Home is subject to either explicit donor-imposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Home or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Home and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

At September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Home does not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the combined statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Home to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Home maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

Property and Equipment

Acquisitions of property and equipment are recorded at cost. Donated property is recorded at its estimated fair value at the date of receipt. Currently, there are no donor or legal restrictions on the proceeds from the disposition of donated property. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense when incurred. Major replacements or betterments of properties are capitalized. When assets are sold or retired, their cost and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is reported in the statements of activities. Depreciation of property and equipment is providing using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, generally from two to thirty years.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

When facts and circumstances indicate that the carrying values of long-lived assets may be impaired, the Home performs an evaluation of recoverability by comparing the carrying values of the assets to projected future cash flows in addition to other quantitative and qualitative analyses. No impairment charges were recorded for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016.

Estimated Obligation to Provide Future Services

The Home expects to provide services and the use of facilities to residents over their remaining lives. The Home annually calculates the present value of the net cost of future services and the use of facilities to be provided to current residents as described in Note 1.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Revenue Recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value. Contributions from residents after admission consist primarily of social security and retirement payments.

For financial reporting purposes, the Home distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets. Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assests are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are recorded as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Home reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service. Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

Donated Goods, Facilities and Services

Donated non-cash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals processing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Home receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Home. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition was not satisfied.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Income Taxes

The Home is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC.

The Home has no unrecognized tax benefits at September 30, 2017 and 2016. The Home's federal income tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for a period of three years from the filing of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filing of a return.

If applicable, the Home recognizes interest and penalties associated with tax matters as part of income tax expense, and includes accrued interest and penalties with accrued expenses in statements of financial position.

Endowment Fund

Support from the Endowment Fund for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, was \$2,540,000 and \$2,725,000, respectively. At September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Endowment Fund has temporarily restricted net assets of \$17,238,871 and \$13,316,109, respectively, and permanently restricted net assets of \$12,683,364 and \$12,613,817, respectively.

The Home's property also includes office facilities that are leased to the Grand Chapter and various other medical offices (Note 8).

NOTE 4 OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE FUTURE SERVICES

Certain applicants for admission to the Home are required to make a contribution of their personal assets to the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter. In exchange for this contribution, the Home agrees to care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. This does not apply to residents under a fee for service arrangement. The Home has recorded a liability for its obligation to provide care for the residents for the remainder of their lives. The obligation is calculated by estimating the cost of providing care and the use of the facilities over the remaining lives of the residents less estimated cash revenue before any realized gains from the Endowment Fund or proceeds on future property sales. The excess of projected expenses over revenue has been estimated to increase at 2.01% and 1.68% annually (representing inflation) as of September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively, and is based on actual historical expenses and revenue related to the resident care facility. The resulting liability has been discounted by 5% to reflect net present value. This liability reflected in the accompanying statements of financial position amounted to \$15,178,611 and \$14,331,747 at September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively. The change in obligation from year to year is shown on the statements of activities. Management estimates that the cost to provide future care for existing residents at a replacement facility providing a similar continuum of care in the local area to range from \$11,350,576 to \$13,80,800 at September 30, 2017 based on actual reported expenses at such replacement facilities over estimated revenues increasing at 2.01% annually for inflation and discounted by 5% to reflect net present value.

The Home is licensed to operate a seventy-six bed continuing care home, and at each of the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Home had 37 residents. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter (Note 2).

NOTE 5 CASH RESERVES

The Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws require that the operating cash balance of the Home is to be limited to \$250,000 plus appropriations. Excess amounts are to be transferred to the unrestricted Endowment Fund for the future use of the Home, to be maintained by the Grand Chapter. Any shortfall in future operating cash flow is obligated to be met by the Endowment Fund. At September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Home had operating cash balances of \$75,723 and \$67,046, respectively.

NOTE 6 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Home incurred \$79,620 and \$87,466 in administrative expense charges during the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively, for services provided by the Grand Chapter. The Home also leases office space to the Grand Chapter (Note 8). For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Home earned \$18,450 and \$15,000, respectively, of rental income from the Grand Chapter. At September 30, 2017 and 2016, \$61,450 and \$37,731 was due from the Grand Chapter, respectively.

For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, California Eastern Star Foundation reimbursed the Home \$12,025 and \$65,548 under an employee-sharing agreement. At September 30, 2016, \$6,169 is due from the Foundation.

NOTE 6 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (CONTINUED)

The Home had an existing business relationship with an insurance company owned by an officer of the Organization. For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016 the Home paid \$21,315 and \$21,254, respectively, to the insurance company. For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, there were no amounts due to the insurance company.

NOTE 7 CONTINUING CARE RESERVE REQUIREMENT

The State of California Health and Safety Code requires continuing care retirement communities to report on the adequacy of certain reserve requirements. The Home's required statutory reserve at September 30, 2017 and 2016 was \$701,217 and \$765,129, respectively. The Home reported a surplus of qualifying assets over the required reserve amount of \$16,713,794 and \$12,760,230 at September 30, 2017 and 2016 respectively, which includes temporarily restricted net assets held in the Endowment Fund of the Grand Chapter for the benefit of the Home.

NOTE 8 OPERATING LEASES - RENTAL INCOME

The Home leases office space under an operating lease to the Grand Chapter expiring in September 2022. In addition, the Home leases various medical offices to non-related parties under operating leases expiring through July 2025. At September 30, 2017, property and equipment held for leasing consists of the following:

NOTE 9 COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Health Care

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations by federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for resident services, and Medicare fraud and abuse. Recently, government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by health care providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

Litigation

The Organization may be subject to asserted and unasserted claims encountered in the normal course of business. The Organization's management and legal counsel assess such contingent liabilities and such assessment inherently involves an exercise of judgment. In assessing loss contingencies related to legal proceedings that are pending against the Organization or unasserted claims that may result in such proceedings, the Organization's legal counsel evaluates the perceived merits of any legal proceedings or unasserted claims as well as the perceived merits of the amount of relief sought or expected to be sought therein. In the opinion of management, disposition of these matters will not have a material effect on the Organization's financial condition or results of operation.

Professional Liability Coverage

The Organization is insured for professional liability under an occurrence policy for a combined occurrence and maximum annual aggregate of \$3,000,000.

Risk Management

The Organization has obtained workers' compensation insurance through a private insurer. Worker's Compensation expense through coverage by this entity was \$155,028 and \$178,069 for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively.

Affordable Care Act

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and the Health Care and Education Tax Credits Reconciliation Act of 2010 is currently in force. Together, these two acts affect the health care system and impact payments received by health care providers. Under the new Administration, action has been taken to start repealing the Affordable Care Act. The overall impact of these actions to the Organization is not presently determinable.

NOTE 10 RECLASSIFICATIONS

Certain reclassifications have been made to the financial statements and related disclosures as of and for the year ended September 30, 2016 to conform to the year ended September 30, 2017 presentation.

NOTE 11 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been evaluated by the Home through the date of the auditors' report which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

CALIFORNIA EASTERN STAR FOUNDATION NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 DESCRIPTION OF OPERATIONS

California Eastern Star Foundation (the "Foundation") is a California not-for-profit corporation organized to receive gifts, bequests and contributions for the furtherance of educational, charitable and scientific purposes. The Foundation was organized in 1996 at the direction of the members of the Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Easter Star (the "Grand Chapter"), and operated in accordance with Grand Chapter of California, Order of the Eastern Star and operated in accordance with the Grand Chapter constitution and laws.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets, which are described as follows:

Unrestricted – Net assets that are not subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Temporarily restricted – Net assets whose use by the Foundation is subject to either explicit donorimposed stipulations, or by operation of law that can be fulfilled by actions of the Foundation or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted - Net assets subject to explicit donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation and stipulate the use of income and/or appreciation as temporarily restricted based on donor-imposed stipulations or by operation of law.

Concentrations

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk, consist primarily of cash deposits and money market funds at financial institutions. The Foundation maintains its cash and cash equivalents with high-credit quality financial institutions. At times, such amounts may exceed federally insured limits.

The Foundation's investments are subject to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risks. Further, because of the significance of the investments to the Foundation's financial position and the level of risk inherent in most investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of these investments could occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements. Management is of the opinion that the diversification of its invested assets among the various asset classes should mitigate the impact of changes.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity at date of purchase of three months or less.

Investments

Investments, other than certificates of deposit, are reported at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Changes in fair value that occur during a fiscal year are recognized as investment income reported for that fiscal year. Certificates of deposit held for investment are classified as investments and are reported at amortized cost. Investment income includes interest and dividend earnings, changes in fair value and any gains or losses realized upon liquidation, maturity or sale of investments, net of any investment fees.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as revenue in the period received at their fair value.

For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets and permanently restricted assets Contributions for which donors have imposed restrictions limiting the use of the donated assets are reported as restricted support. When such donor-imposed restrictions are met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions of assets which donors have stipulated must be maintained permanently, with only the income earned thereon available for current use, are classified as permanently restricted net assets. Contributions for which donors have not stipulated restrictions are reported as unrestricted support.

Unconditional promises to give, with payments due in future periods, are reported as restricted support. Gifts of land, buildings and equipment are recorded as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulation, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Promises to give, which depend on the occurrence of a specified future and uncertain event to bind the promisor, are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met, that is, when the conditional promise becomes unconditional.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Donated Goods, Facilities and Services

Donated non-cash assets, such as use of facilities and goods, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets, or that require specialized skills (which include accounting and legal services), are provided by individuals processing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased, if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received. The Foundation receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist with the different functions of the Foundation. No donated services have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition was not satisfied.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the combined statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Income Taxes

The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") and Section 23701(d) of the Revenue Taxation Code of California and is a publicly supported organization as described in Section 509(a) of the IRC. As such, there were no income taxes for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016.

The Foundation has not recognized any uncertain tax positions at September 30, 2017 and 2016. The Foundation's federal income tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for a period of three years from the filing of a federal return. California income tax returns are subject to examination by the Franchise Tax Board for a period of four years from the filing of a return.

Grant Expenditures

Grant expenditures are recognized in the period the grant is made, provided the grant is not subject to significant future conditions. Conditional grants are recognized as grant expense and as a grant payable in the period which the grantee meets the terms of the conditions. Grants payable that are expected to be paid in the future years are recorded at present value of expected future payments.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Statement of Cash Flows

The Foundation's Board of Directors and the Grand Chapter's Finance Committee have the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of assets based on the following guidelines established by the Grand Chapter's Constitution and Laws.

- At least fifteen percent (15%) of the funds available must be in:
 Cash and/or bank accounts.
 Dbligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith

 - Obligations of the United States or those for the payment of which the faith of the United States is pledged.

 Obligations of the State of California and its political subdivisions. Such evidence of corporate indebtedness as is rated "A" or better by Standard and Poor's Corporation or Moody's Investors Service. Qualified investment funds limited to short-term United States Government Securities, bank certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances commercial paper, repurchase agreements and comparable securities. Savings accounts in investment certificates issued by Federal Chartered Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.
- Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

 Up to ten percent (10%) may be invested in:

 Other evidence of indebtedness, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.

 Preferred stocks, which are or will be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.

NOTE 3 INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

- Up to seventy-five percent (75%) may be invested in:
 - Common stocks, which must be fully listed and registered on an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as a National Securities Exchange.
 - Shares of investment trusts.
 - Mutual funds.

NOTE 4 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Foundation values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs is used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below.

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level I inputs.

Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level I prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in inactive markets or model-derived valuations in which all significant inputs are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated with observable market data.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Valuations of mutual funds and exchange traded funds are obtained from real-time quotes for transactions in active exchange markets involving identical assets. For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, there have been no changes in the valuation methodologies.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 5 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Foundation incurred expenses for administrative services of \$26,034 and \$28,660 from the Grand Chapter for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively. At September 30, 2017, no amount is due to the Grand Chapter. At September 30, 2016, \$6.702 amount is due from the Grand Chapter.

For the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Foundation reimbursed Eastern Star Homes of California (the "Home") \$18,706 and \$65,548, respectively, under an employee-sharing agreement. At September 30, 2017 and 2016, \$0 and \$6,783, was due to the Home, respectively.

NOTE 7 ENDOWMENTS

The Foundation's Endowments include donor-restricted funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Foundation has interpreted the State of California Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets: (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Grand Chapter considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (a) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the Grand Chapter and donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Grand Chapter and (7) the Foundation's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters and Strategies. The Foundation's Board of Directors and the Grand Chapter's Finance Committee have the sole discretion as to the investment and reinvestment of the assets of the fund based on the guidelines described in Note 3.

The primary investment objective of these accounts is capital preservation. Actual returns in any given year may vary. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Foundation has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year up to 7% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior three years through the fiscal year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Foundation considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.



LEGISLATION

(Throughout the Sessions the various Committees presented the following legislation to the delegates.)

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1 (CARRYOVER)

WHEREAS, the administrative governance of our Grand Chapter requires continuity and cohesion to allow the Grand Chapter to be successful in the business of the Order; and

WHEREAS, the Grand Line Officers are often involved in the administrative decisions, but no consultation is currently required by our Constitution; and

WHEREAS, decisions are made affecting the business of the Grand Chapter that require more than one year for full implementation; and

WHEREAS, those making decisions for the good of the Order should have the legal and insurance protections afforded those who are officially involved in the decision-making process; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that an additional Standing Committee be added to this Grand Chapter, called the Executive Committee. The membership of the Executive Committee shall consist of the following ten members: The six elected Grand Line Officers, the Grand Marshal, and three members selected from the general membership (the "General Members"), who meet the following criteria:

- 1. The member must be a Past Matron or Past Patron and may not be a Past Grand Matron or Past Grand Patron;
- 2. The member shall have served for no less than five years on one or any combination of the following boards/committees: Constitution and Laws, Jurisprudence, Finance, Home Board, and Foundation; and
- 3. The member shall not serve on, nor be related to any member serving on any of the following committees; Constitution and Laws, Jurisprudence, Finance, Home Board, Foundation or Appeals and Grievances. If a later appointment of the member or an immediate relative of the member results in a violation of this rule, the member shall resign from the Executive Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the General Members shall serve for three-year terms, with one General Member appointed by the Worthy Grand Matron each year.

For purposes of filling the initial positions on the Executive Committee only, in the year that this legislation takes effect, the Worthy Grand Matron shall select one member who shall serve for three years, the Associate Grand Matron shall select one member who shall serve for one year, and the Grand Conductress shall select one member who shall serve for two years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Committee shall meet monthly, in no less than ten months of each year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Worthy Grand Patron shall be the Chairman of the Executive Committee, responsible for arranging and running the meetings, and as such shall not have the right to vote on matters before the Executive Committee except in cases of a tie vote.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all members of the Executive Committee shall be protected under the fidelity and other insurance policies currently in place for those persons who run the business of our Order.

WHEREAS, decisions that require more than one year should generally be approved by those during whose terms of leadership the implementation of the decisions will take place and should be acceptable to the general membership.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the following duties shall be assigned to a newly formed Executive Committee:

- 1. To supervise and administer the Grand Chapter Office, with the Worthy Grand Matron serving as the immediate supervisor of the Grand Secretary, including reviewing recommendations from the Grand Secretary regarding salary schedules and fringe benefits prior to such items being sent to the committee on Finance for their approval;
- 2. To give an annual performance review to the Grand Secretary, the occurrence of which shall be included in the Worthy Grand Matron's report at Grand Chapter;
- 3. To review all contracts before they are sent to the committees on Jurisprudence and Finance;
- 4. To review and approve a plan of action for all subordinate Chapters under probation or threat of probation; and
- 5. To create, approve and execute ongoing strategic plans for the future Good of the Order.

Amendment WITHDRAWN.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 5

WHEREAS, it has become impossible to operate our Grand Chapter effectively with decreasing membership and a per capita that only increases by fifty cents per year; and

WHEREAS, setting the per capita correctly would greatly improve the ability of the Grand Chapter to provide appropriate services to the members, the Eastern Star Senior Living Community and the Foundation without unreasonably burdening our Charities; and

WHEREAS, the most accurate setting of the per capita would take into account the anticipated expenses for the following Grand Chapter year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a budget shall be presented for the Grand Chapter at each Grand Chapter session which shows the anticipated expenses for the then current Grand Chapter fiscal year, including a ten percent contingency/reserve amount, and the anticipated income from sources other than the per capita payments, including anticipated service charges usually billed to the Eastern Star SLC and the Foundation, and that the per capita shall then be determined by dividing the next uncovered expenses by the number of dues paying members in California as of the last per capita calculation.

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED, that said budget and the resulting per capita shall be submitted for the vote of the Grand Chapter during each Annual Session and revised as needed during the Grand Chapter session until a budget and per capita are approved; provided however, that if the Grand Chapter fails to approve a budget and resulting per capita before the close of the last business session prior to Grand Installation, the per capita for the fiscal year shall be 150% of the previous year's per capita.

Report of Committees: The committees on Constitution and Bylaws, Jurisprudence and Finance to whom Proposed Amendment No. 5 has been referred, recommend a "yes" vote for the following reason:

Our Grand Chapter per capita income for the members has declined over the years as our membership has dropped. Fewer members means less per capita. For some time, we have covered that decline by spending down our Grand Chapter cash reserves and cutting expenses. Those cash reserves are gone, and we cut last year as many expenses as we could and still maintain our level of service to the membership.

We now need annual assessments to cover the budget deficit, which is running about \$70,000 to \$75,000 a year.

Last year the special assessment was five dollars. This year, we need a six-dollar special assessment to generate the same amount of income. We could do that special assessment in one of two ways. Finance can in a single motion move for the adoption of the budget and the adoption of the assessment needed to cover the deficit.

Alternatively, you can approve Proposed Amendment No. 5 in which case the required assessment to cover the deficit would be automatic without a separate motion being approved to the proposed budget. You would still control the assessment by controlling the budget.

So, the result is the same either way. It just seems cleaner to adopt Proposed Amendment No. 5 and do away with the second part of the annual Grand Chapter budget motion.

Amendment ADOPTED.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 6

WHEREAS, during the escort of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron at a Traditional Style Official Visit, the Instruction Book (page 90) directs the Conductress to give the Worthy Grand Matron her bouquet and Associate Conductress to give the Worthy Grand Patron is boutonniere; and

WHEREAS, the current practice is that a District may, or may not, provide a carrying piece for the Conductress to present to the Worthy Grand Matron, and a carrying piece for the Associate Conductress to present to the Worthy Grand Patron, immediately prior to their escort, instead of a bouquet and boutonniere; and

WHEREAS, the Conductress and Associate Conductress are further instructed to offer their right/left arm respectively to the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, to escort them through the Labyrinth, first stopping behind the Altar for introduction and then through the Labyrinth to the East; and

WHEREAS, the current practice is for the Worthy Grand Matron to follow the Conductress and the Worthy Grand Patron to follow the Associate Conductress; and

WHEREAS, most chapter rooms are not large enough to expand the Labyrinth sufficiently to allow for the Conductress to walk beside the Worthy Grand Matron and the Associate Conductress to walk beside the Worthy Grand Patron through the Labyrinth.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that at a Traditional Style Official Visit of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron the instructions be changed to the current practice of giving the District the option of providing carrying pieces for the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, and deleting the requirement to provide a bouquet and boutonniere.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron may follow the Conductresses rather than take their arms during escort.

WHEREAS, the Grand Chapter of California no longer has the area to maintain an inventory of Minute Books and authorizes the purchase of a Grand Chapter approved Minute Book from a supplier as chosen by the Grand Secretary.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the minutes shall be either hand-written, typed or computer generated, in full in a Grand Chapter approved Minute Book, which shall contain a continuation of numbered pages.

The Proposed Amendment will save the Grand Chapter office time, money and storage space by permitting minute books to be purchased directly from the authorized vendor.

Amendment ADOPTED.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 8

WHEREAS, Section 36 of our current Constitution and Laws defines the terms "North" and "South" as those members in California residing in, and belonging to chapters in, either north or south of the state dividing line; and

WHEREAS, the state dividing line is currently defined by counties, with the counties of San Luis Obispo, Kern and Inyo considered to be in the "south", and counties north of those counties to be in the "north"; and

WHEREAS, the geographic center of California is near the City of Madera, located in Madera County, with the counties of Fresno, Tulare and Kings being south of that county; and

WHEREAS, moving counties of Madera, Fresno, Tulare and Kings, all of which are south of the geographic center of California, into the South, will better equalize the distribution of members and districts between north and south, with 20 districts in the north and 20 districts in the south.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the definition, for the purpose of dividing the state of California in our Constitution and Laws, will be "North" to constitute those members who reside and belong to chapters north of the northern boundary of San Luis Obispo, Madera, Fresno and Inyo counties with "South" to constitute those members who reside and belong to chapters south of that northern boundary.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that for the purpose of Deputy Grand Matron appointment only, if the majority of the chapters in the district assigned to the Deputy Grand Matron fall into either the north or the south that the Deputy Grand Matron shall belong to whichever association represents the most chapters in the district assigned.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this legislation shall not have any effect on any previously organized groups of Distinguished or Honored Members unless such group chooses to implement this change and that this legislation shall not have any effect on the members currently serving on the Board of Trustees for the Eastern Star Homes of California.

Report of Committees: The committees on Constitution and Bylaws and Jurisprudence to whom Proposed Amendment No. 8 has been referred recommend a "no" vote for the following reasons:

First, the north-south line was never meant to cut the membership evenly. It is a cultural and travel line and, for those purposes, it is located correctly now.

Second, with no changes at all we are already trending in equality. At the time the line was codified, the state had two-thirds of its districts and chapters north and one-third south. Now we are almost even and the line is too important to move each year to keep the sides even. So, if we move it now, it will just imbalance again next year.

Third, the population center of the state is in Bakersfield and has been for 50 years or more.

Finally, the members of the affected chapters to who we have spoken do not want the line moved.

Amendment NOT ADOPTED.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 9

WHEREAS, concerns have arisen over the years that the costs of administering the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron's special projects, when such projects involve outside charities, have not been reasonably charged against such projects; and

WHEREAS, in additional to regular administrative fees, a five percent charge of the amount collected for outside projects was instituted to attempt to rectify these issues but has failed to reasonably correlate the work involved with the amount charged against the project; and

WHEREAS, by federal and state standards, all projects are to be charged in a similar manner as other charities administered through our Grand Chapter office.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the five percent charge for special projects be eliminated and instead, the time spent by the Grand Chapter office staff for special projects shall be accounted for and charged against such special project at the same rate as is charged against all Eastern Star charities for such time.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that amounts collected by any Chapter or group of members for a special project shall be sent into the Grand Chapter office by a check made payable to the Grand Chapter for projects under the Grand Chapter directly and payable to the California Eastern Star Foundation for projects under the Foundation. If the intent of the project is for donations to benefit local groups of the designated charity, rather than a single location or statewide office, the Chapter or group providing the funds may specify the local group to which they would like the funds disbursed when said funds are disbursed.

WHEREAS, the Constitution and Laws have not been updated for the current Investment of Funds provisions of the California Masonic Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that, the Investment of Funds provisions of the Constitution and Laws be updated to the current Investment of Funds provisions of the California Masonic Code.

From Section 809.130 of the California Masonic Code on Lodge Investments.

A Lodge may invest its assets, exclusive of Lodge Masonic Property, Lodge Masonic Hall Association securities, Life Membership Fund and Lodge revolving funds, as follows:

- A. Not less than 20% of the Lodge's assets subject to investment under this section, as valued at the time of deposit or purchase (and disregarding any automatic reinvestments of income or gains), must be invested in:
 - 1. Tier 1 (Cash Reserves). The lesser of 80% of the Lodge's assets subject to investment under this Section 809.130 or two times the Lodge's average annual expenditures over the prior three full calendar years must be invested in:
 - a. Cash or cash equivalents,
 - b. Money market funds or accounts,
 - c. Checking accounts or savings accounts of depository institutions to the extent fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund,

- d. Certificates of deposit with maturities of less than two years to the extent fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund,
- e. Obligations of the United States Government or obligations whose payment is pledged by the full faith and credit of the United States Government with maturities of less than three years, or
- f. Investment companies or investment trusts that invest in the above referenced financial instruments;
- 2. Tier 2 (Fixed Income). The balance of the 20% investment minimum under this paragraph A may be invested in:
 - a. Cash or cash equivalents,
 - b. Money market funds or accounts,
 - c. Checking accounts or savings accounts of depository institutions to the extent fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund,
 - d. Certificates of deposit without regard to maturities to the extent fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund,
 - e. Obligations of the United States Government or obligations whose payment is pledged by the full faith and credit of the United States Government without regard to maturities,
 - f. Corporate notes and bonds that are at least investment grade and are fully registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission and who issuers have a market capitalization of at least \$500 million,
 - g. Mortgage-Backed Securities,
 - h. Commercial Paper that is at least investment grade,
 - i. Banker's Acceptances,
 - j. Investment companies or investment trusts that invest in the above referenced financial instruments, or
 - k. Such other prudent and appropriate investments as may be approved from time to time by the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Lodge Committee on Investments.

- 3. Tier 3 (Growth Assets): no more than 80% of the Lodge's assets subject to investment under this section, as valued at the time of deposit or purchase (and disregarding any automatic reinvestments of income or gains), may be invested in:
 - a. Common stocks which must be fully registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission and whose issuers have a market capitalization of at least \$500 million;
 - b. Preferred stocks;
 - c. Master Limited Partnerships;
 - d. Convertible Notes and Bonds;
 - e. Convertible Preferred Stocks:
 - f. ADRs (American Depository Receipts) of non-U.S. companies;
 - g. Publicly traded REITs (Real Estate Investment Trusts);
 - h. Investment companies or investment trusts that invest in the above referenced financial instruments; or
 - Such other prudent and appropriate investments as may be approved form time to time by the Grand Master after consultation with the Grand Treasurer and the Grand Lodge Committee on Investments.

A Lodge may only invest its Life Membership Fund in cash equivalents, savings accounts, certificates of deposit, investment grade bonds and conservative growth investments which are designed for total return (defined as any investment returns, including capital gains/appreciation and losses/depreciation – realized or unrealized – and all dividends and interest). A Lodge's Life Membership Fund may not be used to secure or fund any loan to a Lodge or Hall Association, nor may it be used as collateral for a mortgage or promissory note to or for the benefit of any entity or person.

Report of Committees: The committees on Constitution and Bylaws, Jurisprudence and Finance to which Proposed Amendment No. 10 has been referred, recommend a "yes" vote for the following reason:

It will give chapters greater flexibility to make prudent investments.

Amendment ADOPTED.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 11

WHEREAS, vacancies in the office of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer may occur by death, suspension, resignation, or termination of paid employment, while accordingly having those positions filled by appointment by the Worthy Grand Matron; and

WHEREAS, that appointed officer shall exercise the powers and duties of said office, and in accordance with the Constitution and Laws, Section 20, receive the compensation of such office, as an acting officer, without installation, until the election and installation of a successor to the office.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that those persons who have served in the capacity of an Acting Grand Secretary or Acting Grand Treasurer, performing such duties as required for those positions for a minimum of six months shall be afforded the title of Past Grand Secretary or Past Grand Treasurer, as befitting their service to our Order.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Worthy Matron in her discretion, at all meetings other than at Installation, may select a different patriotic song to be sung at the time of Flag escort in lieu of the National Anthem. If the National Anthem is not sung, then the flag salute shall be released after completion of the Pledge.



The duties of the Committee on Audit are set forth in section 93B of the Constitution and Laws. The Committee on Audit is responsible for seeing that the financial statement of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California and California Eastern Star Foundation are annually audited by independent Certified Public Accountants.

The committee is also responsible for making recommendations to the Worthy Grand Matron regarding the choice and compensation of the CPA and approves all non-audit services to be provided to the organizations prior to such services being performed.

Where appropriate, the committee also consults with the Committee on Jurisprudence. The committee also sees that all requirements of the Nonprofit Integrity Act of 2004 or any amended or subsequent Internal Revenue Code sections relating to audit of nonprofit organizations are met.

The committee recommended to the Worthy Grand Matron that the firm Mueller Prost CPAs be retained to audit the financial statement of the Grand Chapter of California, the Eastern Star Homes of California and the California Eastern Star Foundation for the period ending September 30, 2016.

The committee reviewed the audit report of Mueller Prost CPAs. In the opinion of that firm the financial statements of all three entities present fairly in all material respects the financial position of each such entity as of September 30, 2016 and 2015, and result the operations changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended are in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

No ethical concern for competency issues were raised by the audit.

The committee believes that all requirements of Nonprofit Integrity Act of 2004 or any amended or subsequent Internal Revenue Code section relating to audit of nonprofit organizations have been met.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE

Thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored Members, sisters and brothers. It is a pleasure to present those committee members with whom I have the privilege of working this past year. And if they are still in the audience and not up here behind me, stand and wave.

Sisters Debbie Baptiste, Dixie Batto, Stacy Beyenhof, Patti Cady, Deanna Carr, Judy Edgmon, Ginger Jackson, Tamra Keen, Casey Rainey, Cindy Schulenburg, and Virginia Williams. And special wave out to sisters Cindy, Stacy and Judy who were kept the busiest this year. Thank you. Thank you for your service.

The others that I would like to name were not officially on the committee but, since committee members could not get to where the consolidation geography was located, I would like to acknowledge Sisters Robin Barnes, Deputy Grand Matron, Melissa Cronin, Deputy Grand Matron, and Erla Hildebrand, Past Grand Treasurer. They assisted in the completion of the consolidations and they were very, very willing to put out their time and effort to help our Grand Chapter in these processes. And I thank you very much.

It has been an adventure and continuing education to serve as the Chairman of Consolidations again this year. In Eastern Star it continues to be an emotional time that requires discussion and agreement with the need of merging and joining together.

In our Consolidation manual, which is being revised as new challenges arrive, there are 13 major steps to accomplish.

Step No. 1, contacting Grand Chapter, which gives you a liaison to assist you and clarify the needs of your individual Chapter. Then you begin to work with the process.

The second step is to examine the challenges of providing membership direction. You may consider location and condition and personality of the Chapter. Through meetings you finally arrive at the diligent work, the give, the take and loving compromise.

Committees are appointed, property and logistics are examined. Countless letters and reminders to the membership. Voting on a myriad of decisions and meeting and discussing details.

Then final voting, elections and installation.

Through it all, comes the realization there are people in the Order who act as true sisters and brothers who want to do all they can for the good of the Order.

There have been about five consolidation adventures this year. I will share the names of the Chapters, numbers, meeting places and dates with you today.

The officers, bylaws, reports and records will have been received by the correct committees and the Grand Chapter office as per our rule.

All this labor and more has been completed by valiant efforts and dedicated service and sacrifice.

In most cases our secretaries and Grand Chapter Secretary and their assistants have shouldered the responsibility and deserved our gratitude. No one knows the time you have expended.

Sisters and brothers, consolidations are really hard work. And I didn't have to borrow the Worthy Grand Patron's whip to accomplish anything. The rent was too high.

The five consolidations are:

On April 17, 2017, Lake Chabot Chapter No. 103 joined with San Lorenzo Chapter No. 177 to be consolidated as San Lorenzo Chapter No. 103, meeting in Castro Valley Masonic Center.

The second one, after being turned down by one chapter, Nova Star Chapter No. 319 joined with Ocean Park Chapter No. 245 to become Ocean Park Star No. 245 on April 23, 2017, and meetings are held at the Sunset Masonic Center in Santa Monica. This consolidation took over two years.

No. 3. September 18, 2017, Palmleaf Chapter No. 114, Porterville, completed consolidation procedures with Tulare-Corcoran Chapter No. 94, and will become South San Joaquin Chapter No. 94, with meetings held in Tulare Masonic Center. Their Installation of Officers is scheduled next weekend, November 6, 2017, so they would probably be considered as consolidating next year.

No. 4. After consolidation with another chapter was not successful, on September 20, 2017, Menifee Valley Chapter No. 243 consolidated with Star of the Valley Chapter No. 648, Moreno Valley, to be Star of the Valley Chapter No. 243.

Installation was held and they are planning another installation in November. They are meeting at the Masonic Center in Moreno Valley until December, but news just reached me that there's angelic help on the way, so that two months might not be set in stone.

No. 5. On October 18, 2017, Bellflower Chapter No. 397 sought consolidation with Emerald Star Chapter No. 143. They will be called Emerald Star Chapter No. 143, to meet in the Norwalk Masonic Center. The Installation of Officers is scheduled for November.

So that makes three completed consolidations and two almost completed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE

(Sarahann Shapiro, PGM Chairman) Report given during the Thursday Morning Session

This year it was my very great pleasure to serve on this committee with Sisters Heidi Benjamin and Kathy Young. Both of these sisters did an amazing job on each of the tasks assigned to our committee this year. I cannot thank them enough for their hard work, enthusiasm and assistance.

We began the year by working with the Jurisprudence Committee to write up the language to incorporate last year's legislation into our Constitution. All of the items adopted at last year's session were incorporated into change pages for our Constitution, and we sent a copy of our changes to the committee on Constitutional Reorganization so that they could be sure to provide the approved parts of all the new Constitution to include the items.

Throughout the year we reviewed and made recommendations with respect to proposed chapter bylaws revisions. In total, we reviewed 29 sets of proposed bylaws. Seventeen were approved as written. Three were sent back for revision, resubmitted and approved. Five were sent back with a request for revision, but no revisions were ever made and they were therefore rejected. And four were rejected for attempting to include items that were disallowed under our Constitution.

A complete list of these submissions and the results will be included in the written report submitted for the Proceedings.

As an aid to our sisters and brothers moving forward, I would like to remind anyone submitting bylaws for approval that you must include the date on which the notice of the bylaws consideration meeting was sent to the members. We check that date to make sure that sufficient notice was given to comply with the requirements of our Constitution. Many chapters send this notice out as an item in their newsletter, but the newsletter does not say the date on which it was mailed, and some chapters sent separate letters but didn't put a date on them.

Seventeen of the 29 bylaws reviewed, more than half, did not have correct notice information in the packet sent to the Grand Secretary. In 12 of those cases, we were able to get the notice information and approve the bylaws. Please, please, remember to provide the date on which the notice was mailed when you submit the proposed bylaws for revision.

In July, we attended a joint meeting of our committee and the committee on Jurisprudence to review the legislation submitted for this session, to assure that the words written by the proponents clearly set forth their intent, and that the object of the legislation was lawful. Meaning, that it did not violate the ritual or Red Book of General Grand Chapter and did not violate federal or state law.

My heartfelt thanks to each of the proponents who worked with us on wording for their legislation. Their kind cooperation allowed us to get the approved legislation to the Grand Secretary in plenty of time to meet the required publication deadline.

Yesterday, we held our Joint Legislative Review meeting with the committees on

Jurisprudence and Finance to review the legislation and determine our recommendation in accordance with our duty under the Constitution. I appreciate the efforts of all the members of the joint committees who participated in the meaningful discussion of the proposed amendments yesterday, and for each taking part of a task of getting them ready for presentation.

We thank Sister Linda and Brother Bill for appointing us to this committee, and we looked forward to fulfilling our final duties of the year in the next few days.

Our thanks also to Brother Gary Gole of Jurisprudence who was kind enough to help us with some sticky questions on some of our bylaw submissions, and to Sister Tammy Kinzy, our Grand Secretary, who has helped us track down missing information and documents all year. And a special thanks to our legislative staff here at the session for helping us prepare the legislation to be presented to you.

We are pleased to report that all three of us were in full agreement to the distribution of these proposed amendments. We thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for the opportunity to be of service to this Grand Chapter.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EASTERN STAR HOME BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(By Jim Whiteley, GGCCM, President)
Report given during the Thursday Afternoon Session

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished and Honored members, sisters and brothers, it has been an honor and privilege to continue this past year as the President of the Board of Trustees and speak at this Annual Session on behalf of the entire board.

At this time, I would like to present our dedicated board members who have served you, the members and the residents of our Home, with passion during this past year. They are Sisters Linda Hoeser, Worthy Grand Matron, Karen Meador, who has served as the Vice President, Laura Bouwens, Melissa Cronin, Kathe Larick and Ruth Serini, and Brothers Bill Prentiss, Worthy Grand Patron and Scott Smissen.

In addition to your elected board members, we are supported by two other important members of the team. They are sisters Tammy Kinzy, Grand Secretary, and Sandra Geanoulis, Grand Treasurer.

We are also supported by our Interim Executive Director and Administrator Judy Figueroa. Judy also serves as the Executive Director of Residential Services of the Masonic Home at Covina. Judy will be with us on Friday and you will get to meet her when she gives our report.

Our Constitution and Laws requires the trustees make a complete report of the property condition and operation of our charity for the preceding year.

We have two properties. Our Eastern Star Professional Plaza, also known as the ESPP, and our Senior Living Community, also known as the SLC. The ESPP has continued to be a good source of income for the SLC. As reflected in this year's ESPP budget the projected profit is expected to be over \$170,000. That amount is equivalent to having an additional four million dollars in our endowment at a four percent draw.

We are happy to report that we have all suites under contract with one exception, that being a lease that was recently turned out by a retiring doctor. Our agent has had interest in that suite by potential renters with hopes of having it leased soon.

2017 has been a challenging year for our Senior Living Community. We started out our budget year with a Home under the direction of our late Sister Kim Cooke and her highly qualified staff of managers. Sister Kim managed our Home through the first six months until her untimely passing while attending a LeadingAge conference in Monterey. In addition to Kim's service on the board of trustees she served four years as the Executive Director of our Home. She was a very dedicated employee with a 24/7 commitment to the Home's success.

Very soon after Kim's passing, we were contacted by Gary Charland, the Executive Director for Masonic Homes of California, who offered to help us in

any way necessary. As a result of this offer, we contracted with the Masonic Homes to have Judy serve as our interim administrator and to allow us to continue our operation under her administrator license.

At the time of Sister Kim's passing, Brother Simon Dias stepped up to the position of Interim Executive Director. Brother Simon served in that position up until about a month ago when he decided to re-enter retirement. The life of retirement. Brother Simon served as our Director of Maintenance for the past four years and is to be commended for leaving our Home in an excellent condition. He was instrumental in accomplishing a lot of deferred maintenance and setting up an effective maintenance schedule.

Judy is now serving as our Executive Director and Administrator, with Randi McGinnis serving as our SLC Manager.

Judy Figueroa brings to us over 28 years of residential care facility for the elderly and executive director experience. We are currently utilizing her experience to help evaluate the operation of our Home and look for ways to improve the efficiency, reduce costs and look for new sources of revenue.

We are currently working to establish memory care within our facility which will allow us to take care of our own resident members in-house and to provide a fee for service to nonmembers.

At the 2015-2016 annual sessions we had to submit emergent legislation that would allow us to spend up to \$3 million if necessary, of our temporarily restricted endowment funds to support our budget. I'm happy to inform you that over the past two years we did not have to spend any of those authorized funds. We have heard rumors that we spent the three million dollars each year and that isn't true. If it were, our endowment would have been well under \$19 million.

The ceiling of our restricted fund in 2015 was \$24,165,115.

I'm happy to report that the amount of our endowment as of September 30 of this year is \$29,366,737.

Now the increase in our endowment is due to some very generous trust payments that were received this year from two of our deceased members, in the amounts adding up to over four million dollars.

Sisters and brothers, please listen carefully. Even though we received some very generous gifts into our Endowment Fund, we still have some very serious problems. The income from our investments is not paying the bills. The 2016 budget year ended with a net draw down of the endowment by approximately \$577,000 as compared to the endowment value at the end of 2015.

The unaudited number for 2017 budget year indicates that we reduced the endowment value by another \$209,000.

Your board has been working diligently over the past two years to find a breakeven plan that would allow us to fund our budget with a four percent maximum draw from our endowment to ensure sustainability of our Home for the future. With our projected budget deficit, that you will see later, for this year of \$2,513,652 on this year's budget, we would need an endowment of \$63 million at a four percent draw to cover the deficit. We are almost halfway there, if you want to look at the positive side of that.

As was mentioned in an earlier report today, we have a very daunting task before us. To achieve the four percent requirement has been a very difficult task and one that demands that we find a new significant source of revenue in addition to our investment income. The Home has never been required to operate with a maximum four percent draw from our endowment, and at this time that may be an impossible task.

Your board held two special sessions this past year to brainstorm possible new sources of revenue and will continue into the 2018 year to find a solution. Because of the seriousness of this issue, we are working on two plans. The first being Plan A, an all-out effort to find a breakeven plan that will sustain our Home well into the future. To assist the board in this effort, we have enlisted the support of a business professional who will guide the board through this process and leave no stones unturned. Should it be proven that we do not have a path to a sustainable future for our Home, we will need a Plan B.

At our 2016 Grand Installation we were approached by our newly installed Grand Master of Masons in California who offered to sit down with us and talk about ways that we could work together for the benefit of our residents. We have had some discussion with the Masons this past year and plan to continue our discussions into the next year.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I thank you for allowing us to serve you and the residents of our beautiful Home.

This year, our chairman wanted to have all committee members more involved in the workings of the state Membership Committee, and wanted our committee members to be more involved with your subordinate chapters. Therefore, he assigned each member of the committee seven chapters to contact. The chapters were assigned not based on district or association.

The state Membership Committee designed a format for AMIs and created the theme Roar and Soar in 2017.

The format was to be ritual and leadership training. The programs were presented throughout the state during December and January.

A separate task force was formed to focus and accept the membership challenges facing Eastern Star in California. Meetings were held, two in the south, one in the north, where a total of over 100 members participated.

The members at the September 9 meeting discussed solutions to the membership challenges and to formulate a plan to implement those solutions.

Forty-three eager members and enthusiastic members attended this meeting, including several members of the Grand Line.

Those sisters and brothers that attended any of the task force meetings, please stand at this time.

Thank you so much for your participation.

The data and information was collected, shared with the Grand Line and given to the 2018 state Membership Committee Chair Jackie McDermott for further implementation.

The main goal of this task force was a call to action to the Grand Line and to our members to work on our membership issues. It was more than just talk, because we have been talking since 1974 about these same issues. It was a shout out for concrete plans, implementation of the plans and measurable results.

The consensus with each of the members wants and prays that the vision of Eastern Star be kept alive. The implementation of the solution is with the Grand Line. It is – a deep thank you and gratitude goes to Deborah Winn, Delma Davis, Jackie McDermott in sharing with my vision. Going forward, hopefully the Membership Committee will continue to work serving the chapters and the

members by providing needed education, leadership training and resources to deal with the many challenges facing our Order.

As an addendum to this report, the same group, Deb Winn, myself and Delma Davis, were invited to New Mexico's Grand Chapter last week to present a leadership training program to their members. At their Grand Chapter, we met with marketing coordinator of New Mexico. It should be noted that the data recommendations of the California task force was identical to the solutions and recommendation of New Mexico. The big difference was that our task force — all of you that stood up — did this without having to hire a professional consultant. We rock.

Sisters and brothers, our work is not complete. We all must wake up and begin to roar about our Order by doing those things that will make our Order relevant to everyone. If we are knowledgeable about our Order, positive in our approach, and persistent in our outreach, we will have a solid foundation for which to regrow our chapters.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

(By Brenda Hanson-Smith, PM (62/195) Chairman) Report given during the Saturday Afternoon Masonic Family Honor Session

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron distinguished and honored guests, brothers and sisters, I want to thank you for this opportunity to report on the work of the Scholarship Committee during 2017. Our committee included Patti Whitehill, and John Hoffman and Christa Tipton who could not be here today because of other commitments, and myself as chairperson.

I want to extend my gratitude to each of them for their diligence to the task at hand, for their extraordinary preparation, coupled with their educational expertise, and kind and compassionate hearts. Thank you.

Our committee met for our annual two-day deliberation retreat and I thought I would share with you some of the quantifiable and qualitative information from that. Some of it is numbers, because some of you are numbers people, and others of you are story people, so I am going to give you a mix of both of those to give you a feel of what the work of the Scholarship Committee is about.

We had \$97,600 in the fund this year. Thank you, brothers and sisters.

There were unfortunately no qualified applicants for the ESTARL or Music scholarships, and so those funds will carry over into 2018 and will be hopefully used then. The remainder to distribute was \$92,000.

We had 103 applicants, of which 100 were eligible to be considered.

Fifty-five students were funded. Eighteen of them are graduating high school seniors. Six are attending community colleges. Twenty-seven are in baccalaureate programs. Four are in graduate programs. I think that adds up to 55, but if it doesn't it was my mistake. It was what we did.

The students planning on attending or continuing at community colleges received scholarships in the amount of \$650 to \$1,000, and those planning on or already attending four-year programs or graduate programs received scholarships in the amount of \$650 to \$2,000.

Throughout the year this committee has been available to all applicants, if they chose to connect with us by phone, by text, by email, by carrier pigeon, Hogwarts, doves, whatever else. If they can get ahold of us, we were happy to talk with them. And we will continue to do this in 2018, and you should tell the young people that you know that if they have a question, please contact one of the members of the Scholarship Committee.

I think it is important for us to remember that our students, in response to the question of where do they attend school, they go to school all over. So, for this year's recipients, you can find seven of them on the UC campuses. For those of us who are Bears and Bruins, this is a good thing they are there. Eight of the California State University campuses will be represented. Six of the community college campuses.

However, many of you asked, where else do they go other than California? Do our monies go out of the state? Yes, some of it does. Some of it stays within private schools within California. We don't differentiate that, as long as they are California residents.

The list of out of state and out of state institutions is quite significant this year and includes the University of Nevada Reno, University of Arizona, Northern Colorado, Colorado State, Western Oregon, Northern Arizona, Perdue, Bucknell, Cogswell Polytechnic College, Spellman, Graceland, St. Catherine's, American University, Dominican College, American Military College, Concordia, Irvine, Chapman and National University.

A second question that you often ask us is, well, what are they majoring in? And you know, those of us who have had college experience are always looking for someone who might be following in our footsteps, so they are. And these are the majors that you can count on them doing. I would tell you that they are highly motivated and there were only three who were entering college as undeclared. In all of the groups the GPAs were averaging around 3.4 to 3.6.

So, in health care, we will find our recipients in medicine, osteopathy, nursing, physical and occupational therapy, public health, speech therapy, global disease and psychology.

In the hard sciences they are studying chemical engineering, biochemistry, environmental science and engineering, ecology, forestry, biology, forensic chemistry, computer science, game designing, engineering and cognitive science.

In business they will be found in finance and accounting, business administration and management.

In the arts and letters, they will be found in prelaw, sociology, poly-sci, communication, jazz studies, broadcast journalism, liberal studies for teaching and early childhood development.

I did not do that for this year but we will be adding a separate scholarship application for those who are applying for the music scholarship and the revised 2018 scholarship. They should all be up on the website here by the end of November.

In addition to academic excellence, all of our recipients, every single one of the 55, are involved in community service projects that we don't have enough time for me to talk about. They are all worthy. They are all in our community. They are doing just exactly the sort of things that we, as Eastern Star brothers and sisters, want to see the young people of our world doing and that we want to be doing, too.

I did an exit interview by telephone and email and text – whatever way I could communicate – with about half – a little bit more than half of the recipients this year because I wanted to be able to answer these kind of key questions that you posed to us.

So I learned that our scholarship funding is helping the recipients to become doctors, lawyers, teachers, nurses, physical therapists, journalists, forest rangers – Sister June Lucretia would love that – engineers of all types, genome researchers, business owners, corporate managers, corporate administrators, forensic pathologists and musicians.

There are more. I could name all 55 of their hopes and dreams and aspirations, but you get the point. They are highly motivated. They are directed to success and they are on the pathway that we can be proud of.

Many of you asked me and other committee members, how do they use our money? This is one of those kind of E.F. Hutton moments. How is our money being spent? Is it being spent wisely?

And I think I would just tell you that, once again, the exit interviews were incredibly revealing, and our dollars were helping them in a variety of ways.

For some, of course, it is helping with that tuition bill which can be formidable depending on where they are attending. However, for several it was the ability to know that they would have less credit card debt because they could pay things off in cash. They could buy all their textbooks. They could buy e-books, whatever, but they can pay for it in one fell swoop and not have to carry a debt on a credit card.

For some, it meant they could buy a computer and not have to spend time in the university computer labs doing their homework. Because those of you who are in

college, been to college, or paying for somebody else's college, know that a computer is just about as essential now as a ballpoint pen, maybe, if not more so.

Pay for college labs, which are expensive. My nursing students at the university pay around \$250 every semester just for lab fees.

Many said that our funding enabled them to work less hours each week and gave them more time to study.

One student in particular said that she had no transportation except her own two feet and lived three miles from campus. And our scholarship enabled her to buy a bicycle which gave her transportation in her college community, and she can now ride a bicycle to and from campus, and she bought her very first laptop computer and printer, and how much easier it made her life, she said. She said, "It just is easier now."

Students and their families fund college with a patchwork of scholarships, grants, work-study and personal contributions. I know I'm speaking to the choir here because many of you are college students and you know how that quilt looks. It is all a bunch of pieces. There is no one scholarship funding that pays for everything. But our part of it, our piece in that puzzle, in that quilt is an important piece.

I was trying to summarize what some of the students have said and, when I spoke with them, they validated how important our funding is to them. However much they get, they are grateful. They say, "Oh, this helped."

I thought of one student's story to try to stand out from all the others that might illustrate for all of us why we need to keep doing what we are doing, even if it means one less latte a week, one less McDonald's burger, for those of us who are ice cream-oholics, one less Baskin Robbins, but this is a story that I know will warm your heart.

If one student's story were to stand out, it is the student who will be attending Spellman College on a full tuition scholarship that will pay for classes, board and room, period. However, on August 1st, upon turning 18, and having been in foster care for 14 years, working throughout high school, every day, every week, this student is now out of the system.

She is without parents and she is without family. She has been in six foster care homes in the course of those 14 years. And she said to me, "It's on me now. It's on me to take care of me and to get through college. I've got this great scholarship and I'm not going to, quote, 'screw up'."

"I used the money that you sent me, the scholarship from the Eastern Star, to buy a laptop computer, and I have bought my books already for one semester, and I bought a new suit and nice shoes to go with it, so that when I go for job interviews I will look professional. I have a little bit left over in case there is an emergency."

I want to thank you brothers and sisters for helping this student fund something that's really important to her. She said, "I will write you and let you know how

I'm doing." And she will. And I will give it to Cherri Whiteley and she can post it and you can see her letters.

So, the last take-away point for us today, is that by funding scholarships for students, we are funding the future in case we doubted that. I don't think any of us did. Like I say, I'm preaching to the choir. I think we would agree it is an impressive list of institutions they are attending. Their majors are relevant to the needs of the 21st century. Our scholarship funding makes a positive statement that we value the recipients, we support their hopes and dreams for their future and for our future. They are our caregivers for our future.

In the exit interviews the recipients stated repeatedly that it was our vote of confidence in their ability to be successful – and it was priceless – and while they were grateful for the funding in any amount, the gratitude of our tangible statement of belief in them, the belief in another person by a person, by an organization, makes them say that they can and they will do whatever they can to work for the future and to not disappoint us.

We have a neat group. For those of you who are all about gender equity, we're not. We're about young people. So, for example, we have seven of our recipients are Eastern Star members, five are DeMolays, couple are Eagle Scouts. Three of them are Rainbow and Job's Daughter Grand Officers – no, five of them are. Two are Masons. Many of them belong to Rainbow or to Job's Daughters. Seemed like a really good group to me.

So, I hope you will continue to join with us committee members as we continue our efforts and we redouble our efforts to sustain and to even increase the donations for scholarship funding. It is a worthy endeavor, to say the least, and it is something that clearly you all know is a deep, deep passion in my heart.

And once again I thank you, Worthy Grand Matron, for the opportunity to serve our Order, to serve our youth, and to hopefully serve my brothers and sisters by giving you some information you may not have had.

Thank you very much for this opportunity.

The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron Special Project Eastern Star Cares has been a phenomenal success. The Eastern Star of California have donated \$33,628 worth of food to food banks, churches and directly to the needy in local communities, thus achieving our goal of giving to our local communities and having California Eastern Star associated with local community service.


Chapters filled the bags with the Eastern Star Cares logo on them and distributed them where they were most needed. The total reported dollar amount again was \$33,628, which breaks down roughly to about 13,726 pounds of food distributed to the people in need of the most basic necessity, food.

Some of the chapters took on the preparation and serving of food in cooperation with churches and other nonprofit groups totaling many hundreds of hours. The efforts of each chapter who participated in the Eastern Star Cares program can be very proud. One of our larger chapters in a metropolitan area has donated \$7,765 in goods and services and is still going strong.

One of our smaller, more rural chapters with fewer than a hundred people, has donated \$1,171 worth of food and services. Everyone who participated should be proud of your amazing Order.
